Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

First Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

THE ANTI-CRIME BILL which I strongly supported has passed the House by an overwhelming vote after two days of debate and now goes to House-Senate conference. The raw savor of crime in our big cities is almost beyond belief, and in my opinion all provisions of this bill are fully justified. In fact, even more drastic and possibly more innovative reforms are needed and should now be considered by the Congress.

OUR CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM IN URBAN AREAS IS A "SHAMBLES" according to Mr. Edward Bennett Williams, one of the nation's most prominent attorneys specializing in criminal law. Because his remarks during a recent television interview are so timely and meaningful, copies of the complete transcript are available free to constituents upon request to my office.

BIG CITY CRIME AND FILTH as described daily in the press are more dangerous to citizens today than the hazards of wilderness and hostile Indians faced by the early settlers. It takes as much courage to travel east in 1970 as it did for the pioneers to go west over a hundred years ago. Scaped by an Apache or yoked by a hoodlum — does it really make a difference?

ANOTHER GREAT STEP FORWARD FOR CREDIT UNIONS. The House last week approved legislation (S. 3822) providing share insurance for the more than 22 million Americans who are members of the nation's 23,944 credit unions. This insurance program, similar to Federal insurance protection for deposits in most banks and savings and loan institutions, will cover all credit union accounts up to a maximum of \$20,000 per account. While credit unions have an outstanding record for safe handling of funds, this new program will give added protection against loss. As with all other credit union legislation, the cost of the insurance program will be paid by the individual credit unions themselves.

HOUSE APPROVES LEAD-BASED PAINT ELIMINATION ACT. As discussed in my 1721st newsletter, lead poisoning kills hundreds of children each year and causes permanent damage to thousands more. To help eliminate this man-made hazard to children, the House voted last week for H. R. 19172 which originated in the House Banking and Currency Committee, of which I am Chairman. The bill now goes to the Senate for further action.

THE EMERGENCY COMMUNITY FACILITIES ACT, H. R. 17795, which I introduced has become law. It authorizes an additional \$1 billion for badly needed water and sewer projects and goes a long way toward eliminating the acknowledged \$5 billion backlog of applications submitted by communities throughout the nation. The backlog for Texas alone is over \$130 million. Timely construction of water and sewer facilities saves millions of dollars, protects the health of millions of people, and helps to preserve our environment which we increasingly realize is beyond price.

THERE WAS BI-PARTISAN SUPPORT for the bill to limit the amount of money that could be spent for television and radio in future political campaigns. The reason is obvious — it is hard to believe that any American wants to see the Presidency bought and sold, or only the rich elected to Congress.

FOR THE HOME GARDENER The U. S. Department of Agriculture has released new editions of two fact-filled booklets (each 3 pages): "Growing Chrysanthemums in the Home Garden" and "Growing Iris in the Home Garden." They offer valuable information on varieties as well as advice on planting and care of these popular flowers which are associated with the Fall ("mums" bloom in Autumn and the iris is usually planted in the Fall). Tom T. Jeffus Deport Banker, Dies Saturday



Funeral services for Tom T. Jeffus, 88, were held Monday at 2 p. m. at the Depot Presbyterian Church where he was an elder, the Rev. Sam Rice, pastor officiating. Grant Funeral Home made burial in Highland Cemetery. Deacons of the church were bearers with elders of the church as honorary bearers.

Born Sept. 7, 1882 at Depot where his grandfather, Samuel Jeffus settled in 1836, Tom Turner Jeffus was a son of John and Candis (Roach) Jeffus. He died Saturday at 6:30 p. m. in McCuiston Hospital at Paris after illness. Survivors are his wife, the former Mae Bell, whom he married March 8, 1904; a son, Hugh L. Jeffus of Depot; six grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren, also two brothers, Lewis Jeffus of Depot, Clarence Jeffus of Plano, and a sister, Mrs. Ota Bowen of McKinney. His son, Jack Jeffus Sr., preceded him in death in 1942.

November 1st would have marked the 60th year in banking for Tom Jeffus. From 1904 to 1908 he was cotton weaver in Depot, the first one ever elected. First State Bank was organized in 1909 and in 1910 he started work as bookkeeper. He was connected with that institution and became its president in 1927. He was president of its successor, the Depot State Bank, until the merger of First National and Depot State Banks in April, 1954, where he served as president.

Besides being prominent in the business world, Mr. Jeffus was known for his civic leadership, having served his home town and county in numerous capacities. He was a member of the Depot Masonic Lodge and received a 50 year Masonic membership pin in June, 1958.

He continued an active role at First National Bank until his recent illness.

Mr. Jeffus was a leader in numerous projects of civic improvements as a member of Depot Chamber of Commerce and other committees. He lived to see one for which he had worked for many years — the flood control of Depot Creek — approved recently.

Autin.— State employees want a 17 per cent pay raise within the next two years. They served notice of their desire at the annual meeting of the Texas Public Employees Association.

TPEA's legislative program for 1971 seeks a three-step (10.2 per cent) raise effective next September; and a two-step (6.8 per cent) hike the following September; plus a 3.4 per cent merit raise for half of the employees.

Also requested are "career incentive" benefits—a \$10 a month automatic raise after three years of service, ranging up to a \$60 a month supplement for employees with 30 years' service.

Substantial pension benefits also were included in TPEA's far-reaching legislative package which would give retired employees with 30 years' service 50 per cent of their base pay.

State employees also want their travel allotments boosted to \$16 a day per diem and 12 cents a mile.

SOCIAL WELFARE CHANGES.— Continuing growth of welfare rolls will bring changes in basic operating methods of the State Department of Public Welfare after January 2.

Welfare Commissioner Burton G. Hackney says that the key procedural change would require welfare applicants to fill out their own "declaration forms." This would replace face-to-face interviews with overworked caseworkers. This method already has been tested in Corpus Christi, Austin and Nacogdoches regions.

Another change would reduce social services to that which can be quickly provided and for which specific goals can be defined.

Hackney predicts that legislators will be called on for \$96 million annually in state funds, just to keep the financial assistance programs at present levels. This is \$16 million above the constitutional ceiling. Some \$291 million in federal funds would match the state outlay.

INSURANCE LAWS PUSHED.— State Insurance Board is pushing four new laws to protect both the policy holders and the ailing insurance industry.

Insurance Board told the House probing committee that it is becoming increasingly difficult to get home and auto protection in disaster-hit areas. Therefore, it will advocate these changes in the law.

Stiff regulation of holding companies, assessment of all companies to protect citizens against insolvencies, a mandatory pool to provide fire and windstorm insurance in areas subject to catastrophes and provisions for identifying and segregating company assets.

Board members said they are unanimously opposed to the "no-fault" auto insurance plan now before Congress and in effect in Massachusetts.

DRILLERS WARNED.— Three deaths in a new water well near Queen City in Cass County brought warning to water well drillers in Northeast Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana to beware of escaping nitrogen gas.

Texas Water Development Board issued a warning that a high concentration of nitrogen gas and a lack of oxygen were found in a Cass County well. Most likely source was found to be a natural condition caused by denitrification of organic matter in sub-surface strata, with entrapment in small reservoirs. A similar condition was found in Marion County.

COURTS SPEAK.— Interest on

debts after the death of the borrower may not be deducted in computing the net taxable value of an estate, says the Texas Supreme Court.

In other recent opinions the Supreme Court decided:

• Kentucky Fried Chicken distributors don't have to pay Texas' chain store tax.

• An Odessa woman is entitled to \$3,750 damages due to a fall at a drive-in grocery store.

• Distributors of a Florida-based cosmetic firm are not subject to state securities registration because investors must work for profits.

• Whether a Fr. Worth judge should have postponed a Sunday closing suit until similar cases have been decided will be reviewed November 8.

• Voters signing a petition to get a new party nominee on the general election ballot are entitled to know who the candidate is in advance of signing. Decision was in a case where the High Court ruled La Raza Unida candidates off the ballot in Dimmit, LaSalle and Zavala Counties.

• Appeal of a Ward County attorney to prevent the county's participation in a retirement system for employees was dismissed for want of jurisdiction.

AG OPINIONS.— Mobile homes or trailers owned by non-resident servicemen are not subject to ad valorem taxation, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

• A junior college district has the power of eminent domain to acquire buildings, lands for buildings, campus sites or other property the board of trustees determines is needed to carry out its functions.

• A minor's driving license automatically is suspended when finally convicted for driving while intoxicated.

• A County Commissioners Court can order publication of information relating to redistricting of the county into voting precincts in addition to the minimum publication required by the election code.

• It is not a violation for a motorist to make a left hand turn off a four-lane highway across a double yellow stripe into an alley, a private road or a driveway.

• Nursing home administrators must pass an examination by the Texas Board for Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators in order to get a license. However, the Board may not establish additional training requirements for those with sufficient experience.

DRINKS PASSAGE PREDICTED.— Sen Joe Christie of El Paso, head of the committee campaigning for passage of the local option liquor - by - the - drink amendment, predicts its passage at the election on November 3.

Christie says that sponsors of the amendment hope to dry up bogus private clubs in areas which vote against liquor-by-the-drink. "Hypocrisy" of present liquor laws, argued Christie, contributes to the "generation gap" and promotes disrespect for all laws.

Opponents contend that passage would increase liquor consumption.

Paris Jr. College Receives Land

Charles C. Green, Regional Director, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Dallas, announced today that a 235.88 acre tract of land at the former Camp Maxey Military Reservation will be conveyed by the Federal Government to the Paris Junior College at 4:00 p. m., Monday, Oct. 19, 1970, in a ceremony to be held in the J. R. McLemore Student Center at the College in Paris. The public is invited to attend.

Green will execute the Deed in behalf of HEW Secretary Elliot Richardson. Dr. Harold Hunt, President of the Board of Regents of the College, will accept the Deed on behalf of the College.

The property having a value of \$47,200 will be conveyed without cost to the College for use in its expanding program. Louis B. Williams, President of the college said that the college is looking forward over the next few years to developing the land into a demonstration livestock farm. In making the announcement, Green said the transfer is another example of the Government helping to make plows out of swords. U. S. Senator John Tower will be in Paris to participate in the event. The Senator has given full support to the conveyance. It is not known at this time whether U. S. Representative Wright Patman will be able to attend the event. Also participating in the ceremony will be Sam G. Wynn, HEW's Assistant Regional Director for Surplus Property Utilization.

Magic Formula Promotes Nutrition

Right side up or upside down, the 4-4-3-2 formula is magic in assuring well-nourished young people everywhere. And the magic formula is used by the 664,000 boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H food-nutrition program.

They find the 4-4-3-2 formula an easy way to learn and practice good eating habits. Using the nutritionists' daily food guide, the formula suggests: four servings from the fruit and vegetable group; four from the bread and cereal group; three from the milk group and two servings from the meat group.

The 4-4-3-2 approach to well-nourished young people is featured in a series of manuals developed by the Cooperative Extension Service with the assistance of General Foods Corporation and the National 4-H Service Committee.

Starting with the magic approach in the unit, *Tricks for Treats*, the young people move into *All American Foods*, *Meals for Today the Easy Way* and *Foods with an International Flavor*. A guide for volunteer leaders supports each unit. Planning, preparing and serving meals and snacks are covered in the attractive books. 4-H members enrolled in food-nutrition also learn about buyman-ship, nutrition, foods and customs of America and other countries.

Adding another dimension to the national 4-H food-nutrition program for the 10th year is General Foods Corporation's support through incentive and recognition awards. The company provides \$600 scholarships to six national winners and an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress to a winner from each state. General Foods also will host the group at the national 4-H event in Chicago, Nov. 29-Dec. 3. Four medals of honor are offered in each county.

Boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 19 are eligible to participate in 4-H including the food-nutrition program.

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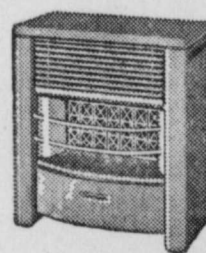
