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Day Burglar Walks Away With \$65 In Purses

Postman Brings Empty Purse Back From Out Of Town

Mrs. W. J. Hollaway walked out of her residence Thursday shortly after noon and, when she did, a burglar took between \$65 and \$109 in cash plus other valuables.

The daring daylight offense — second major house burglary here within a week — came as the housewife went into the yard carrying garbage at 1705 Austin.

When Mrs. Hollaway returned to the house moments later, two purses had been taken from a larger straw bag and a young man was walking away.

"I ran back through the house," she told The Record "then called police."

Only trace of the thief, however, came that evening in a phone call from Sweetwater and in the mail Fri-

day when the postman brought one of the empty purses from Abilene.

It was about 1:30 Thursday when Mrs. Hollaway in her house, locked from the inside, picked up the garbage can to take trash outside. She unlocked the front door, walked out the front entrance and around the south side of her home at the north side of E. 17th St.

"I came back in the front and locked the door behind me," she recalled. "I came through the house to get a paper bag for the garbage can."

"The kitchen screen door, which had been latched from the inside, was open."

"My straw bag in the carport at the west side of the house . . . our dog was bark-

ing . . . a yard gate was open . . . and a man was in front of the Virgil Mann house, next door, going north."

"He turned west on E. 18th St. back toward Hickory."

Mrs. Hollaway said the man — in his mid twenties and dressed in white shirt and dark trousers — apparently came into her home immediately after she walked out the front door.

He took a billfold and a black patent leather clutch purse from the straw bag and discarded the bag as he walked away from the house.

In the billfold was at least \$65 in cash plus identification cards, Social Security card, credit cards,

layaway purchase credits and other valuables.

A neighbor, Mrs. E. B. Proctor, 1704 Hickory, told Mrs. Hollaway she saw the burglar in the Hollaway yard as she was hanging clothes in her backyard.

"I thought he was a meter reader for a utility company," she said.

The man went out of the Hollaway house at the north door opening onto the carport, opposite from the side of the house where Mrs. Hollaway walked to and from the garbage disposal.

From the carport he walked through a fenced area, then out an east front gate.

Thursday evening a long distance phone call from Sweetwater brought information to Mrs. Hollaway that the white billfold had been found empty of money on Interstate 20 east of Colorado City near Bernards' Tourist Center.

The phone caller identified himself as a truck driver for a packing company and said he had found the billfold open on the highway.

"He was laughing about it," Mrs. Hollaway said, "and I told him I wanted him to know it wasn't funny to me."

"My final credit card and other papers were in the billfold, he told me, and said he was mailing the billfold."

Tags, Lights Urged For Cotton Trailers

Cotton farmers were urged Saturday to be certain trailers are properly tagged and equipped for traffic safety.

Cotton trailers hauling as much as 4,000 pounds must have proper license tags and all trailers must have one red tail light (operating) and two reflectors.

The warning came with the reminder that Texas Department of Public Safety is checking trailers throughout this area as the cotton harvest season moved into high gear.

A County Court jury of four men, two women returned a verdict of guilty here Thursday and sentenced a 19-year-old Snyder, newlywed to 18 months in jail.

The jury took only seven minutes to find Jim Raymond Burditt guilty of negligent homicide in the auto crash death of J. P. Nunn last April 30.

Another 60 minutes was required for deciding the jail term after the defendant's lawyer had asked the jury for probation.

But the jury said Burditt should go to jail for driving his 1959 Thunderbird at excessive rate of speed when it collided with the Nunn automobile at Hickory and Interstate 20, immediately killing the Colorado City man and seriously injuring his wife.

Burditt's lawyer, James G. Baker of Perryton, immediately filed a motion before County Judge Elmer Martin for probation from the jury's jail sentence.

The trial of Burditt, whose bride of only a few weeks sat tearfully in the courtroom as the verdicts were returned, began Wednesday morning and ended with the final verdict Thursday mid-afternoon.

Thirteen witnesses testified in the trial — including the widow of the wreck victim and the young wife of the defendant. Seven of the witnesses were called by County Attorney Frank Ginzler for the prosecution and six by the defense.

State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger told the court he was chasing Burditt on State Highway 208 (to Snyder), which is an extension of Hickory, as the Burditt Thunderbird and the Nunn car collided.

The patrolman said he had driven his patrol car at maximum speed between 110 and 115 miles per hour from the Buford area in pursuit of Burditt's Thunderbird but observed no noticeable gain on the speeder.

Mrs. Nunn, riding with her husband, said Mr. Nunn had stopped at the intersection of Interstate 20 south surface road entering Hickory from the west.

She said her husband asked if she was clear on her right side and she replied "yes." Then he entered the intersection to turn left and north on Hickory after telling her there was nothing in his direction, she testified.

The collision impact was on driver's side of the Nunn car and front of the Burditt auto.

Burditt, taking the stand in his own defense, admitted he was speeding in a 40 mile per hour speed zone but denied he was traveling 90 or 100 miles when he arrived at the intersection.

Mrs. Von Dell King of Snyder, a defense witness, said she created a hill north of the intersection and saw the crash. She testified no car had passed her auto in which she was traveling 60 miles per hour.

Other witnesses included Raymond Espinosa, Jimmy Luera and County Tax Assessor Collector M. D. Hardegree. Other witnesses for the prosecution were Assistant Police Chief Bill Henderson and Dr. Kenneth Eowan.

Testimony of officers investigating the accident revealed that Burditt's Thunderbird left skid marks of 165 feet before the crash, 211 feet after. Force of collision knocked Nunn's car 51 feet and hurled his body 105 feet.

Other testimony revealed that Burditt in preceding years had received traffic tickets for speeding, illegal turn and not observing a stop sign.

"We the state," County Attorney Ginzler told the jury before it began deliberation on type of sentence, "are not apologizing when we ask for a jail sentence."

"Democracy can survive only when people are respect-

ful of the rights of others."

Had in Mitchell County, are we going to have one live for free before we ever get serious about this fact?"

"This is a callous disregard for human life," Ginzler continued. "This is an aggravated case."

"The defendant should have substantial punishment."

Defense Attorney Baker in appealing for a probated 3 year sentence which

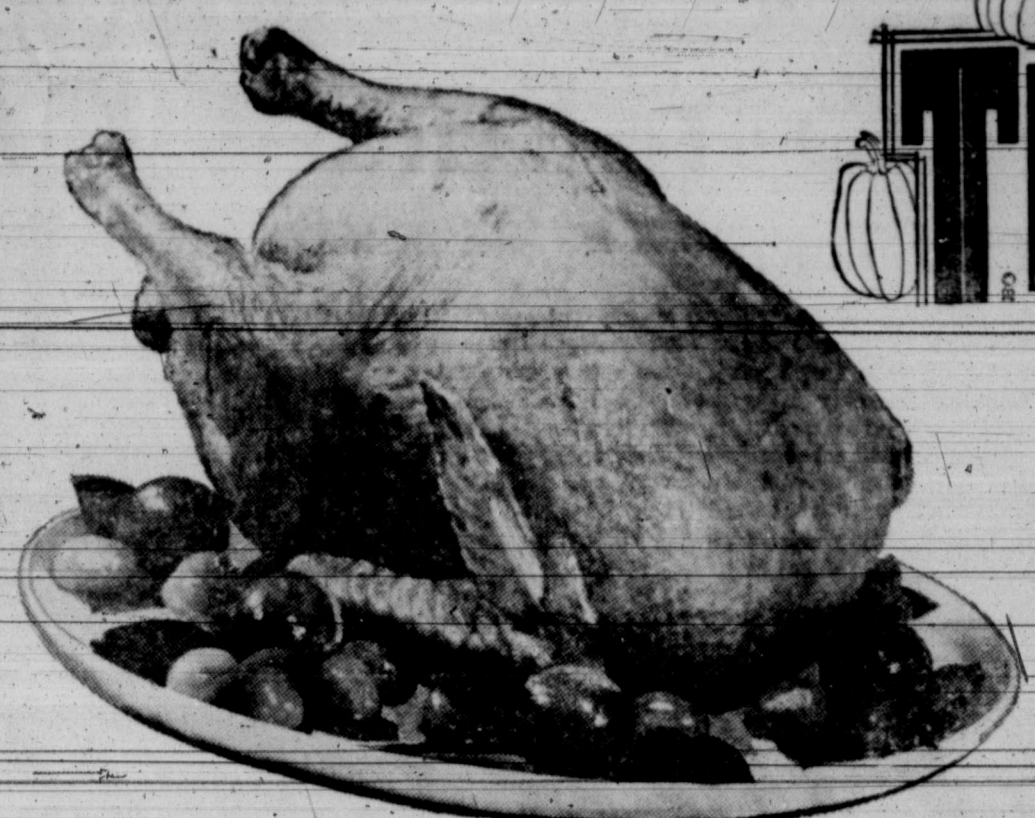

But whoever wrote the message, well-documented with scripture, simply does not know ME.

EXCUSES — or reasons for currently chronic absence from the church — long ago between me and the Lord, who knows. But because I was touched by the worried little letter a reply seems in order. Here it is.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

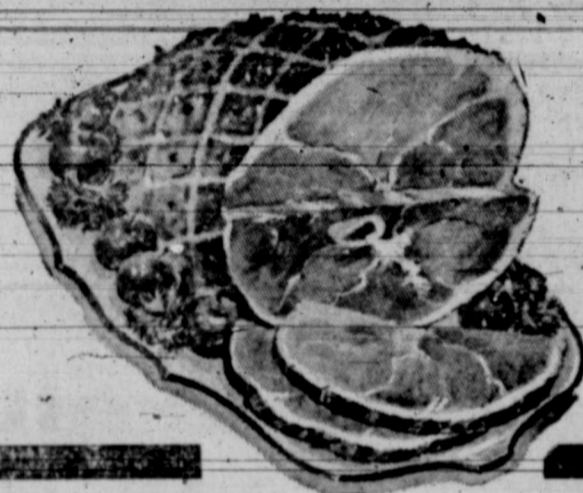

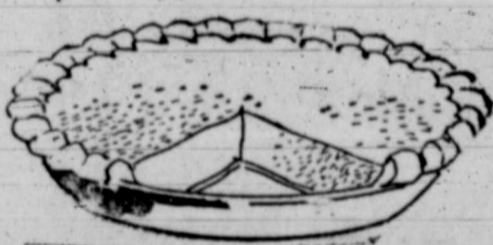
