Thirty-Six More Blocks Of Paving Ordered In City

Four Killed, Ten Hurt In Blast At Fire Works Plant

Explosions Wreck Five Buildings Of National Company

Series Of Blasts Occur In Massachusetts Factory From Unknown Origin; 2 Men Are Missing

Felt For 10 Miles

One More Man Likely To Die; Structures 10 Miles Away Shook By Blasts; 350 Employees Escape

(By Associated Press) HANOVER, Mass., May 10.—Four workmen were fatally injured and 10 others hurt here today in a series of explosions which wrecked five buildings of the National Fire Works company.

The dead were Edgar Knight, Frank Bulof, Robert Perry and Teobal Skwarzinsky. John Handberry was at a hospital and John Swenka was missing. None of the injured except Handberry was believed to have been seriously hurt.

Powder Exploded. The only explanation for the first explosion came from Perry just before he died. George J. J. Clark, treasurer and principal owner of the company, said Perry told a course he was placing a tray of dried powder on a rack when in some unknown manner the powder exploded.

Structures 10 miles from the plant were shaken. Although Hanbury, a private fireman at the plant, and Swenka were officially missing, fragments of bodies found in the ruins of the buildings caused searchers to believe they were still alive.

Moody Okehs 3 Bills Of Session

Change Of Spelling Of Texas County, Payment Of Members And School Unit For Terrell Approved

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, May 10.—Governor Moody was up with his work tonight. The three bills and two resolutions ground out by the special session of the legislature in the 19 days it has been on the job, were cleared of his desk, approved.

The resolutions were: Invitation to President Hoover to visit Texas. Authority for friends of the late J. S. Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey to erect a monument to his memory on the capital grounds.

The bills were the following: Knocking one "L" out of "Zavalla" name of South Texas county. The bill providing for expenses of members.

Authorizing Terrell county to adopt unit system for schools. The house adjourned today until Monday after adjournment of the bill creating a pardon and parole board. Twice during the afternoon speaker Bacon instructed Sergeant-at-Arms White to wake up "sleeping members" in order that a quorum might vote.

Dirigible Line To Hawaii Is Planned

NEW YORK, May 10.—(P)—California, if plans which have reached the stage of presentation for consideration to President Hoover materialize, is to have a great air base from which mighty dirigible liners will fly to Hawaii, the Philippines and the Orient.

Construction of the operating base may begin as early as next winter, and if this occurs America's first commercial Leviathan of the air should be carrying passengers and mail over the California, Hawaii route by 1931.

A \$10,000,000 plan for such an airline has been presented to the president by Paul W. Litchfield, president of the Goodyear Zeppelin Company of Akron, Ohio, who said he was ready to go ahead if congress at its next session would authorize shipping the Hawaiian mail by air.

Southern Baptists Vote Continuance Of Home Missions

Vote Of Confidence Taken In Work As Proposals To Abolish It Are Downed; New Orleans Gets Meet

(By Associated Press) MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 10.—The Southern Baptist convention gave its home missions board a vote of confidence today, and by deciding overwhelmingly against proposals to abolish it and combine it with the foreign missions board, agreed to continue the work jeopardized last year by the defections of the board's imprisoned treasurer, Clinton S. Carnes.

A special committee appointed to consider various suggestions for reorganizing the board recommended adoption of the board's official report. The report asked that the board be continued, that its expenditures be sharply reduced, and that no change be made in the present methods of handling home missions.

The vote on the board proposals was taken despite an unofficial ruling by President George W. Truett that one of the defeated plans was unconstitutional because of conflicts with clauses which provide for separate boards.

The convention decided to hold its 1930 convention at New Orleans, beginning Wednesday, May 14.

Relief Amendment Accepted Friday

Provision Gives Congress Power To Fix Salary And Not President; Vote May Be Taken Next Week

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 10.—Preparing for a final vote early next week on the farm relief bill with its disputed export debenture section, the senate accepted the first of a mass of proposed amendments today, one which would give congress, instead of the president, the power to fix the salary of the proposed farm board's chairman.

The remainder of the amendments are expected to be disposed of by Monday, the senate recessed over the week-end.

The amendment was supported generally by the same Democrats and Republican independents who disregarded Mr. Hoover's objections to the export debenture plan, and also by a number of senators who upheld the president, opposition to debentures.

DALLAS, May 10.—(P)—Whether headquarters of the Texas State Teachers' association will remain in Fort Worth or be removed to Austin will be decided at a meeting of the association executive committee in Fort Worth tomorrow, it was announced today by Brooks Caldwell, president.

Littlefield, Amherst And Olton Seeking Courthouse

LAMB COUNTY voters will march to the polls today to determine by ballot a proposal of changing the location of the county seat from Olton, present capital, to either Littlefield or Amherst.

Culmination of a campaign on the part of Littlefield citizens to secure the county seat, the election will be strengthened in interest by the recent entrance of Amherst into the appeal for the location.

Colquitt To Rail Mediation Board

Former Texas Governor Will Succeed Pat Neff at Post; Confirmation Comes After Discussion And Hearing

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 10.—The senate today confirmed the nomination of Oscar B. Colquitt, former Texas governor, to be a member of the railway board of mediation.

Colquitt will succeed Pat Neff, another former Texas governor whose renomination by President Coolidge early in the year never was acted on by the senate. President Hoover then named Colquitt, who described himself to the senate interstate commerce commission as a "Hoover Democrat."

There was some discussion of the Texan's nomination at the executive session today but no record vote was taken. The interstate commerce committee called Colquitt to answer protests which related to evidence in an old law suit to the effect that he had been offered a \$25,000 loan by the Texas Brewers' association in 1916. He denied this charge and the committee endorsed him.

Houston Murder To Go Down Unsolved

HOUSTON, May 10.—(P)—Although officers today continued their search for the slayer of Olona Wunsche and Edward Stone, whose bodies were found Monday near Aldine, the killings apparently were destined for a place in the book of unsolved crimes.

Every lead had led nowhere. Belief was expressed tonight that the secret of who killed the pair had been buried in the prairie with the victims.

Two men held for questioning were eliminated from calculations of officers today and Sheriff Binford announced that two negro women held in San Antonio have no connection with the murders.

RECOMMEND ADDITION

Arizona And Colorado May Be Added To Region

AUSTIN, May 10.—(P)—Addition of Arizona and Colorado to the Cactus region of the girl scouts was recommended at regional conference here today. Oklahoma, Texas, and New Mexico now compose the region.

AGED GOLD MINER'S THIRTY-YEAR FIGHT FOR PATENT INFRINGEMENT IS REWARDED

(By Associated Press) SAN FRANCISCO, May 10.—Announcement in New York today that settlement of litigation involving claims of George Campbell Carson on infringement of his patented reverberatory smelting furnace has been consummated ends a long struggle by the aged gold miner for a fortune. He is head of the Carson Investment company.

The American Smelting and Refining company and the Anaconda Copper Mining company were among the last organizations to settle with Carson in suits he started some years ago involving upwards of \$20,000,000.

For nearly 30 years, Carson grubbed the desert in search of gold. Past the prime of his life, spent in the heat ridden days on the sands of the southwest, he invented the reverberatory copper smelting furnace, said to facilitate the reduction of that metal.

The invention was adopted by copper smelting companies, which, he claimed, asserted it was based on an old principle and that Carson was not entitled to a fortune.

Hamilton May Be Arraigned Today In Murder Case

Hearing Is Uncertain, However, May Be Delayed; Attorney Refuses To "Try Case In Newspapers"

Under a Texas law which requires the accused to be served with indictment papers at least two days before arraignment, it would be possible to bring Hamilton into court tomorrow, exactly a week after the shooting. He received a copy of the indictment when he was arrested Wednesday.

Hamilton spent most of today in the jail office conferring with attorneys, including his law partner, H. G. Hendricks. Hamilton asked jail keepers if there were any reporters around before he would come down out of his cell. His attorneys would not say what action they might take to obtain bond for the prisoner.

Prisoners in the same cell with Hamilton report him congenial and "one of the crowd."

Naval Flier Sets Altitude Record

Lieutenant Soucek Climbed 39,140 Feet, Records Of National Association Revealed Friday

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 10.—Official announcement that Lieut. Apollo Soucek of the navy has approached the sun nearer than any other mortal was made today by the National Aeronautic association.

The flier reached a true altitude of 39,140 feet in his biplane over the naval air station Wednesday. This was determined today at the Bureau of Standards, where a barograph carrier in the plane was calibrated. The National Aeronautic association recognized the mark as a new world's altitude record.

LIONS GO TO AUSTIN

Texas District Meet To Be In Capital; Kater Chosen

SAN ANGELO, May 10.—(P)—Austin was selected as the 1930 convention city of the district of Texas of Lions International, and A. C. Kater of Houston was named district governor at the closing session of the 1929 convention here today.

In winning the convention, Austin beat Galveston by a vote of 193 to 176.

Sooner Justice Is Freed Of Charges In Impeachment

Oklahoma Senate Reinstates Justice J. W. Clark Friday; Ten Voted Down, One Dismissed

(By Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, May 10.—Justice J. W. Clark of the state supreme court was acquitted by the senate court last today of ten of the eleven impeachment charges preferred against him by the house of representatives. The other charge was dismissed.

The senate court verdict automatically reinstates Justice Clark to the supreme court bench from which he was suspended about a month ago when the court accepted the house charges.

The last charge to be voted on was one of general incompetency, of which Governor Henry S. Johnston was convicted by the senate in March and removed from office. The vote for conviction of Clark on this charge was 13 to 30.

California High Students Strike

SAN MATEO, Calif., May 10.—(P)—One thousand students at the San Mateo Union high school went on strike today in protest against the discharge announced yesterday, of George S. Reed, physical director and track coach, and the subsequent resignation of James E. (Spud) Spaulding, baseball, football and basketball coach.

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TRUBEE NOT WORRIED

Assistant War Secretary Not Alarmed Over Status

SAN ANTONIO, May 10.—(P)—Arriving here by plane today to inspect Randolph Field with a view to hastening construction at the new "West Point of the Air," assistant Secretary of War F. Trubee Davidson declared he is not alarmed over the number of resignations of air corps pilots quitting the service to enter commercial aviation.

"A year ago," he said, "I did feel some alarm over the situation but time has not borne out our fears."

Five Streets Will Get Improvement In Needed Areas



Avenues K, G, S, T, and Fourteenth Street Are Affected By Order; Recent Bonds Bear Expense

Much Authorized

Fourteenth To Be Paved From Q To College; Avenue S From 19th To City Limits In Program

THE Lubbock City Commission in recess session Friday night ordered the paving of 36 additional blocks in this city, part of a program for distribution in pavement over needed sections, as provided for by \$25,000 of the bonds voted here September 24, 1928.

Much of the paving program, outgrowth of the bond election, has already been authorized.

Streets which will be hard-surfaced are the following: Avenue S, from 19th street to the city limits, 15 blocks; Avenue E, from 18th street to 19th street, 3 blocks; 14th street, from Avenue Q to College Avenue, 7 blocks; 14th street, from Avenue G to Avenue H, 1 block; 14th street, from Texas Avenue to Avenue M, 4 blocks; Avenue T, from Broadway to 19th street, 7 blocks. The paving on Avenue T will touch the campus of the present high school on the east and will also touch on the east the campus for the proposed new high school on 19th street.

The commission discussed question of abatement damages with property owners affected by the Avenue H underpass, but no action was taken.

Lubbock Likely To Get Big Air Play

Development Of Facilities Here And Advantages Of Flying Offered In Area Promise Progress

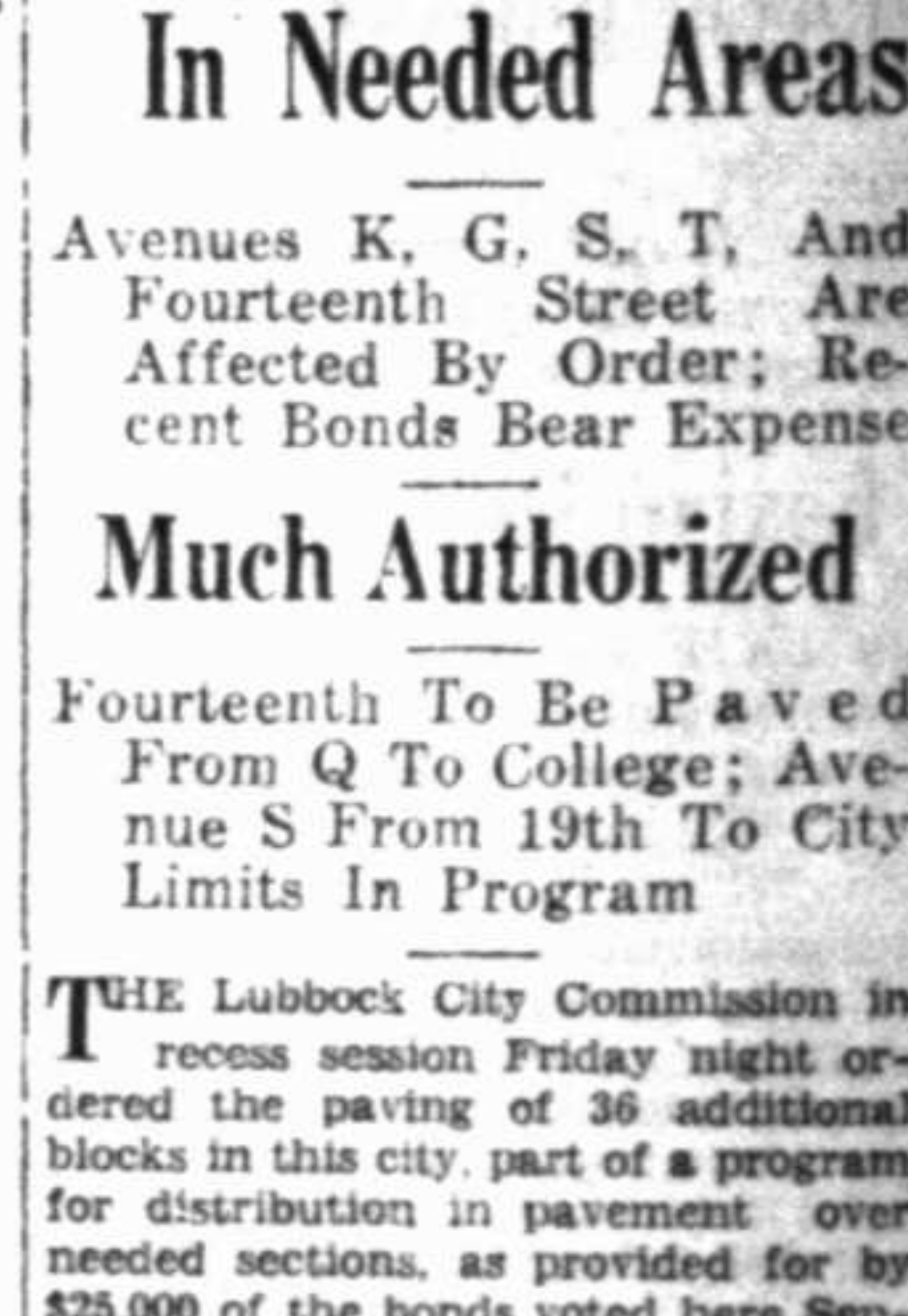
As soon as facilities are provided Lubbock will share in the rapid trend of airport transportation through the southwest, in the opinion of George E. Benson, chairman of the aviation committee of the Lubbock Board of City Development.

"Aeronautic leaders have found many hazards, such as mountainous ranges and blinding fogs, over midwestern routes, and emergency landings are impossible through the Rocky ranges," he said. "When airport provisions are made practically all the transcontinental flights will be made through the southwest. Here we have weather conditions which will permit flying almost every day of the year, and emergency landings can be made almost anywhere through this section."

"Plausibly, Lubbock is in a position to connect with international lines north and south, and with transcontinental lines east and west. After voting \$75,000 worth of municipal bonds for an airport, we should look forward to a carefully planned field, which should be designed from the standpoint of convenient and safe arrangement of equipment by an expert."

How to Achieve Beauty

It may seem to you that legs, like noses—are a feature whose shape you have to take as it comes and put up with it. But they aren't—you can alter the shape of your legs more easily than you can the shape of your nose; unless they are badly "bowed," when you should go to a good orthopedic surgeon and let him advise you.

But ordinarily imperfect legs can be improved and made more shapely. Thin ones can be developed, and fat ones reduced.

Exercise of various sorts changes them. Swimming is the best one I know for developing beautiful, long-muscled, graceful legs.

If your legs are too thin and spindly looking, use them more. Exercise develops thin legs just as it reduces too fat ones. Walk whenever you can—and dance. Look at a dancer's calves and realize what exercise has done to change them! Often her legs may be over-developed and over-muscular, especially if she is a toe dancer, because the same muscles have been used in the same way too strenuously and too often. But the danger of over-developing your legs through exercise is not very great. Remember that in general, stretching, relaxing and shaking exercises are best for making long, graceful muscles in place of tight, lumpy ones. Rhythmic dancing is the best dancing of all to develop pretty legs.

Here is a good exercise to help thin legs grow shapely. Place a thick book or a block of wood on the floor. Stand with the balls of your feet on it, letting the heels hang off in back. Rise up on your toes, then lower your heels to touch the floor behind. Repeat 12 times with both feet, then do it with each foot singly, letting it balance.

Sunday-School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR MAY 12, 1920

General Topic: The Early Ministry of Jeremiah.

Scripture Lesson: Jer. 1:6-10; 26:1-15.

Jer. 1:6. Then said I, Ah, Lord Jehovah! behold, I know not how to speak; for I am a child.

But Jehovah said unto me, Say not, I am a child; for to whomsoever I shall send thee thou shalt speak; and whatsoever I shall command thee thou shalt speak.

Be not afraid because of them; for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith Jehovah.

Then Jehovah put forth his hand, touched my mouth; an Jehovah said unto me, Behold, I have put my words in thy mouth.

See, I have this day set thee over the nations and over the kingdoms, to pluck up and to break down, and to destroy and to overthrow, to build and to plant.

And it came to pass, when Jeremiah had made an end of speaking all that Jehovah had commanded him to speak unto all the people, that the priests and the prophets and all the people laid hands on him, saying, Thou shalt surely die.

Why hast thou prophesied in the name of Jehovah, saying, This house shall be like Shiloh, and this city shall be desolate, without inhabitant? And all the people were gathered unto Jeremiah in the house of Jehovah.

And when the princes of Judah heard these things, they came up from the king's house unto the house of Jehovah; and they sat in the entry of the new gate of Jehovah's house.

Then spake the priests and the prophets unto the princes and to the people saying, This man is worthy of death; for he hath prophesied against this city, as ye have heard with your ears.

Then spake Jeremiah unto the princes and to all the people, saying, Jehovah sent me to prophesy against this house and against this city by all the words that ye have heard.

Now therefore amend your ways and your doings, and obey the voice of Jehovah your God; and Jehovah will repent him of the evil that he hath pronounced against you.

But as for me, behold, I am in your hand: do with me as is good and right in your eyes.

Only know ye for certain that, if ye put me to death, ye will bring innocent blood upon yourselves, and upon this city, and upon the inhabitants thereof; for of a truth Jehovah hath sent me unto you to speak all these words in your ears.

[Time: Jeremiah born (Beecher) about B. C. 646. Begins prophesying, B. C. 626. Jehoiakim becomes king of Judah, B. C. 607.

Place: Jeremiah's call, at Anathoth or Jerusalem. Jeremiah's prophesying and trial, Jerusalem. Golden Text: We must obey God rather than men.—Acts 5:29.

Introduction.

God speaks it must be through the lips of man. God speaks out into the world today to his hand on men who will speak the message to men. We are surprised when we look at a specimen whom God chose in turbulent and sinful age to be a mouthpiece to wicked, scoffing men.

He chose as a medium for his message a simple, earthen vessel without any of the qualifications which we might deem necessary. He was not eloquent as Isaiah or serene as Ezekiel, nor strong and brave as Elijah, but a timid, shrinking boy, conscious of his weakness and yearning for a sympathy and which he could never know.

He was chosen from a quiet, obscure home of a village priest. His very nature seemed to disqualify him utterly for any such calling, yet God chose him in the quiet hour and led him to his messenger.

Jeremiah Makes Excesses, v. 6. "Then said I, Ah, Lord Jehovah! behold, I know not how to speak; for I am a child." Jeremiah was fifteen or twenty years old at the time, a very young man. He knew that if he should attempt to proclaim divine truth he would be caught into conflict with many worldly minded priests and prophets of the day. Jeremiah was certain to embroil himself in many strifes if he should set himself in opposition to the current of the times. He was timid and shrinking, and was not practiced in public speaking. For him to be a prophet seemed an impossible task. He joined the long line of divinely appointed leaders, Moses, Joshua, Saul, David, Jonah, Paul, Mark, many more—who have "licked" against the heavy and dangerous work marked out for them. For all that, God has the same answer that he gave to Jeremiah.

"I Am With Thee," v. 7. "Be not afraid because of them; for I am with thee to deliver thee, saith Jehovah." Twice at least, Jeremiah was assailed by many powerful foes, and was often in extreme peril because of his unpopular teachings and his bitter condemnations of wickedness; these promises just have been a wonderful comfort to him through all his ministry. Our savior has given the same precious assurance to all his faithful disciples; "Lo, I am with you ways, even unto the end of the world." (Matt. 28:20).

The opening verses of the Book of Jeremiah, the scope of his prophesies, i. e., from the thirteenth year of the reign of Josiah, through the reign of Josiah's son Jehoiakim, to the end of the eleventh year of the reign of Zedekiah up to the captivity of the inhabitants of Jerusalem in the fifth month of that year.

Jeremiah next gives us the words which he said to himself, declaring before his birth he was chosen by the Almighty to be "a prophet to the nations." That he had been divinely chosen before his birth for a special work must have

Jeremiah feels that he has done his best; nay, that God has done his utmost, and that it has all been perfectly useless.

Jeremiah The Weeping Prophet. 9:1, 2.

The first verse of this chapter is one of those that gave Jeremiah the title of "the weeping prophet": "Oh that my head were waters, and mine eyes a fountain of tears, that I might weep day and night for the slain of the daughter of my people!"

Then follows Jeremiah's prayer for some refuge from the plotters and the wicked men around him; some refuge, no matter how lonely and barren, if only a "desolate, land, a mere enclosure, with no food and but the poorest shelter. At any rate, he would be free from the lies and treachery that surrounded him in Jerusalem.

Jeremiah's Public Preaching. 26:1-6. Jehovah sends the prophet on a great fast day when people from all the surrounding country would be crowding about the Temple, to deliver a message to the assembled multitude. Not one word was to be kept back. The king might issue an order to have him executed, but he must deliver the message. He declared to them that their Oburancy would compel Jehovah to make their beautiful sacred shrine as complete a desolation as the site of Shiloh, which for five hundred years had been in ruins.

The Effect of the Message. 26:8, 9. We can imagine something of the fury and consternation which was manifested by these hearers. It seemed like the height of impertinence to say such "blasphemous" things about the temple. He found himself in the midst of a veritable whirlpool of excitement. It is a

thrilling experience which the prophet undergoes. The princes rush down to the temple to find the infuriated mob ready to commit murder. They hastily constitute a court of appeals and the prophet is given a trial.

Jeremiah's Defense. 26:12-16. Jeremiah said, "Jehovah sent me to prophesy against this house and against this city all the words that ye have heard." This is the only answer that any faithful speaker for God can make when his utterances are criticized. Thus spoke Amos in the Old Testament: "The Lord Jehovah hath spoken: who can but prophesy?" (Amos 3:8), and thus spoke Peter and the other apostles in the New Testament: "We must obey God rather than men." (Acts 5:29).

Now therefore amend your ways and your doings, and obey the voice of Jehovah your God." Here is no faint-hearted preaching; Jeremiah is threatened with death, but he valiantly repeats the exhortation that brought him into court. "But as for me, behold, I am in your hands: do with me as is good and right in your eyes." Jeremiah recognizes the legal right of the tribunal to execute him, and confronts the prospects without theatrical defiance on the one hand or abject cowardice on the other, but with a serene expression of his willingness

to accept the verdict his judges pronounce.

"Only know ye for certain." It was Jeremiah's duty, as a preacher of righteousness, to warn his hearers of the terrible guilt they would incur in slaying him; this much of a plea he would make, more on their behalf than on his own. That, if ye put me to death, ye will bring innocent blood upon yourselves, and upon this city, and upon the inhabitants thereof." Thus Gamaliel warned the Sanhedrin that in condemning the apostles they might be fighting against God. (Acts 5:30). Thus Pilate's wife warned him, because of her dream, to have nothing to do with the condemnation of Jesus, for he was a righteous man. (Matt. 27:19). The verdict was: "This man is not worthy of death; for he hath spoken to us in the name of Jehovah our God." "So Jeremiah was snatched from the enemies—delivered from that most terrifying of all dangers—the fury of a fanatical mob."

THE BRIGHTER SIDE

If you had happened out at Senior High school almost any day during the week just gone by you would have gotten a thrill. The curtains of the past would have been lifted aside for you just a moment and you would have been carried back to the time when you, too, walked from your public school days through the threshold of life.

Two hundred fifty-five young American boys and girls are leaving the Lubbock school system. Back of them are happy, care-free days of high school. The institution, which through the past four impressionable years has been a part of their life's blood, is behind them. Friendships, fashioned in the classroom and on the campus, are being broken by the hint of separation which will come—all too soon.

There has been a spirit of seriousness permeating the rooms, the halls and the campus of Senior High school during the past week. Even the thought of a summer's vacation—a respite from the arduous duties of classes—has been forgotten. It is with a decided note of sadness that the Seniors of 1929 leave their first Alma Mater. A chapter in their lives has been written and the moving finger writes, and having writ, moves on, and all your petty nor all your wit cannot remove a single word of it!

The Avalanche understands the sadness of farewell. It sympathizes, in a rather sophisticated manner, perhaps, but sympathizes just the same, with the Seniors as they go into college or out onto the varied walks of life. But in this sadness of farewell the Avalanche also sees a good omen. It sees an efficient school system, which in daily contact, draws students happily and contentedly within its portals.

If the Senior class of 1929 had been happy to break school ties, the Avalanche would have felt that there was something wrong—radically wrong—in the operation of our high schools. If the teachers and the executives had been unable to bind their students to the institution through education and through patient, careful management of those students, there would have been plenty of room for fear that somewhere, somehow, someone was failing at the job.

But there can be nothing much wrong with a high school which ties its students to it. There can be nothing much wrong with executives and faculty members who do not lose the personal touch in their daily tasks of teaching young America. The Avalanche is glad to commend the faculty and the executives of Lubbock Senior high school upon their records for the year and congratulate the outgoing class as being so fortunate in attending an institution of such merit.

THE HEIGHT OF FUTILITY

The preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations, sitting at Geneva, has decided that neither poison gas nor disease germs may be used hereafter in any wars.

This agreement, beyond doubt, will presently be ratified by all of the world powers, from Abyssinia to Uruguay, and the peace-loving people of the world will tell themselves that another great victory has been achieved.

To begin with, no one but the most hopeful of optimists would suppose that such an agreement would really be binding in time of war.

In one thing in this world is certain, it is that any nation, going to war now or hereafter, will use every weapon at its disposal. Poison gas may be prohibited by treaties enough to fill a library; nevertheless, the next war will see poisoned gas used on a greater scale than ever before. There simply is not any doubt about it.

Disease germs may be another matter. It is quite possible that they will not form part of the properly-prepared nation's arsenal. You see, they are so hard to use effectively. Chemicals work better; they are bacteria. They kill more people for the same amount of effort.

But poison gas will be used, just as high explosive shells and machine guns and airplanes will be used. And treaties of the kind just promulgated at Geneva, may conceivably, in the long run, do much more harm than good.

No one ever gets anywhere by kidding himself. And when we go to a lot of fuss and bother to "outlaw" the use of poison gas in war time, we are kidding ourselves in a big way.

We are blinding our eyes to realities. Even the dustiest man can see, in what happened between 1914 and 1918, that war on a large scale is simply too hellish to be borne. And poison gas, which can wipe out whole cities of non-combatants overnight, is one of the things that make it so.

Now, when we declare that we will not use gas any more, what are we doing? Just this: we are telling ourselves that future wars won't be so terrible, after all—and we are taking away one of the great arguments that should make us work to avoid war altogether.

It wouldn't be so bad if the anti-gas prohibition would work. But it won't. Fooling around with it simply prevents us from mobilizing our full strength for the fight for continued peace.

Patching up rules for war is the most futile occupation imaginable. War will abide by no rules. In trying to devise some we are merely kidding ourselves.

FREEDOM OF THE PRESS?

An effort to repeal Minnesota's infamous gag law has failed. But it is gratifying to note that one of the state's leading newspapers intends to appeal to the United States supreme court as a means of setting the issue as to whether freedom of the press is as guaranteed in the federal constitution, is something more than a myth.

The Minnesota statute provides that any county judge can suppress a newspaper if he considers it a nuisance. The publishers and employees are not even given a jury trial, and if they continue publication after the court ruling they may be judged in contempt and sent to jail.

It is a deplorable legal restriction which may be expected to arouse the anger of every liberty-loving American, whether in or out of the journalistic profession. Democracy cannot survive without free exchange of ideas. One hopes that the supreme court will abrogate the Minnesota law.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

LABOR COMMISSIONER PREDICTS MORE MILL TROUBLE FOR SOUTH

WASHINGTON, May 10.—The cotton textile industry howls for higher tariff protection. Nobody denies that it is in sore straits.

Yet already it is the best-protected industry in the country. Even now Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana is demanding a congressional investigation to determine why, protected as it is, it has dealt so meagerly with its labor that many textile plants are strike-bound by reason of starvation wages, long hours and speed-up methods of production.

I doubt if there is a textile expert in the government service who is not ready to name the cause of the industry's trouble and prescribe the remedy—if he dared. There is no disagreement among them, either.

Too much output is their diagnosis for the disease; less of it the cure.

But, with one or two exceptions, not a government expert will express such an opinion out under anything but the solemnest pledges of secrecy concerning his identity.

The experts are not afraid to talk turkey—in strictest confidence—to the cotton mill owners, many of whom, they know, already are aware that they ought to curtail production. It is the cotton growers whom the experts fear to anger.

With a Washington administration which is engaged, at this very time, in an effort to convert the cotton states to a new political way of thinking, any utterance calculated to depress the price of raw cotton is regarded as far from likely to result advantageously to the government expert responsible for it.

If there must be economies to counteract the effects of overproduction, let them come out of the cotton mill workers' pay envelopes—hitherto, at any rate, they have not been so prompt to resent it.

The textile industry probably will get more tariff protection to quiet its clamor, but it will do no good, as the experts see the situation, because foreign competition is not what hurts the American mills. They are protected against that already.

Like western agriculture, they have a surplus to export, thus can not be protected by import taxation.

Worse off than the corn belt farmers, they have lost their former overseas markets, inasmuch as the latter built up their own cotton industries during the war, and now supply themselves with cotton goods.

In the judgment of Commissioner of Labor Statistics Ethelbert Stewart—one bold government official who does say just what he thinks—the south is only at the beginning of unrest among its workers in the textile field.

The spark which kindled the bonfire seems to have been the walkout following a wage cut in the big rayon works at Elizabethton, Tenn.

Rayon is a new industry and distinct from that of ordinary cotton products, but it was in the neighborhood of the cotton mill area, just across the state line, in the Carolina, "and the cotton workers were ready to strike anyway," as Commissioner Stewart puts it, "on account of general conditions. Elizabethton simply gave them the impulse."

Commissioner Stewart mentions, as about the last straw on the textile workers' backs, the recent activities of efficiency experts from the north in the southern mills—a mistake which the managements recognized and tried to undo, but too late to placate the workers.

The commissioner considers the unionization movement in the mills rather as a sequel to the flare-up than the cause of it.

He looks to see labor unrest spread from textiles to the southern lumber mills, but not to such industrial centers as Birmingham and Atlanta, which he describes as organized—though at lower wages—substantially on a northern basis.

"In the south," concludes Commissioner Stewart, "the textile mills are hopelessly entangled with the commission men, whose only interest is in sales and not in profits. In the north a percentage of the mills are held in trust by banks under terms of trusteeships outlined by the grandfathers of the present alleged owners, who find themselves just as helpless in these trustees' hands as the southern mill is in the hands of the commission men."

"When I come to analyze the dividends paid by some mills, it becomes apparent that they either are not passing their earnings on to commission men or they are much more intelligently operated."

"Besides, it is just an unknown practice to maintain dividend payments from surplus, or even from capital, to prevent a slump in stocks."

All of this is hokum, with no basis in scientific evidence.

In every instance, the magical basis is the same, the person feels better because he wants to feel better and because it is the tendency of his disease to have periods during which he feels either better or worse. But when the charm is forgotten or the disease gets worse, the magic fails.

A physician in Connecticut some years ago developed the idea that all sorts of rheumatism could be cured by putting little wire strings around the joints. For that notion there was no scientific support. The most recent devices are alleged magnetic collars hung around the neck, with the claim that they will magnetize the iron in the blood and thereby cure not only rheumatism but other chronic complaints.

EXPECTS INCREASE

New Pharmacy Law Will Aid University School

AUSTIN, May 10. (AP)—W. F. Gilday, dean of the college of pharmacy at the University of Texas, expects a substantial enrollment increase as the result of the enactment of the new pharmacy law which requires registered pharmacists to be graduates of a recognized college of pharmacy unless they have had at least six months of experience under a registered pharmacist prior to June 12, 1929.

The college now has 65 students, eleven of whom are candidates for a degree in June. Three others will be graduated at the close of the summer term, in which several courses of the pharmacy curriculum will be offered.

Beginning next fall students may enter the college for either a three-year or four-year course. Those finishing the three year course may elect to take sufficient additional subjects to complete the longer course and obtain an additional degree.
