Farmers Union Asks Members To Write Secretary Benson

Farmers of Mitchell County are being urged by the local Farmers Union organization to write Secretary of Agriculture Benson, urging that the proposed regulation for limiting State ASC Committee to 2% for cotton acreage reserve purposes be made effective immediately.

In a letter to members, A. K. McCarty, Jr., President of the Mitchell County Farmers Union, points out that Central and East Texas farmers "saw" after our cotton acreage again, but this time we can do something about it if we act in time.

McCarty further points out that the proposed new regulation will limit the State ASC Committee to withholding only 2% for state cotton acreage reserve. This, he says, would give Mitchell County an additional 5 to 6% in cotton acreage that was withheld from the county in 1956.

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New Bill Affects W. War 2 Veterans

The bill signed yesterday by the President extending the World War 2 GI Bill Loan deadline also has other important provisions affecting many veterans. Scott B. Harrington, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said today.

The new law will permit any veteran who sells residential property purchased with a GI loan to be relieved from liability to the Government under certain circumstances, Harrington said. Previously, the veteran who sold his property and allowed the purchaser to assume his GI loan still remained liable to the Government in the event of subsequent foreclosure and the payment of a guaranty claim by the VA.

Now, Mr. Harrington pointed out, the veteran may be relieved of liability if the purchaser assumes full liability on the loan, the VA approves him from a credit standpoint, and the loan is current.

The new law also permits World War 2 veterans to have their GI loan entitlement restored up to January 31, 1955, if their property was taken by a governmental agency for public use, was destroyed by a natural hazard, or was otherwise disposed of for compelling reasons without fault on the part of the veteran.

The law extended the World War 2 GI loan program ending date for one more year to July 25, 1958. Any loan application received by VA up to that time may be guaranteed by VA if it is completed by July 25, 1959. Another provision permits the restoration of GI home loan entitlement to a veteran in military service who disposes of his home because of a transfer under military orders.

Veterans will have to certify that they intend to live in the home they are buying with the assistance of a GI loan at the time of application and at the time of closing the loan.

The new law also clarifies VA's authority to make the final determination of reasonable value of property irrespective of the estimate of value made by an individual appraiser.
