Tornado Siren To Sound This Week

Local residents should become familiar with the signal for a tornado warning this week.

In a special meeting Friday morning, 10 area officials gathered to discuss plans for informing the public of the procedure to take during an emergency.

May 13, 1975, a plan for emergency disaster operation was approved by Mitchell County, Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook.

After some discussion, it was decided that each day this week—Monday through Friday—a siren will sound

to practice alerting citizens to a tornado warning.

The siren—one long whistle followed by a short whistle—will go off at about 7:50 a.m. each day.

Wednesday, at about 9:15 p.m. a siren was sounded to alert local residents that Mitchell County was under a tornado warning.

However, it was noted at Friday's meeting that not very many people knew what the siren designated.

Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter, who presided over the civil defense meeting, said that some people had told him they thought the whistle was for a fire.

Weather Rocks Mitchell County

Stormy weather conditions in Mitchell County Wednesday caused extensive property damage, especially in Westbrook.

It was estimated that over \$1 million worth of hail damage occurred across the county.

No injuries or accidents were reported locally as a result of the adverse weather conditions.

Almost all of the buildings and homes in Westbrook received some damage from the high winds and hail, with windows broken

and roofs damaged.

According to Ken Godsey of Ken Godsey Insurance, the people of Westbrook "did receive severe damage to all of their building roofs."

Godsey said, "In my past experience, I have never before seen a hail-storm of such intensity."

In Colorado City, businesses with tar roofs reported hail damage, especially buildings which have roofs more than four years old. No damage was reported to gravel roofs.

"We were lucky in

Colorado City that we didn't get hit like Westbrook," said Bob Ratliff of Bob Ratliff Insurance.

In Colorado City, Ratliff said that "very few" places were damaged.

Ratliff noted that the rain which accompanied the hail was very beneficial in softening the intensity of the hail stones.

Lumber companies were kept busy Thursday and Friday, selling materials to repair the damages from the storm.

Loraine Woman Dies In Wreck

Mitchell County recorded its third traffic fatality of the year Friday when an 87-year-old Loraine woman died as a result of injuries in an

accident about a mile north of Colorado City. Crescencia Gonzales was a passenger in a 1973 Chevrolet Impala driven by her daughter, Josie Yruegaz, which was hit broadside by a 1976 Ford pickup driven by Jimmie Don Sorrells of Hermleigh as the first vehicle was pulling into the parking lot of the Neff Nursery on Texas 208.

The car driven by Sorrells was southbound and Mrs. Yruegaz's car was northbound.

The accident occurred at 1:47 p.m. Mrs. Gonzales was taken to Root Memorial Hospital where she died at 3:35 p.m.

Both Sorrells and Yruegaz were also taken to Root Hospital where they are listed in satisfactory condition.

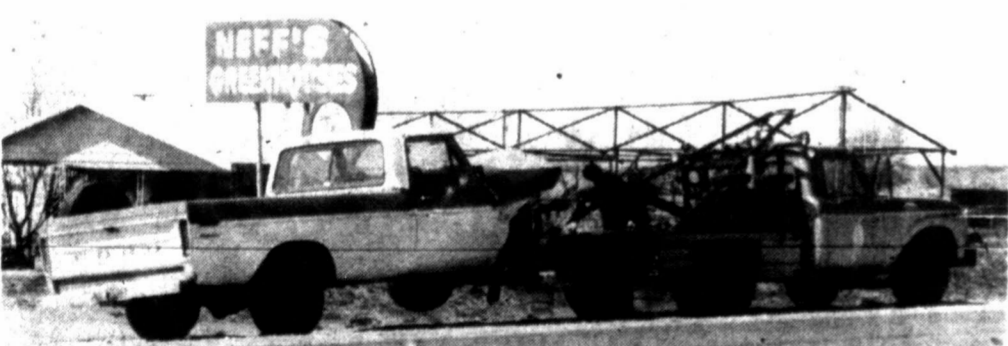
Funeral services for Mrs. Gonzales are incomplete at Kiker-Seale Funeral Home.

Children Are To Be Tested

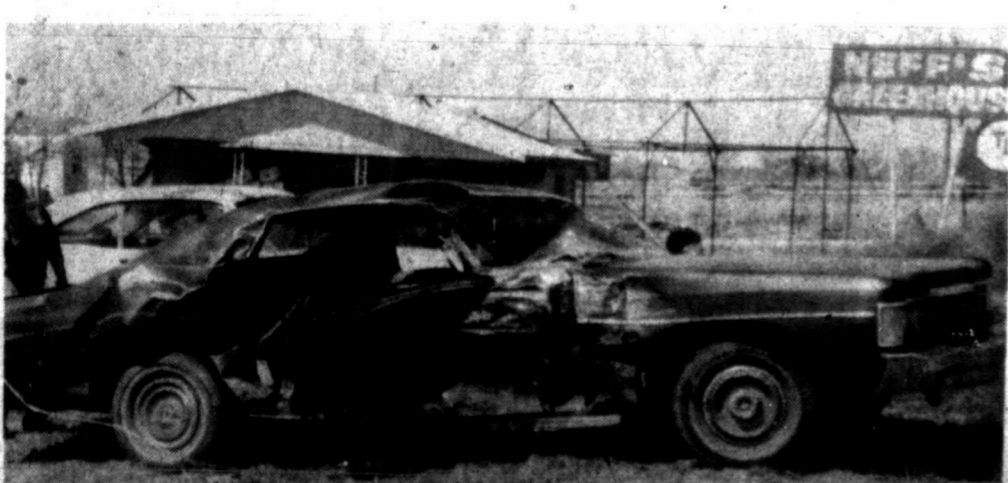
Three and four-year-olds will be tested for educational development growth Wednesday at the Plan "A" office in the Colorado City Administration building.

One of the all time favorite musicals in American Theatre is coming to the Colorado City Opera House stage. It starts Wednesday night and will be presented for eight performances, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday and again the same days the following week, April 4, 5, 6 & 7.

The musical is "Oklahoma" based in the Indian territory shortly before it became the state of Oklahoma. The plot is a simple one, involving love andalousy between the leading and major characters.

Rehearsals started in January and a very hard working and conscientious cast has turned the show into what one Playhouse veteran has described as one of the slickest productions to hit the local Opera House stage.

From my own viewpoint, the music is very enjoyable and the show will prove to be very entertaining. There is a lot of humor, adding to the enjoyment for the audience.

Tickets preparation was by Marie Jackson and sales is under the guidance of Bobbie Steakley and Nona Jones. Operation of the Red Dog Saloon is the job of Mac Perkin and Leslie Perkins while Kent Womack is grounds keeper.

Lighting operators are Jerry Phariss, Nancy Gierhart and Marsha Moore with the terrific stage design and construction by Porter Richardson.

Make-up is the job of Jolyn Mikow and Anita Richardson. Mrs. Mikow also was in charge of the program with assistance in selling ads from Jody Neff, Ray Anne Carlock and Bobbie Steakley. Stage manager and rehearsal prompter is Susan Crow.

Lighting design is by the directors of the play, Carl Beery Moore and George Womack. Womack is also responsible for the audio-visual techniques used during a dream sequence.

done to Browne's property was not known. Part of the roof on the garage was torn off when the twister hit and sheetrock fell on the car

which was parked in the garage.

The fuse box was ripped away by the wind and electrical power was lost temporarily at the house.

Mrs. Browne noted that she and her husband were in the storm cellar when the twister hit and "We thought nothing would be left."

Broken tree limbs blocked the door of the storm cellar when the twister hit and Browne's left the shelter at about 5 p.m.

Windows were blown out of the house, decorative trim was knocked from the front and the storm windows were damaged.

Mrs. Browne noted that this was not the first time a twister struck their property. About three or four years ago, the property was hit by a twister. In 1923, a tornado struck.

Most of the damage in Loraine occurred in the southern and southwestern portions of town.

Mitchell County Commissioner Billy Preston said that windows were broken out of homes and businesses in Loraine and that the hail caused damage to some vehicles.

Across the county, the storm Wednesday deposited pea-sized hail in most places: In Westbrook the hail was reported to be about marble-sized and was piled up along the roads.

One observer noted that the effects of the hailstorm resembled January's ice storm, which blanketed the county.

In addition to the late afternoon hailstorm and rainstorm, a tornado watch was issued for the county.

At about 9:15 p.m., a siren sounded across the county, alerting residents that the area was under tornado warning.

Reports from the Colorado City Police Department noted that the National Weather Service from Abilene notified the local police that a tornado had been sighted 10 miles west of Westbrook.

When the tornado warning signal sounded—one long whistle followed by one short whistle—many people were confused as to what action to take.

Friday morning a special meeting was attended by local officials to discuss a civil defense plan for Mitchell County. (See related story.) Plans were made to attempt to avoid massive confusion during an emergency, such as a tornado warning.

Local law offices reported that telephones were kept busy constantly Wednesday with calls from concerned citizens.

Many people retreated to storm cellars Wednesday when the tornado warning sounded, some remained in their homes and others set out in vehicles to watch for the tornado.

Assistant Chief of Police Jerry Cowin noted that the most important rule people should follow when a tornado warning is issued is "don't get in the car."

Cowin said, "There were two types of confusion Wednesday—phones ringing constantly and citizens driving around."

Grand Jury

Returns

Indictments

Four indictments, two of which were sealed, were returned by the Mitchell County Grand Jury Friday.

John Mill Houston was indicted for an offense in which, as the indictment read, "On March 15 he did cause bodily injury to Don Hamilton, a peace officer in the lawful discharge of his official duty, when the said John Mill Houston knew that Don Hamilton was a peace officer by then and there throwing Hamilton to the ground and the act caused pain to the head and right shoulder of Hamilton."

Ricardo Surita Zamora was indicted for Driving While Intoxicated, subsequent offense. The offense was committed on Feb. 24, 1979.

Zamora's previous DWI offense was in Nolan County on March 18, 1977.

Because of the rainfall received, there was high water in the local roads and vehicles were flooded out.

"The car is not a good place to be during a tornado," said Cowin. Instead, he suggested that people get to a low area and remain calm.

"If you don't have a storm cellar or a low area, go to a confined area in the house with windows," Cowin advised. "Open the windows in the house so you won't have pressure built up which might blow the windows in."

Cowin stressed that people should not panic, but should listen to the local radio station KVMC for information and instructions.

"Only authorized personnel should be on the streets," said Cowin.

After Mitchell County was no longer under tornado warning, Cowin said it was difficult to inform the people that it was safe to return home.

Thus, he noted that listening to a radio broadcast would be helpful.

Although Wednesday's rainstorm and hailstorm was damaging to area property owners, the rain should be extremely beneficial for Mitchell County farmers.

Bob Benson, Mitchell County Extension agent, noted that the rainfall should provide excellent underground moisture conditions.

However, Benson said that in the southern part

of the county, more rain is desperately needed to fill the stock tanks.

Because most Mitchell County fields do not have any crops planted in them right now, the hail was not damaging.

Van Mills, Soil Conservation Service director, said, "Wednesday's rain was a million dollar rain," and that it was greatly needed.

Mills said that considering the amount of hail received, there was minor damage done to area terraces.

The Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service said that no crop damages had been reported to the office yet.

Both Mitchell County lakes benefited from the rainfall.

"A tremendous amount of water has come into the lakes this week," said S. R. Wilkinson of Texas Electric Service Company Morgan Creek Power Plant.

As of Friday afternoon, Lake Colorado City measured 2059.35 feet, an increase of 1.85 feet from March 17.

Lake Champion measured 2049.00, an increase of 8.20 feet from March 17.

Wilkinson said that with the rainfall, both Champion Creek and Morgan Creek were flowing.

Wednesday's stormy weather was followed by a powerful West Texas sandstorm Thursday. Most preferred the rain—but without the hail.

Local Man Indicted

William Henry Hudson of Colorado City has been indicted with the alleged slaughter of diseased cattle at a Tucumcari, N.M., packing house.

Three others—all of Tucumcari—were accused in the indictment. There were Lawrence E. Leonard, Lawrence (Bud) Leonard and James Henry Leonard. All were released on their own recognizance.

A five-count indictment charged that the four men conspired with former USDA Inspector John W. Ryan of Rockdale, Tex. Although Ryan was mentioned in the indictment, he was not indicted.

Ryan was previously indicted on charges that he accepted some \$27,000 from cattle dealers who brought stock to the Sixty Six Packing Company in Tucumcari between August 1977 and August 1978. Ryan was permitted to plead guilty to one count of inspecting cattle in which he had a financial interest in return for offering state's evidence.

Hudson and the Leonards are directors of the Sixty Six Packing Company.

They were charged with conspiracy to defraud the U.S. government, slaughter of cattle without federal inspection, preparation of uninspected meat food products, misrepresentation of meat food products and related offenses.

Hudson was charged in a separate indictment with 15 counts of intent to influence. The indictment alleges that he paid Ryan almost \$14,000 to approve cattle Hudson sold to the packing plant.

It was noted that William Henry Hudson should not be confused with Bill Hudson, a contractor in Colorado City.

"The fire whistle caused more panic than protection," said Dale Mathis, manager of Frontier Cable TV, who was present at the meeting.

L. O. Schaffer, truck driver for the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department, said that he does not sound the fire whistle at night. Also, Schaffer said that he does not sound the whistle for a fire during threatening weather conditions. Thus, if the siren blows during a storm, it would mean that the area is under a weather warning.

Following the siren alert Wednesday, law enforcement offices were flooded with phone calls from area residents who did not know what precautions to take.

When the area is under emergency weather warning, the city manager of Colorado City decides when to sound the emergency siren.

The group present at Friday's meeting decided that the siren would not be sounded unless a tornado was actually sighted and confirmed.

Then, when the siren sounds, residents should find shelter in a storm cellar or a low area. If a cellar is not available, persons should open all windows in the house and stay in an area that

is enclosed and has no windows, such as a hallway.

Carter stated that if people had no place to go during a tornado warning, they could go to the Courthouse or City Hall for protection.

Drew Ballard, owner of KVMC Radio Station, said that he would be on the air during weather emergencies to keep the public posted.

Thus, when people go into storm cellars, they should take a transistor radio so they will be able to receive reports, it was pointed out.

Possibilities of using Cable TV to transmit information on weather warnings was discussed, but the investment would be about \$3,000 in the machinery. No action was taken regarding the purchase.

tric, is that a properly sized unit provides a better comfort level. It will do a better job of dehumidifying than one that is oversized for the particular room or area.

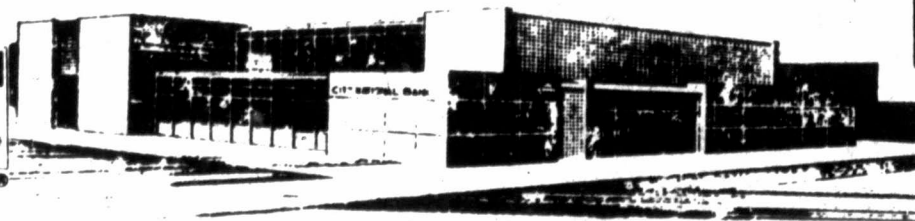

Take care of winter-worn trees

As a traditional activity, spring cleaning has never gained the popularity of, for instance, welcoming the crocus or spending that first afternoon on the golf course.

Nevertheless, it has remained a necessity that has moved beyond the simplicity of airing the feather beds and shoveling ashes from a multitude of hearths and stoves.

Today's spring cleaning may include such outdoor tasks as removing tree limbs that may have been damaged by winter storms.

Even shade trees that may have been properly pruned in the fall could require some surgery by springtime.

For making any cut more than two or three inches in diameter, a gas-powered chain saw is recommended. Besides making the job faster and easier, a chain saw will make a cleaner cut.

Nobody likes messy surgical scars. A gas saw is ideal because of its power and portability, a characteristic that is important unless all your trees are within the range of an extension cord.

While removing damaged branches is easy, there is a definite procedure to follow, according to the tree surgery experts at McCulloch, a leading chain saw maker.

For the most painless possible limb removal—for the tree and the operator—follow the steps shown in the diagram.

The first cut will prevent bark from peeling away from the trunk when the limb falls.

The second cut is made an inch or so farther out on the limb.

The third cut leaves a smooth surface that will become part of the trunk.

It's important not to cut

into the trunk, or shoulder wood. Nutrients that feed the tree are carried throughout its length just under the bark.

Treating open cuts with tree wound dressing is optional except in the case of oaks or elms where open wounds may attract insects that carry disease or allow fungus invasion.

Special chain saw operation rules apply to cutting limbs from a standing tree. These are outlined in owner's instruction manuals provided with saws by McCulloch and other manufacturers.

Tree owners are advised not to make any cuts above shoulder height. Jobs higher in a tree or where a falling limb could damage property should be left to a tree care professional.

Using the right size chain saw is also a consideration. Homeowners wouldn't want to use a saw that is too large or cumbersome for the same reason they wouldn't use their driver to pitch to a green: it's too hard to control.

A saw the size of McCulloch's Power Mac 310 would be the right size for most limb removal jobs. Its 14-inch bar and chain and powerful 2.1 cubic inch engine simplify most light to medium duty woodcutting jobs. And features such as electronic ignition and an anti-vibration system enhance operation.

Non-slip gloves, safety glasses and ear plugs are recommended, and a hard hat should be worn when any wood being cut extends above the operator's head.

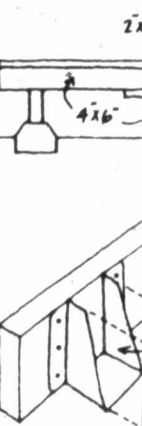

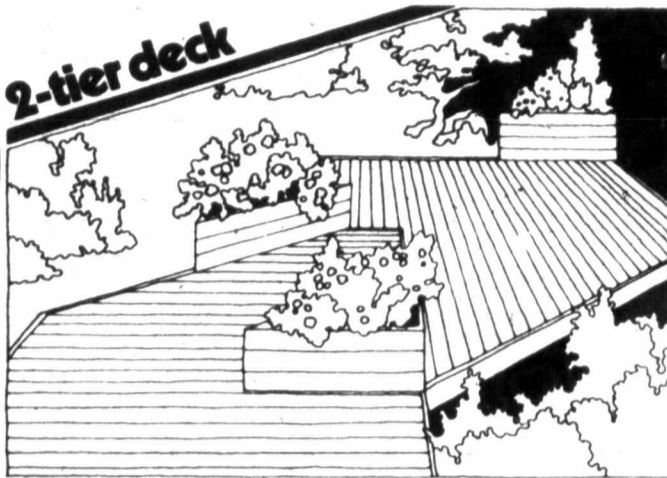

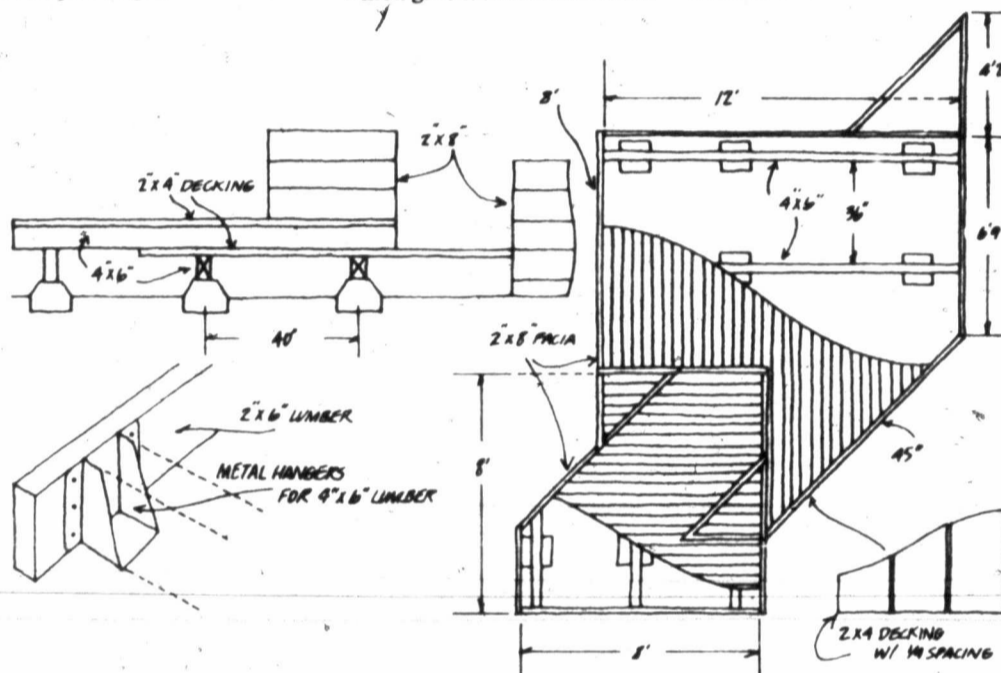

CONSTRUCTION—After you have checked the plans against your local building code, start by bolting the pre-cut 2" x 6" base plate under the door jamb, allowing enough space for a 2" x 4" laid flat. Nail on the metal hangers. Next, position and level the concrete foundation blocks using two to three inches of 3/4" minus gravel. Place 4" x 6" beams in the hangers, and adjust the cement blocks until the beams are level. Repeat the process, overlapping the two main beam supports onto the lower deck beams. Working out from the house, lay down the 2" x 4" decking using 1/4" wood spacers. Trim the ends of the decking at 45° as shown in the diagram. Add the pre-cut 2" x 8" fascia boards around the perimeter.

- Restock your kitchen—it's a much-frequented place in warm weather. Reorganize pantry and refrigerator shelves so that between-meal snacks and fruit juices are in easy-to-reach places. To quickly and easily clean-up greasy spills

To forestall such problems, the Asphalt Roofing Manufacturers Association advises homeowners to check their roof's condition at least once a year and preferably twice a year.

But don't go up on the roof to do it, warns ARMA. Inspect it from the ground instead. Walking on a roof is dangerous and could damage the shingles.

Indications that a roof is in need of replacement include cracked, curled, brittle or

missing shingles. If a roof is fairly new and has suffered limited damage such as loose or missing shingles from a storm, these can be renailed or replaced.

If it looks as though the roof requires replacement, ARMA suggests you call in a professional roofer to conduct an on-the-roof inspection.

Not only can a reputable roofer tell you whether the roof needs to be replaced, but he can provide assistance in the selection of roofing material and the design elements inherent in color and dimension.

Increasingly popular, for example, are three-dimen-

sional asphalt shingles in handsome earthtone colors of browns and beiges that serve to relate a home to its surroundings.

Designed to last up to 25 years with little maintenance, multi-layered asphalt shingles produce deep, attractive shadow lines that give a roof dimension.

To keep kitchen maintenance to a minimum, shop for washable wallpaper, flooring that won't show dirt easily

and stain resistant cabinets. Cabinets certified by the National Kitchen Cabinet Association are tested to assure years of service under tough kitchen conditions.

A kitchen that tires you out needs work. NHIC points out that while energy-saving kitchen improvements can be do-it-yourself jobs, more difficult projects require a home improvement contractor.

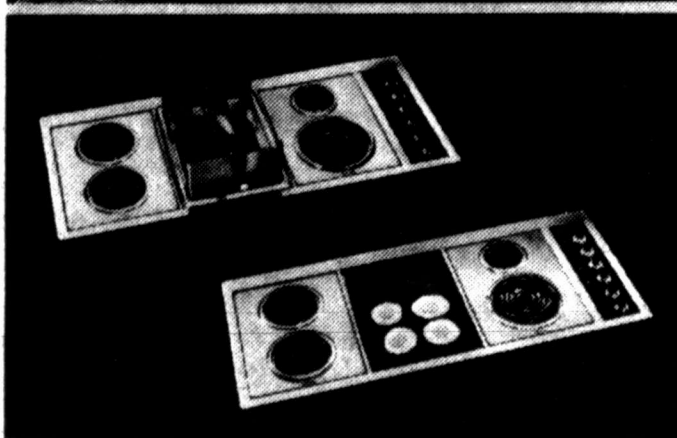

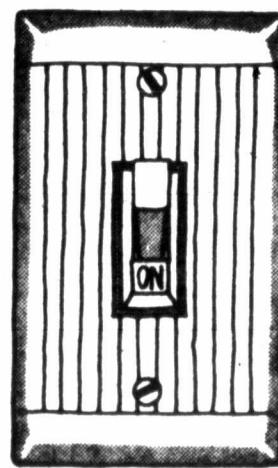

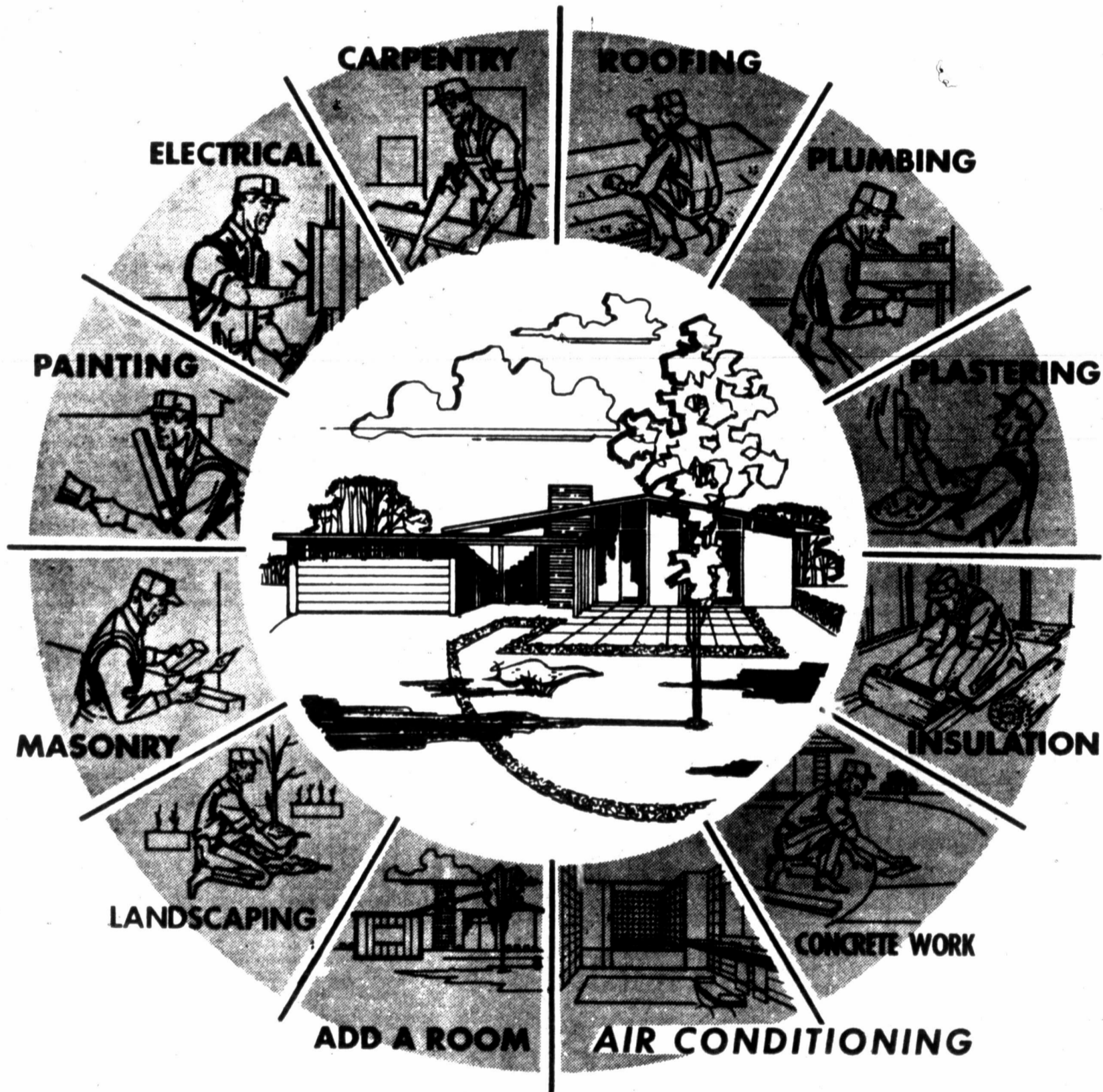
