Eight Lives Taken In Grade Crossing Accidents Dawson To Vote On \$1,250,000 Road Bonds Today

Optimism Voiced At Mass Meeting Of Road Boosters

Polls Open This Morning At 7 o'clock On County-Wide Project For Paving Of Designated Highways

Victory Predicted

Rally Brings Colorful Campaign To Close; Proposed Bonds Would Hard Surface County State Roads

(By Associated Press)
LUBBOCK, Dec. 20.—With expressions of confidence on every side that Dawson county's first bond election for \$1,250,000 will be a landslide victory, approximately 300 road boosters gathered in the city here tonight for a final rally in the campaign for paving of designated highways.

The rally brought to a close the colorful campaign in history of the county and opinions of all present were filled with enthusiasm for the proposed bonds.

Prominent speakers from all over the county were here, addressing the gathering in an effort to get voters of Dawson county to pass favorably on the bond issue.

While there has been some organized opposition to the bond issue, it has been weakened materially in the past few days.

Some 3,000 votes being forecast.

Two Men Make Successful Escape After Quietly Leaving Valera Bank Of \$2,274 In Cash

(By Associated Press)
VALERA, Dec. 20.—Two men who quietly entered the First State Bank of Valera shortly after it opened for the assistant cashier to fill a bag with all available cash, \$2,274, and escaped with their comrades waiting in a car in front of the institution, were sought tonight by police of Central Texas.

The holdup was done so quietly that a cafe owner, who watched the two robbers load their bag into the waiting car and drive off toward Coleman was unaware of what was transpiring. An employee of the bank, who came in in the midst of the holdup, thought the leaders of the bandits was joking when he was told the bank was being robbed.

Cashier Alone
The assistant cashier, Steve Brown, was alone when the men entered. He was forced into the vault. Glen Mitchell, another employee who walked in, followed Brown at the point of a pistol. A third man, who came in to transact business followed the other two into the vault, the door was closed and when the three ventured forth 20 minutes later there was no sign of the bandits or their car.

PORT NOT CLOSED
Statement Says Consulate Only Is Affected

LAREDO, Dec. 20.—A notice that only the Mexican consulate in Laredo was closed, and not the port, was issued today by the Laredo chamber of commerce.

A statement read:
"The port of Laredo is not closed, only the Mexican consulate. Shipments to and from Mexico are going through as usual, with only the slight difference that consular inspectors covering shipments to Mexico are presented to the collector of customs at Nuevo Laredo, instead of to the consulate at Laredo, Tex. Consequently, all shipments to Mexico can be routed through Laredo as heretofore. The clearing service is as rapid as before the closing of the consulate."

Injured Local Youth Gets Present He Wanted—Release from Hospital

DAYTON, Ohio, 18-year-old Lubbock youth who was injured recently in a plane mishap at Fort Worth, today will receive the Christmas present he most desired—release from the hospital in which he has lain for almost two months.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Orr, 1012 Avenue R, young Orr was a student pilot at the Fort Worth military airport. He was struck by the propeller of a plane he was attempting to crank November 2, and since that time has been in the Baptist hospital. He will be released today with permission to return home, according to an

Associated Press dispatch received by the Morning Avalanche last night.

The youth was struck just below the elbow, shattering the bone.

Doctors at the institution announced yesterday that they have given him a complete new arm bone—taken from his own left leg.

Mrs. Orr just returned several days ago from Fort Worth, and stated that the youth was convalescing very nicely. Both the father and mother were at his bedside during the operation.

Lubbock Newsboy Injured In Auto Accident Friday

Melvin Britton, 12-year-old Lubbock-Journal carrier boy, son of Mrs. Elia Britton, 1614 Ave. J, was seriously injured Friday evening when the car in which he was riding collided with another at 1411 Seventh street.

Young Britton was rushed to the West Texas hospital for emergency treatment. Examination revealed three severe cuts on his face and other minor lacerations. A deep cut was over each eye while another penetrating to the bone, started at his nose, ranged across his cheek and to the lower jaw. Doctors stated that while not considered serious, a disfigurement might result.

The lad was under influence of ether at a late hour last night and was unable to give any details of the accident.

Practice Jump In Parachute Fatal To Young Airman

Lieutenant Elmer Miller Meets Instant Death At San Antonio Because Of Failure To Pull Cord

Plunges 2,000 Feet

Board of Investigation Is Named to Probe Cause of Accident; Marks Second Fatality In Three Weeks

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 20.—Lieut. Elmer M. Miller, 25, Dodd Field aviator, was instantly killed this afternoon when he failed to pull the rip cord of his parachute after making a practice jump from a plane. This was the second fatality within three weeks due to the same cause. Sgt. Louis J. Pulavie, Brooks Field, having been killed in the same way on November 27.

Lieut. Miller jumped from a plane piloted by Lieut. Leroy Hudson, his body plunging 2,000 feet. A board of investigation was appointed this afternoon to study the cause of the accident.

Graduate Flier
Lieut. Miller graduated from the advanced flying school at Kelly Field in March and was immediately assigned to the 120th observation squadron at Dodd Field, receiving his regular army commission in Sept. He was also a graduate of the primary flying school at Brooks Field.

He gave his nearest of kin as his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Miller, Stratford, California. Authorities at the station hospital, Fort Sam Houston, had not received instructions as to the disposition of the body late Friday night. It was his first parachute jump.

Two More Bodies Taken From Mine

Group Funerals Held For Twenty-Seven Victims Of Fatal Explosion; Death Toll Mounts to 61

(By Associated Press)
MCALISTER, Okla., Dec. 20.—While group funerals were held today for 27 miners killed in an explosion in the Old Town mine of North McAlester, a searching party recovered two more bodies from the workings, bringing the dead accounted for to 61.

One was the body of Gabino Comanche, Mexican. The other the body of Harry Allison, negro. One was found in the eighth east entry, and one in the eighth west entry, through which the rescue crews had passed many times in recovering the 56 bodies previously brought to the surface.

Twenty-two Mexican victims were buried in a long grave, while Father Maurice Pustenberg read the Catholic services. The burial was arranged by H. Valdez, Mexican consul at Oklahoma City.

Five others were buried in a Protestant cemetery in single graves. Both graves were prepared by convicts from the state penitentiary here. A representative of Gov. W. J. Holloway laid a wreath on each of the graves. Each casket bore a wreath from the McAlester chamber of commerce.

SOCIAL WRITER DIES
Elizabeth Gale Poindexter Succumbs To Operation

ORANGE, Calif., Dec. 20.—(AP)—Elizabeth Gale Poindexter, 63, whose writings on social affairs in the national capital aroused much comment while her husband was United States senator from Washington, died here early today after a major operation.

With her when she died were her son, Lieutenant Commander Gale Poindexter, U. S. N., and two sisters, Mrs. May Jorgensen and Mrs. Charles Morton of Santa Ana. Former Senator Miles Poindexter had been summoned by wire but will not reach here until Sunday.

Mrs. Poindexter came here a fortnight ago from Washington, D. C., to visit her sisters, and suffered an unexpected abdominal illness which made the operation advisable.

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Snow Falls Over Lubbock And South Plains Section

Freezin' Temperature Continues in Texas Panhandle Friday

THOUGH insufficient to cover the city in a white blanket to any great extent, snow, which started falling here late Thursday night, continued throughout Friday in varying degrees, abating early last evening.

As temperatures rose at mid-afternoon the fall became somewhat heavier and laden skies indicated that the precipitation would continue indefinitely. But with night the mercury again started a downward slide and at midnight the air was clear.

FLOYDADA, Dec. 20.—(Special)—Snow that began falling here early Thursday night continued until noon Friday, furnishing moisture that will be valuable to thousands of acres of growing wheat in this county.

Throughout Friday afternoon much of the snow melted but cloudy skies indicated more snow. Farmers and business men are jubilant over prospects for wheat.

LOCKNEY, Dec. 20.—(Special)—A blanket of snow, amounting to about one inch, fell over Floyd county Thursday night and Friday morning, following in the wake of the season's lowest temperature. Wheat growers are elated and cattle men report no loss.

SLATON, Dec. 20.—(Special)—Snow, which began falling Thursday night and continuing through Friday, covered the ground here to a depth of more than one inch, melting slightly near noon today. The temperature Friday morning was 24 degrees. For three days this section has been in the grip of the coldest weather of the season.

A white invader moved upon the Texas Panhandle today, sending its occupants to the West Central Plains and threatening northern Texas.

In the wake of freezing and near zero temperature, snow fell over nearly all the Panhandle, from Borger as far south as McCombs and as far east as Breckenridge. Rain or snow was predicted for all north Texas.

Four Inches At Childress
Childress recorded the heaviest fall, four inches. Pampa awoke this morning with a four-inch covering.

INVESTIGATION ASKED
Operation of Factories Is Aim of Proposed Probe

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The senate was asked today by Senator Sheppard, democrat, Texas, to consider asking the secretary of agriculture to conduct an investigation of the extent to which small factories may be operated in connection with farms of average size.

In a resolution he presented, Sheppard also proposed that the secretary of commerce be requested to determine the smallest capital, labor and machine units with which articles of common use may be manufactured for sale.

STATE RESTS CASE
Fifty Witnesses Called By McNeil's Defense

BROWNWOOD, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The state having rested its case yesterday, more than 50 witnesses were called by the defense today to testify as to Clyde A. McNeil's good reputation.

McNeil, a captain in the Texas National Guard, is on trial here for robbery with firearms in connection with the robbing of the First National Bank of Brownwood March 13.

Defense witnesses gave testimony to establish an alibi for McNeil. Most of the testimony, however, was that his character was good.

Latest Edition of "Meanest Man" Is Found—One Who Robs Xmas Trees

IN DIRECT contrast to the spirit of Christmas, hoodlums last night about 9:30 o'clock entered the yard at home of K. N. Clapp, 1022 Thirteenth street, and stripped two of the Christmas trees which had been placed for entry in the local holiday decoration contest.

In a statement to the Morning Avalanche shortly afterwards, Mr. Clapp offered \$25 reward for any information leading to arrest of those responsible.

Local officers were investigating but at a late hour had made no arrests.

Entire Family of Six Wiped Out As Passenger Train Crashes Into Truck In Iowa; Texas Woman Dies In Wreck

Truck Loaded With Christmas Toys Scattered Several Hundred Feet; Bodies of Victims Badly Mangled; Officers Claim Proper Caution Was Not Taken

CLARINDA, Iowa, Dec. 20.—Seven persons, six of them members of one family, were killed near here early tonight when the Tarkio Branch passenger train of the Burlington Railway struck a truck on Highway 71.

The dead: F. E. Glass, his wife, baby and three young sons, and an unidentified man.

The family was returning from a shopping trip and the truck was laden with toys and Christmas things.

The intersection where the accident occurred was described as an "open" one by Sheriff William McLelland. The visibility was good and he said he believed the occupants of the truck were probably not taking proper caution in crossing the tracks.

Bodies Battered
The truck was scattered for several hundred feet, and the bodies of the seven victims were badly battered. The bodies were brought here.

Woman Killed In Train Collision
AUSTIN, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Mrs. J. R. Farmer was killed and her husband and son, Leroy, were injured here tonight in a collision between a Missouri Pacific train and an automobile.

Mrs. Farmer's body was mangled badly and the automobile in which she was riding was demolished. The accident occurred at a crossing near Camp Mabry. A heavy sleet was falling, making visibility very poor.

The train did not stop. Apparently the crew did not know of the accident. A switch engine returning from Camp Mabry a few minutes later discovered the woman's body.

Eighty Are Hurt In Subway Crash

Stampede Is Result When Crowded Train Is Halted By Grounded Third Rail; Thirty to Hospitals

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Eighty persons were injured today in a stampede as a crowded subway train, speeding through a tunnel 30 feet under the bed of the east river, was halted by a grounded third rail.

Thirty of the injured were taken to hospitals.

Many Trampled
All of the 80 were suffering from inhalation of smoke from burning insulation on a conduit, and many had been trampled and cut as they beat with their fists against windows and doors in their frenzied attempts to get out of the train.

At no time were they in any particular danger from the burning insulation, which was a small blaze quickly put out by a repair crew which was already at work on the conduit and had dropped back as the train approached.

In terror, however, the passengers would not listen to guards and a policeman who was one of the passengers. They broke the windows, and clouds of smoke came into the cars.

Over Million In State Aid Given

Allotments Are Awarded To Projects In 19 Counties Highway Commission: Lubbock County Included

AUSTIN, Dec. 20. (P)—More than \$1,000,000 aid on projects in 19 counties was allotted by the highway commission at its December meeting, according to minutes on file in the department.

That 1929 will be a busy year with probably more construction put under contract than ever was indicated by announcement of G. G. Wickline, bridge engineer, that the commission would let contracts for two causeways and three interstate bridges, the project to cost \$1,500,000.

Causeways On 57.

The causeways will be on highway 57, known as Hug-the-Coast highway, one across Lavaca Bay in Calhoun county and the other across Copano Bay in Aransas county. Texas and Louisiana will build a bridge across the Sabine river on highway 63 and two bridges will be constructed by Texas and Oklahoma across the Red river at Gainesville and Ringgold.

The surface treatment budget for the year was set at \$1,435,000. It is planned to surface 340 miles and to place a seal coat on 197 miles of highways during the year.

Lubbock Gets \$5,000.

Counties sharing in the aid allotments were: Matagorda, \$14,673 for highway 88; Limestone, \$11,297 for highway 7; Brooks, \$4,548 highway 12; Aransas, \$25,635 highway 57; Guadalupe, \$3,000 highway 3-A; Wharton, \$16,276 highway 60; Waller, \$180,866 highway 20, and \$71,616 for highway 6; Hardin, \$32,320 for highway 40 and \$19,774 for highway 8; Orange, \$9,754 highway 62; Jefferson, \$21,215 highway 3; McLennan, \$14,292 highway 2; Falls, \$5,523 highway 6; Sterling, \$129,375 highway 5; Motley, \$107,719 highway 28; Lubbock, \$5,746 highway 7; Potter, \$4,410 highway 13; Jones, \$428,767 highway 4; Webb, \$6,103 highway 2, and Eastland, \$35,000 highway 1.

"Baby Ruth" Is Returned to Jail

Nineteen-Year-Old Bandit Gets Suspended Sentence And Cash From Judge And Jurors—Not Freedom

DALLAS, Dec. 20. (P)—Ruth Barnett, 19, who said they call her "Baby Ruth" back home in Hugo, Okla., is again in jail although a jury gave her a suspended sentence today.

Arraigned on a charge of breaking into a filling station at Greenville, Miss. Barnett took the stand and admitted her guilt. She was, she said, hitch hiking "here and there." Last Friday night she landed in Greenville, "broke and hungry."

Motorist Gives Aid

A kind motorist helped her get into a locked wayside filling station. She ate some pies, appropriated a wrist watch and a new pair of shoes, and proceeded afoot. Then she was arrested.

The prosecutor, judge and jury, apparently felt sorry for her. The jury was instructed to return a verdict of five years

suspended sentence. The judge gave her two one-dollar bills; the prosecutor handed her a bill. Members of the jury contributed, and several spectators added to the pot.

Returned To Jail

With her suspended sentence in one fist and the currency in the other, "Baby Ruth" started back to jail to get her belongings. She got inside the jail door.

"I'm glad to see you," the jailer said. He showed her a telegram signed by Sheriff Hal Hood, who is in Huntsville, it said.

"Hold Ruth Barnett," wanted elsewhere.

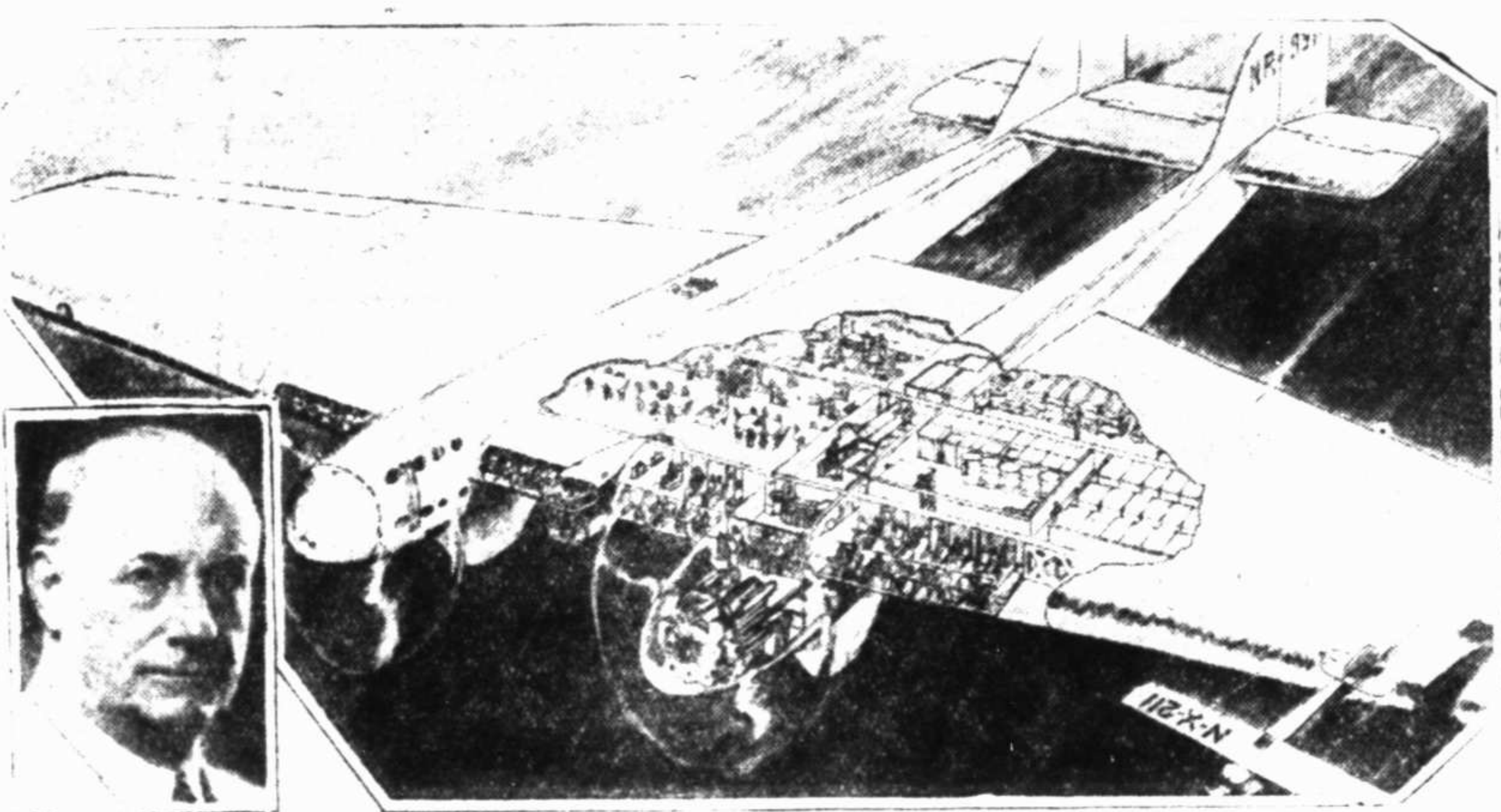

GIANT PLANES PLANNED FOR U. S. WILL BE WORLD'S LARGEST



(Photo copyright General Development Co. of Connecticut) The largest airplane in the world, as American aeronautical engineers have planned it, is pictured here. Four of these for regular passenger and freight service, are to be built by the General Development Co. of Connecticut, through its vice president and chief engineer, Dr. William Whitney Christmas, lower left. He is the inventor of the aileron balancing device now used on every airplane in the world. Early in 1930 construction is to be started on the giant craft, which under Department of Commerce regulation will have a maximum carrying capacity of 500 passengers and a crew of 25. In the

above picture, in which part of the interior is exposed, you see how the passengers' compartments with glass fronts are to be placed in the leading edge of the wing, which will be 200 feet long. Two main decks will be maintained in it. Berths are planned for 100 passengers, and there are to be smoking and card rooms, a spacious lounge and a dining room seating 42 persons. Freight and mail compartments with electric elevators will be placed in the wings. Pumps and turbo-propellers will operate from the central operating cabin. Eight motors of 1200 horse-power each will work in units of four on two giant four-bladed propellers. The wing span is to be 322 feet 100 feet greater than the former 100-X seaplane, now the largest in the world.

Boswell Is Named Manager Of C-C.

Dallas, May 21.—J. H. M. Harrison, Asst. Sec. of the Chamber of Commerce, has named John Boswell, manager of the Southern Development Co. of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, to be the general manager of the C-C.

Boswell will succeed Harrison, who resigned to become general manager of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce. He will take over his duties Jan. 1. He has been connected with the Dallas chamber

King George Will Open Naval Parley

LONDON, Dec. 20.—King George VI. will open a naval parley with the British fleet, which will be held in the harbor of Portsmouth, England, on Monday, Dec. 23.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (AP)—Japanese delegates to the London naval conference were guests of their countrymen here today before sailing for London tonight.

They were met by Japanese officials and merchants headed by Consul General S. Sawada when they arrived from Washington. Former Premier Reijiro Wakatsuki, leader of the naval delegation, said his government would support a battleship building holiday until 1936. He said Japan would insist upon the 10-10-7 ratio in auxiliary ships and the right to construct an adequate tonnage of submarines necessary to defend the country. He also disclosed his government favored a program for closer limitation on construction of airplane carriers.

(AP) — A spirited controversy over the tariff developed in the house today, when Representative Garner, of Texas, minority leader, challenged Representative Ramseyer, republican, Iowa, to state his position on agricultural rates in the bill as it is being rewritten in the senate.

General Topic: The Child in a Christian World (Christmas Lesson).

Scripture Lesson: Luke 2:8-20.

8. And there were shepherds in the same country abiding in the field, and keeping watch by night over their flock.

9. And an angel of the Lord stood by them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid.

10. And the angel said unto them. Be not afraid; for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which shall be to all the people.

11. For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord.

12. And this is the sign unto you: Ye shall find a babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, and lying in a manger.

13. And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying.

14. Glory to God in the highest, And on earth peace among men in whom he is well pleased.

15. And it came to pass, when the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another. Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing that is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us.

Time and Place.—Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem according to tradition, on December 25. The year was B. C. 5, four years and a few days before the beginning of the Christian Era, which was fixed thus incorrectly by the calculations of the monk Dionysius Exiguus in A. D. 526. The Matthew passage at Capernaum, summer of A. D. 29, the third year of Christ's ministry, Christ blessing the little

children Mark 10:13-16, in Perea, March, A. D. 30, a month before the crucifixion.

Introduction

Christianity is the only religion that gives the child his proper place.

"Ever since that day when Jesus was born in Bethlehem, the world has had new reverence for childhood and motherhood." The sacred of Christianity has been marked by the transformation of the attitude of men toward the child and by the growth of institutions for the promotion of his welfare. Today more than ever before, the best thought of the world is centering on the problems of childhood.

A Secret of Greatness

"Dr. A. J. Gordon was a wonderful man of God. On one occasion I asked one of the aged members of his church if she would tell me what in her judgment was the secret of Dr. Gordon's power. She told me this story. 'One day—it was a Sunday—I saw Dr. Gordon going towards his home from the church, when he met three children who were crying. After accompanying the cause of their grief I saw him get down on his knees in the dirt and reach through the grating of the sidewalk and pull up a scrawny kitten. He gave it to the kiddies and went on his way rejoicing.' Parents, that is the spirit of the Kingdom of God, and it will make any man great."—Rev. W. Harry Freds.

Bringing Children To Jesus

Mark 10:13-16

"That he should touch them—not simply that they should touch him. Parents of the coming generation, bring your children to Jesus! Small lives need the greatest heat to fan them into flame. Seek for them nothing less than the presence of Jesus. They will learn all things from him—the beauties of the field and the pity of the heart and the fervor of the mind. Caesar will not impress them with such chivalry. Moses will not inspire them with such meekness. Elijah will not inspire them with such earnestness. Daniel will not touch them with such majesty. Job will not serve them with such patience. Paul will not fire them with such love. Bring them to Jesus!"—George Matheson.

Birth of Bethlehem, Luke 2:1-29

When Augustus was Emperor of Rome and Quirinus Governor of Syria the imperial mandate ordered a census to be taken throughout

the empire. The Jewish method of enrollment, which the Romans allowed to be used in Palestine, was to require each person to be enrolled in his own city, that is, the town from which his family originally came.

Among the many thousands whom this edict required to take long and toilsome journeys was Joseph, the village carpenter of Nazareth in Galilee, who travelled with Mary, his espoused wife, to Bethlehem, six miles south of Jerusalem, since he was descended from the Great King David, who was born in that small town. The inn was crowded and had no room for the pair, who were compelled to take refuge in a stable. Tradition says that Jesus was born in a limestone cave used as a stable, and Jerome spent many years in such a cave at Bethlehem, translating the Bible into Latin (the "Vulgate" or "Common" translation). Mary was too poor to hire an attendant, and when the Holy Child was born she herself wound his tender body with swaddling bands after the fashion of the East, and laid him in a stone manger, a receptacle still on occasion employed as a cradle in that region. The entire story is so simple and natural that it bears on its face the evidence of its truthfulness. The false Gospels, on the contrary, are crowded with preposterous miracles attaching to the infancy of our Lord.

The City of David v. 11

Bethlehem was known as the "City of David" because it was the home of his ancestors rather than because of any residence or exploit on his own part at that place. It was here that Boaz married Ruth, the beautiful young Moabite widow who left her native land to go to Judah with Naomi, her bereaved mother-in-law. It was here that David, David's grandfather, was born to Boaz and Ruth; and it was here that Jesse, the father of David, lived (1 Sam. 17:12). Because it was his birthplace, Bethlehem was associated with the name of David throughout the history.

"A Saviour, Christ The Lord" v. 11

Here is a triple crown of glory and blessing. "Jesus" means "Jehovah Saves"—saves from sin, from sorrow, saves from death, saves eternally, saves from all evil, and who will accept his salvation. "Christ" means "anointed," and is Greek; "Messiah" is Hebrew and also means "anointed." Christ was anointed by the Holy Spirit at his baptism to be Prophet, Priest, and King. "Lord" signifies "Jehovah," the Infinite and Eternal God. The wonderful sentence is the herald's proclamation, announcing the greatest event in the

world's history.

"The Heavenly Host"

"And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host." Jehovah is the Lord God of Sabaoth, that is, of this same heavenly host. Before the wondering eyes of the shepherds the sky seemed parted and drawn aside like a curtain, disclosing the vast army of angels who had gathered to attend the event which meant so much to heaven as well as earth.

"Praising God." Because he "loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son."

The First Christian Preachers vs. 17, 18

"And when they saw it, they made known concerning the saying which was spoken to them about this child." They would tell their startling story to this person and that, in the streets of Bethlehem and the crowded inn, and they would not fail to tell it to Joseph and Mary. They would reject all the confutations that had been devised to themselves.

Those shepherds were the first Christian preachers, and they moved their little audiences bravely because they talked about Jesus Christ, and because they confirmed themselves to their own experience. Any preacher or teacher or other Christian worker will succeed if he follows their example.

Mary Pondered Over All These Events, v. 19

"But Mary kept all these sayings, pondering them in her heart." Memory and thoughtfulness combined, gradually working understanding, and conclusion. Others wondered but Mary pondered. Little is told of this marvelous and greatly blessed woman, the mother of our Lord, but that little is enough to fill us with admiration. To artist to paint so exquisitely to saint, and to see she has always stood for the highest, purest and best in womanhood, the ideal mother.

The Babe in the Manger v. 20

King of Kings

"Stumble not at the deplorable accident, rather consider the mighty oak which springs out of it, limbs with spreading branches all the sky. Out of that stable has grown the civilized world. The manger was more than all ironies, the wadding, clothes, swaddling bands, the purple raiment, the babe was truly King of Kings and Lord of Lords. The humble birthplace witnessed the origin of the force which destroyed the religion of the old world, and of the movement which has created a new earth. It is not difficult now to believe in the divinity of the wonderful Child. How can we do anything else? Blessed are they who trust in him."—W. L.

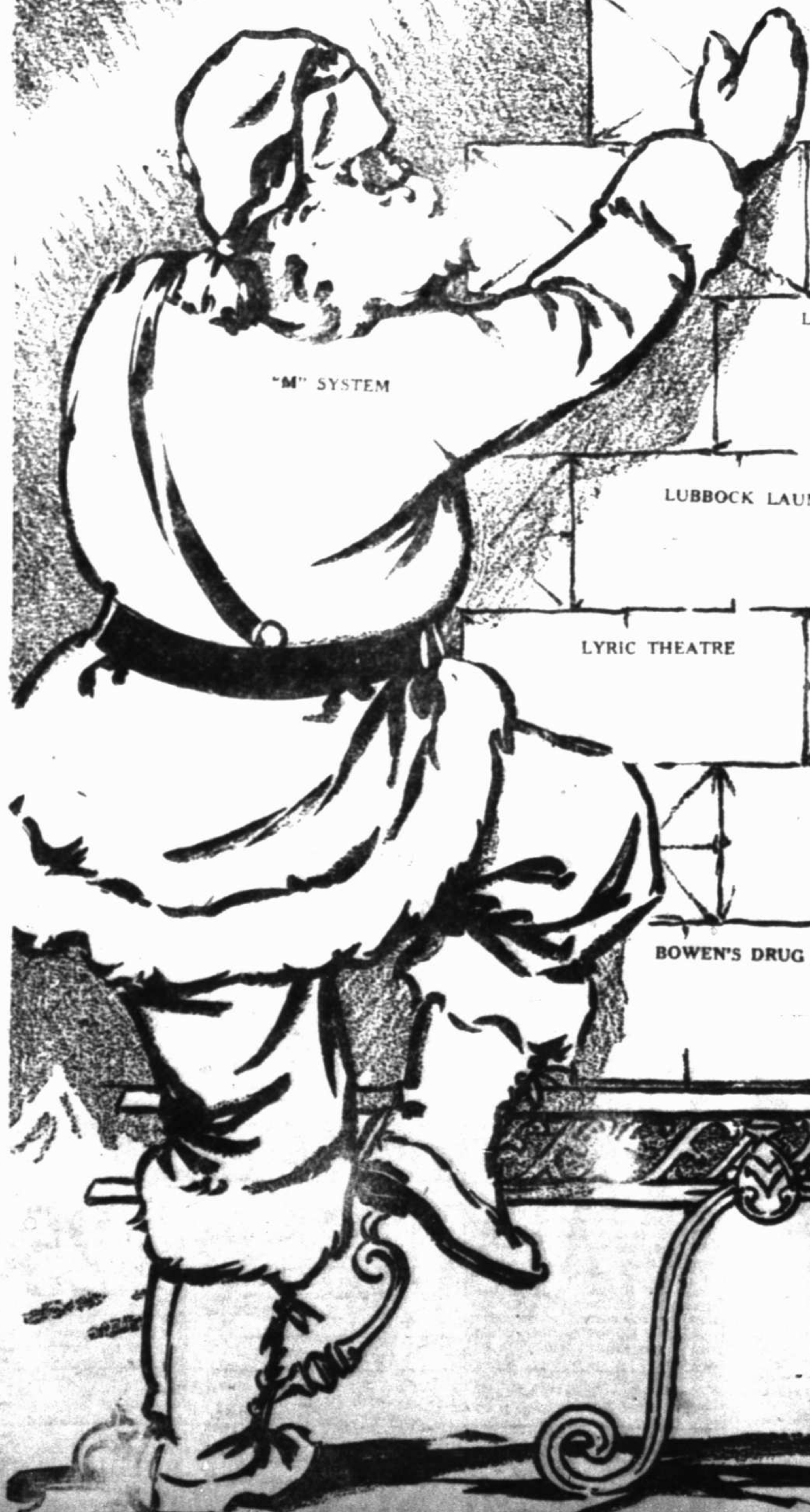

Fog Dispelled On New York Harbor

Fleet Of 77 Ships Move In And Out Of Harbor With Safety After Being Fog Bound 48 Hours

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. (P)—A fleet of 77 ships, fog bound from 12 to 48 hours, moved in and out of New York harbor with safety today as a west wind dispelled the dense curtain of mist which had hung along the coast for days.

Fifty of the vessels were incoming. Among them were half a dozen trans-Atlantic liners, which had been anchored, fearful to proceed to their piers in the fog that was responsible Wednesday for the sinking of the liner Fort Victoria.

Sunken Liner Menace
The sunken liner, lying on her side across part of the channel with part of her hull awash, was another menace which kept shipping motionless.

Among the incoming vessels today was the crippled Clyde liner Algonquin, which rammed the Fort Victoria. For two nights and a day the crippled liner lay anchored near the Ambrose lightship, unable to proceed with her 189 passengers for Miami and Galveston and also helpless to return to her pier.

Efforts were made today to salvage 247 sacks of mail which went down with the Fort Victoria. Fourteen sacks on the liner floated to the surface. Although the wrecked hull lies in only 60 feet of water, visible at low tide, it was believed the cost of raising it would be prohibitive.

One hundred and six of the Fort Victoria's rescued passengers continued on their way to Bermuda today aboard another of the Furness-Bermuda line vessels, the Fort St. George.

Will Expose Fee System in Talks

CORPUS CHRISTI, Dec. 20. (P)—An exposition of the fee system allegedly in use in some Texas counties of "farming out" tax assessments and collections to private firms on a commission basis will be made in a speaking tour by W. G. Kinsolving of Corpus Christi, president of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce.

President Kinsolving announced his proposed tour as a step toward reforming "serious" charges made against the chamber by "a legislator in whose district are located several counties in which this custom has been most pronounced."

Both the South Texas and West Texas chambers adopted resolutions pleading support to the legislative committee headed by Senator Frank B. Parrish of Lubbock named to investigate the fee system.

Returns Of Road Bond Issue Vote To Be Canvassed

Commissioners Of Lubbock County To Convene Here Monday To Count Ballots Of Recent Election

Commissioners of Lubbock county will convene in this city next Monday for a canvass of the returns of the election held here on Tuesday. Judge Robert H. Bean announced yesterday. Date for sale of the \$391,000 bonds also probably will be set by the commissioners.

"All the bonds will be issued at once, but will be sold in lots of \$200,000 at a time," said Judge Bean. "When we get ready to sell any particular lot, the sale will be duly advertised. These bonds will bear not more than 5 per cent interest, and will be issued serially."

Values Increase
Assessed valuation of Lubbock county for 1929 is \$44,127,500, of this, more than \$18,000,000 is on land and city property, exclusive of personal and railroad properties.

Total bonded and warrant indebtedness of the county at this time exclusive of the amount of the road bond issue and \$21,500 now outstanding against district 1, is \$211,805.55.
