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Austin Mare Grand Champion For Show

Judge Tommy Buckner of Loveland awarded grand championships to exhibitors from Snyder, Austin and Odessa Saturday at 5th Annual Colorado City Quarter Horse Show.

He selected the trophy winners from a field of 51 animals brought to the show from 19 towns across West and Central Texas.

Heavy clouds threatened the show all day, but the rains held off in favor of another successful event sponsored by Western Riding Club with official approval from American Quarter Horse Association.

Bunk House Beauty (1963), owned by Udo Houflier of Austin, became the grand champion mare of the show with Wells Missie (1965) of Hays Ranch, Snyder, reserve champion.

A 5-year-old bay, Fuego Rojo, owned by J. C. Conine of Odessa, was the grand champion gelding. Reserve gelding was Ron's Stormy Day, a red dun owned by E. O. Miller of Lybbock.

Grand champion stallion was Hi Jo Bars, owned by Hays Ranch of Snyder and from the class of 1964 and before. Sunup Five (1965) owned by Scharbauer Cattle Company of Midland was the reserve champion stallion.

\$45,000 Asked In Wreck Suit

Mrs. Ruth Dozier, librarian for Mitchell County Public Library, filed suit Wednesday in 32nd District Court asking for \$45,250 in connection with an auto collision here last year.

Mrs. Dozier was injured in the morning collision last July 28 at Chestnut and East 26th St.

Defendant in the damage suit is Patrick McKinney Sr., driver of the other car involved in the mishap.

Mrs. Dozier, in the court petition filed by Attorney T. L. Rees, contends she suffered "serious and probable permanent bodily injuries and

damages" in the wreck. She also claims that the collision resulted from negligence of the defendant and cites nine particulars in her claim.

In addition receiving serious, painful and lasting injuries, Mrs. Dozier claims that she was unable to work for a period of time and will be handicapped in doing her work.

The suit contends that \$45,000 is a reasonable sum for damages suffered as a result of the accident and that \$250 is due her for damages resulting to the 1949 Plymouth she was driving when the wreck happened.

Lorraine Phone Suit Business Man Files For Damage

A Lorraine business man has filed suit against Telephone Inc., operator of Lorraine phone exchange, asking \$150 per month damages since April and \$5,000 additional exemplary damages.

Olen Mayes, operator of a butane and appliance store, claims he was caused damage when the phone company discontinued phone service to his business firm and, when service was restored, provided the firm with a phone number different from that listed in the current Lorraine directory.

In his petition, filed here in 32nd District Court, the plaintiff contends that phone service was disconnected April 11, 1968, after a disputed charge for Mayes' advertising in the phone directory's "yellow pages."

Service was resumed, the plaintiff claims, after his attorney wrote the phone company April 12. However, the number was changed to a different number, hurting the plaintiff's business which operates "primarily by phone," according to the petition.

Mayes claims damage to his business because of the

phone interruption and number change has amounted to "at least \$150 per month" since April and that he "will be damaged at least that much until new phone directory comes out informing customers of plaintiff's number."

He further contends that the defendant's action was with willful and malicious intent to injure plaintiff, and entitles Mayes to \$5,000 exemplary damage.

The suit was filed for Mayes by Colorado City attorney, Dell Barber.

Schools Reply To Farrar Suit

Attorney for Colorado Independent School District has filed an answer in 32nd District Court denying all allegations by Nick Farrar in Farrar's civil suit against the school system.

Farrar earlier this month filed suit asking \$15,800 damages on the contention that he was "wrongfully fired and told to leave the offices" of the school tax post.

Guilford L. Jones, Big Spring attorney, this week replied to Farrar's petition for the school district and

Supt. James G. McMath. The answer declares that the defendant (the school district and superintendent) "respectfully denies each and every, all and singular, the allegations of plaintiff's original petition, and demands strict proof thereof."

The school reply also requested that a judgment be rendered in favor of the school district and Farrar recover nothing for his suit and that the school district recover court costs and "other and further relief to which they may be entitled."

Man Charged For Desertion

A child desertion charge has been filed here in County Court against Harold Ross.

The misdemeanor complaint alleges that Ross has willfully deserted, neglected and refused to provide support for three children; two sons and a daughter, all under age 18.

County Attorney Frank Ginzle filed the complaint, and the defendant posted \$500 bond in San Angelo.

Pilot Program Here High School Data Processing Course

Colorado High next fall will offer a data processing course which is designated as a "pilot program" within the state by Texas Education Agency.

The course, one of a series of steps to broaden the curriculum within Colorado Independent School District, will be the first step by the school system into computer instruction.

Fifty-nine students have pre-registered for the course and have been tested to determine aptitude and interest.

If the program is successful, school officials will consider offering an adult course during summer months next year to employees of business firms.

Supt. James G. McMath has told school board members that basic equipment in the data processing instruction will be a 402 accounting machine, a 526 key punch machine and a sorter—all leased from IBM corporation.

Supportive equipment will include IBM typewriters with a simulated keyboard for key punch instruction to rubber-mats and caster cups.

Federal funds for purchasing the supportive equipment have been approved by Texas Educational Agency through Title 3 program.

It is in this proposed use of supportive equipment which is an innovation for providing data processing instruction. In fact, the Colorado City idea for maximum instruction with supportive equipment is so new that it is the first to receive Texas Education Agency approval.

Courthouse Repair For Safety And Water Leaks

That work high on the scaffolds at Mitchell County Courthouse isn't just for beautification to the building.

For several years Commissioners Court has tried to make repairs to the masonry abutment which extends around the Courthouse exterior at several levels. The repairs, however, did not prove effective.

Water continued to run into the building and large chunks of masonry — heavy

enough to cause serious injury if striking a person — fell from time to time.

The new repairs, county officials believe, are going to be adequate and permanent.

One ledge or abutment trim has been replaced with a concrete finish at top of the first floor on the north, south and west outside.

Workers now are starting on a higher ledge at third floor level. This ledge — extending outward about two feet — will also be replaced

by a new concrete strip.

The work has been on a pay-as-you-go basis in day-to-day segments, so that commissioners could call a halt at anytime if the repairs were not suitable.

Replacing the lower ledge on three sides of the Courthouse cost approximately \$1,500. Work on the higher, larger ledge at the third floor will be more expensive.

When it is finished, the Courthouse is expected to be safer on the outside and dryer on the inside.
