High School baseball Coach David Johnson said the loss was dis-

covered Monday as the team prepared to play Muleshoe here, and the Tahoka team had to borrow equipment from the visitors to play the game.

Stolen were six aluminum bats, three dozen Wilson baseballs, three catcher's mitts, two face masks, two chest protectors, one helmet, shin guards and two wooden bats.

School Board Accepts Resignation Of Tahoka Head Football Coach

Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of head football coach Tim Smith at their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night, and the resignation of coach Charlie Mac Holland, and renewed teacher contracts for elementary and junior/senior high school staff.

Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter presented the board with the resignations of Smith and Holland, and trustees renewed the contracts of all other elementary and junior/senior high school professional staff members, following a two-hour executive session. The group also approved the textbook committee's recommendation of adopting a multiple listing of textbooks from which material may be chosen in the district.

Business Manager Loretta Tekell reported an account balance in all funds of \$1,536,550.49 as of the end of February, which is a collection rate of 86.6%, down from last year's percentage of 90.1% at the same time period.

The Board unanimously approved a proposal to build a new storage facility on the junior/senior high school campus, to be constructed on top of an existing slab (the old tennis court) next to the athletic facilities. Bids will be solicited on a 90'x42'x12' storage facility.

Also approved for bid requests was a new pickup truck for the Director of Maintenance and Transportation. The present truck is a 1982 GMC, and trustees voted to advertise for bids for a new Chevrolet or GMC 1/2 ton pickup, V6 with automatic transmission.

In other action, the superintendent told trustees he had requested a waiver for the district from the Com-

missioner of Education, to allow the district to use a 175-day school calendar instead of the 180-day calendar. This would allow five additional technology training days for the staff in the district, but students would attend school on a 175-day schedule. The waiver was requested for a three-year period, beginning with the 1992-93 school year.

The board approved the superintendent's request, and also approved two school calendars for next year - one with the traditional 180 days for students and staff, and the other with 175 days for students and 5 technology training days for staff. If Commissioner Lionel R. Meno accepts the district's request, and the superintendent felt that very likely, then the first day of school for the 1992-93 year will begin on Aug. 24 for students, with a staff meeting on Aug. 17. If the request is not

granted, then school will begin on Aug. 19 for students.

Trustees approved several district policies after some discussion, and then heard the superintendent's report. Dr. Carter told the group that he had invited Dr. Mick Stevens of Texas Tech University to give a one-hour presentation on site-base management to staff, administrators and board members at a meeting sometime after Spring Break. More information on that meeting will be presented at a later date.

The board acknowledged the accomplishments of the Tahoka High School DECA project in their advancement to national competition in Anaheim, California. The group will compete at the end of April.

The meeting adjourned at 12:15 a.m. All board members and district administrators were present.

Lots Of Candidates File For Tahoka I.S.D. Election

Election date is May 2 for school districts and city councils, as well as for the Lynn County Hospital Board of Directors. However, the Hospital Board filing deadline is April 7 for the May 2 election.

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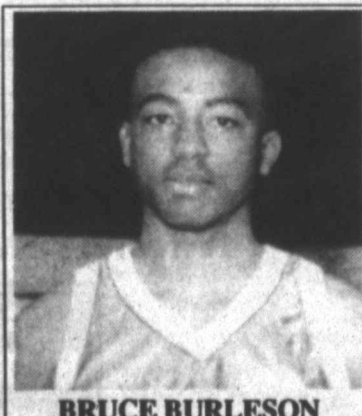

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Survey Shows Pre-Plant Irrigation Not Needed In Lynn County This Year

Soil moisture conditions are better than they have been in many years for Lynn County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

No pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity for the 1992 growing season.

"The top three feet of the five-foot soil profile are near field capacity, with small soil moisture deficits occurring at the four and five foot levels. This is the opposite of recent years where the deficits were in the top three feet of the soil," said Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Two to four inches of water will be needed to wet the top five feet of soil to field capacity over the eastern and western sections of the portion of Lynn County within Water District boundaries, according to data collected during the annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey conducted by the High Plains Water District and the United States Department of Agriculture—Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS). The City of Wilson is included in this area.

An area requiring zero to two inches of soil moisture is found in the north central portion of the county within the Water District service area. It extends southward from the Lubbock/Lynn County line to New Home and the Water District's southern Lynn County boundary.

Crenwelge suggests that producers let normal rainfall replenish the

deeper soil moisture, since the probability is good that enough precipitation will fall between now and the growing season to fill the deficits.

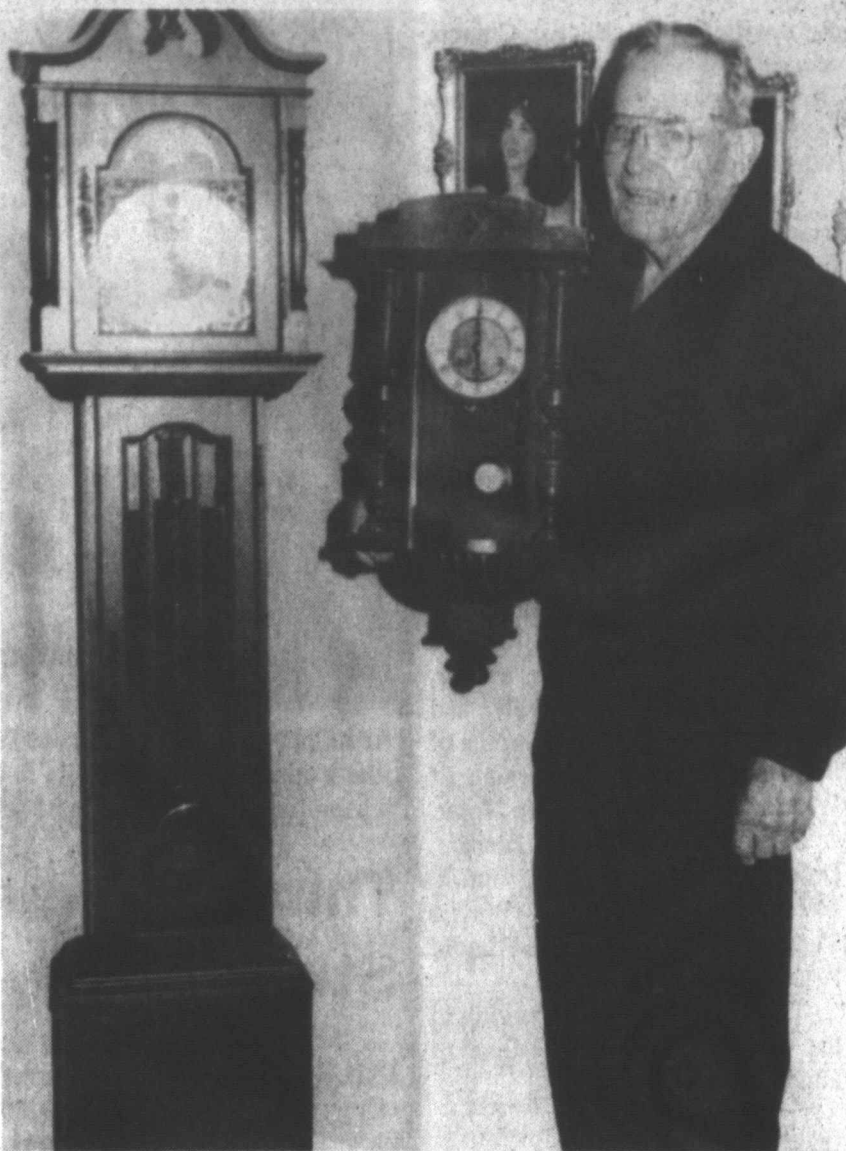
Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from Nov. 13, 1991, through Jan. 23, 1992, at 270 soil moisture monitoring sites within the 15-county District service area.

However, some sites received additional precipitation after the measurements had been made. In order to provide the most accurate soil moisture information possible to District residents, personnel re-read rain gauges from those soil moisture sites measured from Nov. 14, 1991 through Dec. 16, 1991. They found that additional rainfall had been received at these sites. A second set of soil moisture readings were made at selected sites, and the data was adjusted to reflect these findings.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube. Soil density data and rain gauge readings are also recorded during the survey.

Selection of soil moisture monitoring sites is based upon the soil type and crop(s) grown in the area. Each site is representative of typical field conditions in the area.

Tahoka Man's Hobby Is Clock Building, Repair

Tahoka resident Everton Nevill is one who spends a lot of time with time, and his hobby of building grandfather clocks and repairing timepieces keeps him busy. Nevill, a retired carpenter and contractor by trade, was the subject of a feature story in the *Andrews County News* issue of Jan. 19.

Nevill, his wife June and their son, Joe Don, live on N. 2nd St. in Tahoka, but spend much of their time at their second home about 18 miles northwest of Andrews. Following is a condensed version of the feature article from the *Andrews County News*, written by staff writer Judy Thompson:

An old clock given to him by his grandmother started Everton Nevill off on the road of fascination with what made things tick, particularly in the world of timepieces.

"Grandmother had an old clock and give it to me," Nevill recalls. Ignoring the old adage that one should not take complex things apart because you might not be able to put them together again, Nevill sat down to find out what made the old clock tick. From that beginning a fascina-

tion for any kind of timepiece was developed.

Nevill began fixing clocks of his own and those of his neighbors, and when World War II came along and he went into the army, he soon became well-known for being able to fix the watches of other soldiers, often with just a pocketknife and screwdriver. He had no tools until some of his army buddies came up with jewelry tools, making the repair jobs easier. "I also kept the clocks in the mess halls running," he said.

Clock and watch repair took second place in Nevill's priorities during the years he was a carpenter, but he always said he'd like to build grandfather clocks when he retired. One Christmas after he retired, his wife and son presented him a grandfather clock kit from an Alabama firm and he finished his first clock in little more than a week.

He continued to make clocks and now has several ready to sell. "Probably the most difficult part of building a clock is regulating it," he said. Time and patience are key elements in the process and Nevill has both. Most of his work is done at the Andrews County location.

Scholarship Set Up For Former Tahoka Man

Colleagues of the late Texas Tech University Professor Wendell Eudell McClendon recently established an endowed scholarship fund in his memory. McClendon, 54, of Tahoka, died Feb. 14.

McClendon, who joined the faculty at Texas Tech in 1984, was an assistant professor of French. At the time of his death, he was trying to establish the Texas Tech Zola/Naturalism Center in the Rare Book Room of the University Library. Texas Tech has the only library outside of France with microfilm copies of French author Emile Zola's manuscripts.

According to Diane Wood, associate professor of French, the scholarship drive will serve as a living memorial for McClendon.

"He was the kind of person who was not afraid to get in there and get the job done," Wood said. "Everyone who knew him had nice things to say about him."

At Texas Tech, McClendon served as a faculty senator from 1988-1991. He also served as director of first-year French classes including supervision of teaching assistants. McClendon had developed the syllabus and lab materials for first-year courses since 1985.

Prior to coming to Texas Tech, McClendon was an instructor and an assistant professor at the University of Oklahoma from 1968-73. He also was an assistant professor at Glamorgan Polytechnic from 1973-74. McClendon taught French, English, and Spanish at O'Donnell High School from 1976-84.

McClendon received his bachelor's degree in French in 1964 from Texas Tech. He received his master's and doctoral degrees in French in 1966 and 1972, respectively, from Indiana University.

P.I.E. representatives match students with host families by finding common interests and lifestyles through an informal in-home meeting.

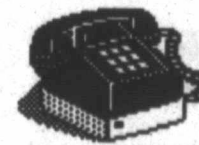

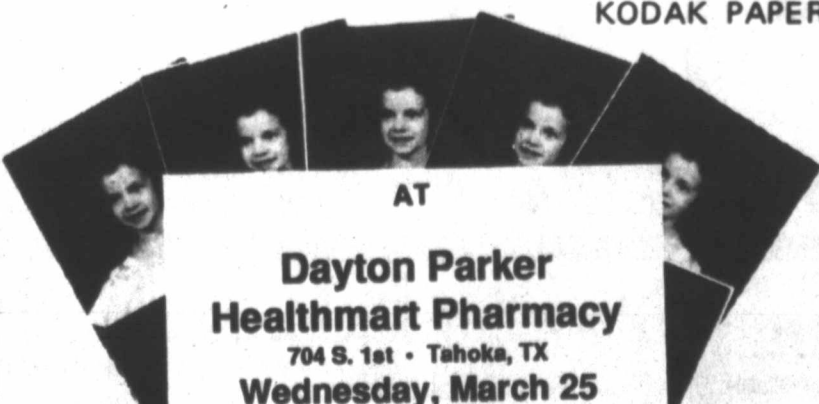


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'Cotton Unlimited' Program Presented At Rotary Club

Wanda Mitchell, a representative of Cotton Unlimited in Post, presented the program last week at the noon meeting of Tahoka Rotary Club. She gave information about some of the products the innovative new plant in Post is producing, and showed samples of insulation and oil spill cleanup products made from cotton.

According to Ms. Mitchell, there are 35 people employed at the Post plant, making cotton insulation for

buildings out of low-grade cotton (not yet on the market) and oil spill cleanup materials made of cotton which is currently on the market. The oil spill material is produced in several shapes, including a water repellent "stuffed sock" shape which soaks up 20 times its weight in oil and will float indefinitely. She noted that any oil could be recycled from the sock, then the cotton could be recycled from the sock to make insulation, stressing that there were no waste products whatsoever.

"The cost of our insulation will run about 10% higher than fiberglass insulation," she noted. She held a flame to the cotton insulation sample, showing Rotarians how the material was flame resistant, and also produced no smoke.

She predicted that the plant would eventually use about 55,000 bales of low-grade cotton annually in the production of the new materials.

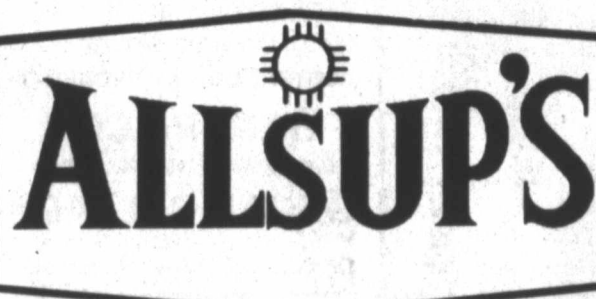
