Dr. M. W. Lowrey, Former Mayor Of Gatesville, Dies

Dr. M. W. Lowrey, 71, one of
Gatesville's leading physicians for
40 years and an outstanding civic
leader, died at 11 a. m. Friday at
his home here.

He has been seriously ill for the
past three months.

Dr. Lowrey was on the city
council from 1918 until 1930, and
was mayor of Gatesville from 1930
to 1936.

He was born in Hill County,
Texas on Feb. 8, 1875, and was
graduated from the American
Medical College at St. Louis, Mo.,
in 1897. He practiced at Richard-
son and Sanger before coming to
Gatesville in 1909. He was married
to Miss Kate Halbrook on Feb.
8, 1911.

Survivors are his wife, two sons,
Dr. E. E. Lowrey of Gatesville,
Wendell Lowrey of the army med-
ical corps, one sister, Mrs. J. W.
Holt, Jr., of Gatesville, three grand
children.

Funeral services were held at
4:30 p. m. Saturday at the First
Methodist church of Gatesville
conducted by Rev. Roy Langston
of Temple.—Temple Daily Tele-
gram.

Oglesby Boy Taken On Armed Robbery Charge Last Week

An Oglesby youth wanted in
connection with armed robbery
of a nighterie on the McGregor
highway was arrested Thursday
by Chief Criminal Deputy B. Co-
cker, Constable Billie Wheat and
Coryell county officers and was
placed in the Waco jail for ques-
tioning.

Two were involved in the tak-
ing of \$60 from the club as it
was about to close May 21, and are
still at large.

The club was robbed by three
men who had been drinking beer
in it for almost an hour Tuesday
night. As it was about to close
they walked outside but two re-
turned seconds later and took
money bags containing \$60. The
third covered them with a gun
from outside, and they were last
seen driving toward McGregor in
a gray Ford.

Don't get overtired. Extreme
fatigue makes you an easier vic-
tim.

Avoid Chills. Don't stay too long
in cold water.

Keep clean. Wash hands before
eating. Keep flies and other in-
sects away from food.

Help keep your community
clean. Waste and exposed garbage
may be sources of infection.

Don't swim in polluted waters
Avoid removal of tonsils or
adenoids prior to and during polio
epidemic season.

There is no known cure for in-
fantile paralysis. Good medical
care will prevent or correct some
deformities. But in every fourth
or fifth case there will be perma-
nent paralysis that cannot be over-
come. Do not believe those who
for one reason or another prom-
ise to cure these cases. Be guided
by sound medical advice.

Your doctor, your health offi-
cer and your county Chapter of
the National Foundation for In-
fantile Paralysis will do every-
thing in their power to see to it
that your community is ready to
meet an epidemic. Year-round
services provided by the National
Foundation Chapters, in coopera-
tion with local health authorities
include:

Hospitalization, transportation,
care and treatment of polio pa-

tors (iron lungs) orthopedic ap-
pliances and other special equip-
ment.

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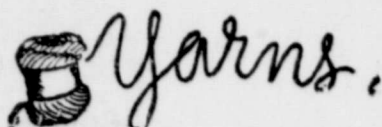
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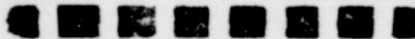

—For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity in action against the enemy, Norman W. Painter of 1620 South 10th Street, Waco, Texas, has been awarded the silver star medal, the Navy Department announced recently.

Painter, a lieutenant (jg) in the Naval Reserve now on inactive duty, was assistant damage control officer aboard the U. S. destroyer Morrison which was lost off Okinawa on May 4, 1945. Hit by four suicide planes after an hour's battle, the Morrison was enveloped in flames and explosions and casualties included more than half of its personnel.

The Texan effectively directed his damage control party in fighting fires despite flying debris and burning ammunition, taking the most dangerous positions to save his men. He continued this work until critically burned and wounded. Other ships in the formation rescued him and the other Morrison survivors in the midst of Japanese Kamikaze attacks.

He spent five and a half months in Navy hospitals as a result of this action, and was released to inactive duty in November, 1945, at Camp Wallace, Texas.

A native of Gatesville, Texas, Painter and his wife, the former Miss Eloise Whotsel of McAlester, Oklahoma, now live in Waco where he is attending Baylor University. He is a senior in the Department of Sociology.

The Silver Star Medal and citation was sent to Painter by Rear Admiral F. A. Low, USN, Commander Destroyers, U. S. Pacific Fleet. He has received the Purple Heart Medal.
