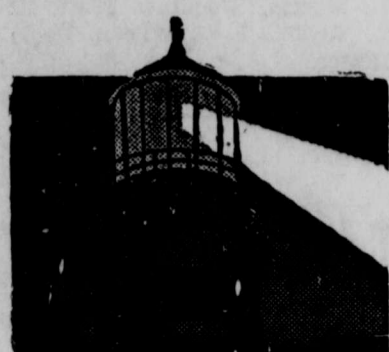

Annual Tour Conducted Monday For Ministers of Mitchell County

The annual tour for the local ministers was conducted Monday, April 17, A. K. McCarley Jr. has announced. The annual tour is sponsored by the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District, with the Mitchell County Ministerial Alliance and other ministers cooperating.

In the field, the group observed sorghum stubble holding the soil in place with no movement on Woodroe Crabtree's farm.

Throckmorton Range Experiment Station Visited on Sponsored Tour

The Board of Supervisors of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District sponsored a tour of the Throckmorton Range Experiment Station April 13, Rex McKenney has announced. Fourteen ranchers, supervisors and other personnel attended the tour.

The tour was conducted by Dr. W. J. Waldrip, Superintendent of the Station. The group studied stocking rates, range proper, use, brush control and two systems of range deferred rotation grazing, McKenney pointed out.

The most successful system on the ranch, according to Dr. W. J. Waldrip, associate range scientist, is the four-pasture deferred rotation system whereby three pastures are being grazed with one laying out about four months at a time. The stocking rate on these pastures is one annual unit to 20 acres. The six year average calf crop has been 93 percent, with the average weaning weight for calves over the 6 year period at 518 pounds. The big difference lies in the fact that calves from cows on these rotation pastures have averaged 50 pounds more than calves from cows on all other types of pasture on the ranch.

At 25 cents per pound, the increased production of the 4-pasture system, over continuous use, represents a gain of 12 per cent per year.

This practice is simple once planned and put into operation by the rancher. Dr. Waldrip stressed. Once livestock are put into a pasture they are not moved for 12 months. Movement of 1-3 of the livestock from one pasture to another is all that is necessary to carry out the practice, Dr. Waldrip pointed out.

The rancher needs to do a good job of selecting four pastures as grouping of four units of pastures that are about equal in production to plan and carry out a four pasture deferred rotation grazing system, Waldrip added.

The ranches are also experimenting with two pastures in rotation. The stocking rate on these two pastures is one animal unit per 20 acres with cattle staying on the pasture from 3 to 6 months, depending on the time of the year. It is planned so that the same pasture is not grazed the same season of each year. The calf crop per-

centage over six years on these two pastures is 91 per cent with the average weaning weight at 499 pounds. These cattle received the heavier supplemental feeding.

The trip to Throckmorton was very informative, McKenney added. Ranchers in our district are urged to analyze their ranching operation in light of installing one or both of the range deferred - rotation grazing is a part of the ranching operation.

\$12.00 more income for each cow or animal unit of sheep per year would be some shot in the arm to our livestock industry, McKenney said.

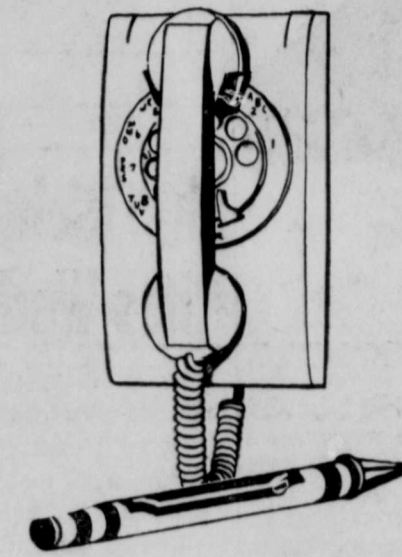
