TEXAS BEAUTY SPOTS.—The scenic tours in all parts of Texas need more publicity. Texas people, the newspapers and chambers of commerce included, are too modest in proclaiming the beauties of the many drives through the state. I have been in nearly every county in Texas and I have yet to find one where there are not possibilities for scenic drives rivaling those of any state in the union. All places can not show mountains or sea shores, pine forests or rippling streams, but there is beauty in the great vistas of level plains, in broad acres of cotton and wheat, in irrigated valleys dotted with cottages, in everything about us, if we will only open our eyes to all that is to be seen. Having seen, we should take pride in showing others the beauties of nature so evident in Texas.

SCENIC TOUR SURVEY.—The Highway club of Texas has about completed plans for a "Scenic Motor Tour" to include the principal beauty places and main historic spots in Texas. This will include most of the large cities, will give views of the vast grazing ranges of West Texas, the oil fields of the Panhandle, the grandeur of the Davis mountains, the Central Texas oil and agricultural belt, the quiet pine forests of East Texas, the palm gardens and citrus orchards of the Rio Grande Valley—a motor trip over Texas. Would it not be a fine idea for every chamber of commerce in the state to survey and picture in newspapers and pamphlets the scenic tours of its territory, with maps showing important spots, tourist camps, fishing pools, and all the other things tourists would like to know? Then would it not be well to designate a "scenic trip" day, or a succession of such days, when the local citizens would be induced to make the trip together on a picnic party and to get acquainted with the beauties close to home in order that they may be able to show them to visitors? Such an effort would soon result in the "home folks" finding that they do not have to go to some distant state or even some remote county in the state to find the beautiful which lies all about them.

MARKING HOUSTON ROADS.—The highway department is making a rather delayed effort to get all the state highways into Houston marked before the National democratic convention meets there in June, so that tourists may be able to find their way into and out of that city. Why not extend this to all parts of the state? Tourists, even our Texas tourists, often find themselves unable to determine which road to take when arriving at a cross road.

TEXARKANA AIRPORT.—Texarkana is making provision for a landing field for air planes. The time will soon come when it will be as necessary for cities and towns to have air ports and hangars as it now is to have railroad stations and public garages. The places that make early and convenient provision for fliers will become the popular landing fields.

TRAVEL PASSING THROUGH.—Marshall and Texarkana, eastern gateways to Texas, report that numerous car loads and trainloads of prospectors are "passing through" to other points in Texas. It seems to be up to these and other places through which home seekers enter Texas to make the favorable impression necessary to getting a share of the new life coming to Texas, and this the East Texas chamber of commerce and local chambers are trying to do as never before.

TUBERCULOSIS WAR.—The climate in most parts of Texas is inimicable to the development of tuberculosis, and yet people do contract the disease in Texas. The state board of health says that this comes from lack of knowledge of the signs of the approaching trouble and to neglect. Tuberculosis is insidious almost as cancer, but with watchful care can be avoided by almost everyone. Fully 85 per cent of the cases could be avoided if only those who show the first symptoms would seek immediate treatment. A cold, a cough, a difficulty in breathing, a pain in the lungs should send a person hurrying for relief.

RADIO TROUBLES.—Texans who use the radio, and they are many, have been hoping that congress would give some relief from the interference of state stations. An evening's pleasure has been spoiled by inability to cut out stations not wanted. Many an evening's growl instead of better. The hope that have been given out that matters would soon be remedied have resulted only in continued disappointments. Wake Up! For Memphis Motorcade

CISCO SHOULD TAKE STEPS TO PROTECT CITY

"I regret to see so little interest manifested in the coming motorcade that will pass through Cisco April 16, for the Memphis meeting of the Broadway of America Highway," said Judge Eugene Lanford this morning. "Surely our people are not attaching sufficient importance to this meeting, but it is of vital concern to all of West Texas, and especially to Cisco. Eastland, Ranger and Baird, our immediate neighbors. Interest should be aroused in each of these cities, which should be represented at least 100 strong at Memphis."

"Right at this time is an especially critical moment for Cisco, Baird, Eastland and Ranger and Strawn, as the Broadway of America doubtless will be designated at the Memphis meeting. The towns on the main line of this transcontinental highway are menaced by the possible designation of the north loop as the route for the highway, and it will probably be so designated if Cisco, Baird, Eastland, Ranger and Strawn should let the matter go by default as they did at the El Paso meeting. Especially is there a danger of this action being taken if there is a strong delegation at Memphis favoring the north route, as there is more sure to be. Towns, like individuals, secure that which they go after, and already we are told that large delegations are preparing to attend from Albany and Breckenridge, the only two towns that would be directly benefited by the designation of the loop as the main line."

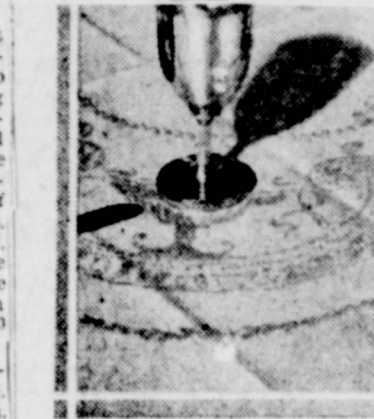
"There is another danger of losing this designation through Eastland county for the reason that the federal authorities are not in favor of loop designations, and unless Cisco and neighboring towns that would be effected have good strong representation at the Memphis meeting the designation probably might be made over the north loop. The fact that the main line has five good little cities to be served, where only two are located on the loop, and that the main line has 40 miles of splendidly paved highways, 20 of which are brick paved, the equal of any in the state, will hardly suffice unless the main line is backed up with a strong representation."

"There is nothing so important to this part of the state as this transcontinental route. It means a volume of traffic that can hardly be envisioned at this time. This fact was most forcibly brought to my attention when I made the drive through the Atlantic states last summer to originate the South-Central route, the best highways of any Southern state, and those people are commercializing their highways to good advantage. For 100 miles in either direction of points of interest the attractions are advertised, and tourists are given information along those highways of the places of interest, and the proper route to take, as well as other facts necessary to make their tour pleasant and expeditious."

"Should the loop be designated as the one route through this part of the state, naturally tourists will be directed over that route. Thus, the tourists would miss a great deal by detouring Strawn, Ranger, Eastland, Cisco and Baird, but these cities would also miss this tourist traffic that is growing in volume every day. I certainly think Cisco should take the initiative and that big delegations from all of these five cities join the motorcade when it passes through Eastland county," Judge Lanford concluded.

Advices from Midland state that the motorcade will leave El Paso the evening of April 14 and reach Midland on the afternoon of April 15, and spend the night, where the members will be guests of the chamber of commerce at a "cowboy" breakfast. It will arrive at Abilene for lunch April 16. There the motorcade will split—half of the party going over the loop to Albany, and the other half traversing the main line through Cisco. Entertainments are being provided for the party at many places along the route, including a fish fry at the former home of Judge Lanford, DeWitt Bluff, Ark., on the banks of White river. The two motorcades, one from the east and the other from the west, will meet at Memphis April 19 for the biggest highway convention ever staged in the South, which will convene April 20 and 21.

Lee Meets Much Encouragement in Race for Congress; Speaking and Meeting Voters of District

R. Q. Lee left this morning for Rockport, where he is attending to some matters in connection with the Cisco & Northeastern railroad. He will return home this evening and complete arrangements for further prosecuting his campaign or congress. This trip will probably consume the remainder of the week as he has had several invitations to visit different parts of the district, and has grouped a number of places where he will make talks in the interest of his candidacy, and meet the people. He is billed to speak at a luncheon given partially in his honor at a near by city Tuesday, and other appointments are scheduled for the remainder of the week. It was not known this morning who would be in the Lee party to leave here Tuesday, but two or three friends will likely accompany him on this trip.

Speaking of the trip made with Mr. Lee Friday and Saturday, R. A. St. John, who with J. T. Elliott and Luther McCrea were in the party, said that Mr. Lee made the most favorable impressions on those whom he addressed and met during this trip. "So far as I could observe there seemed to be practically no opposition. We went directly to Lometa and Lampasas Friday, where we were guests at the annual chamber of commerce banquet, at the latter city. Lee made a splendid talk that appeared to be most favorably received by all who heard him. After his talk we mingled with many of the people in the town. Friday afternoon we drove to San Saba, spent the night there, and Saturday we visited Goldthwaite. A large crowd was in Goldthwaite Saturday, which afforded Mr. Lee an opportunity to meet a great many of the voters in that section. At each of the places we were met with practically no opposition. Naturally Mr. Lee will not get all the votes in that part of the district, but if the expressions heard are any indication of the way people are going to vote, there will be a big vote cast for Mr. Lee in the July primaries in the

Bride of a Year Found Shot Dead

NEW YORK, March 19.—Mrs. Helen C. Kimball, public school teacher and bride of a year, was found shot to death and partly disrobed on a bed in her home this morning, half an hour after her husband, a professor, had gone to work. Police are seeking a negro who formerly worked in the apartment building, in connection with the slaying.

ILL FATED S-4 IS DOCKED AT BOSTON TODAY

BOSTON, March 19.—With flag at half mast flying from her battered conning tower, the ill-fated submarine S-4 was successfully jockeyed into dry dock here today. The removal of eight bodies locked in the submersible was effected tonight. Thirty-two bodies were removed by divers before the ship was brought to the surface.

JURY FOR HILL BEING CHOSEN; HAS CONFESSED

Henry Hill was brought to trial in the 91st district court in Eastland this morning. He is the third member of the gang which held up the First National bank in Cisco on December 23, and the only member to plead guilty to the charge. He has already made a full confession to officers.

Of the 230 special veniremen summoned from which to select the jury only 150 of them were present when court opened. After excuses were heard 25 of them were permitted to return to their homes.

The work of securing a jury will not be difficult, in the opinion of court attaches, since Judge Davenport announced to the prospective jurors that Hill will plead guilty, hence any preconceived opinion they may have regarding his guilt or innocence will not affect their qualifications as jurors. The only thing left for the jury will be the determining of his punishment.

When court adjourned at noon Ray Agnew, of Rising Star, the first venireman called, was being questioned. It was thought that the jury would be secured this afternoon.

Robert Hill is expected to take the stand and tell the public where and when the disastrous robbery was planned and why he was one of the quartet who figured in the robbery and the gun fight that followed.

Hill has a story to tell that sounds like the one of fiction that used to thrill the barefoot boy. His father died when he was 30 days old and his mother passed on when he was seven years old.

Left alone in the world, unwatched and uncared for, the penniless boy fought the world for a living. Then he was taken to the reformatory, and, he said, he knew not why.

The story he tells about being taken to the reformatory reads like a tale from a story book.

He said he was walking alone the streets of Nacodoches, when just a small boy, when the sheriff called him and told him that he was going to take him to an orphan's home. He went willingly—but he said that instead of the orphan's home he was taken to the reformatory. That was the start of the hectic life that finally led to the climax of the bloody Cisco robbery.

That his early childhood, the life he spent at the reformatory, the efforts he made to make a living honestly, and his trip to the penitentiary will figure in his recitation to the jury is practically certain.

In all probability he will tell of the chances that were denied him, an orphan boy who was handicapped because of the time he spent in the reformatory.

He is expected to tell of the time he was sentenced to the penitentiary on a charge of robbing a tailor shop and how he served his time, was released, and was making an honest living when he met Marshal Ratliff.

Should Hill go to the stand, he is expected to make a confession of his life just as he did of his participation in the robbery of the Cisco bank. He made the confession voluntarily and told all to the county officials.

Hill is expected to plead guilty and put his life in the hands of the 12 men who will be selected to try him.

Ranger Captain to Appear Before Grand Jury to Explain Statement Regarding Murder for Reward

SAN ANGELO, March 19.—J. O. Barfield, sheriff of Upton county, who last week received \$10,000 from the Texas Bankers' association as a reward for killing two alleged bank bandits at Rankin January 11, says Captain Frank Hamer will be called before the Upton county grand jury convening March 29 "to tell all he knows" about the alleged "frame ups" of bank robbers in Texas, concerning which he recently made a statement.

The ranger captain's statement declared that there is a "murder ring existing in Texas" to collect rewards of \$5,000 for each dead bank bandit.

Hamer is credited with the statement charging that certain bank robberies in Texas have been framed where the reward of the bankers' association was granted. Citizens Rankin officers take the position that the statement seemed to indicate that robberies there and at Odessa might have been "framed." The result of this feeling is that there is considerable demand at both places that the names of their officers be cleared.

Barfield was one of three officers guarding the First State bank at Rankin the morning of January 11 when two men were shot as they are said to have been entering the bank. Guard had been maintained at the bank the two previous nights to the shooting on the strength of an alleged tip to the effect that a robbery was contemplated. The reward of \$10,000 was received by Barfield this week.

After complete investigation had been made by the bankers' association and subsequent to which Hamer's statement was issued, the Odessa reward was paid promptly. Hamer declared that two more bank robberies are being planned in Texas, at this time. "The supreme court of the United States," said Mr. Bennett, "has declared that the business of insurance is to a large degree impressed with a public necessity; there is coming to be recognized by the courts and by supervising and governmental state officials, more and more, the fact that the insuring public is the principal party to all insurance contracts, and is entitled to the largest element of protection and the greatest amount of consideration that can possibly be thrown around indemnity contracts. It is hard to gain-say a statement of this kind. It is becoming increasingly difficult to justify the existence of any business except as a public necessity. In and around and as a part of this theory has grown up in Our Country the idea that if our business is a public one then it should be publicly administered.

"I wonder where this paternalism-in government idea is leading us!

"There are pending in congress bills creating bureaus and commissions in direct competition with or substitution for American business as it is conducted today.

"Other evidences of the socialistic trend of state governments are numerous so-called 'state funds' established for the purpose of affording alleged insurance protection. The experience of all these has been most disastrous to those unfortunate enough to be deceived into believing that they were carrying some kind of genuine protection. These measures are class legislation to the nth power.

"One business should never be helped, under our system of government, at the expense of another. The merchant, the manufacturer, the business man and the insurance companies are just as much entitled to preferential protection as are the recipients of favors under state and national funds."

CITY SANCTUARY

Six wild ducks have wintered by the little stream which flows through New York City's botanical garden. Commuters whirling into the metropolis on their morning trains have seen these birds of the wilderness nonchalantly feeding not far from the railroad tracks day after day, and the sight, according to one observer, has made the city a little more endurable. Furthermore, a naturalist remarks, wild ducks, geese and other birds often find winter sanctuary in the heart of that city, in and around the lakes of a splendid system of parks, "as if knowing their enemies were harmless there." Here is one of the many reasons for having large, natural parks in and near big cities. The mere proximity and noise of city life do not seem to alarm wild creatures, once they discover they are unmolested by the humans there. Every city owes it to itself to have not only fine parks and playgrounds for its citizens, old and young, but also woods and streams and ravines and little lakes for such feathered and furry creatures as may enjoy them.

A PRESIDENT'S VACATION

A dispatch from Washington says that President Coolidge is looking for a place to spend his vacation. In which he is not so very different from a good many of us. Yet there are differences between the chief executive's vacation and ours. He may have greater opportunities for getting close to nature while remaining with the comforts of civilized life. The lodges and ranches and country places that are put at a president's disposal, though often set in the midst of scenic loveliness, are not at all cut off from civilization. Therein lies one of the reasons why the ordinary vacationer need not envy the president. The latter cannot, if he would, get out of touch of his business. The affairs of state, the problems of governing a mighty land, follow him even when off duty. He can't be allowed really to rough it, for his health and safety must be constantly guarded and the national capital must be readily accessible by wire, at least, at all times.

RADIO UP

Radio fans have been doubtful lately regarding the fate of radio. Reception has been bad this winter because of the broadcasting interference. The federal radio commission has done little more than mark time, not being sure of its legal powers or the continuation of its authority. The department of commerce, which for a little while had injected some order into the chaos, has had its hands tied. Recently, while the two houses of congress quarreled over the new radio law, and partisans played politics with it, the situation has been more doubtful than ever. But Wall Street has not worried. The Stock Exchange has been the scene of the biggest bull movement in many months. Radio securities were boosted more than \$60 a share within a few days. The daily stock turnover broke all records. There must be more to any such phenomenon than mere professional gambling. There are evidently many people who have faith in radio, as entertainment and instruction, and therefore as an industry. It may be safely assumed, not particularly on the ground of this stock boom, but on the general basis of experience and common sense, that the radio mess will really be cleaned up. The American people will not stand for any mess indefinitely. Sooner or later they "turn a keen, untroubled gaze home to the instant need of things," and do something.

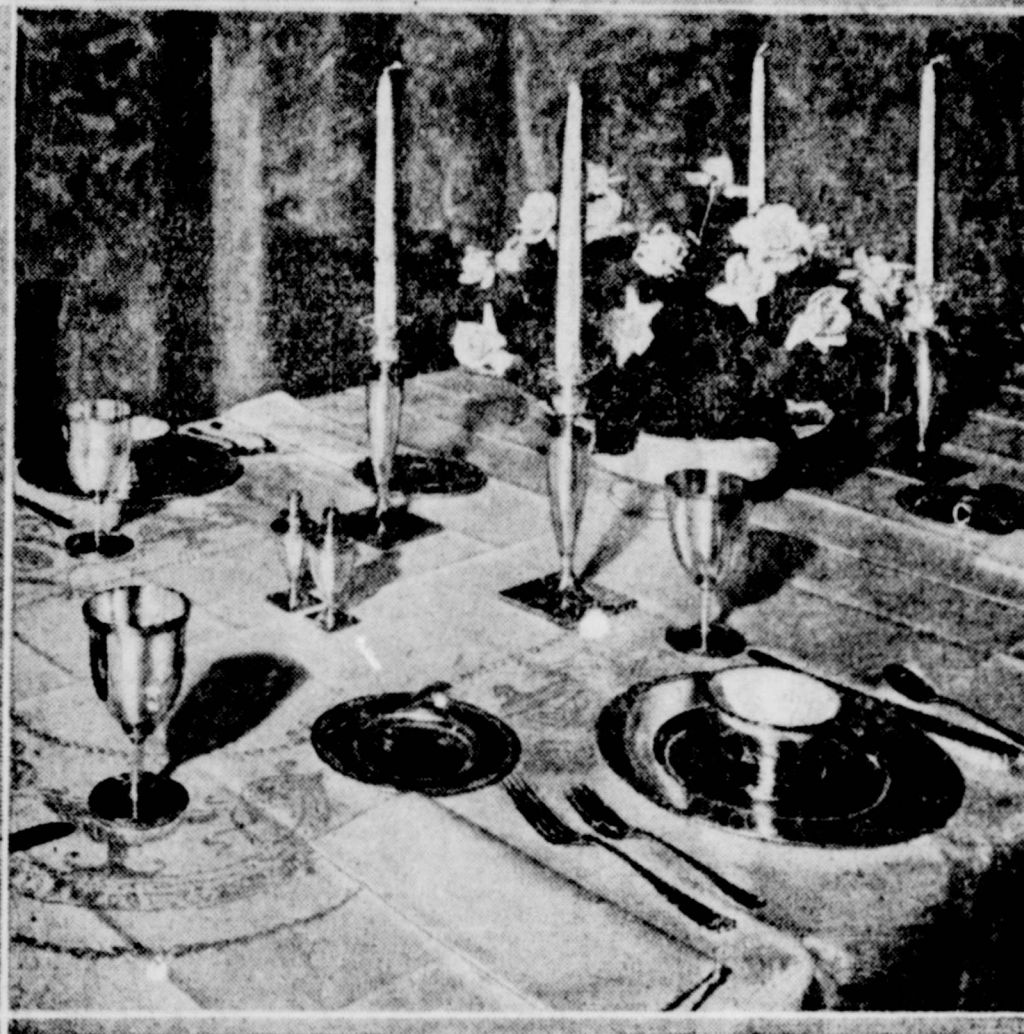
McMurry Debaters Won Every Contest

Period Sterling for the Modern Service



V. GEORGIAN

THE Georgian period in sterling silver was influenced to a certain extent by Louis XV art but strongly tempered by a return to classic models. There were also in it remaining traces of the Jacobean and the plain shapes of the Queen Anne period. Later Georgian was subject to many exotic influences, one of the most conspicuous of which was that of China as embodied in the designs of Chippendale. Just as the Louis XVI period marked a decided swing away from the rococo in France, so the still later Georgian underwent another decided change and marked one of the brightest spots in art history.

To this period the sterling illustrated above belongs with its beautiful simplicity and classic restraint in ornamentation. Classic form with utmost delicacy of decoration became of first importance. Decoration for the most part took the form of engraving, chasing or applique in very low relief. The only superficial decoration in the silverware illustrated above is a low relief in a swastika design which is chastely classic.

Ranger Boy Drops Out of Cross Country Run Account Wrenched Knee; Companion Going Strong

RANGER, March 19.—A badly wrenched knee, received in the John Tarleton-Ranger Junior college football game of last fall, has caused Homer Shipp, Ranger boy, to drop out of the Los Angeles to New York cross country race, according to a letter from him received Saturday by Ernest Shelton, circulation manager of this paper.

Kenneth Campbell, Ranger, college chum and track partner of Shipp's is still in the race and is the only Texan to survive the grueling foot trek.

The wrenched knee, which was thought by Shipp to be in good enough shape to stay in the race, started swelling Monday and when he went to a doctor he was advised to drop out of the race. Shipp, however, continued until Tuesday but the condition of the knee was such that it was utterly impossible for him to continue the grind. Shipp stated that Campbell was still in the race and "looking great."

Very little information has been received here from the two Ranger entrants since they departed on the long race at Asot Speedway, Los Angeles, March 4.

In the letter received by Shelton, Saturday, Shipp says, "I had to drop out today on account of having wrenched the knee. We were going fine until two days ago

when my knee began to swell. I went to a doctor and he told me to drop out at once, but I kept going and my knee continued to swell. This morning I was completely unable to go.

"There are less than 100 men now in the race. The third day out, we hit the mountains and the high altitude cut down some of the best runners. The foreigners lost much blood because of unusual climatic conditions. The fifth day out we crossed the desert and the intensive heat cut the number to about 100 men.

"We were going fine until my knee began to swell. The doctor said it was caused from the continuous pounding on the pavement but the knee was wrenched in the John Tarleton game and had not completely healed.

"Campbell is still going. I bade him goodbye this morning and sent him on. You don't know how much punishment that boy can take and if nothing happens to him, as it did to me, I think he will finish in New York."

"I hated to give up the race but I would be much better off if I had withdrawn when the doctor warned me. Give Campbell credit; he has gone through lots and is still going. As soon as my knee gets better I will return to Ranger."

Shipp is recuperating at Needles, California.

INDIANS SELL OIL LANDS TO FILL COFFERS

PAWHUSKA, Okla., March 19.—On March 28 and 29 the annual sale of oil leases is scheduled to be held here and there will be placed before oil men big tracts of great richness in oil.

Before the entry of the United States in the World war, nations were mustering their resources and taking stock especially of oil reserves. There was much talk of oil reserves for the navy. When the war was declared the Osage Indians, to show their patriotism, gave to the United States what government geologists reported to be the largest undeveloped tract of oil land in Oklahoma. The gift was for the duration of war. Recently the leases were returned unused to the Indians by the government.

Now the oil lease plus the gush-

ing oil well is on the market. Uncle Sam's wards will sell them at auction and pocket the proceeds in the tribal fund. The sale will attract captains of the oil industry from far and near. Millions will flow into the coffers of the tribe.

WHY PAPERS DO NOT PUBLISH A PRIZE WINNER

There is hardly a month passes during which the Daily News is not offered an advertisement which would, if published, cause the publisher to be hailed before the federal court to answer charges of violating the anti-lottery postal laws. The Daily News realizes the difficulty which advertisers labor under in con-

vincing themselves that their special advertisement is not a violation of the anti-lottery law, but the moment a newspaper gives it circulation, the publisher of that paper becomes liable to criminal prosecution, and the advertiser who sponsors such advertising is a criminal. A newspaper is not allowed to make reference to winners of prizes of any description of lottery, even for church or benevolent purposes, as will be seen by the explanation of the anti-lottery law, by Horace J. Donnelly, solicitor of the federal postoffice department, who has unofficially become the national censor on games of chance, as it is played through the mails.

Millions of dollars are saved yearly by Americans annually by fraud orders issued by the solicitor, on rulings on what constitute lottery and gift enterprises.

Donnelly's greatest difficulty is to inform the public that newspapers are prohibited from printing the winning numbers of contests for prizes held by charitable organizations, churches or philanthropists. He explains the penal code of the United States is very strict about games of chance. Section 213 of the law was revised by congress in 1909 so as to prevent any loophole for professional gamblers.

Donnelly said worthy organizations that operate community enterprises to raise funds for church or charity relief can not understand why newspapers refuse to print winning numbers of lotteries or any details about the enterprises. He explained the penal law prohibiting such publication and read section 213 of the code, as follows:

"No letter, package, postal card or circular concerning any lottery, gift enterprise, or similar scheme offering prizes dependent in the whole or in part upon lot or chance, and no

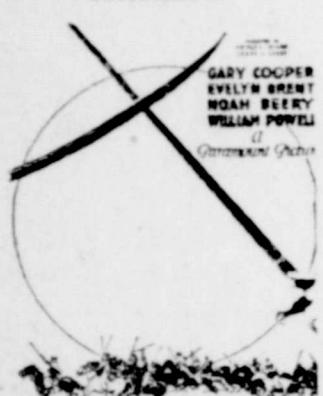

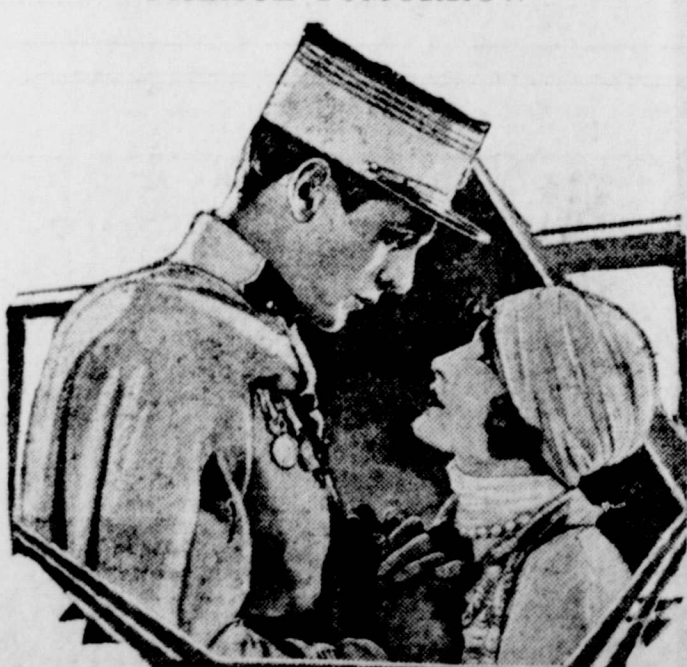

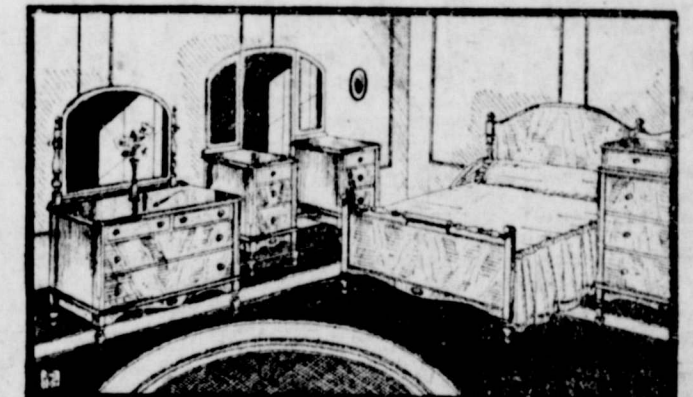
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
