The family has requested that memorials be made to the First United Methodist Church in Sudan.

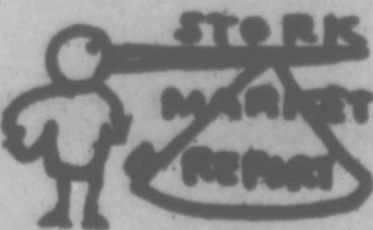

## RAINS AND SNOW IN SUDAN AREA

The Sudan area received an inch of rain Thursday, March 26 to again slow farmers in land preparations for the 1973 crop. Then on Monday, everything happened in one afternoon with

rain, sleet, hail and then snow falling from a dark sky and sent temperature to a low of 28° before morning. Twisters were reported on either side of Sudan, one near Whitharral which was traveling towards Anton, and the other northwest of Muleshoe. No damage was reported from either twister. Area schools were dismissed early due to the weather conditions.

Sudan had .40 rain, and four inches snow Thursday which fell in approximately two hours covering everything in a blanket of white.

Everyone was hoping that this was the Easter cold spell.

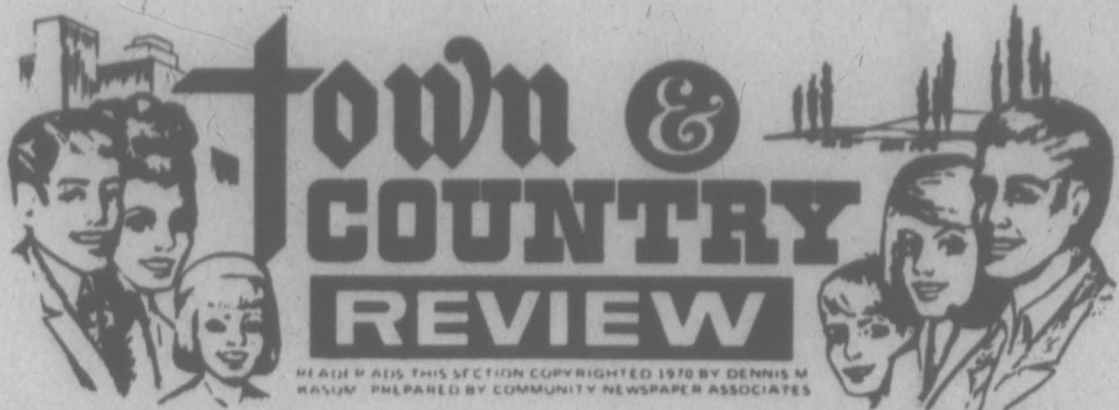

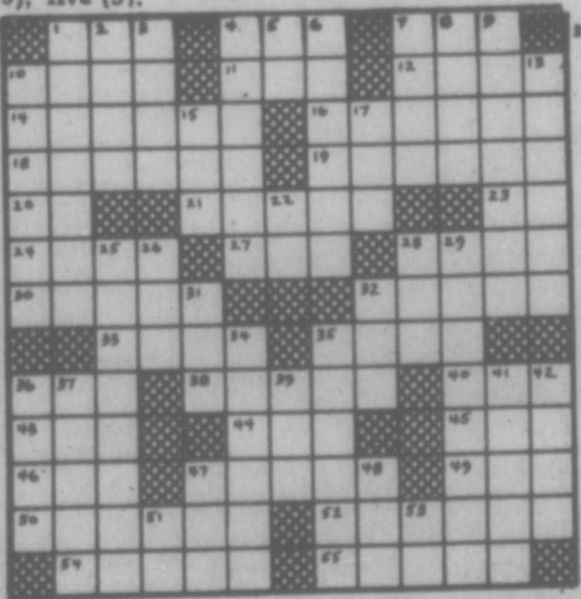

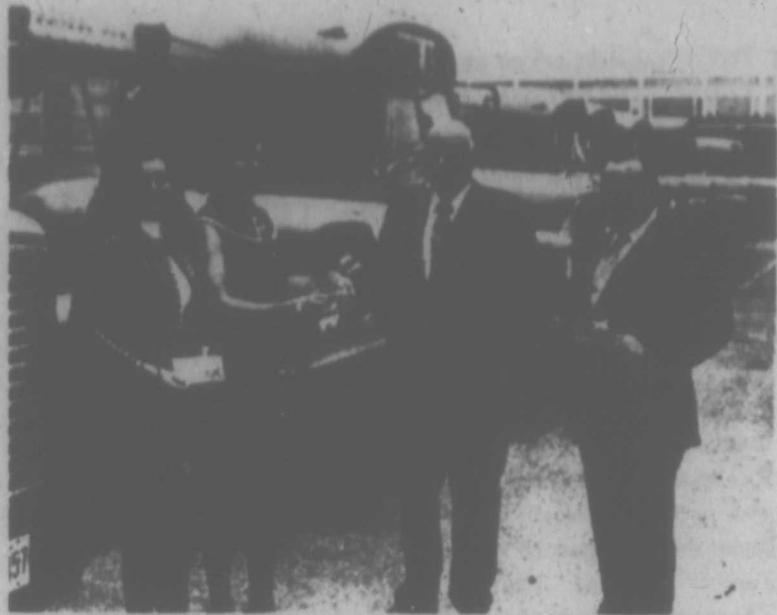
## RAILROADS-PROMOTE SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Austin, March 29--The Railroad Transportation Section of the Texas Safety Association and the Women's Transportation Club of Houston are working together to promote a campaign for the safer operation of school buses.

Representatives of the TSA Section and the Women's Transportation Club of Houston presented the Texas Education Agency with enough stickers for every school bus in Texas, at ceremonies in Austin. The stickers, which remind school bus drivers that it is Texas law to stop at all railroad crossings while carrying school children, were accepted by Richard M. Cummins, Director of School Transportation for the Texas Education Agency. TEA is handling distribution of the safety reminders to the school systems of Texas.

The stickers were produced by the Railroad Transportation Section of the Texas Safety Association. All the railroads operating in Texas are represented in the TSA group.

Perry F. Satterwhite, TSA Vice President for Industry, was on hand for the presentation. Satterwhite is superintendent of safety for the Southern Pacific and Cotton Belt Railroads. He stated that the stickers were a part of the railroads and railroad workers

to reduce the number of grade crossing accidents.

"The recent school bus tragedies have made us even more aware of the great loss we all suffer when a school bus is involved in an accident", Satterwhite said, "and it is our aim through this effort to significant-

ly reduce the number of accidents at grade crossing sites."

"We hope that these stickers will remind school bus drivers to come to a full stop at crossings and to look up and down the track before proceeding safely," Satterwhite added.

## Atheist Sues President

In her zeal to make the United States over in her own image, atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair has filed suit in federal court against President Richard Nixon, the treasurer of the United States, the Senate and House chaplains, and certain congressional officials.

She asserts in the suit that these people engage in practices that "interfere with the free exercise of religion on her part and... contribute to an establishment of religion."

It annoys Mrs. O'Hair that President Nixon has held non-denominational religious services in the White House—which is his home during his term of office.

It bothers her that our currency still bears the inscription, "In God We Trust."

It irks her that sessions of the Senate and the House are opened with prayer.

**Tail Wag Dog?**

So her suit is an attempt to force the elimination of these things which are contrary to her religion—atheism.

Not content with our willingness to allow her perfect freedom of religion—freedom even to hate the God whose existence she denies—Mrs. O'Hair insists that the tail must wag the dog. She insists that the free exercise of religion by the President and members of Congress must be stopped. She insists that we allow her to dictate when and where the

rest of us may pray and read the Bible.

This is freedom?

This is foolishness.

**Prayer in Space**

After her successful attack on prayer and Bible reading in the public schools, Mrs. O'Hair raised her sights and objected to prayers in space by our astronauts. In 1969 she filed suit seeking an injunction against the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and its administrators to prohibit them from "further directing or permitting religious activities or ceremonies and especially reading of the Bible, and from prayer recitation in space and in relation to all future space-flight activities."

She lost that case, both in the courts and in the public arena.

Supporting the right of astronauts to read the Bible and pray—if they wish to do so—during space flights, over 2.5 million people wrote letters or signed petitions addressed to NASA. Receiving these letters and petitions, Dr. Thomas O. Paine, NASA administrator, said, "We are profoundly moved by this spontaneous voice... We appreciate very much the message they have given us."

NASA got the message. But Mrs. O'Hair didn't.

She seems determined to do all in her power to eliminate God from our national life. She should be glad that God has not yet adopted that policy toward her.

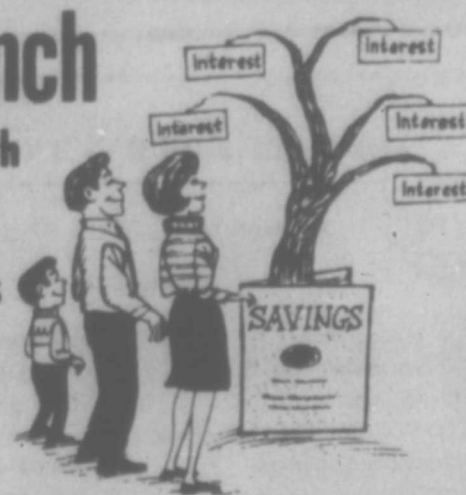

Which Way for Rural Texas? ... Cattle On Feed ... Citrus Production Increases ... Milk Production Declines.

Plans to improve job opportunities, community services, and the social and physical environment in rural Texas have been detailed by the Texas Rural Development Commission. The commission is a joint effort of the governor's office and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The five-point program to revitalize rural Texas as outlined by the commission is as follows:

1. Give people a choice of where they live by providing attractive employment opportunities, adequate community facilities and services (including health, housing, transportation, and public protection), and a more attractive living environment in rural areas which will create a better balance in the distribution of population.
2. Attract new industries and develop existing industries in rural areas.
3. Provide relevant educational opportunities for rural residents.
4. Provide for the orderly development and protection of the natural environment in rural areas.
5. Maintain a profitable agricultural industry as a major element of the rural economy.

The commission also recommended the establishment of a committee on rural development in each house of the Texas Legislature.

About 20 percent of the state's population now lives in rural Texas. This is more than 2,250,000 people. Texas' rural population is more than the combined populations of five states—Alaska, Delaware, Nevada, Vermont, and Wyoming.

The commission is composed of 25 civic leaders from throughout the state. It notes that 85 percent of the state's net growth between 1960 and 1970 occurred in the Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, and San Antonio areas.

The rapid growth in metropolitan areas and the decline in rural areas has created an imbalance in the distribution of population and the quality of life.

TEXAS, naturally, retains its leadership as the nation's top beef cattle feeding state. There are 2,184,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter in Texas as of March 1. This is 18 percent above a year ago, but one percent below a month ago.

Placements into Texas feedlots during February totaled 341,000 head, which is 13 percent above February of last year but four percent below marketings for January. Nationwide, in the seven major cattle feeding states—Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas—there were 9,698,000 head on feed, a four percent decrease from a month ago, but eight percent more than a year ago. Iowa is closing in on Texas; it has 2,018,000 head of cattle and calves on feed.

CITRUS production for 1972-73 in Texas is now estimated at 18,100,000 boxes, which is 3,100,000 boxes more than last season's crop. It is also an increase of 900,000 boxes from the February 1 estimate.

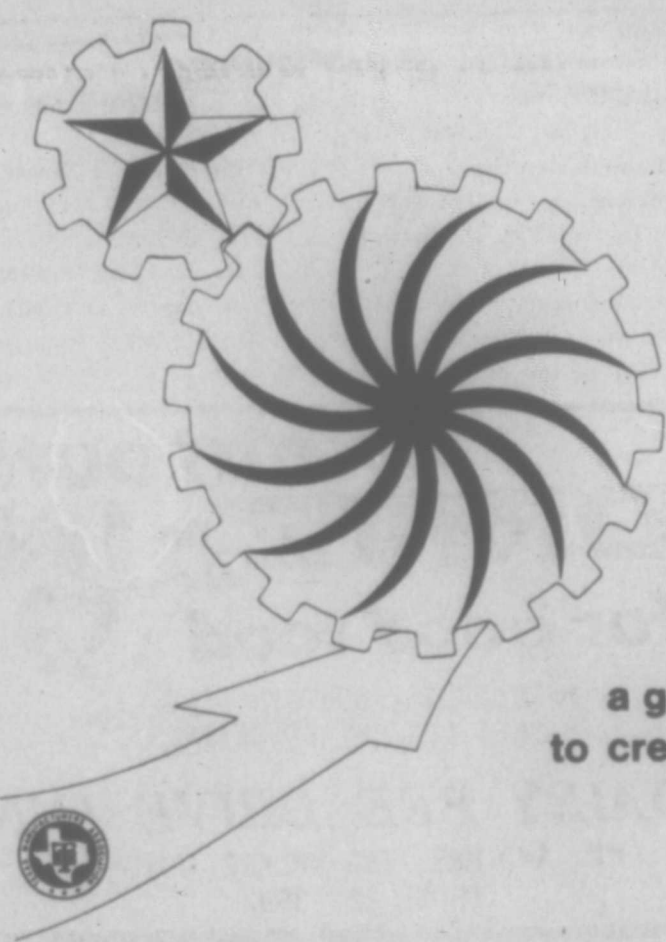
Harvest of the crop is expected to improve as weather conditions return to normal. Citrus trees are in excellent condition and fruit continues to size well with the rains.

MILK production in Texas during February was down five percent below 1972 and 10 percent below the previous month's production. Nationwide, milk production also showed a decline of four percent compared to a year ago.

Milk production per cow in Texas was 705 pounds which is 40 pounds below a year ago and 75 pounds under a month ago.

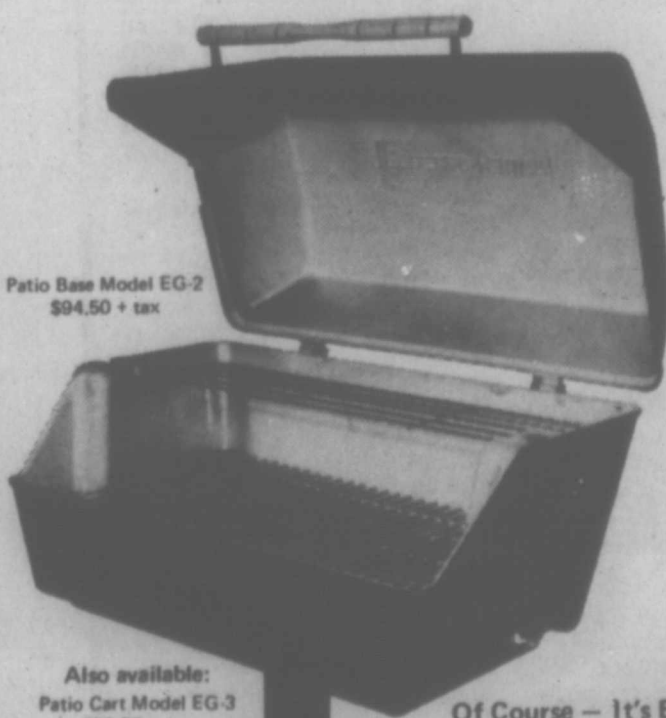

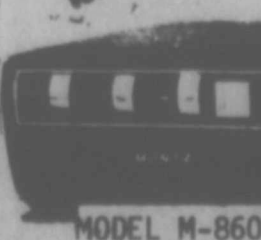

## The Master Gardener

### Study Proves Seed Can Be "DOA"

If your flower and garden seed did not "come on" last year, it could have been due to the fact that at least some of the seed was "DOA" — dead on arrival — or dead when planted.

That's the conclusion of researchers at one seed firm, who are quick to point out that the problem and related fatality rate is primarily limited to "especially sensitive" seeds. These include peppers, onions, lettuce and petunias. The problem is related to the containers used to display and merchandise garden seeds — namely, paper packets.

Dr. John Cross, who supervises research for Asgrow Mandeville, headquartered in Cambridge, New York, found evidence that the germination and vigor of certain sensitive seeds decline rapidly when stored in paper packets and exposed to a combination of high temperature and humidity.

While seeds stored in metal

containers maintained a relatively steady germination percentage at 90 degrees temperature, seed stored in paper packets at the same moisture content dropped drastically in germination after 2 months, and "died" (less than 5% germination) after 3 months.

As a result, Asgrow Mandeville will initiate a program of supplying particularly sensitive seeds in foil packets this season. Seeds properly conditioned and packaged in foil, the tests showed, are relatively immune to temperature and humidity changes.

The seeds selected for this special foil packaging include chrysanthemum, leek, lettuce, onion and pepper, plus these ornamentals: aster, ageratum, delphinium, petunia, snapdragon, larkspur and verbena. Asgrow Mandeville, a subsidiary of The Upjohn Company, and Sears, Roebuck will feature seeds in foil packaging for the 1973 season.

## What's Waiting at the End?

50,000 Americans died in the Viet Nam war. 50,000,000 human beings died in World War II.

For what end? The Second World War did not end all wars. The Viet Nam war has not established a generation of peace in Indochina.

And what if they had? What difference would that make? In 100 years the people our armies fought to protect will all be dead. Then what will these sacrifices mean?

Certainly I am glad the American revolutionaries died so that I could enjoy the freedoms of democracy 200 years later, and I hope my son can appreciate them for another 50 years after I am dead, and his son after him, and his son, and his.

But still, in the final end, what difference will it have made? Surely the world was not created to give me 70 years of freedom or even 70 generations of it.

### What Is The End?

If death were the final end of life all self-sacrifice would be meaningless. Not that it wouldn't always be best to live unselfishly, but the one surrendering his life would not be giving up anything of lasting value, and the one receiving the sacrifice would not be preserving anything of ultimate worth. After death there would be no distinction between rescuer and victim, between escaper and martyr. And not only 50,000,000 but the three billion and more human beings now alive and the billions who preceded us would all have lived for nothing.

It not only could have been true, it would have been if it hadn't been for Jesus. The sacrificial death of Jesus Christ changed everything.

### How Is It Changed?

Jesus changed everything by His example. Just as He suffered for you, He expects you to follow in His steps, to live unselfishly. If everyone patterned his life after Jesus' there would be no need for war.

Yet even Jesus' example isn't enough, is it? With or without wars we will all die just the same.

But Jesus changed that, too. Jesus not only showed us how to live, He gave us life itself. His voluntary death as a punishment for our sins freed us from slavery to passions and habits and fears which alone we could not overcome. His resurrection demonstrated that life continues beyond death and that how we live influences how we will live.

We will all still die, but it doesn't need to be the same at all. If we sacrifice to help another human being, it may be to his eternal advantage. If we give up our lives to enable another person to save his, we may be rescuing not only a body but a soul.

Then again, we may not. Jesus does not force His life on anyone. He offers it. And anyone who chooses may refuse.

However you choose, you should know that it is the unique life of Jesus that makes your choice meaningful.

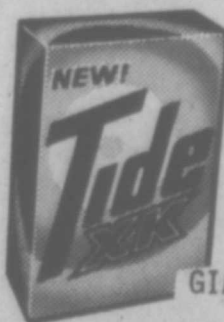

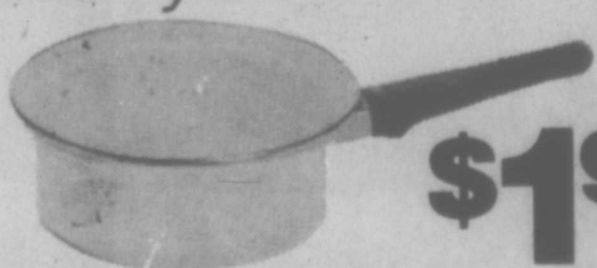
