TALCO TROJANS WRAP UP 14-A GRID TITLE WITH 20-14 WIN

The Talco Trojans won the District 14-A title last Friday night in true championship fashion, coming from behind in the second half to defeat the James Bowie Pirates 20 to 14. At halftime the score was 14 to 6, James Bowie leading.

The Trojans, however, were by no means of that frame of mind, and living up to the old maxim that "A True Trojan Never Quits," they came back to stage a magnificent performance that the Pirates couldn't overcome. And who were the standouts of this stirring game? Take your pick: Larry Horton, Darrell Morris, Daniel Johnson, Jerry Simmons, Jerry Hood, Richard Rothwell, Ney Blackburn, Donnie Eberts, Wayne Blackburn, Bud Hanks, Bobby Broughton, Charles Lewis, Jimmy Williams, Jerry Russell, Jerry Daugherty. Any one of them was a hero, for it was a team effort like as hasn't been seen on the Trojan gridiron for many seasons. Every man did his job to perfection both on offense and on defense. The offense could seemingly do no wrong, opening holes against a seven man line with amazing consistency; and the defense was even more rugged, holding the Pirates to a net of 18 yards rushing in the second half.

The first half was an entirely different story though, for the Pirates were almost unstoppable. Halfbacks Choyce Bostain and Donnie Reed made big gains thru the line and around the ends easily, and when Trojan tacklers hit them they couldn't hold on long enough to bring them down.

The first time James Bowie got the ball they drove 75 yards for the score and used up over half the first quarter. Reed ground out most of the yardage but the score was made by Bostain on a quick opener over left guard from 11 yards out. Reed plunged over the two for the extra point. The Trojans came right back though on a drive of their own which carried 64 yards to pull within one point. In the second period Bobby Broughton plunged over left tackle for the score from the one foot line, making the score 7 to 6.

After the kickoff the Pirates drove 58 yards to the Talco 7 yard line before giving the ball up on downs and after Williams picked up 7 yards to the 14, Lewis fumbled and the Pirates recovered. They took advantage of the error and drove for the score in three plays. Reed ran over right tackle for the touchdown,

then added the extra point for a 14 to 6 halftime lead.

To make matters seem worse Talco fumbled on the first play after the kickoff on its own 37 but the Pirates could only advance to the 12 yard line. The Trojans promptly marched 88 yards in five plays for their second score. Williams got three off tackle, then Bobby Broughton sliced through left tackle and raced 55 yards to the 29 yard line for the longest run of the night. Charles Lewis netted 7 yards around left end and Jimmy Williams scored from the 22 after taking a pitchout from Hanks. Hanks then went around end for the PAT. That reduced the score to 14 to 13 and things were beginning to look brighter.

Following the kickoff which was returned to the Pirate 43, Talco threw the Pirates back 25 yards in three downs. From there they punted out to the 40 yard line from where Talco began its final scoring march. Jimmy Williams plunged over left tackle for the score and Bud Hanks again made the extra point around right end. After that the Pirates could never sustain a drive and time ran out without ever getting beyond their own 30 yard line.

Another outstanding point of the game was the fact that James Bowie did not fumble the ball once in the entire game while Talco fumbled two times, one costing them a touchdown and the other almost costing one.

Thursday the Trojans played their bi-district game at Commerce with the Van Alstyne Panthers, a team that won nine games while losing only one for the season and weren't even pressed in their district games.

The season will continue thru Jan. 17. Increased numbers of ducks prompted federal authorities to allow a 75-day duck season while the goose season remained at the usual 60 days.

There are substantial goose concentrations in scattered state areas, it was reported.

Amateur Beekeeper Stung to Death

Louisville, Ky. — Walter C. Crenshaw, an amateur beekeeper most of his life, has been stung to death.

The 47-year-old service station operator was stung three or four dozen times and died in less than 10 minutes.

Crenshaw and his brother-in-law, Max Crenshaw, 26, were transferring a swarm from one hive to another when the insects attacked.

Cool Wave Brings Light Shower

Only .25 inch of rain accompanied the cool wave as it moved in this territory Tuesday night. The cool front dropped the mercury from the record high of 82 degrees to 62. Unseasonable highs have been recorded the past few days.

Little rain has fallen during the month and a general soaker is needed on cover crops, winter pastures and cover crop seed that have been dusted in.

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Two New Wildcat Oil Tests to Drill In This Area

Drilling intent has been given by D. W. Shelton, Denton, for No. 1 Oscar Westbrook, a 2,800-foot Travis Peak test about two miles northwest of Deport. Drillsite was given as 330 from the north and 1,232 from the east lines of a 155-acre lease in the W. S. Rogers survey.

A shallow 1,200-foot Paluxy sand venture is proposed by Raymond Rhodes, Idabel, Ok., 10 miles north of Clarksburg. Permit requests shows operation to be No. 1 Burnis L. Watson, 450 from the east and 380 from the north lines of a 100-acre tract in the John Ware survey.

Attention in this county has been turned to I&L Development Company No. 1 E. E. Morris, Jno. Guest survey, four miles southwest of Bagwell. Scouts who have visited the well say it has made some flows of oil and water from an unreported section in the Paluxy. The water is believed fresh. This would be characteristic of other wells drilled in this area.

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OIL DISCOVERY REPORTED FOUR MILES NORTHEAST FULBRIGHT

Oil fever is at a new high in the western part of Red River County with reports of the discovery of oil in the Paluxy sand in the wildcat well in the Catonville area.

The well, drilled by the Sher-Tex Drilling Co., contractors, for the I. & L. Development Company, Dallas, is the E. E. Morris No. 1, 330 feet from the south end east lines of a 174-acre lease in the John Guest survey.

It is located about four miles northeast of Fulbright and four miles southwest of Bagwell. Flow on the first check was estimated at 300 to 500 barrels daily. Leasing activity skyrocketed as news of the completion spread in this area. Prices jumped from exactly nothing to \$25 and \$100 an acre. Some 10,000 acres have already been blocked for the Dallas wildcat firm, according to C. W. Whitehead, who represented the company in lease transactions. Five and 10-year leases are carrying one-16th and one-32nd overriding royalties.

Plans were complete to skid the rig eastward 660 feet for a second well. It is reported work has already begun on a second well.

The discovery well went 2,051 feet to the Paluxy sand. Drillers said they encountered very little trouble wrapping up operations in two weeks.

Morris, who lives in Corpus Christi, owns the old Caton farm of 749 acres. The discovery well is the second drilled. Earlier, a test to 3,180 feet was made 660 feet south of the No. 1. The well

shut down temporarily after a water showing, is reported being reworked.

J. L. Benningfield, Bagwell, who handled local leasing of the initial 5,500 acre block for Whitehead, said the first well also showed oil. Benningfield explained part of the block was lease free and some was obtained at \$1 an acre. Outside leasing carried \$25 and \$100 price tags the first of the week and drilling operations drew a steady stream of sightseers. It was the first real showing in the area.

Gravity tests on Red River County's promising, new wildcat showed 33.2 with no water, Drilling Superintendent Dick Scott revealed late Wednesday.

The tests were run by American Liberty Oil Company of Mt. Pleasant.

A second well on the same lease, the I. & L. Development Company Tract No. 2 well No. 1-A E. E. Morris, was spudded in Wednesday 660 feet to the east of the discovery well.

Two more test wells have been planned, and several more are due as soon as arrangements can be completed. One of the tests is being planned by John B. Stevens northeast of the I. & L. Development Company lease. The second is being planned by Dick Scott for a West Texas friend he did not identify, and will be located southwest of the I. & L. lease.

The Stevens test will be a two-mile step-out northeast of the No. 1 E. E. Morris and the other test is one-half mile southwest.

Veteran Lawman Says Discipline Begins at Home

Waco.—Dallas County Sheriff Bill Decker declares that the child that is taught early to obey the rules of an orderly family will grow up to respect the laws of society.

Decker told the Waco Junior Chamber of Commerce that "re-
spect for the law begins in the home, not just respect for officers, but appreciation of the fact that society has rules that should and must be obeyed."

The father has a key role in this vital job of instilling healthy discipline in youngsters, to prevent them from ever becoming "juvenile delinquents," said Decker.

"When something goes wrong, the child usually turns to mama for sympathy, and usually gets it," Decker said. "That's all right, but it means that dad is usually the one who must lay down the law. How well he does that affects the whole future of his child. That's their first encounter with the law."

Childish lying, stealing, destruction, assaults on others and indecent exposures are the seeds of adult crimes, the veteran lawman added.

EFFICIENT FARMING DECLARED MORE VITAL THAN A-BOMBS

Houston.—A Louisiana educator said Thursday efficient farming is more important to the country than atomic weapons.

Dr. Norman J. Efferson, director of the Louisiana State University experiment station, spoke at the eighth annual industrial health conference, sponsored by the public health committee of the Houston Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Lemuel C. McGee, director of the Hercules Power Company's medical department, said modern insecticides have saved cotton farmers alone 750 million dollars a year.

Efferson predicted that countries and economic systems which produce food and clothing cheaply and in large amounts will prevail over those who do not. Increased living standards and stockpiles of food and materials may offset the danger of war, he believes.

Discussing the country's farm surpluses, he said:

"They are a temporary thing and should not mislead Americans from the central fact that expansion in farm production is essential for continued progress."

Seven years hence, he said, the United States will need 3,500,000 more cattle, 2,500,000 more sheep and 9,000,000 more pigs to meet demands for food. The added livestock, he said, will require a crop-producing area the size of Texas.

The country's population, Efferson said, is increasing by 2,000,000 a year.

Discussing farm use of chemicals, McGee said that a few years ago over a million dollars worth of cotton was lost every season to boll weevils and other pests. New insecticides have reduced the loss to less than a quarter of the old figure.

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie
 3 beaten egg yolks
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin
 1/2 cup milk
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 envelope Knox gelatin
 1/2 cup cold water
 3 stiffly beaten egg whites
 1/4 cup granulated sugar

Combine egg yolks, brown sugar, pumpkin, milk, salt and spice. Cook in double boiler until thick, stirring constantly. Soak gelatin in cold water, stir into hot mixture. Chill until partly set. Beat egg whites, add granulated sugar, and beat stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into baked pie shell and chill until set. Garnish with whipped cream.
 Makes one big pie or 8 individual pies.

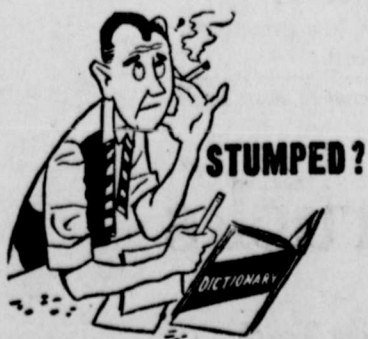

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

By VERN SANFORD, Texas Press Association

Austin. — After three exiled years, Texas again has an official, accredited Democratic national committeeman.

Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey's acceptance by the national committee gave Texas full representation for the first time since September, 1952. Wright Morrow was refused recognition because he supported Republican Dwight Eisenhower.

Official groups of both conservative and liberal Texas Democrats supported Ramsey. Only scattered protests were heard, one by the president of the liberal faction of the Texas Young Democratic Clubs.

SHIVERS OKAYS DEMO RULES—Gov. Allan Shivers says he is willing to play by the rules adopted for the 1956 Democratic national convention. He said at a news conference that he expects to be challenged, nevertheless, by a "bunch of wild-eyed pinks."

Rules set for 1956 were viewed by Shivers as being the same as in 1952. Then they required heads of delegations to work for placing the party nominees' names on the state ballot under the proper column.

Shivers said he is not surprised to hear that some old political enemies, like Stephen Mitchell, Adlai Stevenson's aide, think he should not be allowed a 1956 seat. He held firm that he would not take any pledge to support the party nominee. "I will give no pledge to support a nominee until I know who he is," Shivers said. He said he considers himself a "bona fide democrat" and feels it is no crime for a Democrat to vote for a Republican friend. "I consider President Eisenhower a friend of mine," the governor said. His statement was widely interpreted as indicating he might support Eisenhower again if he is a candidate.

UT TESTS SLATED—High school seniors with a University of Texas career in mind will find a good vocabulary, logical mind and number sense helpful in taking the scheduled aptitude tests. Tests may be taken in 42 Texas cities on these dates—Feb. 4, May 12 and Aug. 10. Dr. H. T. Manuel, director of the University Testing and Guidance Bureau, said that, as a general rule, a student can be confident of his ability to succeed with university work if he is in the upper three-fifths of his high school class and makes a score of 75 or more on the aptitude test. Most of those applying for entrance would be admitted, he said.

The tests are designed to measure two very general abilities in academic work. First is the ability to work with words and to understand their meanings. Second is the ability to work with numbers and to solve problems. Scores on the required tests will not be the only basis for admission, Dr. Manuel added. All test scores will be kept confidential.

GILES APPEALS PENDING—

Former Land Commr. Bascom Giles can count on at least 2½ months more of freedom. Both Giles' convictions in land scandal trials have been appealed to the Court of Criminal Appeals. Formal submission of the Austin conviction and three-year prison sentence is set for Jan. 18. A six-year sentence imposed in San Antonio was appealed and is expected to come before the court about Jan. 25 or Feb. 1.

HISTORICAL COMMITTEES ORGANIZING—Every county in Texas is being asked by the State Historical Survey Committee, to set up a County Committee, announced HSC director George W. Hill of Austin. The state committee was authorized by the 1953 Legislature to "study the subject of preservation and dissemination of the records of Texas and Texans." County judges, with other officials, have been asked to appoint committees for their counties.

If You Should Suddenly Wake Up And Smell Smoke - Know What to Do?

San Antonio.—If you suddenly wake up and smell smoke, do you know what to do until the firemen come? Few people do, Southwest Research Center fire technologists have discovered. And knowing what to do—and what not to do—might save your life.

"Put your hand on the bedroom door," advises Calvin Yuill, director of fire technology at Southwest Research Center, who has prepared a "check list" of what to do in case of home fires. "If the door is warm, don't open it. The draft might fan the blaze, or hot gases and smoke could overcome you. Get out a window as soon as possible. Jump if you have to. A few broken bones are better than being burned to death."

How, if you must go out the door, Yuill advises you to wrap a wet blanket or towel around your head and crawl across the floor.

Heat rises and it is coolest near the floor. The wet towel will also absorb some of the gases.

Yuill has a word of advice for home fire fighters trying to put out a small blaze:

"Call the fire department first. Then try to put it out. Don't wait to see if you can handle it. It may spread badly before the firemen can get there."

If a frying pan of grease catches fire, don't throw water on it, said Yuill. Grab a cover that fits and smother the flame or throw baking soda on it. Baking soda is a good homemade fire extinguisher and is used in many commercial extinguishers.

If a curtain catches fire—pull it down and stomp on it or douse it with water. Curtains will not burn easily if you rinse them in a boric acid solution when you wash them. You make it by using nine ounces of Borax and four ounces of Boric Acid to a gallon of water.

"Fire prevention is the major part of cure," Yuill said. "Every home should have a good garden hose permanently connected, preferably to an inside water supply, and periodic home fire drills."

Don't leave a rug over a floor furnace. It holds the heat in so that it builds up.

Don't put pennies or tin foil fuses or use 30 amp fuses in place of 15 or 20 amp fuses. You are throwing out the protection you had and are liable to cause a fire.

Frayed lamp and appliance cords are dangerous. Replace them.

Never have a fire in the fireplace without a screen in front of it. Don't use flammable cleaning fluids. They can cause a flash fire.

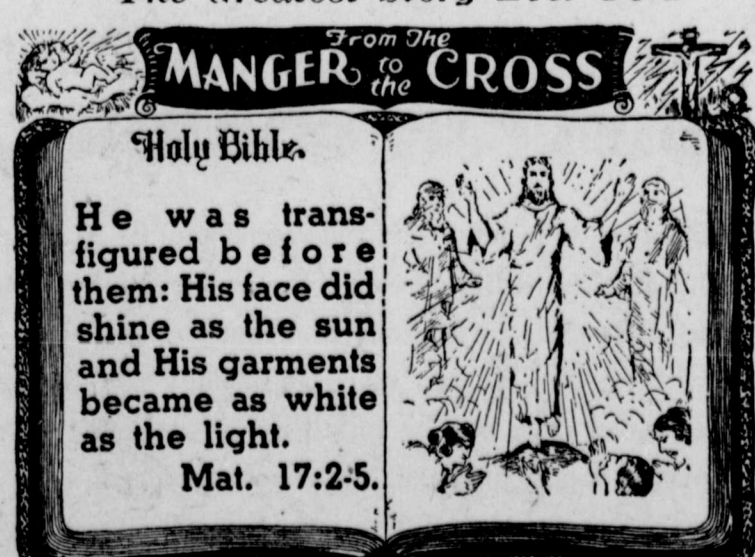

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Alcorn Says Ike Entitled Few Months To Decide, Takes Congress Years

Editors' note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, discusses politics this week, without making much headway.

Dear Editor: It's not my job to advise the politicians, the way I see it, there's too much advice in the world already, especially farm advice, but it seems to me the politicians are starting in so early on the next election which won't happen till a year from now that by the time voting day rolls around everybody will be tired of the subject.

In fact, if farmers started working on next year's crops as early as politicians do on next year's election, no telling how big the surplus would be.

I sort of like the way President Eisenhower is handling the situation. He doesn't even discuss the matter.

I know there are a lot of people who wish he would say what he plans to do about running again, some Republicans want him to say so they get in the race if he doesn't others don't want him to say anything unless he can say yes, and some Democrats

want him to stay quiet so it's confuse the other Republican candidates, other Democrats want him to say something, providing it's no.

Personally, I prefer silence, for this reason. The other day I read an article about a big industrialist who said his plans for expanding his business were being held up until he found out what President Eisenhower is going to do, and that's the policy I use out here on my Johnson grass farm.

There are a few preparations I could be making now toward next year's farming activities, but I hesitate to do anything until I find out what the President is gonna do.

This is a sound policy, provided you don't carry it too far. For example, it wouldn't be a good idea to hold up all your efforts until you find out what Congress is gonna do. I tried this once and it was three years before I found out and even then I wasn't sure.

People ought to be content to let the President take six months or so to make up his mind, when it takes Congress years.

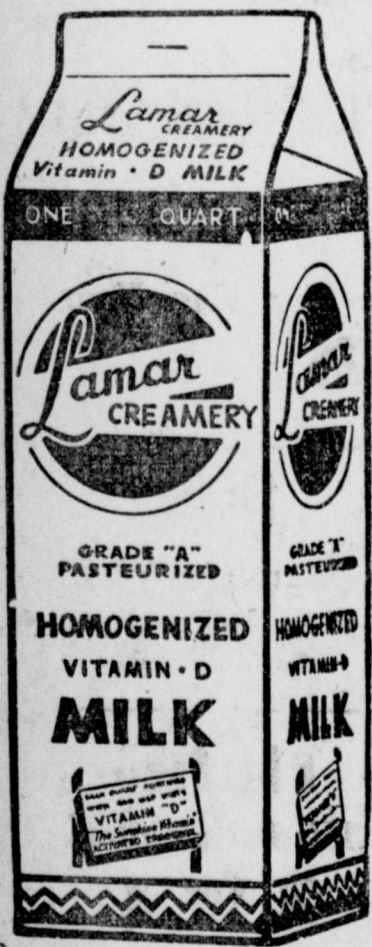
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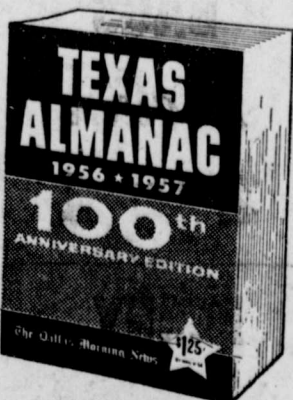


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
