Suicide threat ends in assault on police

Two Big Spring police officers were assaulted by a man who reportedly threatened to commit suicide.

Officer Robert Morales and Sgt. Roger Sweatt went to the 1500 block of Kentucky Way in reference to a suicidal male who may have been armed with a pellet gun.

Morales made contact with Mark Lynn Davis, 22, who the officer suspected was intoxicated and could be a danger to himself or others.

Public Information Officer Sgt. Victor Brake explained, "Morales placed him under arrest, handcuffed him and placed him against the car to pat him down for weapons. Morales felt a metal object and reached into the pocket, found a home-made smoking pipe and a small bag of marijuana."

"At this point, Davis knocked Morales to the ground and ran away. Sweatt was the second officer on the scene and jumped into the path of Davis as he was running. Sweatt grabbed the subject and attempted to arrest him."

Davis then pushed Sweatt to the ground knocking the sergeant unconscious. By this time, Morales was able to catch up to Davis and attempted to arrest him again. Davis reportedly then resisted arrest and pushed Morales to the ground. The officer received a puncture wound to the leg.

Davis was finally arrested, transported to the city jail and charged with two counts of aggravated assault on a peace officer, resisting arrest, escape and possession of marijuana.

Morales and Sweatt were taken to the emergency room by fellow officers, where they were both treated and released.

Judge dismisses lawsuit against county

A lawsuit filed against Howard County by a former sheriff's deputy has been dismissed in federal court.

The lawsuit was filed May 10 by attorney Cindy Weir-Ervin on behalf of her client Kenneth Wheeler.

Wheeler claimed he had been wrongfully terminated from the Howard County Sheriff's Department in October 1994 by Sheriff A.N. Standard.

Judge Sam R. Cummings, Abilene, dismissed the case July 27 by request of the attorneys representing the county.

In dismissing the case, Judge Cummings cited previous precedent set by the United States Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court for the "proposition that sheriff's deputies in Texas are at-will employees serving at the pleasure of the sheriff with no cognizable property interest in their employment."

Cummings also stated that, contrary to Wheeler's claims, sheriff's department regulations "prohibiting off-duty employee cohabitation does not implicate the Fourth Amendment."

"Howard County and the sheriff's department had not violated any constitutionally protected freedom of speech or association interest held by Wheeler, determining that under the facts of this case Wheeler had no such constitutionally protected interests," the judge stated.

County officials issued a statement about the dismissal and said they are extremely pleased with the outcome.

"Howard County is pleased that the first pronouncement from the courts in the Wheeler case is a clear and unequivocal ruling that Wheeler does not have a viable claim against the county."

"The county remains confident the remaining litigation against Howard County will also be resolved in the county's favor," the release stated.

County officials would not comment any further on the case.

The other litigation officials are referring to is a lawsuit filed by Ervin for former deputy Robert Stapp. He claims he was also wrongfully fired by the sheriff.

An attempt was made to contact Ervin for comment but she did not immediately return the phone call.

Doctor concerned about school lunch quality

Dr. Bruce Cox addressed the Big Spring Independent School District board of trustees last Thursday to express his concern about the quality of lunches being served.

He stated he was upset the board had increased the prices of lunches but not the quality of food. Cox says he has eaten once in the cafeteria but did not state when.

The lunch prices were

increased slightly because the food service department is self-sufficient and relies on money from lunches and federal government commodities. They receive no money from the district.

The department had to pay \$20,000 during the last school year to replace equipment in several cafeterias.

Cox commented, "The students need the right nutrition to perform. If you feed them better they will perform better. You need to serve fresh fruits so the kids won't have a sugar crash in

the afternoon.

"The parents also need to be involved. Perhaps the kids could grow gardens and get in the kitchen themselves to help prepare food."

Food Services Director Joann Knox says her department's hands are tied because they are involved in the National School Lunch Program.

More than 50 percent of the students qualify for free meals so the government sends commodities and because of this, they must follow their guidelines.

Knox explained, "Since I have been here, we have drastically reduced the amount of fat and sugar in our menus. Dr. Cox has some good ideas but we don't have the money."

"We hardly serve any desserts anymore and we give the students fresh fruit for dessert instead. We have a salad bar at the high school. The meats we receive from the government are low in fat, too."

She adds she does not serve as much fried food in the cafeteria as in years past.

She agrees parents need to be

involved because many students eat in the snack bar instead of the lunch line.

This is because the parents give their child more money than the cost for a regular lunch.

Knox continued by saying she cannot make any drastic changes in the menus unless the government changes their guidelines.

She would also be open to having Cox assist her in finding ways to serve more nutritious lunches.

Cancer claims Mantle

DALLAS (AP) — All sorts of memories and warm feelings came out following Mickey Mantle's death early Sunday from liver cancer. Even at age 63, he had remained one of the nation's most endearing, albeit somewhat tarnished, heroes.

He became an idol to a generation of kids, a pal to his teammates and an inspiration to anyone who saw him go all out despite bad knees and arthritis.

Later, the dark side came out. He became addicted to alcohol, a habit that began as a way to deal with his father's death then became a way to help him loosen up in comfortable situations.

And his association with gambling got him kicked out of baseball for two years.

But Mantle realized his flaws and reinvented his image.

He let everyone know he was an alcoholic and he told others to sober up. A month before he died he urged children: "Don't be like me."

For all the talk about how much that carousing led to Mantle's demise, his doctors said that he didn't wreck his body all that much.

A June 8 liver transplant was done to extend his life by years, but it only added weeks. Doctors already had just finished putting in the new organ when they found some cancer still near the bile duct.

Tests two days later showed those cells were hepatomas, the fastest-spreading kind.

Fears were confirmed July 13 when cancer was discovered in Mantle's right lung.

All hope was lost Aug. 7 when a CT scan showed cancer in practically all vital organs, including the new liver, said Dr. Daniel DeMarco, Mantle's gastroenterologist.

"All of us on the team, in our combined experience, we have never seen a tumor as aggressive," said Goran Klintmalm, head of Baylor's transplant unit.

Fuqua proposes college fund program

City Manager Gary Fuqua recently requested and received a consensus from the Big Spring City Council to implement a program introduced more than a year ago - a tuition reimbursement program for city employees.

In August 1994, the proposal was introduced to the council as a college degree incentive and reimbursement plan.

At the council's last meeting, Fuqua asked council members to reconsider the tuition reimbursement portion of the program.

Fuqua's proposal to finance the program includes the establishment of a college fund to be supported by the funds derived from the sale of scrap metal, which is separated from the waste at our landfill.

He said, "This is material that was historically buried at our facility, taking up valuable space, and creating an additional waste volume that we were paying disposal fees to the state on."

He added employees would be eligible to participate in the College Reimbursement Fund program upon successful completion of a college course.

To participate in the program, employees would have to meet the following criteria:

- Establish a degree plan to be approved by the city manager.
- Select pre-approved classes

and pay the necessary tuition.

Upon completion of a course, a report card is turned in to the personnel department at a rate scale of 100 percent reimbursement for an "A," 85 percent for a "B," and 75 percent for a "C."

Prior to reimbursement for a semester, the participating employee will sign a document stating they agree to continue working for the city of Big Spring for one calendar year from the date of the last reimbursement, or they agree to pay back the college fund in full.

Fuqua said no general funds would be used to fund this program. "The only funds available for the program will be the through the sale of our scrap metal and will be assigned on a first-come basis."

City crews prepare to sealcoat streets

City crews are now in the process of sealcoating several miles of Big Spring streets.

Inmates from the 80 John Wallace Unit of the Colorado City prison worked with city crews to prepare several streets for the sealcoating process.

Assistant City Manager and Streets Director Emma Bogard said the sealcoating began this morning in the Kentwood area.

"We have not set the number of miles we want to sealcoat, but the program will be in place for 60 days," she said.

Howard County has agreed to allow the city use of its equipment for the next 60 days while

sealcoating city streets.

Bogard added, "We would like to point out this is a city/county operation. Without the county's help, we couldn't do this."

Fuqua previously said the city would like to exceed the 30 miles of streets sealcoated last year. He added, "We are working very well with the county on this project."

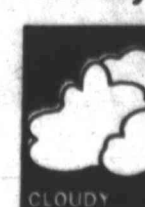

When told of his doomed fate, Mantle smiled, thanked DeMarco and said he didn't want to know how long he had.

Mantle's final days included visits from former teammates and family from around the country, an autographed ball sent from the Yankees and painkillers to keep him comfortable.

Former teammate Bobby Richardson, now a pastor in South Carolina, spent time alone with Mantle discussing death. The talks seemed consoling.

"I think Mickey was ready to go," DeMarco said. "At one point he said, 'What are we waiting for?' That was just a day or so ago."

Mantle was in and out of consciousness over his final 48 hours. He awoke for the last time around 12:30 a.m. CDT, held the hands of his wife, Merlyn, and son, David, then lapsed back to sleep. He died at 1:10 a.m. CDT.

"I'm so sorry he had to suffer as he did," said Phil Rizzuto, a former teammate and Yankees broadcaster. "He'll be loved for so many things. We all love him so much."

"I hate to talk about him in the past tense. Mickey always played hard and never complained. That's the way he was to the very end, never complaining and telling jokes. He kept telling his fans, 'I'm not giving up.' That was so typical of him."

Richardson may officiate Mantle's funeral Tuesday at

Lovers Lane United Methodist Church, an event sure to be attended by many former teammates.

There will be stories about his 536 home runs and arguments over which was the longest, the two that almost went out of Yankee Stadium or the one that was measure at 565 feet.

Someone will bring up the 12 World Series, especially the catch he made to save Don Larsen's perfect game in 1956. And who could forget that he won the Triple Crown and the first of three Most Valuable Player awards that year?

There's also the four American League home run titles, the 1961 chase with Roger Maris for Babe Ruth's home run and, to top it all off, the 1974 induction into the Hall of Fame.

"There were things Mickey could do that no one else could do," recalled longtime Yankees broadcaster Mel Allen. "He was the greatest, most powerful switch-hitter who ever lived."

The remembering began almost immediately Sunday, with the most dramatic display coming at Yankee Stadium.

Flags were at half-staff and a moment of silence was followed by a two-minute standing ovation. Highlights from Mantle's career were played on the scoreboard. All the Yankees wore black arm bands and some had No. 7 on their caps.

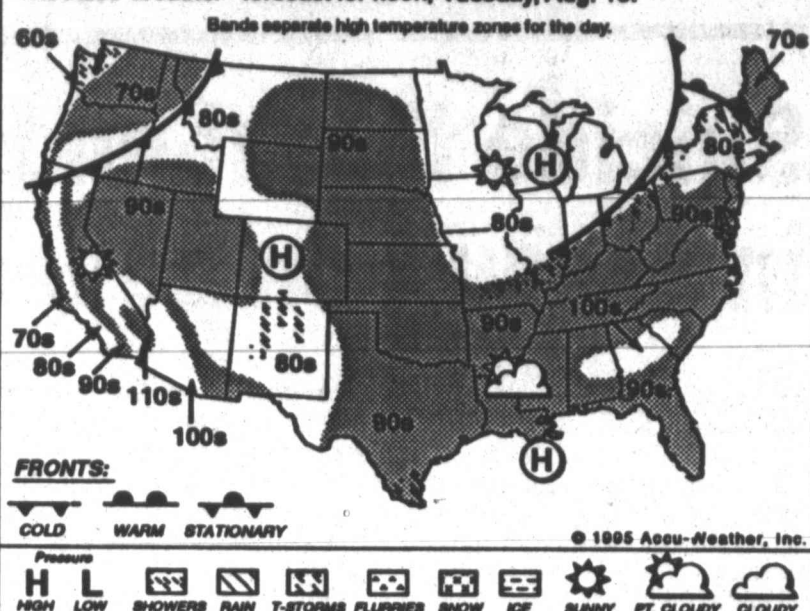

No Lotto jackpot winner Sunday

AUSTIN (AP) — No one correctly matched all six numbers in Saturday's Lotto Texas drawing, meaning the jackpot for Wednesday night's game will be \$40 million, state lottery officials said.

The jackpot had been worth \$28 million.

The numbers drawn from a field of 50 were: 25, 31, 34, 35, 37, and 47.

There were 170 tickets sold with five of the six numbers, with each ticket worth \$2,185. There were 9,697 tickets with four of six numbers, with each paying \$139. And there were 203,514 tickets sold with three of six numbers, with each worth an automatic \$3.

Dallas Morning News publisher's widow dies

DALLAS (AP) — Trudie Lewellen Dealey, the widow of a former publisher of The Dallas Morning News, died Sunday morning of leukemia.

Dealey, 91, was born in Mount Pleasant, Texas where she married E.M. "Ted" Dealey in 1951. She met Mr. Dealey while working at Neiman Marcus in Dallas.

The couple's Welsh terriers won high honors at the 1952 Westminster Kennel Club Show in New York City's Madison Square Garden.

The couple is also remembered for aiding in the creation of the Dallas Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Mr. Dealey died in 1969 of a heart attack.

Mrs. Dealey is survived by four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Woman slain while jogging near home

COPPELL (AP) — A woman was stabbed to death while on an early-morning jog only a few blocks from her home in this Dallas suburb, police say.

The body of Catherine Casler, 38, a nurse, was found Sunday morning in a vacant lot by a man who was mowing a nearby lawn. The woman had left her home between 7:30 and 8 a.m. to jog in the Northlake Woodlands subdivision where she frequently jogged.

Police say they have few leads. They don't think the victim was abducted or raped.

"We are trying to locate some witnesses who saw something out there," said Detective Bruce Crowell. "Somebody might have seen something not realized they were seeing a crime being committed."

Perot meeting worth attending, says San Antonio couple

DALLAS (AP) — She did it for her children and grandchildren. San Antonian Louise Lowes and her husband of 50 years, George, spent a long weekend at United We Stand America's national convention — she crowned the whole time with a red straw hat bearing small U.S. and Texas flags that just about matched her neat red nails.

The conference has been tiring, but worth it, she said.

"We're fighting this fight at our age because somebody's got to," said Mrs. Lowes, 70. "Not that many people are active, and we've got to take back our government."

"It's for you young people that we're working — for you."

The retired couple stayed with son Allen, the youngest of their four children, who lives in Arlington. They also have 10 grandchildren.

Mrs. Lowes can't remember a time when she wasn't politically involved. But her activism began in earnest when she worked for George Wallace's American Party in the late 1960s.

The Loweses have kept it up since then, primarily supporting Republican candidates.

Lowes, 72, was a delegate to the state GOP convention in Fort Worth two years ago.

The couple can barely remember how they became Ross Perot supporters. When Perot decided to run for president in 1992, his ideas just seemed to click, and he got two votes from the Lowes household.

"It was automatic. We liked what he stood for," Mrs. Lowes said. "We were so disgusted with the way things were happening, it was like a breath of fresh air. Here was somebody speaking out."

"I felt our whole being is being sapped away by apathy and inaction," her husband said.

The Loweses are divided on whether they would support Perot again, saying he probably is in a more favorable position as an outsider. So far, they are attracted to Pat Buchanan and U.S. Rep. Bob Dornan, R-Calif., as presidential candidates but think it's too soon to tell.

"If we could make up more time getting our congressmen to enact the laws that we want, I think that would probably be better," Mrs. Lowes said.

Topics of key concern to the couple include moral issues, fighting crime, improving education, shrinking the government and doing away with unfunded mandates.

Brothers arrested in killing

BEDFORD (AP) — A man who made a desperate 911 call to report the murder of a night clerk who was shot to death behind the front desk of a hotel is now being held in the killing — along with his brother.

Anthony Wilson, a 27-year old security guard at the Courtyard at Marriott, and his brother Donald Wilson, 29, have been charged with capital murder in connection to the death.

Police say Anthony Wilson's story fell apart as investigators found several inconsistencies in

his story of how he found the body of hotel clerk James V. Beattie Jr., 28.

Beattie was shot in the face on the morning of Aug. 7. Police officials have declined to comment on how much money was taken.

The Wilson brothers were being held Monday morning on \$150,000 bond.

Lt. Mike Mason said the brothers had agreed to split the spoils of the pre-planned robbery.

Both men were arrested Saturday.

"I think this is a cold calculated robbery where they intended to kill the victim," Mason said.

"No one should ever have to worry about going to work and fear that they're not going to make it home the next morning."

Police say a telephone tip on Saturday alerted them to the inconsistencies in Anthony Wilson's story.

The killing was the city's first in two years.

BUSH TAKES A STAND

No immigrant-bashing in presidential race

EL PASO (AP) — Without hesitation and under no uncertain terms, Gov. George W. Bush has staked out his position on illegal-immigrant bashing during the upcoming presidential race: There will be none.

Breaking with a popular trend of making political hay out of illegal immigrants by blaming them for many of the nation's fiscal ills, Bush said he refuses to point an accusatory finger at the undocumented.

And, he said, he doesn't want to see any other politicians do it either, be it in Texas or anywhere else.

During a recent visit, the Republican governor said he will use his political clout in upcoming presidential primaries in the state and around the nation "to see that there is no immigrant bashing."

Those that do will draw his ire, he said.

Reacting to his comments, presidential contenders Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kansas, and Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, both said they aren't among the guilty.

"I agree with Gov. Bush," said Dole. "I'm not bashing anybody that I know of."

"I'm not bashing," added Gramm.

But the issue doesn't begin or end with them.

Illegal immigration has been a hotly debated topic for months around the nation in general — where calls for stronger border controls and revamped laws are in vogue — and in politics in particular.

"The basic issue here is do we want to encourage people to come to America who want to come with their sleeves rolled

up ... or do we want to perpetuate a system that encourages people to come to America to seek welfare?" Gramm said.

Some have striven to take a high road in the debate, highlighting concerns about the United States' ability to absorb waves of immigrants.

Others, however, have preferred BUSH attacks, portraying illegal immigrants, and sometimes those who enter legally, as being attracted to the United States by the promise of welfare benefits.



Heavyweights handle custody case

HOUSTON (AP) — In his effort to win custody of his two young sons, Kenny Bigham has been represented by four former Texas Supreme Court justices, two former state legislators and a former congressman.

His ex-wife, Vickie, has had the same Pasadena attorney all along.

The marriage collapsed two years ago under the weight of allegations of Bigham's adultery and Mrs. Bigham's mismanagement of family finances.

The fight for the boys, now 7 and 3, is not over, but victories have all gone to Bigham, 32. Most recently, he got the case moved to where he wanted it.

"The Legislature never contemplated a system in which venue is decided in favor of the party who can exert the most legal effort and win the race to

the courthouse," wrote Justice Raul Gonzalez, one of three who unsuccessfully opposed Bigham's request.

Bigham's lead attorney, former state Sen. Carl Parker, said there is nothing inappropriate about Bigham putting together a politically connected legal team.

"If you're looking for a lawyer, do you look for the lawyer least connected or best connected?" Parker said. "You would do it. Anybody would do it, and hopefully judges have enough integrity to administer the law fairly."

Bigham, a lawyer himself, is asking a judge in Fayette County to strip Mrs. Bigham, a 34-year-old bookkeeper, of all custody rights. The Fayette County prosecuting attorney, a political ally of the judge, is representing

him in a hearing Wednesday.

Early last year, the case was transferred to state District Judge Bill Elliot, the former boss of an employee of Bigham's law firm.

That June, the Bighams agreed to a settlement of their battle granting Mrs. Bigham more time with the boys and limiting their residence to Harris County. The next month, though, Bigham asked Elliot to allow him to move the children to Fayette County, where Bigham's father has a farm.

Court records show Bigham's father, Kenneth N. Bigham Sr., has been paying many of his sons legal bills in the child custody fight.

The elder Bigham became a multimillionaire from the hazardous waste disposal company he built.

'flawed demigod'

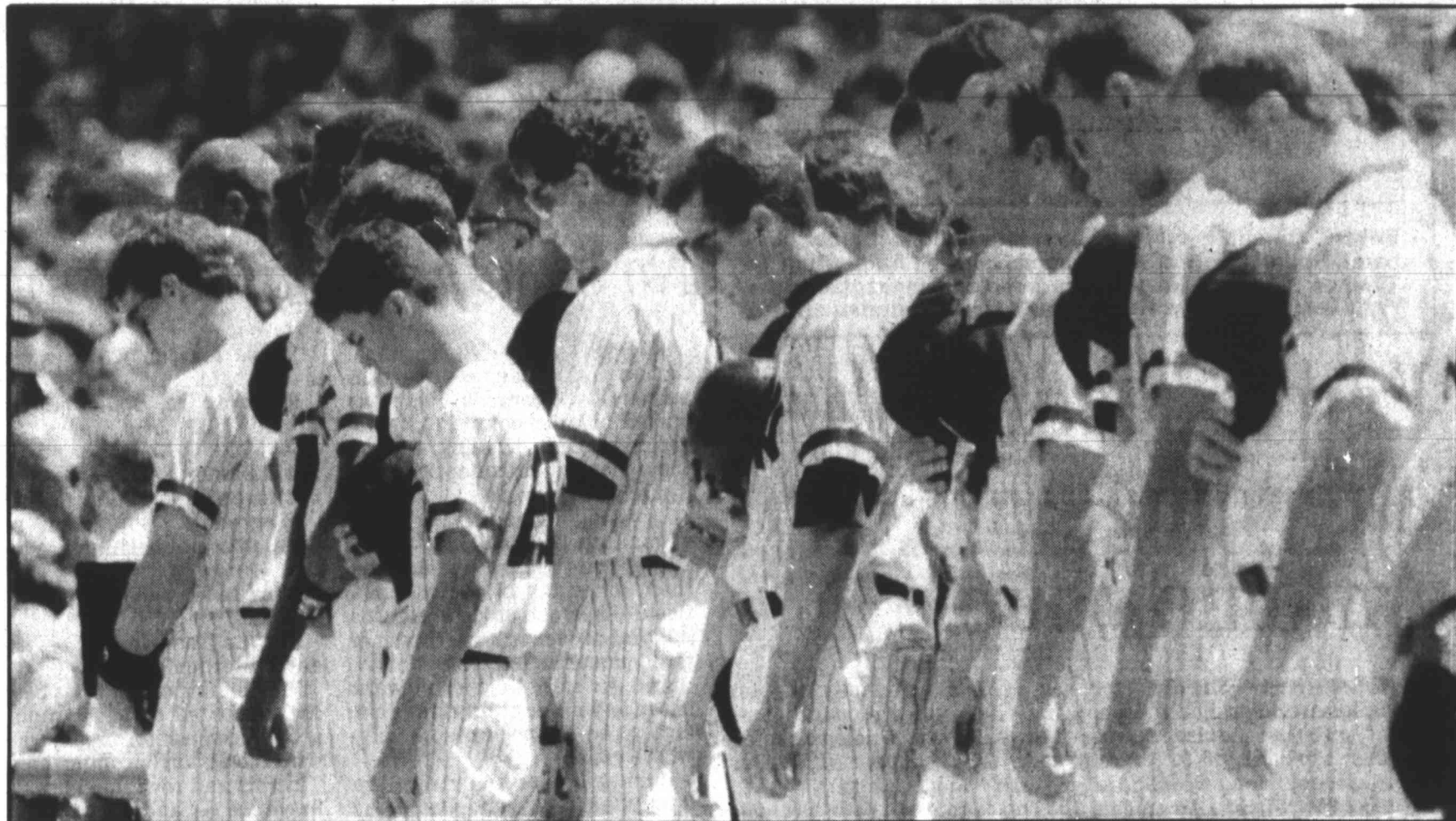
The Mick was like a demigod, so strong, so vulnerable, a million-dollar body flawed by dime-store knees.

Skowron visited Mantle on Thursday along with two other old Yankees, Hank Bauer and Johnny Blanchard. "I'm glad I went to see him," he said. "He was in good spirits. He was battling."

But Skowron said his old teammate was in some pain. "He was aching. His back, his tailbone. I'd rather he go than suffer. He suffered enough in his career."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Steve Elkington was sitting at the scorer's table, about to put his John Hancock on the best round of his life. Then the unmistakable roar rolled across Riviera Country Club.

There was more work to be done to win the PGA Championship.

While Colin Montgomerie pumped his fists in celebration on the 18th green down below, Elkington quickly signed his scorecard. He walked out to cuddle his infant daughter, mentally regrouping for the playoff that would soon come.

Somewhere, somehow, Elkington now had to find one more birdie on Riviera's battered greens.

"I knew if he missed, it's over," Elkington said. "It's a terrible feeling when someone makes a long putt to tie you for a playoff, especially with so much at stake like the PGA."

A few minutes later, Elkington got his birdie, at the end of a 25-foot putt on the first playoff hole that headed unerringly toward the cup before dropping in.

And this time, Montgomerie couldn't answer.

Montgomerie, who had a 20-footer of his own to tie, turned his back and walked away to gather his thoughts. When he got over his ball, he pushed it just slightly and it slid past the hole to the right.

"Obviously you're hoping he doesn't do that sort of thing," Montgomerie said. "But he did, and all credit to him. It was a great putt, but you expect it. And I knew I had to hole my

putt whether it was for a win or for a half, and on we go."

It was a fitting end Sunday to a tournament that turned into a unique major championship, with par only a vague suggestion instead of a potentially winning score.

The 17-under-par winning total was a PGA Championship record, and tied the lowest four-round score for any major tournament, set by Greg Norman in the 1993 British Open. Riviera's soft greens proved so accommodating that scores in the mid-60s weren't

only possible, but occurred with astonishing regularity.

Ernie Els had three of them and began the day with a three-shot lead, then welcomed the rest of the field in with a tentative front nine. It was an open invitation to Elkington and Montgomerie, who accepted by roaring right past.

By the time Els was hitting his second shot to the 18th green, Elkington and Montgomerie were getting into golf carts heading for the tee on the final hole to begin the playoff.

Agassi overcomes heat, Chang
to win ATP Championship title

MASON, Ohio (AP) — The old "image is everything" Andre Agassi might have stayed with his stylish black shoes in the 96-degree heat. He certainly would have entertained the crowd, and almost certainly would have lost.

A remade Agassi showed once again during the ATP Championship that image is out and winning is in.

The crowd favorite and No. 1 player in the world put away his beloved black, took a no-nonsense attitude onto the scorching court and matched his career high for tournament wins Sunday.

Agassi's 7-5, 6-2 victory over two-time champion Michael Chang highlighted all the reasons he's turned into a much different player in the past two years.

For starters, he's determined. Despite the heat and draining humidity, Agassi played just one bad set all week. Agassi had no letdowns Sunday during a one-hour, 34-minute match played on a sizzling court.

"I haven't played a match in over a year now where I haven't gone out there and laid it all on the line and tried to win," Agassi said. "I've forced myself to play above what I felt I was playing that day for a year now, week after week."

Just about a year ago, Agassi won the U.S. Open and started a run that continued through the \$1.8 million ATP Championship. He is 81-9 since the beginning of last year's Open, has matched his career high by winning six tournaments this year, and is 41-2 on hard courts.

Agassi gives a lot of the credit to coach Brad Gilbert, who has changed his approach to

third straight win

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. (AP) — Nothing comes easy for Mark Martin at Watkins Glen International, yet he manages to finish out in front — year after year.

For the third straight year, Martin won from the pole in the Budweiser at the Glen on Sunday, running down former teammate Wally Dallenbach six laps from the finish after losing his lead during a fuel stop.

His second win of the year set him up once again for a late-season run at the NASCAR Winston Cup driving title. Martin vaulted past Dale Earnhardt into third in the points battle, behind Jeff Gordon and Sterling Marlin.

"I'm not any more proud of this one than last year's (victory)," Martin said. "It's just another notch in our belt. These things are just not easy to win, I'll tell you. ... There's a lot of competition."

placed now to win his first championship than he has been in five years.

"I believe we will win some more before the season is out," he said.

There also were two big losers: Michael Andretti and Bobby Rahal.

Unser averaged 107.110 mph and won by 2.037 seconds over Paul Tracy as the pair finished one-two for the second year in a row at the Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course.

Villeneuve practically locked up the season driving title by placing third.

Unser's triumph came at the expense of Andretti, who seemingly had the race wrapped up until his engine blew on the 80th lap of the 83-lap event.

And Villeneuve moved to a 45-point lead over second-place Rahal in the driver standings because he was able to continue while Rahal crashed into a wall when their two cars brushed each other on lap 39.

Unser seemed amazed at his good fortune.

Andretti was stunned. "The engine just let go," he said. "This was the third race in a row that I think we could have won. ... I just gave Al another win. I was just in shock, disbelief, especially when I drove so hard to get that far."

The victory was Unser's second of the season, ending a nine-race losing streak.

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

Today is Monday, August 14, the 226th day of 1995. There are 139 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: Fifty years ago, on Aug. 14, 1945, President Truman announced that Japan had surrendered unconditionally, ending World War II.

On this date:

- In 1848, the Oregon Territory was established.
- In 1900, international forces — including U.S. Marines — entered Beijing to put down the Boxer Rebellion, which was aimed at rebelling China of foreigners.
- In 1917, China declared war on Germany and Austria during World War I.
- In 1935, 60 years ago, the Social Security Act became law, creating unemployment insurance and pension plans for the elderly.
- In 1941, President Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill issued the Atlantic Charter, a statement of principles that renounced aggression.
- In 1944, the federal government allowed the manufacture of certain domestic appliances, such as electric ranges and vacuum cleaners, to resume on a limited basis.
- In 1947, Pakistan became independent of British rule.
- In 1951, newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst died in Beverly Hills, Calif.
- In 1962, robbers held up a U.S. mail truck in Plymouth, Mass., making off with more than \$1.5 million.
- In 1969, British troops arrived in Northern Ireland to intervene in sectarian violence between Protestants and Roman Catholics.
- In 1973, the U.S. bombing of Cambodia came to a halt, marking the official end to 12 years of American combat in Indochina.
- Ten years ago: Vice President Bush led a celebration aboard the aircraft carrier Enterprise marking the 40th anniversary of Japan's surrender in World War II.
- Five years ago: Interrupting his vacation in Kennebunkport, Maine, President Bush returned to Washington, where he told reporters he saw no hope for a diplomatic solution to the Persian Gulf crisis, at least until economic sanctions forced Iraq to withdraw from Kuwait.
- One year ago: Rain turned the final full day of Woodstock '94 in Saugerties, N.Y., into a mud-bath. Eight children who were left alone died in an early morning house fire in Carbondale, Ill.
