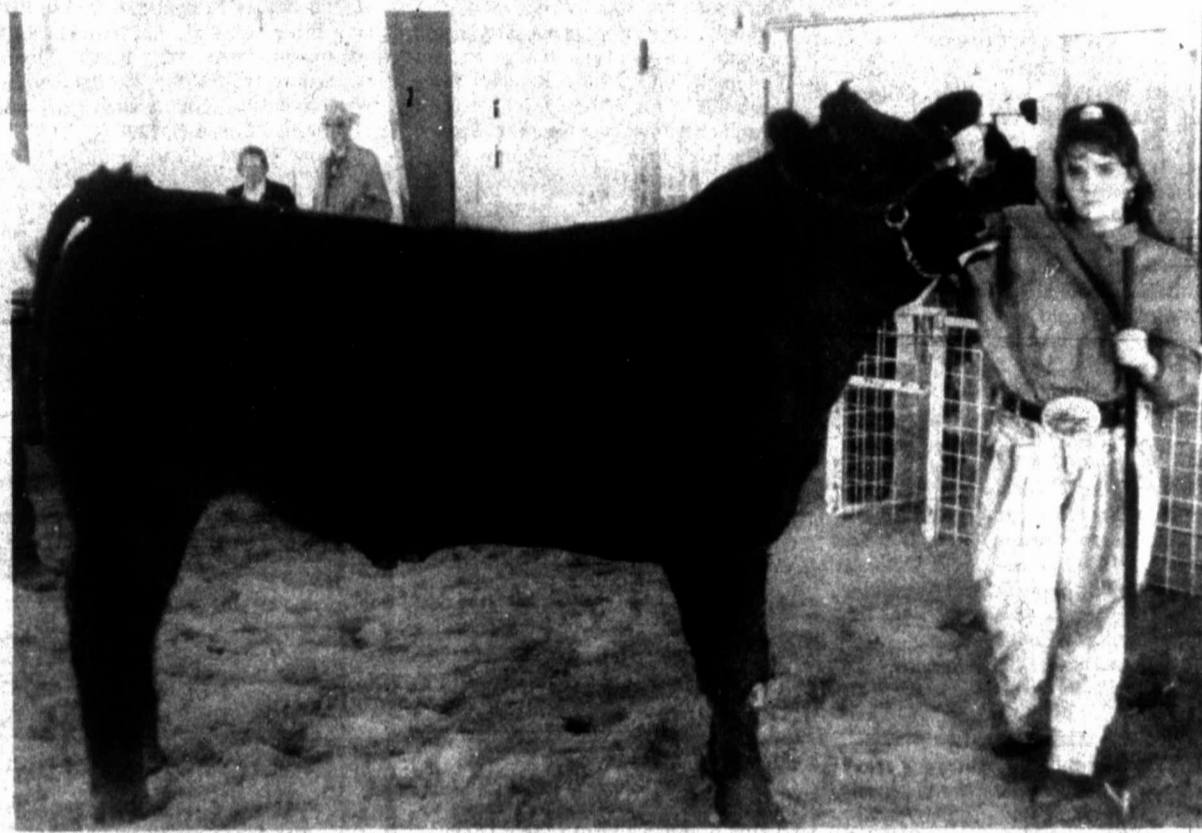

## Hospital shows healthy profit in December

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors was told Tuesday night that because of increased patient load, the hospital showed a net profit of \$129,380 in December.

Administrator Richard Murphy said the number of admissions in December equaled that of Oc-

tober and November combined. In addition to approving the financial and statistical reports for both the hospital and nursing home, the board approved the appointment of Billie Dannheim and Margaret Baum to the hospital's auxiliary.

Murphy told the board that the

hospital is participating in a continuing education program for its physician and nursing staffs through Texas Tech University in Lubbock. The hospital received a grant of \$10,000 with which a satellite dish, color monitor, VCR and other equipment was obtained to receive the programs

from Tech. The cost to the hospital district is \$250 a month for the next 24 months. Programs are transmitted via satellite which can be viewed by the nurses and physicians at the hospital.

"We're receiving via satellite 20 hours a month of qualified, continuing education for

physicians," said Murphy, adding that there currently is an hour of continuing education each week for nurses.

Murphy also reported on the county economic board of development of which he is an


