### VISITORS TO SEE FACTORY NEXT WEEK

Industrialist, High Sears Officials Due Here Tuesday

An industrialist and at least two high officials of Sears, Roebuck and Co. are scheduled to visit the Marie Foundations factory in McLean next Tuesday.

In the group will be: Maurice Perlstein, president of the Kellwood Co.; Al Steinel, assistant to the vice president of Sears, and Larry Buchon, who is in charge of buying for Sears' Southwest territory.

The vice president of Sears, Charles Myers, also may accompany the group, but it had not been learned definitely here Wednesday whether he would be able to add McLean to his itinerary.

Fraser to Be Here  
Cal Fraser, owner of Marie Foundations, said Myers had hoped to come to McLean but didn't know if his schedule would permit. Fraser will show the visiting group around the local plant.

Perlstein's Kellwood Co., like Marie Foundations, is a supplier for Sears.

The company is a combine of 17 needle trades firms with 7,000 employees, manufacturing men's, women's and children's clothing, as well as bedspreads and other linens, etc.

The visitors are due in McLean Monday night and will spend Tuesday at the local factory.

Expansion Starting  
An expansion program is under way at Marie Foundations, and Fraser disclosed that several other women's clothing items are planned for production here, in addition to the brassieres and girdles now made in the plant.

The new 15,000-square-foot addition to the factory building should be completed within a few weeks, and occupancy is scheduled in May.

The new structure will make it possible for the factory to move all its operations under one roof and further increases in the number of employees are planned.

More than 180 persons are currently employed and this number will swell to some 200 over the next few years.

### Vandalism Probed By Local Officer

Constable J. D. Fish was investigating vandalism at the Derby Drive-In Theatre and rural areas Wednesday, but no arrests had been made by the afternoon.

At least eight speaker poles at the theater and a number of mail boxes in the rural areas were knocked down Monday night.

Fish said he had some clues to the identity of the vandals but planned to complete his investigation before naming the persons involved.

## FHA Loan Program Broadened

Families living in McLean and other rural communities of not more than 2,500 population may now be eligible for housing loans, even though they are not engaged in farming, according to James D. Gouley, Farm and Home Administration supervisor for Gray, Armstrong and Donley Counties.

Gouley, whose office is in Clarendon, said the Housing Act of 1961 broadened the eligibility requirements for rural housing loans. As a result, owners of non-farm tracts in rural areas and in small rural communities of 2,500 and less, as well as farmers, may be eligible for this type of credit.

"This program is an important new tool in promoting the development of rural areas," Gouley

said. "Rural housing loans will not only help families obtain better homes but will put more carpenters, plumbers and electricians to work, and will increase the sales in lumber yards and building supply firms."

Housing loans are made for the construction, repair and remodeling of dwellings and essential farm buildings to provide water for farmsteads and household use.

In addition to major construction, funds are available to modernize homes—add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other home improvements, as well as to enlarge and remodel farm service buildings and put in related facilities such as paved feedlots, yard fences and driveways.

The interest rate is four per cent per year on the unpaid balance of the loan. Loans may be scheduled for repayment over periods up to 33 years.

The proposed housing must be adequate to meet the family's needs, yet modest in size and design.

To be eligible, an applicant must own a farm or housing site in a rural area; be without decent, safe and sanitary housing; be unable to obtain the needed credit from other sources; and be without sufficient resources to provide the necessary housing on his own account.

He must also have or be able to obtain sufficient income to meet (See FHA, Page 6)

## 8 Candidates Bid For 3 Positions

Three school trustees for the McLean Independent School District will be elected in balloting here Saturday.

Polls in city hall will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. for the election, which is expected to attract an unusually large number of voters.

Eight candidates are in the race for the three positions to be filled. A field of nine had filed, but one withdrew late last week.

Arthur Dwyer, whose name is already printed on the ballots, announced that he was withdrawing. Dwyer explained that he was taking the action because his nephew, Carl Dwyer, plans to apply for a teaching position in the local school system.

Carl Dwyer and his wife are currently enrolled at Oklahoma State University but have indicated they intend to seek their former positions here in the fall.

Mr. and Mrs. Dwyer resigned as teachers in McLean last year after he received a grant for special study at OSU.

Carl Dwyer said. "I wouldn't want to endanger Carl's or his wife's chances of returning to the local school," Arthur Dwyer said.

School regulations do not permit a relative of a trustee to work for the school district.

Farris J. Hess is the only incumbent trustee asking re-election. Retiring members are Spencer Sitter and Dr. Joe Suderman.

Other candidates are Ernest Watson, Jack R. Lisman, Guy Beasley, Bob Willoughby, J. M. Hathaway, Ted Simmons and Orphus O. Tate.

Conducting the election will be Mr. and Mrs. Homer Abbott and Mrs. E. L. Price.

### Light Shower Ends Long City Dry Spell

A teasing bit of moisture drizzled down on McLean Wednesday afternoon, but by late in the day barely enough to measure had fallen.

McLean skies were heavily overcast Wednesday and clouds were so soggy they finally turned loose a fair shower during the afternoon.

March 20 was the last date on which the city received a measurable amount of rain, but then only .02 inch was recorded by Pete Fulbright, local weather observer.

That brought the total for the year to .89 inch, compared with four inches on this date in 1961. To the same date in 1960, the city had received 4.5 inches.

### Rail Mishap Hurts Two Near Alanreed

Two Rock Island Railroad employees were shaken up but not seriously injured last week when a rail test car jumped the tracks west of Alanreed.

Harve Burnett, Rock Island depot agent here, said the two men were bruised and "skinned up" in the accident.

The mishap occurred when the guide wheel on the vehicle came off. The test car left the tracks and struck an embankment.

The vehicle is capable of traveling on the highway as well as on rails.

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

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

### MAILING CARTONS

I have placed a supply of mailing cartons for samples of possible screwworms at The McLean News. These mailing cartons contain a small vial of alcohol to place 10 or 12 specimens to be collected from any animal that has been suspected of having screwworms.

A short questionnaire is enclosed for the rancher to fill out, if he does collect any worms.

You then place the vial and the questionnaire inside the mailing carton, which is already addressed. No postage is required.

Should cases be discovered at any point in Texas, it is my understanding that an aerial drop of male sterile flies will be made in that locality.

So, if you should have a case, let's pick up a mailing carton and send in a sample. It will be to everyone's advantage.

### 4-H SALE

For several years the Armstrong County 4-H boys have held an auction sale of farm machinery. This has grown to such an extent that people from all over the Panhandle, South and Rolling Plains attend, both as buyers and sellers.

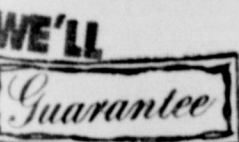
The date on this sale has been set for April 14. This is an excellent place to buy or sell farm and ranch equipment. The 4-H boys charge a five per cent commission on all items sold.

## LET'S TALK POLITICS

### PROGRESS

I am a Democratic candidate for State Representative from the 87th District. This is the fifth in my series of newspaper columns and radio speeches.

Texas receives more Federal Aid per capita than any other state in our nation. Only New York and California receive more total dollars in Federal Aid than does Texas.

In Texas 90% of our Federal Aid goes to highway construction and our State Welfare Program. I am for receiving these Federal Aids. Our Defense Highways must be constructed to accommodate military weapons during time of war. Our Federal Government is responsible for the defense of this country. Therefore, their specifications must be met. Our State Welfare Program and the acceptance of Federal Aid to this program is provided for in amendments to our Texas Constitution.

A vigorous economy in this State must be encouraged. We have relied on a colony type economy in this State by placing emphasis on exporting our raw materials. We must encourage the converting of these raw materials into the finished product within our State and export the finished product. We must encourage major development of our deep water ports and provide for a vigorous export trade in our finished products and our surplus raw materials.

We must develop an economy based on a solid foundation which will weather any storm. Many of you will say that we have a good economy now. Let's assume world peace and total disarmament are obtained and our military establishments, defense plants and all dependent industry suddenly stopped. Our present good life would collapse overnight. We need to rely upon solid economics and every attempt at that goal should be encouraged by our State Government.

A detailed discussion will be made on radio, Friday of this week.

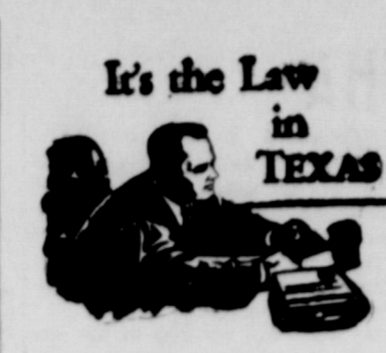

**YOUR LEGAL NAME**

Most probably you are never quite sure whether your wife should use your first name, or her own, when signing an important paper.

Perhaps you also wonder whether to put a "Mr." or a "Mrs." in front of a signature; and you can get all mixed up about a "Jr." or a "Sr." after it. Then, what about your middle name or initial?

It seems that for centuries under common law a legal name has consisted of one Christian or given name and one surname or family name. The law presumes that every person has a given and a surname which must be stated in full on any legal document.

The law pays little attention to a middle name or initial, but it is wise to use either one or the other for exact identification. For example, one real estate buyer was advised to sign all papers by his full name, "William Alton Smith Jr.," to make it clear which of the Bill Smiths was buying the property.

If you are a "Jr." or a "Sr.," such description should be used to help distinguish you from namesake.

As for "Mr." in front of your name, that's not important at all. The same is true for "Mrs.," because it's your wife's own given name that counts.

When a woman marries she takes her husband's family name. Her maiden name is absolutely lost. Many women incorrectly use their husband's full name, and sign "Mrs. William A. Smith," for example. The correct way is for her to sign her own given name and her husband's surname, such as "Joan Marie Smith."

A divorced woman who wants to resume the use of her maiden name may, under some circumstances, have it returned to her by court order.

**HORSEHEAD CROSSING**

Horsehead Crossing is located south of Crane, in the far western part of the state of Texas.

An historical marker pays tribute to this important early day crossing and tells of how it was used.

It reads: "Well known to frontiersmen and used by emigrants for several years preceding, this crossing was an important point on the Southern Overland Mail (Butterfield Route) which linked St. Louis and San Francisco with a semi-weekly mail and stage service. 1858-1861."

payments on existing debts, take care of his other expenses and make the payments on the proposed loan.

The local county or area committee of the FHA determines applicant's eligibility.

All loans are secured to the extent necessary to protect the government's interest. Small improvement loans made in amounts of less than \$1,500 with repayments scheduled over periods up to 10 years may be secured by a promissory note. Other loans are secured by mortgages.
