City seeks financial ruling Community Center proposal

The city council decided Monday to ask its auditor if the city can finance its proposed \$75,000 community center building without a tax boost.

Arthur Davis of Lubbock, the city auditor, is due here shortly to prepare for the city's annual audit and the making of the municipality's 1964-65 budget.

Councilmen agreed it would be best to know the city's financial ability to pay its share of such a project before sitting down with the Post Chamber of Commerce officials and the Garza County Commissioners Court in a joint session to discuss the recommendations for such a Community Center released last week by the Chamber's Civic Improvement Committee after a year of study on the project.

The committee in its report said the city could pay its proposed \$75,000 share and the county its \$150,000 share in the proposed \$225,000 building with no tax boost to local taxpayers.

Councilmen had their doubts the city could provide \$75,000 without a tax boost.

City Superintendent E. A. Warren pointed out that the city is going to have to pay some \$40,000 for warrants for the recently completed outfall sewer and sewer lateral lines.

Carleton P. Webb, attorney for the city, said he wants to check the authority for the city and county to jointly finance such a project. Webb pointed out the city can do only what is authorized for it by the legislature.

The committee report said adequate authority exists for a jointly financed Community Building.

In bringing up the committee report proposing the Community Center, Mayor Harold Lucas commented, "I think we are all aware of the need." Each councilman received a copy of the report for individual study.

The city is going to spend some \$25,000 seal coating city streets this summer, but the cost of the project will be spread over two fiscal years.

Superintendent Warren explained that with so many streets here needing a seal coat to prevent costly deterioration, that the city (See City Seeks, Page 8)

Five absentee votes have been cast in the Post and Close City school consolidation election to be held Saturday, May 9, in the two school districts.

The absentee voting deadline was Tuesday midnight.

Voting places in Saturday's consolidation election will be at the schoolhouse at Close City and at the high school library in Post.

If the consolidation proposal carries in both districts, the Close City district will be consolidated with the Post district prior to the start of the 1964-65 school year.

If the consolidation proposal carries, the Post school board will deed the present school building at Close City to the community for use as a community center. The two teachers now employed by the Close City district would be employed by the newly-formed Post Consolidated Independent School District.

Douglas Livingston will be the election's presiding judge at Close City and Mrs. Loucille Morris will be the presiding judge here.

Manager Janet Hall said today the Post Hotshots, the local women's basketball team which will meet Post Rotarians here Friday night in a benefit game, are ready to play.

Manager Frank Blanton of the Rotarians says nothing and keeps his fingers crossed.

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Four runoffs face Garza voters in second primary

Saturday's vote hits 1,898 total

Four runoff races will keep Garza County political activity lively for another month, complete and official returns from Saturday's first primary show.

Democratic voters must go to the polls again June 6 to pick their nominees for sheriff, county attorney, Precinct 1 county commissioner and Precinct 3 county commissioner.

The canvass of the returns Tuesday morning by the county Democratic executive committee disclosed that a total of 1,898 votes were counted in Saturday's election.

Paired in the June 6 runoff election will be the following:

Sheriff — L. E. Claborn Jr., incumbent, and Lloyd H. Merritt.

County Attorney — Preston Poole and Carleton P. Webb, incumbent.

Pct. 1 Commissioner — Paul H. Jones and Jack Myers, incumbent.

Pct. 3 Commissioner — Ben G. Sanchez and Ozell Williams, incumbent.

Also on the Garza County second primary election ballot will be a runoff race between Joe Pool and Robert Baker for Congressman-at-large.

T. H. Tipton was successful in his bid for re-election as Garza County tax assessor-collector by defeating Mike E. Custer.

John C. Harrison won the Democratic nomination for Precinct 1 constable over Eddie Shaw. A considerable number of write-in votes, most of them for Dick Wood, made it appear for a while that Harrison and Shaw might go into a runoff for the office being vacated by J. A. Johnson.

With the exception of the North Post voting precinct, where counting wasn't completed until 4 a. m. Sunday, all the boxes were in early with their returns.

N. C. Outlaw, county Democratic chairman, attributed the lateness of the North Post box total to the long ballot and to the large number of votes cast there—820, nearly half the county total.

"Even at that," the Democratic chairman said, "the North Post box wasn't nearly as late as some boxes in the state. I read of one voting precinct at Eagle Pass, where they didn't get through counting until 6 p. m. Sunday."

The 1,898 votes cast in Saturday's election was 459 more than the 1,439 counted in the first primary two years ago. Later that year, 1,453 voted in the second primary

and 1,034 in the general election. In the governor's race Saturday, Garza County voters went for John Connally with 1,163 votes, giving his chief opponent, Don Yarborough, 547. In the hotly-contested U. S. Senate race, the county favored incumbent Ralph Yarborough over Gordon McLendon by 934 to 716. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith won easily here over Albert Fuentes Jr., 1,563 to 177.

He's 74, but survives fall, hours in ravine

Henry J. Letterman, 74-year-old farmer, who spent 21 hours in a 20-foot ravine with a broken leg, bruises and cuts, was reported in satisfactory condition today in Veterans Hospital at Big Spring.

Letterman's ordeal began about 3 o'clock last Thursday afternoon when his tractor plunged over the edge of the ravine on the W. A. Gray farm, about two miles north of Post.

Henry J. Letterman's farm was listed yesterday by friends and neighbors, according to the Rev. K. S. White, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene. Women came in from the farm to prepare and serve lunch to the workers at the Nazarene Church building here.

He was pulled out of the ravine shortly after noon Friday by a winch truck cable after he had been given first aid by a local physician and placed on a stretcher. The Post Volunteer Fire Department assisted in the rescue.

Suffering from a fracture of the left leg below the knee and mild shock, Letterman was rushed by ambulance to the Big Spring hospital.

He was found in the ravine by W. A. Gray, whose land he farms.

Gray said he and his wife began worrying about Letterman after not seeing him at work in the field, which is across the 15-foot ravine from the Gray home. He said they at first thought Letterman might have made a trip to town on the tractor, but decided to investigate about 11 o'clock Friday morning.

"The first inkling I had that something had gone wrong," Gray said, "was when I approached the ravine and saw tractor tire tracks leading up to its edge. Then, from the edge of the ravine, I saw Mr. Letterman and the tractor at the bottom."

The tractor is believed to have plunged over the edge of the ravine after the gasoline lever jerked "open" when the tractor hit a bump.

Letterman was thrown clear of the tractor as it plunged to the bottom of the ravine.

The ravine was dry at the time. (See 21-hour Ordeal, Page 8)

4-day sewing room week is temporary

Sewing room operations at the Post Cotton Mills here have temporarily been reduced to a four-day week due to a shortage of cloth.

The rest of the mill's operations is not affected and is operating full time, officials said.

The sewing room operations were cut to four days last Thursday when the sudden shortage developed and probably will remain in effect this week, and possibly next.

The sewing room will resume full-time operations again just as soon as a sufficient cloth supply is available. The shortage should be remedied within two weeks, officials estimated.

Garza County had literally a "last minute" Republican primary Saturday after it was discovered Friday that Garza was about to be the only county in Texas without a GOP primary.

Party officials rolled into town Friday night determined to hold such a primary. Local Republicans pitched in to organize the affair. Earlier they had decided not to hold one.

The voting was conducted in the office of the Manhattan Construction Co. with a total of nine votes cast.

Jack Cox picked up eight votes for the senatorial nomination as against one for George Bush, also of Houston.

In the GOP preferential presidential primary, Barry Goldwater got six votes to two for Richard Nixon. The ninth ballot was not voted.

Demo convention to be Saturday

The Garza County Democratic convention will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday, May 9, in the district courtroom, with delegates certified from all voting precincts except Justiceburg. N. C. Outlaw, county Democratic chairman, said today.

Outlaw said he felt sure a delegate had been selected at the Justiceburg precinct convention last Saturday and the delegate probably would present his credentials at the county convention Saturday.

All precinct conventions were harmonious. The only two resolutions came from the North Post and South Post boxes and each of these resolutions was that the delegation vote as a unit.

Two delegates to the state convention will be elected at Saturday's county convention. The number of delegates is based on the size of the county's vote for the Democratic nominee in the last gubernatorial general election.

Voting box sets unenviable record

The big North Post box, where nearly half of Garza County's total vote is cast, broke all records for coming in late in Saturday's election. It was not until around 4 o'clock Sunday morning that all the votes—something over 800—in the box had been tabulated, and it was six hours later before the results were made available.

The North Post voting precinct, being the largest, always has been the last one in with its election returns, but, as we said earlier, it broke all records this time.

What can be done about it?

One solution, and perhaps the most logical one, would be to split the box into two voting precincts. This solution, it appears to us, would not be out of line, considering that in the number of votes cast there, the box is out of all proportion to the size of the county's eight other voting boxes.

It isn't entirely fair to the public, including the candidates, to have to go to bed not knowing how the election came out, and it certainly isn't

fair to the election judge and his helpers to have to spend upwards of 20 hours holding an election and counting the votes.

Because of it taking so long to get all the votes counted in the North Post box, Garza County was the only county not having complete, or nearly complete, election returns reported in Sunday morning's daily newspaper.

Here at The Dispatch office, we stayed on the job until it appeared beyond a doubt that the complete returns would not be in until sometime Sunday morning from the North Post box. We answered from 500 to 600 telephone calls in that time, a number of them from out of town.

We're not complaining about something we did voluntarily and as a public service, but we are complaining of the inconvenience the long-delayed total vote caused the public. It is something that can and should be remedied, not only for the benefit of the public, but also for the benefit of the election workers.—CD

The community center project

If the "voice of the people" can be taken as an indication, then there no longer is any doubt that a community center is Post's number one need.

At last week's Chamber of Commerce-sponsored community workshops, more than 300 persons listed a community center as the "number one need" in their suggestions for community betterment.

Long before the community workshops were held, however, a Chamber of Commerce committee had been at work on the prospects of a community center for Post. The committee's report, calling for construction of a community center

in the City-County Park, was unanimously endorsed April 23 by Chamber directors.

Even though the community center project has strong support throughout the community and area, a lot of "groundwork" remains to be done before the project—which will call for joint financing by the City of Post and Garza County—moves past the planning stage.

The best way the civic-minded citizen can help the community center project along is to "talk it up," if he believes in it. And it has been indicated beyond a doubt that a big majority of the people of Post and its trade territory do believe in it.—CD

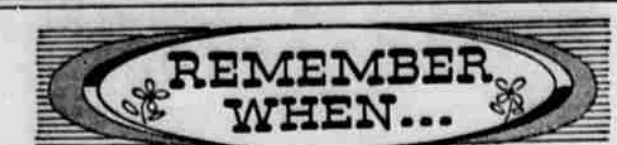

SCS technician says

Brush control is production help

Over the past several years many thousands of acres of brush have been controlled in Garza County. This control of undesirable brush has put valuable rangeland back into production.

Former Garza County man starts manufacturing firm at Lometa

(Editor's Note: R. V. Burnes, a former resident of the Pleasant Valley community, near Post, has started a new industry at Lometa, as described in the following article from the San Angelo Standard-Times. Burnes is a brother of Mrs. V. H. Kuykendoll and a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Mathis, formerly of Garza County.)

LOMETA — A new industry has been started here by a long-time stockfarmer.

R. V. Burnes, who has lived most of his life in this Lampasas County community, got into the manufacturing business "mostly by accident."

A self-taught welder, auto mechanic and machinist, Burnes went to work for Frieme Bros., Inc. of Hereford over a year ago when his stockfarming operations got nipped by drought.

"I worked at Hereford and Plainview last fall," Burnes said recently. "When the company couldn't make enough of the row markers to keep up with the demand, I saw an opportunity to bring a little payroll into Lometa."

Burnes thus became a subcontractor for the manufacturing firm. He loaded his pear and returned here from the Plains area.

"When we first got started, I had 10 men working 24 hours a day. Now that we have caught up with sales, I have only a few working," he said.

Burnes builds row markers, made of steel, in eight and 10 foot lengths. The row markers are attached to any late model tractor and operate hydraulically.

It is called the maximum payable percentage plan which means that in lieu of the total amount of insurance being payable from inception of liability, there is a gradual increase from given dates until 100% of the amount of insurance is payable. is planning to spend \$12,500 for this fiscal year in June and probably another \$12,500 in July out of the new 1964-65 fiscal year's budget. The city begins its new fiscal year July 1.

In other actions, the council: Approved summer library hours of four half days weekly with the library open three hours on each of the half days with the fourth hour to be used for a library work period.

Applauded as Walter Duckworth, retiring city councilman, was presented at the start of the meeting with a plaque by Mayor Lucas for "five years of valuable service" as an alderman.

Refused to overlook an \$81.20 water bill for a local automatic laundry which had been sub-leased but with the water meter still in the owner's name. The council wants the bill paid before the water is turned back on.

Heard Police Chief Elton Corley report \$620 collected in April fines and 15 dogs picked up.

Heard a report that the city's new outfall sewer project has been completed to Avenue L, one block further than originally planned. The sewer is now awaiting inspection in about three weeks by the state health department.

Heard a report that three sewer laterals already have been installed off the sewer by the city, one of them lying in 85 houses in Mill Village north of the Postex Mills. These were built by Clyde Construction Co. at a cost of \$8,604.

Voted to authorize another \$10,000 for additional sewer laterals as needed with the city doing the work itself.

Heard a financial report on the sewer project, which showed total cost of the sewer project, since planning began in 1962, has been \$31,256.82. To pay for the city's share of the project \$20,000 has been transferred from the water fund and two \$10,000 warrants cashed to date. This also financed the three long sewer laterals already installed. To date the city has received a \$10,200 partial payment from the government to apply to the cost of the project.

Tabled until the next meeting action on a proposed co-op uniform plan for all non-office city employees in which employees and city would share the cost of such uniforms, including regularly cleaning. The council wants to know whether all employees favor the uniform plan before considering it further.

Authorized rental of City Auditorium to R. Calmenro of Spanish Assembly of God for a week-long series of nightly religious services for \$5 per night if the sponsoring organization cleaned it up after use, or \$10 nightly if the city did the cleanup.

Welcomed Claud Collier as a new councilman and heard Collier voice his opinion, after a recent ride up and down local alleys, that the community is badly in need of a real cleanup, especially around the business district where serious fire hazards are now present.

The Superintendent's Corner

By BARRY B. THOMPSON
QUALITY EDUCATION IS NOT ACCIDENTAL

The development of a system of quality education in any community is never accidental. A great deal of planning and research is involved. If the Russian Sputnik stimulated anything in America, it stimulated a scientific approach insofar as the solving of educational problems are concerned. Opinion and emotional inferences are no longer acceptable to the professional teacher.

Each quality school system is characterized by the experimental attitude of the staff. Encouraging evidence exists in Post that the experimental philosophy of the professional staff is rapidly developing. Indeed, there is a great deal of evidence to indicate this experimental philosophy will make up an integral part of the school's long range planning. A philosophy of experimentalism and research, however, requires (a) the administration and staff not to claim large gains when the gains are small; and (b) the school board and patrons to be prepared to accept the fact that new or different approaches do not always turn out successfully. There will always be a percentage of failure as programs are tried, used, and/or discarded when evidence shows they have little or no promise.

The experimental approach has many analogies in industry as many industrial and scientific breakthroughs have come after a number of failures. To function in an experimental situation the staff must have the freedom to fail as well as succeed. This means basically that over a period of years a quality school will evolve from constant research and tireless effort on the part of the staff and the patrons. Dogmatic programs or adherence to only one approach breed the conditions that allow the status quo. Seeking new methods and subject matter is essential to the development of a quality program.

The library is perhaps the most important single physical factor in a program of quality education. Without access to research periodicals and books the best teaching in the world is watered down. Therefore, all quality educational systems have good libraries in common. This particular characteristic of quality education has been identified time and time again.

Another important factor in a system of quality education is the use of first class equipment and materials by students and teachers.

It is difficult to reconcile a community's claim to quality school instruction when learning tools are either inferior or obsolete or both. Such equipment (first class) will provide a versatility and an applicability which will reach over into other theatres of school operations. When this is accomplished the initial investment is even more valuable than it may appear at first glance.

A quality system of education involves the development of a library for the professional staff. Research abstracts, school surveys, etc., are provided to the staff so they can read in disciplines that are rapidly expanding. This approach leads to experimentation or the problem - solving approach. Books and professional periodicals should be constantly added to the professional library. Work space should be provided in order that staff personnel can make easy, natural use of the materials available. Each teacher, theoretically, stays abreast of recent developments in public school education. These research findings are transmitted directly to the student in a control situation so that pertinent data can be collected.

It soon becomes apparent that the development of quality education in any community is not accidental. Those communities that wait for divine insight or happenstance remain average in their educational programs. We can safely assume the development of a quality school program is dependent on the support of the community; the caliber of instruction; the long range planning of the administration; and the physical aids available. The library should be constantly revised and kept up to date. Intellectual development can only occur with consistency where constant analysis of the total school program is undertaken.

A. Yes. A veteran in full time training receives \$110 a month; with one dependent he receives \$135 a month; and with more than one dependent he receives \$160 a month.

Q. Under what conditions can a veteran with National Service Life Insurance file an application for a waiver of premiums?

A. The insured must have an impairment of mind or body which continuously renders it impossible for the insured to follow any substantially gainful occupation for six or more consecutive months.

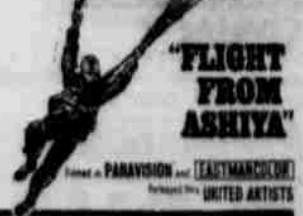

Adjustments in postal services affect only few

The vast majority of the residents of Post will not be affected by the recently announced adjustments in parcel post and window services. Postmaster Harold Voss said today. Recapping the local postal situation, the postmaster pointed to these facts: 1. We have received permission to write money orders on Saturday mornings—8:30 to 12. 2. No Postal Savings services will be rendered. No deposits of trust funds nor meter settings will be received. 3. No change will be made in rural delivery services. All services on city delivery routes will be as usual except the delivery of parcel post will be on a five-day basis. Tuesday being the day no deliveries will be made within the city delivery bounds. At the same time, the postmaster said he has received information on the national scope of the service adjustments, which indicate very little over-all effect is anticipated from the order, which started May 4.

LOOK FOR THE LEAN

When buying beef, look for lean meat that is bright red, firm and fine textured, and liberally marbled with fat (narrow threads of fat in the lean muscles). Red porous bones indicate that the meat comes from young animals. The fat covering should be white and firm in high quality beef.

NEEDS SPECIAL CARE

Meat needs special care when you get it home from the supermarket and before it is cooked. Rewrap it loosely in waxed paper or foil when you arrive home, then store it in the coldest part of the refrigerator. If you don't have in extra minute to rewrap the meat when you get home, just poke a hole in the package to let some air into the package cuts. When you buy good quality, treat it with proper care.
