

# Rozzell should be fired: Commissioner Holman

 "It is my opinion that Mr. Rozzell does not represent the best interest of the taxpayers of this district, he writes leases for individuals then asks for the district's approval and I don't understand how he can represent both parties. His service to the district are worth less than 25 cents an hour and he ought to be fired."  
 Those were the words of an obviously angry Aransas County Navigation District Commissioner Kirk Holman, as he spoke to the press at an unscheduled meeting at the ACND office Wednesday afternoon.  
 Holman's remarks came unexpectedly as Navigation District Harbormaster Bernie DeForest and Homer Faber were em-

broiled in an argument at the district office in Rockport.  
 Faber, who was trying to get information about the district's leases and subleases, told DeForest that he should cooperate and present the information as requested or the matter would be taken to the grand jury. The lease and sublease information had been requested in a letter on March 8 and he claimed the district was hiding the information and not making it available as requested and as required by law.  
 Faber told DeForest the commissioners were using him and that they were making a scapegoat of him. DeForest said he was doing everything he could to comply with the request for the information.

When asked why he wouldn't produce the requested information DeForest replied, almost desperately, "I don't see how in the hell I can. I can't give you what I don't have."  
 At this point Commissioner Holman entered the office and stood listening to the heated discussion between the two.  
 DeForest then continued his plea saying, "You ask for something I don't have and I can't give you what I don't have."  
 "You're after me, Mr. Faber and that's no secret around here. What am I going to do, take them (the commissioners) to court to get what you want?"  
 Holman then entered the battle saying, "The district's attorney (Reese Rozzell) is

running the district and I don't think we have any control here but I'm going to get up and walk on the desk at that meeting," referring to a special meeting being called on March 23.  
 "The board has never voted against him or requested a second opinion. It's clear he is running the district," said Holman.  
 "It is my opinion as a commissioner on the Aransas County Navigation District that Mr. Rozzell does not represent the best interest of the taxpayers of this district, he writes leases for individuals for the district to approve and then recommends approval and I don't understand how he can represent both parties legally," said Holman. "I think we should get a

new one (counselor), one who can do a good job for us."  
 Holman continued expressing his feelings about Rozzell saying, "He is asked by the board to perform certain duties and he didn't perform adequately. It takes him too long to do anything. Take the matter of my conflict of interest thing — it took him four months to file that and he did a poor job of it at that."  
 Holman said, "I think he is influenced by certain parties that would rather have their interests represented than the interests of the taxpayers."  
 He continued, "When the board votes to take action on a lease or sublease (See Rozzell, Page 12)

# Shopping center announced

 Plans for a \$5 million shopping development on Highway 35 between Traylor Avenue and Henderson were unveiled Wednesday in meetings at Live Oak Center and the weekly Rotary Club gathering.

Roger Seaman Jr., president of the Candy Stick Corporation in Corpus Christi, told civic, financial and business leaders the proposed new shopping development will include an Eckerd Drug store, a grocery store and other, smaller stores and shops in a 100,000 to 120,000-square-foot strip type shopping center with a central mini-mall.

Construction of the new center is scheduled to begin between June 1 and June 15, Seaman said, with projected completion date in early 1983. No construction contract has been awarded yet, he added, but work is under way on final plans for the project.

Bill Holland with the architectural firm of Total Design Four in Corpus Christi said the completed center will have some 550 parking spaces and will front on Highway 35 North.

"We hope to have more than 25 different types of stores," Holland said in a private interview Wednesday morning.

Seaman elaborated on this in his formal talks at Live Oak Center and in the Rotary meeting, saying plans call for "two or three different types of food businesses, high style ladies' and men's wear, shoes and several other shops."

Seaman introduced Michael D. Holden, real estate manager with the Houston Division of Eckerd Drug Company. Eckerd will be one of the major tenants to occupy space in the Harbor Oaks Village Shopping Center.

Seaman added he could not at this time reveal the name of the grocery company that will be the other major tenant but said the commitment to locate in the center is firm.

Speaking to an audience at Live Oak Center at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Seaman said his company has a "good shot" at getting a Wyatt's Cafeteria in the new shopping center and added, "We'll probably have a steak house and a lounge and we hope to have a local seafood restaurant."

"We hope to have a good beauty shop," he continued. "In the mini-mall, we hope to have things like a stock-broker."

"We're trying to put everything in there that Rockport will be proud of," he said.

At the noon Rotary meeting, he said the developers hope to include stores "that will cater to waterfront needs," and expressed an interest in having some local tenants in the development as well. He invited interested local business people to contact Bob Bernardy at Live Oak Real Estate.

Bernardy, who introduced Seaman at both of Wednesday's meetings, empha-

sized to the Rotarians that "We look forward to any local inquiries about the center at our (Live Oak's) office."

Seaman has successfully developed more than 60 subdivisions and 6,000 homes as well as apartment projects, condominiums and shopping centers in

the Coastal Bend area.

Among those present at one of both of Wednesday's meetings to hear the plans unveiled were Rockport and Fulton mayors Walter S. Falk Jr. and L.E. Casterline, members of the Rockport and Fulton city councils, representatives of

Allied Live Oak and First National banks and of the Rockport Area Chamber of Commerce and the Rockport-Fulton Tourist Association.

The 10 a.m. reception was co-hosted by Allied Live Oak Bank and Live Oak Real Estate.

## Annexation hearing set for Monday

An on-site hearing on proposed annexation of the land to be occupied by the new Rockport Country Club Estates development is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. Monday, March 22.

The hearing, conducted by Rockport's city council, will be on Tract III, reachable by driving west on Henderson Street (just north of the Live Oak Shopping Center) for approximately 900 feet.

A decision on whether to annex the land, based on the outcome of the 5 p.m.

hearing and an earlier hearing on March 8, is expected at the regular council session Monday night at City Hall.

That meeting will begin with a joint public hearing of the council and the city planning and zoning commission at 7:15 p.m. Included for consideration at that time is a request by Port Royal Development Inc. for a variance in the construction of its condominiums in Harbor Oaks.

Ron Hoover, representing the developers in the council's March 8 meeting, said Port Royal wants to build 48 condominiums on the tract and has enough overall acreage to build 54 units using conventional construction.

However, Hoover said, the company proposes to build the condos in unit of 12 fourplexes and, because of terrain, five of the fourplexes would have to be built on less than 8,800 square feet of land called for by city ordinance.

The developers are asking for a

variance from the ordinance to allow the construction.

In other action before the council Monday, council members are expected to adopt an ordinance that will grant a \$5,000 general homestead tax exemption to homeowners in Rockport.

The exemption was approved in an earlier council meeting and the ordinance scheduled for approval at the March 8 session but because of a legal technicality, City Attorney Allen Lee requested that the ordinance be deferred.

The council is also expected to call a special meeting to canvass April 3 city election returns. An April 5 canvass date has been suggested.

Other action before the council includes opening of bids for purchased of garbage pickup containers and dismantling of the elevated storage tank on Magnolia Street.

## Absentee voting gets good start

Absentee balloting in four city, county and school district elections got off to a good start this past week, according to reports from election officials.

At Rockport's City Hall, 10 absentee ballots had been cast in Ward 2 and five in Ward 1 as of Thursday morning, March 18.

Ward 1 Alderwoman Betty Jean Ward and Ward 2 Alderman Murray McMillan are both running unopposed for re-election, but the big race in Rockport this year is for the mayor's post where incumbent Walter S. Falk Jr. has opposition from Burt Mills, presently an alderman on the council, and Christi Vaughn.

Absentee voting, which began March 15 and will continue through March 30 for all of the April 3 elections, reached a count of 10 in Fulton Thursday morning where, again, there is a race for the city mayor's post.

In Fulton, incumbent Mayor L.E. Casterline is being opposed by June Carter. Another race is in place 3 where incumbent Elgin Dietz is being challenged by Jack Bohn. In the third Fulton

council post, Leslie Cole is running unopposed.

Absentee voting in Fulton for the city elections is at the Harbor Lights Cottages.

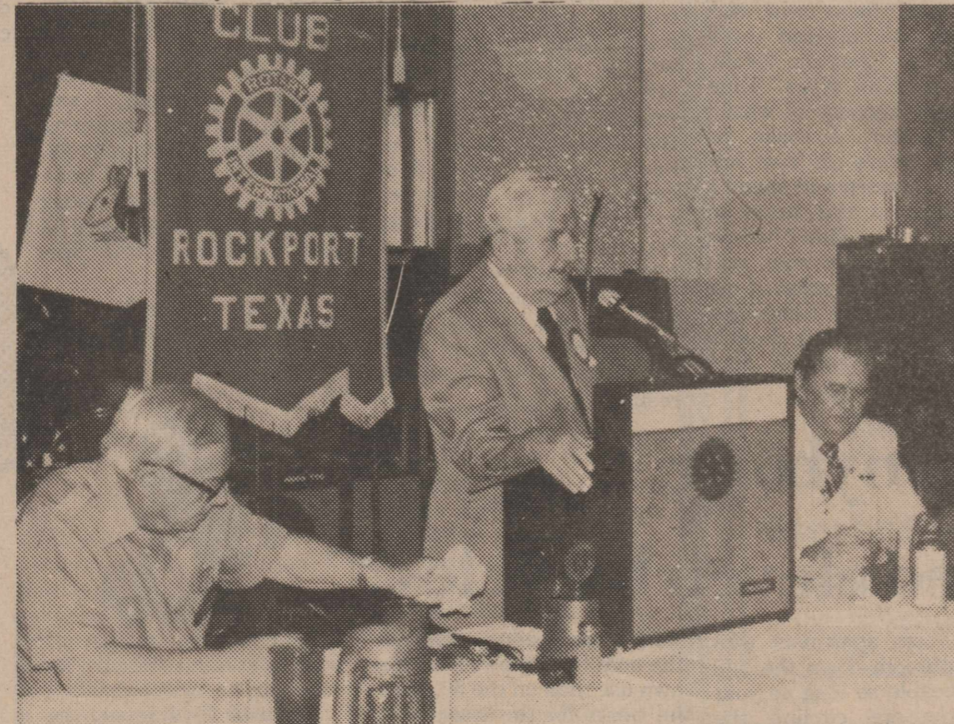
At the school administration building, headquarters for absentee voting in the Aransas County Independent School District elections, the absentee voting totalled five Thursday.

Voting in the county school district — as in the city of Fulton — is on an at-large basis with all school district voters qualified to cast their ballots for candidates for all positions.

Six candidates are vying for two spots on the school board this year. In Place 3, the race is between challenger Dede Dick and incumbent J.W. Harden. Contending for Place 6 are James Jennings, Annabelle Casterline Henry, Mitch Ammons and Nelda Lee.

The one county election coming up on April 3 is the local option bingo decision.

Absentee voting for this election is in the county clerk's office where, as of (See Voting, Page 12)

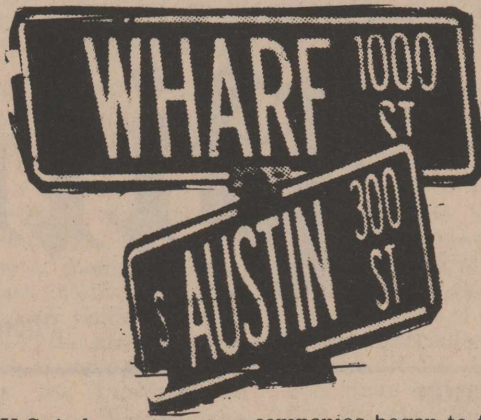
## It is time for country to get tough

TIME WAS, TWENTY OR more years ago, when I used to sort of yearn to reach three score years. Then I thought I could sound off at will, say things that might ordinarily earn me a punch on the nose, yet still freedom to boldly express my sometimes unorthodox thinking. Or cockeyed thinking.

Now, and perhaps because I may be a sissy, I don't at all fancy being told "If you weren't an old man I'd punch you." I can take the punch, but not the reference.

Meanwhile the years have taught me a simple fact; one can express his views firmly, even diplomatically, still annoy people who disagree, but at the same time stir intellectual rather than fistic debate. Example: "A person like Jane Fonda should have been hung for treason for support of North Vietnam." Now a decade later: "Women like Fonda aren't doing much in the way of protesting Vietnamese slaughter in Cambodia."

THE NEWSPAPER headline read: "How to



propel U.S. industry into the 21st century". Before reading the accompanying story I at once thought to myself, "That headline is a bit late." This nation was first warned, in my view, by the demise of its railroad industry. Japan, France, other countries years ago began to develop a mass transit, efficient rails transport system, the while our railroads slipped into decay. The result today is preposterously expensive highways laden and crowded with mini automobiles and monstrous sixteen wheel trucks. The while, railroad

companies began to fail and have since been taken over by a system which we call AMTRAC, a typical governmental bureaucracy.

We were warned but who gave heed? Now our own proud automotive and steel industries are falling into the pattern. Time was when American industry was the envy of the world. People came from abroad to learn and emulate us. Proudly we showed them how. Today the situation has reversed. We, proud Americans, go to Japan to learn. Still the

Japanese can produce a fuel efficient car for hundreds of dollars less than we, a ton of steel for more than a hundred dollars less. All especially amazing when one realizes that Japan must import all the natural resources. Face it, our auto, steel, textile, you name it industries are, or have become, obsolete when compared with those abroad. Skip the El Salvador, Guana, etc.

HA, EL SALVADORE. Ask me about that and first off I may tell you as before that it's a "damned if you do and damned if you don't" situation. But no. But let me repeat that we need to stand by that old-fashioned document, the Monroe Doctrine, also breaches of the Kennedy-Khrushchev 1962 agreement barring the Kremlin from sending offensive weapons to Cuba.

THE TIME HAS COME, if it's not too late for this country to "stand tough." Otherwise we shall fall to communism, not by force of arms but our lethargy, as Lenin promised nearly half a century ago. Our Achilles heel is Central and South America and there the Kremlin blisters us every day. For one I hold those countries in the same regard that they hold us. We have nothing in common, philosophically, governmentally or socially. It remains however that we live side by side and we must somehow learn to exist with each other. To do this I suggest that we at whatever cost halt any incursion from Cuba or Russia. If the people of those countries choose to fight each other, let them do it with sticks and stones, not weapons from Russia.

I am convinced that there is less chance of order in those nations than ever, therefore we should solidly, firmly close our southern borders, a Berlin wall if you like.

PRESENTLY HISPANICS arriving legitimately or otherwise (usually otherwise) are privileged as no other newcomers have ever been. To our detriment their language is becoming a second American language. Have Germans, Jews, French, Greeks, Italians ever been so privileged as to have their language taught in the public schools. Why have we become so weak that a foreign language be printed in legal notices, on our voting ballots?

AND SO, STILL "HANGING TOUGH", I fancy a proposal which I heard a few days ago. That is that all the Cuban criminals and degenerates which Castro dumped upon us not so long ago be taken to Guantanamo Bay and dumped over the fence onto their native soil. A rash statement, unworthy of one who presumes to be civilized? Exactly what I might have said not so many years ago. No more. We live in a harsh, tough world and the time has come for us to wake up to fact, end our namby-pambyism. I know there are those who will agonize, be angered, even charge me (heaven forbid) with a Klu Klux Klan mentality because of what I have written. I make no apology. Were old Tom Jefferson to return and spend a few days in the world in which we live today I believe he would agree with me. Here I leave the Jane Fondas, the Ted Kennedys, liberals, bleeding hearts agast. In that I find consolation. -- ahah.

## Largest deficits in history unacceptable to Dems, GOPs

The President has sent Congress a new budget tied to the largest deficits in our country's history. It takes for granted at least seven more years of red ink.

The Administration says the deficits — if all its proposals are adopted — will approach 100 billion in each of the next three years. The three-year total is \$273 billion — more than a quarter of the trillion-dollar deficit it took us 40 years and three wars to amass.

And even these projections may be way too low.

The Republican leadership of the Senate thinks they are. They warned the President in December that deficits in the years between 1982 and 1986 would total more than a trillion dollars. That's equal to our present total national debt.

Last week, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office (CBO) released its own appraisal. Its experts, too, feel that the President's deficits will be far greater — perhaps even double — what he is now predicting. CBO lists reasons for its appraisal: It believes the Administration is underestimating what some major programs will cost, overestimating what some taxes will yield, and being overly optimistic about interest rates and other key elements affecting the economy.

For example, the Administration assumes the interest rate on 91-day Treasury Bills will drop to an average of 11.7 percent this year —

from 14.1 percent last year.

But the trend of interest rates has been up, not down.

Despite the differences among the various predictions, on one thing everybody agrees:

President Reagan's program that was adopted in full last year, combined with every recommendation he has made so far this year, will result in the largest deficits under any administration, Democratic or Republican, in the peacetime history of this country.

The previous peacetime high was \$66.4 billion under President Ford. The last deficit under President Carter was \$57.9 billion. President Reagan says his deficit for 1982 will be \$98.6 billion, while the Congressional Budget Office puts it at \$111 billion.

The most disturbing aspect of these new deficits is their certain effect on interest rates. Continued high deficits put the Federal government in competition with the private sector for credit, and credit is always limited when the money market is tight. With the government having to borrow these gigantic sums, interest rates are sure to stay at towering levels. And the longer interest rates stay up, the longer the current recession will continue.

I am deeply dismayed by the Administration's turnabout on deficits. Last year the President told us that a balanced budget was a key element in his plan for

economic recovery.

Now some of the President's closest advisers and public spokesmen are telling us deficits don't matter.

For example, Will Niskanen, a member of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, recently said, "There is no direct or indirect connection between deficits and inflation."

This directly contradicts the President's own statement a year ago when he said, "We know now that inflation results from all the deficit spending."

I think deficits do matter. They do fire up inflation. They do increase unemployment. And they do keep interest rates high. These high rates, in turn, feed the deficit.

The Federal government is already paying interest of \$116 billion a year on our national debt. And, if the Republican senators are right, we are looking at a proposal that would double that national debt in the next five years.

I believe the people of this country want a balanced Federal budget. I believe you feel, as I do, that it is a necessary step if we are to find a permanent cure for the economic ills of this country.

That is why I co-sponsored a bill — shortly after I got to Congress last year — that would have required a balanced Federal budget by 1984. And it is why I supported a budget and tax package that, unlike the Administration's, would have led us much closer to that result.

New alternatives to set us back on course toward this goal are now being proposed by a variety of sources, both Democratic and Republican. I hope to keep you informed on the details of these alternative plans as they are developed.

## Interest rate drop a needed stimulant

President Reagan has privately assured Republican senators interest rates will decline appreciably in the next few months. He said he got this promise from Paul Volcker, Federal Reserve chairman, who exercises great power over policies affecting interest rates.

The president needs all the support he can get for his record-deficit, defense-oriented budget, which faces strong opposition among Republicans who want him to make drastic cuts in the deficit.

Many in Congress are blaming high interest rates for economic difficulties such as widespread unemployment.

The president reportedly told the Republican senators he was informed by Volcker that "the prime rate will

drop by three or four points by summer." A White House source said, however, that when Reagan talked with Volcker the prime rate was 17 percent. It has already dropped to 16 percent, the source said, and the prediction actually is for a further reduction of two or three points.

The prime rate is the rate banks charge their best customers, and changes in it generally indicate similar fluctuations in other interest rates, including consumer loan rates.

If reports concerning the president's private meeting with GOP Senate committee chairmen are accurate, his assurances represented the most optimistic remark heard from the administration, or Volcker, in several months about interest rates.

So far, since he submitted his budget, President Reagan has stuck to his position on the estimated \$100 billion deficit and his refusal to increase taxes or reduce the Pentagon outlay, two conditions Republicans have laid down in exchange for their support of the budget.

The president has made no public concessions to his budget opponents, leaving the impression in some quarters he is willing to compromise. However, Senate Republican Leader Howard Baker said after Reagan's meeting with the GOP committee heads he detected a willingness on the president's part to compromise and told reporters: "I think nothing is off-limits."

"I cannot accept the idea that a program which hasn't

really started is responsible for the displeasures of today," Reagan said of his proposed economic program which took effect last Oct. 1.

Taking a swing at the Democrats, he said, "Planned deficits and deliberate inflation as a supposed means of preserving prosperity was the policy of the Democratic-controlled Congress for most of this last half-century. . . . Has there been any indication they are not demanding a return to those past policies? If they are, they're doomed to failure."

The Rockport Pilot believes President Reagan will agree to a compromise before he will allow his program to fail. Half-a-loaf is better than no loaf at all.

## U.S. should investigate in El Salvador

If reports are true — and they appear to be — that security forces of the government of El Salvador have been wantonly killing men, women and children, the Reagan administration should reassess its priorities in that unhappy country.

The U.S. has been strongly backing the civilian-military junta that is ruling El Salvador in the government's struggle with leftist guerrillas, who have kept the country in turmoil for three years.

Amnesty International, headquartered in London, issued a report charging the government's security forces

"have been carrying out a systematic and widespread program of torture, 'disappearances' and individual and mass killings of men, women and children."

The report by the international human rights organization included testimony of eight survivors who told about the slaying of pregnant women, cutting out of fetuses, raping of young girls, throat-cuttings and beatings.

Much of the information that has been certified to U.S. officials in El Salvador was gathered by a three-member Amnesty mission

that interviewed Salvadoran refugees in seven camps in Mexico, Honduras, and Costa Rica last August. The mission did not go to El Salvador.

Church and human rights groups estimate more than 32,000 people have died in El Salvador's political bloodshed since the junta took power in 1979. They say the majority of the victims are civilians killed by the government's forces or its right-wing paramilitary supporters.

The Salvadoran Defense Ministry issued a report denying that government

soldiers massacred 30 or more civilians in a group of villages in the San Benito area, in late January.

Peasants in that area showed foreign reporters 14 skulls in a field and two wells smelling of decaying flesh as evidence supporting their claim of a massacre.

The Defense Ministry branded the reports "black propaganda."

The Rockport Pilot feels the U.S. government has a pressing obligation to investigate the wanton slaughter reports and then to determine whether or not it might be supporting the wrong side in El Salvador.

## State park visitations increase

AUSTIN — Visitation at state parks increased by almost 1.8 million in 1981 over the previous year, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The total for calendar

followed in total visitation by Galveston Island, Lyndon B. Johnson, Martin Dies, Jr., Bentsen Rio Grande and Garner State Parks.

Among parks offering overnight facilities, Garner State Park near Uvalde continued to be the most popular, hosting 165,734 overnight visitors during the year. Garner was followed by Inks Lake, Galveston Island, Huntsville, Martin Dies, Jr. and Tyler State Parks in popularity by campers.

The top six parks for day use visitation were San Jacinto Battleground, LBJ, Galveston Island, Martin Dies, Jr., Mustang Island and Bentsen Rio Grande.

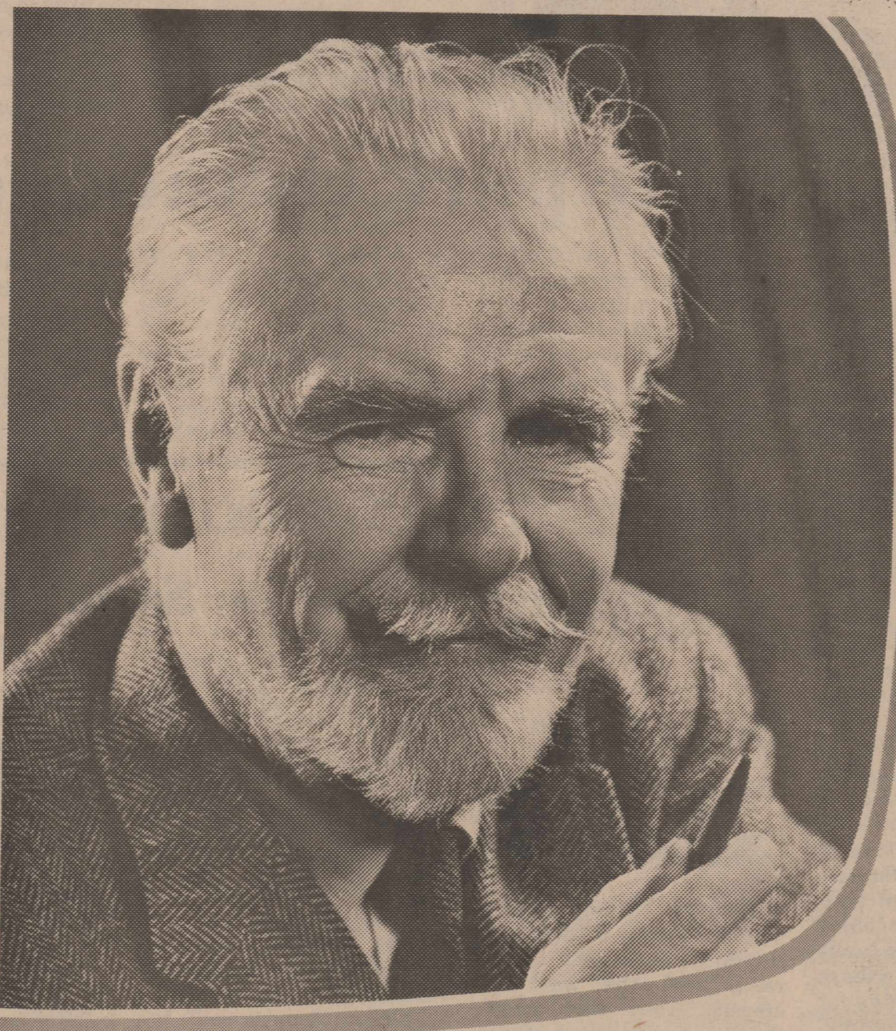

## The Shepherd's Staff

"A Little Sermon in a Nutshell"

J.B. Phillips, in his book "Letters to Young Churches," a translation of the New Testament Epistles, translates I Corinthians 16:13, 14 this way:

"Be on your guard, stand firm in the faith, live like men, be strong! Let everything that you do be done in love." Mr. Phillips says these verses are "A LITTLE SERMON IN A NUTSHELL."

Let us then note the main points of this little sermon.

First: the Christian is told to "Be on guard." This probably means to be on guard against temptation, or against evil and wickedness wherever it may be found. As good soldiers of Jesus Christ we need to stand guard against the enemy sin.

Second, we are told to "stand firm in the faith." The mark of a Great Christian is loyalty and steadfastness. The Christian life begins in Faith and it is maintained through Faith. When the burdens of life become hard we are to stand firm with patience,

hope and confidence in God's good purpose for us.

Third, our little sermon says we are to "live like men, be strong." This means we are to be honorable in all of our dealings with men; that we are to be devoted to the truth; that we are to be courageous in our loyalty to Jesus Christ; that we are to have all the qualities of ideal manhood flavored with the Christian Spirit. Above all, the Christian is to have the strength of clean and pure living.

Fourth and finally, our sermon emphasizes love. As followers of Jesus we are to let all our actions be guided by love. God in giving His Son to us taught us what love is. It is self-giving. God calls on us to follow Jesus in self-giving. This old world with all of its problems will be transformed through people who give themselves unselfishly for God and others.

Here then are four truths by which we can live: Be of your guard. Stand firm in the Faith. Live like a man. Let everything you do be done in love.

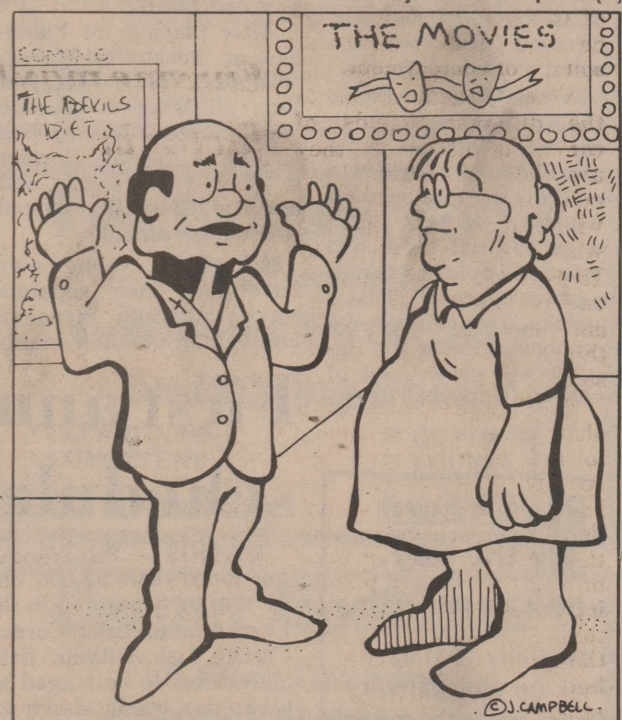
Burial will be in the I.O.O.F. Cemetery. Mr. Mills died Tuesday, March 16, in an Aransas Pass nursing home.

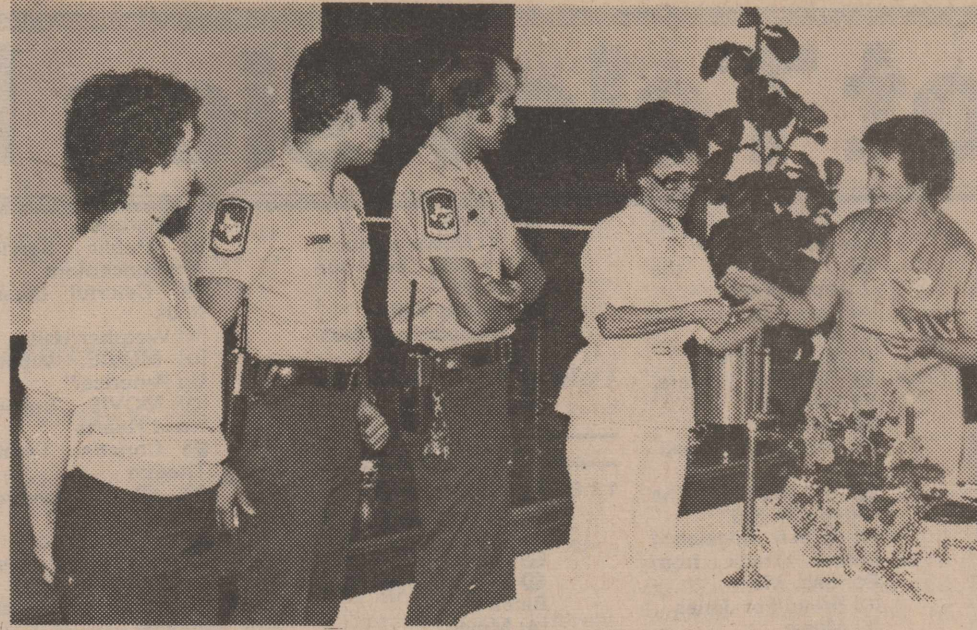
## 4-H Club meets

## Bon Appetit! by Ann Thomas

It may seem a bit early for some of you, but Easter is so special that I wanted to print your holiday menu early so there will be ample time to do

your grocery shopping for the items you'll be needing. This particular menu has been a family favorite for quite some time. I hope it will become a part of your Easter celebration, too.

### BAKED HAM

Begin preparing home-cured ham the day before you serve it. Long soaking and cooking make country ham a special treat.

1 home-cured Smithfield or Virginia ham  
1 c. dark-brown sugar  
8 cloves

Soak the ham overnight in cold water to cover. Drain, scrub with a stiff brush, and place in a large pot. Cover with water, heat and simmer for 25 minutes per pound. Add more water as it cooks away. Allow the ham to cool in the outerskin and most of the fat. The ham is now ready to eat, but a brief glazing and baking will make it even better. Preheat the oven to 350 F. and place the ham on a rack in a shallow roasting pan, and rub it all over with brown sugar. Stud it with cloves and bake for 10 minutes per pound, until the meat is heated through and the glaze is melted and shining. Place on a large platter and surround with garnishes of your choice.

### CREAM CHEESE CORN

My daughter, Debbie, brought this recipe home with her from her Home Ec. class and it's been to more public get-togethers where food is served than a dog has fleas. Don't be turned off before you try it. I promise it will become one of your favorite dishes.

2 10 oz. pkgs. frozen whole kernel corn  
2 3 oz. pkgs. cream cheese  
2 T. onion salt  
1/2 stick butter  
1/4 c. cream (homo milk if you don't have any cream)

Put the corn in a saucepan large enough to accommodate all the ingredients. Turn on mod. low heat and let corn simmer in just the moisture in which it is packed. Stir frequently to avoid burning. Add the butter, the cream cheese which has been cut into small pieces, cream, and onion salt. Cook on low, stirring constantly, until all the cheese is melted and coats the corn. The longer this sits the better the flavor. Serve it hot, although some people I know like it cold just as well.

### ASPARAGUS

The shorter the cooking time, the fresher and greener the color.  
24 large asparagus (serves four)  
Wash the asparagus and cut or break off the tough, colorless, woody bottom on each stalk. Peel with a vegetable peeler, lightly near the top and more deeply toward the bottom. Plunge the spears into a large pot of boiling water and boil gently until the bottoms are just tender when pierced with a knife. Begin testing after 5-8 minutes. Drain well and serve with melted butter.

### SOUR CREAM FRUIT SALAD

2 cans mandarin oranges, drained well

2 cans pineapple chunks, drained well  
1 bag mini-marshmallows  
1 bag flaked coconut  
1 large carton sour cream

Mix all of the ingredients except the oranges, which will be added last. Cover and keep in the refrigerator overnight before serving so that the flavor have time to meld.

### HOT ROLLS

These are feather light! This recipe makes only a dozen so you may want to double it.

1 pkg. dry yeast  
4 T. soft butter  
1 T. sugar  
3/4 t. salt  
1 egg  
3/4 c. warm milk

Stir the yeast into 1/4 c. warm water and let it stand for five minutes to dissolve. Mix the butter, sugar, salt, egg, milk, and dissolved yeast in a large bowl and beat until smooth. Add the flour and beat vigorously until well blended. Cover and let rise in a warmer place for about an hour. Stir down and fill buttered muffin pans until half full. Cover and let rise for about 30 minutes. Preheat oven to 400 F. and bake rolls for 15-20 minutes.

### COCONUT-LIME CAKE

This wonderful recipe comes from none other than Ponchartrain Hotel's pride and joy, Annie Laurie Squalls.

2 1/4 c. sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 c. sugar  
1 t. salt  
1 t. bkg. soda  
1 t. bkg. powder  
6 T. butter  
1/2 c. shortening  
1 1/2 t. vanilla  
1 c. buttermilk  
4 egg whites (beaten separately)

1/2 c. flaked coconut  
Preheat oven to 350 F. Sift together the dry ingredients. Add butter, shortening, vanilla, buttermilk, and blend. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Fold into the batter and mix 2 minutes more. Pour into 2 greased 9x1 1/2" round cake pans. Bake 25-30 minutes. Cool. Spread with Lime filling then frost.

### LIME FILLING

3/4 c. sugar  
2 T. cornstarch  
2/3 c. water  
2 egg yolks  
1 t. grated lime peel  
2 T. butter  
1 drop green coloring  
1/3 c. lime j.c.

In saucepan, blend sugar and cornstarch. Gradually stir in water. Stirring slightly beaten egg yolks and lime j.c. Cook while stirring over medium heat until it thickens. Remove from heat. Stir in lime, butter, color and cool. Spread on top of first layer when it's cool.

### FLUFFY FROSTING

1 c. sugar  
1/3 c. water  
1/4 t. cream of tartar  
1 t. pure vanilla  
1/8 t. salt  
2 egg whites  
Combine sugar, water, cream of tartar, and salt in saucepan. Bring to a boil. Stir constantly. Place egg whites in a bowl and very slowly add the sugar-water mixture while beating constantly at high speed until peaks form. Frost cake. Sprinkle with coconut. This is really good if you go to the extra trouble to use fresh coconut.

## Growing Child Infant needs to hear your voice

A baby is born with all the equipment needed to develop speech and language - ready to go.

"Growing Child," the monthly child development newsletter, reports that from birth on, an infant vocalizes - makes noise with his voice. (In fact, there is even some evidence that suggest he may do this at times even before he is born.)

The first sounds the baby makes are cries. These are his response to body feelings such as hunger, pain, or other discomfort. At first, when the baby is content, he will sleep most of the time. Soon, though he will begin to make sounds of contentment.

When parents attend to the different sounds of comfort or discomfort, they are helping establish a communication system which is crude at first but which is very important. The system works like this: one person makes sounds and another person does things in response to those sounds.

The infant's inborn gifts also include a tendency toward listening and responding. Newborns are known to respond to sudden, loud noises by moving their entire bodies at once or by an increase in breathing or heart rate. Biologists think that the infant, like the very young animal, is born to respond to a wide range of sounds which aren't specific.

Very quickly though, the infant's response becomes more specific to the sounds he hears from his parents. He learns to associate a soothing voice with pleasant situations, a smiling face and loving words. Parents who continually talk to their babies during bathing, feeding, dressing and playing are shaping the

child's future communication skills.

If a child doesn't have words to listen to, his language development will be affected. It is obvious that a hearing defect will seriously interfere with a child's language and speech development. It is also important to realize that the absence of tender loving talk from a parent will be almost as serious a handicap. So talk to your baby!

## Enzyme may be factor in overweight

COLLEGE STATION - have you ever wondered why some people can eat anything and not gain an ounce while others eat almost nothing and gain weight?

Some researchers now say that heavy individuals may actually have a predisposing factor that causes obesity, says Dr. Cass Ryan-Crowe, a food and nutrition specialist.

She explains that lower levels of an enzyme, adenosine triphosphatase (ATPase) were found in obese subjects. ATPases is necessary for pumping sodium and potassium across cell membranes.

"This exchange process accounts for 30 to 40 percent of the body's total energy needs. Lower levels of this enzyme may mean that overweight people use less energy or calories for this process, so they store the surplus as fat," she says.

## Dieting can be delicious

Dieting can be delicious, says Annette Reddell Hegan, a seafood consumer education specialist. Try adding seafood - fish is a good one - to your next low-calorie diet plan.

Hegan is on the marine advisory staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

By using fish, you can plan a variety of meals for you and your family, the specialist adds.

### BAKED FLOUNDER IN WINE SAUCE

2 lbs. flounder or other fish filets  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
2 medium sliced tomatoes  
2 Tbs. flour  
2 Tbs. diet margarine  
1/2 cup skim milk  
1/3 cup dry white wine  
1/2 tsp. crushed basil  
Chopped parsley

Sprinkle filets on both sides with salt and pepper. Arrange filets in a single layer in a greased baking dish. Place tomato slices over the top of the fish. In small saucepan, blend flour into margarine. Add milk gradually and cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in wine and

basil. Pour sauce over top of tomatoes. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Sprinkle with fresh chopped parsley. Makes six servings.

I moved from L.A., Calif. to Fulton with my wife and six cats. Two of my cats have been spayed by different veterinarians. When the first cat was spayed, the vet used a blue color suture similar to the line I use on my fishing reel. The other vet used a wire stitch. Why?

Dear Sir:

There are many different kinds of suture material. Some are designed to be used in the skin, some for deeper, buried tissues, and many can be used in either place. In most situations, the selection of the type of suture material is largely based on personal prefer-

ence of the surgeon. If I knew, or thought it likely a certain cat was a "licker" or a "chewer" (one that would likely try to chew the stitches out), wire would be the preferred material. A cat will seldom lick or chew if metal stitches are used.

## Talking

### about coleus

The Coleus is a tender plant with colored leaves or attractive flowers. They are natives principally of Java and tropical Africa and belong to the Mint family, Lamiaceae. Coleus is the Greek for sheath, and refers to the arrangement of the stamens.

The modern varieties of Coleus with brightly colored leaves are descended from C. Blumei, which has bronze-colored, nettle-like leaves. The leaf coloring is varied and ranges through yellow, pink, red, crimson and green. The flowers of the colored-leaved kinds are comparatively inconspicuous. These plants require a minimum temperature of fifty-five degrees and must be potted in rich, well-drained soil when grown as house or greenhouse specimens. When used for outdoor summer beds and borders they thrive in any good soil. They need full sunshine.

To keep pot specimens shapely, the tips of the shoots should be pinched occasionally to promote bushiness. Plants that have filled their containers with roots should receive applications of diluted liquid fertilizers at weekly intervals.

The most important flowering Coleus is C. thyrsoideus, a native of Central Africa and a perennial that grows to a height of three to four feet and bears bright blue flowers of great decorative value. An important point to remember about this plant is that if it becomes necessary to pick off faded leaves this should be done with an upward pull; if a leaf is removed with a downward pull a long piece of skin will be stripped from the stem and remain attached to the base of the leaf that is pulled off.

Another good flowering species is C. shirensis, which is also a native of Central Africa. It grows about three feet tall and flowers a month or two later than C. thyrsoideus. It, too is a perennial. Its flowers are paler blue than those of C. thyrsoideus.

Coleus Fredericii, a native of Angola, is an annual or biennial kind that has richly colored deep purple flowers in the early spring. It grows to a height of three to four feet and forms well-branched bushy specimens.

The Coleus is best used in this area as border plants for our flower beds and re-planted each year or as a pot plant for our homes to add color. Let's color our summer with Coleus.

### Cities get sales tax rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed - 29 percent over the same period in 1981.

The city of Rockport received a check for \$13,413.60 for its share of the tax refund up \$1,155.31 over the same period last year.

Payments for 1982 to Rockport total \$72,711.11 an increase of \$7,298.40 over the same period for

1981, an increase of 6.28 percent.

Fulton received a check for \$1,347.92 for the reporting period showing an increase of 13.80 percent over the same period last year.

Fulton has received a total of \$8,098.19 for 1982.

This record payment reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution saying, "Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value."



**Accidental deaths primed by alcohol, expert says**

"If you die prematurely, chances are it will be in an accident of some kind - and that accident could be alcohol-related." Those were the words of Corpus Christi Osteopathic Hospital's CAREUNIT program Coordinator, Henry Harlow, here today, speaking out on the relationship of alcohol to accidents.

Harlow explained that the 106,550 fatal accidents in the U.S. last year were the leading cause of premature death. More than 50 percent of those deaths were alcohol-related, Harlow added. "Most people are aware," he said, "that at least half of all automobile fatalities are caused by drunk driving. But

it's not so well-known that many other types of accidents - home, industrial and recreational - are alcohol-related, too. Accidents and alcohol can be deadly partners."

Harlow said that the staff at the CAREUNIT, a local alcoholism treatment center, believes that almost all alcohol-related accidents are avoidable. "The depressant effects of alcohol, especially in the problem drinker, are what create such high accident risks. Alcoholics have almost 10 times the chance of dying in a fire than others do. And the risk of dying from a fall is 16.3 times greater for the alcoholic. It isn't always the drinker who suffers, as

victims of drunk driving accidents know. The tragic thing is these kinds of accidents could be avoided if treatment for alcoholism were more readily prescribed."

Harlow said that the CAREUNIT, part of a nationwide network of treatment centers run by Comprehensive Care Corporation, advocates wider recognition of alcoholism as a disease and thus more treatment of it. "By conservative estimates," Harlow warned, "there are 14 million alcoholics and problem drinkers in this nation. With any other disease that contributed so highly to our national accident rate, we'd have an

extremely serious problem, bordering on epidemic."

Comprehensive Care Corporation, the nation's largest private provider of alcoholism treatment, treats more than 35,000 patients annually in programs stretching across more than 67 communities in 25 states and has another 30 programs awaiting government approval. Treatment is provided in contract units (CAREUNITs) based in community hospitals and in freestanding alcoholism hospitals. Employee Assistance Programs to aid businesses in helping troubled employees can be developed by the CAREUNIT Program at no cost to employers.

**Conference on Aging finds universal needs**

The widely publicized and controversial White House Conference on Aging is over. Now, the delegates are back at home, working quietly to transform the work done there on a theoretical level to action that will mean real benefits for the aged.

Congressional Delegate Jo Ann Luckie said projected actions were divided into three categories: those which can be accomplished only at the national level and which require strong national policy and leadership; those which can be carried out at the state level; and those which can be accomplished within the communities.

Extension services, which function in every county of the Coastal Bend and are already working with the elderly in many ways are looking at some additional possibilities. Some services are proposing training sessions for older people who need part time employment

for supplementary income. They would be trained to go into the homes of the frail elderly who can remain independent only if they have such assistance as shopping, meal preparation, and other tasks. This would serve as double purpose, providing employment for the stronger elderly and keeping the frail elderly out of institutions.

Some churches and organizations are looking at another possibility to serve the same dual purposes. This would be coordination of a chore service. This would provide a pool of handmen who would go into the home of older people who can no longer do maintenance and yardwork and accomplish the work for a small fee.

Mrs. Luckie says these effects carry out two of the highest priorities at the White House Conference, to open up opportunities for the elderly to improve their economic status and to remain in their own homes as long as possible.

Another high priority was

to place more emphasis on pre-retirement planning. Older people are much better able to deal with the vicissitudes of aging if they have prepared for this time financially, from a standpoint of health, and by developing interests and skills that enable them to keep contributing to life around them.

There are movements in this direction in the Coastal Bend. Colleges are offering pre-retirement planning. Consultants are working with employee groups. Some industries such as Central Power and Light and DuPont have already made pre-retirement planning an employee benefit.

There were 14 committees at the White House Conference. Mrs. Luckie served on the education committee. She says education is being approached in three ways. One is educational programs available to the elderly. Another is making it possible for the elderly to use their experience and resources to help the educational system

teach young people. The third is education of the public about the processing of aging. This would help dispell stereotypes and help people to think of aging not in terms of years but in terms of capabilities.

The Conference opened up two areas that are being given in-depth consideration for the first time. One is that of older women, who are called the "new poor." Mrs. Luckie said that so many women are surviving their husbands and living to be 85 or older, and many of these women do not have any of the types of resources that are important to them. Another is increased attention to the frail elderly, as planning must take into account the fact that more and more people are living more and more years.

Mrs. Luckie said the universality of needs was one of the realizations of the conference. But the need to deal with them on home ground is the ongoing emphasis.

## Property tax breaks for vets

Aransas County veterans with service-connected disability or the surviving spouse or minor child of a disabled veteran may qualify for property tax breaks, says Jack Groseclose, chief

appraiser for the Aransas County Appraisal District.

"The Texas Constitution provides that the Legislature may exempt from taxation property owned by a disabled veteran, the sur-

viving spouse of a disabled veteran or the minor child of a disabled veteran or a person killed while on active duty," Groseclose said.

To qualify for the tax exemptions, the spouse must not have remarried. A minor child may qualify for the exemption if the spouse does not survive the veteran and the child is under 18 and married.

The amount of the disabled veterans' exemption is based on the percentage of disability. Groseclose said, but may range from \$1,500 to \$3,000 exempted from the assessed value of any property owned on Jan. 1 of the tax year.

The exemption may be applied to any one piece of property designated by the individual. Groseclose added, and the application must be filed in the Appraisal district office before May 1.

The applicant is required to present documents stating the percentage of service-connected disability, either from the Veterans Administration or a branch of the armed services. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death or age may also be required.

Application forms and additional information on the exemption are available at the appraisal district office on Allen Street.

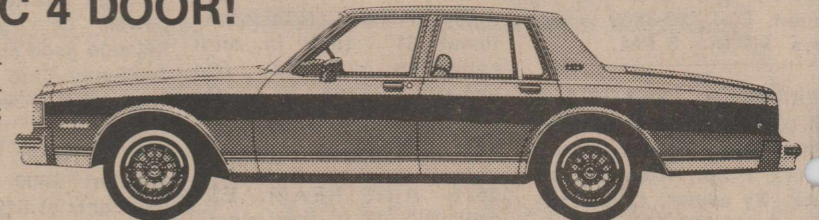

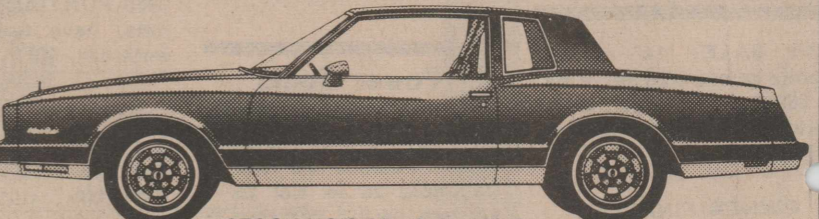
