Lions Hear Talk On Bible History

"Romance of the English Bible" was the title of an address made Tuesday by Rev. John Fitzgerald, pastor of the First Methodist Church here at the regular luncheon-meeting of the Matador Lions.

He explained in interesting detail from the beginning of the Old Testament translation in Greek, to the Revised Standard Bible of today.

Rev. Fitzgerald said the First English Bible in 1382 was translated from Latin. He said italics were used in the Bible, not for emphasis, but because no Greek word existed for the English word. The Geneva Bible of 1644 was the "Bible of the Puritans" and known as the revised Great Bible.

He said the King James version was rewritten in 1611 by 54 of England's greatest scholars and was "A product of the Golden Age of English literature," and still was the most accepted Bible in our language. Rev. Fitzgerald was introduced by Lions program sponsor Bryan Cammack.

Three Are Victims Of 2-Car Collision

A FORMER MATADOR resident, Mrs. Elbert Segler, 55, of 6111 Ave. O., Lubbock, and two great-nieces, Elaine Nolan, 4-months old, and Laurel Nolan, 6, have died as a result of a two-car crash Sunday afternoon at the north city limits of Roscoe on U.S. 84. The children are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Nolan Jr., of Alamogordo, N.M. Mrs. Nolan is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Howell of Amarillo, former teachers in the Flomot school system.

Mrs. Segler was dead on arrival at Simmons Memorial Hospital in Sweetwater, and the baby, Elaine Nolan died about 7:45 p.m. at the same hospital. Laurel Nolan was transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, where she died about 5 a.m. Monday.

Five Others Injured
Five other persons, including the children's mother and two other sisters, were injured.

Mrs. Nolan, 34, an Alamogordo school teacher, and her two daughters, Paige, 7, and Ellen, a twin sister of Elaine, were listed in fair condition at Simmons Memorial Hospital in Sweetwater Monday.

Also hospitalized there are Mrs. Albert Taylor, 36, and her son, Charles Mike Taylor, 15, Star Rt. Sweetwater. Mrs. Taylor is in serious condition with facial lacerations and possible head and internal injuries. Charles Taylor is listed in fair condition.

Mrs. Segler, with her niece and children, had been in Sweetwater visiting her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Wilson, and were returning to Lubbock.

Mrs. Wilson was critically injured and her 13-year-old daughter, Mary Jayne, was killed in another multiple fatality accident west of Roscoe last December.

Mrs. Segler had lived in Lubbock the past 16 years, and was an employee of the Reese AF Base branch of the Lubbock National Bank the last 12 years.

Services Held Wednesday
Funeral services for Mrs. Segler were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church, Lubbock.

Officiating were the Rev. Norris Fuller, nephew of Mrs. Segler and Baptist pastor of La Puente, Calif.; Dr. Ralph Grant, pastor of the Lubbock First Baptist Church; and the Rev. Leland Spurrier, pastor of Oakwood Methodist Church, Lubbock.

Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park under direction of Sanders Funeral Home.

Bodies of the two Nolan children were transferred to Mullins-Hamilton Funeral Home in Alamogordo, where services were pending yesterday.

Also among survivors for the children are the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Nolan of Lubbock.

EVERYBODY LOVES A PARADE and everybody is invited to take part in the 75th Anniversary Celebration of Motley County parade here Friday afternoon (2:00 p.m.) August 5th. Parade chairman Bundy Campbell urges everyone to enter. There are no restrictions on vehicles, age or kind. Riders or any kind of animals are welcome, floats and special novelty entries will be assigned places. The Amarillo Air Force "Golden Spread Band" will provide the marching music. Campbell said the entries would be divided into 10-year eras, beginning with 1891, to the present time.

Route of the parade is as follows: It will start on Main Street, north of the Hackberry Branch of Ballard Creek bridge, and proceed south. At Hazel street the parade will turn east one block to Eubank Street, and then north to the courthouse square. General assembly will be in the area north of the former Spears gin on the north end of Main Street.

Numerous organizations are preparing floats that will take part in the parade, according to reports. Transportation for the Air Force Band is being provided by Wylie Oil Company of Matador and Farmers & Ranchers Livestock Commission Co. of Lubbock, who will jointly sponsor the bus.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Cattlemen cannot expect continued gains on Bermudagrass with the hot dry weather of July and August at hand. During hot weather and short moisture periods grass loses some of its nutritive value, and an animal's forage intake decreases. The result is a drop in gains.

In Texas A&M experiments, steers averaging 500 pounds each were grazed on Bermudagrass. Half were given 5 pounds of sorghum grain each day and the other half got none. Those that received no supplement gained 1.2 pounds a day from April 28 to July 7 and gained only 4 pounds a day from July 7 to September 15. On the other hand, animals that received the supplemental feed gained 1.7 pounds a day during the first period and 1.1 pounds during the last period.

If a cattlemen wants additional gain on his cattle, grain should be fed at the rate of at least 1% of the animals body weight per head a day. To finish cattle out for slaughter it will require as much as 2.5% body weight in concentrate feed, or a full feed.

The first check of the chemical weed control plot on the E. G. Reed farm at Flomot was made June 29 with planting and treatment made on June 14. Four rows of each material were repeated three times and for the check, a frame 9'x48" was placed over the center of three of the four rows of each reapplication.

Findings were as follows: Check plots—45 weeds and grass; Amben—14 weeds and grass; Enide—1 grass; Vernam—2 grass; Treflan—no weeds or grass; PCNB—12 weeds and grass; It was noted that where Enide was used, plants were stunted, and some burning on the edge of the leaves was noted. Where Vernam was used, stunting was also apparent, and the ground was baked more. PCNB was not used for weed control, but as a check for diseases.

Colorado grass and crab grass were in the area, along with some careless weeds. Another check will be made later in the year to determine the residual effect of the chemicals.

The cotton seedling disease demonstration established by Caldwell Smith of Roaring Springs on June 26 was checked July 14 with the following findings. On the untreated

check plot, 55% of the plants had seedling disease, but on the area treated with Demosan 65W, only 7% of the plants were infected. If the weather cooperates, we may get some cost return information from this test.

Farmers and ranchers will not file a claim for refund of federal tax on gasoline used on their farm and/or ranch as they have done in past years. Instead, the refund of federal tax on gasoline used on or after July 1, 1965, must be claimed as a

credit on their annual income tax return.

This credit will first be taken on the return for the first full year beginning after June 30, 1965. If the return is filed on a calendar year basis, the credit for gasoline tax refund taken on their 1966 return will include tax on gasoline used in the period from July 1, 1965 through December 31, 1966.

The refund is claimed as credit in a manner similar to the credit for tax withheld on wages.

A seedling disease plot was established by Roy Grundy at Whiteflat on May 23. This was checked on July 12 with the following findings. In the check plot, 44% of the plants showed seedling disease symptoms.

Where Terracolor Super X was used, only 6% of the plants were infected, but where a light rate of application was put down due to failure of the applicator, 14% of the plants were diseased.

In another area where Terracolor DiSyston was used, only

3% of the plants were affected while at the light application rate, 12% of the plants were affected.

In the third test plot where Thiamet-PCNB was used, 10% of the plants showed seedling disease symptoms.

Due to poor stand and damage by wind and sand along with applicator malfunction, it is hard to obtain cost data, but it does appear that earlier the planting, the more the need for seedling disease control.

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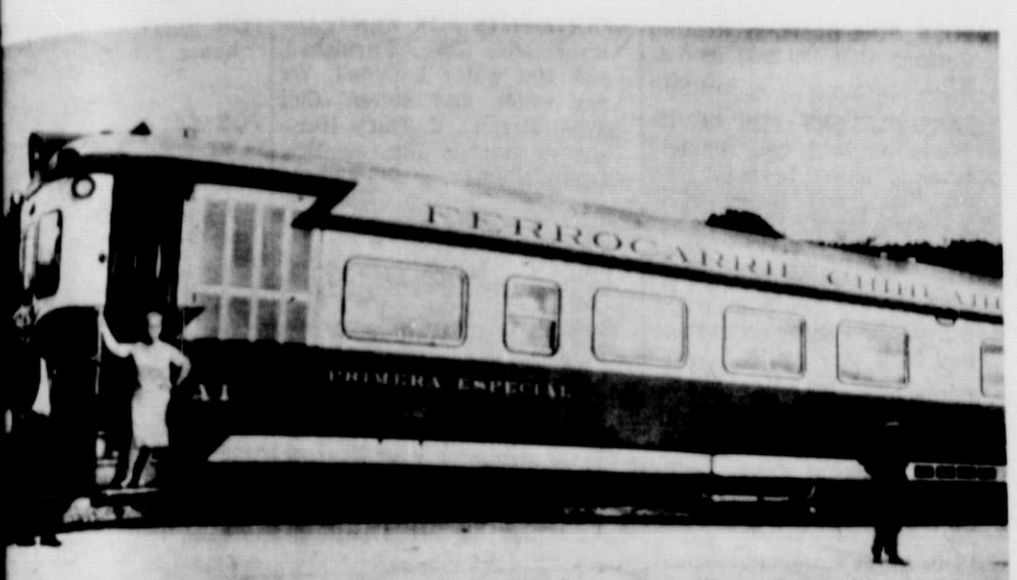

A Foreign Adventure for a Song

RUNNING ALONG SIDE, dogs
at the gleaming Fiat motor
cars of the Ferrocarril de Chi-
huahua al Pacifico as they pass
through the innumerable sta-
tions between Chihuahua and the
Pacific 400 miles away. The
need the exercise because
there are few automobiles for
passengers to chase. Passengers
notice the dogs because
they are trying to see both
of the great picture win-
dows in the modern air-condi-
tioned coach.

These fortunate passengers
embarking on an adventure
might well be an inexist-
ent unit of an independent unit
powerful diesel motors be-
hind, and an extremely capable
man at the controls. The
train will stop many times and
often before it reaches the
canyon. It will stop at most of
the small stations to receive
passengers, but it will slow more
with the blast of the air
to allow horses, cows,
hogs, chickens, and peo-
ple to get off the tracks so the
train may proceed. Despite
the perfect control of the motor-
ist, some of the livestock may
not succeed.

Hills are Old and Steep
West from Chihuahua City the
road starts its climb into the
hills. The hills are old and
high in most places, but they
are actually mountains with their
edges taken away by the
forces of erosion. Most of
the area is grazing land, fenced
with rock. In places the fences
appear to cling to the steep
sides of the hills. Hundreds of
fences may be seen in all
directions.

Like the rock fences, the rail-
road clings to the sides of the
hills, and within a short
distance trees begin to appear in
the picture windows. The road
almost one continuous curve
along the coastal plains. Looming
in the distance are mountain
peaks with strange, fantastic
formations.

The adventure has started.
There is a world in which
the Creator stored the beauty
that was left after each land had
its share. Sometime in past eons
there were convulsions of the
earth that created anomalous
mountains, rivers, canyons and

waterfalls and their splendor
is now visible from the railroad
which engineers said could not
be built.

World's Newest Railroad
It is the newest railroad in
the world and the trip would be
the greatest travel bargain in
the world if there were nothing
more to see than the engineer-
ing feat. More than 70 tunnels,
one of which is a mile in length,
and half as many bridges, cross
canyons and great rivers. Often
the passenger can look straight
down from his window into
depths that might be the view
from a plane window. On the
opposite side, passengers are
looking at a rock wall that has
been cut away to create the rail-
road bed. Despite the rugged
terrain, the coach moves smooth-
ly and quietly over welded rails.

The coach will stop at El
Divisadero, rim of the mighty
Copper Canyon, which is deeper
and more than three times the
length of Grand Canyon. Here,
the primitive Tarahumara In-
dians will offer their crafts
(drums, violins carved by hand,
and woven baskets). Often
mothers and children have
no more than rocks brought
from the mysterious depths
of the canyon. They live in
caves and are a handsome peo-
ple who pursue a Stone Age
existence.

It is in this strange mile-high
world that the adventurer will
see small patches of earth
tilled by a team of oxen or with
horses and burros.

Trains Are Attraction
Everyone comes to see the
trains. Almost every stop has
its share of box-car homes
where live the maintenance
crews. Flower boxes, colorful
with blossoms, hang on the sides
of the windowed freight cars
and children are in every door-
way and at every siding. They
wave to the passengers, but
their parents usually offer no
more than a smile. There is ex-
tensive freight traffic on the
railroad and the Fiat coaches
constitute a small part of its use.

In many places the children
are well clothed, but in remote
villages they may be without
clothing. There is little evi-
dence of wealth along the railroad
line except in areas where mod-
ern industries are in operation.
The great paper mill along the

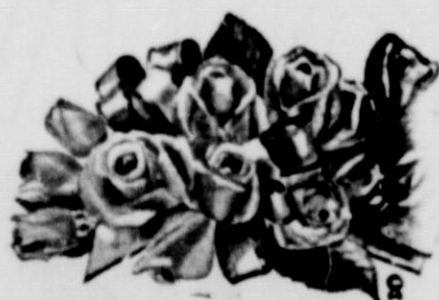
