Two Acquitted of Traffic Charge In Burk City Court Jury Trial

A jury trial in Burk Burnett Corporation Court Friday resulted in not guilty verdicts for two youths charged with traffic violations.

The two, James Alexander, 21, and Tommy Hinant, were charged with contest for speed, which allegedly occurred at about 11 p.m. in the 1000 block of State Highway 240 on August 23.

They were charged and arrested by Police Sergeant A. L. Bilyeu and Officer Scott Newton, with driving approximately three-tenths of a mile from the vicinity of the Dairy Mart, to the Boomtown Bowl parking lot, side by side.

The four-man and two-woman jury heard conflicting testimony in the case. The youths

said they drove side by side only long enough to agree to meet at the bowling lanes parking lot.

A friend, Tommy Key, testified as the defendants did, saying the side by side driving was a matter of seconds, and no agreement to race was made.

Defense Attorney Bill Browning of Wichita Falls told the jury this city had failed to produce testimony in accordance with the charge, which was engaging in a contest for speed.

Testimony in the case took almost two hours.

City Judge F. E. Cruce, who presided, said it was the first jury case in corporation court in more than five years.

NO OATH OF ALLEGIANCE?

Congressman Otto Passman, of Louisiana, made a trip to Thailand recently, and returned with a report of being "shocked to hear" members of the Peace Corps on duty there publicly voicing their opposition to US policy in Vietnam.

On the other hand, the Director of the Peace Corps, Jack Vaughn, has stated that it is not necessary for Corpsmen to support this nation's foreign policy while serving overseas. In fact, when Rep. Passman indicated that he was of the opinion that corpsmen should impart a correct American image, Vaughn informed him that he was misunderstanding "the concept of the Peace Corps and what it is setting out to do."

Perhaps Mr. Vaughn should inform all of us as to the "concept" and the goals of the Corps. Is it a separate entity, or an extension of the United States? There are many Americans who believe that if South Vietnam falls into the hands of the Communists, then Thailand would be a next logical point for a so-called war of liberation by the Reds.

Thus, Thailand has a direct stake in the war to keep South Vietnam out of the clutches of Ho Chi Minh. Currently, there are more than 2,700 Thai troops serving along with our own and those of our allies in South Vietnam. The Thai government has offered another 5,000.

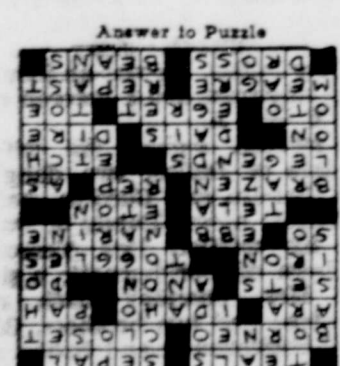
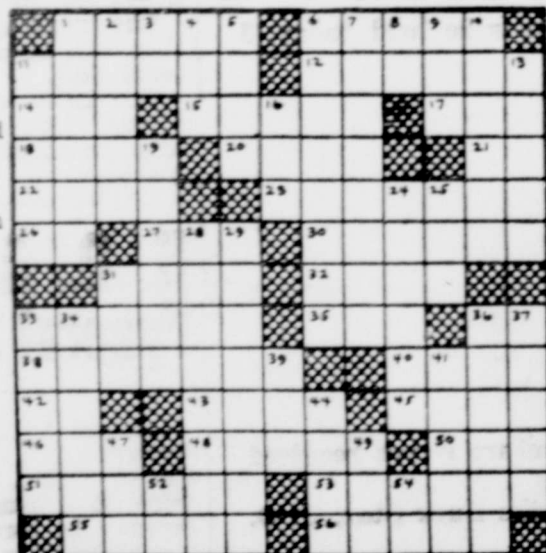
What kind of goodwill do we show when "aides" sent by our government to Thailand take potshots at the policy of supporting our allies in resistance to Communist aggression?

We realize that not all Peace Corpsmen backstab the United States and criticize its policies to friends and allies. But whatever Mr. Vaughn's "concept," it would seem appropriate that Congress outline its own very clearly when it returns to Washington, and require Peace Corpsmen to swear an oath of allegiance to the United States.

Then, those who do not wish to do so may come home and sound off here, so that we all can hear. Better that they should express themselves in opposition to our policy here, rather than in Thailand. And it would intrigue us to know to whom the dissident Peace Corpsmen profess loyalty.

Windows Give Mom Helping Hand

If you doubt that woman's work is never done, consider these statistics: the average housewife does 17 hours of general housework a week; cooks 57,000 meals in a lifetime, and walks 300 miles a year just in the house.

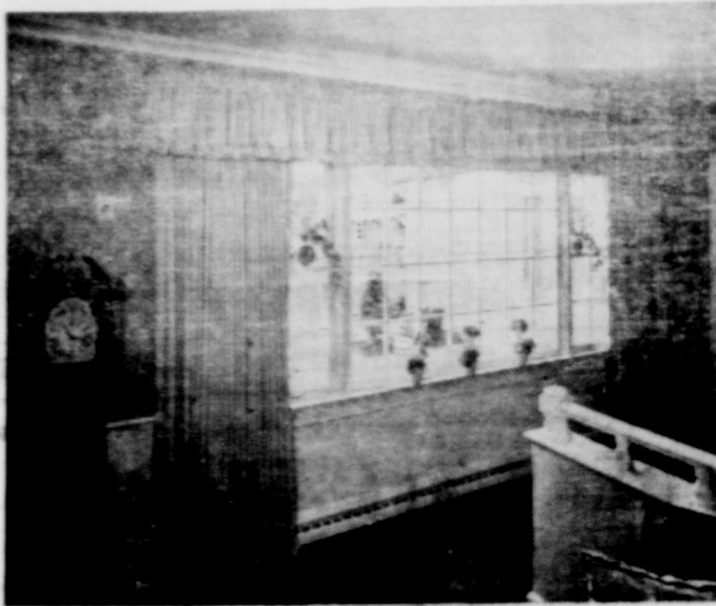
Most of her work is dull and thankless: making beds, sorting laundry, washing windows. If her husband has time, he probably pitches in. But, it's actually home product manufacturers, who have come to the aid of overburdened housewives.

For example, while no one has figured out a way to dispense with window washing, modern wood windows now have a number of convenience features to make the job easier. Among them are: 1. removable grilles, 2. pivot and lift-out sash, 3. insulating glass.

Since it is the number of corners that determine how difficult a window is to clean, removable grilles are a boon. They snap into place over the inside glass surface to give windows an attractive small-pane appearance. When the windows need cleaning, they are simply removed to expose one easy-to-wash pane of glass. The grilles, in rectangular or diamond patterns, are available with stock windows of ponderosa pine.

Pivot and lift-out sash have a double advantage—convenience and safety. These windows lift right out of the frame, or tilt inward to permit both sides of the glass to be washed inside the house. No more leaning out of windows, sitting on high window sills, or climbing shaky ladders to wash the outside surface of the glass.

Insulating glass, which used to be a custom feature, is now obtainable with all ponderosa pine window styles. By eliminating the need for storm sash, insulating glass cuts by half the number of window surfaces to be washed. Its use in weatherstripped wood sash also prevents condensation and the messy aftermath of fogged-up panes, wet window sills, and possible moisture damage to walls and floors. Bonus attraction for the man of the house is that he no longer has to hang, store or maintain storm sash.



Bay windows are among the loveliest styles available. They afford wide visibility and ventilation through either operating panels, or—in this ponderosa pine window—flanking double-hung units. The removable grilles, which give a multi-pane appearance, reflect the window's Colonial origin.

Bay Window Graces Any House Design

Certain things seem to go together—love and marriage, beards and hippies, crackers and cheese, and wood bay windows with Colonial homes.

The tie-in between bay windows and Early American architecture is easily traced. They were originally used by Colonial shopkeepers to exhibit their wares. Today, their purpose is more decorative than functional—although they retain a practical use.

Bays, and their sister-window, bows, are possibly the most beautiful window styles available. Bays are straight in the center, and angled at each end. Bows have a graceful outward curve. Because of their large areas, both styles offer an expansive outdoor view. Ventilation is provided through operating panels in the top or bottom of the windows, or by flanking the windows with operating units.

Bays and bows are suitable for any room where sunlight,

visibility and a decorative window treatment are desired. Generally, they're used in living, dining and family rooms. Their obvious assets have also made them popular for libraries, bedrooms and dens.

Contributing to the wide use of wood bow and bay windows is their availability as complete, pre-assembled units. Bow and bay windows of ponderosa pine can be found at local lumber dealers in stock sizes, ready for installation. They're obtainable with insulating glass which eliminates the need for storm sash, and substantially cuts heat loss and condensation. Some styles have an interior window seat with built-in storage space underneath.

To highlight their Colonial history, many bows and bays are used with removable grilles which give the windows a traditional multi-pane appearance. The grilles snap into place over the inside glass surface, and snap out for easy window cleaning.

Casement Windows 'Swing' in Kitchen

Kitchens are prime candidates for remodeling. As such, there's an increasing interest in methods that will make these rooms more cheerful and comfortable for the lady of the house who spends most of her work-day there.

One of the best ways to brighten a drab kitchen is to let in lots of sunlight and fresh air, and to give the room a view of the outdoors. All three goals can be easily and economically accomplished with the proper choice of windows.

The ideal window style for kitchens—especially that awkward, hard-to-reach area above the sink—is wood casements. These swing open at a 90-degree angle to give maximum ventilation, and have an uninterrupted glass area for

good visibility. Most important, they can be opened and closed easily with the turn of a conveniently-reached handle.

Casement windows of ponderosa pine, available in stock sizes at local lumber dealers, have another advantage for kitchens. Like all ponderosa pine stock windows, they are obtainable with insulating glass. The combination of insulating glass and weatherstripped wood sash offers the best protection against condensation—which can be a troublesome problem in high-humidity rooms like the kitchen.

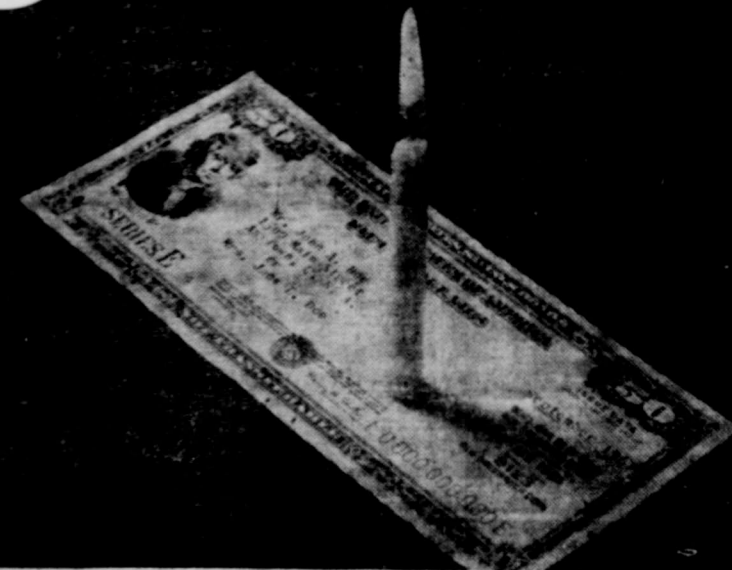
The use of insulating glass also eliminates the need for storm sash—which is not feasible with windows that open outward as casements do.

Technology Creates New Type Window

Science and technology have opened the door to a new, improved "breed" of wood window. Today's window—except for its function—is as different from the old as supersonic jets from propeller-driven aircraft.

It also eliminates the need for storm sash, thereby cutting window washing chores by half, and dispensing with the seasonal bother of hanging, storing and maintaining storm sash.

- Factory-applied weatherstripping. It's estimated that a window without weatherstripping admits as much air as a hole in the wall the size of two building blocks. Conversely, tight, efficient weatherstripping has been demonstrated to cut air infiltration to a minimum and reduce heating bills by as much as 24 per cent in an average five-room house.

- A combination of cleaning ease and safety, afforded by pivot and lift-out sash. These windows can be tilted or removed from the frame so both sides of the glass can be safely cleaned from inside the house.

- Removable grilles—a beauty and convenience feature. They snap into place over the inside surface of the glass to give the window an attractive multi-pane appearance. When removed, they reveal one easy-to-clean glass surface.

- For easy operation, wood windows are fitted with metal and plastic hardware that assures smooth, non-stick operation.

- Variety of window styles. A wide range of beautiful window styles, appropriate for every architectural design, is available in stock sizes at local lumber dealers. Double-hungs, bows and bays, casements, awnings, hoppers, sliders and fixed-sash units are all precision-made for exact fit and easy installation.

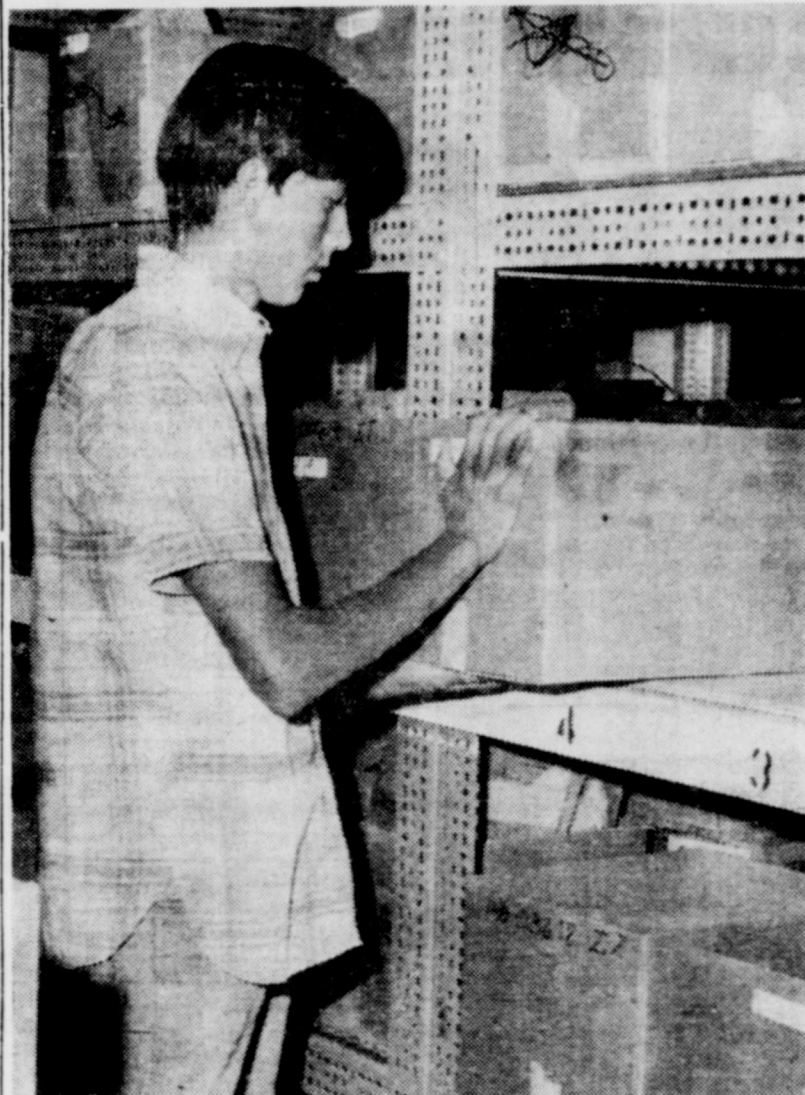

Add "Twist" To Your Barbecue



Here's a great new twist from the Pennsylvania Dutch country for your next barbecue — hot pretzels. (That's the way the pretzel bakers themselves eat pretzels.) The trick is to put the pretzels on a pan or piece of foil where they'll stay oven hot — and eat them with a variety of simple dips (the pretzel bakers just dip them in mustard straight from the jar). For the barbecue itself — how about juicy hamburgers, mini-dogs (to be picked up in the fingers and dunked and eaten) — with fresh roasted ears of corn and crispy cold radishes and tomatoes? Thick slices of tomato are delicious and juicy with the hamburgers.

Dips are Simple
For the hot dog and pretzels, use catsup, chili sauce or mustard as a dip — and use the same for spreading on the hamburgers. Or make sock-it-to-me hot sauce in advance and use it for any and all purposes at the barbecue — it has a full, delicious flavor.

Soak-It-To-Me Sauce

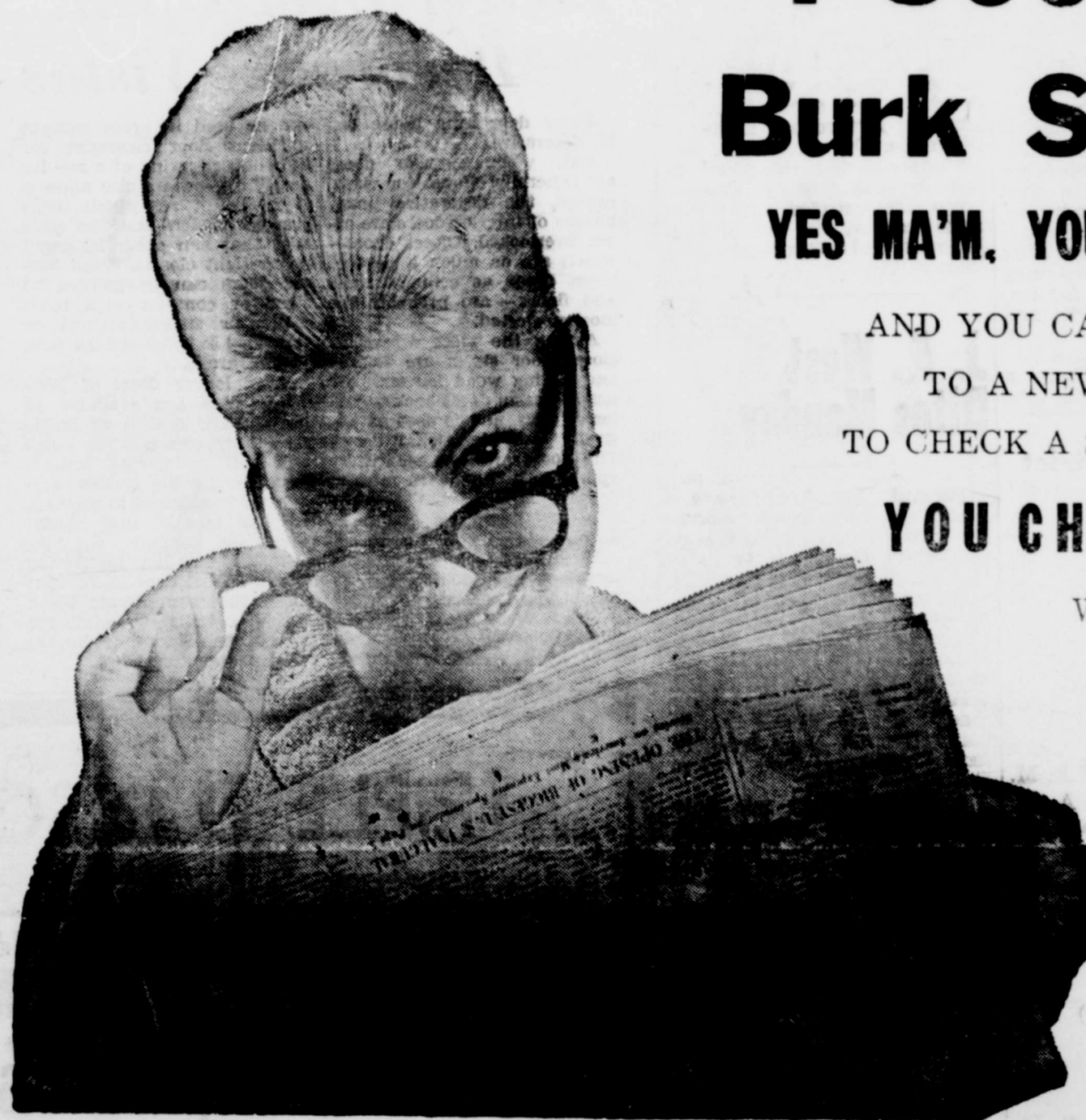

TEXAS MUSEUMS SHOW BIG GAINS IN NUMBERS

AUSTIN—The new Texas Museum Directory, compiled by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and published by the Humble Oil and Refining Company of Houston, is now available for distribution.

The announcement was made by Charles R. Woodburn, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Reflecting the continued rapid growth of museums in Texas, the fifth edition of the directory lists 282 museums open to the public. The directory it replaces listed 243 museums.

Texas continues to lead the nation in the number of museums. In addition to the 282 existing museums, there are an

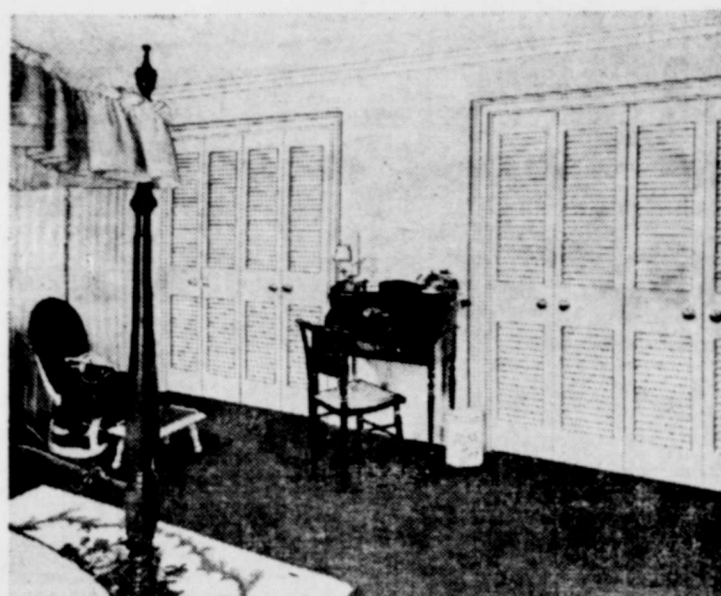
additional 170 museums in various stages of development.

The Survey Committee has long encouraged the development of historical museums at the local level.

This year, the committee offered professional guidance to the states' smaller museums by sponsoring the Second Small Museum Institute in Ft. Worth.

The new directory is readily available to tourists as copies are distributed by the Texas Highway Department, by Chambers of Commerce and by other tourist-oriented organizations.

Louver Door Opens Decorative Vistas

Every door in a house can be decorative.

But, while exterior doors are generally chosen for visual appeal, the decorative possibilities of interior doors are often overlooked. Closet doors—which are as much a part of room decor as ceilings, walls and floors—are probably the most neglected.

Among the most decorative closet door styles are folding and sliding wood louvers. The louver design dates back to Colonial days, and is used extensively with traditional decor. The doors are also beautifully appropriate to modern interior design, because of their distinctively "textured" appearance.

In addition to their good looks, louver doors have a number of practical advantages for closets. Since they slide open and closed, or fold back against each other, they

can be used in areas without sufficient floor clearance for the outward swing of a regular door. The louvers also allow a free flow of air which helps prevent mildew and the stale odor that can occur in damp or air-tight closets. Wood louver doors can be painted to blend or contrast with room colors, or simply stained or varnished to bring out the rich, natural grain.

Stock louver doors of ponderosa pine are available at local lumber dealers or building supply stores. They come with full or partial louvers (slats in the top section, and a closed wood panel in the bottom half), and with special tracks and hardware for easy operation. For an interesting accent, choose door knobs that reflect the room decor: black iron for Colonial, porcelain for French, and brass or bronze for contemporary.

TOPIC: Getting married and going to college.

In the Northern half of Texas there are several thousand young men and women who are married but are still getting their education. These young men and women are full-time students (some with part-time jobs). In a good number of cases, Dad is still providing principal support for one or both. You will have to file separate income tax returns (you can not file a joint return) if Dad

is going to claim you as a dependent on his tax return. Since Texas is a community property state, you simply split the income between the two of you and file separate returns. At the Dad or Dads who provided principal support get a credit for your dependency too. This doesn't keep you and your spouse from each claiming your own exemption. Dad will appreciate your taking care of him, since he feels he's been having a hard time taking care of you.



More Peachy Desserts

Here come two dessert dazzlers. The first is a spectacular open-face peach pie baked in a pizza pan. The second is a glorious peach shortcake with pecans baked in the dough. Both solo beautifully at a dessert party—or finish off a patio supper with a flourish. Just one quick tip about peeling pretty peaches: Dip them first into simmering water for half a minute, next into cold water. Then slip off the skins and create a peachy extravaganza.

FRESH PEACH PIZZA

2 cups New Bisquick
 2 1/2 cup light cream
 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
 4 or 5 peaches, sliced
 1 tablespoon firm butter
 1/2 cup New Bisquick
 1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Heat oven to 450°. Mix 2 cups New Bisquick, the cream and granulated sugar with fork to a soft dough. Beat vigorously 20 strokes. Knead 8 to 10 times on lightly floured cloth-covered board. New Fruit Torte Is A Triumph!



Properly impressive for a dessert and coffee party is this "Nectarine Torte California." It takes a little time but is surprisingly easy to put together.

Nectarine Torte California

6 or 7 fresh nectarines	6 tablespoons ice water
1 cup water	1 package (3 or 3 1/4 oz.)
Granulated sugar	vanilla pudding and pie
1 cup butter or margarine	filling
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour	1 cup whipping cream
1/4 teaspoon salt	1 tablespoon powdered sugar

Peel and slice some nectarines to yield 4 cups. (Save remainder.) In large saucepan, heat sliced nectarines and water to boiling. Add 1 cup granulated sugar and simmer 20 minutes; cool. With knife or pastry blender, cut butter into flour and salt. Add ice water and mix to pastry dough consistency. Divide into 8 equal parts; chill 30 minutes. On lightly floured board, roll each part into 9-inch circle. Prick circles with fork; sprinkle with 2 tablespoons granulated sugar. Bake 5 to 6 minutes at 425 degrees; cool. Prepare vanilla pudding according to package directions; cool. Divide cooked nectarines into 4 equal parts; divide pudding into 3 equal parts. Place a pastry round on serving plate; top with 1 part of nectarines. Cover with another pastry round; spread with 1 part of pudding. Repeat layers, ending with pastry round. Slice remaining fruit; arrange sunburst-fashion on top. Whip cream with powdered sugar. Encircle nectarines with cream; dollop spoonful into center. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance, 277 Park Ave., N. Y., N. Y., 10017

Q. Our first baby is on the way, which has made me think about planning definitely for his (or her) future. I have group health and life insurance policies at work. I also have a life insurance policy on myself, and my wife has one also. Is there some way I can have our child covered under these policies?

A. Yes, there is, at least under your group health insurance policy. If the policy includes major medical coverage, the baby will be covered immediately after birth for all major complications whether or not due to pregnancy. If it is just a basic hospital coverage policy, it will help pay the maternity bills if thus set up.



For other possible illness of the baby, there is usually a waiting period of 14 days after birth before coverage starts, unless the policy specifies that there is coverage from day of birth (higher premium). For life insurance, some, but not all of the group life insurance policies cover your child automatically. Coverage under a family policy is term insurance, usually in the amount of \$1,000, and it will continue until a specified age, generally, 18 or 23, depending upon the policy.

Q. I'm 30 years old, have a \$30,000 straight life insurance policy and pay the premiums every month. I seem to remember there is an advantage to paying them once a year. Just how great is it?

A. The advantage in savings can be considerable. In your particular case, paying a life insurance premium on an annual rather than a monthly basis would result in a savings of \$27 a year. Although it may be more convenient to pay monthly, the cost is higher due to the increased administrative expense incurred by the insurance company.

Rabies Is Still Threat In Texas

It rabies a thing of the past? Don't bet your life on it, says the Texas State Department of Health Statistics and activities of the Health Department indicate otherwise.

"Rabies in man is always fatal," said Dr. James E. Peavy, state commissioner of health, "and for that reason prevention is the only cure."

A big step in prevention is vaccination of pets.

"Vaccination of pets takes on a more vital role when you come to realize that most rabies treatments received by humans have come from exposure or possible exposure to pets," said Dr. Peavy. He noted also that rabid pets normally expose the people closest to them—their masters or neighbors.

Among the animal heads examined for rabies last year, 385 were found to be positive for rabies upon laboratory examination by the State Health Department. Another 16 cases were affirmed on military bases following examination at the Fort Sam Houston laboratories in San Antonio.

Of the 385 cases, 86 were dogs; 32, cats; 27, foxes; 152, skunks; 44, bats; 24 bovine; and 20, other species. Six horses and seven raccoons were found to be positive among the "other" species in 1967.

Communities and individuals have their greatest opportunity to prevent the spread of rabies among pets and on to humans by means of vigilant anti-rabies vaccination programs and stray dog control.

Health authorities feel that a community is adequately protected from an outbreak of rabies when 70 per cent of the pet population is vaccinated. But most urban areas in Texas have attained only a 10 to 15 per cent vaccination record.
