

# Local Sales Taxes Vary Up And Down

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$107.7 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,026 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said the monthly allocations were down .14 percent in August compared to a similar period last year.

Smaller checks to some cities reflect a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

Houston received the largest check,

\$17.3 million, bringing Houston's total 1986 payments to \$99.6 million down four percent over last year. Dallas' check for \$13.6 million pushed its total to \$73.5 million this year, a four percent decrease over 1985.

San Antonio's payment of \$7.1 million increased its 1986 total to \$39.3 million, up three percent. Austin received \$5 million for a total of \$29.1 million a three percent decrease over 1985 payments.

For Worth's check for \$4.2 million brought total payments to \$24.2 million five percent over last year's payments.

Bullock also sent check totaling \$50.1 million to the state's six Metropolitan Transit Authorities.

August checks represent taxes collected on sales in June and during the second quarter and reported to the Comptroller by July 20.

On a local level, Titus County, Mt.

Pleasant received \$120,837.18, compared to \$127,728.01, bringing 1986 payments to \$722,540.96, a 3.33 increase over last year.

Talco received \$2,224.28, down from the \$3,382.84 of last year. Payments so far this year total \$13,823.02, a 13.95 percent drop from last year.

In Red River County the city of Clarksville received \$22,117.80, down from \$23,468 at this time last year.

This year's total is at \$137,518.61, up 5.42 percent over last year.

Bogata received \$4,203.06, up considerably from the \$2,291.22. Total to date this year is \$22,069.86, up 42.28 percent over this period last year.

Deport received \$871.51, down from \$1,639.17 last year. The total to date is \$6,273.26, up 2.42 percent from last year.

Lamar County reports Blossom receiving \$1,540.90, close to the

\$1,598.58 last year. Total to date is \$9,373.11, a slight decrease of .19 percent from last year.

Deort received \$2,083.94, up from \$1,704.95 last year. To date they have received in 1986 7,338.58, a decrease of 4.42 percent on the overall total this year.

Paris has received \$247,187.12, a decrease of \$258,186.00 from the same period last year. They have experienced an overall gain of .69 percent.

As I had read your article only the day before, I thought it a timely accident. It seems chili was officially named our state food. So now we both know. We enjoy the paper.

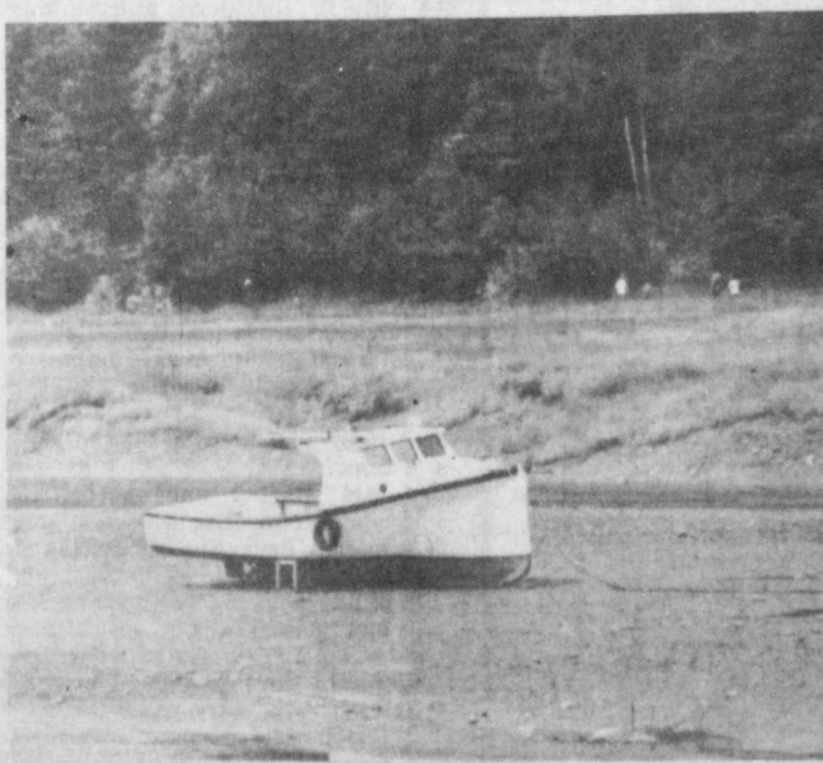

## Fishing, Coal Mines In Nova Scotia

As the heat beats down, meories of vacation become even more appealing. On the third day out from Bangor, Maine, Thomas and I discovered that folks up there just don't understand about heat.

Speaking to some folks on the parking lot outside our motel, they said "Boy, it's really hot today, it's a shame it isn't pleasant for you while you are up here."

Hot? It was 82 degrees! Of course, in the depths of winter it gets down to about 30 or 40 below zero, so it all balances out.

Continuing to follow the ever-present shoreline we were fascinated by what is essentially another world. Boats of every size and description crowd the shore, lobster traps are piled up high by the hundreds, brightly colored buoys, as individual (and respected) as cattle brands, are tied to the sides of the traps.

Lobster can be bought from tin sheds on the sides of the road, and fresh seafood and fish is more common than barbecue around here.

A tour of an experimental blueberry station yielded harvesting and cultivation information, plus a driving tour of acres and acres of the beautiful blue berries. A quick stop on the side of the road can pick a few handfuls for snacking, while the hills often look frosted blue with the plentiful berries.

The bay of Fundy flanked the eastern side of the road at all times. Fundy has the highest tides in the entire world, so powerful that twice daily the St. John River actually flows backward for miles and miles!

At low tide boats rest on the bottom of the bay floor, tethered by thirty or forty foot ropes. The docks rear up into the sky and it presents a strange landscape.

At high tide everything changes. A peculiar roaring fills the air as the tide rushes in, and soon the boats float on the incoming tide, and docks are even with water level.

amidst huge rocks carved by tides and pressures over millions of years, many resembling strange creatures.

After skidding about on the seaweed encrusted stones and taking pictures of the other-worldly landscape, we climbed hundreds of steps to the shore again. There, on a neat, mowed level stretch of ground, I managed to turn my ankle, which immediately swelled and turned a delicate shade of purple.

That night we tried lobster sandwiches, an inexpensive way to enjoy lobster.

The next morning we crossed into Nova Scotia, another Canadian province. We were actually getting the hang of what coin was worth what by that time.

At Springhill we toured a coal mine. I found out rather quickly that coal mining would never, never be a way of life for ME.

The man who conducted the tour had been a miner for 33 years. He had the almost-traditional wheeze in his lungs from the coal dust, and was full of funny stories. He explained, with a perfectly straight face, how safety test lanterns had been devised to test for gases in the mines after the canaries that were used learned to hold their breath!

Donning bright yellow coats, heavy rubber boots (ohhh that ankle) and hard hats, we traipsed down into a damp, very dark, and none to big mine.

The mines run three miles underground, and the coal vein is three miles wide.

I did okay until we turned a corner and our guide slammed a big ventilation door shut on a sight of the outside world.

Then, I almost left. One lady almost burst into tears...and did when he turned off the lights! Its dark down there. Then he began to tell us all about the rats.

Steeling my nerves I made it through the tour, Thomas and the rest of the men took a pick and hacked at the walls, and we all left.

All but three left, that is...and one of those three was Thomas, who remained with the guide an another man to keep talking about mining methods.

Thomas, for some reason, didn't think the mine was so bad.

The Springhill mine is the only area in the world except for an area in Kentucky which has "bumps". These bumps are mini earthquakes which have killed hundreds of men over the years, most crushed when the tunnel floor literally slams against the roof.

Happily we washed our hands, took off our mining gear and began a trip to Sherbrooke village, the second place on the day's itinerary.

Along the way church steeples in pristine white, rolling valleys and crystal blue streams, houses painted in pastel shades delighted the eye.

 In the 1930's at cotton picking time, new people would come into Deport to help get the cotton picked. There was an excitement in our neighborhood as families with children and sometimes a group of adults would move into the two 'Cabins' on my grandparents place.  
 One year, two or three men lived in the car shed right at the edge of Pappy and Grandlma's back yard. I never dared peep inside but do remember they cooked on an open fire back of the shed. They had a framework over the fire to hold a

black pot. Before they left for the field, they would put on a pot of Great Northern Beans for their supper. Pappy and Aunt Norma would tend the fire and keep the beans stirred. Never in my life have I smelled anything so good. Aunt Norma would have them a pan of cornbread when they came in from work. Tommie and I found lots of reasons to go by the camp fire and sniff that good smell. good smell. Even today, I shudder to think what would have happened if we had tipped over the pot.  
 That fall was our introduction to Great Northern Beans. We ate them then, and I still enjoy cooking a pot in the winter when the house is closed and that good smell fills the air.

**BLUEBERRY-LEMON STREUSEL CAKE**  
 2 packages Betty Crocker wild blueberry muffin mix  
 Almond Streusel (below)  
 1 cup milk  
 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel  
 2 eggs  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 Heat oven to 350°. Grease tube pan, 10x4 inches. Drain blueberries; rinse and set aside. Prepare Almond Streusel. Mix milk, lemon peel and eggs in large bowl. Stir in muffin mixes (dry) and sugar until moistened; fold in blueberries. Pour batter into pan; sprinkle with Almond Streusel. Bake until topping is light brown and cake springs back when touched lightly near center, 35 to 40 minutes. Cool cake in pan 30 minutes (do not invert pan while cooling); invert on wire rack. Remove pan; invert cake on heatproof serving plate. 12 servings.  
**Almond Streusel:** 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup all-purpose flour and 2 tablespoons firm margarine or butter until crumbly; stir in 1/4 cup sliced almonds.  
**BUTTER-NUT FUDGE BARS**  
 3/4 cup packed brown sugar  
 1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened  
 1 cup all-purpose flour  
 1 cup finely chopped almonds  
 3/4 cup shredded coconut  
 1 package Betty Crocker brownie supreme mix (with can of Chocolate Flavor Syrup)  
 Heat oven to 350°. Mix brown sugar and margarine. Stir in flour, almonds and coconut until crumbly. Reserve 1/2 cup of the crumbly mixture. Press remaining crumbly mixture in ungreased rectangular pan, 13x9x2 inches. Prepare Brownie Mix as directed on package. Carefully spread over crumbly mixture in pan. Sprinkle reserved crumbly mixture over top. Bake until golden brown, 25 to 30 minutes. Cool; cut into bars, about 2 1/2 inches. 36 bars.
