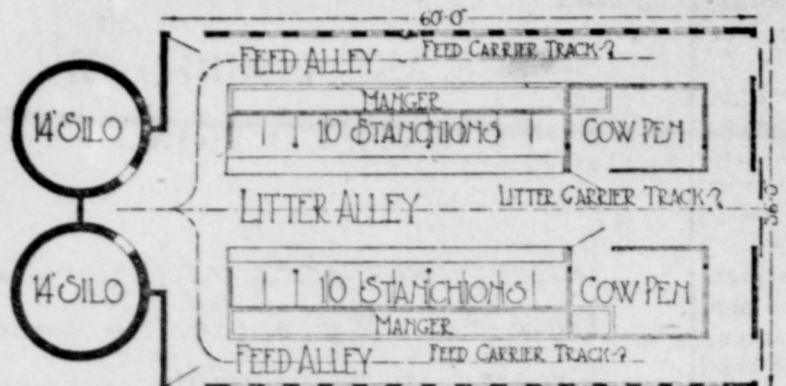
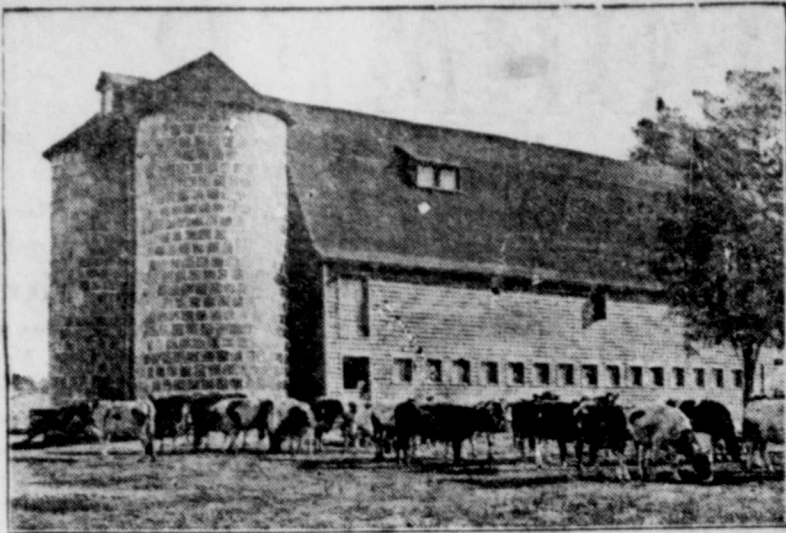

Designed to Withstand Rigors of  
the Seasons.

gienic Installation.

"It's an ill wind that blows no good" is a saying as old as time and every day it has cause for application. When the period of deflation through which we are now passing first started, the farmer was one of the first to be hit by declining prices. In the face of a bumper crop he had enormous stocks on hand which he either had to keep or sell for a greatly reduced price. On first thought this situation looked very bad, but there are some compensating features as we shall see. In many cases, rather than sell his grain at a loss, the farmer turned his attention to increasing his dairy herd so that he could use his crop for feed. He had plenty of grain and could still get a price for dairy products. As a result the dairy business has gone along and acted as buffer for the farmer against complete stagnation.

That is one big reason why the dairy barn has become so important. The farmer has realized at last that he can only have a productive herd if he handles and houses his cattle efficiently. No better medium is available than a good well-built and equipped dairy barn. Plenty of health-giving sunshine not only stimulates the animals but acts as a disinfectant against disease. Fresh air is an antidote for many ills which cows are subject to. Humane conditions are now as important in the barn as they are in the home.

As an example of a real up-to-date dairy barn replete with the latest equipment and representing an excellent type of construction, we offer this dairy barn. A second look is not needed to convince yourself of its solidity and permanency. It is built to endure, to survive the weathering of storms and seasons. Set on a solid concrete foundation and floor, this building is frame with a high well-covered gambrel roof of the plank-frame type allowing a large unobstructed haymow and storage room.

At one end of the barn are two large spacious hollow tile silos of large capacity. They open into the feeding room at this end of the building and can easily take care of a good supply of winter green feed. A carrier track leads from the silos to the two feed alleys along the outside walls of the barn, the stalls facing out. This carrier track also runs over the central litter alley in back of the rows of stalls. This litter carrier track passes out through the far door to the manure pit.

There are two rows of cow stalls facing toward the outside. In this arrangement the cows get the benefit of individual windows and are provided with plenty of light and air. There are also individual drinking cups in front of each stall to keep a constant supply of water available for the animals. Fresh water helps to increase milk supply. There are ten stalls in each row, each stall partitioned off by steel partitions and each one equipped with the modern type of stanchion. At the end of the barn are two cow pens.

The keeping of cows has become one of the greatest industries in the world. In building a house for the herd the health, comfort and cleanliness of the cows must be considered because they are the important factors in production. Moreover, the health, ease and efficiency of the men are also important. Today the farmer can secure a satisfactory barn like that shown in the illustration, a barn that will be a real home for his cows in which they may live and produce efficiently and profitably. It will also be a workshop for men and his boys who some day will take over the farm and continue in their father's footsteps. If he is too shortsighted to recognize the value of a modern barn with labor-saving devices and equipment and a pleasant design, he may not have the sons with him to take over the farm. Invariably they leave the farm as soon as they can get away. Better farm buildings are solving the "boy" problem on the farm better than any other single agency. In the past, boys have left the farm because of the long hours and the back-breaking work. The dairy barn was the main source of trouble and the big cause of discontent. Trucking litter by wheelbarrows was drudgery and the boys invariably broke under the grind. The carrier has lifted this load from their shoulders, and scientific planning of the barn stalls has eliminated many burdensome tasks. Modern dairy barns make farming a pleasure as compared with the old systems.

## NOT TO BE SENT BY MAIL

Remarkable Number of Things on  
Which Strict Restrictions Have  
Had to Be Placed.

It is easy to understand why you may not send tobacco to Peru, Morocco, Greece and several other countries, because the governments concerned hold a monopoly of the article. The same reason applies to Serbia, Algeria and Tunis with regard to playing cards.

But the reason why certain objects may not be sent through the post to various lands is not so obvious. Why, for instance, may not one send a feeding bottle to Algeria? Or a police whistle to Nicaragua? Or jam to Mexico?

Prison-made goods are refused admission by many countries. Patent medicines are forbidden entrance into Algeria, Rumania, Sierra Leone and Italy. Trinidad won't have rat killer, while old clothes are rejected by the Caroline and Marian Islands. Greece, in the latter respect, only bans old shoes.

It is not altogether surprising that Ecuador not accept parcels containing implements for mining, and Bahama turns down loaded dice.

Religion, like government monopolies, is responsible for many of the restrictions. To a Mohammedan the picture of a person signifies a curse, hence one may not send packages of picture postcards and the like to Arabia, Persia and Palestine.

Holland will not accept parcels containing pirated editions of copyrighted works, while Norway refuses announcements regarding lotteries.

## FARM STOCK

### WOOL AND MUTTON COMBINED

Experiment Station Established at Dubois, Idaho, to Solve Sheep Problems.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Sheep breeders, ranchmen and animal husbandmen from six or eight states went to the United States sheep experiment station near Dubois, Idaho, this year for the annual shearing. Keen interest attaches to the work done by this station, especially by those who are alive to the importance of producing, if possible, a breed that shall combine weight in mutton and excellence in fleece, with special reference to market demands for fine or coarse grades of wool. In the shearing this year, just reported to the Department of Agriculture, the Rambouillet scored highest. The report shows these results:

The station at Dubois was established by the bureau of animal industry in 1917 to conduct experiments with which it was hoped to solve some of the big problems in range sheep business. With only a little more than three years' experience the specialists do not consider the results sufficiently conclusive to warrant definite assertion in favor of or against particular range practice, but the work has attracted the attention of sheepmen everywhere, and is expected to become increasingly important as the experiments develop.

"It is quite generally agreed," said one of the sheep husbandmen, "that for the main part of the range sheep country of the northwestern states the type of ewes obtained in the first cross between the long wools and the fine wools is a very desirable stock ewe. We appreciate the fact that fine wool rams were most popular in 1919, and that this was due in part to the high price of fine wool. Even should fine wool continue to sell above coarser grades, which is doubtful, we still could not afford to neglect the lamb

side of the business that has been the cause of such large use of crossbred stock."

Sheepmen concerned in the business of producing sheep that shall combine mutton and the right kind of fleece watch with interest the development of the Corriedale grades and the Columbia. The Corriedale was imported from New Zealand in 1915 by the bureau of animal industry for this work. The Columbia is the Lincoln and Rambouillet cross interbred.

## WHY PERCHERON IS POPULAR

Breed Adapted to All Kinds of Farm Work, and Exceptionally Docile and Sensible.

The modern Percheron is very popular with the American farmer because he is an easy keeper and an early maturer, is hardy and vigorous, but docile and sensible, strong, active and well adapted to all classes of farm work and city use. America had a preference for a black horse which has led to the production of darker colored horses, but, as is evidenced by some of the leading shows of recent years, there is a tendency to revert back to the original color, that beautiful iron gray. It is a good thing that this is true, for a minor point like color should never detract from the value of an otherwise good horse.

## PREPARING FOR SPRING PIGS

Good Idea During the Winter to Arrange for New Pastures and Lots—Practice Rotation.

It is well to plan new pastures and lots for the spring pigs. For next to disease, worms probably cause the greatest losses. The larvae of the various types of infectious worms lie over in the grass and on the ground for months. A mudhole may be full of them. Rotation of pastures and lots is a good practice in raising healthy pigs.

### SAVORY DISHES.

Calves' hearts are tender and delicious, cut in slices and fried in a little butter. They should be cooked until well browned and served with the gravy which may be thickened or not.

**Braised Liver.**—Wash two pounds of fresh liver and flour well, seasoning with salt and pepper and a little lemon juice. Lay in a casserole; add two sliced onions and six carrots shredded lengthwise, a bay leaf, a sprinkling of parsley and a pint of boiling water. Place thin slices of bacon over-all; cover tightly and bake for one hour and a half; then remove the cover, baste and brown ten minutes. Serve with tomatoes or chili sauce.

**Fried Peppers With Cheese.**—Choose large green peppers and blister them in the oven until they peel easily. Remove the seeds and veins and wrap each pepper around a piece of cheese. Fry in good sweet lard or butter, or better, olive oil. Prepare a sweet sauce of browned butter, flour, a flavor of garlic, to pour over the peppers when ready to serve.

**Baked Mexican Chicken.**—Steam two young chickens for 20 minutes, then cut up as for fricassee. Strain a can of tomatoes; mix with a cup of corn; add one green pepper chopped, a little parsley, cayenne pepper and paprika. Put the chicken into this mixture; thicken with bread crumbs and bake with pieces of butter over the top, for half an hour.

**Ripe Pear Salad.**—Cut pears in halves and scoop out the core with a potato scoop, leaving a good-sized, perfectly round cavity. Make cream cheese balls, season them well before rolling, and dust with paprika. Fill the cavity with the ball, arrange on lettuce and serve with a French dressing prepared with some of the pear juice if possible. Canned pears may be used for this recipe.

Musketeers may be served the same way, using just the melon or a combination of melon and banana.

### EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS.

A tender well-seasoned and cooked tongue is one of the most tasty of meats.

**Beef Tongue en Casserole.**—Choose a tongue which has been slightly corned, remove all the rough portions, rub with flour to ginger and allspice. Fry a few slices of salt pork, then add a sliced onion and the tongue, tying it into shape. Flour it lightly on all sides. Make a cupful of gravy, adding the juice of a lemon, three tablespoonsful of shredded almonds, and a half cupful of seeded raisins. Put the tongue in a round casserole, pour over the gravy and bake one-half hour in a moderate oven. Untie the tongue, turn out on a platter and serve with the gravy over it.

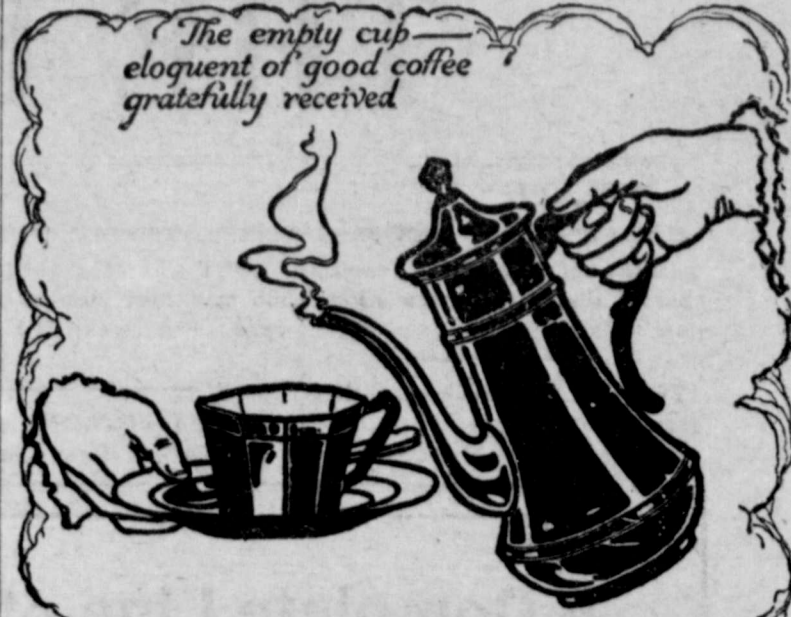
Rhubarb is delicious baked. Take a cupful of sugar to a pint of finely cut rhubarb. Bake in an earthen dish until jellylike in consistency. Fruit juices which lack the thickening quality called pectin, may be supplied with it by using the white pith of an orange peel. Remove all the rind and cut it in strips, cover with cold water and simmer for an hour or two to remove all the pectin and boil up again. There will be sufficient pectin in half an orange rind to thicken several glasses of jelly.

**Iced Cocoa.**—Put two heaping teaspoonfuls of cocoa into a double boiler, add half of a pint of boiling water and cook five minutes; add one-half pint of milk, beat thoroughly and take from the fire. At serving time fill the glasses one-third full of chipped ice, add a teaspoonful of powdered sugar, fill the glass two-thirds full of cocoa and top with whipped cream.

**Oatmeal Cookies.**—Take two cupfuls of browned and ground oatmeal, two cupfuls of flour, one egg, one-half cupful of sour milk, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one-half cupful of shortening and a cupful of sugar; add raisins and nuts and drop from a teaspoon on a well-greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven until firm to the touch.

**Punch a la Naples.**—Take two pounds of rhubarb, two cupfuls of water, one small bay leaf, one cupful of sugar, one cupful of orange juice, one-half cupful of pineapple juice, one-fourth of a cupful of lemon juice, one-fourth cupful of ginger syrup. Dilute to taste just before serving with sparkling water. By using a pint bottle of sparkling water occasionally the punch will keep its snappy taste.

### THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

#### "BLACKMAIL."

IF, TODAY, anyone were to accuse the editor of a newspaper of accepting blackmail when he exchanges a year's subscription to his paper for a bushel of potatoes or to state that a merchant is guilty of the same practice when he trades his goods for farm produce they would probably be sued for libel. As a matter of fact, they would be only using the word in its primary sense.

In the early days of English history "blackmail"—derived from the word "black" and the French "maille," meaning rent—was applied to the rents received from tenants in the form of work or grain, in contradistinction to payments made in silver or white money (maille blanche). Later, when the feudal barons and freebooters of many kinds roamed the highways almost at will, they collected "blackmail" in the form of forced levies of goods and provisions from the inhabitants of the countryside or from travelers who fell into their clutches and the word fell into such disrepute that, under the Elizabethan laws, it was made a "felony without benefit of clergy."

It is doubtless from this law and the practice which necessitated it that the modern meaning of the word—now synonymous with hush-money or a bribe paid for the maintenance of silence—originated.

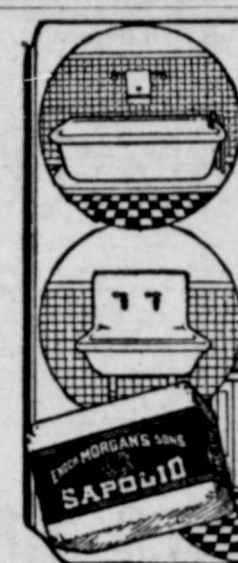

## PLAIN TAILORED SUITS; COATS IN SEVERAL STYLES

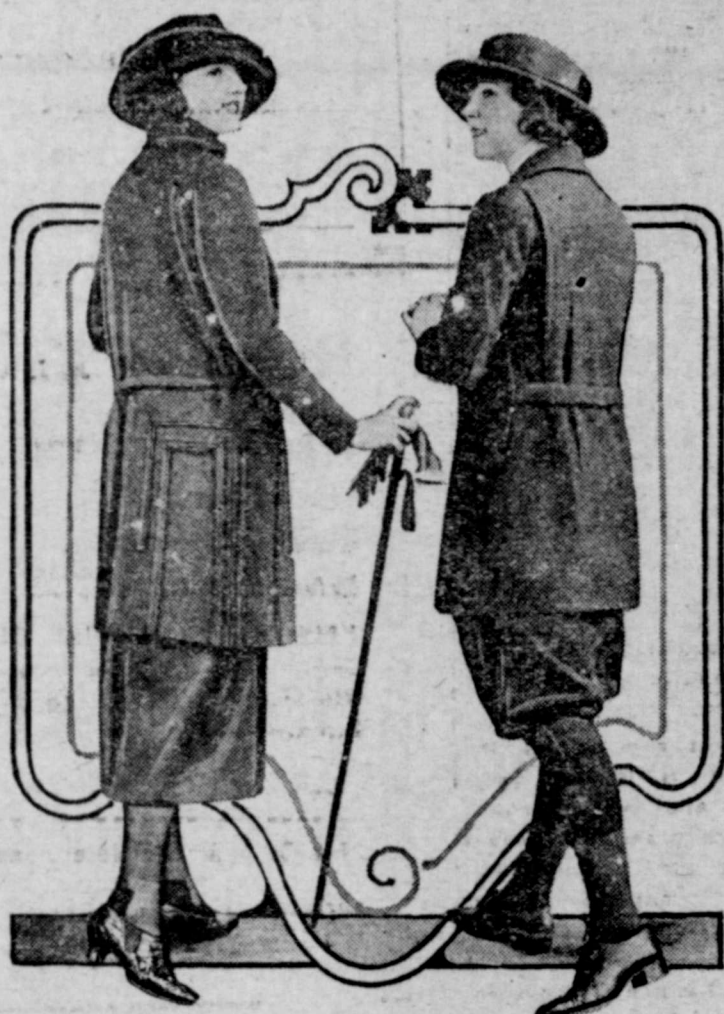

## IMPROVED ROADS

### PATROL SYSTEM IS FAVORED

Pointed Out by Department of Agriculture as Illustration of Economical Maintenance.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The road patrol system used in Grant county, Wash., is pointed out by the United States Department of Agriculture as an illustration of how highways can be maintained most successfully and economically. Other counties in the state use the "gang" system, assigning to each gang a long section, upon which they make repairs at intervals, seldom reaching all the necessary points. In Grant county the plan is to prevent a road from getting into bad condition rather than to make repairs.

There are 13 patrol sections, each from six to ten miles long, in the 87.83 miles of county highways. Each section is in charge of a patrolman, who works constantly on his piece of road.

feeling that he alone is responsible for its condition. While these men work under the direction of the county engineer, the details are left largely to their judgment.

A specially constructed light road machine, called locally a "road fixer," is used. It has a long wheel base and two cutting blades rigidly connected with the carrying frame of the machine. The rear wheels are on separate axles, controlled by separate levers. The patrolman carries the necessary small tools for clearing weeds, trimming shoulders, cleaning ditches, and for handling surfacing material. He makes his own repairs in the county repair shop under the direction of a skilled mechanic.

The annual cost of this system, states the bureau of public roads, averages \$223 a mile, which is less than other counties pay where roads receive attention "only when they need it." Grant county has graveled roads second to none in the state, and its people are enthusiastic supporters of the patrol system.

### TONNAGE ON COUNTRY ROADS

Report of Bureau of Markets Shows Extent to Which Highways Are Being Used.

The necessity of keeping country roads in good condition is shown by a report recently compiled by the bureau of markets and crop estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, showing the extent to which they are used in hauling farm products to market. According to the report, which shows the tonnage of 11 products hauled on country roads, giving the yearly average for the period from 1915 to 1919, there were 27 tons of these 11 crops hauled for every 100 acres of land. The average tonnage of the 11 crops hauled on country roads each year for the period mentioned amounted to \$6,500,000 tons. The 11 crops referred to in the report are corn, wheat, oats, barley, rye, rice, flaxseed, cotton (including seed), tobacco, potatoes, and cultivated hay.

### BUILD IN FALL AND WINTER

According to Engineers Money Spent in Constructing Roads in Spring, is Wasted.

The building of roads in the spring is opposed by good engineers, who insist that money spent at that season is largely wasted. They hold that work should be done in the fall and winter, when the ground is in better condition and when foundations can be laid with greater permanence. They also criticize the sloppy manner in which foundations are laid, pointing out that subsequent repair bills make the whole cost much greater than the cost of solidly-built roads.

Big Work in Ohio. The great highway system of Ohio for this year includes the construction of 500 miles of heavy duty roads, representing an outlay of \$11,000,000.

Right of Way in France. In France at crossroads the automobile coming from the right has the right of way.

Cash Value of Good Road. The actual cash value of a good road is something that is hard to determine.

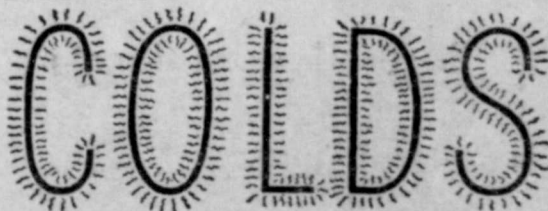

We sold our truck and started for Amarillo Oct 13th, 1920, on the train. The states we came through were as follows: Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, and then into Texas. We moved to Hedley Nov. 27th, 1920.
