## Court, FGE still willing to negotiate

In consideration of the community's support of the FGE power plant expressed by citizens attending previous meetings, the Mitchell County Commissioners' Court convened Monday morning with one thing to consider: whether or not to continue negotiating with FGE, the company planning to build a power plant in the county. Several local businessmen and individuals attended meetings in September to express support for the project.

Commissioner Randy Anderson started the meeting by saying he made the request to put the item on the agenda because he is interested in moving forward with negotiations.

"I am interested in going forward, and I think we owe

it to the taxpayers, businesses and individuals in the county," Anderson said. He went on to say that he believes the project is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for the county.

Commissioner Jeremy Strain expressed his frustration at the slow progress and breakdown in negotiations. He said the county has been in negotiations with FGE for a year and a half and has spent about \$150,000 in legal fees. Strain said he feels like the county is getting conflicting information from FGE owner Emerson Farrell and FGE attorneys.

Legal fees and who is going to pay them have come into question. Farrell agreed in a court meeting for his company to pay any further legal fees incurred by renegotiat-

ing a tax abatement with the county. Anderson said that if \$10,000 in legal fees is the sticking point, there are a few business owners in the county offering to help pay those fees in order to get the project to go through.

Commissioner Jesse Muñoz reminded those in attendance that the county and FGE are already operating under a binding legal contract. He said that, from what he can tell, the renegotiations are all in FGE's favor.

"Folks, we already paid for all of this," he said. "I would like to see them pay what they owe in good faith."

Muñoz said that the county has received \$25,000 from FGE and owes over \$200,000. "I'd like to see it go for-

## New city garbage rules explained

With the City of Colorado City taking over garbage collection services, city officials are taking the opportunity to specify what is and is not allowed to be put into dumpsters. Trash pickup schedules have changed from some residents, so the city has supplied a map (left) with each area marked for designated pickup days.

The switch from contracted trash services to in-house garbage collection will ultimately save the city money, and it has been the city's goal to make sure the citizens see no interruption in the services they receive. In an effort to keep the services on time and available to all, city officials have a few things for citizens to keep in mind as they use the dumpsters.

Dumpsters are to be used primarily for household garbage, and all garbage needs to be bagged. Other items such as lumber and tree limbs are also al-

lowed if the proper preparations are made to the items before they are deposited in the dumpsters.

Lumber must be cut or broken into two-foot or smaller pieces, and tree limbs and trunks can be put in the dumpster as well if they are less than two inches in diameter or less than two feet in length. Furniture must be demolished into two feet or smaller dimensions in order to be legally disposed of in the dumpster.

All brush, limbs, and grass clippings are accepted at the landfill 24 hours per day, seven days per week. Air conditioners and appliances are also taken at the landfill during business hours at no cost; as are all types of metal as long as it is separated from other debris.

Used tires are accepted at the landfill during business hours for \$14 per cubic yard. Other things accepted at the landfill include: construction and demolition de-

## Two more to be inducted onto Wall of Honor



W.H. "Dub" Barker

W.H. "Dub" Barker is one of several Colorado High graduates being inducted onto the Colorado ISD Wall of Fame. A ceremony will be held to honor the inductees and introductions will be made before the Wolves' Homecoming football game Friday.

Dub Barker was born in 1931 in McAlester, Oklahoma. Growing up during the Great Depression, he learned the value of hard work.

Barker attended school in Colorado City where he developed a love for sports in which he excelled. He was not only an outstanding athlete but also a friendly, kind, thoughtful, and humble person.

In 1948, Barker was named to the All-State Football Team. He also excelled in other sports, such as boxing and track. During the 1948-49 school year, he won the state championship in broad jump. Upon graduation in 1949, he attended Tyler Jr. College and Texas Tech University, playing football for both schools.

While he was working as a po-

lice officer in Lubbock, Barker joined the U.S. Navy and was on the ship U.S. Yorktown during the Korean War. He received numerous awards during his time in the service, including two Korean Service Medals, the China Service Medal, a National Defense Medal and United Nations Service Medal.

After being honorably discharged from the Navy in 1955, Barker worked for a television cable company, traveling around the country building towers. He helped install the first-ever cable television tower.

Barker never lost his love for sports. He coached football and track while living in Abilene. He took the track team to the Jr. Olympics several years in a row.

Besides being a talented athlete and coach, Barker had a gift for writing songs and poems. He had two songs released on 45 records, one titled "Santa and the Blind Boy" and the other was "Heart and In My Mind."

Colorado ISD alumni will be inducted onto the CISD Wall of Honor. The induction will include a ceremony Friday afternoon at the CHS Auditorium, followed by an introduction before the Wolves' Homecoming football game Friday night at Wolf Stadium.

Jim Cooper graduated from Colorado High School in 1942. Sports were his main interest and he was able to achieve success in football and district boxing. In 1941, Cooper was named All-District Guard and was the Golden Gloves District Welter Weight Champion.

After serving in the armed forces, Cooper received an honorable discharge and decided to pursue his lifelong ambition to play football for Texas Christian University. After two years at TCU as center and linebacker, he transferred to North Texas State where he played the same

positions. Cooper received his degree from North Texas State in 1948. He later earned his Master's Degree in Education with certification in administration at West Texas State in Canyon.

The CHS graduate received much recognition at TCU for football. He was named to the 1944 All-Southwest Conference, 1944 Most Valuable Player, and 1945 Most Outstanding Defensive Player in the Cotton Bowl.

At North Texas State, he was selected as All Lone Star Conference in 1946 and 1947 and played in two bowl games. He was also listed as honorable mention for Little All American.

Cooper continued to receive awards in boxing, as he competed in Fort Worth in 1944 and 1945.

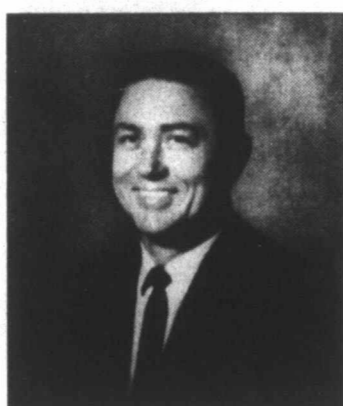
In 2006, TCU magazine made selection from the 1900-2006 of football players who best

represented TCU, and Cooper was selected in three categories: All Conference 1944, All Time Letterman '44 and '45, and Honorable Mention Player Who Best Represented his Jersey in '46.

Cooper was recruited by several professional football teams but signed with the Brooklyn Dodgers of the old AAFC. He played one year and then decided to begin his career in teaching and coaching.

The beloved athlete coached and taught in school in Fabens, Odessa, Amarillo and Anchorage, Alaska. In 1967, a professional football team from Odessa called the Comets and later the West Texas Rufnecks of the Continental League recruited Cooper as the defensive coach.

Cooper retired from the Odessa Independent School District in 1985, after 36 years of service in education.

## September 21st was 50th anniversary of local shootout

Monday, September 21st marked the 50th anniversary of a shootout that took place way back in 1965. The shooting happened near Colorado City and killed Scurry County Deputy Jesse Minton. His grandson, a police officer in Arlington, took the time to visit the area Friday and memorialize the grandfather he never got the chance to meet.

The entire incident was well recorded by the *Colorado City Record*, as many stories were published detailing the incident in 1965. The following information is taken from those stories.

Though the shooting took place in Mitchell County, it was not uncommon at that time for Scurry County Deputies to assist. Carlos Perez had already killed a man and was hiding in a corn field after being pursued by local deputies.

Minton and Deputy Leon Ward assisted Mardell Sheppard, Deputy Forrest Smith and Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger with the search for the murderer. They found fresh tracks leading into the field and followed them.

During the tense search, Sheppard was grazed by a bullet, as Perez sprang up from behind some careless weeds to surprise the law man. As Sheppard returned fire, Minton and the others came to his aid. When Minton stood up to provide cover for Sheppard, Perez shot him and he went down.

Unfortunately, Perez's bullet hit Minton in the neck, fatally injuring him. He died from severe blood loss. According to a story in the 1965 *Record*, "The deputy from Snyder, however, managed to get to his feet again and fire the fatal shot into the body of Perez."

Minton's grandson that visited Colorado City on Friday is also named Jesse Minton and works for the Arlington Police Department. Another of the Scurry County Deputy's grandsons is

also in law enforcement, working as the Chief of Police with the Leander Police Department.

Jesse said that he always heard the story about his grandfather and has looked up to him all his life, regardless of the fact that the man was killed before Jesse was born. "I always knew I wanted to be a police officer," he said Friday.

In an effort to put all the pieces of the story together, Jesse first arranged to meet Leon Ward 16 years ago. The pair visited the site where the shooting took place, about six miles east of Colorado City along I-20. The house that was there in 1965 has been torn down, but the location still made an impact on Jesse.

The Scurry County Deputy was 43 years old at the time of the shooting. He had a wife and two sons, and his grandson, Jesse, is making sure that the dedicated deputy is not forgotten.

ward. I would just like to see some good faith," he said.

Commissioner Bill Preston had a different take on the situation. He said that he believes that the problem lies with the county's lawyer, insinuating that the attorney from Austin doesn't care about what happens in Mitchell County as long as he gets to bill the county for legal work.

"I don't think he has our main interest at heart. I think he has his," Preston said.

He was the first commissioner to suggest that any further negotiations take place in an open meeting, and he expressed his intent to move forward.

"If 10 or 20 thousand is the hold up, what is that when compared to what we have to gain?" Preston asked hypothetically.

County Judge Ray Mayo warned commissioners that the county may not have recourse if the contract is approved after renegotiations due to certain stipulations being removed. "There's still no guarantee that we will ever get a penny from FGE," he said.

Muñoz asked a question that no one has ever asked in open court. "We have a county attorney on the payroll, but we don't ask him a question. Why?" he asked.

Anderson explained that County Attorney Ty Wood had excused himself from such negotiations due to a potential conflict of interest.

Strain said he wouldn't mind meeting one more time but would like to see a time limit of 45 days put on further talks with the power company.

Commissioners were in agreement that they would like to see negotiations move forward and to do so in a public setting. Judge Mayo said he would contact FGE and the county's attorney, Chuck Kimbrough, to see if a date could be agreed upon. He also said he would see if the district courtroom would be available to accommodate as many citizens as would like to show up for the meeting.

Muñoz made the motion, Strain seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Colorado City's Homecoming is always a special occasion, and traditions will continue this year. Come out and cheer on those Wolves!

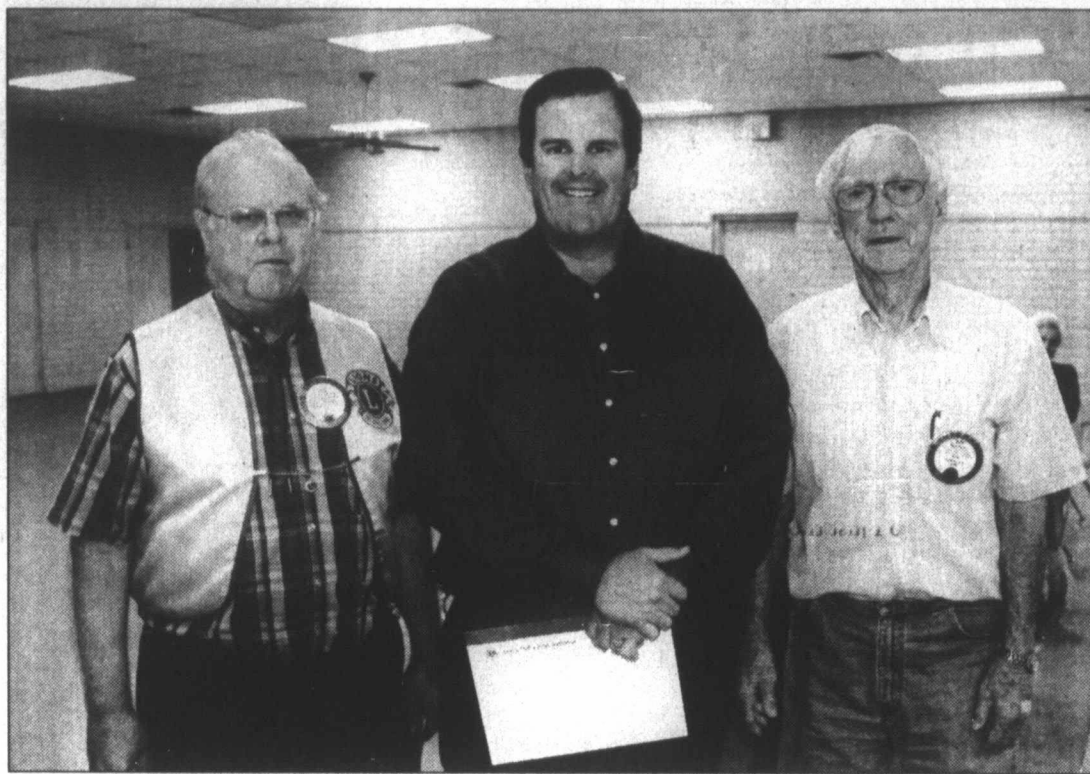

bris, all sizes of lumber and wood products, mattresses, box springs and other furniture.

There are a few things that must not be thrown into dumpsters, no matter the condition or situation. Absolutely prohibited in dumpsters are: batteries containing lead, used motor oil and filters, whole tires, air conditioners, appliances, large pieces of metal, paint cans containing liquid paint, hazardous waste and any waste generated at an industrial site such as oilfield locations.

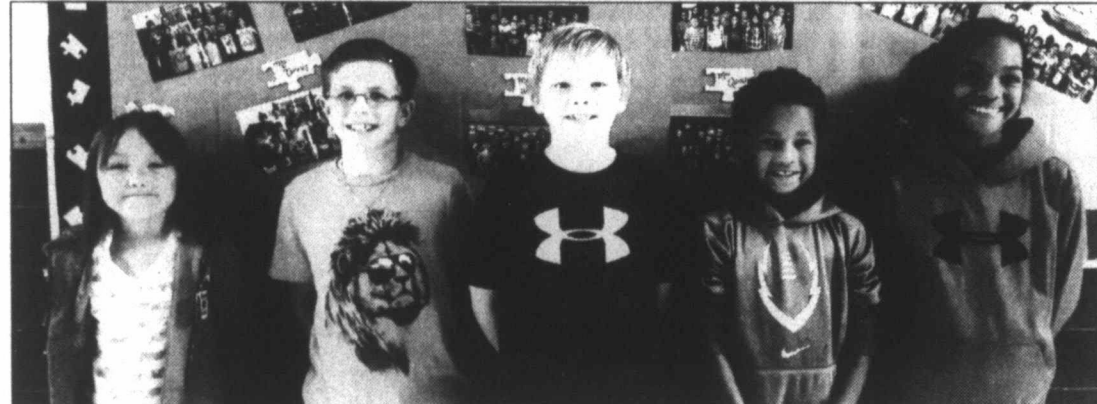

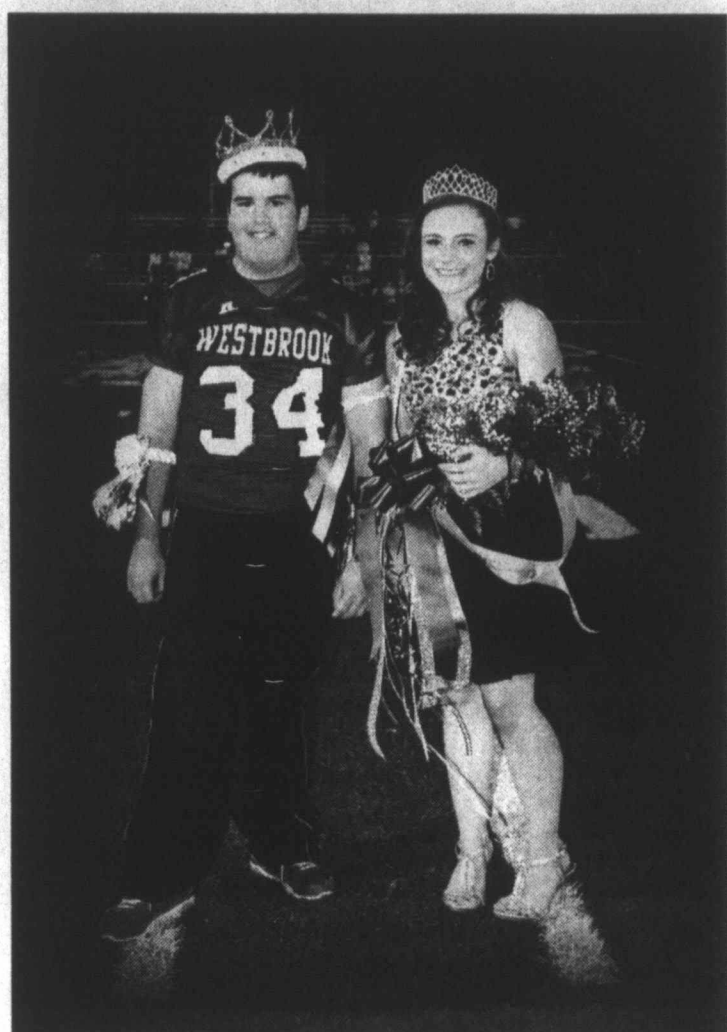

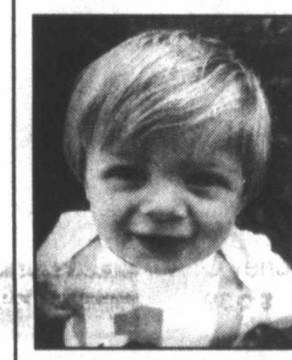

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, REPEALING AND REPLACING ORDINANCE 2015-08, HOUSING STANDARDS CODE; ESTABLISHING MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR STRUCTURES WITHIN THE CITY AND WITHIN 5,000 FEET OUTSIDE CITY LIMITS; ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE FOR THE ABATEMENT OF SAME; AUTHORIZING THE COLORADO CITY MUNICIPAL COURT TO ISSUE ADMINISTRATIVE SEARCH WARRANTS AND AUTHORIZING DESIGNATED HOUSING STANDARDS INSPECTORS TO OBTAIN SAME; PROVIDING A REPEALING CLAUSE; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES; REQUIRING PUBLICATION OF SAID ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

**PENALTY SECTION**

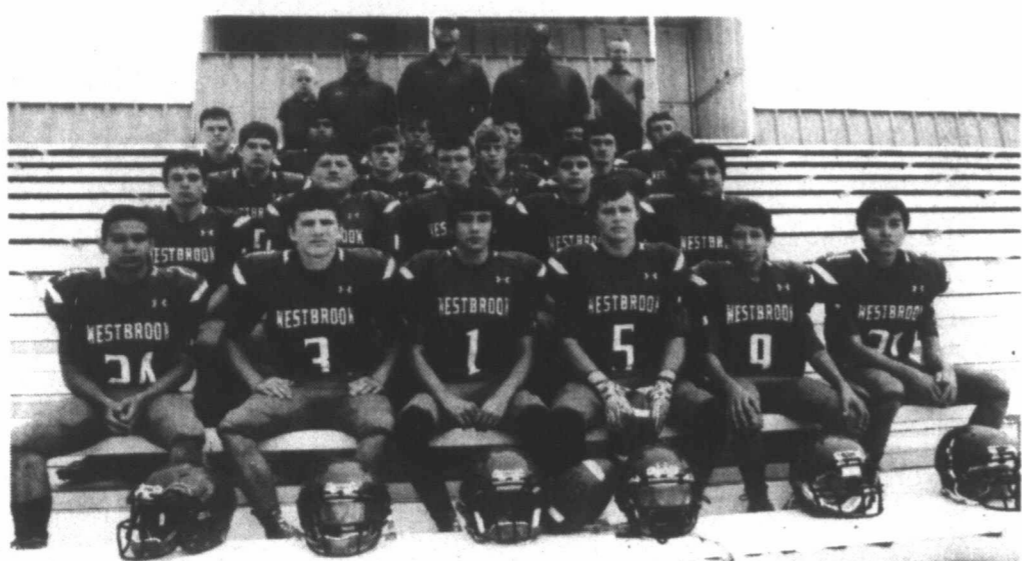

## Second half surge carries Clyde past C-City

CLYDE — Through the first three weeks of the 2015 high school football season, the Colorado City Wolves had been waiting for their offense to show up.

On Friday night in Clyde, it did.

Backed by a season-high 127 yards passing from junior quarterback Tommy James and 93 yards rushing from De'Ante Adkison, the Wolves managed to surpass 300 total yards for the first time this season and posted three touchdowns.

Unfortunately for the Wolves, their new-found offense wasn't enough to fend off the Clyde Bulldogs in front of a large crowd in Bulldog Stadium. Clyde rolled up more than 600 total yards and seven TDs en route to a 50-20 come-from-behind win in non-district play.

The Wolves, now 1-3 for the season, had plenty of reason to smile early. The CHS defense gave Clyde fits in the opening minutes and forced a pair of turnovers that directly led to a Colorado City lead.

Isaiah Jennings came up with the first of the big plays for the Wolves on the third play of the

game. After Clyde had reeled off 13 yards on a first down on their first two snaps, the CHS defensive back stripped the ball from Clyde's Kaden Clark on a pass play and scooped up the loose ball at the C-City 42.

The Colorado City offense was unable to take advantage of the gift, however. A pair of illegal procedure penalties put the Wolves in a hole quickly and, minutes later, forced Mark Munoz to punt the ball away.

Munoz put Clyde's back against its own end zone with the punt. Following the punt, Gage White and James raced downfield and downed the ball at the Clyde 1.

Jennings made things even worse seconds later. The senior picked off Riley on the ensuing play and gave the Wolves a first down at the Bulldog 12.

As a team, the CHS defense forced three first-half turnovers by the Bulldogs.

James made sure the Wolves didn't let a second opportunity slip away. After a pair of short run plays by Adkison had moved the ball to the Clyde 8, James called his own number, taking

the snap from Justin Trawick and scampered eight yards into the end zone.

James' touchdown staked the Wolves to a 6-0 lead with 8:33 left in the opening frame of play.

Clyde got its offense in gear from there. The Bulldogs rallied back to take the lead on their ensuing possession, going 51 yards in four plays before Riley hooked up with Tyler Crawford on a 17-yard scoring play on a 4<sup>th</sup>-and-Goal play.

Clyde continued to wield the hot hand in the second quarter. The Bulldogs garnered two more touchdowns in the frame and took a 22-6 lead into the half.

The wheels came off the Colorado City wagon in the third. Clyde scored on all three of its possessions in the first 12 minutes of the second half and ballooned its lead to a staggering 43-6 margin.

Colorado City didn't roll over and die. The Wolves answered the buzzer for the fourth quarter with a flurry, despite having to play without Adkison, who left late in the third quarter with a shoulder injury.

White gave the Wolves the spark they needed following Clyde's final TD in the third quarter. The CHS kick returned fielded a short kick and returned it to the C-City 41. Moments later, James and the Wolves' offense hit stride in a big way. Colorado City ended Clyde's 36-0 scoring run with a lightning quick 4-play, 59-yard march that lasted just 1:28. James capped the march by tossing a 45-yard scoring strike to Munoz with 10:32 left in the fourth quarter.

Colorado City struck again on their next possession, this time going 61 yards in five plays.

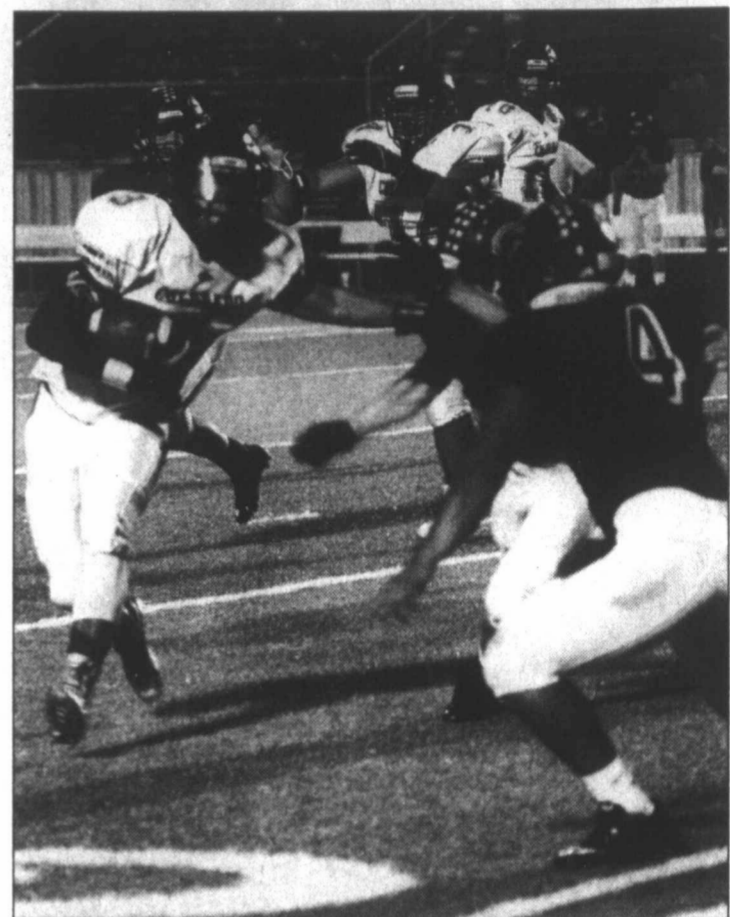
James led off the Wolves' third scoring drive with a quick 15-yard pass to Munoz. Following a 21-yard quarterback keeper and a

pair of short runs, C-City found itself staring at a 1<sup>st</sup>-and-10 from the Clyde 13.

Munoz capped the effort from there by catching a quick screen pass from James on the next play and dancing his way into the end zone.

Munoz finished the game with a season-high six receptions for 93 yards and two touchdowns.

Colorado City is scheduled to close out its non-district schedule this Friday when they host the Hawley Bearcats at Wolf Stadium.
