Farm Machine Production to Double in 1944

No Restriction on Manufacture of Repair Parts

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 28.—Manufacture of repair parts for farm machinery in 1944 will not be restricted, and production of needed types of equipment will be about double the output of 1943. This outlook is based upon the total overall materials authorized by the War Production Board for making planting, tillage and harvesting equipment during the year. Comparably, it is about 80 per cent of the 1940 production, a year in which manufacture was relatively large.

According to information from the War Food Administration to the A. and M. College Extension Service, sufficient tonnage of carbon steel has been authorized to manufacturers to meet the entire machinery and repair parts schedule for domestic use.

The WFA explains that the improved outlook for 1944 permits a reduction in the number of types of machinery which it will be necessary to ration compared with the rationing schedules of this year. And, incidentally, neither attachments nor repair parts for next year are subject to rationing and distribution. Distribution control will be necessary on only 46 types of machines and rationing control on only three. As a consequence nearly normal trade relationships will exist between farmers, dealers and manufacturers, the agency forecasts.

It is disclosed that production from July 1 to September 30 the first quarter of the 1943-44 program of spring-use equipment, including land preparation machinery, seeding equipment, tillage tools and similar items, amounted to 760,500 units. During the four months ending October 31, the total tractor production for farm use was slightly more than 25 per cent of the year's production schedule.

According to the WFA's analysis of the farm equipment situation, the tight spot will be hauling vehicles, including trucks and replacement tires for trucks now in operation.

Highway to Liberal to Be Improved

According to an Associated Press dispatch from Oklahoma City under date of December 27, the Oklahoma Highway Commission had agreed to improve U. S. Highway between the Texas-Oklahoma state line and the Oklahoma-Kansas state line.

Capt. C. G. Beckenback, Dallas, and Capt. E. F. Phillips, Amarillo, conferred with the Oklahoma Commission regarding the necessity of the highway being improved because of its military value.

This route is used by hundreds of trucks daily transporting gasoline and oil from Borger to the air fields at Liberal, Garden City, Dodge City and other Kansas fields.

Amos Schuster of the firm of Schuster & Boren of Perryton, which has the contract for supplying the above fields with gasoline, has been working for several months to get this much needed improvement.

Federal Funds Available for Maternal Care Wives Enlisted Men

Austin, Texas.—Federal funds are now available with which to provide maternal medical care for wives of enlisted men in the armed forces and for medical and nursing care for their infants, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Children's Bureau of the United States Department of Labor has released funds to the Texas State Health Department with which to administer this program.

Two distinct services will be rendered under this program, explained Dr. Cox: complete maternity care for wives of enlisted men in the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard; medical and hospital care for sick infants under one year of age whose fathers are within these four pay grades.

Maternity care as provided under this program will consist of medical care during the prenatal period, child birth, and six weeks thereafter—including any complications resulting from pregnancy.

Sick infants will be given medical, hospital, and nursing care during the first year of life. Nursing care, in the home, will be made available by local health departments where there are established services. Beside nursing care will be provided only upon the recommendation of the attending physician.

Forms of requesting care may be obtained from the local or State health departments, Welfare agencies, American Red Cross Chapters, USO centers and local physicians.

The United States Congress made it clear in passing the legislation making provision for this service that it is to be provided as the right of any wife and infant of an enlisted man in the fourth, fifth, sixth, or seventh pay grades of our armed forces.

Storm Rages All Day Monday Eight Inch Snow Drifts High Blocks Roads, Communications

It started in early morning with a coat of sleet and ice, developing into a real blizzard about daylight and continuing until after dark. Draft Age Farmers Released for Temporary War Jobs!

State Headquarters for Selective Service permits draft-age farmers in this area to accept war jobs during slack seasons without affecting their deferment classifications.

Because men are urgently needed in vital war industries in this area, farmers and farm laborers may accept temporary jobs in essential industries under the following conditions as cited in a Headquarters memorandum of Dec. 6th to all local boards, WMC Area No. 6:

- (A) They remain in their seasonal occupations for a period of not less than 8 months of the year;
- (B) They become engaged during the off-season for farming operations in some occupation in war production or in support of the war effort; and
- (C) Upon the reopening of the season in which they may pursue their normal seasonal occupation they return to the seasonal occupations that constituted the basis for their original deferment and resume their status as necessary men therein.

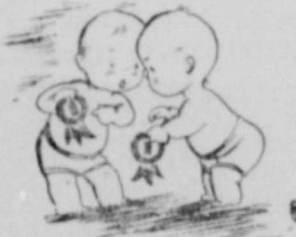

Postoffice Receipts 1943 Record High

December Receipts Also Show Gain Over Previous Years

Receipts of the Perryton Postoffice continue to increase, according to information released today by M. R. Coffee, postmaster. The 1943 postoffice receipts for Perryton were the largest for any year. Total receipts for 1943 were \$214,006, compared to \$18,039.99 for 1942, or a gain of \$2,108.09. This is a ten per cent increase. Receipts for the month of December 1943 were \$2,871.53 compared with \$2,097.61 for the same period in 1942.

During the nine years that Mr. Coffee has served as Postmaster, there has been a consistent gain each year, with the 1943 totals reaching an all time high. The total receipts for 1935, which was Mr. Coffee's first year, amounted to \$11,954.77, compared to the \$20,148.06 of last year, or a gain of \$8,193.29.

John Rawleigh Dillard, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Dillard, was born March 12, 1904, at Hillsdale, Okla., and passed away in Perryton Sunday morning, January 2, at the age of 39 years, 9 months and 20 days. He moved with his parents to Ochiltree County when he was eight years old. He has been making his home in and around Perryton for a number of years. The past ten years he was employed on the Alex Johnson farm. He was a member of the First Christian church. Mr. Dillard was known as a trustworthy citizen, a man of his word, always glad and willing to help in any possible way when he was called upon.

Emergency Crop Loans Are Available

Emergency Crop Loans, known generally as "seed loans," are now available to farmers for the production of vitally important food crops and normal crops for 1944, according to announcement of W. E. Farwell, manager of the Dallas Emergency Crop Loan Office of the Farm Credit Administration.

Applications for the loans in this county are being taken at County Clerk's office, by Mrs. Mabel McLarty under the direction of Field Supervisor Chas. C. Bishop.

Funds obtained under these loans may be used to cover the general expense of crop production including the cost of preparing the land, purchase of seed, fuel oil, fertilizer and supplies. A first mortgage on the crops to be financed is the security required.

These loans have been made in this county for a number of years and have proven of great benefit to farmers of limited collateral whose cash requirements are small. The maximum loan to an individual is \$400. Applicants who can secure loans from banks or other sources are not eligible for "the seed loans."

As in the past, borrowers will be required to plant a large garden for home use and a balanced crop program will be encouraged.

County Farm Agent News

Clay Spurlock, Ochiltree County Farm Agent

The Ochiltree County Planning map has been received from the Rural Electrification Administration office, St. Louis, Mo., and is now being completed, says County Agent Clay Spurlock. Herman Hargrove and Earl Waide have volunteered their services in locating every single farm and ranch home in the county. It is necessary that every house be spotted in the map in order to make a preliminary survey.

It isn't probable that we will be able to secure a power line until after the war, however, by completing a preliminary survey and organizing an association, we will be in line for immediate action when WPA removes war-time restrictions on construction material.

There are 300-102 farms in Texas without central station electric service, the Rural Electrification Administration has advised the A. and M. College Extension Service. Knowing farm people's appreciation of rural electrification, C. B. Ray, extension specialist in cooperative marketing, predicts a big expansion in REA co-ops after the war. There now are about 74 such co-ops in the state, he says.

Rural Electrification is not exactly at a standstill, despite critical shortages of materials. Where electric service will greatly increase war food production, some extensions are being made to REA lines. For example, rural electric cooperatives at Brady, Roby, Robstown, Honda, and Stanton recently have been allocated loans for this type of expansion.

Annual C. of C. Meeting Is Postponed

The annual membership meeting of the Perryton Chamber of Commerce scheduled for Monday evening, Jan. 10, has been postponed indefinitely, so states retiring president John Sammons. A new date will be settled upon just as soon as the weather moderates.

The 1944 Board of Directors will meet soon to elect new officers. The 1944 board is composed of J. H. Woodward, H. I. Hudson, T. R. Murray, Virgil Castle, H. D. Malone, Sam Hergert and Wesley Bryan.

Hoch is Alive



Pvt. Wesley Hoch, an Ochiltree county boy reported as "missing in action" for almost two years, is alive and a prisoner of war. Wesley is interned in an Imperial Japanese prisoner camp at Bawlemin, Burma. This welcome news was received Sunday in a card written by Wesley to P. D. Thiessen, his uncle with whom he has made his home for years as a son. He said his health was good and wanted to know about the Thiessen family. Wesley enlisted Jan. 15, 1941, and sailed for the Philippines with the 131st Field Artillery, Nov. 17, 1941. While enroute to the Islands, they heard of the fall of Manila and changed their course, going to Java. He was last heard from on Jan. 24, 1942.

JUST HERE and THERE

We just read a "snort" from the old rock ribbed, isolationist, anti-Roosevelt, Republican newspaper over at Enid that operates under the name of the News and Eagle. This time they are spouting off about the soldier vote bill that was killed by the Republican senators ganged up with some Southern Democrats.

Such an editorial is an insult to the men and women of the armed forces. The Enid newspaper says that if this bill had passed the service men would have been lined up and voted in solid blocks for the reelection of Roosevelt. We really enjoyed a visit the other day with Jim Anderson, MML/c, U. S. Seabees, who is back in the states after more than a year in the Southwest Pacific.

Jim was on Guadalcanal one year and five days. He landed Nov. 4, 1942 and left Nov. 9, 1943. The force Jim was with landed about 40 miles east of Henderson Field and later moved to about 20 miles from Henderson Field.

His outfit was in construction work, building bases, roads and bridges. Jim said that he drove a bulldozer most of the time. We asked him about fishing on Guadalcanal and he said it was really good with hand grenades and dynamite.

Jim was first stationed on New Caledonia. On the trip to Guadalcanal, the convoy was halted about twenty miles from the island because a large Japanese task force was near the place of landing. His ship got separated from the convoy and was without escort most of the night before they landed. They encountered no opposition in landing.

Jim says that he survived 221 air raids, six earthquakes and two floods and three attacks of jungle fever. He reports Jan. 23 at Camp Parks, near Oakland, Calif.

Eight Cars Protein Feed Received Here

Certificate Holders Must Take Out Feed When Available

Eight tons of protein feed, including soy bean cake and meal, have been received in Perryton, so states Herman Hargrove, who is in charge of the distribution for the AAA. Mr. Hargrove warns that persons holding certificates for feed must take same out of warehouse at the Perryton Equity just as soon as they receive the certificate.

Due to shortage of storage facilities, feed for which certificates have been issued, cannot be held. Such feed not removed will be issued to certificate holders who are ready to haul the feed out.

There is very little red tape to the issuance of certificates regardless of what a leading Panhandle newspaper reports. Persons entitled to certificates can obtain them in a few minutes from Mr. Hargrove at the AAA office in the courthouse.

While the feed situation remains critical, it now looks as though farmers will be able to get sufficient feed to get by. There will not be enough feed for everybody to have as much as they want.

Wholesale Gas Stations Are Robbed Friday

The wholesale stations of the Sinclair Refining Company and the Texaco Company were broken into and robbed Friday night, December 31. Both stations report cash, checks and gas rationing stamps stolen. Wednesday afternoon, this week, the sheriff's office stated that no arrests had been made.

The Sinclair Refining Company stated that approximately \$200 in currency and cash was taken, and some R and T gas stamps. W. A. Cone, agent, was unable to give the exact amount of cash and gas stamps stolen. The robber or robbers tore the lock off and left the door open when they left.

Horace Lackey, agent for the Texaco Company, reported the loss of \$165 in checks and currency, and T stamps amounting to 1400 gallons. Mr. Lackey said he had no way of knowing the time of the robbery but that it was after 11:30 Friday night.

Freezing of Canned Foods is Often Not Ruined

"Is canned food safe to eat after it has frozen?" This question is asked frequently during the winter months, says Sadie Seward, Home Demonstration Agent.

Freezing in itself does not spoil canned food, but when food swells in freezing, it may break a jar or break the seal on a can or jar, so that spoilage organisms may enter. If a jar of frozen food breaks, there is danger that the food may contain broken glass and then the jar and contents should be discarded. All other canned foods that have frozen should be examined for leakage and bulges. Any that show leakage should be used promptly like any other opened canned food.

Those that have bulges but no leakage should also be used as soon as possible if they cannot be kept frozen, for they may have a break enough to let bacteria in. As a safe-guard, if frozen canned food has stood after thawing, it is well to boil for at least 15 minutes before eating. Any food that shows any sign of spoilage should be destroyed.

Draft Age Farmers Released for Temporary War Jobs!

State Headquarters for Selective Service permits draft-age farmers in this area to accept war jobs during slack seasons without affecting their deferment classifications.

Because men are urgently needed in vital war industries in this area, farmers and farm laborers may accept temporary jobs in essential industries under the following conditions as cited in a Headquarters memorandum of Dec. 6th to all local boards, WMC Area No. 6:

- (A) They remain in their seasonal occupations for a period of not less than 8 months of the year;
- (B) They become engaged during the

off-season for farming operations in some occupation in war production or in support of the war effort; and

(C) Upon the reopening of the season in which they may pursue their normal seasonal occupation they return to the seasonal occupations that constituted the basis for their original deferment and resume their status as necessary men therein.

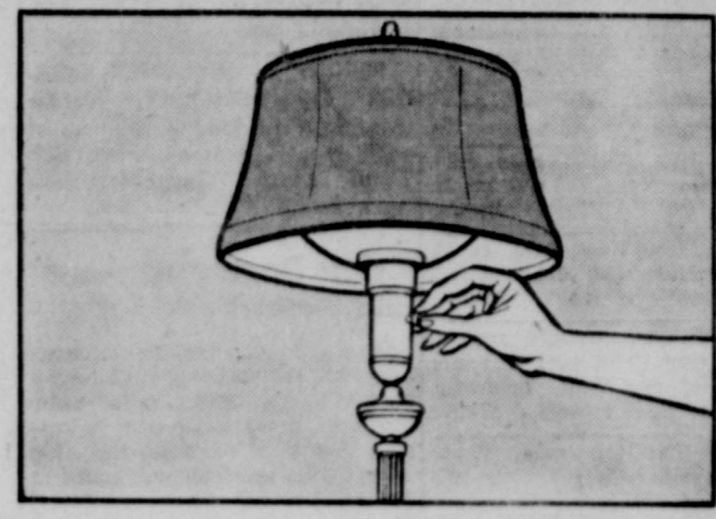

NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

Your 1943 Taxes are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1944, to avoid penalty.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1943 are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1943 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1943 or will become 21 before election are required to secure an exemption certificate during January 1, 1944 before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

1944 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1944, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1944.

SCHOOL TAXES ARE DUE!

Remember that penalties on 1943 unpaid taxes are added at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent per month until July 1, 1944, when the penalty is increased to eight per cent and interest charges at the rate of one-half per cent per month are added.
