

Snooter Knows

A MAJORITY OF THE QUALIFIED voters of the city of Stanton have spoken their sentiments. They expressed their opposition to two of the six propositions incorporated in the \$84,000 bond issue voted on last Tuesday, in vehement terms. The two projects failing to be approved by the voters were Nos. 4 and 5 the former relating to a swimming pool and the latter to a recreation hall.

The vote on these two projects showed up this column to good advantage. We would have sworn by all that was holy they would have gone over the top with a bang. We had had it dinged-donged into our ears for the past many years by so many parents and others, that what Stanton needed the most to keep the teenagers at home was to provide them with recreational facilities—two of the more important of these facilities to get the job done were a swimming pool and recreation hall or youth center. In point of importance the swimming pool ranked first with the recreation hall or youth center, placing second.

We had heard so many pleas made in favor of the two over a period of so many years, we'd have banked our reputation, (though small that may be) on them passing by a good majority if the time ever arrived for a vote to be taken.

The swimming pool project was defeated by a near two to one vote—69 for to 139 against. The recreation hall died a similar death under an avalanche of opposition votes—142 against to 64 in favor of it.

These two projects were the very ones that appealed to the youth of Stanton. A couple of projects that would figure prominently in providing recreational facilities to help keep our youth at home.

WE HAVE SPIRITED COMPETITION in the 80-year-old-age bracket. We admit this editor at the age of 80 is continuing his pace at keeping longer hours than we. Starting time is now 9 a. m. and it's often after midnight when Reiley turns off the desk light.

The elderly veteran's only concession in this seven-days-a-week routine is an afternoon walk in recent years with his grandchildren and a short nap after dinner. My only respite from the all-day grind is time-out for coffee, being sure my pals in the office get the pay check.

Reiley was 10 (and we were 14) when he started his newspaper career as an apprentice typesetter.

OIL NEWS:

Producer Adds To Oil Activity

The Germania (Grayburg) area southwest of Stanton has gained three more producers.

Murphy Corporation and Husky Oil Company No. 4 Fasken was finished for a 24-hour pumping potential of 68 barrels of 32-gravity oil and no water through perforations from 3,936 to 3,949 feet after 31,000 gallons of fracture solution had been used.

Gas-oil ratio was 86-1. Location is 1,007 feet from north and 1,659 feet from east lines of section 14, block 37, J. V. Stokes survey.

Murphy and Husky also completed No. 7 A. Fasken for a daily pumping potential of 88 barrels of 32-gravity oil. Production was through perforations from 3,946 to 3,962 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 115-1. Completion was natural.

Location is 2,344 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of section 14, block 37, J. V. Stokes survey, 14 miles east of Midland.

Fryer & Hanson Drilling Company completed the third new well. It is No. 1-G-13 A. Fasken, 330 feet from west and 1,867.85 feet from south lines of section 33, block 37, T-2-S, J. V. Stokes survey.

The well was completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 75.8 barrels of 32-gravity oil through a quarter-inch choke and perforations from 3,928 to 3,938 feet.

Eleven miles southwest of Stanton, Ray Morris Drilling Company of Odessa will dig a 3,500-foot Grayburg wildcat as No. 1-26 W. G. Spencer.

Site is 2,320 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 26, block 35, T-2-S, T&P survey.

Operations are to start at once.

Two new projects and a new producer have been reported for the Moore field of West Howard County.

M. E. Daniel & Lester Clark of Breckenridge will dig No. 1 Jack Wilcox 330 feet from south and west lines of the east half of northeast quarter of section 20, block 33, T-1-S, T&P survey. It is slated for a 3,500-foot bottom.

Same operator will dig No. 3 J. H. Allison is a 3,200-foot project in the same field. It is 1,350 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 6, block 33, T-1-S, T&P survey.

John I. and P. D. Moore and Dunagan Drilling Company No. 1 Dunagan-Conoco is a new well in the Moore field. Operators reported a 24-hour pumping potential of 75.72 barrels of 29-gravity oil from open hole section at 3,176-3,232 feet.

Pay was fractured with 10,000 gallons.

Location is 330 feet from south and west lines of section 19, block 33, T-1-S, T&P survey.

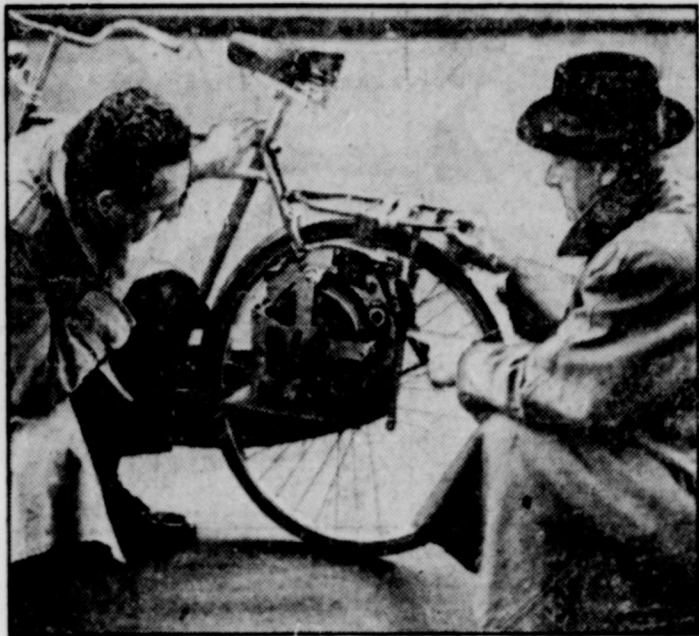
New Mercury Dealer Here

Covington, the daughter, Carol, her parents and by three brothers and a sister. They are: Henry G. Orson and Dr. O. W. Orson, both of Midland; and William Orson, Tarzan; and Mrs. J. Alfred Tom, Midland.

Mrs. Covington had been very active in Midland civic affairs, and at the time of her death was a Girl Scout leader. She had served in every capacity in Girl Scout work, from president on town, and served as secretary-manager of the Midland chapter of commerce in 1945 and 1946. She was a member of the Eastern Star and of the First Baptist church in Midland.

County Gets \$7,500 Back

Martin county has recovered \$7,500 of the money which last summer's grand jury charged had been spent illegally. County Judge Jim McCoy confirmed here Wednesday. The money was part of the funds involved when former County Judge James McMorries and others were indicted for misappropriation of county funds.

The \$7,500 recovered was secured by Jess M. Miles, who was chairman of a committee which assisted the grand jury last summer in auditing the county's books. Miles is an auditor and is a member of the Stanton high school faculty. The check

was secured from Henry L. Stafford, Lubbock contractor, and labeled "a refund for excessive and erroneous charges made against Martin county."

McMorries is now serving a three year sentence in the state penitentiary as a result of his plea of guilty to a charge of theft of Martin county funds. There are still 11 indictments against McMorries, and a conviction on another charge, as a result of which he was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary, now on appeal. Additional indictments are to be tried against Oliver Vaughn and Stanley Lewis, former county commissioners; James Herndon, Stanton contractor; and against Whit and M. H. McMorries, brothers of the former judge.

All so far have been tried in Sweetwater under a change of venue from Martin county.

Deavenport To Leave Council

With the positive announcement from Bob Deavenport that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself as alderman, city politics began to show more interest this week.

Using the words of Calvin Coolidge, Deavenport said: "I do not choose to run for alderman in the coming city election." Deavenport is now finishing his first term on the council, but finds the press of business and other activities too much to continue as alderman.

With Sam Wilkinson also going out because he is moving to the country, and the term of S. H. Wheeler also expiring, that will make three new councilmen to elect this spring. June Graham still has one year to serve, as does Phil Berry. Mayor J. W. Sale also has another year to serve, but the election of three new aldermen could turn the balance of power any particular way a group would choose.

The big accomplishment of the council the past year is probably getting the people to vote \$71,000 worth of bonds for water department and street improvements.

The bonds were voted only recently, and details of preparing them for sale and use are now being worked out.

St. Paul Had Solution For Quarreling

There are many things in the two epistles that Saint Paul wrote to the Christians at Corinth, the longest in the New Testament. And much in the letters has to do with the dissensions that arose so early in the church. Particularly noteworthy is Paul's comment and counsel concerning these church quarrels, and especially his commendation of Christian love as the great means of overcoming them.

Whether the dissensions at Corinth amounted to actual quarrels or not we cannot tell. But the difference of opinion and the divisions were evidently very sharp. Throughout the long history of Christian churches, quarrels have frequently been bitter and sharp, degrading the institution in its rightful organization and in its right to profess to serve God. The dissensions among the Corinthian Christians were very much like those that have appeared again and again in modern churches.

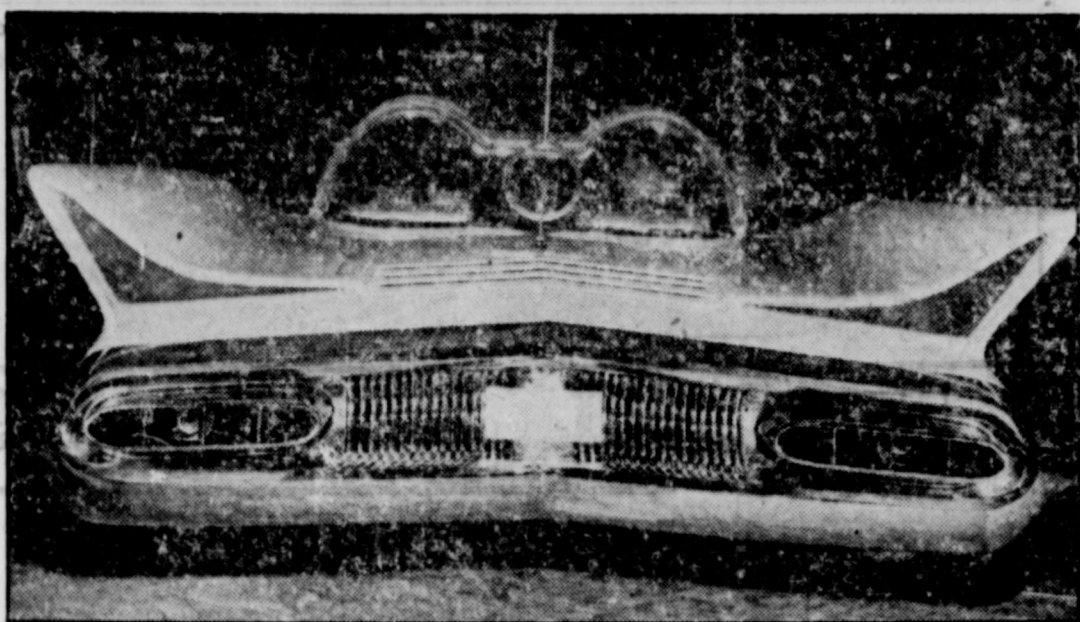

Time Short To Test Car Safety

"More than 60 per cent of Martin County motorists have yet to register their automobiles for safety inspection stickers," said O. L. Birchfield of the Midland unit of the Texas Department of Public Safety this week.

Mr. Birchfield in urging the car-owners to get inspection stickers before the last minute, pointed out that only seven weeks remain before the April 15 deadline.

According to the department's records there are 3,100 vehicles registered in Martin County, and only 1,212 have been inspected to date. "Minimum fine for failure to have a sticker is \$15.50," Birchfield said, "and the law will be enforced."

Farm & Ranch Review



By JAMES E. KELLY

In the Southwest, livestock men will be able to take advantage of the big grain sorghum crop which was harvested last fall.

Texas harvested 5,471,000 acres of grain sorghum for a total yield of 117,386,000 bushels, almost twice as much as was raised in the state in 1953.

Grain sorghum has become a standby in many areas and the big increase last year largely reflected the effect of cotton acreage allotments.

Douglas Meador, editor of the Matador Tribune, "unbridled" his typewriter for a bit of West Texas range jargon in this editorial paragraph:

"Caution within reason is never despised. When a man 'saddles' his ambition with intention to 'ride' into the 'pastures' of accomplishment, he can prevent possible calamity by testing the strength of his 'cinches' before he puts a foot in the 'stirrup'."

Prices of farm lands in Texas fell two per cent in the four months ending November 1, 1954. Wyoming and Colorado showed the largest declines in farm land prices, three and four per cent.

Last year 1,740 cotton gins were active in Texas. Recent estimates place the value of \$147,445,000 on these gins.

The third annual short course sponsored by District 1, Texas Garden Club, Inc., has been scheduled for April 13 on the Texas Tech campus.

Garden club members from 64 Panhandle and South Plains counties, are expected to attend.

Lectures on turf grasses, color planning, garden lighting and creative arranging are being scheduled.

The Santa Fe Crop Report says: "Wheat pastures in Kansas, Oklahoma, northwest Texas, and eastern Colorado, have provided limited grazing and are about exhausted. Sorghum fields have provided considerable grazing in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas."

The Lamb County Farm Bureau held a one day campaign for members to join the organization. A report of the drive revealed 1217 members were added to the organization.

O. H. McAllister, who owns a ranch just west of Stanton, copied first place in the senior bull class at Denver's National Western Livestock Show. The winner is sired by Mr. McAllister's show sire, M. Proud Mixer 17th, a bull that was six times a grand champion and never defeated in competition.

This year's official state show for the Texas Hereford Assn. will be the Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse Show, held at Odessa March 9-13.

Jay Taylor of Amarillo, president of the American National Cattlemen's Assn., speaking before the Alabama Cattlemen's association, declared that despite increased beef consumption cattlemen aren't making as much money as they should.

"The returns on our investments, management, labor and risk are still too low or non-existent."

At the Coke County Livestock Show held recently at Bronte, Miss Leslie Neil Wink, 18, won grand champion honors in the baby beef class. About 700 turned out to view the 142 entries. The winning steer was a 15-month-old 4-H Hereford weighing about 740 pounds.

The show was held in the new FFA barn erected at Bronte by vocational agriculture boys near the city park at a cost of \$36.

Speaking of cotton burrs being spread on farm land as a fertil-

izer to the soil, the State Line Tribune, published at Farwell in Farmer county, says, "right now trucks are being kept busy making trips from gin composting or grinding site to pick up the waste material and return it to area farms." And continues The Tribune: "There are several distinct advantages in making use of the burrs. To the farmers it means that soil nutrients including nitrogen and phosphorous will be added to their land (something most irrigated fields need now), and as a consequence productivity will be realized."

County Agent Jones of Farmer county says: "Through the years, a sum estimated at mil-

lions of dollars has gone up in smoke in cotton producing areas for the simple reason that no practical use had been discovered for burrs—a by-product of ginning."

Ben Spears, extension agronomist of Texas A&M College reports guarantee purity, higher germination and boosted crop yields await farmers who buy and plant certified seed this year.

This seed with a "blue tag" came from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, properly handled at harvest, cleaned and tested for purity and germination.

Only after the seed has pass-

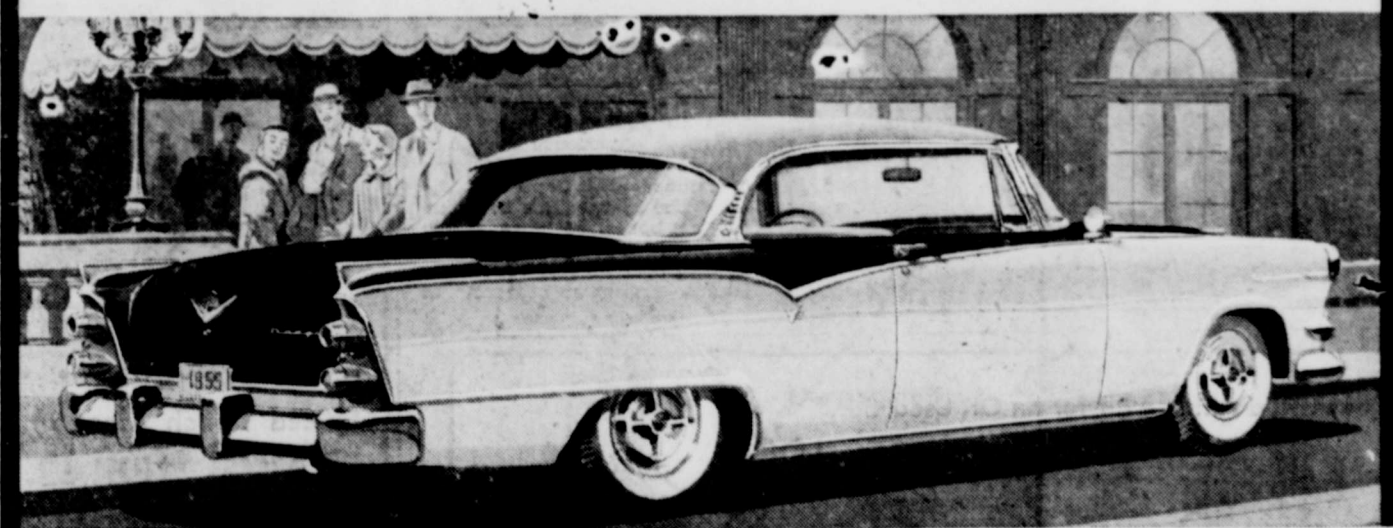

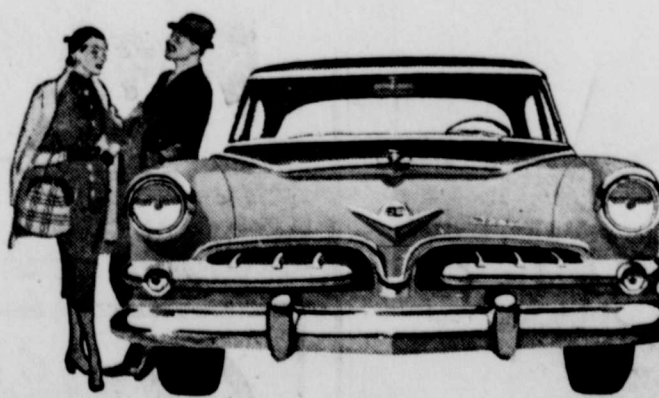

The chair is handmade, the material hewn from a live hickory tree, perfectly fashioned into a chair, revealing its conversion from the raw product into the finished, was done by skilled hands.

The first settlers in Martin County were Germans. The cleverness displayed in making the chair leads to the suspicion that the antique article of furniture could have been brought to this county by some one of those early settlers back 60 or more years ago.

At least the tree from which the chair was made never grew in Martin County. Why and how come it to find refuge in the attic of the couthouse, weighs heavily on the mind of our county judge. If there be anyone who can pull aside the curtain of mystery and reveal the subject's true identity, please hasten to inform County Judge Jim McCoy.

EFFORTS ARE BEING MADE by the Crane chamber of commerce to arouse interest in the people of this area to work to preserve the Horsehead Crossing on the Pecos River, located near Given, in Pecos county. This point afforded the only crossing on the Pecos for the cattle barons of that pioneer West Texas period, to cross their herds of longhorn cattle, chuck-wagons, cowpokes and cow ponies.

All along the course of the Pecos its banks are steep, almost perpendicular, and water several feet below, is brackish and muddy. Horsehead Crossing pro-

vided the only safe year around place in Texas to ford.

Not many of the pioneer cowmen and cowboys are living today who knew Horsehead Crossing and actually experienced crossing it with herds of longhorn cattle back in the early 1880's.

Stanton has a living example of a cowboy who drove cattle across Horsehead in its heyday. He is "Uncle Billy" W. T. Epley, who, with his wife, lives in Stanton. He owns a ranch in north-west Martin County, on which his son Claire (Snooks) Epley

and his family reside and operate.

Wayne Gard, an editorial writer on the Dallas Morning News, writing the story, "On the Butterfield Trail," appearing in the February number of The Texas Parade, published in Austin, referred to the Horsehead Crossing on the Pecos. He said the Butterfield Overland Mail route, a 2,650 mile line, running from St. Louis, Mo., to San Francisco, Calif., operated through Texas from Sept. 15, 1858 until March 1, 1861, crossed the treacherous

Pecos in August 1859 at Horsehead Crossing on a ferryboat.

NOW WE HAVE IN THE PROCESS of becoming a reality, the Cowboy Hall of Fame and Museum. A. M. G. Swenson of Stamford, has been named third vice chairman of the organization and a member of the executive committee. J. Evetts Haley of Canyon, was appointed chairman of the historical committee.

The project is to be organized along the lines similar to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Coop-

erstown, N. Y. It will pay tribute to rodeo cowboys, stockmen cowboys and ranchers who helped build the West and who, today, keep western traditions alive through rodeo.

For several months the memorial was referred to informally by some as the Rodeo Hall of Fame. The cowboy name was decided on to widen the scope of the project to include famous western ranchers and cattlemen who have contributed to the development of the West but who may not have been connected with Rodeo.



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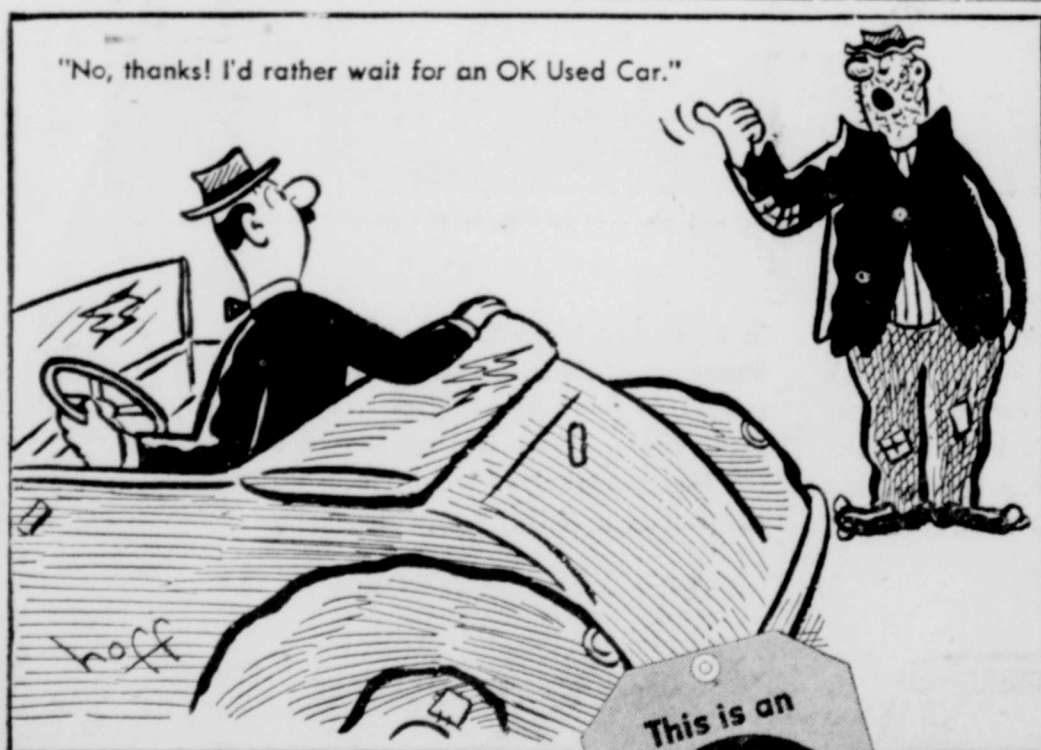
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Texas Viewpoint

The Mexican dishes were furnished by Mr. Fred Catterall of Austin. As you can imagine, Mexican food is one of the favorites of Texans here, and there are not many places where it is prepared to the style and taste of the Mexican restaurants at home.

The Texas State Society has 902 members. Anyone who has been a resident of Texas but who now works or resides in Washington is eligible for membership. It is the largest State society in Washington and the only one in which President and Mrs. Eisenhower have membership and have actually attended.

Robert B. Anderson

Each week this column will refer to one of the many outstanding Texans serving in Washington. This week we compliment the job being done by Deputy Secretary of Defense Robert B. Anderson of Vernon.

Bob Anderson was appointed in 1953 as Secretary of the Navy. In that position and in his present assignment he has made a great impression upon Washington officialdom, especially upon the President himself. President Eisenhower rates Anderson as one of the top men in his administration. We have heard the President say that Anderson has the ability to serve well in any office in the land, including that of the Presidency itself. Do not be surprised if the name of Bob Anderson should become prominent in speculation about a successor to President Eisenhower.

Wool Growers Meet

R. W. Hodge of Del Rio, President of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, and former State Senator Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo, attended two meetings here this past week in behalf of wool growers.

Joining other representatives of wool growers from other states, at one meeting they urged that the Defense Department use the present wool stockpile for manufacture of uniforms and blankets. At the other they appeared at a Department of Agriculture hearing on assignment of wool incentive payments.

Cotton Allotments

The Agriculture Committee in House of Representatives has reported a bill to help alleviate the cotton acreage allotment situation. It provides for a 3 per cent increase in cotton allotments to be used in each state, first to assist the smaller farmers by Thebringing them up to 5 acres, and then in hardship cases where the allotments were reduced by more than forty per cent of the 1954 acreage. This will mean, if passed in its present form, an additional 223,000 acres in Texas. The Senate Committee should act soon on several bills having a similar purpose, including our own bill on this subject.

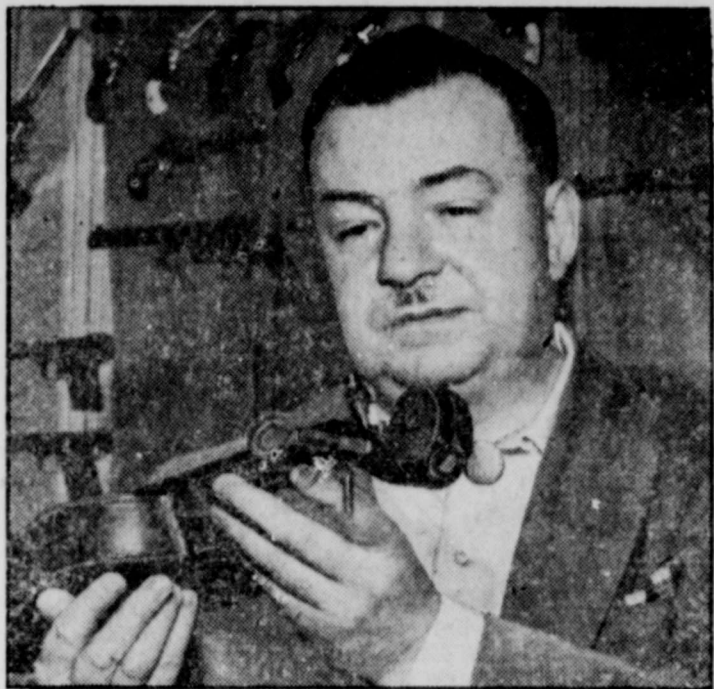

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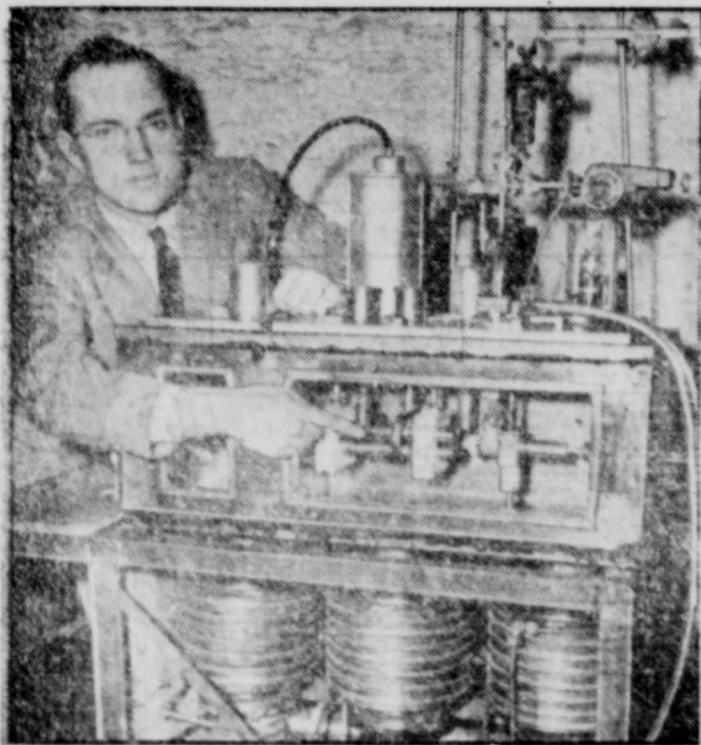

TIME FOR ATOM AGE—Prof. Charles H. Tuna Pompons With Spaghetti (Makes 4 servings)

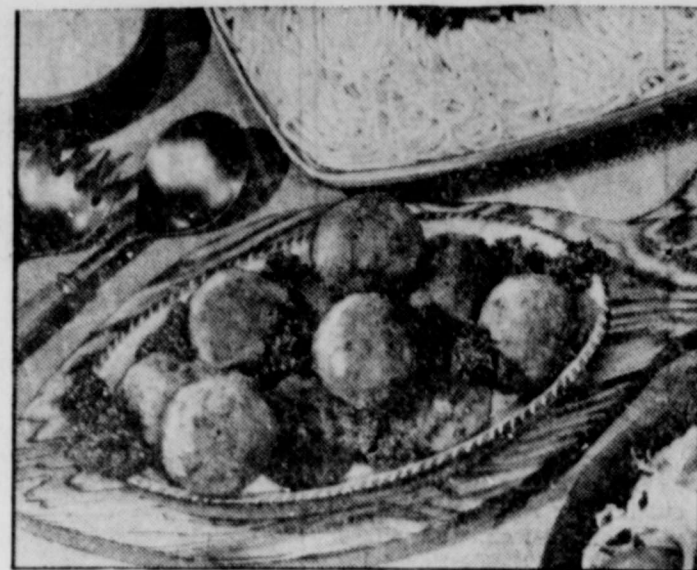
Two 6 1/2-ounce cans chunk-style tuna, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 1 6-ounce can tomato paste, 1 teaspoon oregano, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 2 eggs, 3/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 1/4 teaspoon marjoram, 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts

boiling water, 8 ounces spaghetti.

Drain tuna and reserve oil. In a saucepan combine 2 tablespoons tuna oil and onion; cook over low heat until onion is golden color. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper; mix thoroughly. Cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

In a bowl, combine tuna, unbeaten eggs, 1/2 cup crumbs and marjoram; mix thoroughly. Shape tuna mixture into 8 pompons. Roll in remaining crumbs. Melt margarine in skillet and cook pompons over medium heat until lightly browned. If desired, add browned pompons to tomato sauce and cook 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add spaghetti so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander. Serve tuna pompons with cooked spaghetti and sauce.

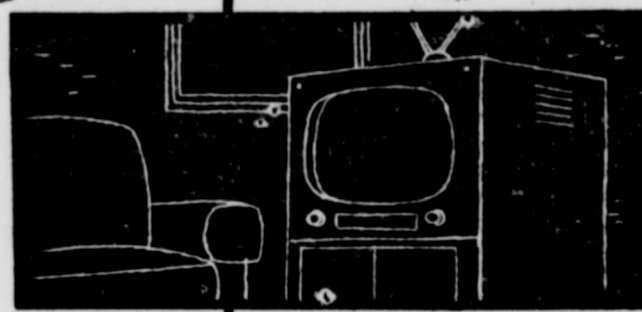
Mrs. Weathers gave a sketch of "HMS Pinafore" and Diana Dawson gave illustrations of ballet and other dances.

The minimum hourly wage was raised by law to 75 cents in 1949.



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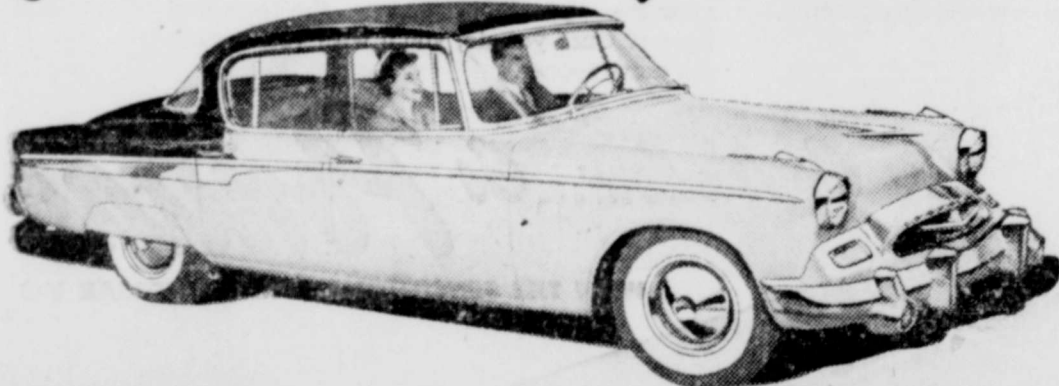
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
