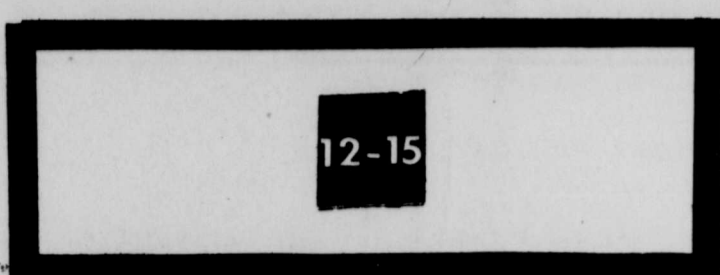

STITCHING WITCHERY

Choose fabrics, colors carefully

We are doing today what was utterly unthinkable ten years ago: putting prints with plaids with polka dots with paisley with stripes. And it's called fashion.

But, be careful. Choose your colors and fabrics with tenderness. Otherwise, you will have a combination that will give you a migraine for a week. Be fashionable — not reckless.

Dear Mrs. Kinser: What do you advise in using leather-like vinyls as trim on coats and jackets? Can it be washed if used on a washable fabric; can it be dry-cleaned if used on wools? I have made a coat and several purses out of various vinyls, and have many left-over scraps that would make attractive "added touches." — Mrs. Richard Nickel

Dear Mrs. Nickel: It's chancey. But, with a little mind-joggling and researching, I think I have hit on a plan that might work. (In sewing, nothing is impossible — almost.)

It is difficult to give you a definite answer as to whether or not your vinyl will wash or dry-clean. There are so many types of vinyl — and just as many ways to handle them.

So, it is necessary to do a little experimenting. Stitch a few inches of vinyl trim onto a piece of the fabric you are going to use. Then, put it through various washing and cleaning "baths." Or, better yet, make two or three test pieces and put each one through a different process. This should give you a no-

nonsense, no-guess-work answer as to how well it survives such treatment.

Remember, vinyl dislikes heat. Don't use a real hot water, or a hot dryer. Never touch vinyl with a hot iron — that's instant disaster. It would be best, I think, to use a fabric that will require little or no ironing so you don't run the risk of accidentally ironing over the trim.

To eliminate bulk, trim all joining seams as closely as possible; and use raw edges rather than turned-under edges whenever you can. Vinyl will not fray, so you needn't worry about it "pulling out" around the edges.

If you find, after experimenting, that your vinyl isn't going to withstand any type of washing or cleaning, then your only alternative would be to attach the trim by hand, removing it before cleaning the garment each time.

QUICK STITCH: A favorite pattern can go through only so many uses, and then suddenly it begins to disintegrate. Holes pop in it here and there, and the edges start to curl up and die. But you can't bear to throw it away. Right?

So, carefully press each pattern piece onto iron-on Pellon, working with the iron just warm enough to do the job — no hotter. Use a soft-lead pencil to redraw the markings, cutting lines, etc. that may have disappeared. Trim the Pellon on the cutting line. You now have a permanent pattern that will go through many cuttings, and foldings, and cuttings, and foldings, and cuttings.

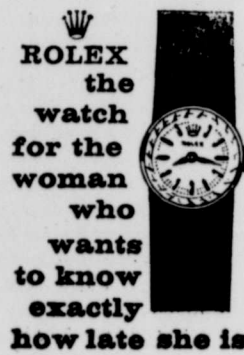

WINTER PROTECTION OF ROSES

It's Simple
And Easy

(Note To Editor: We are repeating this information together with diagrams, as there seems to be a constant new crop of novice gardeners who need and welcome these instructions.)

Wherever temperatures go below 15 degrees, roses need winter protection. All-America Rose Selections, a group of professional growers, hybridizers, and introducers of fine roses, have devised the following fundamental routine of winter protection which is practiced in their extensive test and display gardens scattered throughout the United States. They recommend that you use the same simple procedures in protecting your own roses. They are as follows:

TRIM



1. TRIM - After a hard frost or two, but before the ground freezes, prune all canes of your hybrid tea, floribunda, and grandiflora roses back to 18". This makes it easier to work around them in providing winter protection, and prevents them from becoming battered by the wind and ice of winter.

SPRAY



2. SPRAY - Remove all dead stems, leaves, and debris, raking carefully around each plant. Spray the entire plant and surrounding soil with a good fungicide and insecticide to prevent carrying over of diseases and insects on and about the plant.

MOUND



3. MOUND - Mound a pile of loose earth up over and around each plant to a height of about 12" and firm. Prune the canes of the roses so that only 4" to 6" of the tips remain exposed after mounding. The purpose of this mounding is to protect the plants from rapid changes of temperature and to guard the canes against winter wind and ice damage.

Evergreen boughs, leaves, hay or straw, thrown over the mounds will prevent washing during the winter, but such added protection should not be applied until after the ground freezes.

Carefully remove mounds in spring when new growth starts. As far as possible, plant your garden with All-America Rose Selections award winners. They have a great deal of hybrid hardiness, but even so, winters are unpredictable and winter protection is good insurance against loss.
