

HOUSE DEFEATS NEW TEXAS PRISON SYSTEM BILL PLANS LAUNCHED FOR CONTROL OF MISSISSIPPI FLOOD WATERS

CONFEREES OF 27 STATES MEET TO PLAN ACTION

LEGISLATION WILL BE OFFERED CONGRESS IN SITUATION

OFFICERS NAMED

GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS SHOW MUCH INTEREST IN PROCEEDINGS

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, June 2.—Some 27 states met today in a conference to plan action to be taken in the Mississippi valley states today.

The first flood control conference to aid in coping with one of the nation's greatest problems, the recurring floods in the Mississippi valley, was held today in Chicago.

After three days of study, the conference met Saturday will adopt recommendations it hopes may aid congress in taking the steps necessary to avoid a similar catastrophe in the future.

President Coolidge and his administration recognize the seriousness of the situation and regard the present disaster in the lower Mississippi valley as the ground for the first hand impressions of the next congress. Dwight Davis, secretary of war, the president's special representative declared.

Secretary Davis will address the conference tomorrow morning, giving the first hand impressions of the situation.

Major General Edgar Jordan, chief of the army engineers, will speak upon the details of the engineering work necessary in meeting the challenge of the future of the valley.

Policy in Plan Rapped
A half dozen speakers at the initial session this afternoon urged the demand that the floods be controlled, and that partisan politics and petty sectional ambitions not govern their way to the convention floor.

William Hale Thompson, mayor of Chicago, cooperated with Mayor Arthur J. O'Keefe of New Orleans and Mayor J. Miller of St. Louis in leading the conference call, was selected permanent chairman and the Orleans and St. Louis mayors and Mayor Bowditch of Memphis, Tenn., were named permanent co-chairmen.

James E. Watson, United States senator from Indiana, was chosen to lead twenty-two prominent men from throughout the valley on the resolutions committee.

Mayor Thompson in his opening address, explained the circumstances which had put him in the forefront of leadership, and expressed a hope that he would be able to lead the conference.

Wife Of President Calles Of Mexico Dies Of Heart Attack After Operation

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—Senora Natalia Calles, wife of President Calles of Mexico, died in a hospital here at 3:20 p. m. today of a heart attack suffered five days after a major operation.

Senora Calles, who came here five weeks ago after attending the marriage of her daughter Sonora Calles to Thomas Arnold, Robinson of New York, at Nogales, Ariz., had been progressing favorably from the operation until afternoon today. At that time she suffered a sudden heart attack and the end was foreseen in a bulletin issued by her physician, Dr. Alejandro Wallace shortly after the turn for the worse.

Developed Gall Bladder
She entered the California Lutheran hospital for observation after having developed intestinal and gall bladder trouble which her physician characterized as extremely serious. She rallied quickly from the shock of the operation and was thought to be on the road to rapid recovery when the heart attack came.

Three daughters, Senora Hortencia Torrealba, Senora Natalia Herrera and Senora Calles, were at the bedside when death came. Senora Calles was 48 years old.

Senora Calles was 48 years old, and according to members of her family, until recently had enjoyed excellent health. Nine of her twelve children are living.

Dr. Wallace, who performed the operation, said that Senora Calles was a healthy woman, and that the operation was a success.

Senora Calles was a Protestant of the Catholic faith. At the age of 18, she married a man who was a member of the same faith.

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WOMAN IS FOUND GUILTY BURGLARY

CHARGES GREW OUT OF BANK ROBBERY AND FIRE AT LANSING, KANSAS

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., June 2 (AP)—Miss Julia Murray, former cashier of the First State Bank of Lansing, Kansas, was found guilty of second degree burglary and larceny by a jury here today.

The jury had deliberated about five hours. The charges grew out of the burglary and burning of the bank last November.

Motion for a new trial will be heard tomorrow. Conviction on the two counts carries a sentence of from six to fifteen years in the penitentiary.

Miss Murray showed no emotion when the verdict was read, and made no comment as she was returned to jail.

Frank E. Starnes, recently convicted of the same charges, is now in jail awaiting sentence.

At William C. Halliday, P. M. McConnell, and Lawrence Fleming, Kansas City gunmen, plead guilty when arraigned tomorrow, as is expected, sentence may be passed on all five at the same time, it is indicated tonight.

Supplies Smuggled
The government charged that the alleged members of the ring obtained their supplies from smugglers who brought them into the United States through Florida and other Atlantic points. Sometimes, it alleges, more than \$100,000 worth of narcotics were brought in at a time.

The government began working on the case June 1, 1925, the district attorney said, in New York. Government agents traced huge supplies of opiates to Oklahoma City.

Negro Agent Held
It was not until the service of a negro narcotic agent from Washington had been obtained, Lewis said, that purchases could be made, bringing the case to a head.

Two government agents have disappeared since the government has been working on the case, and some apprehension is held for their safety, Lewis said.

Hidden Treasure
Million Dollars, Said to Be Found in Spanish Colonies

NOGALES, Ariz., June 2 (AP)—A "million dollars" worth of gold bars believed to have been hidden by the Spanish conquistadors, are reported in dispatches from Nogales, Ariz., to have been found in the ruins of a Spanish colony in the Sonoran desert.

When the prospectors explored the caverns whose mouth had been blocked by a rock, they discovered piles of heavy bars each containing a half ton of gold caused by long exposure.

Mining authorities believe the find to be part of the workings of the famous La Joya mine, operated by Don Conquistador.

TULSA, Okla., June 2 (AP)—Oil operations in the Oklahoma, Kansas and North Texas areas of the Mid-Continent field dropped to the low figure of 2,413 during the week just ended, the Oklahoma Petroleum Commission announced.

The figure is less than the 2,422 reported for the previous week.

Four Hurt As Tornado Hits Kansas

TOPEKA, June 2 (AP)—Accompanied by rain and hail, a terrific windstorm swept western Kansas today, devastating wheat in scattered sections of the wheat belt which soon will begin pouring forth its crop.

The storm reached tornado proportions at Dodge City, where four persons were known to have been injured, none seriously, before the wind shifted to the west.

At Dodge City, a wind which was reported to have attained a velocity of 64 miles an hour, blew down a score of homes, were unroofed and fifty damaged. Estimated loss was \$100,000.

TAKES OFF AT DAWN AFTER NIGHT DELAY BY HEAVY FOG

PERFECT START

BIG WELCOME PLANNED IN AMERICA FOR FAMOUS FLYER

TRIP POSTPONED
LYMPNE, Eng., June 2 (Friday)—After flying 38 minutes from Kenley Captain Lindbergh landed here at 5:58 a. m. today, deciding to postpone his crossing of the English channel and his return to Paris until more favorable weather conditions. There was fog in the channel.

Kenley, England, June 2 (Friday)—Captain Lindbergh hopped off for Paris at 6:20 a. m. this morning. Captain Lindbergh is flying across the English channel in a British plane. As he took his seat in the machine, at 6:15 a. m. about 100 persons who had been waiting at the airport, cheered enthusiastically. Two other planes escorted him.

Lindbergh made a perfect start. He climbed rapidly to 1,000 feet, when he went into formation with the two escorts. Circling over the sea, the aviator flew in a straight line, southeast for the coast near Folkestone. Weather prospects were good.

While adjusting his parachute, Lindbergh told a newspaperman, "I've had a great time in England and I hope to return."

The visiting aviator made himself extremely popular among officers and airmen at Kenley field, and all of them were up by dawn to see him off.

A weather report this morning said there was a heavy fog and mist at Folkestone, in the path of the flight over England to the channel, but that there were no clouds for 5,000 feet above England or across the channel. On the French side, clouds at a height of 1,000 feet were reported.

Big Welcome Planned
WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh is to receive a welcome and reception in Washington such as has been accorded to no other private citizen in the history of the republic.

This was determined upon today by the semi-official entertainment committee after it had been informed that the scout cruiser Memphis would arrive at the navy yard here at noon on Saturday June 11 bearing the aviator, the flying hero of the world and the airplane in which he was captured.

RAY IS FOUND GUILTY

Confesses To Robbery Of Oval Bank and Postoffice 25 Years At Abilene

ABILENE, June 2 (AP)—Togo Ray was convicted in 42nd district court here today of robbing the First State bank of Ocala on March 24, 1902, which he confessed and was sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary.

The jury deliberated only a few minutes. The defense introduced no evidence after Judge Milburn S. Long had denied a motion for continuance presented with a certificate from a physician that Ray has mumps and was in no condition to stand the trial. Ray sat in the courtroom as the motion was read.

Abner Ray, cousin of Togo Ray, will go to 1925 here on a charge of robbing the bank, currency totalling \$1,000 was taken in the robbery.

TEXAS PIONEER DIES IN DALLAS

ROBT. GIBSON, CONFEDERATE VETERAN, DIES AT HOME OF DAUGHTER

DALLAS, June 2.—Robert Gibson, 92, pioneer Dallas citizen who for many years was secretary-treasurer of the Interstate Cottonseed Crushers' association and the Texas Cottonseed Crushers' association, died Thursday night at the home of his daughter here. He would have been 93 on July 31. At the time of his death he was treasurer of the two crushers' organizations.

Born in Nashville, Tenn., Gibson studied engraving as a youth. Later he entered the accounting department of a large wholesale grocery concern at Nashville. He entered the confederate service and served throughout the war in the campaigns in Tennessee, Kentucky, Georgia and the Carolinas under Joseph E. Johnston, Hood, Bragg and Albert Sidney Johnston.

In 1878, Gibson came to Dallas, erecting here the fifth cottonseed oil mill in Texas and one of the largest in existence at the time. In 1894 he was instrumental in organizing the Texas Cottonseed Crushers' Association and in August, 1895, was made secretary of the organization.

Gibson met and married Miss Annie Glover of Marietta, Ga., in 1864. Survivors include three sons and four daughters, Robert of Houston, William of Dallas, John of Dallas, and Mrs. W. S. Warner of Dallas and Mrs. W. S. Warner of New York.

PLENARY POWER AS PROPOSED IS CENTER OF FIRE

SATTERWHITE LEADS IN OPPOSITION SAYING PLAN IS WRONG

SENATE ACTIVE

"WHITE PRIMARY" BILL IS PASSED THROUGH THIRD READING

AUSTIN, June 2.—Governor Dan Moody's plan to perfect rehabilitation of the Texas prison system by vesting a new nine member board with plenary power to make property transactions incident to rehabilitation, was struck down by the house of representatives late today, 65 to 57.

By that vote the house sustained Representative Satterwhite's amendment to the Texas administration bill to make the key purchase and sale subject to approval of the legislature instead of only to the governor.

FLOOD SECTION PREPARES FIGHT ON NEW CREST

RISE NOT EXPECTED TO
BE AS SEVERE AS
FIRST BREAK

TOWN EVACUATED

LEVEES AT MORGAN
CITY ALSO BEING
STRENGTHENED

NEW ORLEANS, June 2.—The Atchafalaya river flood, exerted pressure on the last line of man-made barriers tonight, as it gathered the diminished force of its crest in the south portion of Central Louisiana before passing out into the Gulf of Mexico.

With the flood away over the Louisiana lowlands likely to be prolonged, although not rendered more severe, by the new crest riding down the Mississippi, efforts were made to hold protection levees to prevent the inundation of towns near Morgan City, about 12 miles west of New Orleans.

Servick Solters Dykes
Berwick, safe and dry behind a seven foot levee on the banks of the existing Atchafalaya, labored to bolster the dyke, fearing that a break might inundate the town to a depth of five feet. While it was believed that the effort would be successful, the inhabitants of the town, numbering 2,800, were preparing to lift themselves to plank sidewalks on scaffolding just as their neighbors across the river in Morgan City have done.

While all but ten of the one thousand residents of Gibson, about 25 miles east of Morgan City, evacuated the town in fear that the swollen bayou Black would pile in additional waters, the population of Donner, a bayou town nearby, worked on a six foot levee which has been holding the water out.

Higher On One Side
A peculiar situation exists in the flood level on a line with Morgan City across the Atchafalaya river basin since the level is almost two feet higher east of Morgan City than it is on the main stream in the Little port city. Weather-bureau officials attributed the massing of waters to the eastward to westerly winds and to the rapid flow of water through the river outlet at Morgan City which has continuously depressed the flood level there in comparison with stages to the east and west.

"Brownies" Most Popular

This is her recipe:
One cup white sugar; 1-2 cup butter; 2 eggs; 2 squares melted chocolate; 1-2 cup flour; 1 cup chopped walnuts.

Cream butter and sugar, add eggs not beaten, chocolate, flour and walnuts. Bake 20 minutes in a fairly hot oven.

Cut into squares with a sharp knife before quite cool.

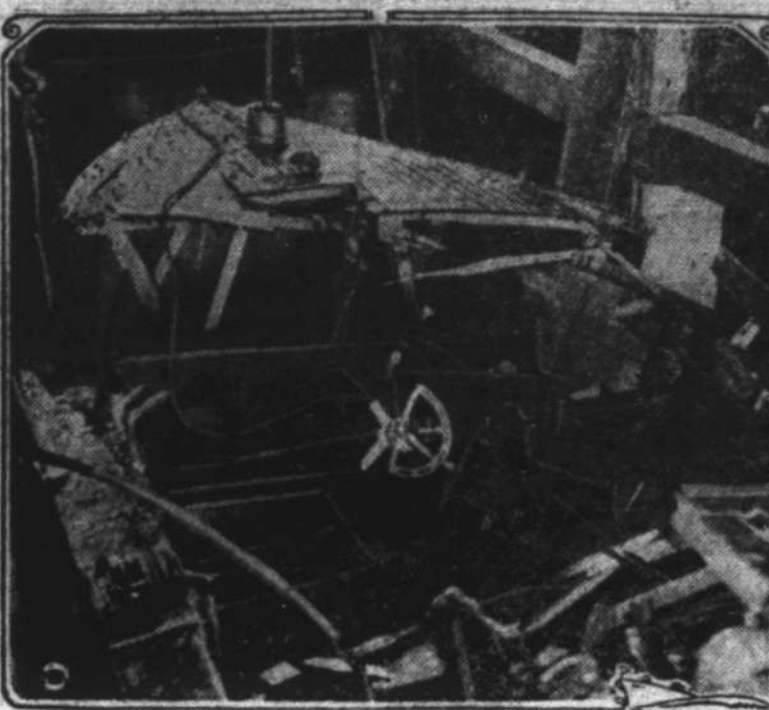

BALANCED FARM PROGRAM PAYS

A HEREFORD MAN MAKES
MONEY RAISING CHICKENS,
COWS AND GRAIN CROPS

(Special to Avalanche-Journal)

HEREFORD, June 2.—Farming hundreds of acres of wheat or grain sorghums on the one crop system, may be all right for some folks, but Jim Chapman, living 20 miles northwest of Hereford, had rather make his chances on milk cows and chickens with enough grain for feed, and with a reasonable acreage in wheat each year. His plan is actually making him money.

Mr. Chapman is keeping the Wyandott strain of White Leghorns. He has 200 laying hens, and now had better than 400 young chickens ranging from three weeks to two months of age. He plans to have 500 hens and pullets, after a quick cutting for next year. Mr. Chapman mixes a balanced ration, composed almost entirely of home grown grains, and he has been getting splendid results.

Uses Large Incubator

An incubator with 600 egg capacity in the basement of the home is used to hatch off all the baby chicks. The Chapmans are also settling some turkey eggs, and have their pens set out for the fall crop. After the hatching season, fertile eggs are sold to the Perry-Wing system in Amarillo, and during the past six years Mr. Chapman has guaranteed his eggs and has never had one turned down.

Seven good Jersey cows are being milked, and returns from the cream are better than \$200 per month. Mr. Chapman figures that the skimmed milk is worth his feed bill for the chickens. Oxford's Golden Sunshine 61st heads this Jersey herd, and Mr. Chapman is making every effort to breed up his milk cows, and is actually doing some constructive work along this line.

Started With Raw Land

The Chapmans started with 200 acres fifteen years ago, with nothing but raw land. Now they have a good home, a fine orchard, outbuildings of various kinds, and more than \$1000 worth of poultry houses. The orchard furnishes fresh fruit during the summer, and the surplus is canned for winter use. Some eight or ten varieties of peaches, plums, cherries, apples, grapes, etc., are to be found in the orchard, and the Chapmans find it a big help in the live-at-home plan.

Two fourteen-year-old cottonwood trees stand right by the lot and furnish shade for the livestock on hot summer days. These trees measure nearly seven feet in circumference and are about 50 feet high. Mr. Chapman has put out a number of trees around the poultry lots and with his many fruit trees will soon have one of the shadiest farm homes in the country.

Mr. Chapman owns 990 acres of land, and 250 of this is in cultivation. He summer-fallows a certain portion of this each year for wheat, and while the yield is cut short over the county, Mr. Chapman will make a pretty fair crop. He plans to have a third of his acreage in row crops each year, a third in wheat, and summer-fallows a third, and practices the rotation system of farming.

All Grain Fed
All the grain sorghums raised on the Chapman farm are fed to livestock and poultry, and this makes a good way to market his stock for a profit. He feeds his cows and chickens a balanced ration, has a feed grinder, and mixes his own grains.

Last year Mr. Chapman planted twelve acres in pinto beans, and received a good crop. He also found that wheat sown on this land is much better than wheat sown on main or kaif soil.

"What would I do if I failed to make a crop," Mr. Chapman was asked, and here was his reply: "Our cream checks and egg money would keep us going, and we would have grain that is two years old, we wouldn't have to buy very much feed."

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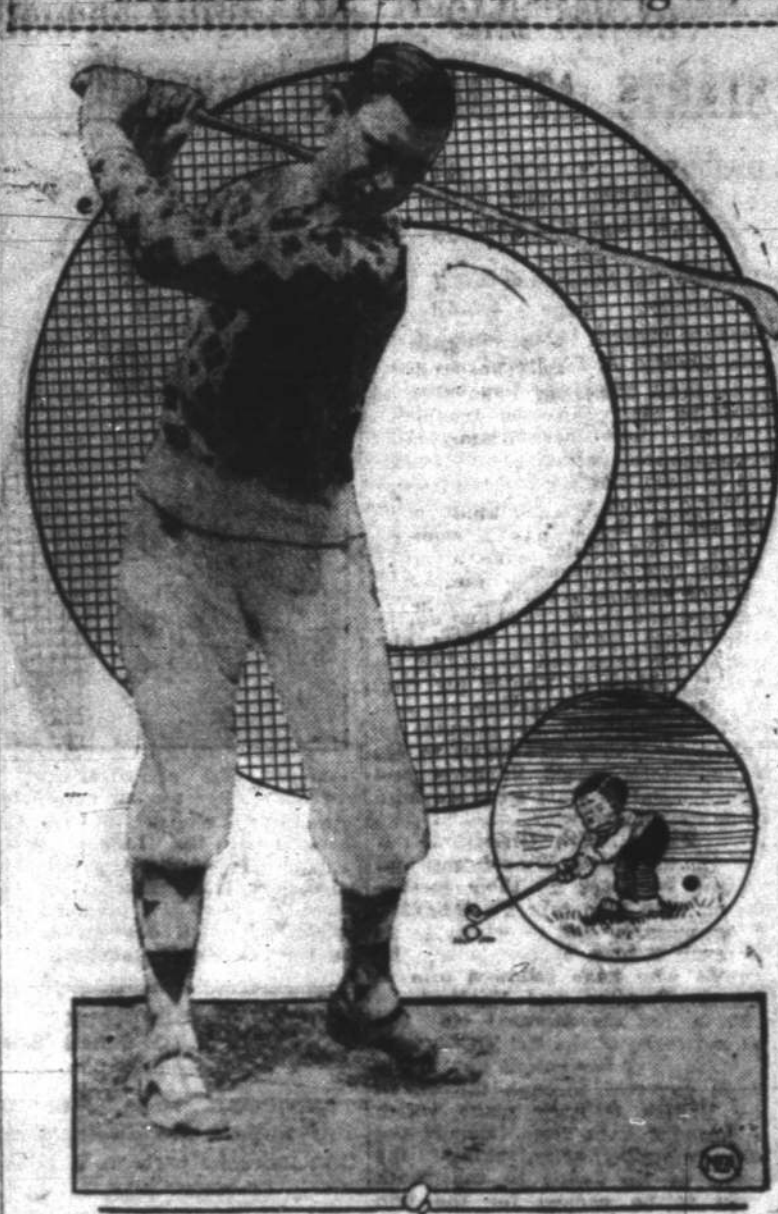

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PLANTING DATES

UNIFORMITY IN NEED
AND PLANTING IS
MUCH NEEDED

(By The Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Texas, June 2.—Plant certified cotton seed and trick the boll weevil, says R. E. McDonald, entomologist of the State Department of Agriculture.

The idea is, according to Mr. McDonald, that the superior product will grow so fast and bloom so early that one of the South's greatest cotton pests can not propagate itself fast enough to consume it.

Mr. McDonald explains: "We do not usually connect the use of a uniform strain of cotton with the control of insect pests, but let us consider how this factor might influence the damage done by the boll weevil."

"It is a well recognized fact that different varieties of cotton differ from one another in earliness that in a field planted with ordinary gin-run seed where there will be some stalks which bloom many days before others. In a community planted to various sorts of cotton, some fields will come into blooming much earlier than others, although planted on the same date. Fields planted to certified strains of cotton, under similar treatment, will show a remarkable uniformity in blooming."

"The winter season is very good on the boll weevil. Records show that upwards of 95 per cent of those that go into hibernation in the fall never emerge in the spring. Hence, there are always a comparatively few weevils to attack the first cotton in the fields of a community. Certainly there is never the over-wintering generation to destroy all the cotton on a reasonably large acreage. They must increase in numbers by propagation on cotton squares. If some of the stalks are blooming earlier than the main crop, this furnishes ideal conditions for the boll weevil to increase to such numbers as to do serious damage to the main crop."

"If all the cotton in a field, or better still, all the cotton in a community, comes into blooming at the same time, certainly the cotton plants, if thrifty at all, can keep ahead of the boll weevil increase."

Planting Dates
"Farmers have long since recognized the uniformity of dates of planting. They know that if one cut of cotton be planted in March and the adjoining cuts be left until a month later, that the over-

wintering boll weevil will center their attention on the earlier cotton. Since it is the only cotton in the neighborhood, there will be enough weevils to do it a great deal of damage. Then by the time the late cotton comes on the increase will do a great deal of damage to this also."

"Cotton amidst boll weevils is able to produce bolls only because it can form squares faster, so to speak, than the weevil can propagate itself."

"Therefore in a community where certified seed is planted and reasonable uniform planting dates and culture are practiced, the weevil stands a poor chance to win the race."

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TENNIS STARS OF SOUTHWEST TO MEET IN AUSTIN

AUSTIN, June 2. (AP)—Ranking tennis stars of the Southwest will compete here for a week beginning June 5, for laurels in 10 events sponsored by the southwest section of the American Lawn Tennis association.

Nearly 100 players are expected to enter. Besides the state championships being at stake, winners of the men's doubles event will be sent to the national contest at Boston in July to represent this section.

Events Of Tourney

Events here include, besides the doubles, men's singles, consolation singles and doubles, junior singles and doubles, boys' singles and doubles and women's singles and doubles.

Berky Bell of Austin and Wilmer Allison of Fort Worth, will defend their state championship title in the doubles, while B. T. C. Norton

of Brownsville, state single champion, will face formidable opposition in the feature events of the meet.

Challengers in these events will include Lewis White of Dallas, 6th national ranking player; Louis Thalheimer of Dallas; Wilmer Allison of Fort Worth, expected to rank among the 20 national leaders this year; John Barr of Dallas, ranking sixth in doubles; Chli Granger of New Orleans, formerly of Austin; Arthur Waters of New Orleans, who, with Granger, holds the

southern doubles title; Leven Jester of Dallas formerly singles and doubles champion; Jimmie Quick of Dallas, 1926 Texas high school singles title holder; Arthur Seaborn of San Antonio, United States arm-champion in singles; Jack Norton of Houston, former Texas singles champ; Red Mather of Austin, winner with Albert Love of Dallas, of the southwest conference doubles crown last year; Earl Taylor and Karl Kammath, Austin, winners of the high school doubles

title in the recent intercollegiate league meet and Ted Hackney and Henry Lawrence, both of Fort Worth, who were runners-up in last year's doubles competition.

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
