COTTON FARMERS ARE TARGET

Warm Build-Up For Referendum

Mitchell County cotton farmers may be facing one of the warmest pre-referendum periods in years.

It all centers around the December mail balloting concerning marketing quotas for 1967 crop of upland cotton.

This is an annual referendum that is not the least unusual except that this year's balloting will be by mail during the period from Dec. 5 through Dec. 9.

But at the same time — in conjunction with marketing quota referendum — producers of upland cotton will vote also to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for their cotton.

This second proposal will determine whether a proposed cotton research and promotion program would be administered by a cotton board composed of members nominated by cotton producing organizations and selected by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Financing for this program would be through assessments of \$1 per bale from upland cotton producers — an assessment to be collected by cotton handlers designated by the cotton board. Collections from any producer who did not wish to contribute would be refunded upon written application by that producer.

Educational programs, both pro and con, have been under way in this area for several months. And the programs are expected to increase as the referendum date nears.

Mitchell County Farm Bureau has gone on record against the research and promotion program.

Rolling Plains Cotton

Growers, a row producers group which has numerous Mitchell County farmers into multicounty, has been speaking favorably for the program.

Two non-partisan information meetings concerning the 1966 Cotton Research and Promotion Act — the exact proposal farmers will cast their ballots for or against in the December referendum — will be conducted in this area Tuesday and Wednesday.

These educational meetings will be Tuesday at 2 p.m. in Lubbock at Plains Cotton Cooperative Oil Mill and Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Stamford at Stamford High School auditorium.

The research and promotion referendum will be through Mitchell County ASC office in conjunction with the marketing quota referendum, but on separate ballot.

Approved by two-thirds of the producers voting, or by a majority of producers voting if that majority accounts for two-thirds of cotton represented in the referendum, is necessary for the order to become effective.

City Urged To Negotiate For Hospital's Purchase

City Council is studying the possibility of negotiating for purchase of Root Memorial Hospital and Root Valley Fair Lodge so the city can operate the two units as an accredited hospital with extended care facility for an interim period.

The interim would be temporary until a hospital district can be legally organized for permanent ownership, and operation of the hospital.

Negotiations are at the beginning stage with no indication whether the deal can be brought to successful completion.

However, City Council received a go-ahead signal from a volunteer citizens group who has been urging that the hospital facilities be kept in operation for the health and safety of all the community.

It was this committee which immediately formed from neighborhoods all across the county to urge of effective action to maintain the hospital after Charles L. Root, owner, announced intentions to close the hospital.

The committee, meeting Friday afternoon in City National Bank in a meeting opened to the public, voted unanimously to urge the city to proceed with negotiations to buy.

This vote by several dozen of the citizens group came after a report by Ben

Franks, head of Sun Oil Company's district production staff here, concerning the possibilities for an interim city ownership.

Franks reported that City Manager Ford Merritt and other city officials already had hired appraisers to study the land, buildings and equipment of the hospital, initiated checks with hospital authorities in other cities, studied legal aspects of interim financing and of ultimate take over of the properties by a hospital district.

Franks who has headed a citizens committee assisting city and county officials in a study of the hospital reported that appraisers have estimated total value of the hospital — complete with the lodge, land, site improvements, laboratory, x-ray, surgical and all other equipment — at about \$465,000 total.

SON OF MRS. JOHN SMITH

National Award For Ag Advisor

Fred A. Tinscher, son of Mrs. John T. Smith, 1041 Elm St., has received the Distinguished Service Award at National Association of County Agricultural Agents Convention in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The citation was presented to Tinscher, county farm advisor for Whiteside County in Illinois, in Morrison, Ill., by U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

Tinscher, who is a brother of Troy Tinscher, received the award for outstanding leadership in working with local people who support the Extension Service program in Whiteside County, according to H. H. Fulkerson, chairman, Association Information Committee, Illinois Farm Advisors Association.

The advisor, who was born and reared in Longview, was graduated from Oklahoma State University in 1954 with degree in agricultural education and received his masters degree there in 1957. He has continued graduate work at

It is my belief the city should seek a reasonable purchase and a reasonable sale," Franks said, "where every citizen can be proud of the deal if and when it is completed."

Charles C. Thompson, who was a leader in originally calling interested citizens together to assist city and county officials in solving the hospital problem, made the motion to urge the city to proceed with negotiations.

The combined lodge and hospital, operating as a single hospital with extended care facilities, provides 80 hospital rooms.

Reports from other areas who have had to most critical hospital situations indicate tremendous cost for acquiring or building their hospitals.

Texas County in 1958 paid \$200,000 for a 36-room hospital and now is planning construction of a new 40-50 room facility at a cost of \$1,500,000 with the county furnishing \$750,000 and federal government providing \$750,000.

City officials are studying the possibility of acquiring hospital on an interim basis through the issuance of time warrants, then leasing the hospital back to Root for a temporary period until a hospital district can be organized and issue bonds to take over the facilities.

In this manner the City would pay out no cash and cost of the acquisition would be transferred to the hospital district.

However, Franks pointed out that all studies have been preliminary.

A study of hospital files reveals that Root Hospital treated 1,996 patients in the last 21 months.

Of this total 1,199 (60.5 per cent) came from Colorado City, 423 (21 per cent) came from Mitchell County outside Colorado City and 374 (18.5 per cent) came from outside Mitchell County.

This means that a 74 per cent of all in-patient patients came from Colorado City and 26 per cent from other areas of Mitchell County.

Out of county patients came mostly from Snyder, Silver, Hermleigh, Ira and Roscoe.

Freeze Cuts Into County's Crops

Cotton Damage Mounts

Extensive damage from Mitchell County's early freeze is showing up in cotton planted late.

In fact, the damage almost has wiped out some of the late-planted crop — especially in the areas south and southeast of Colorado City.

"I doubt if some of the farmers will go into the field with strippers," County Agent Bobby Lemons reported.

Severely hit by the surprise Nov. 2 freeze are those crops planted late in June in an attempt to secure a better stand than in earlier planted cotton.

Farmers say that some producers will harvest their damaged crop even though it will cost them money. They will go ahead in an effort to keep their acreage yield up.

Yield records are important for the individual and the county because acreage

FOR '67 FEED PROGRAM

Sorghums Given 73,858 Acres

Mitchell County's acreage base will be 73,858 for the 1967 voluntary feed grain program which retains the same price support payment while increasing grain sorghum loan average.

The acreage figure, along with other provisions for the '67 program, were revealed here Saturday by Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service.

Nationwide, the program is being set up to encourage farmers to divert between 15 million and 18 million acres of corn and grain sorghum land about half of the 30 million acres for 1966.

Barley, a crop for which Mitchell County had 749 acres for 1966, is removed from the feed grain program next year. And corn acreage here is almost negligible.

So, Mitchell's main interest is in the grain sorghum portion of the program.

The ASC reported the loan for grain sorghum is being increased to \$1.61 per hundredweight, up from 1966's loan of \$1.52. However, the support payment remains at 53c per bushel on projected yield of acres planted.

As in 1966, a farmer must divert 20 per cent of his corn-land sorghum base to qualify for price support payment and loans.

Soybeans will continue to be eligible for planting on permitted acreage without loss of corn-sorghum price support payments.

Those spendid Wolf backs — senior Fullback Donnie Higginbotham and sophomore Halfback Dan Steakley — led the assault and again emphasized the fact they are two of the best in District 5-A-A.

IT WAS Higginbotham who warmed the Wolves, and sent 'em hurrying toward their first touchdown with a magnificent 70-yard run.

He took a handoff, rushed over the middle and then sprinted through Haskell's secondary, eluding the grasp of two tacklers and keeping three others off target with his change of pace and direction.

And when he was finally stopped on the Haskell 15-yard line it was illegal — tripping by an Indian defender faked out of position.

Teach Them to Read was the topic discussed by Mrs. Pruitt. Mrs. Gene B. Loud's subject was Bringing Life Abundant.

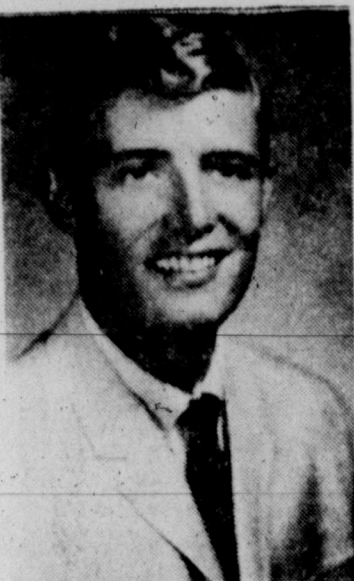

Manly, county agent, who said that early picking of cotton is made into cloth. If it is either taken out as waste or it left it may produce a lower quality cloth. This is why, Manly explained, that grades on cotton received at the District 2 office in Abilene changed little from the previous week. For the week ending Nov. 4, 90 per cent was classed as Light Spotted, 7 per cent Spotted, and 3 per cent White. Predominant grades continued to be Strict Low Middling Light Spotted at 52 per
