Entries Pouring In Every Day As Opening Day Near To Be Conducted At County Fair Grounds

Construction Should Be Started Soon

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Lyntegar Electric Company at Tahoka, a contract was let for the construction of the Rural Electric lines in Dawson County, subject to the approval of the National REA at Washington. It is only a matter of routine for Washington officials to check the action of the local board and it is felt that actual construction on the lines here will get under way within a short time, according to Joe M. Peterson, Dawson County director.

Co-operators in Dawson County are urged to have their homes wired at the earliest possible time.

ACA Committee Points Changes In County Quota

Putting In Of Sod Makes Many Changes

The regular monthly meeting of the Dawson A. C. A. was held in their office February 12, 1940. W. T. Meeks, chairman, presided at the meeting. The purpose of the meeting Monday was to discuss the regulations pertaining to the 1940 program.

One of the problems of the program discussed was the large number of acres of sod land being broken out in Dawson County each year. In 1938 approximately 8000 acres of sod was broken out, which caused the county cotton reduction factor to be lowered from 35.96 in 1939 to 33.99 for the 1940 allotment. Applications on file in the office to break out sod in 1940 amounts to 9,200 acres according to Fred A. Reese, Secretary. That amount of sod broken out this year will cause the county reduction factor to be lowered at least another 2 per cent for 1941. Under the present regulations all sod allotments must be deducted from the old growers and the committees have no authority to prevent this trend from seriously affecting the old growers.

The committee also found other practices over which they have very control contributing to make the sod problem more serious than it would be if these were discontinued: (1) Tenants expanding each year with larger and more tractors, displacing other tenants who have to break out sod or go on relief. Land owners and tenants buying more land and reducing the number of farming units in the county, which leave other tenants without a farm.

DAIRY SCHOOL FOR MONDAY

A training meeting in the preparation of dairy products will be held Monday, February 19, at 808 South Third, in Lamesa, for club representatives. The products to be made that day will be cottage cheese, cooked cheese, neufchatel cheese and butter. Each club will send one person to attend this meeting and she will repeat the demonstration in her respective club.

The purpose of this training meeting is to encourage the use of dairy products and to stimulate interest in entering products to be scored on DAIRY DAY which is to be held in Lamesa April 26. Not only may one enter cottage cheese, cooked cheese, and neufchatel cheese and butter, but whole milk and buttermilk may be entered. Ribbons will be awarded according to the class of the product.

Certificates In Writing To Be Given Students

Twenty-seven pupils in the Lamesa Elementary School have passed the State Handwriting Examination and have been awarded Handwriting Certificates from the W. S. Benson Co., Austin, Texas. Eleven of these are final certificates which are awarded only to seventh grade pupils, and sixteen are Junior Certificates, awarded to sixth grade pupils. A new procedure is being used in this year in submitting examinations for State approval. No pupil is permitted to take the examination until he or she has satisfactorily completed a group of 32 assignments. When these assignments are completed with an average grade of 85 or better, the pupil is allowed to take the State Examination.

everyone is advised to acquaint themselves fully with these provisions before attempting to work themselves or letting contract to others. He has plans and specifications and will be glad to supply them to those desiring such plans.

The board of directors also urged that in so far as possible, and where price and quality are equal, that local electricians and electrical dealers be given the opportunity of handling your job. In the first place this would tend to keep that much money in circulation at home and also if there should be some mistake made on your job, where you are dealing with local people, it is much easier to have it corrected.

Co-operators were also advised that in letting contract for wiring, they should pay a per cent upon completion of the job and hold the balance until the job is officially approved and accepted by officials of the REA. This is for the purpose of protecting the co-operator, for if your job does not pass inspection, it may then be quite easily corrected.

Local labor, in so far as is possible, will be used in the construction of all lines. The wiring of the house is a matter for the co-operator to decide but it is hoped by the directors that local people will be given every opportunity to take care of this work. In other sections where REA has been installed, it has been found that where local people are used, there is less friction and dissatisfaction with the final results.

This line which was contracted Monday will be more than two hundred miles long, and besides serving several hundred Dawson County homes, it will also serve some in Borden, as well as the town of Gail.

LUNCH ROOM NEEDS MONEY

There has been a slight decrease in patronage at the school lunch room for the past two weeks due to illness and inattentiveness of children. The number is increasing again this week, however, and more than two hundred children per day are being accommodated. Efforts are being made to extend the services to children of the fourth and fifth grades. The number being served at present taxes the facilities to their limits. Under the present set up it will be impossible to serve many more.

Foods used in the preparation of the one thousand or more meals per week are furnished by the Surplus Commodities Corporation and through local purchases. The following free commodities were received for the month of February: Butter, 126 pounds; corn grits, 50 lbs.; corn meal, 200 lbs.; rolled oats 90 lbs.; wheat flour, 196 lbs.; lima beans, 196 lbs.; and raisins, 100 lbs. Even with this liberal supply of commodities, it is necessary to purchase large quantities of food locally to supplement the government supply for sufficient amounts and balanced rations. Local purchases are made of such items as milk, sugar, eggs, meat, carrots, potatoes, spinach, green beans, tomatoes, deserts, etc. Purchase in milk and groceries amount to more than thirty dollars per month. This does not include rent, gas, lights, water and many other items necessary for operation.

The project is financed solely by contributions. Many children who take their meals there pay regularly for the services. Several public spirited citizens who have no children in school make liberal contributions each week or month for the support of the plan. More than half the children using the lunch room are underprivileged and unable to make payments. Funds have been raised by programs for the benefit of this type of revenue.

In spite of the contributions made and the funds raised by other means, additional funds are needed to carry on the project successfully. Milk bottles have been placed in various stores over town for this purpose. It is hoped that these will catch a little extra change in this manner will be appreciated and used for the cause. Even checks may be safely deposited in these bottles.

No direct solicitations have been made for this project and it is hoped that this method will not have to be resorted to, however, some method will be necessary to raise sufficient funds if this project is to continue. Anyone desiring to make a direct contribution should call 179 and ask for Mr. Roberts, or any member of the faculty, and make his wishes known. Someone will be sent to collect the money. Contacts may also be made by calling or writing Mrs. C. A. Hollingsworth, president Primary P. T. A. or Mrs. J. D. Dyer, president, Intermediate P. T. A.

Parents of underprivileged children are urged to assist in every way possible. Contributions are not expected from those unable to pay, but every penny contributed to the project will go a long way toward its operation.

Under the new plans for the operation of lunch rooms, the sponsoring organization is now permitted to sell tickets to those desiring

to eat. It has been decided that this plan will not be used until absolutely necessary.

A decided gain in weight has been found in a large per cent of children who patronize the lunch room.

Rules And Regulations For Dawson County's Junior Fat Stock Show

- This Fat Stock Show shall be known as the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show.
- This Fat Stock Show shall be open to all 4-H Club Boys and F. F. A. Boys of Dawson County only that are enrolled with the Dawson County Agent and the several Vocational Agricultural Instructors of Dawson County.
- Each 4-H Club Boy and F. F. A. Boy must make a written entry of each animal exhibited. Each entry must be signed by the County Agent or the Instructor of Vocational Agriculture.
- All written entries must be filed with the Secretary-Manager of the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show at least five days prior to the opening date of the show.
- Entries shall be made upon an "Entry Application Form" same to be furnished by this show. Any or all entries may be rejected.
- This Fat Stock Show shall be for Steers, Barrows and Wether Lambs only. There will not be any entries, awards or space furnished for any bulls, sows, heifers, boars, sows, gilts, rams, ewes, billies, nannies, stallions, mares, fillies, jacks, jennets, or nurse cows.
- All steers must have been calved on or after Jan. 1, 1939.
- All animals entered must be in the show barn before 11:00 a. m. Thursday, Feb. 22, 1940.
- Animals shown by 4-H Club

Boys or F. F. A. Boys must be owned by the exhibitor. However, two or more boys, either 4-H Club or F. F. A., may own an animal jointly with one another. The 4-H Boy, or Boys, and the F. F. A. Boy or Boys, can not own the animal a regularly enrolled 4-H Club Boy jointly with any person other than or F. F. A. Boy.

10. In case a Parade should be announced by the Show, weather permitting, all steers must be in the parade.

11. All animals shown will be under the control and direction of the Secretary-Manager, but the Fat Stock Show, its management, officers and employees, will not be liable for any loss or damage that may occur. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to, or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal or article exhibited by him. He shall indemnify the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto, as well as damage or injury to any other person or property, caused by the exhibitor or any animal exhibited by him, or arising out of, or in any way connected with such exhibition or any of the animal so exhibited.

12. Special rules or conditions are published in each department where necessary, and if there are any conflicts between these Rules and the Special Rules, then the Special Rules shall govern.

13. This Show reserves to its executive committee the final and absolute right to interpret all rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with or incident to the Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show; the right to amend or add to these Rules as its judgment may determine. Any exhibitor who violates any of the Rules or Special Rules of this Show will forfeit all privileges and premiums, and remove his exhibit from the Show Barn.

14. In the Steer Calf Shows steers will be classified as either "milked steers" or "dry-lot steers", and each classification shall be divided into two classes by weight—same being "lightweights" (or Junior) division, or class, and "heavyweights" (or Senior) division, or class.

15. Each animal, as it is brought to the Show Barn, shall be accompanied by its owner, who must have in his possession a "weight ticket" dated the day the animal is brought to the show barn. This weight ticket will determine the "weight class" the animal shows in.

16. "Milked Steers" are defined as (1) any steer that has nursed any cow since September 1, 1939, and-or (2) any steer that has nursed any cow other than its mother at any time since it was calved.

17. Each exhibitor must keep his exhibit in perfect order, removing all litter and manure as dropped,

thereby insuring a creditable Show Containers for all waste bedding and manure will be furnished by the Show, but it shall be the duty of the exhibitor to keep his exhibit, and the walks immediately in front of his exhibit, perfectly clean.

18. There shall be a Special Award, known as the "Herdsmen Award", to the exhibitor that keeps his exhibit the cleanest and most attractive. This award will be made by a secret committee, that will function both the first and second day of the Show.

19. In case space is furnished (by the Show) for storing feed, equipment, etc., each exhibitor will keep his feed, equipment, etc., in such provided place.

20. No exhibitor will be permitted to smoke inside of the Show Barn.

21. Protests: Any exhibitor desiring to file a protest with the management of this Show must file same in a typewritten letter, original and one copy, setting forth his protest and giving names of any witnesses. Such Protest must be accompanied by a Cashier's Check or Money Order, for \$15.00, same made payable to Secretary-Manager, Dawson County Junior Fat Stock Show. In case the protest is sustained the \$15.00 will be returned the protestee. In case the protest is over-ruled the \$15.00 shall remain in the funds of the Show. All protests must be filed prior to 8:00 a. m. Friday, February 23, 1940.

22. This show will use the "one Judge" system of making awards. His placings shall be final.

23. Time of Judging: The time of judging of each class will be announced in sufficient time for each exhibitor to place exhibit in the judging ring.

24. No animal will be awarded a prize unless such is in the Judging Ring at the proper time.

25. Ribbon awards shall be as follows: (Blue first; red, second; white, third; pink, fourth; yellow, fifth; dark green, sixth; light green, seventh; tan, eighth; brown, ninth; gray, tenth; royal purple, Grand champion; lavender, reserve champion.)

26. Once the animal is led into the Judging Ring everyone must leave the ring except the exhibitors, the judge and his assistants. No County Agent, Vocational Agricultural Teacher or any adult can

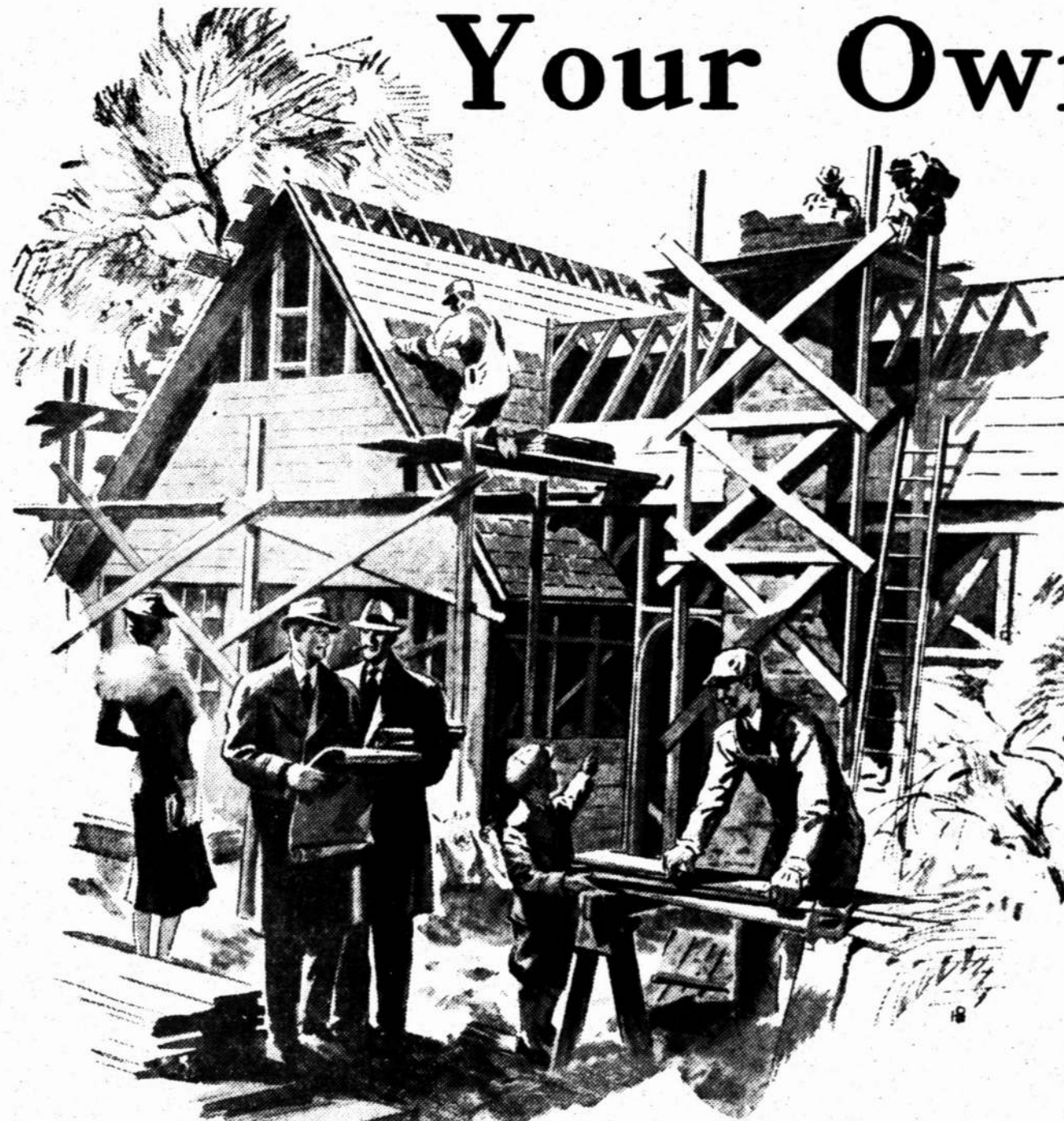
