Mrs. Jerry Brown Honored By TFWC

The Outstanding Clubwoman of Caprock District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, was revealed at the annual convention, being held in Plainview on March 19-20. At the Americanism Banquet held in the Holiday Inn on Friday night, Mrs. Earl Stevenson of Bovina, Chairman of the Outstanding Clubwoman Committee, announced the selection of Mrs. Jerry Brown (Sandra) as the outstanding Senior Clubwoman for 1970-71 in the twenty county area of this District. Mrs. Brown was selected because under her leadership, an Americanism Day observance was held in Tahoka, her home town, which motivated every citizen from the very young to the very old to rededicate themselves to the basic principles on which our country was founded - love of God, love of country, and love of their fellowman.

Mrs. Brown is a native of Tahoka, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. McNeely. She attended public schools there and graduated from Tahoka High School in 1959. Her husband, Jerry, is also a native of Tahoka, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bonnie Brown. Mr. and Mrs. Brown are the parents of two children; Todd, 8 and Lani, 7.

Mrs. Brown is a member of the United Methodist Church a teacher in the kindergarten Department, a counselor at Junior High Camp for three years, and Membership Chairman of the Wesleyan Service Guild. Sandra was nominated by her Church and awarded the honor, Outstanding Young Woman of America, in 1970.

Mrs. Brown has worked with Salvation Army, Girl Scout and "Get Out the Vote" Drives. She has taught a non-reading Latin American adult how to read using the Laubach Literacy Reader. She is past president of The Lynn County Women's Cotton Promotion Association.

In 1968, Mrs. Brown became a member of the Phebe K. Warner Club, the organization nominating her for this award. She is currently serving as First Vice-President, Chairman of the Program Committee, and Americanism Chairman. She is presently serving as Chairman of the Public Parks and Recreation Division of the Conservation Department of the Caprock District, T.F.W.C.

Under Mrs. Brown's leadership the first Americanism Day was held in Tahoka on

November 19, 1970. Co-sponsoring the event along with her club were the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, Tahoka Lion's Club, and the Tahoka P.T.A. All organizations in Tahoka and Lynn County were contacted by letter asking their participation in Americanism Day activities. A poster contest was held for students in grades three through six. An essay contest was held for junior and senior high school students. Trophies were presented in four divisions for the prize winning posters and essays. All posters were displayed either in the windows of downtown stores or in the school cafeteria. The Mayor of Tahoka, the Honorable Meldon Leslie, issued a proclamation asking all citizens to observe November 19, 1970, as Americanism Day and fly their flags. The Future Homemakers of America assisted the club in selling over two hundred flags, the proceeds of which went to the scholarship funds.

Activities for the day included an assembly for grades three through five, an assembly for junior and senior high school students, and an evening program for the general public. The First National Bank of Tahoka presented booklets on flag etiquette to students and adults attending the assemblies and programs. They also distributed flag decals and flag lapel pins. Honored guest for the day was Mrs. Stathakos Condos of Dallas, Texas, who spoke on Americanism at the assemblies and the evening program. Mrs. Condos, Mayor Leslie, and Mrs. Brown were featured on the television program, Community Close-Up. The Tahoka Junior Woman's Study Club sponsored an Americanism Day Tea.

The benefits each citizen derived from this day are still present in Tahoka and prove that Mrs. Brown is a most capable leader and an outstanding clubwoman.

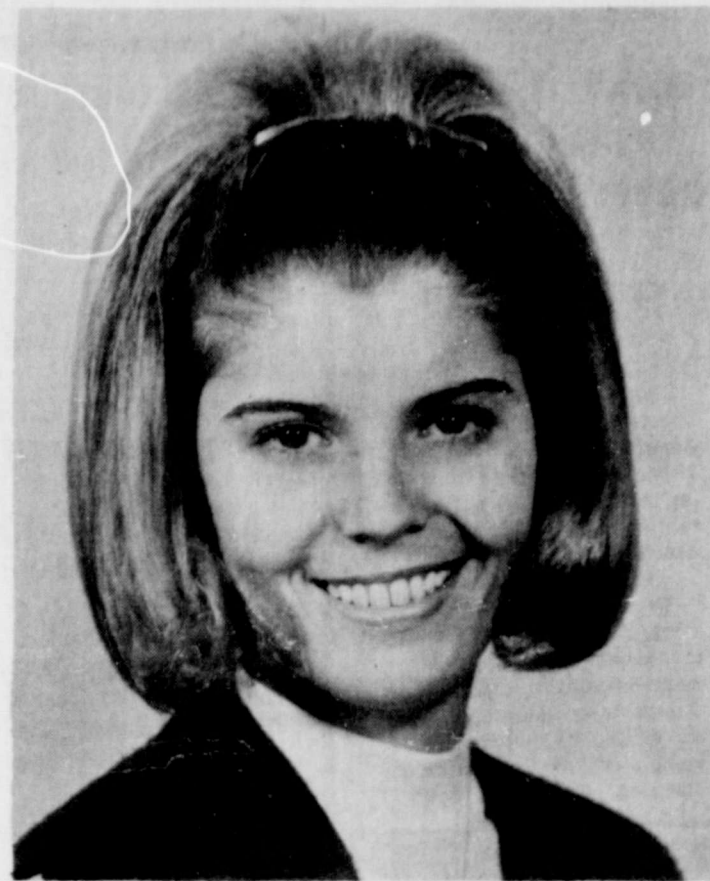

Texas Lions Sponsor Summer Diabetic Camp

The Texas Lions League, which has operated a summer camp for handicapped children at Kerrville for the past 18 years, has added a new dimension of service this year with a special three-week camp for diabetic youngsters in cooperation with the diabetes associations of Texas.

League President Everett J. Grindstaff of Ballinger said the pilot program would be known as the Texas Lions Camp for Diabetic Children. The special summer session -- June 7 through June 25 -- will be held at the facilities of Camp Manison near Friendswood, between Houston and

Galveston, where a diabetic camp has been operated for the past 14 years.

The League is the non-profit, charitable organization which represents all the Lions of Texas, Grindstaff said.

"The diabetic camp represents another important step forward by the Lions of Texas in serving children who require special attention," Grindstaff said.

At the home camp in Kerrville, nearly 12,500 blind, deaf, mute and crippled children have enjoyed two weeks of summer fun. During the other months of the year, the League-in cooperation with the State Commission for the Blind -- operates a rehabilitation center for adults at the camp and has aided more than 800 Texans who have lost their sight.

The diabetic camp will have 110 youngsters, 6 through 16, in the pilot program. Dr. Luther B. Travis, an associate professor in the department of pediatrics of the Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, will be medical director. Tom Manison will be camp director.

The goal of the new program is to help diabetic children learn they can lead happy, normal lives by following good

health practices and to give them self-confidence when they have to leave home.

Chapters of the South Texas and North Texas Diabetes Associations, plus officers of district and county medical societies, have been requested to submit camper applications.

The Lions of Texas, in order to better determine the need for future expansion, are making a survey of diabetic children who would be interested in the camping program.

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

It's boomtime this spring for tailored knits in menswear.

The new knits, mean new freedom, not only in the physical sense but also in a psychological sense. Men will be wearing clothing they can put on and forget—functional as a sweater, yet formal as a conventional business suit.

The first thing a man will notice when selecting a pair of knit slacks is the attractive and pleasing hand of the fabric. And the color and pattern will also catch his attention.

While the salesman may speak of comfort, the wearer usually has to experience it to realize a difference. Most men aren't uncomfortable in "ordinary" clothing, so the knit fabric's built-in give is a new feeling. The "give" means freedom from binding at the knees, easier reach into pockets for change, and in knit coats, new freedom in overhead reaches.

Performance is another plus. The knit garments look and fit better for longer periods of time, resisting wrinkles and retaining a crease. Because of their elasticity, they move with the body like a second skin, and have 15 to 20 per cent stretch with complete recovery.

Most of the knit garments for men are completely washable, but check the labels and hangtags to be sure of care instructions. Unless the hangtag says the item is completely washable, it's best to treat as drycleanable only.

If the knits are washable, hand wash is best. Use care not to stretch the wet garment; either wring it out, or support it in several places if you let it drip-dry. Finish with a brief tumble drying at a warm temperature setting.

Impossible Pie
4 eggs
1 3/4 cups sugar
1/2 cup margarine
2 cups milk
1/2 cup self rising flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 3/4 ounce coconut
Combine ingredients in mixing bowl. Mix well. Grease generously 2 pie plates (Aluminum are best). Bake 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Pie will make its own crust.
