Light Vote Polled In Titus County

A light vote was cast in the Democratic primary election in Titus County Saturday, May 2, when Lloyd Bentsen topped Ralph Yarborough 1,604 to 1,573 in the race for U. S. Senator.

Congressman Wright Patman led Bill Russell in Titus County 2422 to 724 and was reported winning handily over the district.

State Representative James Slider polled 2,089 Titus County votes to his opponent, Jodie Harris, 980. Returns over the district had Slider leading.

In the two Titus County Commissioners races, incumbent Bert Parr won re-nomination and Commissioner Eugene Morris faces a run-off against Dan Bynum.

In the voting at Talco for Senator, Bentsen received 64 votes to Yarborough's 50. For Congress, Bill Russell received 35 and Patman 78. For State Representative Jodie Harris 41; Jas. L. Slider 65.

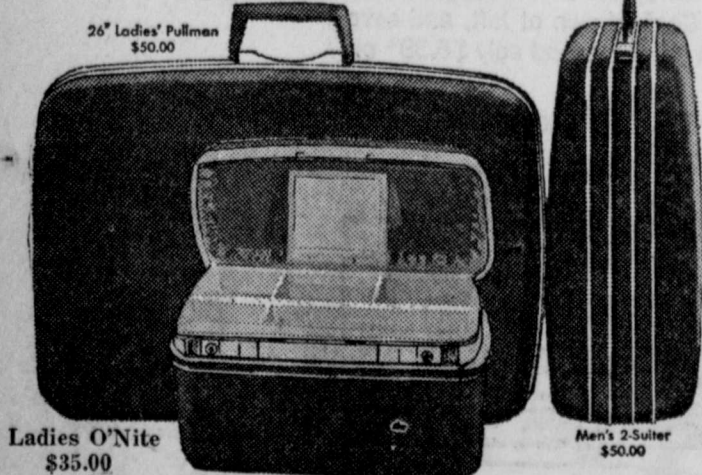

Three-Year-Old Is Accidentally Shot To Death

Three-year-old Stanley Wayne VanHooser of Paris was accidentally shot and killed by his seven-year-old brother while playing in a truck outside their home at 2005 Graham late Thursday afternoon.

The youth was rushed to L. P. McCusiston Hospital by his parents, where he died moments after arriving. Police said a single bullet from a .22 caliber pistol struck him in the back of the head.

Reports indicated the boys were playing when their father, Charles VanHooser, heard a shot. When he stepped outside, his elder son, Johnny, was running into the house. Rushing to the van, VanHooser found the three-year-old lying on the truck floor.

Officers said investigations revealed the younger tot discovered the pistol in a storage compartment of the vehicle. Then, using both hands and feet, cocked the hammer. When his older brother saw the act, he grabbed the gun, but it discharged as he took possession.

Stanley Wayne VanHooser, son of Charles Delane VanHooser and the former Beatrice Louise Whitney, was born near Talco, Jan. 2, 1967 the family moving to Paris about four months ago from Palestine.

Surviving besides the parents are a brother, Johnny Delane VanHooser, a sister, Peggy Ann VanHooser, all of Paris, and his grandmothers, Mrs. W. O. VanHooser of Bonham, and Mrs. Lula Whitney of Talco.

The body was transferred by Gene Roden & Sons to Wise Funeral Home at Bonham for services Saturday at 3:30 p. m. Burial was made at Ravenna.

Talco-Bogata Board Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session on Tuesday, May 5, 1970 at 8:00 p. m. at Talco Elementary School. The entire Board—Dr. E. E. Brooks, Alex Waddell, Kenneth Jeffery, A. D. Stepphenson, Paul Miller, James Gaddis, Howard Swarts—was present.

The meeting was held at the Talco Elementary School for the purpose of inspecting these facilities. After a tour of the buildings and campus, the Board took action on the following:

1. The resignation of Mrs. Gerald Hampton was accepted. Mrs. Hampton gave as her reason for resigning the feeling that she should be at home with her pre-school age son.

2. The following members were appointed to serve as the Board of Equalization for the school district: Jimmy Haynes, Jack Franklin, and Jim Pirtle.

3. Mrs. Leon Tuck was employed as a cafeteria worker for the Bogata cafeteria replacing Mrs. Nannie Watkins who is resigning.

4. The Board approved renting the former superintendent's home in Bogata to Ed Mize, newly elected Band Director at Rivercrest for next year.

5. The Board also agreed to pay one-half the expenses of the cheerleaders to attend a Cheerleaders Clinic at East Texas University this summer.

6. Miss Berenda Alexander was employed as an elementary teacher for the Talco School. Miss Alexander graduated from Talco High School and has a degree in elementary education from East Texas State University.

7. Approval was given for the school district to enter into an agreement with Region VIII Service Center at Mt. Pleasant for school films for next year.

8. The Board approved the purchase of a 1970 Ford Econoline 18 Passenger Club Wagon which will serve to transport small groups of students to various school events and contests. At the present, a school bus must be used for these groups which is much more costly to operate than the vehicle which is being purchased.

9. The Board discussed the policy on use of school vehicles and suggested that the superintendent give the details of the policy. The superintendent stated that the school is now being furnished four (4) courtesy vehicles. The Vocational Agriculture Department has two (2) pick-ups; one furnished by Williams Chevrolet of Clarksville, and one furnished by Howerton Motor Company of Paris. Gasoline for these vehicles is purchased by the individual Vocational Ag teachers and miles driven is of no consequence to the school district.

In addition to these two (2) vehicles, the school is furnished with two (2) Driver Education vehicles, a car and a pick-up, through the courtesy of Williams Chevrolet of Clarksville and financed by the compliments of the First National Bank of Bogata and the Talco State Bank. These vehicles are located at Rivercrest and are used for general school use in addition to Driver Education.

10. The Board discussed plans for continuing work toward the eventual completion of football and other athletic facilities at Rivercrest. Approximately \$30,000 is included in this year's budget for work on these facilities. The first step in these plans calls for moving in dirt to elevate the site where the track and football field will be located. The Board approved the continuing with these plans with dirt work to be done as soon as conditions are dry enough.

11. There was a brief discussion of the policy of paying classroom teachers \$150 above base salary. A decision on this matter was postponed until further information is available as to values and budgetary needs of the district for the 1970-71 school year.

12. The Board approved bills to be paid and accepted the reports of the tax assessor-collector and the cafeteria.

The next meeting of the Board will be on June 2, 1970 at 8:00 p. m. in the Bogata School Cafeteria.

Patman Winner Saturday Vote

Veteran Congressman Wright Patman won the Democratic re-nomination to the U. S. House of Representatives from First District of Texas by an overwhelming margin Saturday.

Rep. Patman swamped his Democratic opponent, Bill Russell, by a margin of four-to-one.

Incomplete returns showed Rep. Patman with 30,970 votes to 8,313 for Russell. The returns were from eight of the 17 counties in the district, including the populous Bowie, Harrison and Lamar Counties. Every county showed Rep. Patman far ahead of his opponent.

Lamar County voters gave the longtime Congressman, third-ranking in seniority in the U. S. House, an overwhelming vote of confidence. The count was 5,207 for Patman, 1,364 for Russell.

Patman now faces the unopposed Republican nominee, James Hogan of Atlanta, in the November general election.

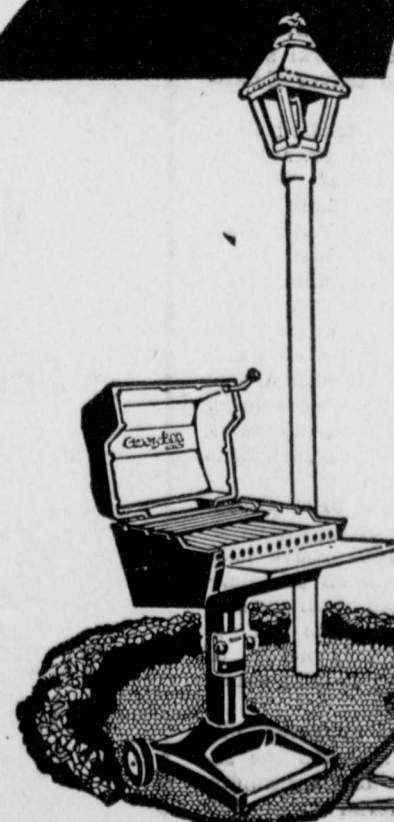

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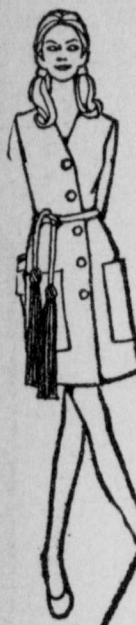

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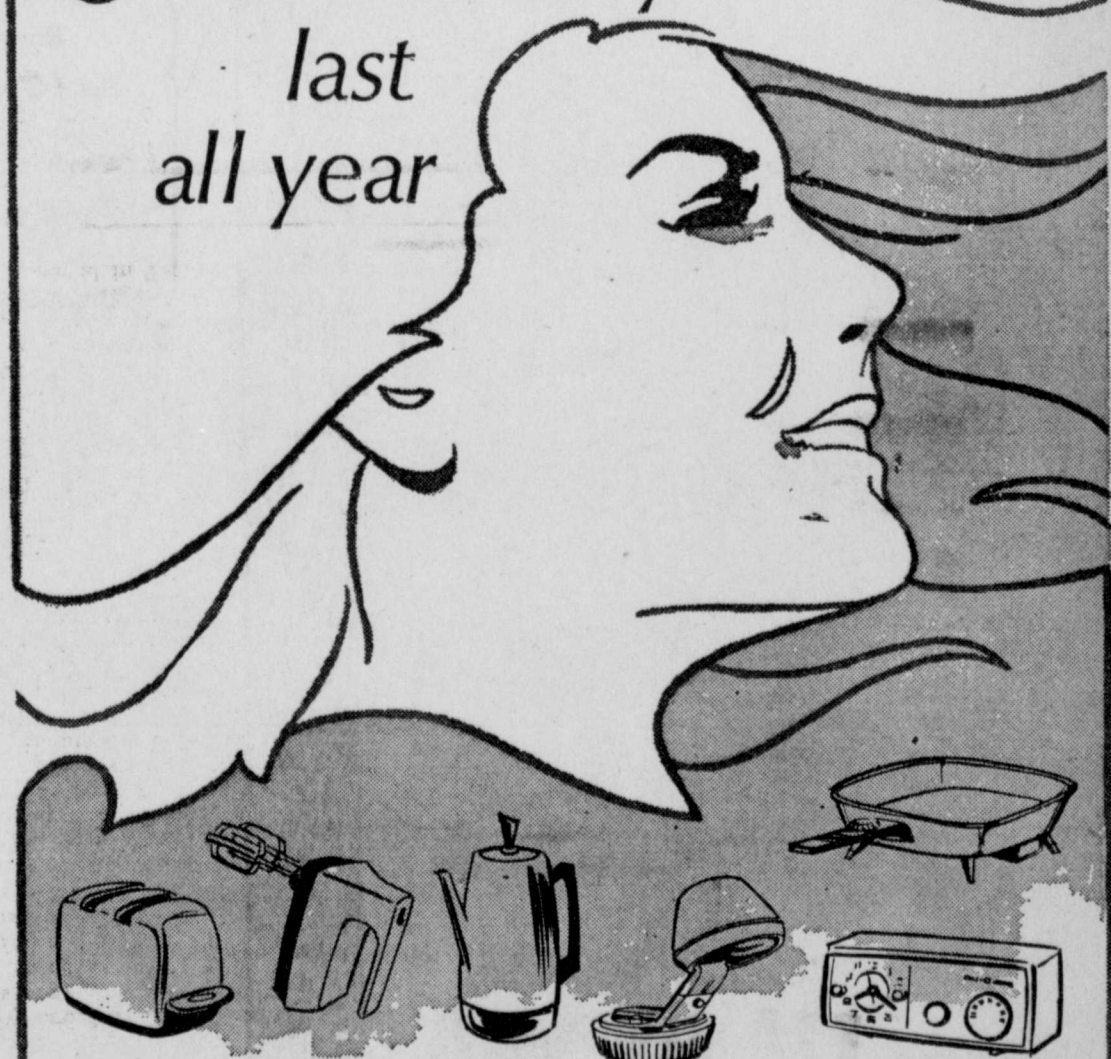
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
