

WRITS AGAINST TRUCK ENFORCEMENT VOIDED

O'Daniel Calls For
Quick Action On
Big Bend ParkRevenue Would Yield High Return
On State's Investment, He Says

AUSTIN, Mar. 1 (AP)—Governor W. Lee O'Daniel today urged quick legislative action to consummate creation of an international park along the Big Bend of the Rio Grande.

The chief executive did not recommend any specific appropriation but said an investigation showed the park "would yield to the state a very high return on the money it would be necessary for the state to invest."

Pending bills call only for an appropriation to set up an organization for acquisition of the necessary land. Advocates said they might seek a \$750,000 appropriation but were not yet certain.

Plans contemplate a park consisting of 750,000 acres on the Texas side of the Rio Grande and a 400,000-acre area on the Mexican side. O'Daniel pointed out that the park would contain some of the most beautiful scenery in the nation.

The governor quoted from a letter written him by President Roosevelt last month saying in part:

"If the Texas legislature at this session should see fit to make an appropriation for acquisition of this land it would be very gratifying to me personally, and I am sure it would win the general approval of the people everywhere. x x x"

"I have been hoping this park could be dedicated during my administration. My advice is that this large and very interesting area could be bought for a comparatively small sum—a sum insignificant in comparison with the economic returns that would flow to the state of Texas and to the nation."

O'Daniel said establishment of the park would result in expenditure of \$3,500,000 annually by out-of-state tourists and the federal government.

"It is estimated," he said, "that the federal government would spend \$225,000 annually for maintenance and protection of the park. x x x"

"It seems to me the increased tourist travel which would be brought about by development of this park would very quickly yield in additional gasoline taxes alone an amount of money which would exceed the expenditure which the state would have to make to acquire the property."

Describing the area O'Daniel said that "from many large peaks the gorgeous scenery is as impressive as a vast fairy land."

Immediately after the message had been read in the house, Rep. Lonnie Alsop of Carthage rose to inquire of the speaker if "this is supposed to be an economic session of the legislature?"

A bill making an appropriation for purchase of land for the park was passed by the legislature two years ago but vetoed by Gov. James V. Allred.

URGES CORRECTION
OF FREIGHT RATES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1 (AP)—E. L. Hart, manager of the Atlanta traffic bureau, suggested today that the interstate commerce commission be directed to "investigate and correct" freight rate inequalities which Hart said were hurting the south.

Hart, appearing before the house interstate commerce committee in support of the Ranspach bill to eliminate geographical differentials, declared:

"We do not advocate any revolutionary action by the congress that would cause a 'frozen' rate structure. I don't believe congress ought to prescribe a fixed formula of rate making. Congress should instruct the ICC to investigate inequalities and correct them."

Pension Tax
Report Due
By Mar. 13Several Financing
Proposals Turned
Over To Committee

AUSTIN, Mar. 1 (AP)—What might turn out to be the senate's solution of the vexing old age pension problem was in the hands of a sub-committee today which labored under orders to report a plan by March 13.

Proposed constitutional amendments dumped into a sub-group last night included a two per cent sales and service tax to support possibly expanded pensions, a straight two per cent sales levy for \$15 state pensions to all persons over 65 years old and a 1.6 per cent transactions tax, similar to but not identical with that of Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel's proposal, to support universal pensions.

Out of the three, the sub-committee was ordered to report one plan, if necessary incorporating provisions of all three, for the whole committee's consideration. The transactions tax proposal was not discussed but Senators R. A. Weinst of Seguin and L. J. Sulak of LaGrange explained their sales tax suggestions to the committee.

Senator Sulak contended there was statewide support of his two per cent sales levy for universal pensions.

"Paying pensions to all over 65 is the only just solution to this problem," Sulak said. "Let's put the question to the people. It would ask them simply 'do you want to tax yourselves for pensions to the old folks?' We ought to pay them to all people, whether they are citizens or not since everybody will be taxed for them under my plan."

Sulak estimated the tax would return revenues in excess of \$30,000,000 a year. He said the federal government could match only those state funds paid to the needy.

Weinst's proposal, as explained by the author, would tax retail sales, with few exceptions, two per cent and place a similar levy on hotel room rent, transportation on commercial carriers, amusements, athletic events, advertising, and brokerage commission.

Fixed amounts of the revenue would be allotted annually as follows: \$15,000,000 to pensions, \$15,000,000 aid to dependent children, \$500,000 aid to the needy blind, \$2,500,000 to Confederate pensions, \$2,500,000 as the state's share of teacher's retirement, and the remainder to the public schools.

State property tax for Confederate pensions would be abolished and the property levy for school purposes reduced 3.5 cents per \$100 valuation each year after 1940. The tax would become effective after September 1 if approved by the electorate on July 15.

Farm Youth Arrested In Attempt To
Extort \$2,000 From Knox City ManIntended Victim Had Been Warned In
Note That Daughter Would Be Harmed

DALLAS, Mar. 1 (AP)—E. E. Conroy, agent in charge of the Federal Bureau of Investigation office here, today announced the arrest of a farm youth in connection with an alleged attempt to extort \$2,000 from H. J. Malouf, wealthy Knox City, Tex., merchant.

Conroy said Malouf received a letter mailed from O'Brien, Tex., Feb. 23, in which he was warned his daughter, La Rue, 8, would be harmed if he did not pay \$2,000.

The youth, described by Conroy as the son of a wealthy Rochester, Tex., farmer, was arrested by City Marshal J. J. Stephens of Knox City and FBI agents last night at O'Brien.

Conroy said he had signed a statement in connection with the case, before a United States commissioner here this afternoon for formal filing of charges.

Conroy said the youth was married and the father of a 5-month old boy. The youth told the federal agent he wrote the letter because he needed money.

Conroy said the extortion letter was mailed from O'Brien and directed that the money be placed at a point about 400 yards from the home of the suspect.

The letter specified that the payoff was to be made between 9 and 10 p. m. on the night of Feb. 24. Maximum penalty under the charge is 20 years in the penitentiary or \$5,000 fine, or both, Conroy said.

Immediately upon receipt of the letter, Malouf notified Knox City officers and FBI headquarters in Dallas. A guard was sent to the Malouf home in Phoenix, Ariz., where live Mrs. Malouf and the couple's children.

Friends of Malouf in Knox City said last night the merchant had left by plane for Phoenix yesterday.

The extortion letter, officers said, was written on regular note paper, in neat handwriting. Only misspelled word was the name of the merchant, Malouf.

Officers working on the case said they believed at the start the letter was the work of an amateur. The extortion note directed that the \$2,000, in bills of \$1 to \$100 denomination, be placed in a cigar box in a culvert "10 telephone posts north of a certain cross road north of Rochester about 2-3 miles. A culvert was found at the exact spot described."

A STRANGER
PHOENIX, Ariz., Mar. 1 (AP)—H. J. Malouf, Knox City, Tex., merchant, said here today the 18-year-old youth arrested for writing him a \$2,000 extortion letter was a stranger to him.

He did not know of the arrest until informed by the Associated Press.

Malouf came here from Knox City where he received the letter demanding the money on threat of kidnapping his nine-year-old daughter, La Rue.

COUPLE SLAIN AND
GIRL ASSAULTED
EDINBURGH, Ind., Mar. 1 (AP)—A mysterious intruder slew Mr. and Mrs. Paul Brand and criminally assaulted their 12-year-old daughter, Johnson county officers found today upon being called to the family's rural home north of here after the child, hysterical, had run to a neighbor's to give the alarm.

The sobbing girl, one of three children, said she had laid terrified in bed with her brother and sister, ages five and six, respectively, until 6 a. m. before reporting the crime, which, she said, occurred shortly after midnight.

KILLED IN MISHAP
EAGLE PASS, Mar. 1 (AP)—Ray Temple, 28, produce company employee, was killed last night, five miles east of here when the automobile in which he was riding overturned.

NEW CAR SALES HERE STAGE A
COMEBACK DURING FEBRUARY

A last half slump, offset by a last minute revival, featured business activity here in February as reflected by building permits, postal receipts and new car sales.

Outstanding was the new car sales record for February—108 new passenger machines delivered here. This not only was far above the 75 for January and the 58 for February a year ago, but it was the largest number sold in a single month since December of 1937 and the highest record for February since 1935. It boosted the year's total to 178, a gain of 24 over the same period a year ago.

The issuance of a \$20,000 apartment store permits the last day of the month salvaged February from the ranks of a bad building month and ran the permit figure to \$48,054 for the 28-day period. This compared to \$21,109 for January and \$43,137 for February a year ago. It cut the discrepancy from last year from \$26,000 to \$25,000 for the first two months period.

Postal receipts dropped off for the first time in more than a year. The \$5,041.76 for the month was less than the \$5,050.53 for February of 1938 and as was expected, considerably under the January total of \$6,318. A sudden slump after Feb. 20 created a low which last day calmed was unable to overcome.

Two counties in this district, Sterling and Reagan, would profit, the first in the amount of \$148,367 over the 35-year period and the latter in the amount of \$4,097.

However, the other four counties would sustain the following losses: Howard county, \$1,108,008; Tom Green county, \$23,361; Terry county, \$47,919; Glasscock county, \$5,233.

Price Fixing
Bill AdvancesCommittee Approves
Measure At Stormy
Hearing In Austin

AUSTIN, Mar. 1 (AP)—Establishment of a minimum price structure on trade-marked commodities, effected by contractual agreement between the manufacturer and retailer, swept towards the floor of the Texas senate and house early today by favorable committee action on the fair trade act.

The senate committee, at the end of a stormy hearing interrupted by booing, catcalling and shouts of "liar," voted unanimously to report the bill favorably to the senate floor.

The house committee, split widely on certain amendments, met into early morning and finally reported the bill out favorably, 5 to 1.

Rep. Abe Mays of Atlanta, fighting the bill as "a subterfuge to get around anti-trust laws" and decrying it as a burden on the consumers, brought a round of boos from the crowded galleries with his assertion the posed legislation would raise the cost of living 20 per cent in Texas.

Senator J. Franklin Spears, author of the senate bill, pleaded with demonstrators to remain quiet, warning that:

"The first thing you know, you are going to lose four or five votes in this committee—and I've worked hard on this bill."

Former Senator Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth led the fight against the act, shaming the legislature for having banners supporting the bill in its halls and backing legislation "that will raise prices to all the men, women and children in this state."

Referring to the highly criticized "loss leaders" used by some stores, Rawlings asked the committee:

"Why in the name of God don't you write a bill to regulate such a practice, if it isn't wanted, instead of giving to the manufacturers of New England the right to set our prices down here in Texas."

Officers Have No Power
To Supervise This,
Tribunal Decides

AUSTIN, Mar. 1 (AP)—The supreme court today invalidated the major part of injunctions which state police had interpreted as preventing them from enforcing the load limit law against trucks from the Rio Grande Valley.

Officers' Duty
The opinion pointed out that license and weight inspectors of the state public safety department are supposed to enforce the 7,000-pound limit law and stated that a judge has no power "to supervise an officer in the discharge of his official duties."

The powers of other officers relating to halting of trucks are limited, the supreme tribunal said, and the court has the right to see that such limitations are observed. Enforcement of the law against large shipments of Rio Grande valley grapefruit had been at a standstill since issuance more than two weeks ago of the injunctions, one of which was by District Judge Bryce Ferguson of Edinburg and the other by Judge Fountain Kirby of Groesbeck.

The Rio Grande valley grapefruit shipping season is at its peak in February and March. Growers insisted they could not make a profit under rail rates or the 7,000-pound load limit.

Moves to increase the load limit are pending in the legislature but so far have made little headway. The opinion, written by Associate Justice J. E. Hickman, asserted the statutes limiting the size of vehicles and their loads were constitutional and were no longer open to question on that point. It observed that under an amendment to the constitution, the legislature has the power to amend the law.

Mexico Probes
Nazi SpyingEight Arrested, One
Kinsman Of Berlin
Police Chief

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 1 (AP)—The Mexican press today linked the hunt for a mysterious, unlicensed radio transmitter to an investigation of so-called German espionage in which newspapers said the brother-in-law of the police chief of Berlin was detained.

Among eight persons taken into custody Monday was a man identified in the press as Baron Hans Heinrich von Helleufer, related by marriage to Count Wolf Heinrich von Helldorf, Berlin police head.

The German legation announced it had intervened through the Mexican foreign relations office to obtain a stay in deportation proceedings against Baron von Helleufer.

He came here in 1931 as a refugee from pre-Nazi Germany and remained as the representative of several German firms.

Informed sources said those detained with the baron were "mostly Germans." Their detention followed disclosure that an unregistered short wave radio transmitter was operating in a Mexico City suburb.

At the same time, it became known that Pablo Garbinsky, advertising manager of a Jewish weekly newspaper here, had been taken to Vera Cruz for deportation, charged with falsifying birth records for various persons admitted to Mexico, presumably Jews.

Whether there was any connection between his arrest and the detention of the others was not disclosed. Official sources hinted other arrests might be forthcoming.

The Bible has 1189 chapters; 929 belong to the Old Testament and 260 to the New. The 117th Psalm is the middle chapter of the Bible, its number being 595. Exactly 594 chapters precede it, and 594 follow it.

The middle chapter of the Bible is also the shortest; containing only 33 words, composed of 133 letters. The longest is the 119th Psalm, containing 176 verses, 2,445 words, and 10,146 letters.

The text of the Bible is divided into 31,101 verses; 23,144 for the Old, and 7,957 for the New Testament. The shortest verse in the Bible is John XI: 35, containing only two words with nine letters. One verse in the Bible contains all the letters of the alphabet except J—Ezekiel 1: 21.

The famous inscription on the Liberty Bell, in Independence Hall, Philadelphia, is taken from Leviticus 25:10. It reads, "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

Written Reasons On Court Dismissals Sought In Bill

"This measure will simply require the court, when it dismisses an appeal for want of jurisdiction, to clearly and succinctly state its reasons so that lawyers may avoid making the same error again."

Big Spring is losing its part in the professional baseball picture simply by attitude of indifference toward the game. If local fans would take their stand one way or the other in the fund drive directors could make a quick and final decision but, like all good Americans, they delay action until the final moment. That final moment has come. The club representative must make a definite statement concerning the local franchise at the league meeting in Lubbock Sunday.

From the present outlook he can have but one thing to say to the circuit's officers—that Big Spring is forced to withdraw from the league.

The peculiar part of the entire situation is that fandom here has repeatedly asserted that the game is wanted here but has made no move to do its part toward keeping the league rights in Big Spring. Many of the backers have promised assistance. Those promises may still be good but they have had plenty of opportunities to make them a reality.

It's sink or swim now and the fans must be made to realize it. Only three days remain of the fund drive. That period will tell the tale.

The turnout at the fans' sessions has been disgusting. Probably the thing needed to get a fair representation is a banquet or an announcement that refreshments will be served but thus far the entire thing has been a failure.

Only those "die-in-the-wool" fans who have been a part of the promotions since the idea of the confab was inaugurated last year were in attendance last night.

Any action the officials might take, even the complete abandonment of plans, would be warranted by that indifference.

The public should be made to realize that the corporation is a public venture, that stockholders have the supreme say in the club's fortunes. Directors certainly receive no monetary gain from their efforts, are servants who give unselfish assistance simply because of their glowing allegiance to the sport.

The game has established its high standing as the national pastime, is endorsed by leaders everywhere because of its good influences and the part it plays in the development of the youth of today.

Speculation and resultant criticism of proposed appointment for the manager's post, the latest wrinkle of bitter debate, has caused President R. L. Cook to take a new stand concerning the team.

"The managerial post is still open, will remain thus until Big Spring is definitely assured a baseball team. Views of the fans, of course, will be given careful consideration."

The fund drive, of course, has been hampered by many things. Bad weather, only too evident here during the past two weeks, has proved a gigantic hurdle. Too, several of the workers have been sick. Harold Stock, among others, has been confined to his home due to illness.

Committeemen are set for that ninth inning rally now, however, and, elements or no elements, illness or no illness, it is their intention to put it over to the people that the time has arrived for that last decision.

The immediate manner in which we put our shoulders to the wheel is going to tell the tale.

The Baseball Hall of Fame stands at Cooperstown, New York, where baseball was born, and designated by bronze plaques are those great men of the national game whose deeds will live forever in baseball memories. In this Hall of Fame is told. As one of the features of Baseball's Centennial program this year, their plaques will be unveiled.

ALEX, THE GREAT

The pitching achievements of Grover Cleveland Alexander set him down in baseball history as a modern Alexander the Great. "Old Pete" was the shutout king of his day, and his greatest triumphs were rung up when a member of the Philadelphia Nationals.

A right hander, Alex had a delivery that was puzzling to the batters. Beginning his professional career in 1908 with the Central City, Neb., club, he later played in the minors and then in 1911 was purchased by the Phillies. He pitched them to their first—and only—pennant in 1915, but his team lost the world series that year to the Boston Red Sox.

Alex the Great was an endurance king indeed in his years of service in the major leagues. After leaving the Phillies he went with the Chicago Cubs and then to the St. Louis Cardinals. It was while with the latter team in 1926—and Alex was about 40 then—that he probably reached the pinnacle of his wonder feats.

St. Louis won the National league pennant and with Alex, who went into the world series against the New York Yankees.

After pitching the Cards to a spectacular sixth game triumph, he was called in as a relief pitcher to save the seventh and deciding game of the series. The bases were loaded; Tony Lazzeri, a dangerous hitter, was at the plate. Alex struck him out, protecting the Cards' lead, and winning the series.

Grover Cleveland Alexander

Alex piled up 373 victories over 20 seasons, establishing an all-time National league record. The record prior to that had been held by Christy Mathewson. This mark of Alex's was set in 1930, while he was still a regular starter with the Cards.

Alex shares the record of pitching 30 or more victories in three consecutive seasons. Matty also is credited with this feat.

Alexander was born in Elba, Neb., in 1887. And he will always be ranked among the greatest pitchers of the National league.

NEW YORK, Mar. 1 (AP)—Now that all the major league ball clubs have a batch of players in training camp or en route there, even the hard-to-convince business managers are beginning to admit there is a holdout problem again this year.

They're having a hard time getting around the determined statements of such stubborn gents as Paul Waner, Joe Medwick, Van Mungo, Dick Cofman, Buck Newsom and Luke Appling.

Cofman is perhaps the latest to become an admitted holdout. He conferred with Manager Bill Terry of the Giants at Hot Springs and got nothing but an ultimatum. Terry said the veteran flinger had been given a raise and that would be all. To this Dick replied, "But it still ain't enough."

The others haven't made much noise after their first loud assertions that the salaries offered were much too low, and the holdout arguments mostly have reached the waiting stage. Mungo, offered a cut from \$15,000 to \$5,000, has shipped back two contracts and says he'll stay in Page-Land, S. C., unless he's offered a lot more. And Boss Larry MacPhail retorts, "I hope he does."

The elder Waner, who has turned the proffered decision twice with the remark, "It must have been written with a surgeon's knife."

In addition to the temperamental flinger, the Dodgers also have Babe Phelps, regular catcher; Charley George, Bill Crouch, Fred Sington, Tot Pressnell, Luke Hamlin and Whitlow Wyatt to deal with.

Other long holdout lists belong to Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Browns, while only the Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers, and the Phillies have reported their contract lists complete.

Four On Outside

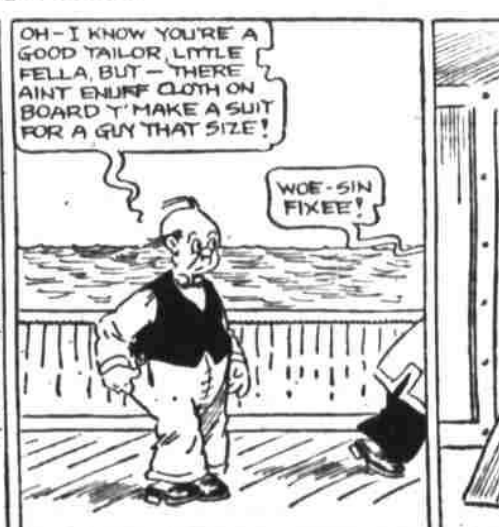
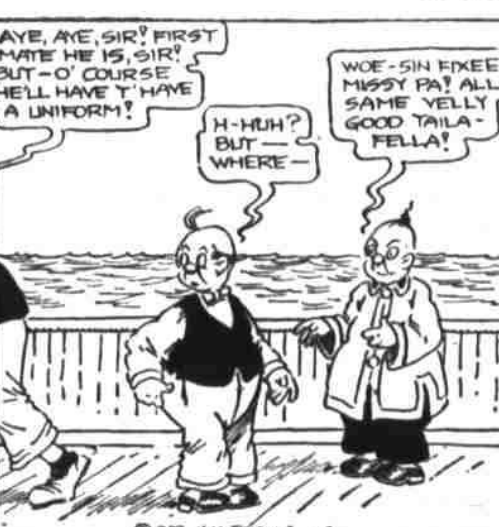
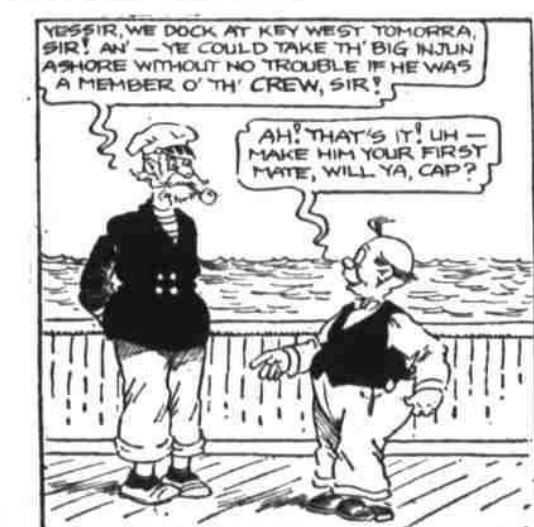

MINERS FINALLY END SIT-DOWN STRIKE

HAZELTON, Pa., Mar. 1 (AP)—Forty-nine hard coal miners, ending an underground sit-down in the dark, damp passages of a mine at nearby Onondaga, caught up on lost sleep today as they basked in the comforts of home for the first time in a week.

Only partly successful in their attempt to obtain payment of \$66,000 in back wages, the men emerged from the mine last night after the Wolfe Collieries company issued an ultimatum that it no longer would be responsible for compensation payments.

Physicians declared the men generally were in good condition. Before the miners came out, pay envelopes covering \$14,000 in wages due Feb. 20 were carried into the mine by the parish priest, the Rev. Joseph Baran, who had made attempts to end the sit-down. Spokesmen said the miners would ask the courts to settle the other claims.

BLAME FAULTY BRAKE FOR TROLLEY CRASH

BOSTON, Mar. 1 (AP)—A broken brake part, which "never occurred before," today was blamed by Boston Elevated company officials as the cause of the trolley smashup which killed six persons and injured nearly two score yesterday, in this city's worst street car accident since 1916.

The trolley car suddenly went out of control on an incline, failed to negotiate a turn, hurtled across a broad intersection and careened into a tree.

Six persons standing in the vestibule of the car were killed instantly.

FLORIDA GROWERS TO
MAKE DECISION ON
FEDERAL PROGRAM

Pony Express Riders Leave Nocona Today; Due To Stop Here Saturday

The Nocona Pony Express, sponsored by the Nocona Boot company of Nocona, Texas, and the chamber of commerce of that city, left Wednesday morning, will arrive in Big Spring latter part of the week or the first of next, according to Morris Prager, proprietor of the Army store of this city.

Prager said the riders in the race to the San Francisco Golden Gate exposition expected to make between 50 and 75 miles per day. "That will make their arrival in Big Spring some time around Saturday. We are making preparations here to greet the riders at our store on Main street, where hitchhiking posts will be provided the riders to hitch their horses during their stay in Big Spring."

The Pony Express, according to information from the Nocona Boot company, Miss Enid Justin, president, was scheduled to leave Nocona at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

In a letter to Prager, she said: "The Pony Express is leaving Nocona promptly at 9 a. m., March 1, and all sorts of wagers are being made as to the average miles per day and it is very difficult for me to say just when and what time I think they will arrive in Big Spring, but the Associated Press will release stories in the different papers, as to the riders' whereabouts along the route. We are going from here to Wichita Falls, through Breckenridge, Sweetwater, on to Big Spring, and right out the Hankhead highway on to El Paso, thence through the southern part of New Mexico, on into Arizona by way of Phoenix, and then right into California, up the coast to San Francisco. The southern route is much more desirable at this time of year."

Special Stamps
"Each contestant has two horses—they can ride one horse 25 miles at a time, and his driver with the truck or trailer takes care of the other horse. The rider carries five pounds of mail in his pouch, then empties it in his truck and starts in on his next five pounds. The letters require the usual three cents postage, and the Pony Express stamp, which sells for 50 cents. The latter must be 3 1/2 inches from the postage stamp in order to have the proper government cancellation."

"There will be an advance man in each town after the race starts, and there are two judges going right along with the riders to see that everything is fair and square, as we want the best man to win, and win fairly."

"There is \$750 cash prize for the winner, and there are several other prizes being awarded."

Prager also announced that "Pony Express stamps," valued at 50 cents each, are on sale at his store. He has provided a mailing box for letters to be picked up here by the Pony Express riders.
