"The Fighting Seabees," To Have First Showing In Panhandle Here

Three theatres in Hale county, the Rita at Abernathy, the new Ritz in Hale Center, and the Petersburg movie palace, will have the first showing in the Texas Panhandle region of the thrilling new picture, "The Fighting Seabees." This film, the first produced extolling the remarkable part played by the Navy's famous Construction Battalions, was made by the same company that produced the authentic and inspiring photoplay, "The Flying Tigers." The producing company is Republic Pictures, Inc.

The picture had its first showing in Dallas early this month and has been held over for its second big week there. It was booked in the three Hale county theatres named above by the Republic studios as a friendly gesture and tribute to the founder of these three theatres, J. C. Hurst, who, himself, is serving in the Seabees as a Quartermaster, second class. Hurst has just returned to the Seabee base at Camp Parks, Calif., after a visit in his home on leave. He served with the Seabees for more than a year in the Aleutians, the last eight months on Attu. The booking of this new movie thriller in the local theatres was done without his knowledge, and the publicity concerning the premier showing is also a surprise to him when he receives this week's paper.

"The Fighting Seabees," starring Jno. Wayne (who was also in "The Flying Tigers") and Susan Hayward, should be of especial interest to south Hale county residents, for about 35 men from this region are at present serving with Naval Construction battalions on all fighting fronts around the world.

Territory Exceeds 4th War Loan Quota

Abernathy and territory went over the top in the Fourth War Loan drive with a total of \$135,550.50 credited to the community. Bond purchases made by residents of the area totaled \$122,550.50 (our quota was \$120,000), and \$13,000 in bonds purchased by corporations and credited to Abernathy brought the grand total to \$135,550.50. The County of Hale credited \$10,000 of its bond purchases to Abernathy, Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. gave Abernathy credit for \$2,000 and Southwestern Associated Telephone Co. applied \$1,000 on the local quota.

Following is a breakdown of the \$122,550.50 total purchased by individuals of this community: Series E bonds, \$83,662.50; Series G bonds, \$29,000; Series F bonds, \$888; 2 1/2% 56-59 bonds, \$9,000.

County Oversubscribes Although exact figures for Hale county were not available at press time, it was known that the county's quota of \$893,000 was oversubscribed—totaling in excess of one million dollars.

Final figures for Monroe area had not been announced at press time, but it was believed the community had reached, and probably exceeded, its quota. Lubbock county topped its quota of \$3,597,000 by about half a millions dollars.

Texas followed the nation in oversubscribing its quota for the drive.

(Editor's note: Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Vaughn recently received the following letter from their son, T. J. Jno. L. Vaughn, who is in England.)

Jan. 25, 1944
Dear Mother & Dad: I am somewhere in England now. Came over in a rather old but very sturdy ship, and ran into no trouble. We didn't have such good living conditions, but I rather enjoyed the trip anyhow. We were lucky in that we could chase around on ship 'most anywhere we wished to, at most any time that we wanted to. Spent a lot of time up on deck watching the sea in the day time, and the stars and sea at night. The sea water has phosphorus in it, and as the ship's prow slides thru it, it rolls the water away from the ship and it looks as if there are a million lightning bugs in it. Quite often there are large spots of it that look like a ball of fire as large as a person's fist. Of course, that can

be seen only at night. Well, those phosphorus sparks and the moon and the stars shining on the sea at night kept me up on deck just doing nothing but looking until some late hour at night, when the weather would permit.

England looks quite different from what I expected it to look at this time of the year. Everywhere the fields and meadows are green, and most of them have shorthorn cattle grazing. The farms are very old but are well kept, and for the most part are very peaceful and attractive. There are some of the most beautiful box wood hedges here I have ever seen. They are as high as my head and well trimmed, must be four or five hundred years old. Surely do wish I had a kodak and some film to take some pictures.

The people in the States don't know anything about rationing yet. Fresh eggs are worth \$9 a dozen — don't know who would pay that for them.

If you can get them, I wish you'd send me some Gem razor blades, either single or double, but be sure they are Gem. They are about the only ones that are good any more. I have enough to last for sometime — but can buy only two a week in our PX and that means two shaves per week for me. Guess that's all for now, so goodbye. Love, Bud.
