Contracts Let for Highway Projects

Two contracts let recently by the Texas Highway Department will affect Motley County, according to announcement made by Palmer Massey, District Highway Engineer at Childress.

A contract for 7.9 miles of construction on FM Road 656 in Hall and Motley Counties has been awarded Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo on a low bid of \$164,861. Contract calls for grading, structures, base and surfacing Hall County from FM 656 ten miles southeast of Turkey to a point three miles west of Northfield. It is expected that 120 working days will be required on the job. Engineer C. B. Hudson of Clarendon will be in charge.

Public Construction Company of Denton has been awarded the contract of asphalt concrete pavement on US Highway 70 from Matador to a point 1.2 miles east of the Cottle County line, on a low bid of \$127,928. The project is expected to require 100 working days. Algie Groves, Resident Engineer at Matador will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Three acres of additional area are now a part of East Mound Cemetery with the grading, clearing and leveling done by Jameson Machinery Co. The new area, east of the original site, has been well fenced, with streets and plots to be designated in the near future.

Traffic Signs are Six Life-Savers

Six life-savers. That's what the nation's traffic signs are, J. O. Musick, General Manager of The Texas Safety Association said recently.

"Traffic Signs," he said, speaking in behalf of the National Safety Council's Signs of Life program, "Are designed to protect human life. It is essential motorists know the Signs of Life by sight—and obey them without fail."

"Traffic signs represent the expert thinking of traffic engineers and safety officials. The signs are designed for your protection."

He urged motorists to learn these six traffic signs by shape so they can recognize them on sight:

1. Octagon...red with white lettering. Means come to full stop and make sure the way is clear before proceeding. This is a revision of the older stop sign painted yellow with black lettering. But the meaning remains the same.

2. Triangle...yellow with black lettering reading "Yield Right of Way." Signifies slow down or stop at intersection to give right of way to cross traffic.

3. Rectangle...white with lettering in black or another color. Indicates traffic laws concerning parking restrictions, speed limits and turning and passing regulations, for example.

4. Round...yellow with "X" and "RR" in black lettering. Warns of a highway-railroad crossing 300-500 feet ahead.

5. Diamond...yellow with black lettering. Warns of such dangerous or unusual conditions ahead as curves, side roads, intersections, hills, dips, bumps, school zones.

6. Crossbuck...tall white railroad sign with black lettering. Usually placed within 15 feet of a highway-railroad crossing.

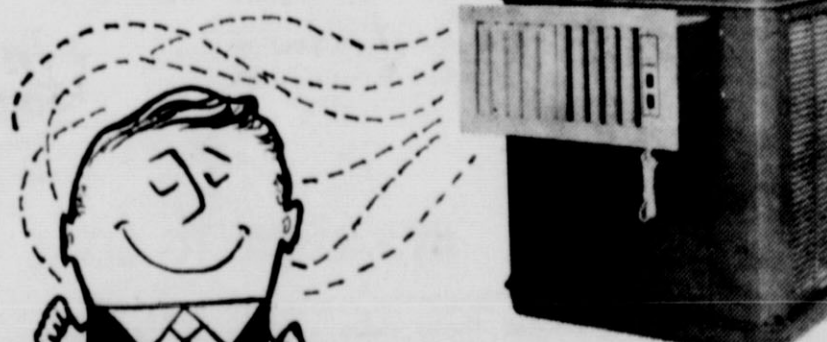

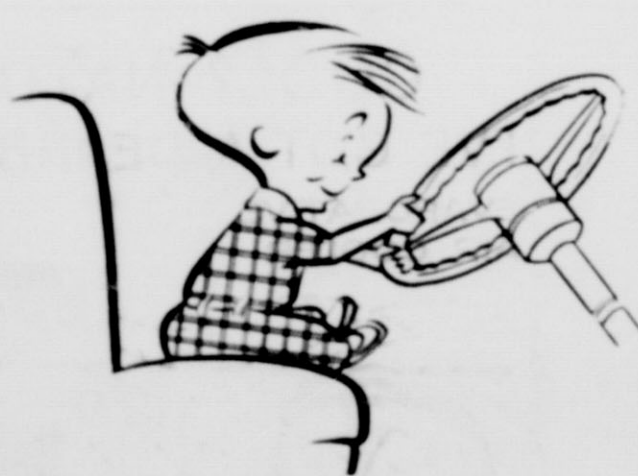

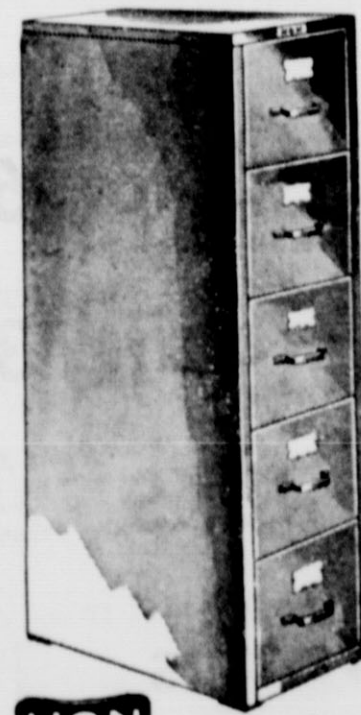

The Model T beetles (black) that farmers have been noticing late in the afternoon, are darkling beetles. This is the adult stage of the false wireworm, and out of young seedlings at night, burrowing into the ground to dig them.

Darkling beetles, last long, but if controls are warranted, the beetles may be controlled with Thoroughness in the rate of 1/2 to 1 quart per acre. Spraying late in the afternoon, for best results.
