Farwell Schools Stage Bicentennial Festival

A flag raising ceremony and rocket launch ignited the Bicentennial Fair and Open House at Farwell Schools on Thursday, May 20. The Clovis Detachment of the Marine Corps League unfurled the flag and conducted the flag raising, the opening ceremony of the day-long festival.

This was followed by one of the highlights of the day, the presentation of a Farwell victory bell which was built by Marlon Inman of Farwell. Inman presented the blue and white victory bell to Superin-

tendent James Perkins who accepted on behalf of the Farwell school system.

Immediately afterwards, a rocket was launched and several energetic students chased it for several blocks, successfully retrieving it for the afternoon festivities.

Bette-Jane Goodwin, bicentennial chairman for the State of New Mexico, presented a display of historical items which she first began collecting in 1974, after becoming chairman.

Included in the items on display

were two authentic blue glass plates obtained through the General Federated Women's Club, uncirculated U.S. bicentennial coins, commemorative coins from New Mexico and other states, and a flag which had flown over Cannon Air Force Base. Bicentennial books and an American Legion plate encrested with the emblem of the liberty bell were among other items in Mrs. Goodwin's display.

An authentic 1800 ball and cap pistol, Sioux friendship feathers and a Sioux baby

blanket were part of Mrs. Steve Hillock's display.

A tour of the Social Studies fair was reminiscent of "the good old days." Students, parents, and visitors were treated to an array of materials 100 or more years old. These included arrowheads, newspapers, a spittoon, a wedding chest, revolvers and rifles.

The students actively participated in preparation for the

big day by decorating the doors to their classrooms with a bicentennial theme. Mrs. Cloreta Douglas's resource students won the first place ribbon with their 1776-1976 bicentennial anniversary decoration.

Throughout the rest of the morning high school students participated in a series of fun and competition. They tried their hand at bike racing, egg

toss, sack racing, tug-of-war and car pushing. The juniors emerged victorious, racking up a total of 216 points. The other three grades came in close behind with the seniors totaling 204 points, the sophomores, 194 points, and the freshmen, 190 points.

Later that afternoon junior high students presented their "Bicentennial Bits and Pieces" assembly. Students danced,

sang, acted out skits, and spouted "cornball" humor.

"Why are the buffalo happy?" "They are celebrating the 'Bisontennial'."

Classroom tours of all the schools followed the assembly. Winding up the day was the supper served by the sophomore class in the cafeteria and the band concert in the auditorium.

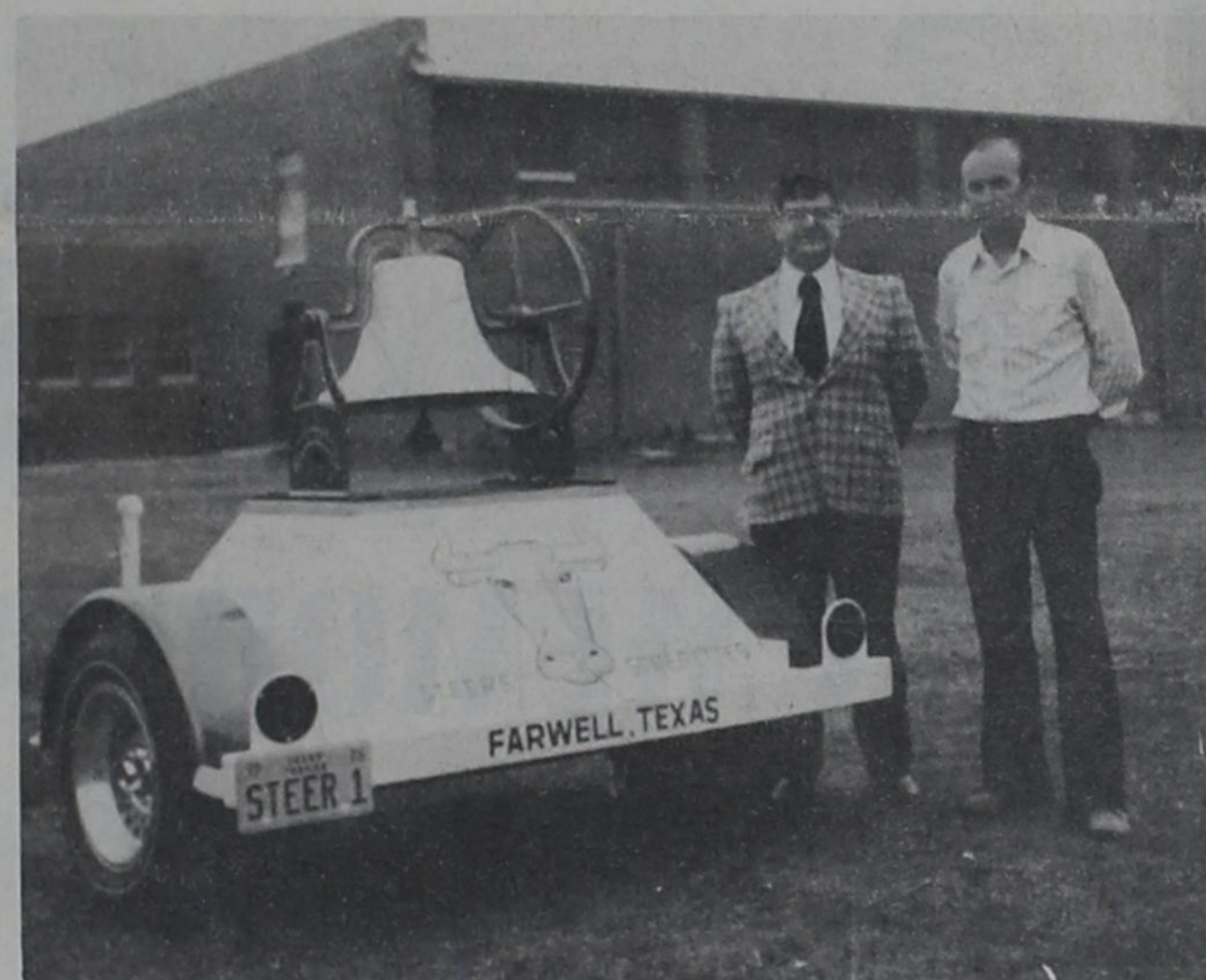

Texico-Farwell in 1904 with Rev. Joe Hedgepeth as pastor. Since that date, 33 additional ministers have served the church, with Rev. Perry having the longest tenure of service.

At Canyon Meet - -

Recommendations Given For Financing Schools

Sales taxes are favored to finance education. That is the trend of thought which emerged from the State Legislative Committee on School Financing which met in Canyon on Tuesday.

Paul Fortenberry, Farmer County Judge, first brought the idea of levying a sales tax. It came in the form of a resolution from Farmer County educators. The resolution said the sales tax would have the advantage of taxing all residents and not just property owners. The resolution presented by Fortenberry said the tax would then be returned to individual school districts based on their average daily attendance, the number of teachers and administrators and other criteria which would be used to measure district educational needs.

Fortenberry said that locally raised funds should be used for local enrichment and not included as part of the state allocation for the district. He



Golf Ball Size Hail

Ben Pritchett of Golden West Seed in Texico surveys the spoils of the storm which whipped through the Twin Cities area late Tuesday afternoon. The storm caused severe damage in some local areas and netted less than an inch of rain. Pritchett reported some of the hail stones measured as much as six inches in diameter.

Hail Pellets Twin Cities

A hail and rain storm whipped through the Twin Cities area late Tuesday afternoon causing severe damage in some parts.

Ben Pritchett of Golden West Seed Co. on the west edge of Texico, reported receiving about one-eighth inch of rain and golf ball size hail. Pritchett said that two hail stones measured five inches and six inches in diameter, respectively.

Mrs. B.A. Rogers of Texico reported scattered hail, "but it did not do any damage."

Mack Heald, Farmer County Agent, said that Farwell received between .30 and .50 inch of rain. Farwell proper received no hail damage but some surrounding areas were severely damaged.

Mrs. Ted Magness, who lives south of Farwell, reported as much as 50 per cent wheat

damage on some of their fields. The land south and east of the Magness property received the worst damage. Golf ball size hail fell for about 15 minutes and was accompanied by very little moisture.

Mrs. Magness reported receiving between .50 and .75 inch of rain.

She also said that last Thursday, May 20, they received about two and one-half inches of rain.

Asa Smith at Sherley-Anderson-Lariat Grain reported hail and wind damage. Strong winds blew out the steel door to the grain pit and marble size hail knocked peaches from trees and split corn leaves. He said the crops still "look good" in spite of the storm.

The Clovis area also received hail damage and .75 rain fell in three quarters of an hour, according to reports.

Texico Okays Tax Ordinance

At its regular meeting Tuesday, May 25, the Texico City Council adopted a Gross Receipt Tax Ordinance. The ordinance increases the city's gross receipts one-fourth of one per cent.

A resolution calling for bids on street bonds in the amount of \$23,000 was approved at the meeting.

The audit contract was awarded to Ribble Holloman of Clovis in the amount of \$936.

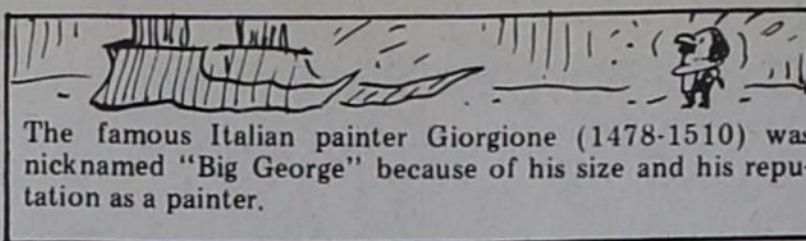
The Texico City Council is still in the process of trying to obtain 30-gallon trash containers with lids. After the new garbage contract goes into effect July 1 all residents will be required to use this type trash containers. If the city succeeds in purchasing the cans, Texico residents will be able to buy them from the city

at a lower price than purchasing the units from individual firms.

Janice Hagelgantz, a representative of Manpower, asked that the city utilize Manpower's services this summer. Texico students comprise a large work force during the summer and Manpower attempts to find them jobs, according to the representative. The Council decided to employ the students during future beautification of Texico projects this summer.

Also during the session, Mayor Manford Turnbough appointed Bill Thigpen as mayor pro-tem.

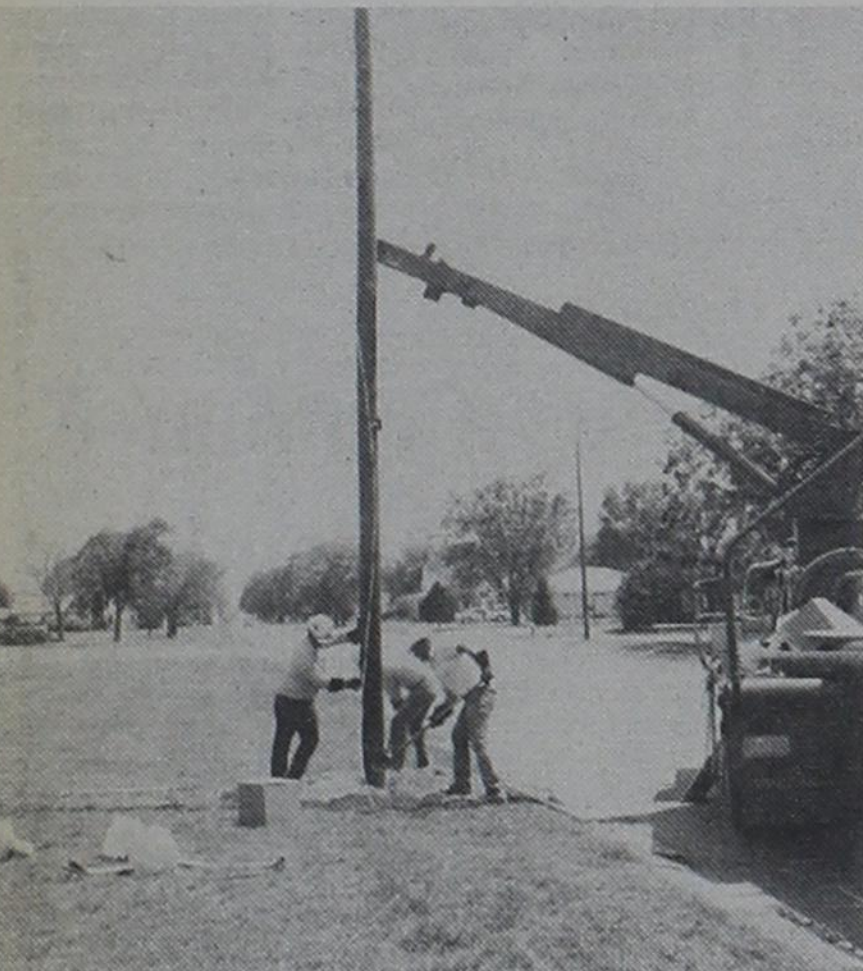

Guilty Verdicts - -

Child Abuse, Drug Cases Heard In County Court

Two child abuse cases and one marijuana case have been tried in Judge Paul Fortenberry's county court this month.

Vanette Lowder of Friona was charged with assault in relation to child abuse. Her three-year-old stepchild had been severely beaten. Mrs. Lowder received a probated one-year jail sentence. Judge Fortenberry ordered her to submit to counseling and the Texas Department of Public Welfare has been appointed temporary managing conservator of the child.

Wayne Balanger of Lariat was also charged with assault in relation to child abuse. He was fined \$2000 and sentenced to one year in jail. However after serving four months,

Judge Fortenberry, in a hearing last week, commuted the remainder of Balanger's sentence, provided he meet certain restrictions such as having a regular 40-hour week job. Two-thirds of the \$2000 fine has also been commuted.

Johnny Dean Broyles of Friona was convicted of possession of marijuana, less than two ounces. Broyles was fined \$1000 and was placed on probation for one year.

Promoted At Bank

Dollie Porter has been promoted to the position of cashier at Security State Bank in Farwell. She succeeds L.S. Pool who will retire this week.

Mrs. Porter has worked at the bank since 1957. In the early years of her association with the bank, Mrs. Porter worked part-time but sometimes took time off to be with her family. She has worked full time for the past four years.

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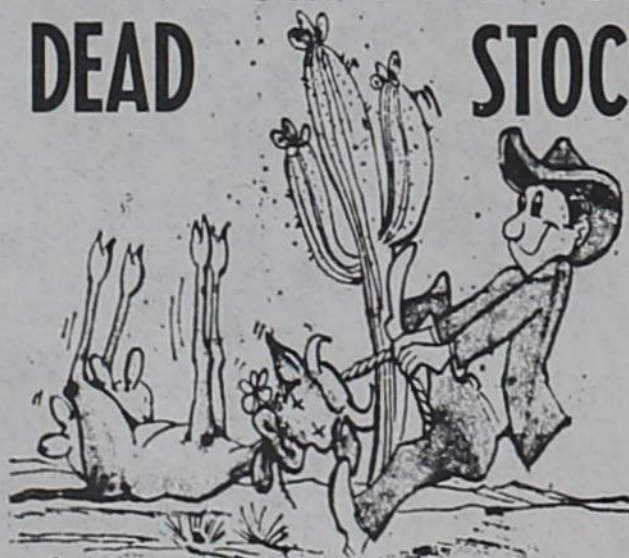
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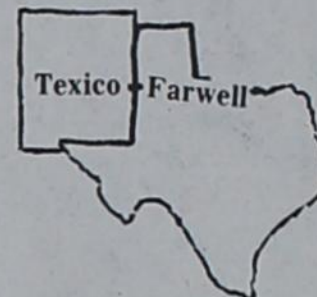
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AROUND THE TWIN CITIES

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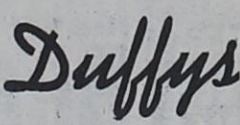

The Court also agreed to reimburse the county agent and the home demonstration agent for expenses incurred during the recent State 4-H Roundup.

Other business included accepting a resolution stating that the county will pay justices of the peace within the

county when they attend schools required by law.

The Commissioners Court also unanimously voted to pay \$2,089.00 to the Western Ag Sales Company, Inc. of Farwell for the cleared right-of-way on the Wendol Christian farm for Farm Road 3333.

The Summer Community Action Program was also discussed.

Local Students Named To Dean's List

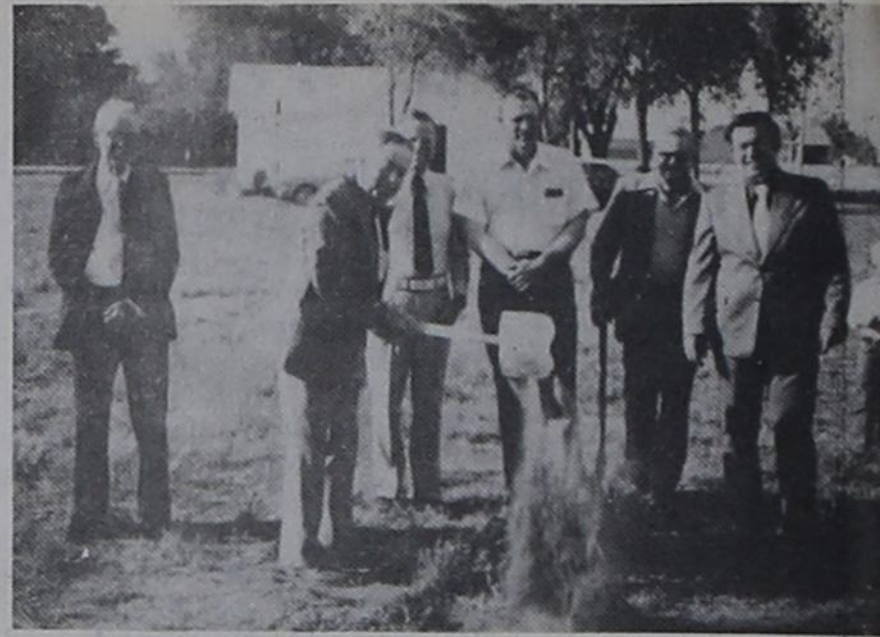
Two local students have been listed on the dean's honor roll at West Texas State University in Canyon.
