

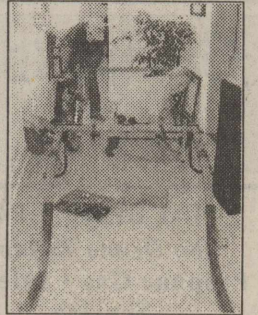

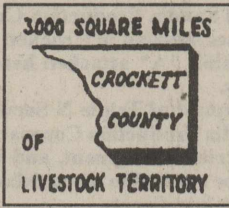

## School officials, architect and engineers survey Davidson Gym expansion progress

Assistant superintendent Ted Cotton, maintenance supervisor Ray Don Myers, high school principal Donnie Wylie, school contracted architect Larry Harvey of Green Harvey Architects of Lubbock, and electrical and mechanical engineers Danny Heath and Jimmy May were all on hand Friday afternoon to inspect Davidson Memorial Gym for quality and progress of the school's expansion program on the building.

Monies for the project are coming from the August 1998 voter approved bond election in the amount of \$2,965,000.00. Also receiving funds from the bond election will be the renovation of Ozona Middle School and Gymnasium facilities.

"Substantial completion of Davidson Gymnasium has been set for the end of this month (July) and a punch list of items remaining to be completed will be discussed and voted on at the next board meeting on Aug. 5," Cotton said. "What we are doing right now is compiling the punch list for the board's review," Cotton further stated.

The purpose of renovating Ozona Middle School, Ozona Middle School Gymnasium and Davidson Gymnasium is to make these facilities Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) handicapped accessible. To accomplish this, Davidson Gym has been given a new entrance with a handicap

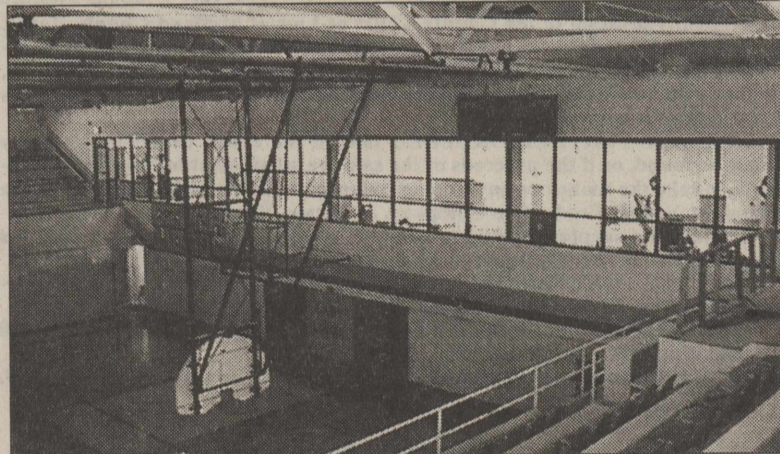
wheel chair ramp on the east end of the building with handicap parking plus handicap viewing areas on both sides of the gym near the east wall complete with railings.

Also included in the Davidson Gym project will be two new 25 ton air conditioners and duct systems, new handicapped accessible toilets for the existing restrooms plus new handicapped accessible restrooms for the public on the east end, new backboards for the practice goals with motorized retractable benches for each goal, a new and improved filming area, and a new glass enclosed viewing and snack bar concession area also on the east end of the gym. Access to this area is provided by a new east handicapped accessible entrance, and through new doors cut into the existing east wall of the gym. The gym floor will be visible from this east concession area, and accessible seating will be provided for the handicapped plus additional accessible public toilets are provided.

The snack area was once the top floor of a previous addition completed several years ago and previously used for storage. "The board really used forethought when they decided to include the upper level of that addition. It has really saved the taxpayers a lot of money," Cotton said.

Cotton said that the gym will be ready by the time school starts for normal school use and will also be completely finished by the time basketball season begins.

Facility improvements underway at Ozona Middle School include re-

moving 22 existing classroom and office heaters from closets; installing 26 new heating and air conditioning units, two for the office area, and four for the cafeteria. All of the evaporative coolers in the cafeteria will be removed; providing new electrical service to the building for new air conditioning and heating units; updating and modernizing the two sets of existing boys' and girls' toilet rooms; providing a new library; providing a new area for band practice and student walkways in the form of a new hallway allowing two entrances for each classroom on the west and south side of the facility; moving the administration offices to a more central location in the building; renovating the current offices into staff work areas; removing and installing new concrete slabs in 11 classrooms; painting all existing interior and exterior painted surfaces; installing new carpet in existing corridors, existing classrooms and new office; new technology room; all new exterior windows; installing new fire and smoke detection alarms; installing a new standing seam metal roof system over the existing sloped roof; installing new batt insulation; performing asbestos abatement; installing new liquid marker boards and bulletin boards and storage shelves in all classrooms; providing a new science laboratory with built-in science equipment; and removing most of the existing partitions on the stage of the cafeteria and repairing the floor, walls and ceiling to return most of the stage area to a usable raised presentation platform.

Architect Larry Harvey indicated that in some places in the original section of the building there were as much as 3 to 4 inches difference in height

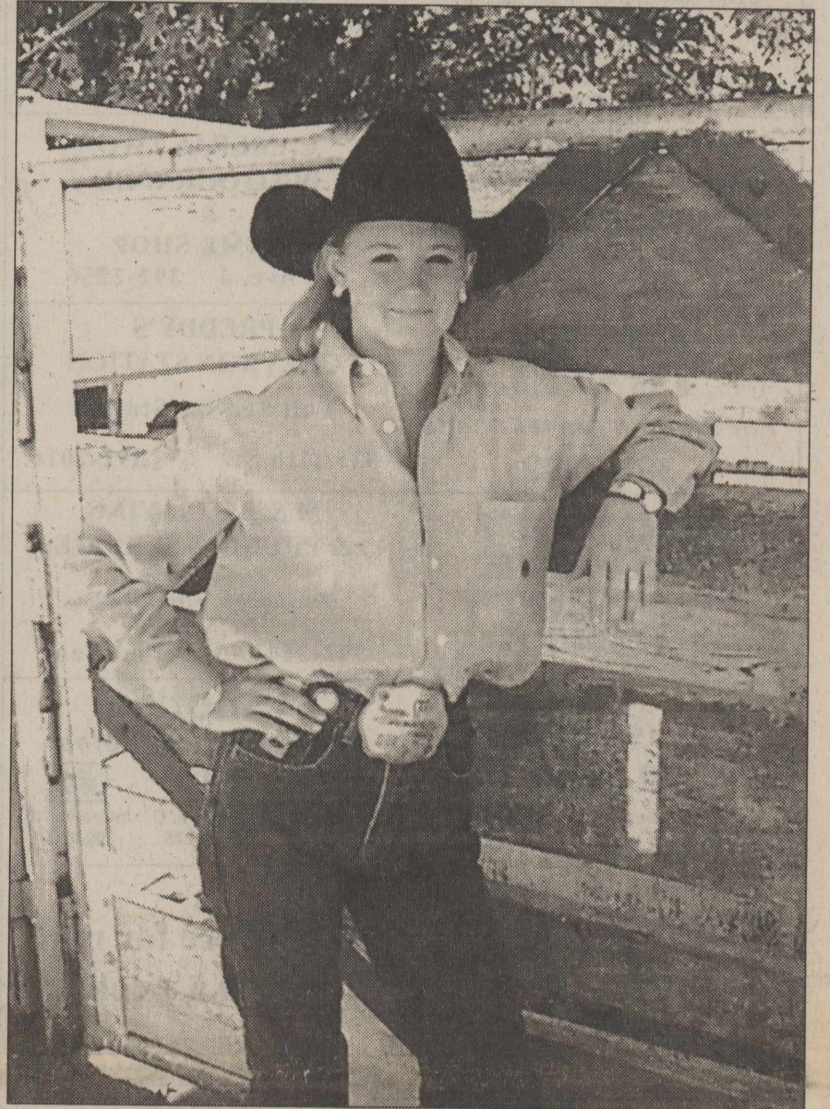
between the corridor floor and classroom floors, forcing the district to build walk ramps in many areas. He also indicated that all of the classroom slabs in the original section of the building were not connected in any way to the corridor slabs. "Three years ago when the board starting looking into the problem with the floors in the middle school we had cores drilled down to test the soil, and in all three places we found broken bottles, trash, all kinds of junk, things you don't want under a floor slab," Harvey said. "When they got in there and started tearing out the old slabs, the steel reinforcing that was supposed to be in the slab concrete was laying on the ground and not in the slab. There were some air gaps between the concrete and the dirt, and we found beer bottles, trash, and all kinds of junk," Harvey further stated.

The middle school gymnasium renovations include: providing a new wood playing floor over the existing tartan artificial floor covering; relocating the boys' locker room to a new addition along the west end of the gym, freeing up space for additional seating; providing additional seating along the south side of the gym with storage below; renovating the existing girls' showers, and girls' toilets to the new west addition; providing new back boards for all basketball goals and new scoreboards; and, removing existing louvers and ventilations system and installing a new ventilation and heating system with improved air flow and comfort.

Estimated completion date for all three projects will be Oct. 22, 1999.

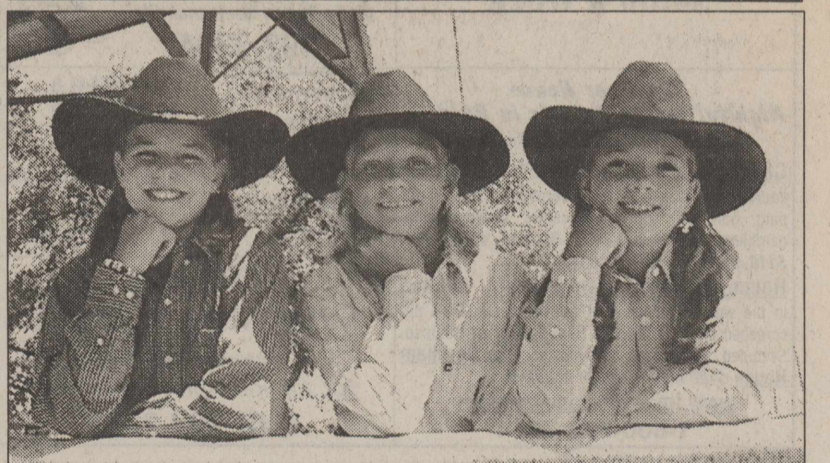

## New Texas Ranger on duty

As a youth, Texas Ranger Brooks Long never planned to go into law enforcement. His college degree, with a major in English and a minor in business administration, was the fastest way to get a degree, said Long. "I didn't know what I wanted to do." After completing his studies at Pan American University in McAllen, near his home town of Sebastian, Long began work for an insurance company.

One day he was pulled over for speeding by a Department of Public Safety trooper who had been his ag teacher in high school. "I went on a ride along with him, and I couldn't believe he got paid to do that. It was so much fun."

The rest is history. Long went to work for the DPS, taking close to a \$50,000.00 pay cut to do so. "It was not a job for money, but for self-satis-

faction," he explained.

Long, who has worked along the Mexican border all his career until coming to Ozona, advanced with the DPS, first becoming a law enforcement trooper and then being assigned to the narcotics service for three years in Laredo. He was promoted to sergeant investigator in the narcotics service in 1992. He was a narcotics investigator for four years in the Rio Grande Valley, which included Starr County-Rio Grande City and Roma.

Then Long took the Ranger test and was "lucky enough to get selected". Before testing for the Rangers, candidates must have been commissioned officers for the DPS a minimum of eight years unless they have four years of previous law enforcement service and four years with the DPS.

Sons Josh, 13, and Jordan, 10, are the reasons Brooks and his wife, Debra, came to Ozona. "We'd heard lots of good things about your schools; it's a small community where we can be part. We want both boys to graduate here. We have a long term plan," Long said.

Debra, who is originally from Houston, ran the legal department for the Attorney General's Office.

"When it (the Ozona office) came open, I knew it was something I could work with, a small community in West Texas with friendly people," said Long.

Long says the community response has been tremendous as far as friendliness. "Everything we've heard about West Texas is true as far as friendliness."

While his primary function as a Ranger is to assist local law enforcement, Long says "anytime a citizen needs assistance with anything of a

criminal nature, my door is open."

Ranger Long's territory includes Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton and Reagan Counties.

## Breastfeeding, reading urged for infants

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Permian Basin Women, Infants and Children (WIC) and the Texas Department of Health (TDH) remind you and your family of two important things for infants during their first year of life: being breastfed and being read to. August is Breastfeeding Awareness Month in Texas, and the theme is "Breastfeeding and Reading: A Smart Start."

TTUHSC Permian Basin WIC is a community organization with the goal of healthier, happier babies, families and communities," Judy Harden, director, said. "Babies who breastfeed have fewer infections, fewer allergies, miss fewer days of school when they are older. Baby becomes a double winner when you couple the good nutrition of that early start with Mother and Daddy reading 'Good Night Moon,' 'Baby Whales Drink Milk,' 'You are Special' and 'Happy Birth Day'."

William R. Archer, M.D., Texas Commissioner of Health, said he wants infants to have the best start possible. "Breastmilk and books are the best brain food," Archer said. "Breastmilk changes as baby develops to meet the baby's physical developmental needs, including help with baby's brain growth. And reading to your baby 20 minutes each day will increase the child's chances of

learning to speak clearly, read better and do better in school."

Archer said children should be read to daily at least to the age of 5, and that reading aloud to children is a way for parents and children to strengthen their family by spending time together, sharing ideas and learning about each other.

"When your baby is first born, you can read aloud while you nurse," said Harden, "textbooks, news stories, letters, poems - it doesn't matter what you read. The sound of your voice reading will stimulate your baby's brain, just as the breastmilk is helping develop your baby's brain."

Approximately 60 percent of Texas newborns are breastfeeding at hospital discharge; 22 percent still breastfeed at six months. TDH promotes breastfeeding awareness to increase breastfeeding by five percent each year in Texas and to educate parents, health care providers and community leaders about the benefits of breastfeeding.

The local Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center is located at 701 9th Street. Christy Chipman, breastfeeding peer counselor, is available Monday and Wednesday from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. for one on one or group counseling.

There is a small display at Crockett County Public Library with books that are child friendly.

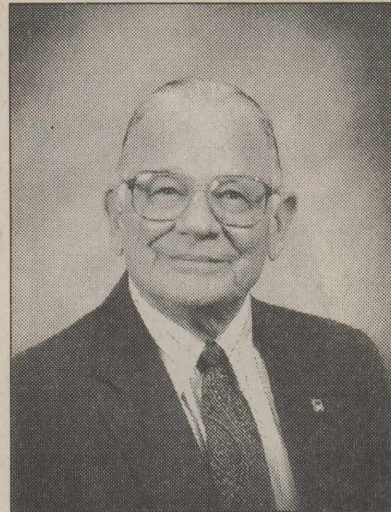

## Accident takes two lives on I-10

Two people were killed and five injured July 31, the result of a 2-vehicle accident west of Ozona. The deceased are Jose Juan Cabral, 31, of Laredo and Refugio Villa, age 59, of Mexico.

Cabral was changing a tire while legally parked facing west 1/10 miles west of mile marker 352. His vehicle was struck by a 1998 Ford van driven by Ramon Contreras of Houston. According to the report filed by investigating officers Monte Carroll and Kurt Knapp, the accident occurred at

## Eyes need protection from the sun

HOUSTON - When thinking about sun protection, do not forget your child's eyes.

"The sun's ultraviolet rays can harm the eyes, as well as the skin," said

Dr. Evelyn Paysse, an ophthalmologist at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

"Overexposure in childhood can lead to eye problems, such as cataracts, in adulthood."

Since children typically spend a lot of time outdoors, it is a good idea to wear sunglasses, in addition to wide brimmed hats or visors.

When selecting sunglasses, choose glasses with impact-resistant lenses that provide good protection against ultraviolet A and B radiation. While it may be difficult to get children to wear sunglasses, telling them how "cool" they look may make it a little easier.

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## Odessa woman who survived cancer says disease is not a death sentence

**EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article reprinted from the July 14 edition of the Odessa American by Jeanna Cuny is about Marie Pierson, former Ozonan, and her fight for survival with the deadly inflammatory breast cancer.**

Marie Pierson looked death in the face and walked away.

In July 1996, the Odessa resident was diagnosed with inflammatory breast cancer, which, unlike other breast cancers, is not detectable by mammograms.

Pierson said she noticed a rashlike redness on her breast, and had it checked by her doctor, who thought it was an infection, and treated it as such.

Then he realized it was cancer.

"My first reaction was extreme fear because you don't know how long you have to live," Pierson said. "I thought, 'My word, I'm going to die.'"

During the 16 months of treatment, she lost her hair three times. She lost the feeling in her hands and feet, although it eventually returned.

She lost her right breast and both parents.

But she never lost her desire to live.

"I'm a tough woman and a very strong person," she said.

Her fight began with a mastectomy.

While she was recovering from the surgery, her mother died. Her father soon followed.

But this wasn't the most difficult point of her ordeal.

Because there were so many cancerous cells in her body, Pierson underwent a stem cell transplant, a procedure similar to a bone marrow transplant.

The bone marrow was harvested from Pierson's system and cleaned. Then it was reintroduced to her body and began making new blood cells.

"It does the same thing as killing you, as far as the blood supply is concerned, because it takes it all out of you," her husband, Ray Pierson, said. "It just wipes out your body. Just chewing a bit of Jell-O would exhaust her."

She was released from the hospital in January, but the fight was not over.

Six months later, Marie Pierson noticed the same red rash. Instead of giving up, however, she grew more determined.

"I said, 'Well, drat. Dadgummit, we got it to go away once, we can get it to go away again,'" she said.

Taxol, a new chemotherapy drug, had just been approved and Pierson's doctor recommended it for her.

At that point, the drug still was so new the medical staff didn't know

how much to administer. The amount of the drug given damaged the nerve endings in her feet and hands.

"She would drop things and it would just aggravate her to death. She stumbled. So she learned to compensate," her husband, Ray Pierson said.

The treatments also made her weak and "fried" her veins, she said.

"Cancer is a scary, scary thing," she said. "While you're laying there (getting the treatments), you visualize it killing the cancer. You can feel it going through your body."

It was painful, she said, but she got past it.

Her perseverance was rewarded in March 1998 when she finished her treatment program and the cancer was found to have gone into remission.

Marie and Ray Pierson believe medical science, with the guidance of a higher power, brought Taxol into the situation, specifically for her.

"There may not be another soul in the whole wide world that may think of it that way, but that's the way we think, because Marie was the first person in Ector County to have Taxol," Ray Pierson said.

Marie Pierson goes in for check-ups every three months, but said she doesn't worry about the cancer coming back. She said her experience was humbling.

"I read obituaries in the paper about women younger than I am and I wonder why I survived," she said. "But I think it's to talk to people about cancer, especially inflammatory breast cancer."

"I'll talk to anybody at any time to assure them they can get over (cancer). It is hard, but one thing that can help is if you have a good support group," she said. "I didn't know about (support groups) until after I finished treatment, and I needed that."

The role that research plays in helping cancer patients face the disease, she said. Through research more cures and better treatments can be provided so others may not have to share her experience.

To raise money for that research, the American Cancer Society Texas Division Inc. is sponsoring its fourth annual Relay for Life July 30 and 31 at the Odessa College track.

Pierson said she will participate, as she has in years past.

The relay is a 24-hour event that raises money for cancer research and local programs the branch offers area cancer patients.

In addition to helping raise funds for research, Pierson said she discusses her experience in the hopes that it will offer hope and encouragement to other cancer patients.

Above all, she said cancer patients should never lose hope.

"Cancer is one of the scariest things in the whole wide world," she said. "But cancer patients have to realize that it isn't necessarily a death sentence. We can cure cancer."

**Sports medicine briefs**

**Warming up is a good idea, even on the beach**

If fun in the sun and sand includes a few games of beach volleyball, don't forget to warm up. It could help you rally through the game with less risk of injury.

Dr. Joseph Chorley, a sports medicine expert at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, suggests walking, swimming and stretching before you serve the first ball.

"Specifically, stretch your shoulders, thighs and calves," Chorley said. "Those are the areas that will get the most work when you're playing volleyball in the sand."

Volleyball players are more likely to suffer shoulder injuries because of the overhead action of spiking the ball. Knee and ankle injuries tend to be less common because the sand provides a more giving surface.

"Provided you are eating a varied and healthy diet and meeting your energy requirements, you will be getting any extra protein that you might need," she said.

A person's daily diet usually provides about 1.5 grams of protein per kilogram of body weight, said Fiorotto. However, too much protein increases water loss, which, especially in hot summer weather, increases your risk of dehydration and undermines exercise performance.

Fiorotto said the real key to success is a balanced, healthy diet. "Eating more protein is not going to give you more muscles. Only exercising them is going to make them grow," she said.

**Women should look into weight training**

Worried about looking like the Incredible Hulk? Don't. Women can enjoy the benefits of weight training while skipping the bulk.

"Most women want to tone up, not bulk up," said Dr. Joseph Chorley, a sports medicine expert at Baylor College of Medicine. "Their training process will involve lifting less weight with higher repetitions."

In addition to increasing strength, good muscle tone can improve posture and activity level. If you are serious about incorporating weight training into your fitness routine, Chorley suggests finding a reliable source of information, recruiting a friend as a workout partner and maintaining proper nutrition.

Don't be discouraged, though. If the scale creeps upward after starting a weight lifting routine. The reality is fat is probably being replaced with muscle, which is denser. If you feel healthier and your clothes fit better, you're right on track.

To combat the heat, a proper warm-up should also include drinking at least eight ounces of water one-half hour before hitting the court. After that, Chorley recommends water breaks every 15 to 20 minutes and a sports drink after an hour of play.

**Pumping up with protein powders: a plus or minus?**

While protein powder supplements might seem to be the key to bulging muscles, their claims could be more hype than a help.

The recommended daily amount of protein is 0.8 grams per kilogram of body weight. People who exercise might require higher amounts. But according to Dr. Marta Fiorotto with the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine, daily doses of protein powder by themselves won't help you bulk up.

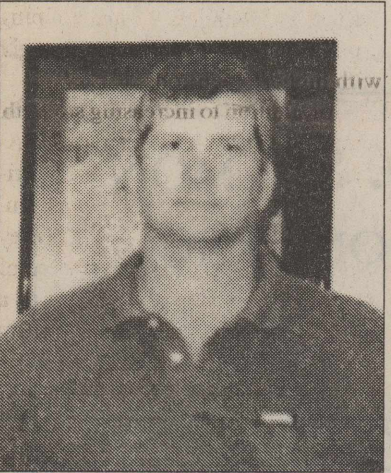
In 1990, Mr. Lacy moved back to Water Valley to go into his family's ranching business. He plans to keep his education and license up to date for selling real estate.

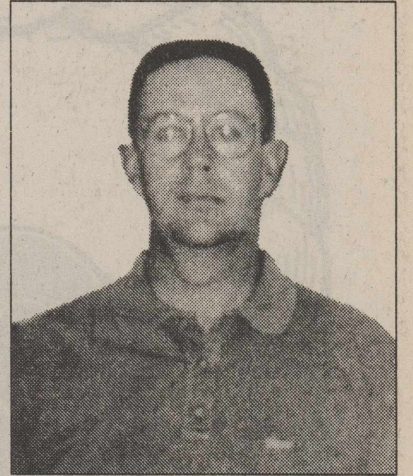
## Osborn named head basketball coach

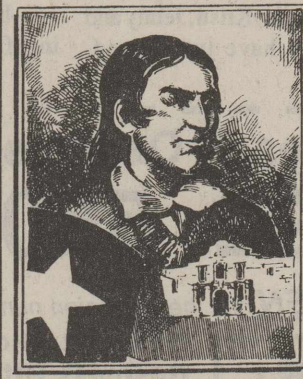

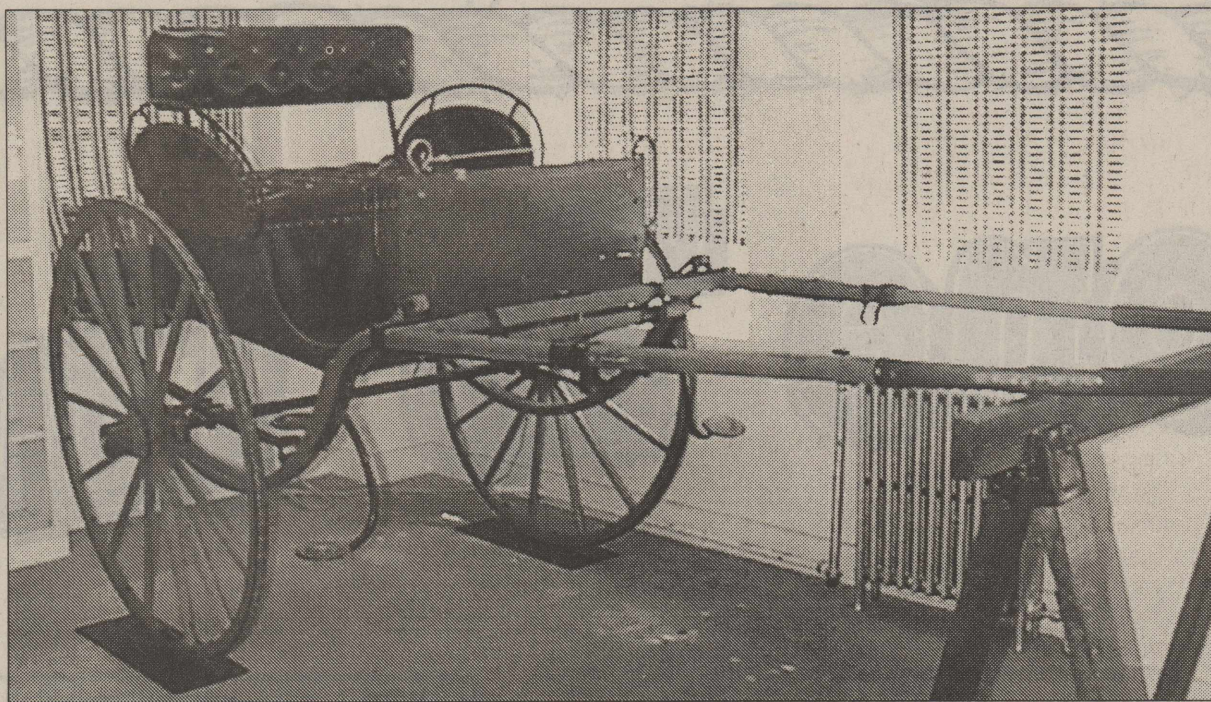

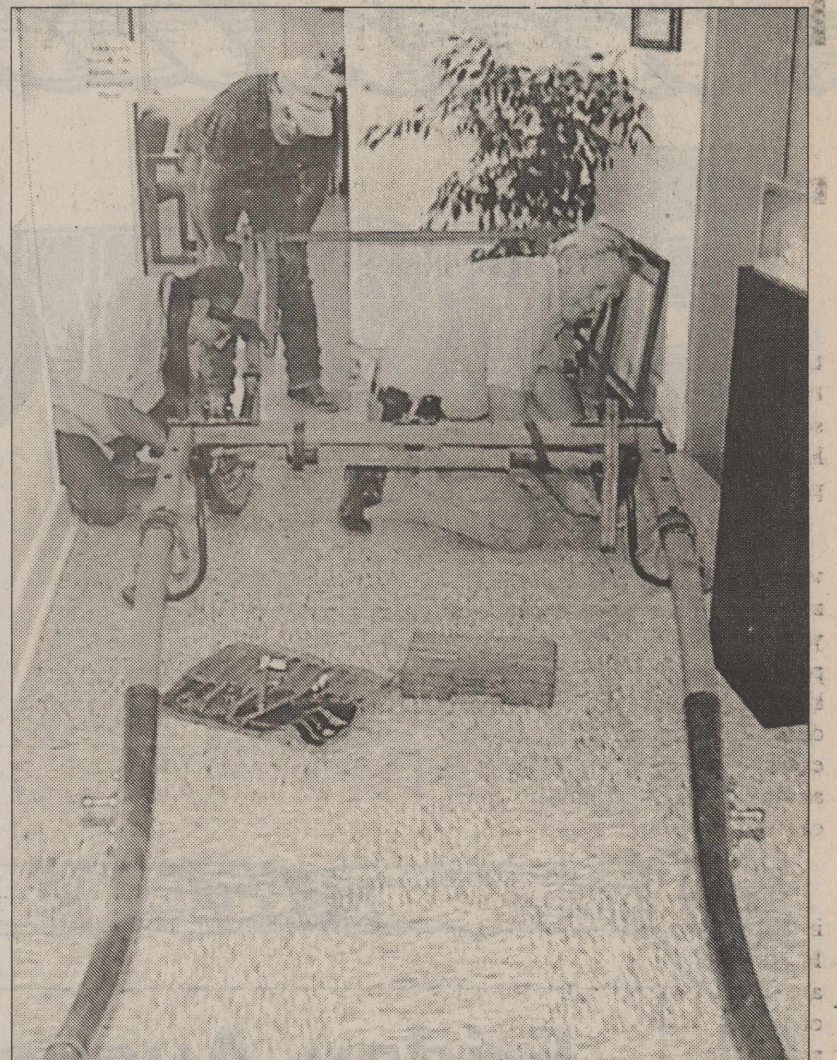

## Will quitting smoking really make a difference?

Can quitting smoking after a number of years make a difference in your health and reduce your chance of tobacco related illnesses? Definitely! There are a number of short term and long term benefits from stopping smoking. Smoking increases blood pressure, pulse rate and lowers the body temperature of the hands and feet.

Within 20 minutes after smoking your last cigarette, these things return to normal. Eight hours after smoking

your last cigarette, the carbon monoxide level in your blood drops to normal and the oxygen level returns to normal. Your chance of heart attack decreases after not smoking for 24 hours; your risk of coronary heart disease is halved after one year of quitting, and that risk returns to that of non-smokers after 15 years. After 48 hours of not smoking, nerve endings start growing back, and your ability to smell and taste is enhanced.

Still not convinced? How about these statistics: after two weeks to three months, your circulation improves, walking becomes easier and your lung function increases up to 30%. In one to nine months, coughing, sinus congestion, fatigue and shortness of breath decrease. Cilia begins to re-grow in the lungs and your body's overall energy level increases. Five years after quitting the lung cancer death rate for a former one

pack a day smoker decreases by almost half. The risk of stroke is reduced to that of a nonsmoker five to 15 years after quitting.

Need more? How about these: after 10 years of quitting the lung cancer death rate is similar to that of a non-smoker. Pre-cancerous cells are replaced, and the risk of cancer of the mouth, throat, bladder, kidneys and pancreas decrease. Fifteen years after quitting, the risk of coronary heart disease is that of a non-smoker.

Compare the advantages of quitting to the disadvantages of not quitting, it's pretty plain that quitting has all the advantages. If these advantages do not impress you, consider this. Cigarettes are the only things manufactured in the United States that if used exactly as intended, can and do, kill and maim. Their manufacture and use serves no other purpose to the consumer. For any information on tobacco, alcohol, or drug abuse, please contact the Alcohol & Drug Abuse Council for the Concho Valley. **Overhauling The INS**

When it comes to the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) taxpayers are tired of excuses. It seems every time we turn around we hear of another bureaucratic error, problem or fiasco with the INS.

Year after year Congress has provided the INS with more and more money to effectively do its job. But year after year we've seen nothing but poor management, incomplete book-keeping, outdated record-keeping, deplorable customer service, inadequate enforcement and little or no accountability. More money is obviously not the answer.

The INS budget has quadrupled in the past decade to over \$4.2 billion. However, their accounting procedures are so bungled and inadequate, they can't even account for hundreds of millions of dollars they have already been given.

Despite a bigger budget than they've ever had, the INS siphoned money away from key accounts like Border Patrol, leaving the INS field operations budget \$300 million in the hole. And to hide this serious mismanagement, the INS quietly proposed a virtual shutdown of Border Patrol activities, with some field operations facing a 90% budget cut.

When the plan was exposed, the INS couldn't explain where the money for those field offices had gone. When Congress pushed for an explanation and reminded the INS that closing those offices would endanger the lives and property of border residents, the INS suddenly found the money to keep the field offices open.

Congress gave the INS an additional \$100 million to hire 1,000 new U.S. Border Patrol agents this year. But the INS is projected to fill only 300 to 400 of those slots. And where is the rest of the money for the additional agents? We don't know. The

INS cannot account for it.

In addition, the INS consistently shows that customer service is not its number one priority. It now has over 2 million immigration and benefit applications still to be processed.

And the nightmare doesn't end there. Let us not forget the monumental failure by INS when it erroneously released a suspected serial killer. Another recent bureaucratic error at INS resulted in lane closures on international bridges and forced people crossing the border by car to sit in line for hours on end.

A bipartisan group of Congressmen, myself included, recently introduced a bill in Congress that completely restructures the INS. The Immigration Reorganization and Improvement Act of 1999 replaces the INS with two bureaus. A Bureau of Immigration Services would focus on processing legal immigrants. The Bureau of Enforcement would focus on enforcing U.S. immigration laws. Both bureaus would operate under the Department of Justice and would be headed by Presidential appointees.

Replacing the INS with two bureaus will strengthen the dual aspects of the INS, enforcement and service. The current agency is overwhelmed with conflicting responsibilities. On one hand, the INS is supposed to effectively process legal immigrants. But on the other hand, the agency is required to aggressively detect and evict illegal immigrants.

It is obvious that the current INS cannot carry out both missions. And it's not for lack of resources.

We cannot continue to accept excuse after excuse as to why the INS cannot perform efficiently. It is time to act. It is time to replace the INS with a system that provides taxpayers with the services they pay for.

**Don't be in the dark about hepatitis C**

This illness can lurk in the body for decades with no symptoms. In fact, up to 70 percent of people with the disease don't even know they have it. In Texas, more than 300,000 people are infected.

It's hepatitis C, and it's at epidemic proportions. That's why it's so important to get all the facts on the disease and get tested. The physicians of Texas Medical Association urge you to be aware of the risk factors for hepatitis C, get tested if you are at risk, and protect yourself from exposure to the disease.

Hepatitis C, like all forms of hepatitis, affects the liver. About 15 percent of those with the virus eventually get well. The other 85 percent develop a chronic infection that may or may not have symptoms. Many people make the mistake of believing that if they have no symptoms, they don't have the illness or the illness is mild, but that's not true, said Dr. Diane Simpson, a physician with the Texas Department of Health.

"Don't let that fool you," Dr. Simpson said. "You can still have it. That's why people at risk need to be tested."

You are at highest risk for hepatitis C if you are or have ever used illegal intravenous drugs or cocaine. "People who have ever injected drugs, even many years ago, even if it was only once, must be tested," Dr. Simpson said.

It only takes one exposure to a contaminated needle to infect you with the virus.

Also, if you have multiple sexual partners now or have in the past, you are at risk, especially if you did not use a latex condom. Up to 20 percent of new infections can be attributed to high-risk sexual behavior. There appears to be little risk of hepatitis C transmission in a monogamous, long-term sexual relationship, even if one partner has the virus.

Another risk factor is receiving a blood transfusion or a transplanted organ before 1992. More reliable tests to screen out blood and organ donors with hepatitis C have been developed since 1992, virtually eliminating any risk of contracting the virus from a donor. But if you received blood or

an organ before that time, you need to be tested. Blood banks and transfusion services within the next couple of years will send out letters informing those who received transfusions between 1988-1992 that they may have received hepatitis C-contaminated blood.

Receiving such a letter does not mean that a person has the virus, but it does mean that person must be tested as soon as possible.

You also may need to be tested if you have received dialysis, or if you have received blood clotting factors, which are given to people with conditions that inhibit blood clotting. And if you are a health care worker who was exposed to blood, you too may be at risk and need to be tested. It is possible to be infected with hepatitis C through sharing razors or tooth-

brushes with infected individuals, but transmitting the virus through these means is rare. It also is possible, but not common, for a pregnant woman to pass the virus to her child.

Three lesser risks exist, but nothing puts a person at greater risk than intravenous drug use. "It's the most common way people get hepatitis C," Dr. Simpson said.

It's important to remember that you can't get the virus from hugging, holding hands or kissing someone who is infected.

There's no need to be frightened of people with hepatitis C. You only need to protect yourself against the known risks for getting the virus. Putting yourself at risk can have serious consequences. Seventy percent of those infected with hepatitis C develop chronic liver disease. Many of these

people eventually will need liver transplants. About 8,000 to 10,000 people die from chronic liver disease each year.

If you are at risk, it's better to find out if you have hepatitis C as soon as you can so you can explore treatment and illness management options, rather than allowing the virus to lurk undetected. Get tested - for your health's sake.

**Death prompts TDH warning about bodybuilding products**

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) is warning the public about a new series of bodybuilding and sleep-aid products after the Travis County medical examiner's office ruled that the death of an Austin man last month was caused by the chemical 1,4 butanediol.

The man and his wife had taken a liquid known as Thunder Nectar, one of a series of new bodybuilding and sleep-aid products that contain 1,4 butanediol, also called tetramethylene glycol. TDH officials say the chemical can cause dangerously low respiratory rates, unconsciousness, vomiting, seizures and death. The woman was unconscious for several hours but survived.

Other 1,4 butanediol product brand names included in the TDH warning are Revitalize Plus, Serenity, Enliven, GHRE, SomatoPro, NRG3 and Weight Belt Cleaner. The products are available on the Internet, in workout gyms, shopping mall kiosks and health food stores and are sold or taken to build muscles, improve physical performance, reduce stress, enhance sex, induce sleep and lose fat.

In January TDH issued a similar warning about products sold for the same purpose that contain gamma

butyrolactone (GBL). GBL product brand names include Firewater, Revivartan, Revivartan G, Renew Trient, GH Revitalizer, GH Release, Gamma-G, Invigorate, X-Depress, Furomax, Insom-X and Blue Nitro.

Health authorities believe manufacturers are renaming their products and substituting 1,4 butanediol for GBL in this latest round of products. Both chemicals are precursors to gamma hydroxybutyrate (GHB), a so-called date rape drug. The body converts both chemicals to GHB.

"We're urging people not to use

or buy these products," said William R. Archer III, M.D., Texas Commissioner of Health.

Health officials say some of the suspect products may list 1,4 butanediol, tetramethylene glycol, gamma butyrolactone or 2(3H)-Furanone di-hydro on the label while others contain no label of any kind. Officials warn that the combination effects of vomiting and unconsciousness mean users could choke to death on their own vomit. They say the products are even more dangerous when taken with alcohol or other depressant drugs.

### Railroad Commission plugs 15,000th well

Railroad Commission Chairman Tony Garza visited Midland/Odessa to mark a historic day for the railroad commission and its well plugging program. The Commission plugs its 15,000th well this week in Crane.

"The state's well plugging program is a true Texas success story," Garza said. "The Texas Railroad commission is committed to safety and sound stewardship of our state's natural resources. Our well plugging program is an important part of the Railroad Commission's conservation efforts."

With the state's 15,000th plugging, Texas leads the nation in this important oil field environmental clean-up effort. Nationally, the program serves as a model for other states that wish to charter a similar system of well plugging.

"When oil prices plummeted, we began to see an increasing number of abandoned and shut-in wells. By plugging these old or potentially hazardous wells, the Railroad Commission protects nearby aquifers, residential areas and various environmental elements," Garza said.

In Fiscal Year 1998 alone, the Commission plugged 1,604 wells and cleaned 281 polluted oil field sites.

Well plugging and cleanup efforts are paid for through the Oil Field Cleanup Fund, an 8-year-old program. The fund's revenues are derived entirely from drilling permit fees, oil and gas violations, as well as a 5/16-cent per bbl tax on oil and 1/30-cent per Mcf tax on natural gas.

The new gas wells have been completed in Crockett County's Davidson Ranch Field southeast of Ozona. Texaco Exploration is the operator.  
New producers include the No. 5 C. E. Davidson Jr. "C", the No. 6 Scheuber-Wilkins and the No. 25 C. E. Davidson Jr. "B". Locations are six, nine and seven miles southeast of ozona, respectively.  
The No. 5 Davidson flowed 478,000 CF gas per day on a 1.25-in. choke and was rated at 500,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The Scheuber-Wilkins produced just 81,000 CF gas per day on a half-inch choke and was evaluated at 115,000 CFD on open flow. The No. 25 Davidson came in flowing 693,000 CF gas daily on a 1.125-in. choke. It earned a 2,213,000-CFD rating on open flow.

Production for all three wells is in the Pennsylvanian Era. Gas pay ranges from 7,752 to 8,142 feet into the wellbore.

Tamarack Petroleum has posted first production data for the No. 18 Hoover "18" in the Ozona Field about 15 miles southwest of Ozona.

The well flowed 191,000 CF gas daily on a 40/64 choke opening and was evaluated at 210,000 CFD on open flow.

Bottomed at 6,515 feet, it was plugged back to 6,338 and was perforated to produce in the Canyon Sand. The production intervals will range from 6,152 to 6,244 feet into the hole.

The same operator has completed the No. 11 Hoover "13" in the Ozona Field about 17 miles southwest of Ozona.

The well bottomed at 6,557 feet and was perforated for Canyon Sand pay, 6,328 to 6,450 feet into the wellbore.

Gauged on a 40/64 choke, the interval yielded gas at the rate of 80,000 CF per day. It was assigned a 98,000 CFD rating on absolute open flow.

Two potent producers have been completed in the Northeast Ozona Field by Texaco Exploration.

Both located about three miles southeast of Ozona, the wells are designated as the Nos. 33 and 34 A. R. Kincaid Trust "B".

The No. 33 flowed 1,248,000 CF gas daily on a 2-in. choke and was evaluated at 1,580,000 CFD rating on open flow.

The more powerful No. 34 yielded 2,253,000 CF per day on a 2-in. choke and earned a 4,903,000-CFD rating on open flow.

Both wells were drilled to 6,600-ft. bottoms and will produce from the Canyon Sand. The No. 33 was perforated to produce at 6,228 to 6,418 feet. The No. 34 was perforated to produce at 6,232 to 6,584 feet into the wellbore.

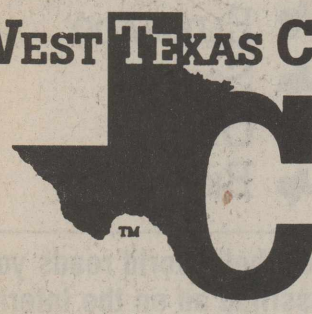

**APPLICATION.** Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, P.O. Box 117, Ozona, Texas 76943-0117, has applied for a Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) wastewater permit. The applicant has an existing Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) Permit No. 10059-001. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 500,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed TPDES Permit No. 10059-001 will replace the existing TNRCC Permit No. 10059-001.

The plant site is located approximately 3,000 feet west of the State Highway 163 and approximately 2.5 miles south of Interstate Highway 10 in Crockett County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged into Johnson's Draw; thence to the Devils River in Segment No. 2309 of the Rio Grande Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for Johnson's Draw. The designated uses for Segment No. 2309 are exceptional aquatic life uses, public water supply and contact recreation.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

**PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING.** Written public comments and requests for public meetings may be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address provided in the information section below, within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of this notice. A public meeting is intended for the taking of public comment, and is not a contested case hearing. A public meeting will be held if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application.

**CONTESTED CASE HEARING.** The TNRCC may grant a contested case hearing on this application if a written hearing request is filed within 30 days from the date of newspaper publication of this notice. The Executive Director may approve the application unless a request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice.

To request a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "(I/we) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a brief and specific description of how you would be affected by the application in a way not common to the general public; and (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the proposed activity. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address provided in the information section below.

If a hearing request is filed, the Executive Director will not issue the permit and will forward the application and hearing request to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

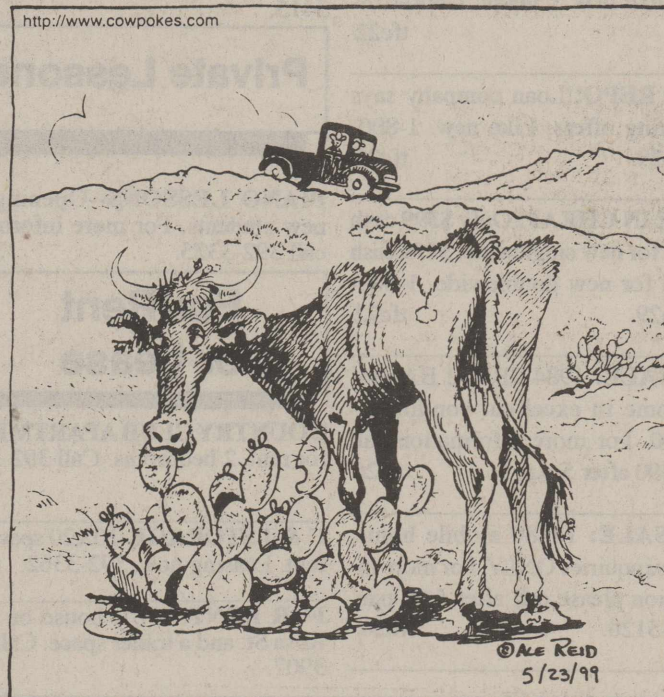
