Lions Conclude 51st Convention

DALLAS—One of the largest conventions in the history of Dallas—the 51st annual Lions International convention—ended Saturday and members of the organization from 143 different countries began to leave for home.

Dallas was a historic spot for the organization, since the first international convention was also held here.

Club members from practically every country of the free world poured into Dallas, with estimates of their number ranging from 30,000 to 33,000.

The new president of the worldwide service organization, Dave Evans of Texas City, called for a rededication to fulfillment of the dream of Lions' founding fathers.

"Too Big" For Excuses
"As we begin this second half-century of Lionism... we no longer can make excuses," Evans said at the final general session Saturday.

"We are now too big to make excuses—we are the largest service organization in the world and we have the ability and moral obligation to serve mankind in any way we can," Evans said. "No job should be too big for us."

Robert J. Uplinger of Syracuse, N.Y., was selected third vice president. The position virtually assures him of elevation to Lions president two years from now.

The Lions members also voted to hike membership dues a dollar a member to meet operating expenses of the international headquarters in Chicago.

Delegates from the Matador Lions Club at the convention were Glenn Woodruff and Secretary Forrest Campbell.

Mrs. Woodruff and daughters, Lou Ann and Lois Suzanna accompanied Mr. Woodruff in attending the convention. They also visited Six Flags and attended the play, "T.V. - B.C." in which Richard Campbell has the leading role.

Contract Let for Hwy Construction

AUSTIN—A contract for highway construction in the Childress District has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.

The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee and will be in Motley County.

Cooper and Woodruff Inc. of Amarillo was awarded the contract for grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment on 14 miles of State Highway 70. Low bid was \$578,604.45.

The project extends from 4.7 miles north of Matador to 6.5 miles north and from Dutchmans Creek bridge north to US 70. Algie Groves of Matador is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 150 working days.

"My needs are simple; there is nothing I want. I usually eat in cafes and sleep out at night. I have wonderful health and peace of mind. It is easy to get employment anywhere. At night I ask God to protect me, and go to sleep. When I work I try to do my best, because I feel that no man can believe in God and give half-measure. I am a member of the Seventh-day Adventists but I feel I am a poor member because I am a non-conformist."

While "Wrangler" requires no money for "fuel" he did wear out a set of horse shoes in seven days traveling in the mountains,

and it cost \$7.50 to get him reshod. The horse usually answers Webb's whistle, but once in New Mexico he ran away, and Webb had to secure another horse to catch him. Now "Wrangler" wears a pair of hobbles at night. Sleeping out at night is wonderful to the Englishman, with one exception—when he reached the Plains irrigated area. There the mosquitoes made sleep almost impossible.

He is frequently invited to spend the night with people he meets, and spent the night in Matador with the Thomas Dodd family about one mile east of town.

He planned to stop in the Vernon area and work one or two weeks, then proceed northeast through Oklahoma.

Free FUEL for 2,000 miles! Travel is cheap to Bill Webb, 40, who is riding horseback from Scottsdale, Arizona to Buckhannon, West Virginia. He left Scottsdale April 19 and reached Muleshoe, Texas in 23 days, but he stops and works when his needs require finances. His 9-year-old horse "Wrangler" grazes in the borrow ditches most of the time.

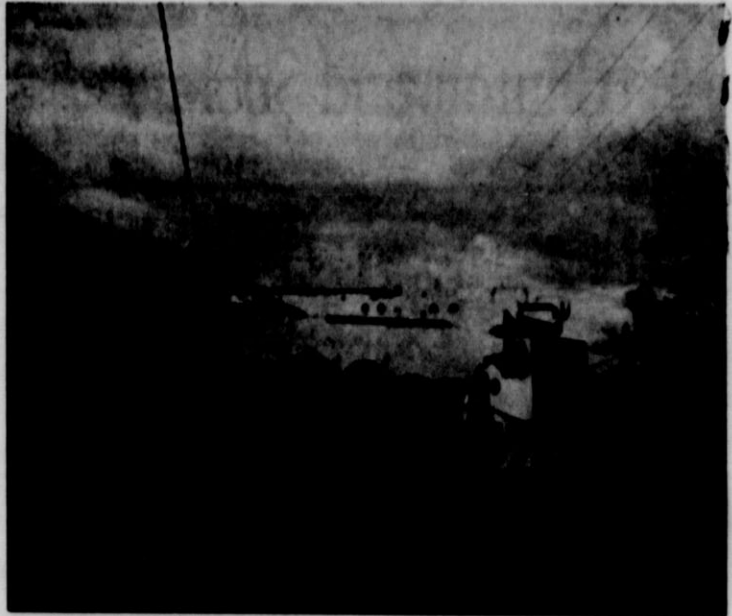
"We," Webb and Wrangler average about 30 miles per day when traveling, and their record mileage is 45 miles.

Webb, who is unmarried and does not drink or smoke, was born on a farm near Worchester-shire, England. He came to the United States in 1963, when his mother, who was spending a va-

cation with her daughter in North Carolina, became seriously ill. Webb flew to his mother's bedside.

His mother improved for a time and then suddenly died. He decided to see some of the wonderful country and worked his way across the nation to Los Angeles. He worked on a sheep ranch and later on a dude ranch at Scottsdale, and when he decided to return to the east coast, he bought "Wrangler" from the owner of the dude ranch and started east.

"I love animals, children and old people," Webb said, "and I love the United States. People are friendly everywhere, but the people of Texas are more friendly than in any state I have visited."

Damage Heavy In Wild Storm's Wake

A WILD, SAVAGE storm struck the Matador area late Sunday and left extensive damage in its wake. Most of the damage was in fields where reports were received of as much as 2.75 inches of rain falling in 30 minutes, accompanied by crop-destroying hail and high winds.

Damage here in Matador was mostly from the excessively high winds which whipped tree branches into the streets and disrupted electric power and telephone service.

A high voltage power line broke in the alley back of the Tribune and plunged the town into darkness. Service was restored within 10 to 15 minutes to rest of the town, but the block of Main Street north from the First State Bank to the Tribune was without power until 1 a.m. Monday.

West Texas Utilities Co. servicemen worked in the darkness and some waded hip deep Ballard Creek to replace the burned lines.

When the broken line fell it struck the General Telephone cable and put telephones out of order from US Highway 70 north. Telephone service men started work Monday morning in rebuilding and repairing the damaged lines. Telephone service to the Tribune was restored about sundown Tuesday.

A plate glass window was blown in at the Matador Hotel and owner Warren Clements was standing only a few feet away when it crashed.

The sheet iron blacksmith shop building owned by Mrs.

M. L. Patton, facing Eubank Street back of the city water tower, was partially blown away. Signs and awnings were blown into streets with many tree limbs.

Near Cyclone
A small cloud north and slightly east of Matador dipped low but did not reach the earth. It was laced for some time by intensive bolts of lightning. The cloud passed east but heavy rain, hail and wind followed. The rainfall in Matador was recorded by Bob Stanley as 80-inch, but was heavier north.

R. E. (Pappy) Campbell and Odell Meyer, about a mile north of town lost all their crops as torrential rains, strong winds and hail struck their fields. Terraces were broken and wide areas were left under water. Campbell said he registered 2.10 inches of rain within 30 minutes. Other farms in the area were also completely destroyed.

Rain was reported as far north as Flomot, where hail also destroyed some crops. No rain fell at Roaring Springs Sunday night but showers were reported Monday night after the passage of the cool front which set off the storms.

Mercury had reached the century mark here Friday, Saturday and Sunday before the cooler air arrived late Sunday.

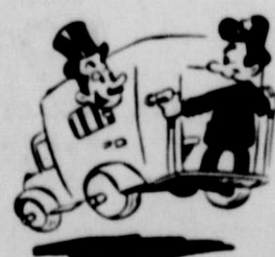

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

TOPIC: THE AMERICAN WAY

There are still a few people around who feel a real sense of pride in the achievements of our country. Certainly we have a lot more accomplishments to be proud of than all of our critics put together have.

The thing that has made our country great is the willingness of the American people to do their share in working for their community or their country, in working for better laws, better health, and better social conditions, and in being willing to die for their country or to pay their fair share of the taxes required to support their government.

Of course there is a small percentage that may want to place limitations on fighting or dying for their country, but fortunately there appears to be a very large percentage that have no reservations.

Finally, every American can feel a real sense of pride that the Internal Revenue Service collects 97% of our federal taxes through voluntary compliance. No other Nation can. As long as we have Americans who are willing to lay their hard-earned dollars on the line for their fair share of operating our government, we have not lost the "Spirit of 1776."

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

A pesticide sprayer that attaches to the end of a garden hose may be one of the gardener's handiest gadgets, but make sure it delivers the recommended amount of pesticide. The size of the container will vary among the different sprayers on the market, but more important to know is the amount of spray delivered.

For example, some quart-size containers will deliver 15 gallons of spray, while others deliver only 6 gallons of spray by the time the container is emptied. The amount of delivery is written on the containers.

If your sprayer delivers 6 gallons of spray and you have a material that calls for 1 tablespoon of insecticide per gallon of water, then add 6 tablespoons

of insecticide to your container and fill it with water. But if only one gallon of spray at the same recommended rate is desired, add 1 tablespoon of insecticide to the container and fill the container with water "only" to the one gallon mark on the sprayer.

Don't use the same hose-on sprayer for herbicides and insecticides, because washing out many of the herbicides is not easy. To be safe, use one hose-on sprayer for insect control and another for weed control.

Depending on the pressure you get from your water line and the amount of water delivered, you must also take precautions with spray drift when using a hose-on sprayer. Shooting a stream of spray into a tree will result in some of the spray material drifting away. Adjust your spraying technique according to surrounding plants and wind movement to prevent unwanted residues or hazards.

It is also important to note whether the sprayer is designed to have insecticide added and filled to a given line with water or whether the particular sprayer is designed for the addition of insecticide alone—with no water added. Home owners are encouraged to check the output of their sprayers by filling the sprayer to a given mark with plain water, attaching the hose and spraying the water into a one, three or five gallon container. This is an easy procedure for determining if the sprayer is putting out the 6 or 15 gallons indicated on the container.

Adjustments in the insecticide mixtures can then be made where the calibration of the sprayer is not accurate. This will prevent damage to plants or failure to get good control in other instances.

If you are in the market for a hose-on sprayer, remember you get what you pay for. Don't expect a precision-made piece of equipment for a real low price.

For those interested in learning more about pregnancy testing of beef cows, another short course has been scheduled for July 11 and 12.

John Beverly, Extension Animal Husbandman from College Station will present information on this subject in a meeting starting at 9:00 p.m. Thursday night July 11th in the courthouse at Matador. Practice work will be done at 4 ranches in the county the following day, July 12th. Time and places will be announced at the meeting on the 11th.

There is no charge for this training, and for those whose calf crop percentage hasn't been 100%, this short course should be beneficial.

Peanut producers will want to attend the meeting at the Flomot School, Tuesday night July 9th, starting at 9:00 o'clock.

James Rogers, Extension Agronomist from Lubbock will present information on peanut production, and will establish a test plot on the 10th or 11th to show the value of correction micronutrient deficiencies.

I also hope to have Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist, from Lubbock to present information on peanut diseases at this meeting.

All peanut producers are urged to attend. Even though Motley County had the highest average yield per acre in the state for 1967, we are still not reaching our potential.

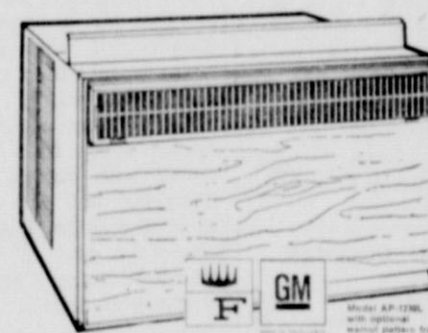
