Calf (?) With Appearance of Dog Is Attracting Many at Eastland

A five-day-old animal whose owners claim is half bulldog and calf, attracted the attention of stock raisers and others Tuesday at Eastland.

W. H. Cooper and Hoyt Davis claim the mother was a three-year-old Hereford and the father a four-year-old Boston bulldog.

The animal, with equal characteristics of a calf and dog and the possible dominating appearance of the latter, is located at Cooper's residence near the Point Service Station, east of Eastland on the Bankhead highway.

At birth the animal weighed 50 pounds, which Davis stated is about 25 pounds less than the average weight of a calf. It has a screw tail, dog legs and cropped ears. The animal is male.

The mother of the calf-bulldog recognizes the animal as its own and is fed in the ordinary manner. A Ranger veterinarian examined the animal and stated its health was good and "should die of old age."

Teeth of the animal are of a dog's type. Horns are taking form on back of the head. The face resembles the usual pug-nosed bulldog type.

Davis and Cooper are dealing with an insurance company to insure the animal for \$2,000. They plan to exhibit the freak at the Dallas and Fort Worth Centennial celebrations.

The dog, which the owners claim is the father, is owned by Connor Stubbfield of Eastland. It has attracted wide attention. Majority of those who view the animal are dubious of the claims until inspection.

EASTLAND, June 24.—(Special)—County Judge Clyde L. Garrett, president of the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas, expressed much pleasure here today when informed that a Washington order would be issued this week lifting the WPA restriction that a person, to receive a WPA job, must have been on dole prior to November 1, 1935.

The announcement was made by Harry Hopkins, national administrator of the WPA at Washington, in connection with his report that the WPA would be ready to begin a new fiscal year July 1 with nearly four billions of dollars of the approved projects available for the program.

to this authority, is actually consumed by Texas cotton mills. This means that of the latest annual cotton output aggregating 2,406,000 bales, only 72,180 bales were utilized by home industry. In the case of wool production, in which Texas leads the nation, all of the raw material is shipped out of the state, none being consumed by the Texas manufacturing industry. The Texas Almanac states: "There is not even a scouring plant in Texas, and it estimated that freight charges on grease and dirt, alone, costs the wool growers \$70,000 a year in sending its wool to market."

The neighboring state of Oklahoma, according to 1935 figures of the Petroleum Administrative Board, refined 57,422,000 barrels of crude oil in its home refineries, but shipped out to other states a total of 136,000,000 barrels. This means that Oklahoma utilizes only twenty-nine per cent of its raw material against sixty-seven per cent which is consumed by Texas oil refineries.

A balance sheet of the Texas oil industry shows that crude oil is shipped to twenty other states as well as to numerous foreign countries. Texas also receives crude oil from Oklahoma, Louisiana and New Mexico, as well as some foreign oil, a portion of which is re-shipped in interstate and foreign commerce.

Texas leads the world not only as the largest producer of crude oil but also as the largest manufacturer of petroleum products. In 1935 Texas produced forty per cent of the nation's crude oil supply and its 197 oil refineries processed twenty-seven per cent of all the oil manufactured into petroleum products in the United States. This combination of leadership in raw material and home manufacturing makes the Texas oil industry a vital influence in the economical welfare of this great state and exemplifies the popular slogan, "What Texas Makes Makes Texas."

In contrast with the oil industry of Texas, which utilizes two-thirds of all the oil produced in the state, are the cotton and wool industries which, according to the Texas Almanac and Industrial Guide for 1936, ship out of the state nearly all of the raw material produced. Only three per cent of all the cotton produced in Texas, according

to the Texas oil industry provides a large labor payroll which is materially augmented by home manufacture of petroleum products through its 197 refining plants located at strategic points throughout the state. This is of paramount importance to the people of Texas since the encouragement of home industry affords additional employment opportunities for labor which might otherwise be diverted to other states. As a result many thousands of persons are gainfully employed by these refineries which process Texas crude oil for gasoline, kerosene, fuel oil, lubricants and scores of other valuable products which are constantly in demand throughout the world.

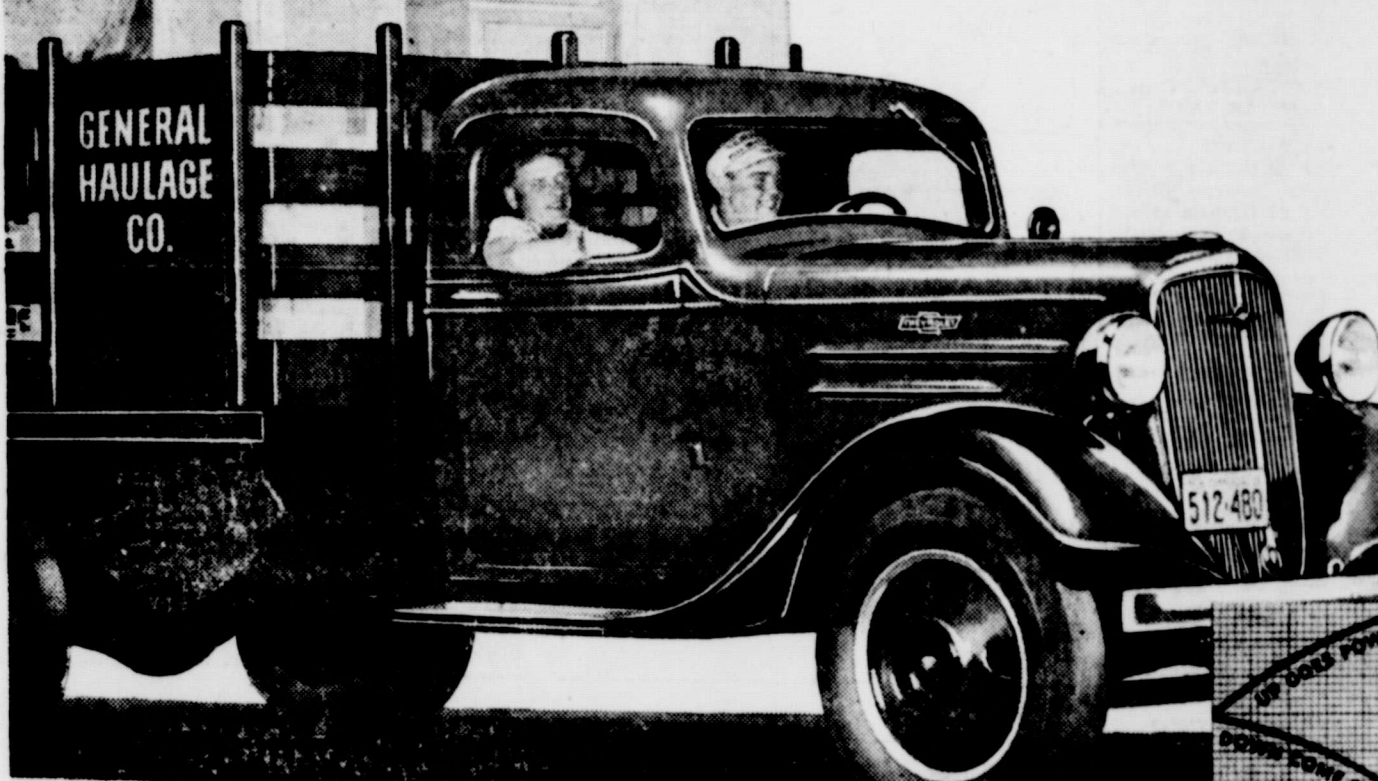
