ROAD TAX CARRIES IN PRECINCT ONE AND THREE

The special road tax voted on in Precinct One and Three on last Saturday carried by an overwhelming majority. The voters of Ochiltree county never fail to do their duty at the polls when good roads are at stake.

Ochiltree county now has the best dirt roads of any county in the Panhandle and probably has more graded roads than any other northern Panhandle county.

CITY BOND ELECTION ON NEXT TUESDAY

The election to decide upon the \$7,000.00 bond issue by the City of Perryton for street improvement purposes will be held next Tuesday at the Courthouse in Perryton.

An election for the purpose of adopting a section of the Statutes of Texas giving the city the authority to order sidewalks and street improvements and assess cost against the abutting property will also be voted on at same time and place.

Both of these elections should carry for they are of vital interest to the future welfare of Perryton. A vote for these measures means a vote for sidewalks and street crossings and both have to carry before we can put in same.

S. J. Allen is manager of these elections. For fear that some may misconstrue the meaning of what constitutes a property tax payer, Mr. Allen says that a property tax payer need not own real estate but the owner of any property, whether assessed or not, makes him a property tax payer. Also a wife is entitled to vote as she is interested in her husbands taxable property.

HUNTOON TO HAVE ELEVATOR

At a meeting of the directors of the Equity Union Exchange of Huntoon a contract for a 15,000 bushel elevator was let to the White Star Construction Company of Wichita, Kansas. Huntoon, the youngest of our Ochiltree county towns is rapidly forging to the front. The brick store being built there is rapidly nearing completion and there is talk of several other business houses being built. Also the Paradise school house is to be moved over to Huntoon and improvements made which will more than double the accommodations for pupils.

NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the Court House in the town of Perryton, at the Lone Tree School House in what was formerly Common School District No. 11; at the school house in the town of Ochiltree which was formerly Common School District No. 13; at the school house in the town of Wawaka; at the school house known as Tevis No. 2, situated in the northern part of what was formerly Common District No. 7, and at the school house in the town of Farnsworth, all of said polling places situated within Perryton Independent School District, within Ochiltree County, Texas, on the 14th day of May, 1921, to determine whether the bonds of said district shall be issued to the amount of One Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000.00), payable forty years from their date, and bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and equipping public free school buildings of brick, tile, stone, concrete, and metal material, and purchasing sites therefor within said district, and whether there shall be annually levied, assessed, and collected on all taxable property in said district, for the current year said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

ORDINANCE NO 32

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ERECTION OF BUILDINGS WITHIN CERTAIN LIMITS SO AS TO INSURE SAFETY FROM FIRE.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Perryton, Texas:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any Person or Corporation to Erect within the limits hereinafter defined in the City of Perryton any Building more than Six Feet Square, or Eight Feet High unless the out walls thereof are constructed of Brick, Tile, or Concrete, or Material that is approved by the City Council, said walls to be not less than Eight inches thick in building twenty feet in height or less, and Four inches additional thickness for each additional twenty feet in height, the roof of said building is to be covered with some non-combustible material.

Section 2. Erection includes removals from one lot to another, and also additions to or enlargement of any existing building.

Section 3. Any person or Corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof be fined in any sum not less than Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

Section 4. The limits within which sections City, Two and Three of this Ordinance shall apply are as follows: to-wit: All Lots or parcels of ground abutting on Main Street between Brillhart Street and Black Avenue.

Section 5. Whenever any Building or any addition to or enlargement of any Building shall be erected or in course of erection in violation of the provisions of this Ordinance, the Mayor or shall notify its owner or the Person having it in charge, in writing, to either remove it or alter it so as to comply with the requirements of this Ordinance, and if such Notice is not complied within Ten Days from date of said Notice, the Mayor shall cause such building or addition to be removed at the Owners' expense, the material removed to remain in the possession of the City until the expense of its removal is paid; if not paid within five days from its removal, such material shall be sold at public sale and the proceeds after paying the expense of its removal and costs of sale turned over to the owner.
This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after its passage and publication as required by law.

ELECTION ORDER FOR MAINTENANCE TAX

Be it ordered by the board of trustees of Perryton Independent School District, within Ochiltree County, Texas, that an election be held at the Courthouse in the town of Perryton, at the Lone Tree School House in what was formerly common school district No. 11, at the school house in the town of Ochiltree which was formerly common school district No. 13, at the school house in the town of Wawaka, and at the school house known as Tevis No. 2, situated in the northern part of what was formerly common school district No. 7, and at school house in town of Farnsworth, said polling places situated within Perryton Independent School District within Ochiltree County, Texas, on the 14th day of May 1921, to determine whether the board of trustees of said district shall have power to annually levy and collect a tax upon all taxable property in said district, for the support and maintenance of public free schools within said Perryton Independent School District, of and at the rate not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property within said district; such tax, if voted, to be levied and collected for the year 1921 and annually thereafter, unless it be discontinued as provided by law.
S. J. Allen is hereby appointed manager of said election at Perryton, as aforesaid; T. S. Pletcher is hereby appointed manager of said election at Lone Tree school house, as aforesaid; A. L. Carter is hereby appointed manager of said election at the school house in the town of Ochiltree, as aforesaid; Jess V. Stump is hereby appointed manager of said election to be held at the school house in the town of Wawaka, as aforesaid; and W. B. Dennison is hereby appointed manager of said election in town of Farnsworth; and Hugh Riley is hereby appointed manager of said election to be held at the school house known as Tevis No. 2, as aforesaid, and they shall each select two judges and two clerks, for each polling place, to assist them in holding the same.
None but property tax payers who are qualified voters in said Perryton Independent School District shall vote at said election.
A copy of this order signed by the president and attested by the secretary of this board shall serve as a proper notice of said election, and the president shall cause notice of said election to be given in accordance with law.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending the Constitution of the State as follows: Section 5, 22 and 23 of Article 4, the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, mileage and per diem of the Legislature; of

passed by the Legislature of Texas:

Sections 5 and 21 and 22 of Article 4 and Section 24 of the Constitution of the State shall be so amended as to read as follows:

He shall, at stated intervals, as compensation for his annual salary not to exceed \$8,000.00 Dollars, and shall have the use of the Governor's residence and furniture.

There shall be a Secretary of the Senate, and he shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the consent of the Senate, and shall continue in office, during the term of service of the Governor, and shall keep a fair register of all acts and proceedings of the Senate, and shall, when required, certify the same, and all papers, minutes and resolutions relative hereto, to the Legislature, or either House of the same, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by the Senate.

He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousand Dollars, and no more.

Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years and his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all cases in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be interested, and shall especially inquire into the rights of all private citizens, and from time to time, he shall cause to be printed and distributed to the courts as may be proper, a book containing the laws of the State, and shall prevent any private person from exercising any power of taxation, or collecting any tax, toll, freight, or fee, not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, cause a judicial forfeiture of all lands, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal notice in writing to the Governor or his executive officers, when required by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by the Governor.

He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed \$5,000.00 Dollars, and no more.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, and the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall each hold office for the term of two years, and until their successors are qualified; receive an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capital of the State, during his continuance in office; perform such other duties as are required of him by law; and the Secretary of State shall receive to their own use, and fees

costs or prerequisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury.

Section 24. Mileage and per diem: The Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may, from time to time, be provided by law not exceeding Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each regular session of the Legislature, and not exceeding Five (\$5.00) Dollars per day for the remainder of such session; and provided, further, that Members of the Legislature shall receive not to exceed Ten (\$10.00) Dollars per day for each special session of the Legislature that may be called from time to time by the Governor. In addition to the compensation above provided for, the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government which mileage shall be ten cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct travel by land regardless of railways and water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distance to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage of each Member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Section 2. The Governor is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July 1921, at which election these amendments shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the Constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State, and the ballots for said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters the following words:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Section 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers."

"Against the amendment to Section 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas."

"Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of Members of the Legislature of the State of Texas."

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for compensation of executive officers."

Those voters who oppose such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "for the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

Those voters who favor such amendments shall erase by marking a line through the words "against the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers."

line through the words "for the amendment to Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for compensation of executive officers." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election; and

Those voters who favor such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "for the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." Those who oppose such amendment relating to mileage and per diem of members of the Legislature shall erase by marking through the words "for the amendment to Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of the State of Texas." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast at such election.

Section 3. If a majority of the votes cast in the election herein provided for should be in favor of the amendment herein proposed, the maximum sum named herein shall become effective and be the compensation of the officers named therein on and after the first day of January, 1923, and so remain until otherwise provided by law, and the compensation so allowed shall be paid out of any money in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of these amendments and the election to be held hereunder.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be entitled to be placed upon the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$7) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 51: The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1910, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the States served in organization for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders or Mexican marauders and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the States and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the word "widow" in the preceding lines of this Section shall not apply to women born since the year of 1861, and all soldiers and sailors and widows of soldiers and sailors eligible under the above conditions shall be entitled to be placed upon the pension rolls and participate in the distribution of the pension fund of this State under any existing law or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven

(\$0.07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment of Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors, and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers and their widows."

Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publications and elections thereunder.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment of Section 2, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by providing that only native born naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt thereof, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one year preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that electors living in any unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding said election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt thereof. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt thereof. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt thereof, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting." And all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt thereof, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

NO. 38

Relating to the amendment of Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; also the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the management of the Prison under such laws as may be enacted by the Legislature. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 58, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended after read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide for the management of the Prison System; and to this end shall have authority to place the same under the supervision and control of such officers as the Legislature may from time to time provide for.

Section 2. The above amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at a general election on the fourth Saturday in May, A. D. 1921, at which election all voters shall propose amendment words: "For the amendment of Article 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those favoring said amendment shall have printed on their ballots "Against the Amendment of Article 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication.
