Platform of the Republican party of Texas.

Resolved, 1st: That the Republican party of Texas heartily accepts the conditions of reconstruction embraced in the several reconstruction acts of Congress, and will in the future, as heretofore, fully sustain the same in word and spirit.

2. That the amendments to the Constitution of the United States, known as the 14th and 15th amendments, are necessary to the perfection of the country and the security of the equal civil and political rights of all classes of the people. The Republican party therefore pledges itself to the prompt adoption of these amendments.

3. That the resolutions adopted by the Chicago Convention of May 20th 1868, where not modified by the proposed 15th amendment, are accepted by the Republicans of Texas as the embodiment of correct principles of public policy. That the Republican party of Texas especially, commends the spirit of the additional resolution adopted in that Convention at the instance of Hon. Carl Schurz; and we will cheerfully accept the assistance of such of our fellow-citizens as are in the late rebellion, but who now frankly and honestly co-operate with us in restoring the peace of the country, and reconstructing our State Government on the basis of impartial justice and equal rights.

4. That the payment of the debt incurred in preservation of the unity of the nation to the last dollar, is in our opinion the sacred duty of the American people, and the Republicans of Texas will condemn all attempts to evade in any manner the payment of this debt according to the intent of the creditors of the same.

5. That the Republican party of Texas earnestly desires the encouragement of internal improvement and immigration, and will as a party, press the adoption of measures having these ends in view. That in Convention herewith, we condemn the demagogical use of the term of "cart-bagger," and other terms of reproach applied to strangers who may come among us, as designed to keep alive the prejudices of the ignorant and deter immigration.

6. That while the Constitution submitted to the people is in some respects imperfect and objectionable, it is believed on the whole to propose the main objects of Constitutional Government viz: The equal, civil and political rights of all persons under the law. This Convention therefore recommends the ratification of the same.

7. That the preservation of the unity and the organization of the Republican party is essential to the safe progress of reconstruction in this State, and they believe that to effect this reconstruction, a great work has yet to be performed. They therefore warn the loyal people of Texas that opposition to the organization of the Republican party, in the result of an insidious design of the enemy purposing the practical surrender of the State to the rebels.

8. That the Republicans of Texas heartily express their confidence in the administrative abilities and integrity of the honor-able head of our Government—President Grant, and in the patriotism and wisdom of the majority in Congress.

P. W. Hall, of Business, offered the following independent resolution which was adopted:

Resolved: That the commanding General of this military district, Maj. Gen. J. J. Reynolds, deserves the approval of the loyal people of the United States, for his activity in foresting out and bringing to justice the murderers of the patriot Gen. W. Smith, and for the measures he has adopted for the security of life and property, and the establishment of peace.

Johnson Reed of Galveston, offered the following, and moved that it be added to the resolutions, and be known as resolution No. 9:

Resolved: That to this end we earnestly invite the co-operation and support of all good citizens, advocates of peace, law and order, and who believe in the principles of the party of union, progress, liberty and reform, which has done so much for the pacification and well being of this country. This resolution adopted.

TELEGRAPHIC

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXPRESS.

WASHINGTON, August 19.

Revenue to-day \$455,000. Customs from 7th to 14th a trifle over four millions.

The treasury department has advised of extensive black mailing operations by a bogus deputy marshal and revenue detective.

New York, Aug. 19.

Stock exchange has applied ineffectually to Delano to re-open the decision classing them as bankers. It is estimated this new tax will aggregate \$100,000 per week.

Eleven millions ten-forties have been substituted for other national bank securities since the promulgation of the order permitting the substitution.

It is rumored that 250 men departed recently, southward, en route for Cuba.

HAVANA, Aug. 19.

Three hundred rebels from Cienfuegos attacked Laguna Grande, which were dispersed leaving 10 killed.

A detachment guarding a train along the southern coast were attacked and repulsed with some loss, but being reinforced attacked the insurgents and succeeded in reaching Ciego Villas with the convoy.

Blackfoot Indians are running off all the stock, killing Malcomb Cook and badly wounding his son, 20 miles from here; they threaten a raid on Gallatin Valley.

PARIS, Aug. 19.

Mozens, in the Switzerland Senatorial Committee and Ministerial Council reached an understanding on all points of the Senate Consultation.

MADRID, Aug. 19.

Bishop of Join deves jurisdiction, appeal to the Holy See.

Cortes summoned on the 15th of Sept. on urgent affairs.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.

Steamer Port au Prince brings Haytian slaves to the 9th, and reports Salvaive closely investing Aux Sacs, and its surrender is daily expected. Jacmel returned without a fight. Salvaive threatened for the iron-clad Atlanta. The Quaker City and Florida, both flying Haytian rebel flag, prevented Port au Prince from landing at Ganeves, whether the steamer was bound; they also prevented her from bringing off the American coast.

PARAGRAPHS.

Rev. Mr. Alston (colored), rector of St. Thomas, preached and administered the communion to a white congregation in Charleston, a few Sabbaths since.

Napoleon, Emperor of the French, has his hands full with the press. The Paris correspondent of the London Standard furnishes a list of thirty-two papers which the Government has taken proceedings against.

As astonishing as it may seem, Brigham Young's flock of polygamists is receiving considerable accessions, mostly from Europe. A late Omaha paper mentions the arrival at that place recently of six hundred Mormon emigrants, en route to Salt Lake city. They came from England, having been induced to embrace the Mormon faith and emigrate by Brigham's agents in that country.

"Everything has its use," said a philosophical professor to his class. "Of what use is a drunkard's fiery red nose?" asked one of his pupils. "It's a lighthouse," answered the professor, "to warn us of the little water that passes underneath it, and reminds us of the shoals of appetite on which we might otherwise be wrecked."

Mr. Motley, in his speech at the unveiling of the statue of Mr. Peabody, said that he was at Rome while the statue was growing "beneath the plastic fingers of the artist;" that he saw Mr. Peabody and his statue side by side, and that he debated within himself, without coming to a satisfactory conclusion, "whether the statue was more like Mr. Peabody or Mr. Peabody more like the statue."

The Allen county Democrats says: "A young man in Lima who contemplates matrimony shortly, answered an advertisement offering an article of great use to young married people—price \$1 or six for \$5. He invested to the extent of half a dozen, and yesterday received six—diapers."

The Kladderatsch of Berlin caricatures the temporary absence of Bismarck by representing the King and his ministers in a coach without a driver. The horses and harness are all in confusion, and a stone (the deficit of 1870) blocks the way. Bismarck is seen grinning at them from over a wall (Varzin) in the distance. "Till so far the carriage went along smoothly, but how will it go now the driver has left the box?"

An exhibition of postage stamps is now being held in Paris. England makes the best show, as she has thirty-four colonies, each with a different design. The United States comes next, the artistic designs on her stamps having a beautiful appearance. The Turkish stamps contain the year of the fight of Mahomet, the year of the reign of the Sultan, and the value of the stamp in Oriental characters. Finland commenced to issue stamps last year.

The medicinal properties of ice are being more and more appreciated. Small lumps, swallowed whole, will often check acute stomach inflammations and will prevent nausea if heat is applied outside at the same time. Pounded ice, applied to the spine, is said to sensitize. A bit of ice will help diphtheria and all throat complaints. To become delightfully cool in the summer apply ice wrapped in paper to the back of the head for one moment.

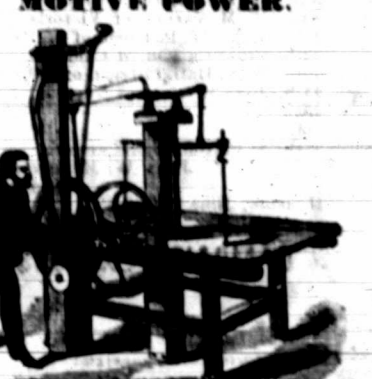

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"Our Colored People."

Such is the heading of the leader in the Herald of the 19th inst. The editor forgets, that he is no longer the owner of a slave; and that they are no longer "our colored people." In this article the Herald, to its mean, low instincts, attacks the colored people, and declares the men to be lazy and the women prostitutes. Speaking of the men it says: "nine tenths of them have made nothing; and many have died, some are dying slowly, others have gone to the penitentiary and more are likely soon to follow."

A more honest, hardworking, worthy set of men than our colored citizens, considering their recent slavery and advantages, cannot be found anywhere. They furnish much of the muscular power that moves the business of our city; they drive the stone wagons, the carts, and are to be found delving from early morn until sundown all over our city in all branches of hard work, as carpenters, blacksmiths, and day workmen; it is rare to see an idle freedman. The records of the courts show them to be a law abiding class and the article of the Herald is libellous and lacks the faintest spark of manly generosity or fairness. The article throughout is to wind up with a proposition to establish a "Savings Bank for the Freedmen," after all the carpet-baggers, preachers, school teachers, loyal leagues &c. have been driven out. The Herald concern would be just the one to start the enterprise—they kept a sort of confederate stealings bank during the rebellion; they would manage to steal the last dime the Freedman had.

The colored people can get along without either the help or sympathy of the Herald and they despise its miserable position.

Dividing the Spoils.

We learn that Jack Hamilton has promised the positions of the Supreme Bench to E. B. Turner, Jas. H. Bell, and A. P. McCormick. Thus, we are to have, should Jack be elected, the Supreme Court of the State incorporated into the Austin and Central Railroad rings. Hamilton has no doubt parceled out all the immense patronage he would have, if elected, among his partisans, and has, in this way, made political strength, which an honest course would not have secured. But the loyal people of Texas are too fully awakened to allow so great a calamity as his election to overtake the State.

THE SINCERE.—We have alluded to Wheelock's drawing a salary from the school fund, of \$2500, as Superintendent of public instruction, and have appealed to the highest authority in the State, Gen. Reynolds, to put an end to the outrage. We believe Gen. Reynolds has the power to remove every civil officer in the State, from Governor down. Peace is directly responsible for Wheelock's appointment, and as Peace is also a sincereist it may be argued that to disturb Wheelock would necessitate the clearing out of the whole batch including the Supreme bench, Attorney General &c. The only officers of any earthly use under our military rule are the Comptroller, Treasurer, and Land officer. The State has simply had to pay out a large sum for a very fancy article in the shape of provisional State officers, whose functions were always in abeyance to the military government. But Wheelock's case is different, he draws a salary from a fund sacred to the cause of education, and while the matter may now not be thought worth remedying, the fact should be an additional reason for the public condemnation of Peace, the old Public Functionary.

Well, we are used to bayonets down here in Texas since the war closed.—S. A. Herald, 20th inst.

What was the Confederate government but a government of bayonets? There never did exist a military tyranny equal to that of Jeff Davis. Let the Union men of Western Texas answer while the memory of Dix is fresh in their hearts, if we were not used to bayonets before the close of the war.

Gen. Reynolds' Attitude.

Gen. Reynolds, as the representative of Gen. Grant and Congress, must reflect the true spirit of the administration, in the performance of his duties and the enforcement of the laws and policy entrusted to his care; and if he leans to the side of the Republican party, he performs the part more of a faithful officer than a partizan. The Republican party has the whole burden of reconstruction on its shoulders, its success is the success of the party, its defeat the defeat of the party, and when Gen. Reynolds expresses himself openly to the effect that Hamilton and his party have placed themselves in the wrong by not uniting in a call for a Republican convention, he but reflects the true position of political reconstruction.

Upon Gen. Reynolds' shoulders is cast the mantle of the Reconstruction party; he is the representative of a Congress and President and Cabinet which represents the great majority of the American people, and he speaks the sentiment of the nation, not of Gen. Reynolds, when he declares in favor of the regular Republican organization.

Indians on El Paso Road. They put the Mail Company on Foot.

From a letter dated Muerto station, August 13th, directed to F. M. Hackworth at Fort Concho, we have further news of Indian depredations on the El Paso road. We extract the words of the writer as follows: Met Spears at Davis, he started back towards El Paso with me, arrived here about an hour ago found every mule gone, Indians took them to-day about 1 o'clock; got fifteen head and the herd horse, among the 15 are included his wagon and team. The mails will cease running further than here unless mules are sent.

The Indians also got 27 head of Government horses near the junction of Fort Clark and Fort Concho roads. They were on the way to Stockton for use of the troops.

JUDGE GAMBLE FOR THE SENATE.—The announcement of Judge Gamble as a candidate for the State Senate, subject to the nomination of a Republican convention, will meet the warm approval of all truly loyal men. The necessity of Conventions, County, District and Congressional, is growing daily, in order to settle the claims of worthy Republicans, and Judge Gamble strikes the key note to this move in the right direction, as has also the Hon. E. Degener. This district, as well as every district in West Texas, has abundant good material to make up good tickets. Republican conventions are all that is needed to put them in the field.

AMONG THE PROMISES.—Among the promises made by Jack to secure political aid, was the position of Superintendent of public instruction to Julius Schutze. Wheelock is now working for it, but the "ring" have very little use for Wheelock unless it be to use him for dirty work.—Wheelock finds it very pleasant to draw \$2500 a year and do nothing.

THE RESULT OF THE ALABAMA ELECTION.—Four Republican and two Democratic Congressmen were elected at the recent election in Alabama.

A WORLD'S CONGRESS.—The Central Committee of the International League recently met at Geneva under the Presidency of M. Jules Barni. It was decided to hold the next Congress at Lausanne on the 14th prox. The following are the questions which will form the principal subjects for discussion: 1. To determine the basis of a Federal organization in Europe. 2. The solution which the Eastern question (including that of Poland) should receive. 3. The means of removing all social or economical antagonism between citizens in each country. 4. Revision of the organization of the league and the re-establishment of its journal, the United States of Europe. A local committee was formed, under the direction of Mr. Eytel, to make preparations at Lausanne for the approaching Congress. The circular convoking the Congress is signed, in the name of the Central Committee, by Jules Barni, for France; Armand Goag, Germany; Jolissant, Switzerland; Cesar Steffani, Italy, and Bossok Hauke, for Poland. It is announced that Senor Castellar of the Spanish Cortes will share in the deliberations of this Congress.

The amount of money sent through the mails by postal money orders is increasing about one hundred percent annually. This year the aggregate foots up fifty million dollars, against sixteen million last year, and it is estimated the amount will again double next year.
