Wave Of Robberies Hits State; Five Youths Held Thirty-One Men Believed Killed In Explosion In Mine

Twenty Bodies Are Brought To Open; Ten Men Missing

Blast Wrecks Workings Of Kinloch Mine At Parnassus, Pennsylvania; 223 Escape Death

Toll May Increase

Rescue Workers Unable To Determine Exact Known Dead; Ten Men May Be Alive In Shafts

(By Associated Press)

PARNASSUS, Pa., Mar. 21.—Twenty bodies tonight had been removed from the Kinloch mine, where an explosion occurred today. O. F. Taylor, mine superintendent, said a final check had shown 21 dead or unaccounted for. William Taylor, 17, a Tipton employee, was so badly hurt that he died.

Hope that some of the men unaccounted for might be alive if still in the mine was expressed by Ira Thomas, deputy secretary of the state department of mines.

Two hundred and fifty men were in the mine when the blast rocked the countryside, but 223 escaped through an old entry five miles from the main shaft.

Hard To Identify
The rescuers who located the bodies, said they were burned so badly it would be difficult to identify them.

They reported that at the foot of the main shaft and back several hundred yards, the mine was wrecked, indicating that the origin of the explosion would be found deeper in the workings. They encountered no cave-ins and said that the work of bracing, also as to carry in fresh air was progressing rapidly.

T. D. Hobart, Pampa, Named As President Of Association Thursday; Convention Is Closed

HOUSTON, Mar. 21.—Houston tonight was losing the frontier atmosphere which had enveloped it for three days during the 33rd annual convention of the Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association.

All this week the cowmen discussed their problems, elected officers, planned policies for the ensuing year and enjoyed their reunion.

Tonight they were on their way home after having decided to renew their associations at San Angelo next year, and having named a new leader.

Pampa Man President
T. D. Hobart of Pampa, former first vice president, will direct the organization. J. M. West of Houston will be next in line for the presidency as he was elected first vice president. R. M. Kleberg of Corpus Christi nominated Hobart as his successor to the presidency. Both Hobart and West were elected unanimously.

San Angelo's victory exceeded all expectation. The final vote was by acclamation after it had become apparent that the city was certain of victory.

Fort Worth and Dallas had been nominated and a few persons had voted for Fort Worth before those two cities were withdrawn.

Rockefeller Buys Whole N.Y. Town

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., March 21.—(P)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr. today bought the entire village of East View, on the outskirts of Tarrytown. He paid \$700,000, said to be three to four times the assessed valuation, for dwellings housing 46 families. General stores, post office and dance hall.

Most of the property will be used for the new main line division of the Putnam division railroad and the rest becomes part of the vast Rockefeller holdings. It is expected that by May every building will be torn down.

Mexican Is Given Death In Murray Slaying In Mason

Ofilio Herrera Ordered To Pay Extreme Penalty For Killing Mason Sheriff; To Appeal Case

(By Associated Press)

MASON, Mar. 21.—Found guilty of the murder of Sheriff A. T. Murray of Mason county, Ofilio Herrera, Mexican, was sentenced to death by a jury here tonight. An appeal will be taken.

Murray's body was found in a lonely lane near here February 20 after he had started out on the highway hoping to intercept persons who had stolen a handcar in a nearby town. He had been shot three times.

Convicted on Testimony
Herrera was convicted largely on testimony of Antonio Chavez, jointly charged with the crime, who said that he and Herrera shot the officer while the two men struggled for possession of a weapon. Chavez also will be tried for the murder.

The shooting occurred, Chavez related, after Murray had arrested two Mexicans for possession of liquor.

Davis Checks Are Recovered In City

Police reported late last night that they had recovered the checks which were stolen from the Davis Brothers Frigidaire company, on Wednesday night, and that they knew who it was that broke into the store and took the checks, aggregating about \$300 and \$10 in cash.

City Patrolman George Eubank arrested Paul Frost, Lubbock youth, when he was in the act of breaking into a store in the 700 block on Broadway Wednesday night, and found a quantity of stolen articles in his possession, among them being certain articles that had been taken from a local officer's automobile, while it was parked on a downtown street.

Frost was tried on a delinquency charge in county court last week, and ordered sent to the State Training School for Boys, at Gatesville, but had been given a few days freedom before sending him to that institution. At the time of his trial he was out on parole from the school. He will be taken to Gatesville today.

Churman pleaded his own case and was acquitted.

ACQUIRE GAS LEASES

United Gas Buys Up 16,876 Acres Near Pettus

NEW YORK, Mar. 21.—(P)—The United Gas company, Houston, has acquired 16,876 acres of oil and gas leases near Pettus, Tex., about 10 miles from the new 110 mile pipe line it is building from the Reagan county gas field to San Antonio and Austin. Gas will be distributed over the new line about July 15.

Mississippi Goes Over Levees Near Quincy, Illinois

Furious Waters Break Over At Indian Graves Levees North Of City; Damage To Farm Lands Great

More May Break

Five Hundred Families Are Made Homeless; 26,000 Are Homeless In Flooded Areas In Southland

(By Associated Press)

QUINCY, Ill., Mar. 21.—The furious Mississippi broke through the battered Indian Graves levee north of Quincy today and loosed a flood over thousands of acres of rich farm land.

The break had been expected and most farmers were prepared for it. Nearly all had moved their livestock grain and household goods back to the bluffs and safety. Relief workers, however, were on hand aiding any who failed to evacuate, and assisting levee patrols in re-enforcing other retaining walls weakening before the strain of pounding water.

Loss To Be Vast
Most of the flooded farms were planted and loss is expected to amount to thousands. The break was below the Rock Creek levee but little hope was held that this levee would last long now with churning water all around it.

While the flood was striking north of the city, districts south and west were benefiting. When the levee gave way, it released so much water that the river stage at Quincy fell four inches and relieved a tense situation.

Residents Move Out
Residents had moved out of the south Quincy gardens, a new home site community, but the flood breaking north of city saved the south from similar peril.

The Lima Lake and Hunt districts, north of the Indian Graves levee, are in danger of inundation, the levees now holding about all they can. Improvements—new levees and diversion channels—in this area now are nearing completion at a cost of more than a million dollars. Conditions to the west of Quincy, See FLOODS Page 3

Rebel Counter Offensive Expected On West Coast

Federals Looking For Attack; Troops Are Rushed To Aid

(By Associated Press)

THE long-heralded rebel counter offensive seemed about to sweep down on the federalists Thursday with arrival of troops under General Turbe before the defenses of Mazatlan, key city in the west coast campaign.

For the first time, the federals were awaiting attack from a strong body of rebels.

Send 6,000 Men
Reinforcements for Mazatlan from the main Calles army at Torreon were promised by Mexico City authorities, who announced that 6,000 men under General Cardenas would be sent to crush the rebel movement in Sinaloa, meanwhile, the government thought that General Carrillo could hold Mazatlan against the 3,000 rebels besieging it.

Stray shots were fired Thursday morning after the rebels had summoned the city to surrender, but telegrams from General Carrillo then reported that the rebel main attack had not materialized.

Rebels claimed to have captured a town 100 miles south of Mazatlan.

Have Long Journey
By road federal reinforcements face 100 miles of forced marches over the mountains to reach Mazatlan, difficult of access from Torreon, in combination with a railroad journey through the state of Durango. By rail and without marching, they have a journey of nearly 1,000 miles.

General Escobar, rebel commander in chief, arrived yesterday at the border city of Juarez. At the same time federal forces defending the border town of Naco, Sonora, were on the alert for a rebel breakthrough.

General Escobar conferred with his chiefs in the north and planned to return immediately to his headquarters at Jimenez.

General Calles last was reported at Torreon, where he had been since the crash of the rebel forces. He, though rebels declared he had gone into central Mexico to face a revolt which had seized several cities there and was threatening his communications with Mexico City.

Passenger Train Crashes Freight

SEALY, March 21.—(P)—Santa Fe passenger train No. 30, running late today, crashed into a freight train which had stopped across its right of way before the depot here today, hurled four box cars from the track and injured five workmen standing on the station platform.

The crash was blamed by railway officials on a heavy fog which obscured vision at the crossing. None of the passengers was injured, although all were shaken up and members of the crew narrowly escaped injury.

The injured laborers, three Mexicans and two negroes, were treated at a hospital here.

Box cars hurled against the depot tower away the platform and damaged the roof. The line was blocked for several hours.

Three Members Of Oklahoma Supreme Court Are Charged

Thirty-Two Counts Cited Against Chief Justice And Two Justices By Investigating Group

Result Of Probing

More Than 6,000 Pages Are Taken In Evidence Presented In Hearings; To Be Reported Today

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 21.—Thirty-two charges against three members of the state supreme court—Chief Justice Charles W. Mason and Justices Fletcher Riley and J. W. Clark—were adopted by the house of representatives general investigating committee in executive session today and probably will be reported out to the house for consideration tomorrow.

Homestead, Oklahoma county, republican is chairman, took testimony in connection with the supreme court for almost two months. More than 6,000 type written pages of evidence were said to have been taken during the course of the questioning, most of which was done by O. O. Owens, Tulsa county republican and a member of the committee.

Public hearings ceased about two weeks ago, and a partial report of the most important evidence was placed before the parent committee.

Only yesterday, the senate impeached Governor Henry S. Johnston.

Chief Justice Mason and Justices Riley and Clark were members of the court which, in 1927, held the state legislature had no authority to convene in special session to investigate Johnston, then governor, and state departments.

LANSING, Mich., March 21.—(P)—Michigan's "life for a pint" law, under which bootleggers were subject to life imprisonment for a fourth offense, was repealed today by the legislature.

The amendment will exempt approximately 120 minor felonies, including such "crimes" as wearing a lodge pin without authority from the class of potential life sentence offenses.

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 21.—(P)—This is the modern West. Today police searched for a bandit believed to have an arrowhead and several inches of the shaft sticking in his back.

Last night while Al Jacobson was putting his car in the garage a bandit stepped out, relieved him of \$9 and ordered him to get in the garage and stay there. Jacobson had been practicing archery and his bow and arrows were in the garage. He strung a steel headed arrow to the bow and sent it flying after the vanishing bandit. Without waiting to see whether he had scored a hit, he ran for the police.

They returned to the alley and found the featherhead end of the arrow and another piece of the shaft. The head and about six inches of the shaft were missing. Police believe the bandit will have to summon a physician and in that way they will find him.

War Clouds Hover Closer Over China; Outbreak Expected

War Appears Inevitable As Slumbering Revolt Against Nationalist Government Rises

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Mar. 21.—War clouds in China, never long absent from the turn of the century, appeared today in reports from Nanking, Peking and Hankow. The nationalist government with a slumbering military revolt already on in Shanghai, was at loggerheads with the faction controlling the rich and powerful Wuhan cities of Hankow, Wuchang and HanYang.

Both sides believed war was inevitable and from Peking came word that nationalist troops from the province of Anhwei had reached Lothen, 150 miles northeast of Hankow, indicating that the outbreak was imminent.

President Chiang Kai-Shek, reviewing the situation, declared the government would not hesitate to use "revolutionary methods" against the rich and powerful Wuhan cities of Hankow, Wuchang and HanYang.

The situation had been tense for weeks. On March 13 the council of the nationalist government dismissed three generals who had expelled the government of the province of Hupeh. At the same time the grand councils of the Puhun and other regional governments were abolished. Early this month both sides began mobilizing. President Chiang Kai-Shek massed 150,000 men in the province of Kwangsi, presumably to meet a threatened advance of 100,000 Kwangsi troops.

Juries In Dallas Convict Negroes

DALLAS, Mar. 21.—(P)—Two juries reporting within five hours of each other tonight sentenced Ardel Landers to death and M. L. Lacy to 25 years for the murder of Joe Piccola, grocer, slain in an attempted holdup of his neighborhood store here Feb. 9. Landers and Lacy are negroes.

Landers was convicted at 5:40 P. M. and the penalty fixed at death after one of the shortest trials in the county's history. Selection of juryman had begun at 8 A. M.

Thirty hours were required to reach a decision in the trial of Lacy. The jury reported at 11 P. M. tonight. Landers was tried and convicted while the jury was deliberating the fate of his youthful alleged accomplice.

W. L. Echols, Van Alstyne City Marshal, May Die Of Wounds Received In Fight With Bandits

Three Girls Held

Five Arrested At Brady Are All Under 25 Years Old; Loot Is Not Recovered; Youth Identified

DALLAS, Mar. 21.—Bank robbers "hit" at three Texas points today with success, and that perhaps transitory, in only one attempt. One casualty occurred. Four men who tried to rob two banks at Van Alstyne shot down W. L. Echols, city marshal, whose gun failed to work. He may die.

The first try occurred at Pottsboro where thugs were frightened from the bank by early rising residents who saw them at work.

City Marshal Loses
A short time later, Echols tried to shoot it out with the Van Alstyne band, and lost. Then, about \$5,000 was taken from the Farmers and Merchants State bank by a pistol-pointing young man whose companions, three girls, officials claim, occupied a waiting motor. This was the only holdup in the "daylight" classification.

Officers tonight held five persons under robbery with firearms charges, in this "job". They were Lucille Awalet, 24, Brady; Miss Billy Ballard, 20, Austin; R. C. Turner, 21, and Coy Nigh, 18, and Irene Curtis, all of Brady.

The money had not been recovered.

NATURAL COLOR-SOUND

Rules Given In Care Of Young Baby

Editor's Note:—This is the fourth of a series of articles on "Your Baby from Week to Week," which Olive Roberts Barton, authority on children has written for The Avalanche.

By OLIVE ROBERTS BARTON NEA Service Writer

I give here some generally accepted rules as to the treatment and handling of a young baby. Feeding, the all-important thing, should be carried out, if possible, under the advice of a competent physician, whether naturally or artificially fed. Often breast-fed babies need supplementary feeding. A baby should be fed at regular intervals even if it means waking him, that is, in the day time. Breast feeding for the first six months is of the utmost importance. Feeding should be at three-hour intervals at the start. After five months, the four-hour interval is better for all babies.

A daily warm bath is necessary for health, unless the physician orders otherwise.

Proper management of the baby's clothing must be learned so that he is never too hot nor too cold, according to the climate and the season. Sleep habits depend largely on comfort of temperature.

Outdoor airing, or admission of outdoor air into a room should be part of every baby's daily program. But again, care must be taken about drafts, wind, and extremes of temperature.

A baby should be trained to sleep at night and have his waking periods during the day. Never hold him, or play with him at night to excite him. Don't begin rocking him to sleep.

Let him cry when necessary, if he is exercising his lungs and you think there is no real cause for distress. Otherwise, look for the trouble.

Every child a month old should be held, carried around, and talked to for a part of each day. It is good for him.

Begin with a few minutes and gradually increase it to half an hour—or a little more. But don't over-excite him.

Here is an important thing. If he is starting to let him stare. Don't interrupt him. He is learning concentration and attention.

See that his clothing is very soft, very clean, loose, and comfortably worn. Consult your doctor about the question of woolens, weights of shirts and bands, and when to

change to lighter or heavier ones. His feet and legs should be covered and warm. Feel his hands. If they are cold—he is cold.

wholesale and market center, will best be served with the Santa Fe extension. The Texas and New Mexico road proposed extension, coming from Monahans, to the northward into the oil fields and to Lovington, does not bring the big markets as near to that section, it being a 40 or 50 mile farther haul on that route to Fort Worth, than by way of Seagraves and Lubbock, and to the central Texas city, figuring cattle shipments to the big packing plants there.

In addition to this, Lubbock has, of late years, become quite a factor in the packing industry, with many thousands of head of New Mexico cattle bought and shipped here by local packers and by buyers for larger companies. With the milling industry expanding here, too, cattlemen are beginning to use this as a feeding center.

Cattle Play Big Part
Perhaps the cattle business is the biggest factor to be considered in the hearing, unless the oil industry should soon develop into larger proportions than looked for. But business men take the attitude that the cattle and agricultural activities of New Mexico will mean more to its citizenship than the oil business, over a course of years. It is on the line of development of these two industries, rather than on merely that of oil, that a major part of Lubbock's fight in behalf of the Santa Fe will be made.

The Santa Fe's record of extending its lines into new agricultural areas, ahead of development, is looked upon as an aid, also. The Texas and New Mexico, some say, is after merely the tonnage to be derived principally from the oil fields, while with the Santa Fe, oil is to be secondary.

It was announced yesterday that the I. C. C. Examiner, to be here for the hearing, which will be held beginning April 1, is to be H. C. Davis. He will be remembered as the examiner who conducted the hearing, held here in May of last year when the Santa Fe asked permission to extend its line from Hale Center to Pamerton.

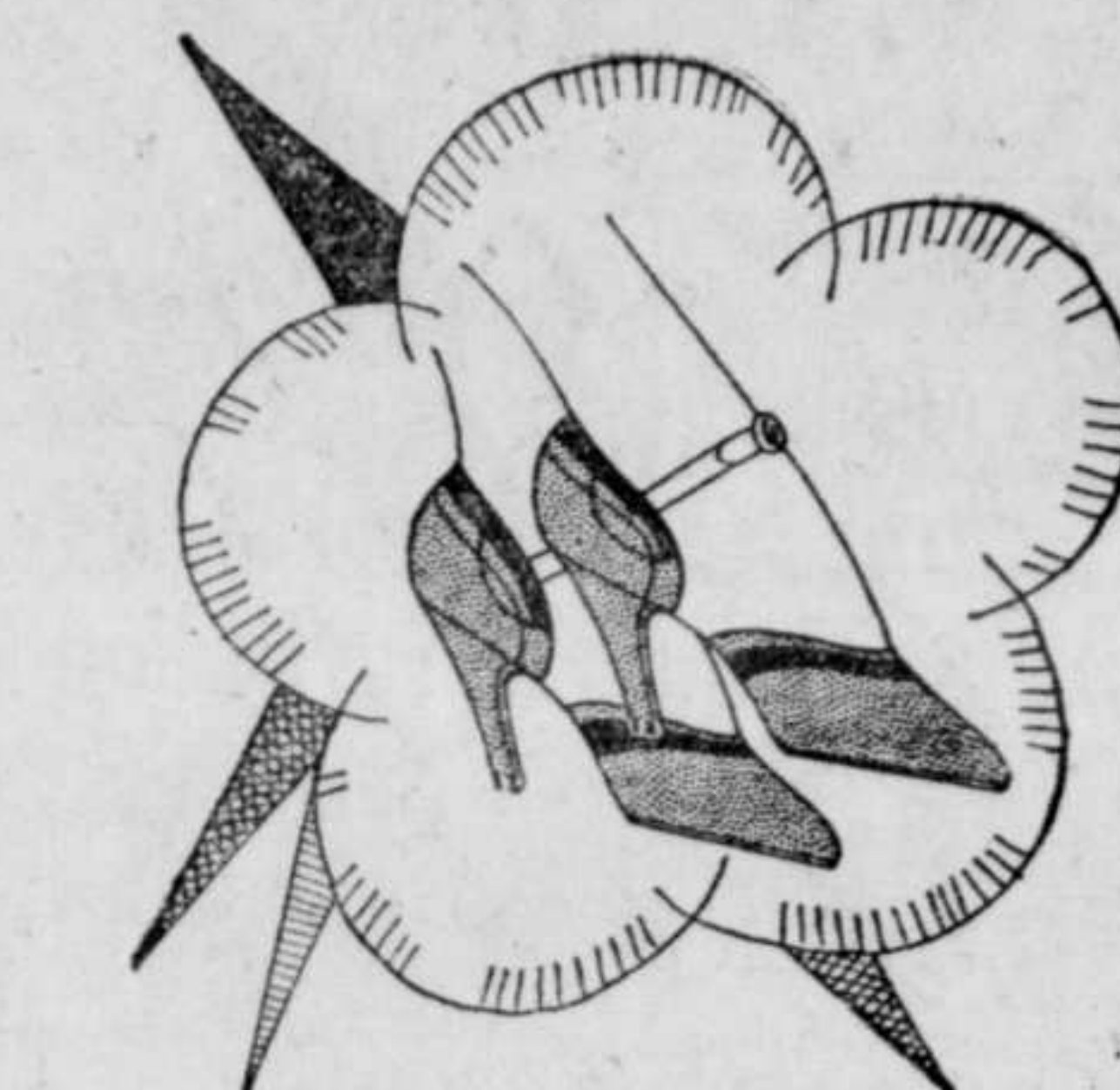

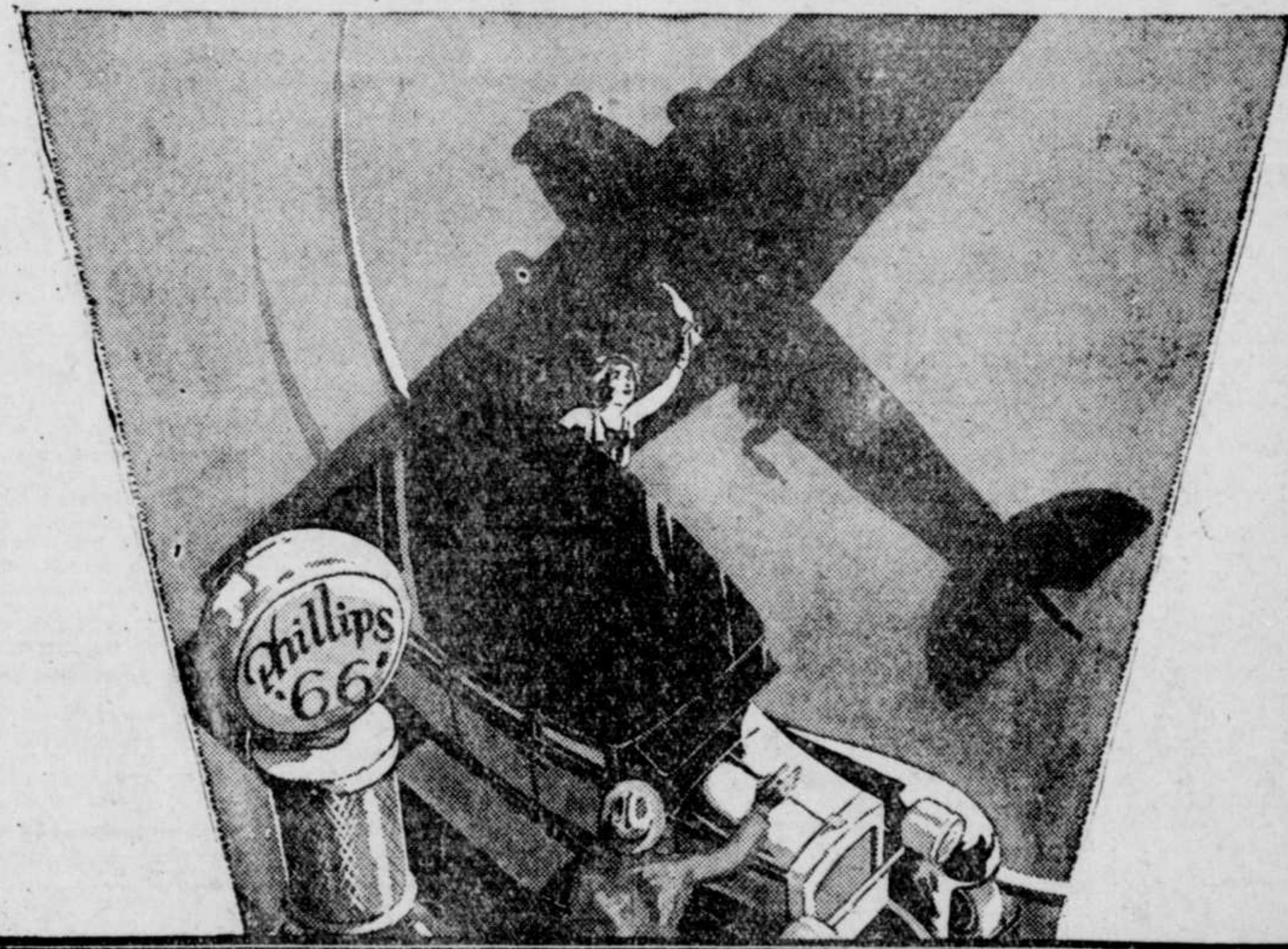

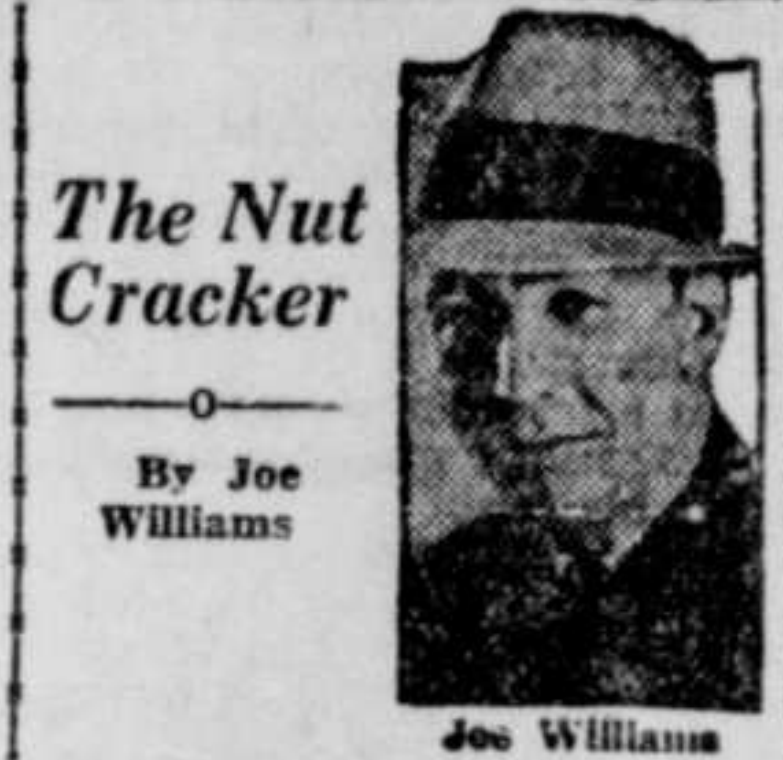

Stocks Flounder In Confusion As Bulls Make Fight

Increase Of Brokers Loans Carried To Highest Level In History; Call Money Holds At Nine Per Cent

By CLAUDE A. JAGGER Associated Press Financial Writer
NEW YORK, Mar. 21. (AP)—The stock market floundered around in extreme confusion today, as the bulls made strenuous efforts to retain control of the market, but were unable to overcome widespread nervousness over the outcome of the New York federal reserve directors meeting after the close.

The fact that no change was made in the discount rate of 3 per cent was in line with expectations, as the bank of England announced no change in its rate in the morning, but the reserve officials had a bitter pill for speculative Wall Street to swallow in an announcement of an increase of \$166,000,000 in brokers' loans, carrying the total to the highest level in history at \$5,793,000,000, as compared to the previous record of \$5,669,000,000 on February 6.

Bid Rates Jump
A development earlier in the day tending to intensify the uneasiness was a jump of 1-4 of one per cent in the bid and asked rates for bankers' acceptances, all maturities, carrying the bid rates to 5 1-2 to 5 3-8 per cent, well above the federal reserve discount rate of 3 per cent, and close to the commercial paper rates of 5 3-4 to 6 per cent. In view of the apparent disparity between the discount rate and credit rates generally, bankers are beginning to regard higher discount rates as inevitable.

Call money held at 9 per cent all day, having reached 10 yesterday, although New York banks were said to have withdrawn from 30,000,000 to 35,000,000. Funds from corporations and other nonbank sources, however, were attracted by the high rate, and the loan desk was said to have a surplus of \$20,000,000 for a time during the afternoon. Time money was still firm at 8 per cent even for months.

Income Taxes Affect
A factor in the huge increase in brokers' loans, which was among one of the largest weeks jumps recorded was said to have been the tendency of traders to withdraw funds from their brokers' accounts to meet income taxes. The New York banks were again heavy lenders in the stock market, increasing their loans \$87,000,000, while the account of others gained \$72,000,000, and that of the out-of-town banks, 7,000,000.

Oil Notes

TULSA, Mar. 21. (AP)—Many new wells are coming in in the St. Louis pool, with production in all of the lower horizons. Sinclair is completing four or five.

North of Wilcox sand production in the Carr City pool, located between the Mand and Mission areas of Greater Seneca, the Carr City company has 3,000 feet of oil in the hole at four feet in the Wilcox sand, and has shut down for eight days before completion.

MID-WESTERN LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, March 21. (AP)—Hog trade around the 11-market loop was fairly active at prices unevenly 15 to 40 cents higher. Packers were liberal buyers at the advance. The day's extreme top of \$12 was paid at Chicago. Total offerings were around 85,300 an increase of 12,700 over last Thursday but 23,500 short of the same day a year ago. Moderate activity prevailed on most killing classes of cattle at steady to slightly higher prices. Demand for the in-between grades of weighty steers continued slow. Light weight steers and yearlings command an appreciable premium over weighty steers with fed dogies in the beef almost as high as choice heavy steers. Replacement cattle held on a firm basis. Light dairy calves are arriving in fairly liberal numbers at northern markets and sharp declines were enforced at several points around the circuit on vealers. Aggregate receipts were estimated at 24,200 as compared with 22,126 a week ago and 23,509 the corresponding day last year.

ATHENS, (P).—Greek carpet makers, driven out of Asia Minor by the military disaster of several years ago, are marketing Turkish carpets made in Athens so successfully that they have asked the government for funds to develop the industry further.

Cattle Receipts Small In Texas

FORT WORTH, Mar. 21. (AP)—The receipts of cattle and calves at Fort Worth today were very small in volume. The cattle run brought in two cars of slaughter steers about eight cars of slaughter yearlings and the rest of the supplies consisted largely of mixed butcher classes. Cotton Has Sharp Reaction Thursday On Orleans Market

NEW ORLEANS, Mar. 21. (AP)—Although cotton prices developed an upward trend today, selling by Wall Street interests and by speculators forced several sharp reactions. July after advancing to 20.40, declined 15 points to 20.22 then recovered 15 points and closed at 20.37, or 7 points net up. The general market closed steady at net gains of 7 to 10 points.

As Liverpool cables were relatively steady and the weather map indicated a return of bad weather to the belt, the market opened higher. First trades showed no change to 5 points up and prices continued to advance after the start until May

sold at 20.30, July 20.35 and October 20.16, or 3 to 5 points net up.

After some trifling reactions on profit-taking the market strengthened again on the bad weather prospects and on private reports of rain in the central belt. On the subsequent bulge May traded to 20.35, July 20.40 and October 20.21, or 8 to 10 points above the previous close.

In the early afternoon the market sagged rather sharply under selling said to be for Wall Street interests coupled with offerings which were reported to be thrown on the market in an effort to force a reaction. Prices traded to new lows for the day with May at 20.17, July 20.22 and October 20.08, or 13 to 18 points down from the highs and 5 to 8 points under yesterday's close.

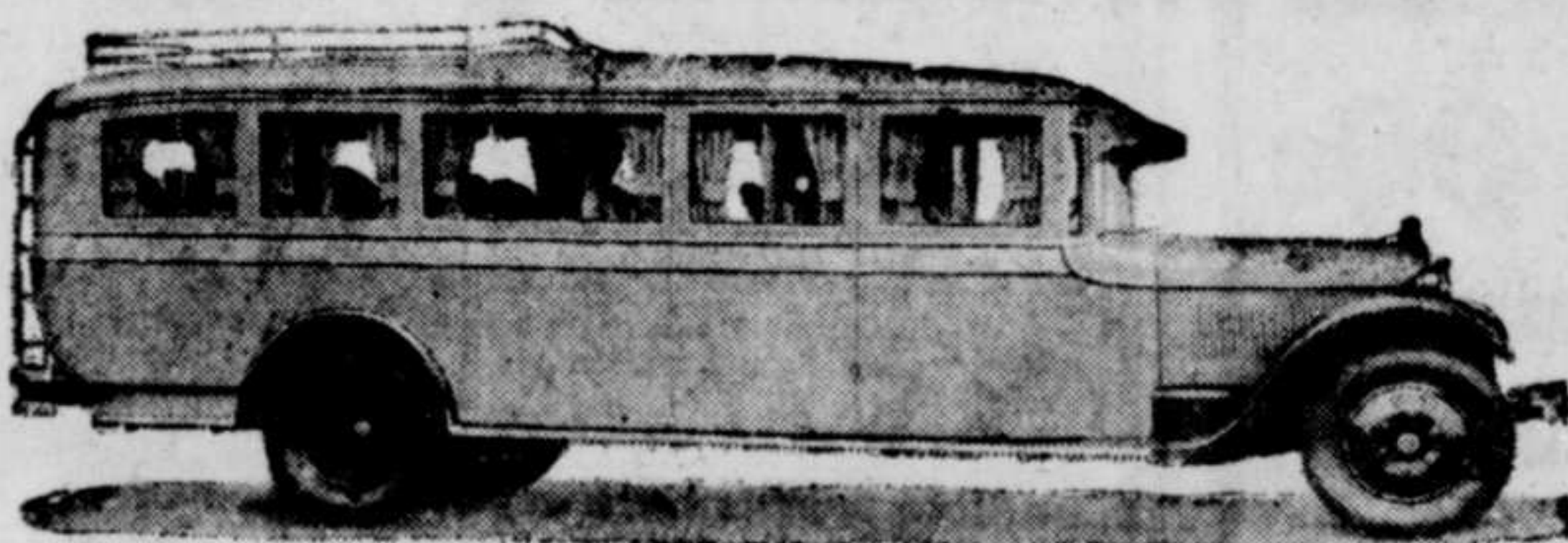

City's Need For Airport Stressed In Letters Here

As an indication of the growing importance of aviation, in respect to what it means to cities that have airports, two letters were received here yesterday, one telling of the early installation of an aviation service from Lubbock to Big Spring, San Angelo and San Antonio, and the other of the recent celebration at the Brownsville airport.

The first letter is addressed to George E. Benson, and is from Sullivan Evans, vice president of the Texas Air Transport, Inc., wherein Evans says: "As you have seen in the papers, we have inaugurated our Dallas to El Paso service and will begin the San Antonio service in a few days. The Lubbock-Big Spring-San Angelo-San Antonio route will probably be the next one, and we will have to have facilities, of course to land there. It may be that at first we will not land at Lubbock awaiting the completion of your airport."

In the second letter, the visit of Colonel Lindbergh to the city of Brownsville is mentioned. It reads in part:

"Our recent airport celebration was a great success. We had 146 visiting airplanes. A great many dignitaries, such as Colonel Lindbergh, were here, consequently the celebration attracted moving picture and camera men from all over the country."

The last letter was from G. C. Richardson, manager of the Brownsville chamber of commerce, and was addressed to the Lubbock chamber of commerce.
