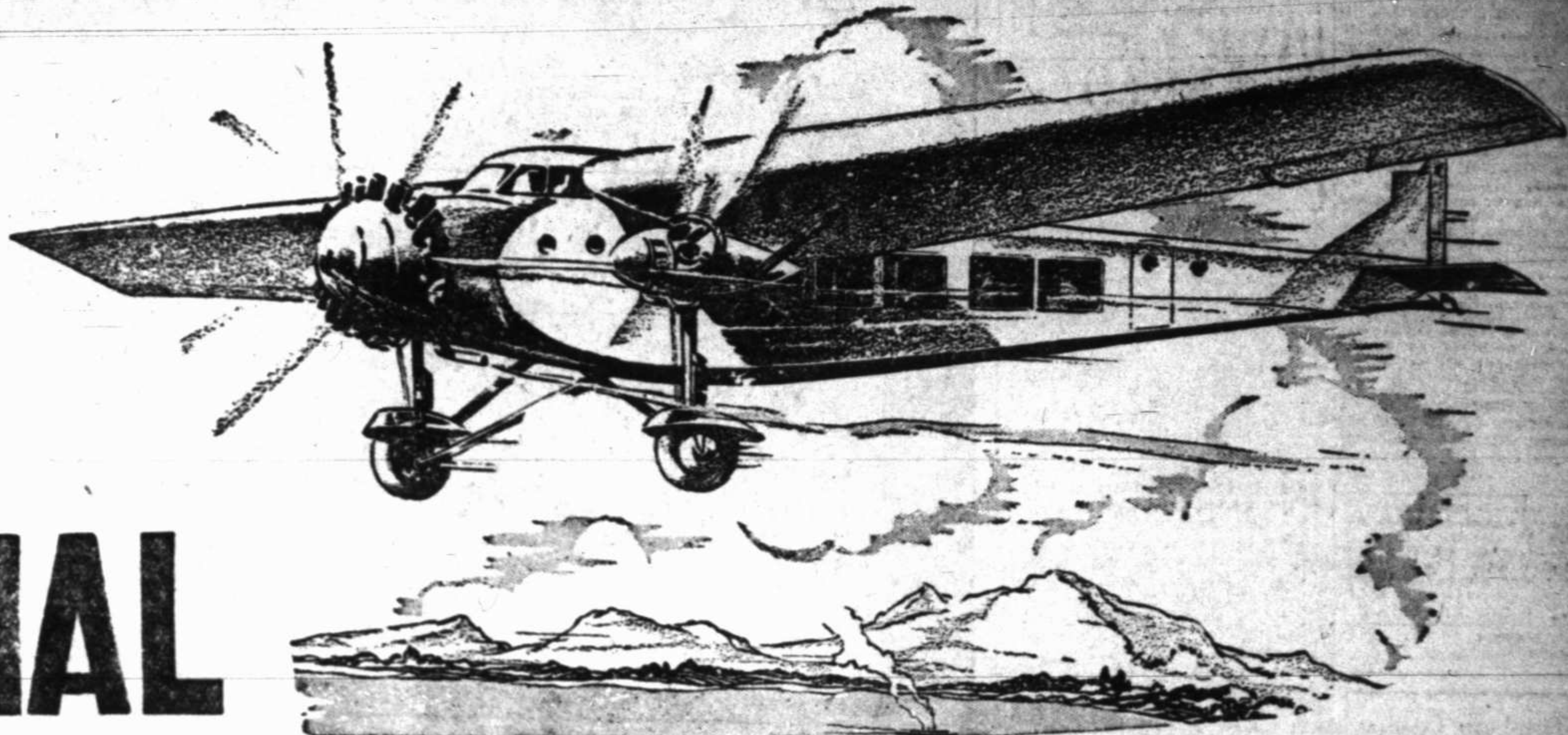

OWSLEY HEARD IN TALK FOR FERGUSONS

JALLAS MAN CHARGES
STERLING HERE LAST
NIGHT TO 1,200

Speaking before an assembly of about 1,200 persons last night, Col. Alvin Owsley, of Dallas, past national commander of the American Legion, charged that Ross Sterling had engaged in the wholesale liquor business and had violated the insurance laws of Texas.

Last night's rally was held on Avenue K between Main and Broadway, speakers addressing the crowd from an improvised platform while listeners were seated on constructed seats in the street. Only few demonstrations were evidenced and these for a brief period.

J. A. Humphries, secretary of the Lubbock county Ferguson organization, Marvin Warlick, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee, J. E. Vickers, Lubbock attorney and member of the executive committee of the local Ferguson club, Mrs. Emma Grigsby Meliang, Plainview, secretary of state during Mrs. Ferguson's administration, R. J. Murray, president of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the Lubbock Ferguson organization, also were speakers at the meeting.

Colonel Owsley first struck at Dan Moody, characterizing him as "that little lightning bug out of Williamson county," and stated that he could not lend the citizens of Texas to vote for the Houston man.

Choose Own Governor
"We'll choose our own governor and it'll not be an ignorant fool from Houston," was the reply Colonel Owsley put in the mouths of the populace.

Describing the general campaign as the most powerful of the rich in Texas aligned against the common people whose champions he said were the Fergusons, the Dallas man said that Sterling "the great big bull from the bayou," was the finest example of an old ignorant barefooted country boy doing a hole in the ground and that all mighty blessing him with oil in the hole.

Records Cited
Official records in the comptroller's office show Colonel Owsley declared that Sterling was director and principal stockholder in the Dayton, Texas, Mercantile company, a private corporation, when it sold taxes on liquor sales between July 1, 1918 and January 1, 1919, aggregating \$1,832. Sterling reportedly admitted that he was a stockholder in the Dayton Mercantile company 26 years ago and that he carried beer in storage on his large quarters," Colonel Owsley said.

The Dallas man said Mrs. Ferguson was a prohibitionist and her husband an anti but that the Ferguson family never had engaged

in the liquor business "and that 'Jim' did not drink liquor."

Reads Affidavit
Replying to statements by Sterling speakers that Ferguson did not aid in passage of the Small land bill over the veto of Governor Moody, Colonel Owsley read a purported affidavit by five committeemen sent to represent the Amarillo area in the fight to pass the bill.

"Passage of the bill was largely due to Mr. Ferguson's efforts in behalf of West Texas landowners," the Amarillo committee testified, according to Colonel Owsley.

Reiterating a statement which Mr. Vickers had made earlier in the night that Lubbock county had not received fair treatment from the state highway commission, of which Sterling is chairman, Mr. Murray declared that committees sent to Austin to represent the South Plains in highway matters had been "insulted and ridiculed."

This territory has not been given a fair division of taxes paid, designation of a new highway into Lubbock or any other South Plains city has not been granted in the last four years, while "all kinds of roads have been built through South Texas into Houston," Mr. Murray charged.

Unfairness Charged
The South Plains country has been "legally robbed of four million dollars in the last four years," Mr. Murray charged.

Mrs. Meliang said she knew Mr. Ferguson because of contact with her when she was governor and Mrs. Meliang secretary of state. The Plainview woman characterized the former woman governor as intelligent, quiet, dignified, well groomed, tastefully dressed, careful in speech.

"Mrs. Ferguson said, 'I have in restoration of citizenship to persons completing sentences and grants of executive clemency to persons serving indeterminate sentences. Persons sentenced during five different administrations received attention in those connections during Mrs. Ferguson's administration the woman speaker said."

Sterling's bond proposal "is the most unsound economic principle ever offered the people of Texas," Colonel Owsley declared.

Charging that Sterling and the vice president of the Trinity Portland Cement company had organized to carry compensation for three oil and pipeline companies, the Dallas campaigner declared that recent Texas legislation showed that the two companies had been broke about six months and were indebted to persons they had insured to extent of \$500,000. Workings of the companies were in violation of state insurance laws, Colonel Owsley charged.

The indictments charged the firm with receiving and selling more than 100,000 gallons of rubbing alcohol within the last year as an intoxicating liquor.

Max I. Katz, president of the company, and William A. Sinabert, his assistant, both of whom are missing, are alleged to have purchased the alcohol from a Brooklyn, N. Y. firm.

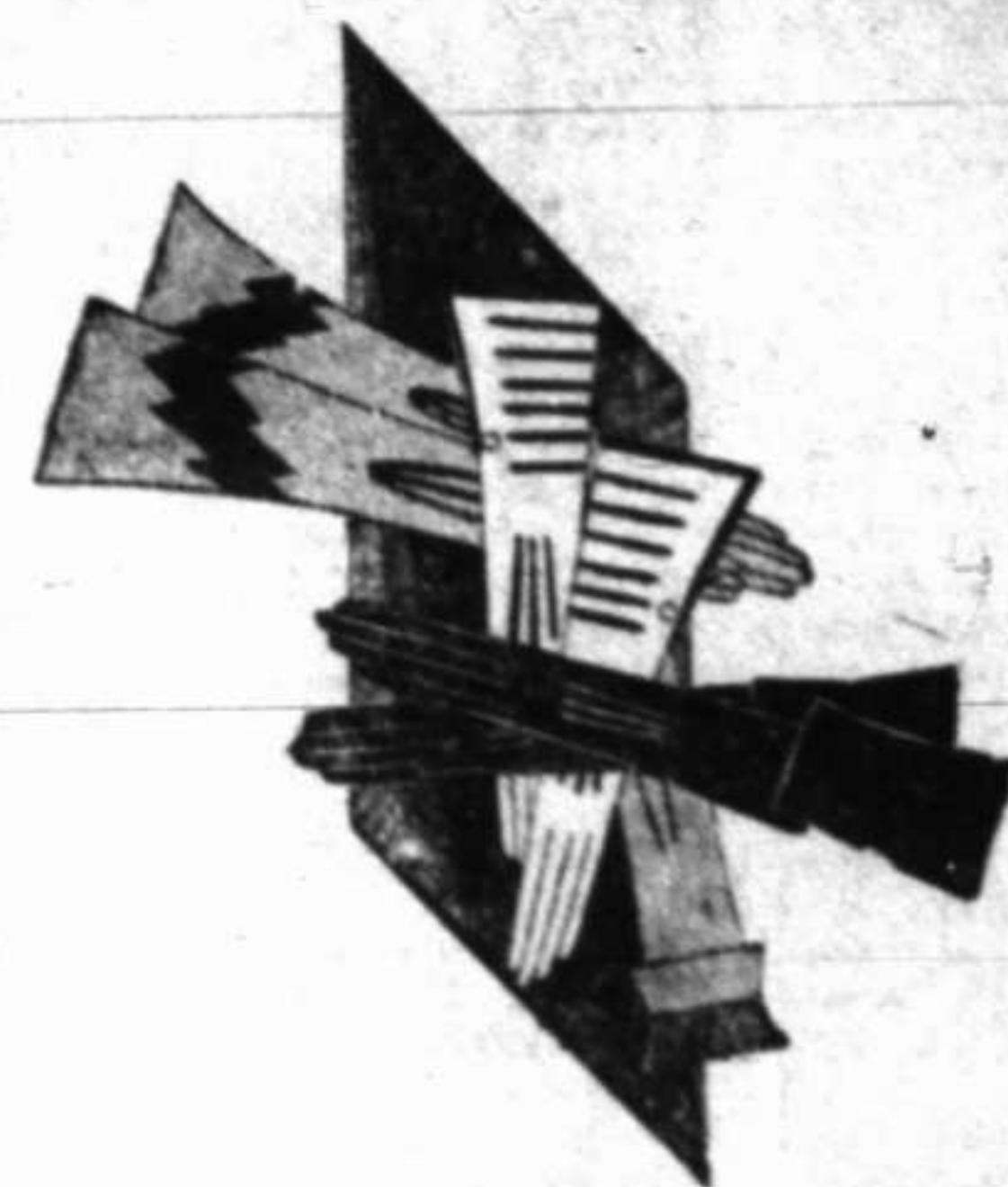

IN THE REALM OF SPORTS

Lubbock tennis players are invited to participate in the Amarillo Globe-News open tournament Friday, Saturday and Sunday. It is the fourth annual cup tournament sponsored by the Amarillo paper for tennis players in Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Colman Barnhill, University of Texas star, will defend the title against a strong field, including former holders of the title. A telegram from Jerry Mallin, sports editor of the Amarillo paper, to this department urges that an invitation be issued to all Lubbock netters, and states that places will be held open for them.

Vic Lamb, Lamesa scribe and Journal correspondent, reports that Bill Allen, captain of the 1929 Champion Golden Tornadoes, will report to Coach Blair Cherry of the Amarillo Spuds this fall. Allen was one of the best players in Class B high school of this district last fall, captaining the Lamesa team to the championship, and Amarillo should be greatly strengthened by his decision to play with the Spuds. After earning two letters in football at Amherst, Allen went to Lamesa last season and lettered for the third time. Reports from Amarillo indicate that only two letters will return for service this fall, and the Panhandle Capital can use Allen, as could any other Class A team in the district.

Helen Wills Moody has retired from the tennis court in favor of home and family—temporarily, she says. She withdrew at a peculiar time, just on the eve of the women's national championship tournament, which she has won almost consecutively for the last dozen years. Her withdrawal left the title open, with no one to defend it, and we wonder what pleasant anybody can get out of winning it now. Mrs. Moody is easily the outstanding tennis player of her sex in the world, and the champion now can be a second rate at best. A popular golfer has said he would not want the golf championship unless he won it over Bobby Jones. The same could apply to women's tennis with Mrs. Moody out of the running. On the heels of her decision not to enter the national tourney this summer came the announcement of a \$20,000 cash prize which she had been offered by the late Jimmy Phelan, "in appreciation for her services as a tennis player and for the prestige she has brought to California on the court." She has not filed formal acceptance of the will, and if she does, she will have entered professional, a thing she has repeatedly denounced.

Ten prospective members of the Texas University tennis team have been declared ineligible for Southwest Conference competition by school officials. Deficiency in scholasticity was given as the cause. Only one of the ten, however, was considered as having had chances on the varsity this fall. He is Claude Meadows, one of the best backhands in the country. Meadows will make a hole hard to fill. Meadows was one of the best backs on the Longhorn team last year, and saw considerable service in conference games. He is a former pupil of Paul Tyson, of Waco High, and a qualified quarterback in collegiate football. Claude Blanton of Lorena, who was a substitute tackle in the Longhorn line last fall, was also found wanting when a check-up of grades was made this week. Blanton was not a sensational player, but might have developed into a fair tackle. Raymond Barton of Lubbock, a guard on the Texas University team last year, was also declared ineligible for competition in 1930.

Speaking of ineligibles reminds us of the Texas Tech team, which is shot more or less to pieces this fall by reason of failure on the part of last year's stars to pull through with their studies. The result is rather disconcerting, especially so to the new coaching staff, which must build from the ground up. Followers of Tech must not look for a sensational team this fall, for some time has been allowed for the rebuilding of a team. The building of a machine worthy to represent a school like Tech. GIANTS MOVE TO SECOND POSITION

ROBINS IN THIRD; BIG SERIES COMING UP MAY DECIDE

Due to the efforts of a pair of clubs which are not even making a pretense of getting into the super-heated National league pennant struggle, the three contenders for the flag have found themselves in a more uncertain position with the prospect that the coming series between the Chicago Cubs and New York Giants will be the really crucial one of the season.

The Giants have taken second place in the standing and have placed themselves within striking distance of the league leading Cubs, only three games behind.

Robins Shoved Down
While the Giants were making a close struggle from the St. Louis Cardinals, 4 to 2, Pittsburgh's shrewd Brooklyn Robins into third place with an 8 to 0 triumph while the humble Phillies kept the league leaders from making any sort of gain in a double header.

The Phillies took the first game by a 9 to 8 count despite the efforts of Hack Wilson, who eluded his 43rd home run to tie the National league record set last year by Chuck Klein and of Harriet and Blair, who also hit homers. Then, as the teams attempted to play off Saturday's eleven inning tie, the tail enders battled the Cubs to a standstill in 15 innings of play which wound up in a 6-6 tie. Pidgey Phil Collins, hurled the entire game and was deprived of a victory when Lester Bell hit a homer with two on in the eighth inning.

Giants Hit Timely
The Giants gained the triumph by some timely hitting in the second inning which produced three runs. Pitcher Carl Hubbell driving in two of them. Brooklyn failed to make any progress at bat as Steve Ewerton pitched his first full game this year for the Pirates, and made it a six-hit shutout. With nothing much at stake, Fred Frankhouse turned in another nice job of hurrying to give the Boston Braves a 4 to 0 victory over Cincinnati.

The American league's hurlers had a thoroughly enjoyable day with the single exception of those who work for Boston. The Red Stockings moundmen failed to stop the Cleveland batters while the Indians got the benefit of Wes Ferrell's 21st winning game of the year and an equally good job of pitching by Roxie Lawson to win by scores of 7 to 2 and 7 to 3.

Earl Whittehill continue his chase after Ferrell's league leading total of victories by running his string to eleven straight to give Detroit a 2 to 1 victory over Washington. He allowed the Senators five hits while Brown and Liska granted six. Charley Ruffing of New York made another kind of a mark by pitching his third two-hit game since he joined the New York Yankees. His victim this time was the Chicago White Sox, who succumbed by a 2 to 0 count. One of Ruffing's previous two-hit performances was an eight inning affair as relief pitcher, George Blahodier, hurled the day's fourth major league shutout, allowing the champion Philadelphia Athletics only five hits while the St. Louis Browns scored a 7 to 0 triumph. Goose Goslin led the attack with three home runs in successive times at bat.

CHICAGO MOVES OUT OF FUND SHORTAGE

HERCULEAN PROJECTS ARE NOW POSSIBLE FOR LAKE CITY

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Herculean improvement projects, on which hundreds of millions of dollars have been spent, and herculean complaints about squandering money have been the background of the 12 years during which Chicago's funds never have sold above par.

The spell was broken when Halsey Stuart and company bought \$1,000,000 worth of the city's bonds for \$7,023,750 and today the city fiscal fathers were pointing with pride to the horizon of financial peace.

Millions in Projects
The millions were poured, at least a large part of them, into projects which gradually are materializing as the Chicago plan. These include a new Park Lake front for 20 miles, the conversion of the old South Water Street of historic character into the Chicago double-decker Wacker drive, the chiseling out of a new channel for a portion of the Chicago river that had a sink in it, and the outer drive system of fast automobile accessways along the lake. Many long streets were widened, numerous bridges erected and the navy pier was built out into the lake as well long.

Also included are the sites for the majestic new home of the Field Museum, and the famous Soldiers Field, where Turner and winter settled the "battle of the century" in the rain.

Flurry Is All Over
"The unfortunate flurry caused by tax delays is all over," proclaimed George K. Soudant, city controller, today.

"Once more Chicago sees daylight ahead in its financial future."

After almost continuous complaints from out local sources or another over a period of years that the city spent money like a drunkard, the city's financial situation reached its climax last winter when with no funds collected for two years, the treasury ran so completely dry that there was no money to pay teachers, policemen and thousands of other public servants at Christmas time. Banks and financial houses refused to buy any more tax anticipation warrants on which ready money could be raised.

Situation Finally Met
The situation was finally met in desperation, by the formation of a special citizens' committee headed by Sir John Strawn, internationally known attorney. A special session of the legislature was called during the spring to enact several items of fiscal reform legislation which the committee recommended.

A tax assessment revision, which had been under way for two years and was completed and passed, unpaid, since 1928, began to flow into the treasury in July. With the collecting of the 1928 taxes, theoretically completed on July 15, members of the citizens' committee announced that more than \$60,000,000 of the city's total debt, \$250,000,000, exclusive of bond issues, could be retired immediately.

marillo Man Held For Embezzlement
BOERNE, Aug. 20.—William Mercer of Amarillo was arrested here on a charge of embezzlement and lodged in the county jail. He will be given an examining trial today.

The complaint in the case was filed by Sheriff of Boerne, N. J. Mercer was said to have engaged in buying oil leases around here the past few weeks.

The medal men are attending the annual encampment of the United Spanish War veterans.

A number of high naval officials were present when the formal expression of thanks for the victory of 22 years ago was voiced by E. Clinton Rhodes, former United States navy lieutenant. During the exercises it was recalled the Olympia had been active serving in the World War and had been selected to bring back the body of the unknown soldier.

BIDDING MAY BE USED BY BOARD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The shipping board is contemplating abandonment of its plan of selling a government-owned steamship line without competitive bidding.

Negotiations for the private sale of the American Gulf Orient line, over which vessels are run between Gulf of Mexico ports and the Orient via Los Angeles, have been halted.

No government steamship line has been sold without competitive bidding, but the shipping board had authorized negotiations for the sale of the Gulf Orient to its present operator, the Tampa Intercoastal Steamship company.

Before the sale could be consummated, the Intercoastal Steamship company, a United States Steel subsidiary, offered \$12 a ton for 11 vessels, \$1 more than the Tampa offer. The Tampa company raised its bid to \$12 for the same vessels, at a total of about \$1,300,000.

After the Tampa bid had been raised, the Merchant Fleet corporation, the board's operating agency, again recommended that the Gulf Orient be sold to the Tampa.

The shipping board demurred, however and officials are contemplating advertising for bids.

KING DECLARES OPPOSITION ON WORDS

DEMOCRAT DENIES HIS PARTY OPPOSES WORK OF ADMINISTRATION

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Charged by Robert H. Lucas that the Democratic party had opposed every effort made by President Hoover to restore business and provide employment were denied today by Senator King, Democrat, of Utah.

Lucas, who Saturday assumed office as executive director of the Republican national committee, in a statement said the Democrats had selected the "natural misfortune of the nation—the suffering of the unemployed—as a campaign issue of 1930." Because of this, he said, they could not lend their support to corrective measures without "depriving their party of a battle cry for the campaign."

"There has been no Democratic criticism of opposition to any effort the president may have made to correct or improve the economic state of the country," Senator King said in a statement issued through the Democratic national committee, "but there has been criticism, not only by Democrats but by progressive and liberal Republicans—statements which were not warranted by conditions and which were based in part on unfounded, optimistic prophecies and misleading statistics—the inaccuracy of which the executive department reports ultimately showed to be misleading."

"The fact is that the Democratic party has sought to promote the welfare of the people to bring about prosperity to all classes and to preserve Democratic institutions under which liberty and justice may be the inheritance of all."

NO EVIDENCE FOUND
AUSTIN, Aug. 20.—(AP)—State and federal inspectors have found no evidence of the Mediterranean fruit fly in Texas, J. M. Del Curto, state entomologist said today. The inspectors recently completed an exhaustive check of the valley and other citrus growing sections of the state.

EUROPE TO BE SHORT ALSO IN CROPS

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 20.—Europe will bear with America heavy agricultural losses which a summer of protracted droughts and severe storms have occasioned from the British Isles to the steppes of Russia.

Reports from many countries where harvesting operations are about to begin showed today that Russia and Rumania would be the only ones with surplus cereal crops for export while England, France, Italy, Germany and Austria would have subnormal yields of wheat, rye, oats and barley.

France Defers On
French and Italian wheat farmers have been suffering from similar weather almost as much as have the grain growers of the United States. Soviet officials, however, reported that Russian peasants have benefited from a season so unseasonably good they were preparing to harvest a huge crop with the prospect of having grain to spare.

England will market a smaller wheat crop than usual, as a result of a decrease of 200,000 acres in cultivation.

Spain Better This Year
Spain, which never raises enough wheat for her own use, will have a better than average crop upon which to draw this year.

Southwestern Europe has been favored with temperate weather. France has begun to entertain serious doubts of producing enough wheat at home to provide bread for the nation.

Italy, it has been estimated, will produce 6,071,000 metric tons of wheat, compared with 7,082,000 last year.

A protracted wet period, which followed the long June drought, delayed all German crops.

To Get Diploma

JOYCE DEATH IS PROBED

MYSTERY VEILS CASE IN CHICAGO; GANGS ARE BLAMED

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—The story of Mrs. John T. Joyce that she received several anonymous telephone calls the night before her husband, a state senator, died mysteriously, sent police on a search, today for known enemies of the lawmaker.

Mrs. Joyce said the calls started Friday afternoon and lasted until that evening. She was first warned that the senator was to be shot and later was told that he had been shot three times.

Senator Joyce died suddenly Saturday morning under circumstances that led his brother, Edward Joyce, to suggest that he might have been poisoned.

Among those whom police sought to question regarding Joyce's death was Tommy Abbott, the Chicago gangster who was believed to have been the intended victim of a machine gun attack at Rockford, Ill., last week. Abbott was not wanted although a man standing near him was instantly killed and Abbott's car was hit several times.

Joyce appeared before a grand jury on election frauds last week and he was reported to have identified Abbott as one of the gunmen who invaded the Forty-second ward during the April primary.

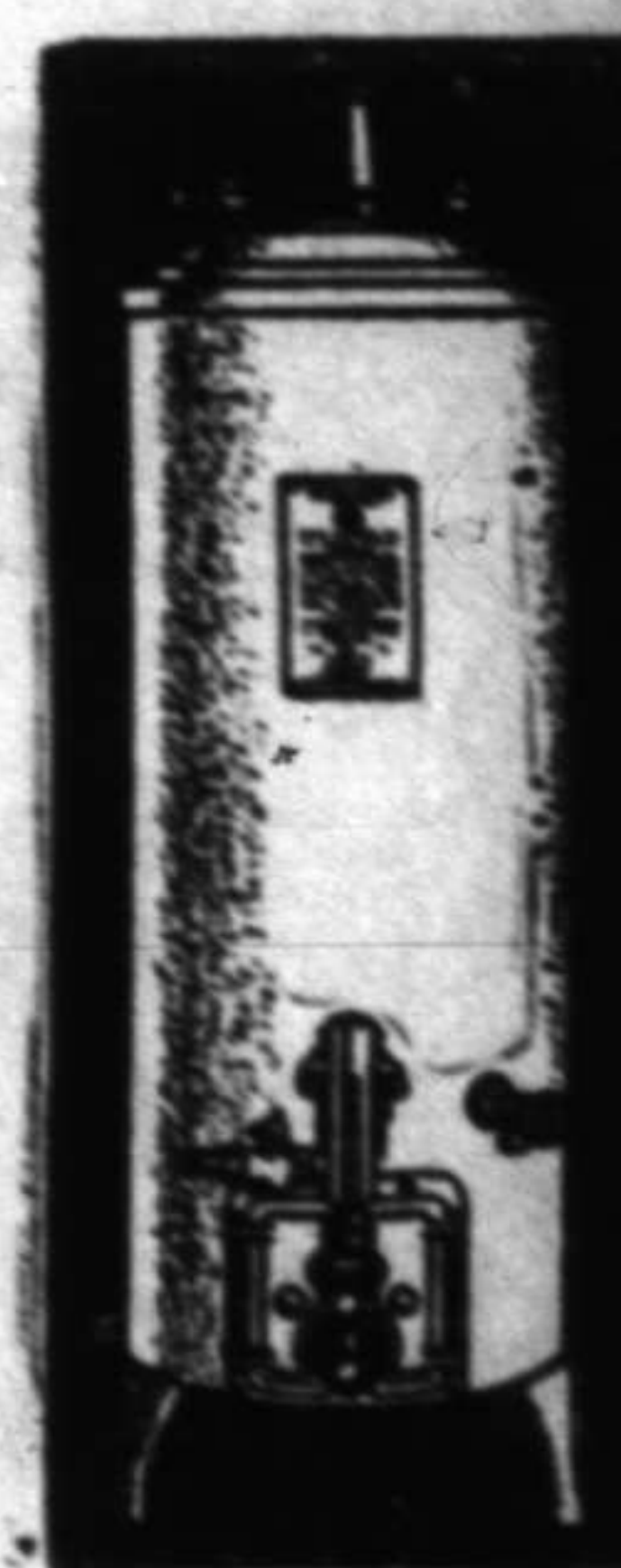

They are no more fond of Afghanistan than the people of India but here where the promise of loot beckons some 10,000 of them, inflamed by their priests marched down the Bara river valley almost to be gazed upon by the Indian army which guarded the valley.

Further south, a series of remarkable conferences was held at Peroma prison at Poona. There peace-makers representing the Government of India, Babar Khan Sapru and M. Jayakar, conferred with Mahatma Gandhi and four of his lieutenants in the national civil disobedience campaign.

The peace emissaries sought to have the non-cooperation movement abandoned and studied the talks conference in London this fall.

China's nationalist government

The Turco-Persian bad feeling arises from the invasion of eastern Turkey by Kurdish tribesmen, who are entrenched in the vicinity of historic Mount Ararat. Turkey insists that the Kurds are Persian subjects; that Persia not only should restrain them but should permit Turkish troops to cross Persian territory. Persia so far has declined to cooperate. The result is that Turkey has recalled her ambassador to Tehran, Memduh Chavket Bey.

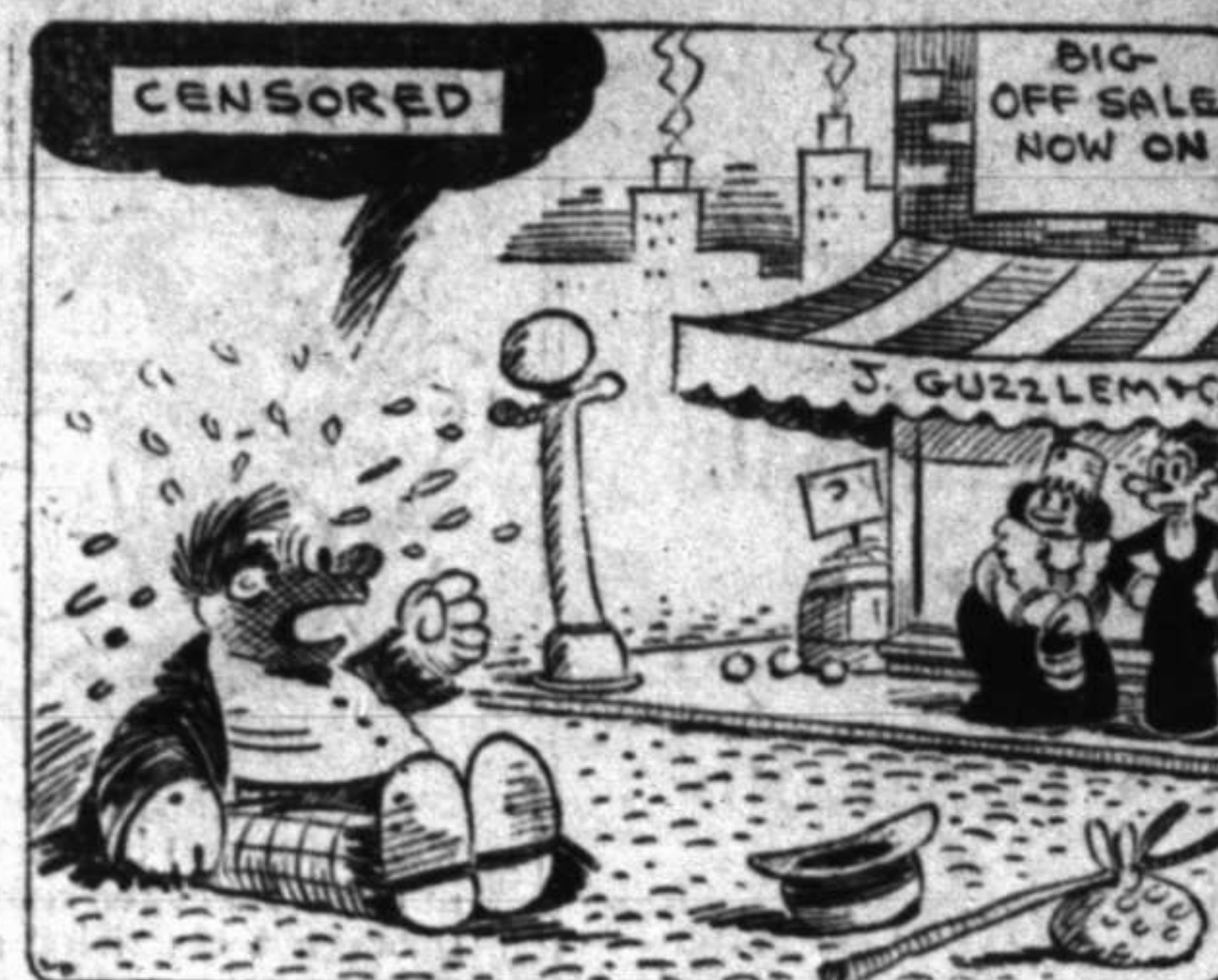
