Council considers new city hall

FWS&L building to be toured

City manager Buddy Foster presented the idea of purchasing a new building for City Hall at the regular meeting of the City Council on Tuesday.
Foster noted that the First Western Savings and Loan building would be a possibility for the City to buy.
He said that the Police Department building is leaking and that with the 911 system to be installed soon, now is the time to think about it if the City has any plans to.

Governments will pay for the first installation of the 911 system, but that any other movement of the system will incur a cost of approximately \$7000 to the City.
The building has room for the Police Department and City Hall, Foster said and also noted that there are two vaults which could be used for evidence and records.
The possibility of renting space

from the building was also presented to Councilmen.
Foster noted that there was no guarantee the City would be able to get the building, but that Bluebonnet Savings has indicated they would entertain any offers.
Mayor Jim Baum said that there were several things that the City would need to know before going forward; the feedback from the community, what kind of bid would

be accepted, what increased maintenance costs would be incurred, projected utility costs for the facility, remodeling costs to put the Police Department and City Hall in the building, the future of the current buildings.
Baum also noted that the site would have ample space to offer the City the ability to rent out a portion of the building to create revenue.

Councilmen noted that the building, being vacant, could become an eyesore for the community.
It could be a positive image for the city, Baum noted.
After discussion on the building, Baum noted that the interest of the City was publically stated if the price was acceptable.
Councilmen approved a motion to authorize City Manager Buddy Foster to meet with Bluebonnet Savings and arrange for a tour of the facility for the councilmen and other interested persons.

Commissioners approve budget and set tax rate

The 1992 Mitchell County budget was approved and the local tax rate set at the regular meeting of the Commissioners Court held Monday.
County Auditor Georgie Griffith met with commissioners at the meeting to present the budget

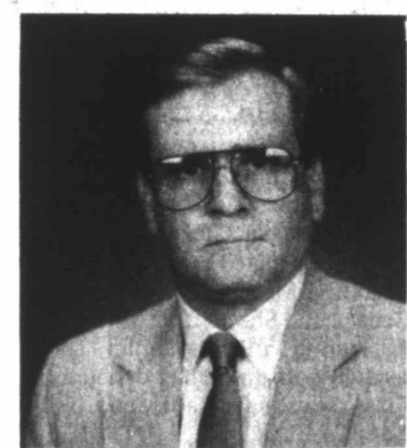
which represents the result of workshop sessions.
The 1992 budget totals \$3,781,999.73 for operating the local entity.

George and Lesa Oliver have three children, Robert, 10, and twins Stephen and Stephanie, 8.

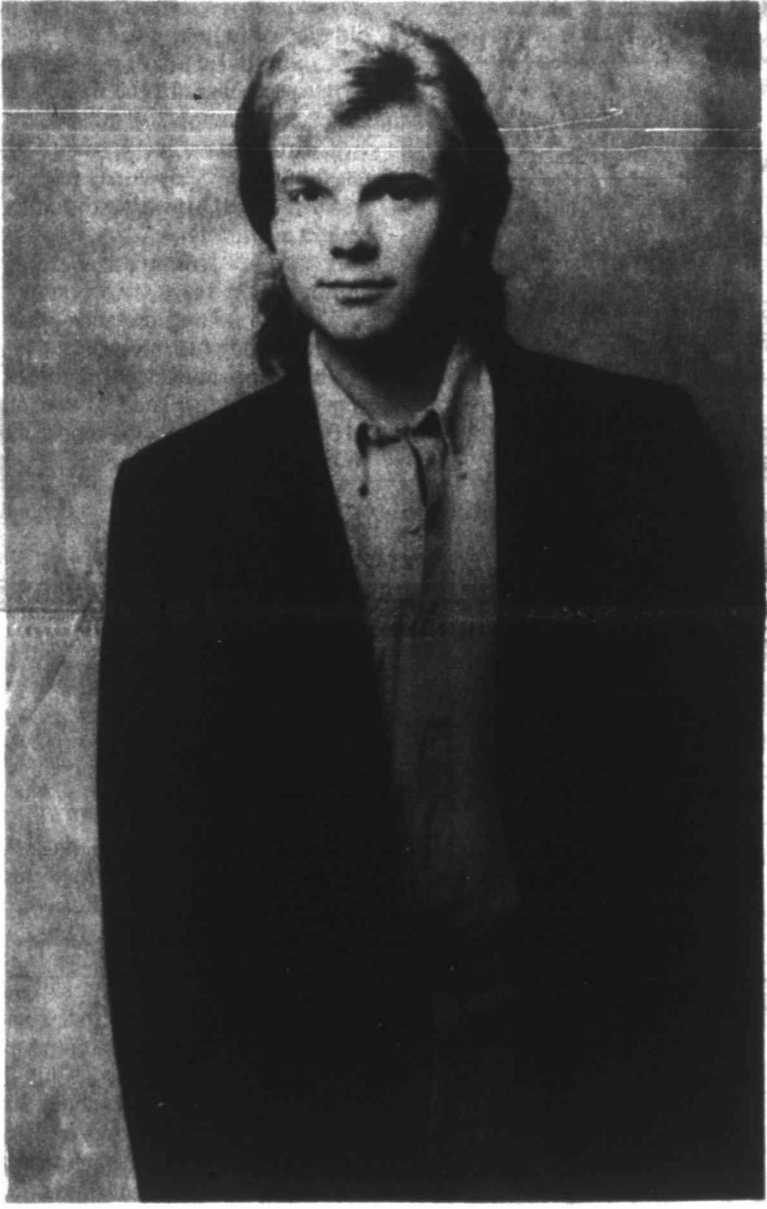
Band paper drive underway

Council okays purchase of new mosquito fogger

The regular meeting of the Colorado City Council was held Tuesday.
Councilmen heard the audit report, approved purchasing a mosquito aerosol generator, moving expenses for the Police Chief, payment of an invoice for repair of the Dowell yard and will seek bids on long distance service.
Joe Morren presented the audit report to the councilmen and said that it was a good report.
He noted that the audit was conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards.
Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable, but not absolute,

assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.
An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.
The council approved the purchase of a mosquito aerosol generator at the cost of approximately \$4100.
It was noted that the current sprayer does not work.

CISD approves various bids

Board of trustees of the Colorado Independent School District approved bids for a variety of supplies at the regular meeting held Monday.

Board members received bids on gasoline, bread/bread products, milk/novelities, cafeteria supplies, a washing machine, printing of tickets, and repair to band instruments.

The board awarded the bid of gasoline to be used by the school

district to Matlock fuel distributor of Colorado City who will supply the gasoline at a 5 cent differential.

Christine Cooley, cafeteria director, met with the board in regards to the bids which had been turned in.

The bid for bread/bread products went to Rainbow, whose bid prices were 4 inch hamburger buns, 8 count - .67, 4 and one-half inch hamburger buns, 8 count - .89, coney buns, 8 count - .67, 1 and

one-half pound sandwich bread - .79, 1 and one-half pound large bread - .67 and assorted 3 ounce snack cakes .28.

The award for milk went to Gandy's who bid to supply the district the following: half-pint homogenized milk - .1420, half-pint chocolate - .1565, half-pint low fat - .1310, half-gallon buttermilk - 1.19, 3 ounce ice cream cups - 1.70 per dozen, 2.5 ounce ice cream bars - 2.49 per dozen, Nestle crunch bars - 2.49 per dozen, sundae cones - 2.55 per dozen, push-ups - 2.50 per dozen, ice cream sandwiches - 1.90 per dozen.

It was noted that this bid contained an escalator clause which provided prices depending on the cost of raw material.

A bid from GSC was accepted for candy to be used in the cafeteria program and a bid from Frito-Lay was accepted for chips.

The purchase of a two-speed washing machine to be used at the field house was approved, to be purchased from Copeland and Associates of Dallas.

'No-wake zone' established at lake

A 'no wake zone' at Lake Colorado City, a contract with the Texas Animal Damage Control Service and committee appointments were reviewed by Commissioners for two local boards before the Court convened into executive session at the regular meeting held Monday.

Commissioners approved a 'no wake zone' at Lake Colorado City that was requested by Olgo McGee of the Sportsman's Club.

The request was made, noting that the small cove was located at the business site, that the parking facility of the Sportsman's Club was going to be undergoing expansion and the narrowness of the cove making it a safety hazard.

McGee noted that the area applied for could be more of a benefit to fishermen than to those with jet ski equipment.

Commissioner Carl Guelker presented a petition which he had received from residents of the

affected area supporting the zone. Guelker noted that he had met with the local Game Warden who noted no objections to the zone.

Commissioners discussed the dimensions of the 'no wake zone', then approved a motion to tentatively approve the zone and to work with the state on the dimensions.

A budget increase request was presented to the commissioners by the Texas Animal Damage Control Service, but the commissioners stayed with the \$9853.11 that they had decided upon during the budget sessions.

The request was for \$1250 a month starting on September 1 of this year to pay towards the trapping fee.

After discussion, commissioners authorized approved a motion to authorize their budgeted amount of expenses for the next year and to have County Judge Ray Mayo work the contract around to meet the

county's conditions. The board of economic development and library board reappointments were made at the meeting.

On the board of economic development, members were reappointed for a two-year term. Those reappointed include Elmer Martin, Woody Anderson, Mike Hemphill, Gayle Houston and Bobby Lemons.

Also reappointed were members of the library board. Marriion Bassham, Bob Reily and Iris Preston were all reappointed for three year terms on the board.

In other action, commissioners approved the minutes of meetings held the past month, approved the payment of bills and of the monthly reports.

Commissioners also met in executive session to consider a personnel matter, but took no action on the matter in open court.

The new model will be able to fit in the back of a pickup instead of on a trailer as was required of the old model.

James Rich, Street Supervisor, noted that the new model sprays a semi-fog which is supposed to kill 20 percent more effectively than the old type of fogger.

Councilmen also approved the moving expenses of the new Police Chief in the amount of \$2000.

Councilmen approved the payment of \$2500 to pay for paving at the Dowell yard due to a leak in a water line.

The City Manager received authorization from the council to seek bids on long distance phone bills and study rate proposals.

In other action, councilmen approved the minutes of past meetings, the financial report and vouchers for payment.

Election results incomplete

Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday evening to canvass election results of the August 10 local option election, but will have to receive an order to open the voting boxes from Judge Weldon Kirk before the process can be completed.

The voting packages that trustees received for Precinct 2 and 4 were incomplete and no envelope for Precinct 3 was received.

In order to canvass the balloting that took place on August 10, trustees need more information and will be required to request an order from Judge Kirk to have the voting boxes reopened so that the information on the individual ballots may again be tabulated.

Geneva Findley, business manager, noted that a copy of the request would be faxed to Judge Kirk's office on Tuesday.

It was noted that Judge Kirk will give directions in his order as to when and where the boxes will again be opened so that the information concerning the balloting might be retrieved.

The board will call another meeting after the Judge's decision has been received and action can be taken to complete the canvassing process of the election which affects the taxation of Mitchell County Education District property.

Commissioners canvass votes

Voting results of the August 10 constitutional amendment election were canvassed by the Commissioners at the regular meeting of the Court on Monday.

Constitutional amendment number 1 was defeated, 158 - 539, by Mitchell County voters and constitutional amendment number 2 was passed, 368 - 325, by Mitchell County voters.

Balloting on amendment number 1 was as follows: absentee - 36/91, precinct 1 - 38/131, precinct 2 - 11/107, precinct 3 - 41/107, precinct 4 - 25/88 and precinct 7 - 7/15 for the total of 158/539.

Balloting on amendment number 2 was as follows: absentee - 60/65, precinct 1 - 111/59, precinct 2 - 40/78, precinct 3 - 87/60, precinct 4 - 54/57 and precinct 7 - 16/6 for the total of 368/325.

CISD trustees conduct regular business

Trustees appointed a teacher for the Colorado Independent School District, heard a report on the cafeteria program, discussed new policy guidelines and approved minutes at the regular monthly meeting of the board.

Bobby Lemons, principal of Hutchinson Elementary came before the board to nominate Catherine Leach for an appointment to the Colorado ISD teaching staff. The native of Westbrook was approved to the position by the school board.

Christine Cooley, cafeteria director, appeared before the board to discuss summer lunch program which served an average of

approximately 179 people throughout the summer with a high attendance of 280.

The program was termed a success by Superintendent Don Nimmo who noted that the school hopes that state funding is available to offer the program again next year.

Cooley noted that revenues for the program were \$18,439.37 and expenses were \$17,940.57.

The board also discussed and approved income eligibility guidelines for free/reduced meals and decided to keep the meal cost for cafeteria meals at the same rate as last year.

City tax rate set

The effective tax rate of .58927 was set as the tax rate for the City of Colorado City for the 1991 tax roll.

The effective tax rate amounts to the same amount that would have to be calculated to come up with the same revenue as last year.

Last year's tax rate was .5475. Due to a decline in property values the effective tax rate went up slightly to generate the same revenue for the city.

With the tax rate of .58927 the city's revenue from the tax roll is listed at \$379,739.

Councilmen discussed options,

including the ability to raise the effective rate three percent to the rollback rate of .60695 without having to go to a public meeting before reaching approval.

The councilmen noted that a three percent increase to the tax rate would generate an additional \$11,394 of revenue for the city.

After considerable discussion on the various options and noting how tight money in the community is, Mayor Pro-tem Bob Reily made a motion that the effective tax rate be adopted for the this year. Councilman Sammy Contreras seconded the motion and the council approved the tax rate.

provide for increases in the allotments made to the board of economic development, renovation costs of the Berman Building, and rate increases to the insurance policy.

Griffith noted that the anticipated receipts to fund the budget come to \$3,214,429.30.

The budget which was approved by the commissioners on Monday was a budget deficit of \$567,570.43.

The commissioners then set the ad valorem tax rate for the 1991 Mitchell County tax roll at .3857 which is the effective tax rate provided to the commissioners by County Tax Collector/Assessor Mike Burt.

Griffith noted that the tax revenue will be split, with .2943 going to the general fund and .0914 of the tax rate going to the road fund.

Principals report to CISD board

Principals of the Colorado Independent School District gave reports to the board of trustees at the regular monthly meeting held Monday night.

James McSwain, Colorado High School principal; James McLean, Colorado Middle School principal; Bobby Lemons, Hutchinson Elementary School principal and Juan Espinoza, Kelley Elementary School principal each brought reports to the board.

McSwain in his comments to the board noted the schedule of classes for the school year at the high school.

The bell schedule will begin with the first bell at 8:05 a.m. and five minutes later the tardy bell will ring.

Classes for the coming year will be fifty minutes in length.

McSwain noted that the home-room concept has been changed. Instead of the confusion of

changing rooms, second period has been extended.

A morning break/tutorial period will follow second period.

He also noted that lunch, which will follow fourth period, will be at the same time for all high school students this year.

This change in the scheduling will allow for an additional 15 minutes of instruction time to be gained throughout the day, McSwain noted.

It was noted that after each two periods of instruction, students will receive some type of a break.

McSwain noted the tardy policy changes. The tardies will be recorded in the office, which is a change from previous years.

He noted that the new policy provides for in-house detention after 3 tardies have been accumulated.

Corporal punishment at the high school will only be administered by

the principal or assistant principal, McSwain said, it will only be used in accordance with regulations when other methods have failed.

Also noted was that the high school was going to move to a moving class sponsorship system, where the teachers sponsoring a class will rotate with the same class.

McSwain presented a rough copy of the student handbook to board members and sought board input on several issues relating to the dress code which was described as being 'cumbersome and difficult to enforce.'

The board's stand on the issues of earrings and facial hair were discussed at the meeting.

The board noted the need to allow the use of administrative discretion in determining the guidelines for a high school dress code.

McSwain noted that registration sheets have been mailed out to high school students. Those with changes in their schedules will report to the high school Friday, Monday or Tuesday from 9 a.m. til 3 p.m. to make changes in their schedules.

He noted that students should be ready for school on the first day of class.

McLean of the Middle School said that pre-registration will take place on Wednesday from 9 a.m. til 12 p.m.

He noted that a student enrollment of 305 is projected at the Middle School for grades 6 - 8.

McLean told board members that the eight period schedule the school has gone to is working well and that plans are to keep the program in place.

He also informed the board about the science pilot-program being implemented at the school.

The pilot program that the school has entered upon is a combination of sciences geared towards the essential elements of the TASP test.

The school will be working with the Texas Education Association and the University of Texas at El Paso in helping to design a

textbook for the course.

Lemons of Hutchinson Elementary noted 7 new students that have reported to the school district who will attend the school.

Registration for Hutchinson will be held from 9 a.m. til 12 p.m. on August 20, he noted.

Espinoza of Kelley Elementary also noted that registration would take place from 9 a.m. til 12 p.m. on August 20.

He reported that teachers would be coming in next Wednesday to prepare for the school year.

Superintendent Don Nimmo told the board members that a breakfast will be held at 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, August 21 at Colorado Middle School to welcome all teachers back from the summer and to get started for the upcoming school year.

CHIEF LONE WOLF

Speaking of baseball cards, we'll give you 10 Nolan Ryans for one Harvey "Big" Muns. Now, don't waste your time looking to see if you have one of Harvey's cards. You don't.

Harvey Muns was one of the great pitchers of his time. Big, hard throwing, he was a strike out ace shortly after the turn of the century. He pitched for Loraine and old timers in Mitchell County say he could have made the major leagues.

But Harvey had one drawback. He wouldn't play baseball on Sundays. "He was very religious," recalls M.A. Dunnahoo. "So religious he refused to play on Sundays."

Baseball in Loraine went back to the towns earliest days, 1906. The first organized team was in 1908 and Crockett Hazlewood was the manager, while Muns was the captain, and naturally, the star pitcher.

Of course a sharp rivalry developed between Loraine and Colorado (City) and the two teams played some real knock-down, dragouts.

Loraine had a good ball club. Men such as Clint Harrison, Leslie Summers, Rufus White, Tom Johnson, Joe Bennett, B. Walker, Joe Jackson and others.

But the arch rival to the west had some stalwarts too. Big Bob Cooper was Colorado's pitching ace. He could really rear back and fire the ball. A little wild at times, but that was just good ol' Bobs way; he was so wild the volunteer fire department refused to ride on the fire truck when he was the driver.

Jim Bodine played catcher and managed the Colorado team. His squad included Sam Wulfjen, Nelson Vaughn (another good pitcher), Andrew Cooksey, Pick Hughes and some other pretty country fair ballplayers.

When Loraine and Colorado hooked up in a contest, fans from both towns swarmed out to the ball park. And the two teams were apparently pretty evenly matched, year after year.

A typical game was played in May of 1912. Loraine led 2-1, going into the ninth inning. The Colorado Record noted that "the Loraine

bunch is a husky set and when they would land on a ball, it went about its business in a hurry."

On this particular day, however, Loraine wasn't "landing" on enough pitches and Colorado rallied in the last inning to grab a 3-2 victory.

"It was a first class game played with as few errors and fumbles as a professional one and it indicates what the Colorado boys can do if they are given a little encouragement," the Record observed.

"Yet they always find the Loraine team an opponent worthy of their very best efforts."

In time, (1917), commercialism crept onto the local baseball diamond. Local merchants were asked to advertise their businesses by contributing uniforms for the Colorado baseball team. It was suggested that each shirt carry the following advertisement:

"compliments of (firms name) we believe in clean sport"

There's no word on whether the idea caught on, initially, but the Record reasoned, "this would prove a very unique and effective method of publicity and would help the boys greatly."

The year 1913 was perhaps one of the best ever for the Colorado baseball team. It defeated one opponent after another. One such victim was Hamlin, which lost 13-6.

The Record tried to soothe the losers feelings, by writing, "We wish to say the Hamlin boys have been unusually courteous and gentlemanly in every respect; no quarrelling nor squabbling of any kind."

Incidentally, the umpire for that game was Colorado Mayor C.M. Adams. (What a way to campaign for votes! What a way to lose votes!!)

The Colorado nine blew through its schedule, whipping teams from Hermleigh, Merkle, Big Spring, Pecos and other West Texas towns. Occasionally the Colorado boys would lose, but not very often.

And in 1913, they easily trounced Loraine and Harvey Muns.

"Loraine put Muns in the box but after they (Colorado) had sent his balls to the brush several times, Morgan went in; he not being able to slip it by the eagle eyes of the Colorado hard hitters, Wilson was put in to pitch the last 3 innings," the Record stated.

Colorado won the game 11-7. A few weeks later Colorado drubbed Loraine again, this time, 14-3 as Preston Scott hurled the victory.

Obviously the losses didn't set well with Bug Muns. So later in the season when Pecos contacted him and asked if he and a couple of other Loraine players would join their squad for a game against Colorado, he was only too glad to oblige.

Earlier in the year Colorado had swept Pecos in three straight games. Now Pecos asked for a rematch.

Come on over, Colorado replied. When game day arrived, shop owners closed their doors at 5 o'clock to get a good seat at the ballpark. They could have stayed at work.

Big Harvey got his revenge. The fireballer set Colorado down that evening, 5-0, striking out 11 and walking none. It was a classic Muns performance.

Even the Record had to bow to Muns superiority. "Mr. Muns did some fine work, in fact, he is out of the country team class and ought to be in the Texas League," the paper stated.

"We understand that he has been offered and attractive salary to sign up with the league, but has refused."

M.A. Dunnahoo says eventually Muns relented on his "never on Sunday" vow. But Harvey pitched for fun, not profit. Actually, his shutout for Pecos wasn't the first time he had been a "hired gun."

He recalled he once pitched a double header against a tough Snyder team, and won both games. Ironically, the team who recruited him was noneother than Colorado. For his herculean effort he was paid two dollars!

No, you won't find Harvey Muns on any baseball cards. But he should be.

The proposed effective date for this offering is September 23, and will be available statewide where facilities permit.

The calling party's telephone number and other originating network call information will be delivered to the Exchange Connection Service customer when the calling number and the called number are served by the same switch. Additionally, the caller's telephone number and other originating network call information may be recorded and stored by the Exchange Connection Service customer. Customers may be able to identify the caller before the call is answered. All Exchange Connection Service customers will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided service. In the agreement the customer agrees not to disclose the calling party's telephone number unless the customer has written permission from the calling party.

The Telephone Company estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$1.2 million. Providers of voice messaging service and telephone answering services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

Exchange Connection Service is provided to customers in two parts: Local Serving Arrangement, which provides access to the exchange network; and Optional Service Features. The proposed rates, for both Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement, including installation charges, are as follows:

Sales tax rebate checks show slight decrease

State Comptroller John Sharp sent sales tax rebate checks out last week that totaled \$151 million to 1,167 Texas cities and counties that collect local sales tax.

The August checks include taxes collected on June sales and reported in July by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state and represent a rebate increase of 10 percent to Texas cities and an increase of 18 percent to counties from the same period last year.

"Even though some areas in Texas show only a slight increase, while others' rebates are down, overall the state's economy is strong and healthy," Sharp said.

In all, 1062 Texas cities received \$136.6 million as their August rebates for a 1991 total of \$841.6 million.

This month's payments to 105 counties reached \$14.3 million for a year-to-date total of \$92.5 million.

Mitchell County received a check in the amount of \$16,550.66 down from last year's same period total of \$16,707.75 which represents a decline of .94 percent.

For the year-to-date, Mitchell County has received checks totaling \$114,974.31, a decline of 14.12 percent from last year's payments to date total of \$133,883.24.

Colorado City received a payment this month of \$47,471.99, a 6.2 percent increase over the prior years comparable payment of \$39,050.15.

On the year-to-date, Colorado City checks are down .49 percent to \$240,429.32 compared to the 1990 year-to-date total of \$241,616.27.

Loraine received a check for \$1,026.02 this month, a 27.19 percent drop from last year's monthly check of \$1,409.08.

Loraine's year to date total is up 63.05 percent to \$7,918.27 as compared to the 1990 year-to-date total of \$4,856.31.

Westbrook received a monthly check of \$613.26, a 30.03 decline from last year's monthly total of \$876.52.

The Westbrook year to date total is \$4,522.57, a decline of 14.28 percent from the prior year-to-date total of \$5,276.16.

Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook have combined for checks totaling \$252,870.16 this year, an increase of .45 percent over last years period to date total of \$251,748.74.

In the surrounding area, cities in Howard and Nolan County posted increases while Scurry County showed a decrease from last year's totals.

Howard County posted an increase largely due to the 83.47 percent increase by Big Spring who received a monthly check for \$352,074.71 this year and \$191,899.08 last year.

Big Spring is running 107.74 percent ahead of last year's period to date. Their monthly checks have added up to \$2,071,312.63 this year as compared to \$997,084.34 at this same time last year.

Sweetwater, of Nolan County, received a monthly check of \$151,349.36, an increase of 80.74 from last year's monthly check of \$83,739.09.

For the year-to-date, Sweetwater checks are up 103.56 percent to post at \$984,805.00 over last year's period total of \$483,784.47.

Snyder, of Scurry County, showed a 1.32 percent decrease. Their monthly check was in the amount of \$82,796.18 compared to last year's \$83,903.99.

Snyder's year to date totals are still ahead of last year's by 14.09 percent, standing at \$598,933.80 this year as compared to \$524,953.80 the preceding year.

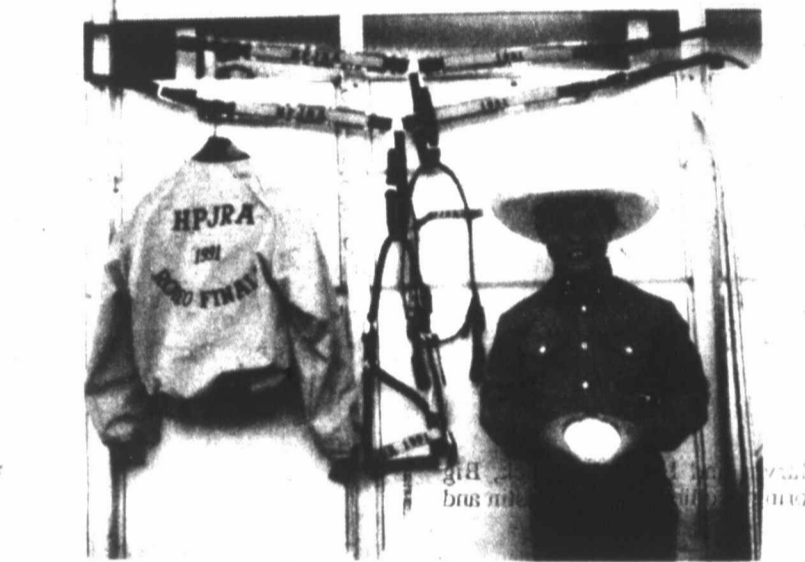

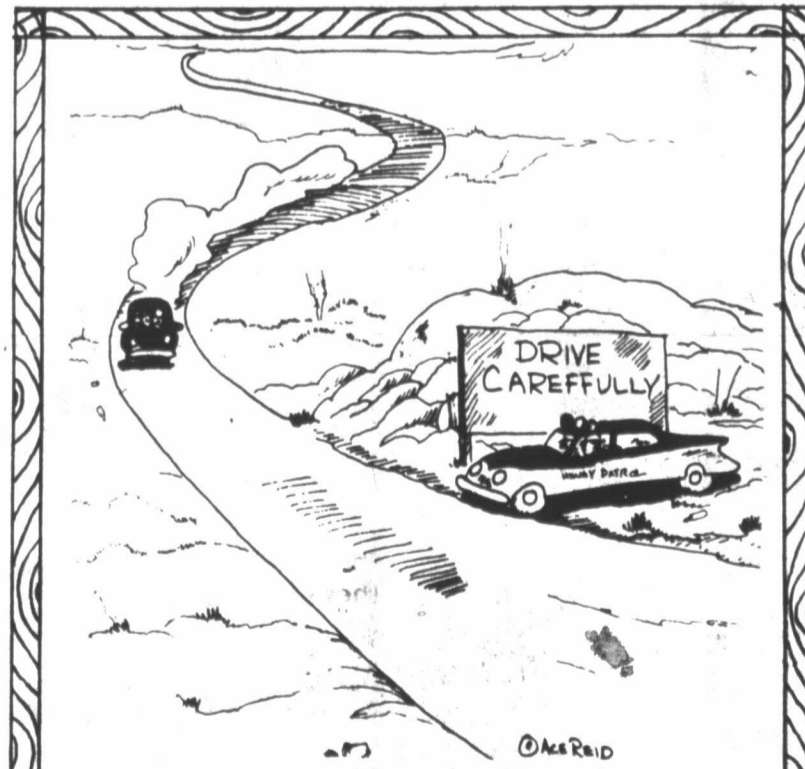

Public Notice

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. PORCUPINE MEATBALLS

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 cup uncooked long-grain rice
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1 T. snipped parsley
- 2 T. finely chopped onion
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- Dash pepper
- 1 10 3/4-ounce can condensed tomato soup
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

THIS WEEK'S COOK... MELINDA HOOVER

Combine meat, rice, egg, parsley, onion, salt, pepper and 1/4 cup condensed tomato soup. Mix thoroughly; shape in about 20 small balls and place in skillet. Mix remaining soup, water, and Worcestershire sauce; pour over meatballs. Bring to boil; reduce heat; cover and simmer, stirring often. Makes 4 or 5 servings.

SNICKER DOODLES

- Mix:
- 1 cup soft shortening
 - 1 1/2 cups sugar
 - 2 eggs
- Sift and stir in 2 3/4 cups flour, 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Chill dough. Roll in half size of walnuts. Roll in 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons cinnamon. Place 2 inches apart. Bake at 350° for 10-12 minutes.

SKILLET SPAGHETTI

- An easy all-in-one spaghetti supper...
- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1 6-ounce can tomato paste
 - 1 1-pint 2-ounce can tomato juice
 - 3 cups water
 - 1 1/2 to 2 tsp. chili powder
 - 1 tsp. garlic salt
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1 tsp. sugar
 - 1 tsp. dried oregano, crushed
 - 2 T. instant minced onion
 - 1 7-ounce package uncooked spaghetti
- In large skillet, break up ground beef. Add remaining ingredients except spaghetti. Cover and bring to a boil; reduce heat and simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add spaghetti; stir to separate strands. Simmer, covered, 30 minutes longer or till spaghetti is tender. Stir frequently. Serve with parmesan cheese. Serves 4 to 6.

MAGIC RAINBOW COOKIE BARS

- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 1/2 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1 can Eagle brand milk
- 1 1/3 cup flaked coconut
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup M&M's or Chocolate chips

Melt margarine in glass dish. Sprinkle crumbs over margarine. Pour Eagle brand evenly over crumbs. Top with remaining ingredients, press down firmly. Bake for 25-30 minutes until lightly brown in 350° oven. Cool. Chill thoroughly if desired. Cut into bars. Store loosely. Makes 24.
