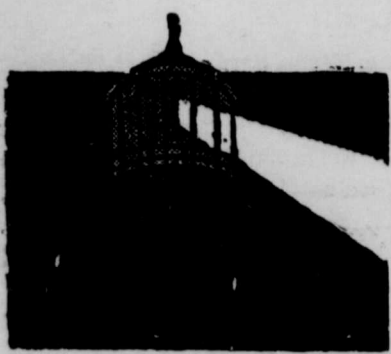




## On The BEAM
