## STREETS IN HOLIDAY DRESS FOR FAIR

### ONLY ONE WORK DAY LEFT PRIOR TO EXPOSITION

#### EXHIBITS HURRY TO HAVE ALL READY BY MONDAY MORNING

Flags and bunting, draped about most of the business houses of Lubbock today gave the city a holiday air and gave a further reminder that the opening of the annual Panhandle-Plains fair lies just around the corner.

With only one more regular work day in which to prepare, officials of the fair and more than a score of workmen today were rushing to complete the detailed preparations for that everything would be in readiness for the opening Monday.

The offices of the fair association in the city hall and the fair grounds alike buzzed with activity this morning.

Exhibitors continued to come in at a rapid pace today, giving added evidence to fair officials that the fair this year will be the greatest ever held here.

Reports from various fairs over the sections this week indicate that winning exhibits will be brought from each of them to the fair here. Eleven prize winning hogs of the Dawson county fair, held Wednesday and Thursday at Lamora, are to be brought here, according to W. W. Evans, county agent there. This in addition to exhibits from Garza and Seury counties which were secured as a direct result of the trade trips of the Lubbock boosters.

Exhibitors in the women's building are being arranged today. The exhibits in this building will close at 6 o'clock tomorrow.

Numerous exposition and exhibit booths were in the process of construction this morning. Agricultural, county and community exhibits are expected to start coming in by tomorrow.

### CONTRACT FOR SUBWAYS WILL BE DISCUSSED

#### SPECIAL SESSION FOR COMMISSION CALLED FOR TOMORROW

Contract for the construction of the two subways under the Santa Fe tracks, one on Avenue H and the other on Broadway, will be taken up by the city commission at a special called meeting at the city hall at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The city bids met in regular session yesterday afternoon but the heavy list of routine matters to be considered precluded any other action.

Calling for bids on the contract is to be the next step in Lubbock's subway program. The contract, which is valued at \$1,000,000 to be applied on the construction in a bond election early this week.

### Bankruptcy Act Conspiracy Held

Charges of conspiracy to violate the bankruptcy act yesterday were filed in the Lubbock division of the federal court of the Northern District of Texas.

J. H. Shurbert, of Idaho, is named as defendant. The suit originally filed in Fort Worth, having been transferred to Amarillo and then here. This is the fourth case to be filed in the division of the federal court here.

### Allen Testifies In Robbery Trial

EASTLAND, Sept. 28 (AP)—E. V. Allen, alleged companion of Scott P. Hyden in the robbery of the First State Bank of Carson on December 13, last, was a scheduled witness in his own defense here today.

The jury was obtained Thursday and taking of testimony began at 1 o'clock. Witnesses testified to the same facts as were brought out at the trial of Hyden last Tuesday in which Hyden was found guilty and given a penitentiary sentence of 20 years.

### JOINT MEETING PLACE SOUGHT FOR FACTIONS

#### AUDITORIUM FOR BOTH POLITICAL GROUPS BEING PLANNED

Location of an open air auditorium with a capacity of several thousand persons to be used jointly by the South Plains Democratic club and the Anti-Smith organization of this section was seen as a possibility by the leaders of the two groups this morning.

Sharing expense between the two groups, officials of the organizations feel that a suitable speaking place can be had.

This plan for a joint auditorium grew out of the program of path group to secure a number of nationally known speakers here between now and the date of the general election November 6.

It is said that a number of speakers of national reputation would be obtainable here if a suitable auditorium could have been provided.

A vacant lot on Texas Avenue between 12th and 14th streets, immediately north of the Powell undertaking building was seen as a possibility for the proposed auditorium this morning. The lot is bounded on three sides by brick buildings and on the fourth by sign boards. Plans is available for several thousand and seats in the enclosure.

May be Used Soon

Should such an arrangement be made the auditorium will be the scene of the democratic rally Monday night in which, Congressman Quinn Williams of Decatur and Congressman Sam Rayburn of Bonham, are the principal speakers. Under the auspices of the South Plains Democratic club, these men will speak here in connection with an extended speaking tour throughout the state in the interest of the campaign of the democratic national nominees.

Congressman Rayburn will speak at Tulsa at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, arriving here in time to speak at the 8 o'clock rally. Congressman Williams will speak at 8 o'clock on Tuesday, and from there to Midland and points to the south.

Congressman Williams will speak at Canyon at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, here at 8 o'clock, Post at 3 o'clock Tuesday, and Sweetwater at 8 o'clock Tuesday.

### SMITH MAKES TRIPLE THRUST AT OPPOSITION

#### INACTION ON WATERWAYS AND FARM RELIEF ATTACKED

ST. PAUL, MINN., Sept. 28 (AP)—Leaving behind another attack on the republican party administration, this time a triple-barreled assault for alleged inaction on the question of farm relief and inland waterways and for "whispering" Gov. Smith takes to the road again today for the last speech of his water relief and inland waterways tour.

Tomorrow night at Milwaukee, the democratic presidential candidate will wind up his two weeks' stumping of the middle and far west with an address, probably on prohibition. The democratic state convention at Rochester next Monday, which he also plans to address, then will be his only engagement before returning to Albany for a rest.

Lack of Leadership Seen

Ripping into the republican opposition, Gov. Smith told a crowd that real relief must come from Washington and had been for the last seven and a half years. As a result, he asserted, republican platform declarations in favor of farm relief and inland waterways have amounted to nothing more than "glowing promises."

On the other hand, he declared, the democratic platform "hits the nail squarely on the head" of the subjects and it is from this party that real relief must come.

The nominee charged into Chairman Work of the republican national committee, Secretary Jardine, and Senator Nye, republican, North Dakota, on the farm relief case, and quoted a statement by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, issued after his Omaha farm speech, as

### DROP IN COTTON CROP FORECAST

Decrease of Texas cotton production from the recent governmental forecast of 5,000,000 bales, of from a half million to a million bales was predicted here yesterday by J. D. Coghlin, assistant field service director of the Texas Farm Bureau association.

This crop shortage was based on several months' travel throughout the state in which Mr. Coghlin has been in constant touch with the farmers and brokers. Bad weather and harmful insects were named as the cause of this shortage.

Although the cotton acreage in this county has experienced a 25 per cent increase over last year, R. E. Overstreet, state director of the farm bureau, said yesterday that this year's production probably would not be as large as that of last year.

### HOOVER VISIT TO TEXAS GETS CONSIDERATION

#### DATE FOR ADDRESS IN GOTHAM MOVED UP BY CANDIDATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Herbert Hoover will speak in New York city on October 17 as originally planned. His address will be delivered in Madison Square Garden and not Carnegie Hall.

At the same time it was made known that no definite decision had been reached as to the time of the delivery of the speech at Boston next month nor has the subject of that address been decided upon.

Invitations to go into Texas and Ohio before the close of the campaign are under consideration.

The change at New York was made, it was announced today at the headquarters of the republican presidential candidate, because of the limited seating capacity of Carnegie hall. The rally will be under the auspices of the Union League club, the national women's republican club, and the state republican committee.

### LINDY PILOT OF REGULAR TRANSPORT

ST. PAUL, Minn., Sept. 28 (AP)—The commercial airway called again today to Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

A dozen passengers who had booked passage to Chicago on a northwest airways plane did not know in advance they were to have a New York to Paris pilot at the controls when their tri-motored plane took off today.

Colonel Lindbergh flew here last night from Chicago, accompanied by Major Thomas G. Lamphier. He had flown to Chicago yesterday from St. Louis, where he had gone to register for the November election.

### MYSTICISM OF FAR EAST ENSHROUDS MARRIAGE CEREMONIES FOR JAPANESE PRINCE AND HIS 19-YEAR OLD BRIDE

TOKYO, Sept. 28.—Presidents were shattered today when Yaukiko, Prince Chichibu, 26-year-old heir presumptive to the throne, married Miss Setsuko Matsudaira, 19-year-old daughter of Japan's former ambassador to Washington.

For the first time since the establishment of a hereditary nobility, a prince of the blood went outside the peerage to select his wife. He made the selection under romantic circumstances, falling a victim to her charms when visiting the Japanese embassy in Washington in January, 1927.

The wedding ceremony began at 9 a. m., today when the prince and his new princess entered the outer sanctuary before the Kashtokodoro "The Place of Ave." in the Imperial palace where the spirit of the sun

Goddess is worshipped as the maternal ancestor of the Imperial House.

Sacred Mirror Shown

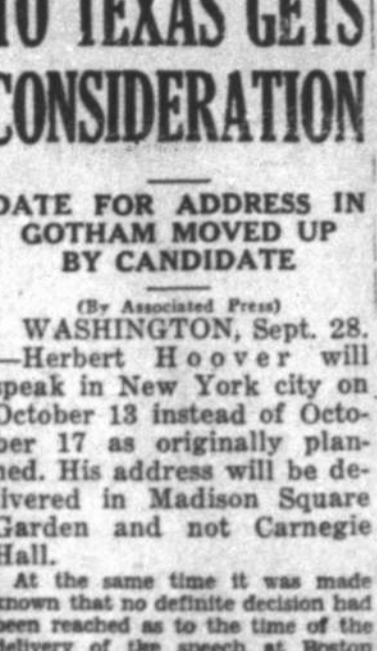
To the strains of flutes music the doors of the sanctuary were opened disclosing the sacred metal mirror, symbol of the spirit of the Sun Goddess. There Prince Chichibu made a formal report of the marriage to the Goddess and the other deities of the pantheon of which she is the central figure. Then a master of ceremonies handed the divine cup of sake or rice wine to the Prince and his bride in turn. The actual wedding ceremony was completed when they drank this.

The three cases were transferred from the district court after indictments had been returned by the district grand jury.

## GRADE MUCH IMPROVED OVER LAST YEAR AND HARVEST IS EARLIER, REPORTS HERE SAY

South Plains cotton is moving to the gins in rapidly increasing proportions and picking is expected to be in full swing by October 1, it was indicated this morning through a survey made at the local compresses and at gins in the vicinity of Lubbock.

Between thirty and forty bales of cotton have already been stored in the compresses here. Maturity of the crop is slightly earlier than last year.

Congress officials declared that the quality and staple of the cotton this year showed a marked improvement over that of 1927. This is based on the early yield of the county, however, and might not continue in the same class, it was pointed out.

Maturity of the cotton in this section is slightly earlier this year than last year, was said. With an increase of 25 per cent in cotton acreage it has been estimated by state farm bureau officials that the production of this year will not be more than that of last year.

The Lubbock Compress reports that about twenty five bales of cotton has been received this season as compared to only three or four a year ago.

The West Texas compress reports the receipt of about twelve bales of new cotton this season in addition to almost 125 bales of old cotton. This is about the same as last year, officials of the company said.

### COOLIDGE PART IN CAMPAIGN IS AGAIN IN DOUBT

#### BELIEVE PRESIDENT TO MAKE SPEECHES IN MASSACHUSETTS

WEST (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Frank statements of some party leaders who have called on Herbert Hoover recently concerning the republican prospects in Massachusetts, home state of President Coolidge, have served to revive speculation as to what part the chief executive is to play in the presidential campaign.

Mr. Coolidge and his successor as head of the republican party have conferred upon this subject but there has been no announcement beyond the mere statement that the chief executive wants to be helpful, as possible.

Since that pronouncement word has gone around in some political circles that Mr. Coolidge contemplates making at least one speech before election day and since his party appears to be having its troubles in his own state the natural assumption has been that he would speak there.

Political observers who have dug into the records of the past have found plenty of instances of a president actively participating in a campaign in which his own political fortunes were not at stake, but there are few instances of a chief executive directly urging the voters to support the presidential candidate of his party.

President Coolidge has clung scrupulously to the precedents in such matters and should he decide to make an address in or out of his home state he would be expected by those who profess to know him best to confine himself to a review of the party record under past administrations and to an exposition of his own ideas of the benefits that might flow to the country by a continuation of republican policies.

Hoover, himself, is to invade New England late in the campaign just before he begins his driving finish of the presidential contest.

Meantime, the republican presidential candidate is giving special study to the situation there as well as in other New England states which have become debatable territory, at least in the claims of the rival political managers. There are indications that the republican drive in that section is to be increased in intensity even before the nominee makes his excursion into that territory.

He is also accused of having shot Anacleto Vasquez when the latter threatened to call police after the slaying of Mrs. Noguera.

### ASSERT OLIER WAS KILLED

#### GRAND JURY REFUTES THEORY THAT HE TOOK OWN LIFE

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—Investigation of the death of William D'Olier, important witness in the Queens county sewer contract investigation, was given impetus today with the report of the Queens county grand jury that he had been murdered. At first it was believed he was a suicide.

D'Olier, president of the sanitation corporation which received subcontracts in the building of Queens county sewers, in which work it is alleged \$16,000,000 in graft was taken by various parties, was found shot to death on a lonely road in Queens county September 2.

Police listed the death as a suicide but on the insistence of D'Olier's widow and other members of his family, an investigation was started. The grand jury heard 18 witnesses but failed to discover who killed him.

D'Olier was to have been a witness in the trial of former borough president, Maurice E. Connolly and Frederick E. Seely, former Queens engineer of sewer design, now under way.

### SANTA FE WINS FIRST CONTEST IN RAIL SCRAP

#### SCORE OVER MISSOURI PACIFIC IN FIGHT FOR EXTENSION

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The first round in a contest between the Santa Fe railroad and the Missouri Pacific System over the right to build a new railroad to serve Texas Sulphur producing operations was won today before the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Santa Fe.

H. C. Davis, examiner, assigned to investigate the competitive proposal, advised the commission to allow the Santa Fe to build, through a subsidiary, into the Boling Dome territory and to reject the Missouri Pacific's proposal, which sought permission for similar extension.

The Santa Fe project would involve construction of 35 miles of

new line by the Cane Belt railroad reaching a connection with the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe rails at Thompsons, Texas. This would enable the Santa Fe to shorten distances over its present system and to reach the sulphur operations more adequately.

The Missouri Pacific proposal, presented by its subsidiary, the St. Louis, Brownsville, and Mexico, calls for construction of 25 miles of line northwestward from Brazoria and construction of nine miles additional from a point on the Galveston-Houston and Henderson.

The two lines would accomplish the purpose of reaching the Sulphur Dome. The report to the commission should be permitted and that Missouri Pacific extension should be denied as "wasteful competition."

The commission itself will investigate further and hear arguments before announcing final decision.

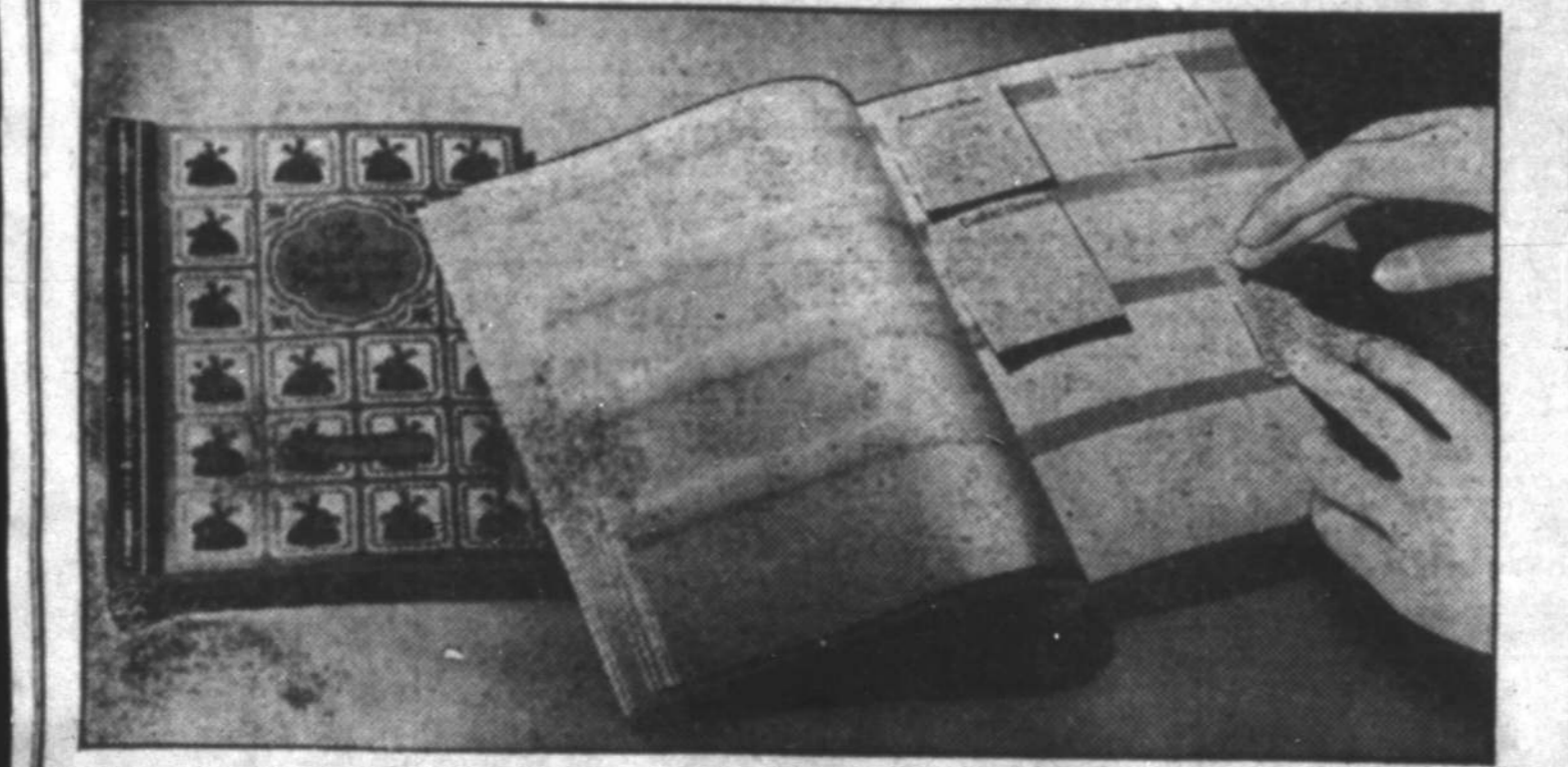

HOGAN AND COCHRANE CONCEDED EDGE OVER WILSON AND BENGOUGH OF LEADERS

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—As is the case in several other features of play, the Giants and Athletics, pursuing clubs in the big league pennant chase, are better equipped behind the bat than the Cardinals or the Yankees.

Frank Hogan, fulfilling John McGraw's expectations, has developed into the best all-around young catcher in the majors. As yet Hogan is not as finished a workman as Mickey Cochrane, the Athletics ace, who probably is at the head of the backstop list, but the Giants' receiver has all the qualifications of greatness.

Hogan, the hardest hitting backstop in either league now, no matter how he raises otherwise. His heavy sticking has had much to do with keeping the Giants in the thick of the pennant fight. His sturdy frame has plenty of endurance. Jimmy Wilson, who came from the Phillies, takes care of the Cardinal back stopping in excellent fashion. Wilson is steady, fast and resourceful but he has fallen off considerably at bat this year, dropping to around 360 after being a 300 clubber at Philadelphia.

The Yankees have three first-classers, two of whom are somewhat mediocre. Ben Bengough, 25, best of the lot, is fast and fairly consistent at bat although not as much a slugger as Pat Collins, whose longevity is a handicap except when profiting his hits. Grabowski, 27, is a hard hitter and a good runner. He has been a consistent performer in the past.

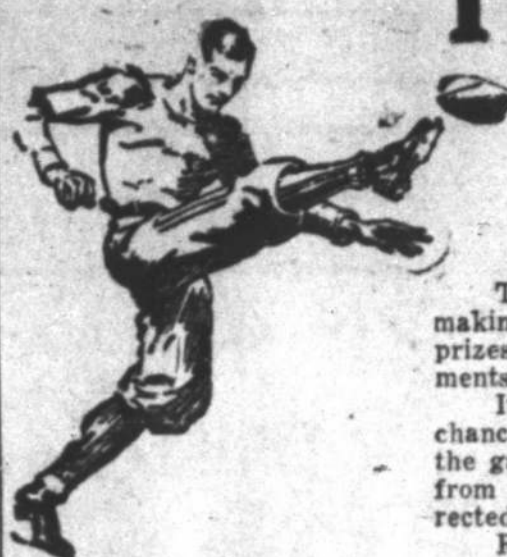

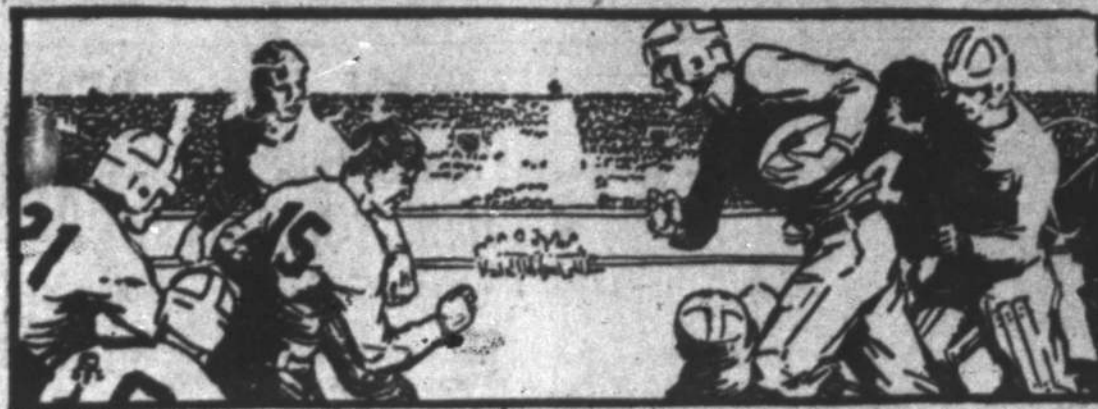

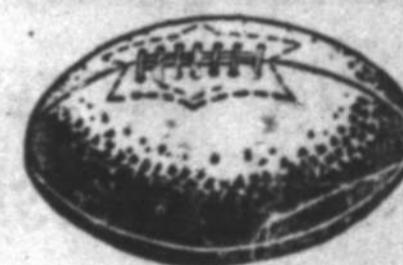

# Uptown Dance Palace Will Open In Fine New Building On Saturday Night

## Ell Hoover Is To Be In Charge Of Newest Amusement Center; He Will Personally Direct Entire Project

"Paul Whiteman of Plains" Comes Here to Operate New Venture; Big Crowd Expected at Opening.

Lubbock's place as the amusement center of the South Plains will be in her highest tomorrow night with the grand opening of the Uptown Dance Palace, at the corner of 8th Street and Texas Avenue, under the management of Ell Hoover.

Open Every Week Night. The Uptown Dance Palace, said to be the finest this side of Kansas City, will be open every night except Sundays, with free dancing from 8:30 to 9 o'clock.

Nothing has been spared to make this new amusement hall the height of refinement. Ample room is provided for those who desire to dance, but want to watch the dancers and hear the music.

The palace is beautifully decorated, with green leaves and varicolored streamers hanging from the lofty ceiling. A color scheme of pale blue is carried out throughout the building which lends an enchanting atmosphere to the surroundings.

The best in music will be provided for the city at all times, Mr. Hoover says. It is planned to bring new orchestras here from time to time.

The band will occupy a raised platform five feet in height at the rear of the palace. The back tier of the orchestra is seven feet high. All of the furnishings of the building blend to create a pleasing effect.

With the best of music obtainable and with the finest floor in this section, it is expected that the opening tomorrow will draw several thousand persons to the innovation of this new amusement place.

In addition to the numerous lights along the lofty ceiling of the building, floor lights will be provided. During waltzes the lights will be dimmed to produce the "dreamy walls" atmosphere.

The orchestra platform is well lighted, with special feature lights facing the dancing floor.

## Dock Workers Use Riot In Australia

PORT ADELAIDE, Australia, Sept. 28 (AP)—The strike of dock workers reached a stage of violent rioting in this port today. Disorders began when 2,500 men invaded docks and thrashed the "volunteers," who have taken the place of union workers, injuring ten severely.

Later an effort was made to reach workers on ships in the outer harbor, but police had been reinforced with mounted men and though the crowd charged repeatedly, it finally was repulsed and returned to Port Adelaide.

Local trades unionists have been bitter in denunciation of ship owners, the course of the government and the findings of the arbitration court. They have refused to follow the advice of the union leaders, who told them to accept the award of "two pickups" daily and go back to work.

## Much Lumber Used In New Dance Hall

Lumber used in the construction of the Uptown Dance Palace, on corner of 8th Street and Texas Avenue, was furnished by the Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber company.

It is estimated that eighty or ninety thousand feet of lumber was used.

The building is constructed throughout with the very finest lumber possible.

The hard wood oak floors are one of the features of the entire structure.

The building was built to meet the requirements of the city's ordinance and is fireproof through out.

## Fireproof Dance Palace Built By Hall's Operators

J. D. Tucker and J. B. Arnot Own Five Dance Halls In The Southwest; Valuation Here \$40,000.

Construction of the Uptown Dance Palace, 8th Street and Texas Avenue, which opens tomorrow night, was under the direction of the Tucker-Arnot Construction company of Amarillo and Lubbock.

This building is fireproof throughout and is one of the sturdiest constructions possible.

J. D. Tucker and J. B. Arnot, constructors of the edifice, have leased the building and will be in charge of it. They have five other similar dance palaces in the Southwest.

With a capacity of several thousand persons, the building is 100 by 125. The arch dome held up by seven massive steel arches is twenty-seven feet from the floor.

Valued at \$40,000. Permit for the construction of the building was \$15,000, but it is said that the structure will be valued at almost \$40,000. The building is equipped with four exits, and is well ventilated.

The building is constructed of Reliance brick, forming one of the best looking structures of the city.

Alva Akers did the painting of the building. He has made an artistic blend of the decorations, of which the owners are proud.

A tunnel awning extending from the front entrance to the edge of the curb will protect the patron from rain. The hardwood floor of the palace is laid in the log cabin style, forming the smoothest type of dance floor.

Asphalt occupies a position of increasing importance in the foreign trade of the United States.

## DENY MEXICAN PAPERS ENTRY

VIOLATE LAW THROUGH CARRYING OF LIQUOR ADVERTISEMENTS

BROWNSVILLE, Sept. 28.—Hundreds of Mexican newspapers were denied entry into the United States here today on orders from customs and postal authorities on the grounds that they violated the law against the circulation of liquor and lottery advertisements in this country.

Though laws against circulation of liquor and lottery advertisements has been in existence for many years the papers have been admitted in the past. Readers say that immediately after passage of the law papers would arrive with the advertisements obliterated, either cut from pages or obliterated in printing. In the last two years, however, they assert that the papers have been entering the country intact.

Postmaster G. W. Bennett, who announced the move, said it was

done on orders from customs authorities. United States Collector of Customs W. A. Neale refused to comment, other than to say, "There is work being done for the United States customs service that is not for publication."

Mexico City, Tampico and Monterey papers were most numerous among those returned to the publishers. These papers have a heavy circulation here. Papers addressed to subscribers in other cities, coming through the Brownsville post-office also were returned.

**McWhorter's Senate Seat Is In Jeopardy So He Issues Eloquent Appeal To Voters Through Washington Scribe**

 WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Senator J. Boomhower McWhorter's re-election to the Senate is in some doubt, according to confidential advisers from the senator's home state.  
 If there's anything that Senator McWhorter, dislikes in an election, it's opposition. And now there's a rather potent one after his job. This is not the same game which gave him such a close race in 1922.  
 The senator's enemies say he saved him, but the senator insists it was his own stroke of genius. The night before election he put all the McWhorter precinct workers to killing spiders, whereupon it rained so hard that all farmers trying to get to the polls were bogged in the mud. Some say it would have rained away, but the senator points out that everybody knows it will rain if you kill a spider.  
 This year the senator's opponent arose to confront him just when he thought he had everything all fixed up. In fact, the senator was telling his friends in Washington that all the lesser statement back home were willing to take minor jobs and that this would allow him to go stumping the country for the national ticket with all expenses paid when the bad news sent him rushing home.  
 The cause of the slip-up is something of a mystery. When Senator McWhorter went to the national campaign headquarters to tell the national chairman that he was already to start out, the national chairman suggested that he had better be watching his own fences because it would be a terrific loss to the party if McWhorter were to fall of re-election.

 Anyway, the senator is back on the firing line, making two or three speeches a day. His evening speech is a powerful tribute to the Star-Spangled Banner. The senator believes that Old Glory is a grand old flag and demands that the members you reach the goal with your body mangled and your face all scarred and torn in battle with an enemy to that which is sacred and right than there is in walking in victorious unscathed and without a struggle—yet an Hoover demagogue.

 These Warner boys, as may have been noticed, have been doing very well lately, what with their stock leading ten points at a time, their onslaught in the field of talkies, their acquisition of the Stanley theater circuit and their reported taking over of the Keith-Albee circuit. Yes, I can recall a certain cold winter day, not more than two seasons back, when the wisenheimers of Broadway were giving the Warners a very brief lease on life. And they did seem to be headed for the rocks.  
 It was Sam Warner, I am told, who visioned the future of the "talkies" and staked the family shirt on its progress. He died about a year ago.  
 Now that they're large in the amusement limelight, maybe you'd like to hear about the Warner Brothers. There were Al, Sam, Jack and Harry. And they all came more than a million miles from their parents. They landed in Baltimore and settled in Youngstown, Ohio. There two of them opened a bicycle repair shop, in the pre-garage days. Sam had a nose for the show. He went to Broadway and got himself a job in a show-shop. His pioneering eventually stered all the brothers in the show direction.  
 Today Harry, 48, is the president. Albert is the business man, and Jack, when not in New York, superintends the Hollywood plant.  
 It was, if I remember, just about a year ago that I was doing an interview with Harry Warner. And he said something like this:  
 "Put this down and stick it in your hat. . . a year from now these wise birds of this business won't be able to recognize their own industry. It will have been turned upside down and inside-out."  
 One hears such comments daily about Broadway. Had this scribbler headed he might now be driving speed-boats on the Hudson instead of jolting down here it happened.  
 Which reminds me that Al Johnson was one of the heavy beneficiaries of the market boom in Warner stock. I am told he made more than a million—and he is already a millionaire.  
 The other day, talking things over in his niche in the Ritz Towers—that gratia-like buildings "just off the avenue"—Johnson insisted that they were "paper profits".  
 An unusual and highly interesting personality is this "biggest box office attraction." His face is tanned to a plum-colored hue. He wears a suit to match the peculiar shade and sits in a chair that seems to have been matched from the same cloth. He's moody and ingenious, suggesting often the melancholy of one of his mammy songs.  
 On this particular day, a theatrical weekly had reported him engaged to marry little Ruby Keeler, the "tap dancer."  
 "And that's the way it goes," he was saying. "I'm going to get out of this town for a while—going to London and get away over in Europe. It's not all it's cracked up to be, this funny way life has of drifting. You seem to be sitting on top of the world. But are you? Take me . . . I don't know for sure whether or not I've got a real friend. I know I've got plenty of yes men. But are they friends? I like to go to theaters and to play around. And yet, if I'm seen with the show girl more than twice, the tabloids come along and say I'm going to marry. And that's the way it goes."

### CROSBY MAKES BUMPER CROP

COTTON FAIR AND FEED FINE, SURVEY MADE IN COUNTY SHOWS

CROSBYTON, Sept. 28.—Crosby county is harvesting one of the greatest feed crops in its history. All kinds of grain sorghums have done much better than was expected and many fields are making a record breeding crop. Some fields are making as high as three tons per acre. It is estimated that about one half the feed made in the county will be shipped after the farmers have stored enough for their feed next year.

Cotton is going to be much better than was expected. It is estimated that there will be more cotton made in the county this year than was made last year. Several bales have been ginned at Crosbyton and within the next ten days picking will be in full swing. Cotton pickers will be in great demand this year as the cotton is too large to be gleaned.

### PEVEHOUSE DECLARES PLAN MAY BE FORMULATED WHEREBY RURAL PUPILS MAY BE ELIGIBLE TO ENTER COLLEGE

Open challenge that a successful plan can be worked out for students in the rural schools to step into Tech college without the necessity of having to attend an affiliated city high school for one year has been made by W. M. Pevehouse, county school superintendent.

Mr. Pevehouse states that with proper instruction and coaching it will be possible for the rural students to pass the entrance examinations, eliminating the expense of having to send the pupils to the city high school for a year. He points to five successful attempts of rural school students in the past two years to pass the college examinations. It is his hope to work out a plan of adequate instruction among the teachers providing the back ground for the examination passage.

The affiliation requirement of 15 entrance credits can be met easily with proper instruction, he said. With less than ten affiliated units Eloas Wilke and Ruby Phillips of New Hope this year passed the Tech entrance examinations, and were allowed to enter the school on an equal basis with city high school graduates.

Miss Vera Hall of Monroe was the only rural school student to try the examinations last year. With only 13 units she was given credit for 17 by taking the entrance exam.

W. J. Grimes and Everett Griffin of Acuff this year were admitted to the college with 18 units accepted after passing the examination. They had only 13 previously.

Beating his belief on these five tries, Mr. Pevehouse plans to continue his drive to make the practice universal among all of the rural schools of as many as four teachers.
