Questions and Answers

Q. I'm planning to take farm training under the Korean GI Bill, but I found out I'll have to pay \$30 a month tuition. My cousin, a World War 2 veteran, trained, and the Government paid his tuition. Why the difference?

A. Your cousin trained under the World War 2 GI Bill; you will be training under the Korean GI Bill. They are separate laws, and each operates differently. Under the Korean GI Bill, you pay all training expenses yourself. But you get a single monthly allowance to help do this. Under the World War 2 GI Bill, the VA paid a veteran's training costs.

Q. My husband was killed in Korea, and I've been receiving monthly indemnity payments of \$92.50. Will those payments stop if I remarry?

A. No. Remarriage will not bar your continued entitlement to the indemnity payments.

Q. I am a Korean veteran and I'm thinking of opening a business. I will have to wait for several years in order to accumulate enough cash. When I'm ready, will I be able to get a GI business loan, or is the program due to expire soon?

A. You will have plenty of time to get your GI loan. The Korean GI Bill loan program will not expire until ten years after the end of the present emergency.

Q. I'm planning to take flight training under the Korean GI Bill. Will I be allowed 30 days absence a year, the same as veterans taking trade and vocational courses?

A. No. Under the Korean GI Bill, you will be paid on the basis of flight instruction actually received—and nothing more. You will not be paid for absences.

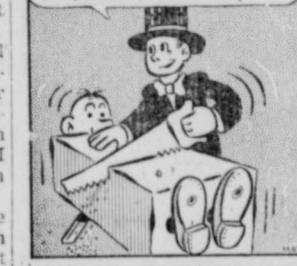

Farmers who are faced with the problem of increasing farm operational costs may be able to lower them by using improved fertilizer and other cultural practices.

Investigations and experiments show that improved practices, as compared with farm practices currently used, can cut the cost of producing a bushel of wheat from \$1.65 to \$1.28, of oats from 90 cents to 69 cents, and of corn from \$1.21 to \$1.02. Recommended practices also lowered the cost of producing a ton of alfalfa-brome grass hay from \$16.80 to \$13.30 and a ton of sugar beets from \$12.21 to \$8.19. All this means more profit to the farmer.

The recommended practices which are best suited for particular areas may be obtained from county agricultural agents or the Texas Extension Service. Researchers have found that it is necessary to spend more money per acre to follow proved practices but the resulting greater per-acre yields more than offset the extra expense.

An example can be found in the production of corn in a mid-western state. Where the farmer spends \$46 an acre to produce 38 bushels of corn, he could spend \$62.25 an acre and produce 61 bushels of corn on each acre.

Fertilizer plays a big role in this increase. Other factors are involved such as timely planting, use of adapted varieties of seed, seed treatment, crop rotation, soil management, tillage and weed control. Each of these help lower production costs.

While Texas is a leading producer of many commodities, such as cotton, it is an uncomfortable fact that it ranks low in actual per-acre yields. We have enough land to produce tremendous amounts of crops, but we are not taking full advantage of the soil's capacity to produce per acre.

In these days of high production costs, it is definitely to the farmer's advantage to practice every known measure to increase his per-acre productivity and assure himself of more gain for effort expended.

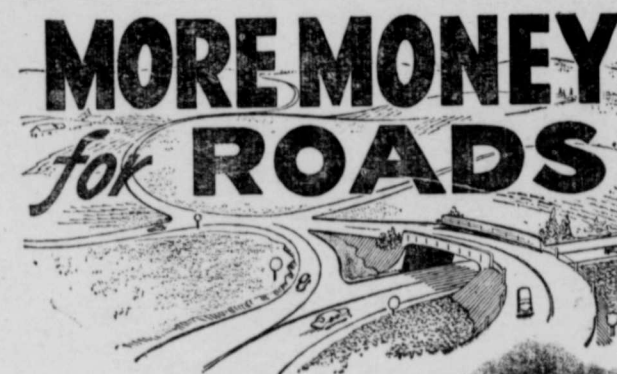
