The body of a Snyder man was recovered at 6:15 p.m., Friday following a six day long search at Lake

Colorado City, according to local Game Warden Ronnie Aston.

After a week of unsuccessful attempts of dragging the lake for the 34-year-old Henry Borego, the victim's body was recovered Friday when he was spotted by a fisherman.

Justice of the Peace Mary Lee Moore pronounced him dead at the scene.

According to other persons, from which the boat

that Borego fell, he was in the jump seat of a bass boat and disappeared at approximately 3 a.m. Saturday, March 13, after the boat made a turn.

The body was taken to Kiker-Seale Funeral Home of Colorado City and transported to Big Spring where an autopsy was scheduled earlier in the week.

some areas of the United States. This is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars; the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with L.S.D. and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can also occur through the skin by simply handling the paper or tatoo.

There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse, (dressed as a sorcerer's apprentice), Dopey, and possibly other Disney characters. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse. They are wrapped in foil in a clear, lock-type bag. They have most often been found in five, one-inch square sheets of stamps.

These are new ways of selling ACID (L.S.D.) - a young child could happen to come upon these and have a fatal "trip." It is also feared that little children could be given a free "tatoo" by older children who want to have some fun. It is important that all parents be alerted in case their child is involved, even innocently.

Should your child come in contact with any of the above tatoos or paper tab transfers described above, please contact the District Attorney's office or any of the local law enforcement officials at once.

NOTICE TO HOMESTEAD OWNERS OVER 65

House Bill 885 was amended by Section 165 of HB 30, effective August 14, 1981. It states that a taxpayer who qualified for, but did not receive, the school district over-65 homestead exemption in 1979 has until April 1, 1982, to file a late application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district. The taxpayer would have his tax ceiling for 1982 limited to what it would have been in 1979 had he received the homestead exemption at that time. No refunds are to be given for 1980 or 1981.
