New County Policy On Culverts

At a recent meeting of Aransas County Commissioners Court the following policy recommended by Commissioner W. B. Allen regarding culverts was adopted:

"That previous policy of the county to furnish culvert pipe in driveways entering into private property be eliminated to coincide with State Highway and City of Rockport rules and regulations.

"Aransas County will supervise the laying of such culvert pipe only after requests for driveway is made to commissioner in his precinct.

"The only pipe and driveways to be furnished by the county in the future shall be first approved by the Commissioners Court upon proof that the county by means of ditches has destroyed ingress and egress to private property where a home or business pre-existed.

"Permits may be obtained from the commissioner or the county judge's office."

Aliens to File Addresses By Jan. 31

Joe F. Staley of the Immigration Service reminded aliens in this area today that Wednesday is the deadline for filing address report forms as required under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act.

The Immigration official urged aliens who have not yet filed their address reports to do so no later than Jan. 31 to avoid possible penalties.

Staley said the law required that every alien except those having diplomatic status and representatives of certain international organizations must file the address report during January of each year at the nearest Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service office.

Qualifications For City Voters

Following is a list of qualifications for persons who wish to vote in the referendum election Feb. 13 on whether the city should get its water from the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District.

1. Over 21 years of age.
2. Shall have resided in the state one year next preceding the election.
3. Shall have resided in the City Limits for six months.
4. Shall have registered as a voter, (1967 voter registration receipt) or shall be over 60 years of age on the day of the election.
5. Shall own taxable property in the City and have duly rendered same for taxation. (May have been rendered by the Tax Assessor-Collector.)

Other pertinent information: If a person of voting age resides with his or her parents, they cannot vote unless they have taxable property listed on the tax roll in their own name.

A husband may vote if the property in the wife's name on the tax rolls is community property. He would not be eligible if the property in his wife's name is her separate property.

If a person meets all voter requirements except having taxable property on the tax roll listed in his name—but is a partner in a business which has rendered taxable property on the tax roll, he may vote. (This does not include stockholders in a corporation.)

City Buys Site For Water Well

The City Council has authorized the purchase of a site for a new water well from William Bloch and M. W. Cochran in the northwest section of the city. Purchase price will be \$750.

The decision was made at the Council meeting Monday night after Commissioner of Public Works Tom Shults reported that chemical analysis tests from a test hole had shown the water was satisfactory.

Mayor Delmar R. Hiller commented, "It looks like we will need one more well this summer and possibly another next summer to meet the heavy demands for water during the warm weather."

He pointed out that the proposed new water supply to be furnished by the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District involved a project that could not be completed before the summer of 1969 at the earliest.

In other actions, the Council:

—Passed a new city ordinance regarding disturbing the peace, covering such matters as unnecessary noise.

—Appointed Bobby Landrum, Edwin H. Tenge and Col. Walter Falk, Jr., to the Board of Equalization.

—Approved construction of an addition to the Boy Scout Hut which is located on city property.

Water Project Election Called

The City Council on Monday night called a referendum election for Feb. 13 when voters in the city will decide whether to authorize the Council to enter into a contract with the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District for the purchase of treated water to supply the city with its water supply requirements.

CITY GENERAL ELECTION APR. 6

The City general election has been set for April 6 by the City Council.

Offices to be voted on are the mayor and aldermen of Wards 1 and 2. The deadline for filing is March 4.

Mayor Delmar R. Hiller has announced that he will seek re-election for another two-year term. So has N. C. Vandagriff, alderman in Ward 1. Mrs. J. W. "Tony" Harden of Ward 2 said, "I haven't decided."

Hiller said, "I feel that I've come to a better understanding of what the community's needs are and what the people want, after having worked with these problems for two years."

"I've learned enough to enable me to do a better job."

Judge at the election will be Mrs. Elbert Mundine. Alternate judge will be Mrs. Bernice Ingersoll.

Spring Concert Planned By Chorus

From this storage reservoir, the water would be pumped into the City of Rockport's distribution system and to existing distribution systems in the county and to proposed distribution systems in Aransas County that would be constructed as part of this project.

The estimated project cost (continued on page 8)

Under this contract, the District would finance and construct the \$2,450,700 project, purchase treated water from the San Patricio District, and would implement major expansions to the system in the future as required.

Upon completion of construction of the project, the City would operate and maintain the system, set water rates (subject to the approval of the District) and collect the water bills.

The City would pay the District a base monthly payment which would cover the following: 1) interest and principal on the District's outstanding bonds, and 2) the District's fixed expenses.

Both the base monthly payment and price per 1,000 gallons would be reviewed by both the City and the District and agreed to before service begins, and would be reviewed periodically thereafter.

The amount of these payments would be only sufficient to pay the District's cost plus a reasonable reserve for improvement, extension and replacement of the facilities on a needed basis.

In summary, the proposed contract would accomplish the following:

- 1) Permit financing of the project (by HUD grant and loan from the Texas Water Development Board.)
- 2) Permit construction of the project by the District.
- 3) Permit the District to make a purchase contract for water from the San Patricio District.
- 4) Cover provisions for repayment of the loan from the Water Development Board.
- 5) Cover provisions under which the City will operate the project.
- 6) Provide the City with funds for additional water line construction within the City.
- 7) Insure maintenance and future expansion of the project as required to meet needs.

The scope of the project covered by the contract includes the construction of a supply line beginning in the vicinity of Ingleside and terminating in a storage reservoir to be located west of Rockport.

EDITOR'S VIEWPOINTS

LAWYERS FOR FREE

In its zeal to solve all the problems of the poor, the Government has just launched a new program in northern Wisconsin under which citizens with low incomes are given the unexpected privilege of hiring lawyers of their own choosing at Government expense.

The program, financed by \$240,181 out of poverty funds, is not intended to supplant existing legal aid in criminal cases, for example, where courts normally appoint lawyers when necessary. Rather it offers low-income people a chance to hire lawyers in such matters as divorce actions, welfare disputes, and landlord-tenant problems. It may be, as proponents of this scheme argue, that the poor people of northern Wisconsin really need this sort of Washington-endowed benevolence. There's no gainsaying the fact that poor people, like everybody else, sometimes run into problems that require the services of a lawyer.

Still, we think there must be better ways of improving the lot of the poor than by subsidizing a service that many a middle-income taxpayer would consider a luxury.—National Observer.

MILESTONE FOR LEARNING

It has been 20 years since President Truman signed that Fulbright Act, authorizing an educational exchange program on an international basis, is long since assured. The Fulbright fellow and the Fulbright scholar have become ubiquitous presences around the world.

During the years since the first scholarship recipient was selected, some 48,000 students have gone abroad from the United States or have come from abroad to the United States. Nearly 17,500 scholars have lectured or done research under the program; some 10,000 foreign elementary and high school teachers have come to the United States to teach, to study or to observe in our schools.

The international educational exchange program was designed to increase international understanding and to strengthen international bonds. There probably is not a more worthy or useful purpose in an era when the world sometimes seems to be coming apart at the seams.—Chicago Sun Times.

In challenging the World Association for the Celebration of the Year 2000, C. L. Harris of Reatherstone, England, resurrects an old teaser. He says that the W.A.C.Y. 2000 is one year off in urging cities to plant "celebration trees" for A.D. 2000. Girl Scouts of the Paisano Girl Scout Council will begin their annual cookie sale at 4 p.m. on Friday, Jan. 26. The sale will last until Feb. 11 in the Rockport-Fulton-Lamar neighborhood.

Five kinds of cookies will be sold by Junior, Cadette and Senior Girl Scouts. They are assorted vanilla and chocolate sandwich cookies, mint cookies, peanut butter, butter shortbread, and ko-ko cookies. The cookies sell for 50 cents a box.

The profits from the cookie sale provide camping facilities and equipment. The swimming pool at Camp Green Hill at Mathis was built with cookie sale profits. Tents and other equipment for outdoor program activities have been acquired. In addition, five per cent of the profits are put into the Memorial Fund. The fund helps make it possible for girls and adults to participate in regional, national and international Girl Scout events.

Troops which participate in the cookie sale receive a troop bonus. They receive a minimum of three cents and a maximum of five cents per box, depending on the number of boxes sold. Troops may also earn a piece of equipment (flag, reflector oven, first aid kit, cooking set, grill, or a weekend at camp if the troop's sales average a designated amount). Individual Scouts who sell 28 cartons or 336 boxes will be awarded two weeks at Camp Green Hill in the summer.

Cookies are in foil packages and were baked approximately three weeks ago. They keep well in the freezer.

Check on Your Social Security Account

Do you receive social security credit for the wages or profit you earn? Make certain that you do—by checking your social security record with the central accounting office of the Social Security Administration. It is recommended that everyone do this about every three years.

"Most people know that they get retirement insurance at age 62 or 65 or later, but some do not realize that the amount of their insurance is determined from the amount of earnings which have been credited to the social security account," H. M. Cleveland, Social Security District Manager in Corpus Christi pointed out.

Upon request, your social security office will furnish a post card form, Request for Statement of Earnings, to fill out and mail to check your record. In reply, you will receive a statement showing the total earnings credited to your account. After checking the reply, if your record is not correct, you should get in touch with your social security office for proper action. The forms can be secured from the Social Security Administration, 1802 South Staples St., Corpus Christi.

UNCLE SAM'S SELECTIVE SERVICE
Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Col. Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. 9th Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—Do the parents of a young man registered with a draft board have a right to see their son's file at the board?
A—No. A man may authorize the board in writing, over his signature, to show his record to parents, wife, or any person.

Q—Can a business to whom a young man owes money get his latest address from the draft board?
A—No.

Q—Are insurance salesmen able to get home or mailing address of young men scheduled to be called into service to counsel them about insurance?
A—No.

Q—Is it possible to find out how any young man is classified?
A—Yes, anyone is entitled to see this on the board's Classification Record, or on the bulletin board after local board meetings; but the young man's record, on which the classification is based, is confidential between the board and him.

Q—Is the public permitted to know who has been ordered for physical examination or induction?
A—Yes.

Q—Does a draft board function behind closed doors?

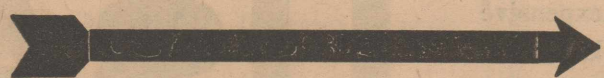

Shrimp Landings In December Sets New Record

Landings of headless shrimp at Texas ports in December amounted to 3.1 million pounds. This was the highest December landings on record for Texas ports by over 600,000 pounds and brought the 1967 total Texas landings to 64.1 million pounds valued at 45.9 million dollars to fishermen and/or vessel owners, according to Orman H. Farley, Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Galveston.

Matagorda-Palacios, 78,700, Dec. 1967; 1,480,000, Jan.-Dec. 1967; 939,200, Jan.-Dec. 1966. Port Lavaca-Port O'Connor-Seadrift: 129,900, Dec. 1967; 3,396,700, Jan.-Dec. 1967; 2,156,500, Jan.-Dec. 1966.

Trawl vessels working adjacent waters were confined to port about 8 days during the month as a series of winter frontal systems moved across the state adding desperately needed water to the northeast estuarine systems along the coast. Vessels working brown shrimp made broken trips with catches of 200-600 pounds per night. Some large vessels with 55 to 60 foot nets worked waters between 30-50 fathoms and reported trip averages of 600 pounds per night. Vessels working waters out to 30 fathoms caught considerably less per comparable time. Sampling trawls in waters beyond 60 fathoms were reportedly unproductive in waters south and east of Aransas Pass and Mansfield. Vessels working white shrimp from northeast of Aransas Pass to Cameron, La., made only fair catches of 200 pounds per day in 3 to 9 fathoms with sporadic 500 pound daily catches of small 41 to 65 count shrimp adjacent to estuarine inlets. Bay catches were poor as the 1967 season closed to regular shrimp trawls. Again sampling of juvenile populations in bays indicated an abundance of small white shrimp but the

commercial harvest continued poor.

Several trawl vessels from Florida and northern Gulf ports returned to Texas waters in December as the Tortugas winter fishery continued only fair to poor without signs of encouragement of better to come. Long-range trawlers made their usual exodus to Campeche with anticipations of only marginal pink shrimp populations based on early trips on these distant grounds. All in all, waters beyond 30 fathoms off Texas, Louisiana, and the east coast of Mexico will sustain a sizable portion of the domestic shrimp fleet during winter months.

The oyster fishery in Texas bays continued somewhat slower than anticipated with a harvest of about 35,000 barrels compared with 45,000 barrels in December 1966. The current decline is largely attributed to factors other than availability of workable reefs. Cold temperatures and optimum freshwater intrusion is expected to produce prime quality oysters for the spring harvest. Low tides resulting from sustained northerly winds rendered some areas of Galveston Bay unworkable, however, this situation exists many times during winter months but is normally short-lived.

Landings of blue crabs amounted to about 60,000 pounds in December compared with 107,000 pounds in December 1966. Weather conditions were largely responsible for the decline as rough waters and the holiday season kept small craft confined to port most of the month.

Texas ports of Aransas Pass, Freeport, Port Lavaca, Galveston, and Brownsville-Port Isabel, each exceeded the combined landings of the states of Mississippi and Alabama, and each exceeded the total landings of the state of Florida. Texas ports accounted for 45 percent of all Gulf landings followed by Louisiana with 34 percent. The records established along the entire coast of Texas, except the Sabine area, resulted from a combination of excellent weather from June through November, early movement of brown shrimp from nursery areas, a large increase in out-of-state vessels arriving early and remaining throughout the year, and the continued entrance of larger vessels and gear into the shrimp fishery. One severe storm hit the south Texas coast and damaged or destroyed some 120 vessels, however, the large number of vessels working unaffected ports coupled with the mobility of dockside processors kept overall production losses below significant levels.

At the close of the year expansion was in various stages of completion at Brownsville, Port Lavaca, and Galveston, and was under consideration at other major ports.

TAX REFUNDS CANNOT BE MADE WITHOUT W-2 FORM

Tax refunds cannot be paid without required W-2 withholding tax certificates and credit cannot be given for taxes withheld, according to Asa L. Crow, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service, Corpus Christi.

Taxpayers were also reminded that in preparing a joint 1967 return, where both parties worked, W-2's for each must be attached. And when either or both parties filing a return held more than one job during the year, all W-2's must be attached.

A taxpayer who has not received his W-2 Form should contact his employer before checking with IRS. If the employer has gone out of business, the taxpayer should contact him or the present owner of the business. If the Form W-2 is still not available, then the taxpayer should prepare his income tax return from the best information at hand, file his return by the April 15 deadline, and attach a note explaining why the Form W-2 is missing.

- 1) Grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$950,700. Grant commitment has been received.
- 2) Loan from the Texas Water Development Board in the amount of \$1,220,000 is approved.
- 3) The District's revenue bonds in the amount of \$280,000 to be sold on the open market.

If the contract is approved by the voters, Rockport's existing water wells would be used for emergencies only when the new system was completed. Completion is expected by the summer of 1969.

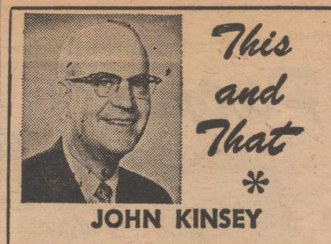

With the deadline for registration only a few days away, Texas voters over 60 years old have been reminded of a new law which requires every voter to register, regardless of age or place of residence. Heretofore, voters over 60 years old were required to register only if they lived in a city of 10 thousand or more inhabitants.

Wednesday of next week, Jan. 31, is the last day to apply for a registration certificate. Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill issued the reminder statement summarizing registration requirements. As Secretary of State, Hill also has the title of chief election officer of Texas. He said that anyone who is now elig-

ible to vote or who will become eligible by Feb. 28, 1969, may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and Feb. 28, 1969, may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and runs through February of 1969.

Hill emphasized that registration for most voters will close on Wednesday of next week, and they will not be permitted to register after that date. The only persons who may register after the

Jan. 31 deadline are new residents who move to Texas after Oct. 1, 1967, and persons who become 21 years old or become naturalized citizens after Jan. 31, 1968.

An application form printed in today's paper may be used to apply for a registration certificate by mail. The law provides the applications by mail must bear a postmark not later than Jan. 31. An application which is mailed too late to be postmarked on that date does not comply with the law, even though it is deposit-

ed in a letter box or a post office drop box before the deadline. This reminder is especially important for patrons of small post offices, some of which close as early as 5 o'clock in the afternoon. Voters may also register in person at the county tax assessor-collector's office or at any of the registration substations which will be open for the remainder of the registration period.

Brief Articles On the Draft Law And Regulations

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of 10 short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

When a man is classified by the draft board that classification is not permanent. It may be changed when, in the judgment of the local board, the classification is no longer warranted.

Each classified man and each person who has filed a request for the man's deferment must report to the local board in writing any fact that might result in the man's being placed in a different classification. This must be done within 10 days after the change occurs.

The local board may reopen and consider a new classification of a man (1) upon his written request, (2) written request of a person who claims to be his dependent, or (3) any person who has on file a written request for the man's occupational deferment. This can be done, provided the request for reopening is accompanied by written facts not considered when the man was first classified, which, if true,

would justify a change in his classification.

Draft regulations say that the "classification of a registrant shall not be reopened after the local board has mailed to such registrant an order to report for induction, unless the local board first specifically finds there has been a change in the registrant's status resulting from circumstances over which the registrant had no control."

Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state draft director, points to two things which might happen to a man beyond his control: (1) a serious accident, or (2) death of his father, resulting in his becoming head of the family.

The local board must always reopen a case at either the request of the national or state directors of Selective Service and must cancel any order to report for induction, if that is involved in the case.

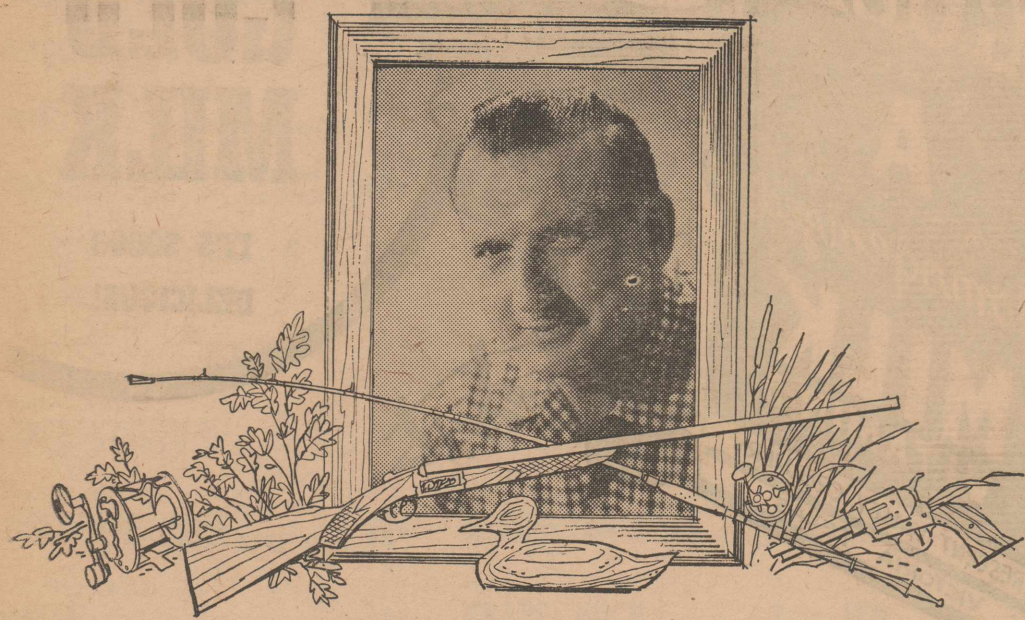

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Uncle Sam's Selective Service

Editor's note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. Ninth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—I am a full-time and satisfactory college student making normal progress toward my baccalaureate degree, and the school has notified my board. I've been classified in I-A. Why wasn't I given a II-S deferment?

A—Probably because you didn't request it. You must request a II-S student classification in writing before it can be granted. You may make this application on SSS Form No. 104, obtainable at the board and at most schools, or by letter.

Q—What is the maximum penalty that can be assessed for violation of the Selective Service law?

A—Maximum penalty for any one violation, upon prosecution and conviction, is imprisonment of not more than five years, or a fine of not more than \$10,000, or both.

Q—How many men are registered with the Selective Service System, in which classifications are there the greatest number of men, and how many are deferred as students?

A—Currently there are about 35 million men registered with the nation's draft boards. More than 15 million of these are classified in Class V-A (over the age of liability for service); nearly 4 million are in Class III-A (fatherhood and hardship); more than 2½ million are in Class IV-A (mostly veterans and some sole surviving sons). More than 1½ million are deferred as college students, and nearly a half million as high school students.

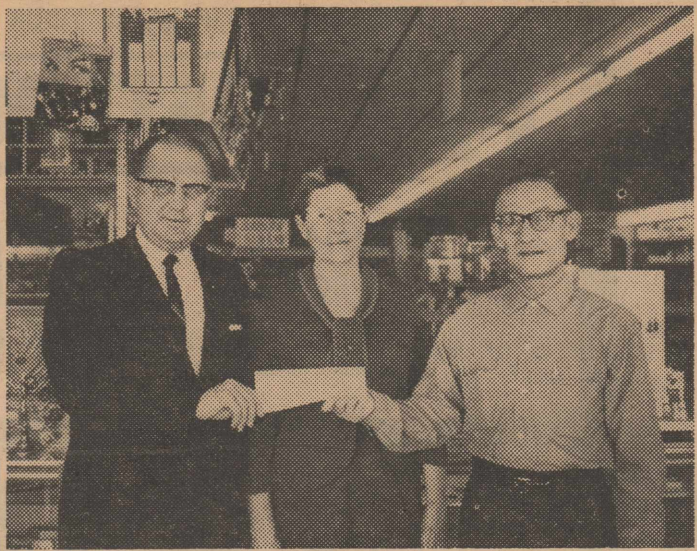

Boss Must Issue Form W-2 By Jan. 31

Employers were reminded today by the Internal Revenue Service that employees should receive two copies of a Withholding Statement, Form W-2, on or before Wednesday, Jan. 31, 1968.

Asa L. Crow, administrative officer of the Internal Revenue Service at Corpus Christi, said "This statement shows the total wages paid and the income tax and Social Security tax withheld, if any, during the calendar year 1967."

Total wages shown on an employee's W-2 must include amounts received as sick pay if it is not required to be shown separately.

If it becomes necessary to correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a revised statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."

Who Must File A Federal Income Tax Return

Austin. — All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1967, must file a Federal income tax return, R. L. Phinney, District Director of Internal Revenue Service in Austin announced today.

If the taxpayer is 65 years old on or before December 31, 1967, he is not required to file unless his gross income for 1967 was at least \$1,200.

Phinney added that even though a tax payer is not required to file under these rules, he must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners, and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self-employment tax, if net earnings from self-employment were \$400 or more.

The Austin District comprises the area south of and including the counties of El Paso, Hudspeth, Culberson, Reeves, Pecos, Terrell, Val Verde, Edwards, Kimble, McCullough, San Saba, Lampasas, Hamilton, Bosque, Somervill, Hill, Limestone, Freestone, Leon, Madison, Walker, Trinity, Polk, Tyler, Jasper, and Newton.

Taxpayers living in the Austin District who "owe" tax should file their returns with the District Director of Internal Revenue, 300 East Eighth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. Taxpayers who have a "refund" due should mail their tax returns in the special envelope provided, or address them to: Internal Revenue Service Center, Southwest Region, Austin, Texas 78740.

Phinney also said that many taxpayers can prepare their own returns by carefully following the instructions provided with the forms.

Benefit Increases — For Persons Now on Rolls

The changes in the social security law signed by President Johnson on Jan. 2 will mean a benefit increase of at least 13 per cent in the social security checks of about 38,000 men, women, and children in the Corpus Christi area.

The increases will go to all 23,700,000 social security beneficiaries around the country in the checks to be delivered early in March.

Beneficiaries need not take any action to get the increase. It will be sent to them automatically.

Some social security beneficiaries will receive more than a 13 per cent increase. The minimum benefit for workers retiring at 65 is increased from \$44 to \$55. For those receiving reduced benefits because of retirement at age 62, the minimum payable may be less than \$55.

The special payment of \$35 a month at age 72 to certain

uninsured individuals will be increased to \$40.

But for most people, the increase will be exactly 13 per cent. For example, a worker now receiving \$100 a month will receive \$13 a month more; a couple now receiving \$150 a month will receive \$19.50 a month more; a widow with two children now receiving \$300 a month will receive \$39 a month more for the family.

In my next article I will discuss the benefit increases future beneficiaries will receive.
