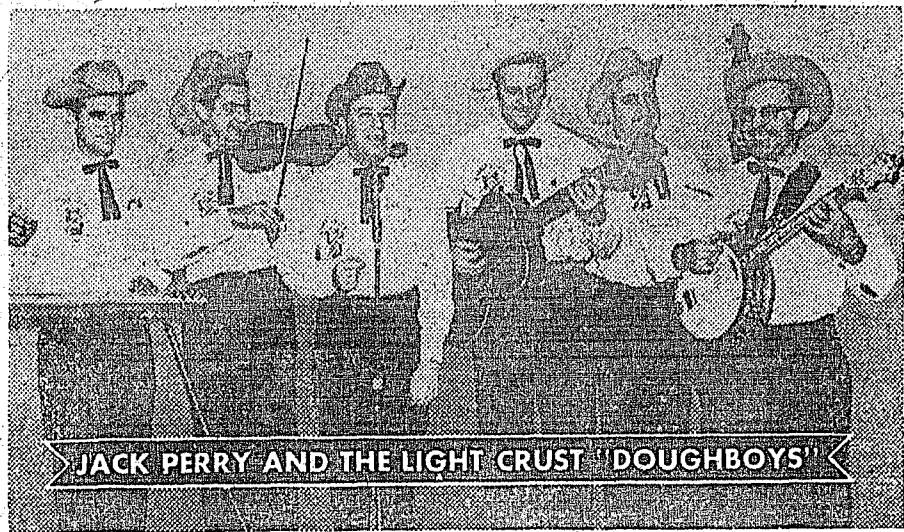

E. D. Shields, better known as Jack, died at 10:00 p. m. Monday, March 18, in the Santa Anna Hospital, where he had been a patient since mid-morning that day. He apparently had not been well the past few days but attempted to keep quite about his condition.

Mrs. Shields left last Thursday for California to visit her mother, who is very ill. She was contacted by telephone Monday night, and she flew to Abilene Tuesday morning where she was met by friends and brought to Santa Anna.

Mr. Shields was the owner and operator of the Shields Blacksmithing and Welding Shop. He was born in Coleman County, August 11, 1897, being 59 years, 7 months and 7 days old at the time of death.

He had lived in Santa Anna or vicinity for a number of years.

He was a member of the First Methodist Church, where services were held at 3:00 p. m. Wednesday. The pastor, Rev. Frank Turner, Jr., officiated.

Burial was in the Whon Cemetery under the direction of the Hosh Funeral Home.

Hospital Receives Second Half Of Ford Grant

The Santa Anna Hospital received their second check in the amount of \$5,000 early this week from the Ford Foundation, to be used for improvements in the hospital. The first part of the Ford Foundation Grant was received last July and has been spent on numerous improvements at the hospital.

W. Tilden Jones, administrator for the hospital, said the board of directors would decide just where the money would be spent. There is several things to receive consideration, such as more equipment for the Physical Therapy room that was added to the hospital recently; reflooring the balance of the hospital; installation of more modern equipment in the operating room and delivery room.

A part of the first half of the grant was used to refloor all of the first floor of the hospital and to purchase air conditioning equipment for the operating room and delivery room. Another part of it was used for the addition of the Physical Therapy room and for its equipment.

Movement To Get Polio Shots For School Children

A movement is underway in the public schools to get Salk Polio Vaccine shots for all the children in the county schools who have not already received them. There is a good possibility that the program will get underway soon, possibly by the first week in April. This would give the first two shots before school is out and the third shot after school begins next fall.

Forms have been sent to parents of all children in both schools and parents are requested to see that these forms get back to the school as soon as possible.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis urges everyone under age 40 years to get the shots before the polio season gets underway. That time is rapidly approaching.

Everyone who has not already been vaccinated may get the shots at the local clinic and they keep records as to when your other shots are due and notify you when to come and take them.

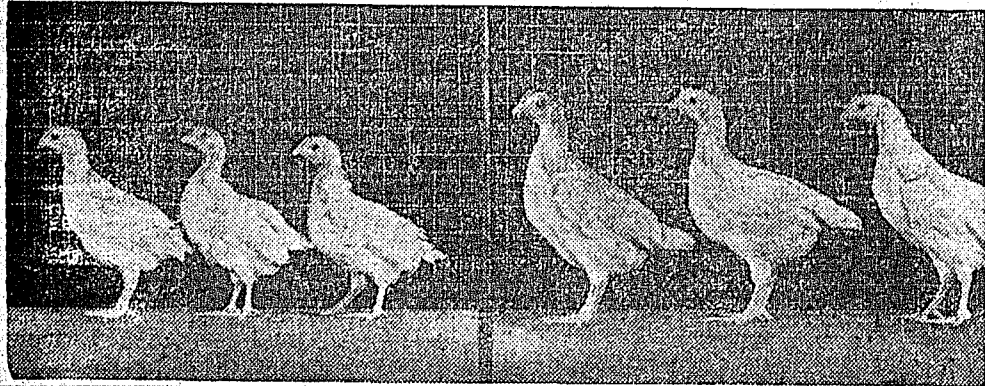

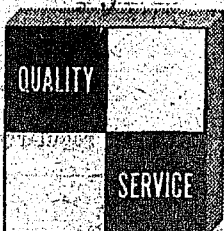

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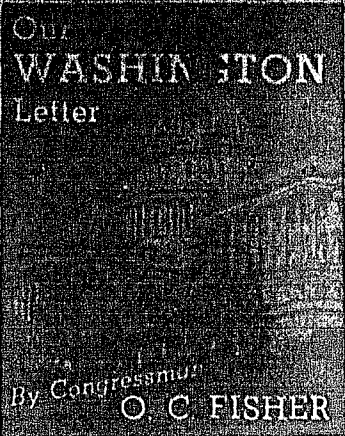

The House did little last week except to pass a resolution, a sort of political maneuver, inviting President Eisenhower to be more specific about a White House suggestion that the Congress would do well to see about trimming the President's budget. While the resolution was rather meaningless, it did serve to further focus the Nation's at-

tention on high level spending for the next fiscal year as recommended by the White House. Essentially the fault for the high budget, and the responsibility to do something about it, lies with the Congress. That is because year after year Congress vote for federal programs which cost money. Many of these programs have been with Administration backing and have grown out of political promises and pressures.

That point is illustrated by the current Civil Rights ruckus, where as a result of minority group political pressure legislation is being pushed to, among other things, create a brand new bureau in the Attorney General's office to handle complaints from any disgruntled citizen who fancies that somebody has interfered with his civil liberties. It envisions a flock of lawyers with staffs to represent these people in lawsuits against other citizens — without charge to the complainants — all at Government expense.

It will be interesting to watch and see how many of those who howl the loudest for economy in government will, when the votes are counted, be found saddling the taxpayers with this added cost annually, for years to come. This example can be multiplied many times over.

Heat nectar with sugar and salt. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in hot nectar. Blend in lemon juice and rind. Cool until slightly thickened. Fold in coconut and stiffly beaten egg white. Pour into molds and chill until firm. Unmold to serve.

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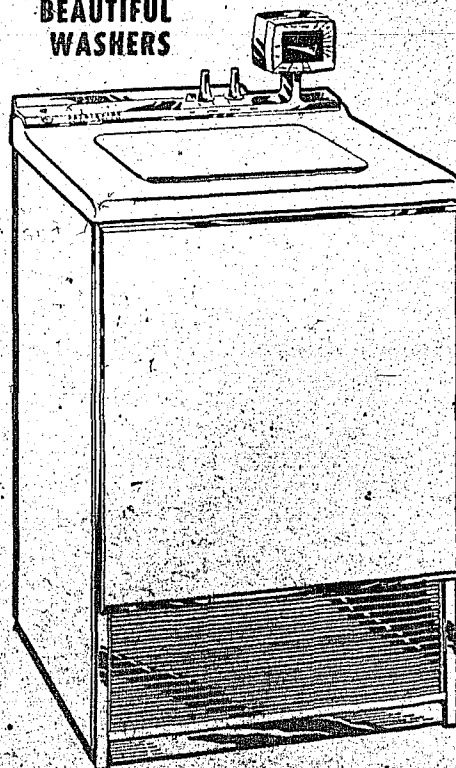

Some Widows Of Servicemen Entitled To More Money

Three of every five widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes before January 1, 1957 have failed to apply for the new increased dependents compensation payments, Dr. George T. McMahan, manager of the Veterans Administration Center in Waco, said today.

The Servicemens and Veterans Survivors Benefits Act, which authorizes the new payments, became effective January 1, 1957.

Widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes before January 1, 1957 may elect to receive the new payments or to continue under the old death compensation, whichever is higher. In most cases, Dr. McMahan said, the new Act provides for higher payments to these widows than were granted under previous laws.

Any of these widows who wish to receive the higher benefit must apply for the new compensation payments even though they already are on VA rolls.

Application cards have been sent to widows eligible for increased payments. Such payments will be made retroactive to January 1, 1957 provided widows apply by July 1, 1957.

With certain exceptions, applications received after July 1, will be effective as of the day they are received, Dr. McMahan emphasized.

The benefit will be paid at the monthly rate of \$112 plus twelve percent of the basic monthly pay now being received by a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased veteran, Mr. McMahan pointed out.

Widows who make application for the new benefit but who would receive more under old laws will be advised by VA against the "wrong choice of payment. Increases, however, cannot be authorized unless application is made.

Advice about applying for the new benefit is available at any VA office.

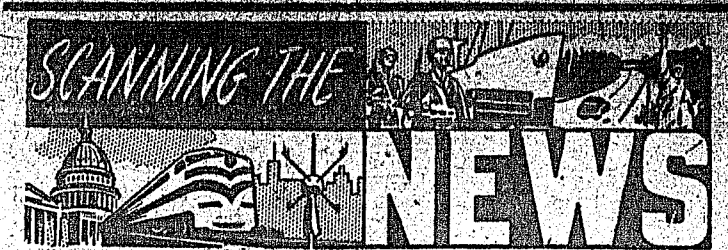

THE Senate Resolution presented by President Eisenhower asking a blank check to use American armed forces in the Middle East and to spend \$200 million for economic and military assistance in that area is no longer a blank check.

Not only were safeguards thrown about the use of troops and money, but the President and his administration came in for some cutting criticism on U. S. foreign policy in the Middle East, or rather for lack of it. Senator Theodore F. Green, of Rhode Island in presenting the amended Committee resolution on the floor of the Senate spoke, rather childishly, it must be admitted, about "past mistakes" in the middle East. He also said:

"In calling upon the executive branch to develop Middle East policies which will help achieve our peaceful objective there, I must remind the Department of State of the evidence developed during the hearing of the joint committee that the State Department machinery and procedures have been at times extremely faulty. It is to be hoped that no more instances will come to light in which the United States Ambassador in a country in the Middle East will learn from the local newspapers of the announcement of United States policies of great concern to the country to which he is accredited."

"We must insist that the executive branch develop constructive foreign policies. The Committee on Armed Services and Foreign Relations must insist on a response by the executive branch

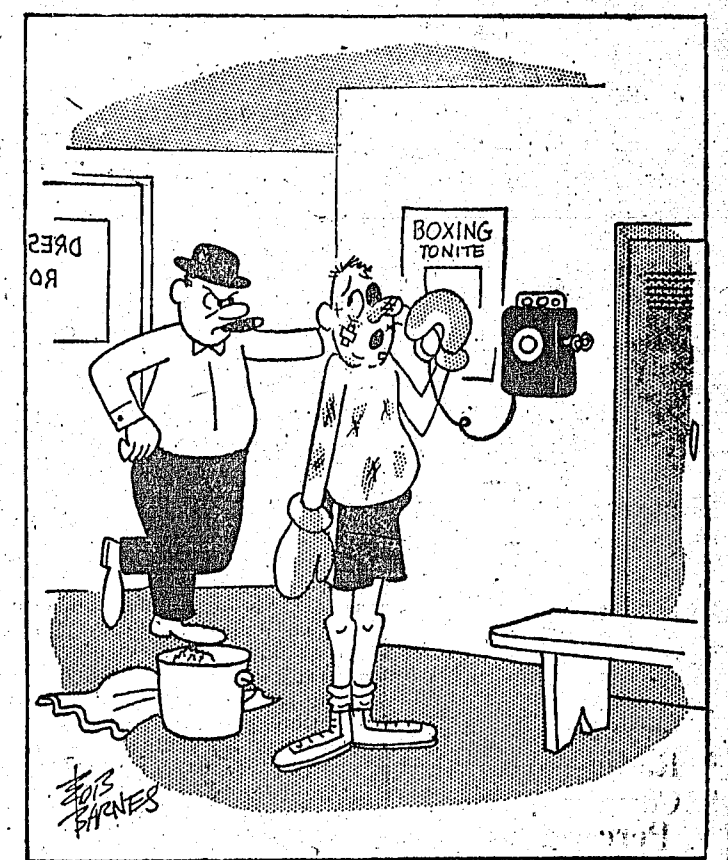
to the request which we have made for documents and other material which will provide a full and fair picture of United States involvement in the Middle East during the past several years."

Instead of an outright authorization to the President, the Committee resolution reads that if the President determines the necessity thereof, "The United States is prepared to use armed forces to assist any nation requesting assistance against armed aggression from any country controlled by international Communism."

Instead of giving a blank check on use of the \$200 million for economic and military assistance, the Committee resolution says that "no money shall be used until 15 days after the Foreign Relations and Appropriations committees of the Senate and the Foreign Affairs and Appropriations Committee of the House" receive a report and approve, where military assistance is involved. The Eisenhower resolution had no termination date, and the Committee put the termination either upon the President's view the emergency is past, or a "concurrent resolution of the two Houses of Congress."

Several Senators, as this is written have further amendments to be offered from the floor, including O'Mahoney, Wyoming; Morse, Oregon; Mansfield, Montana; Douglas, Illinois, and others. On a proposed amendment will be a clear definition of "military assistance." Another will withhold funds from any Mid-East nation which makes aggressive war upon another. Another likely will limit military funds received for "Defense only."

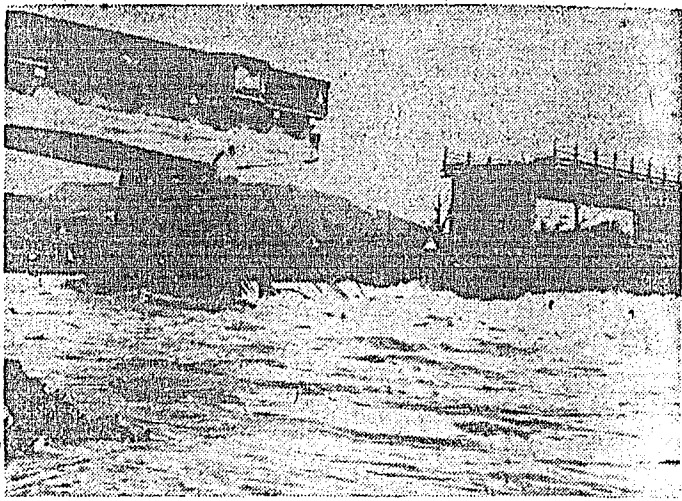

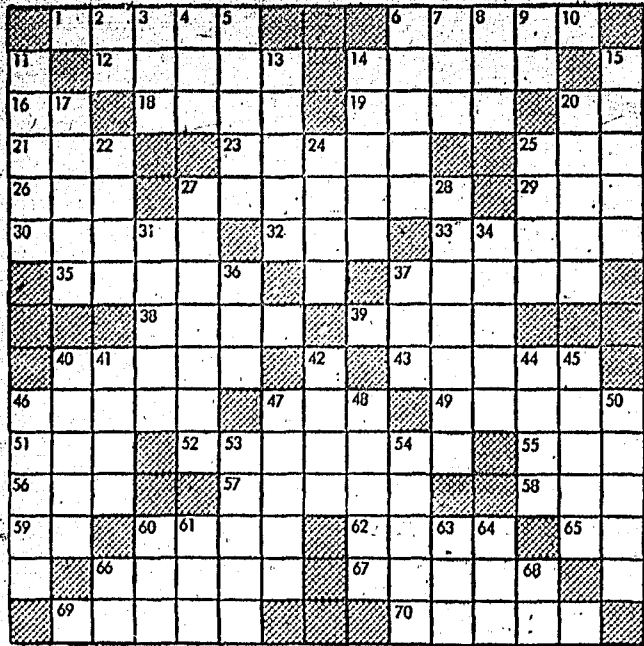

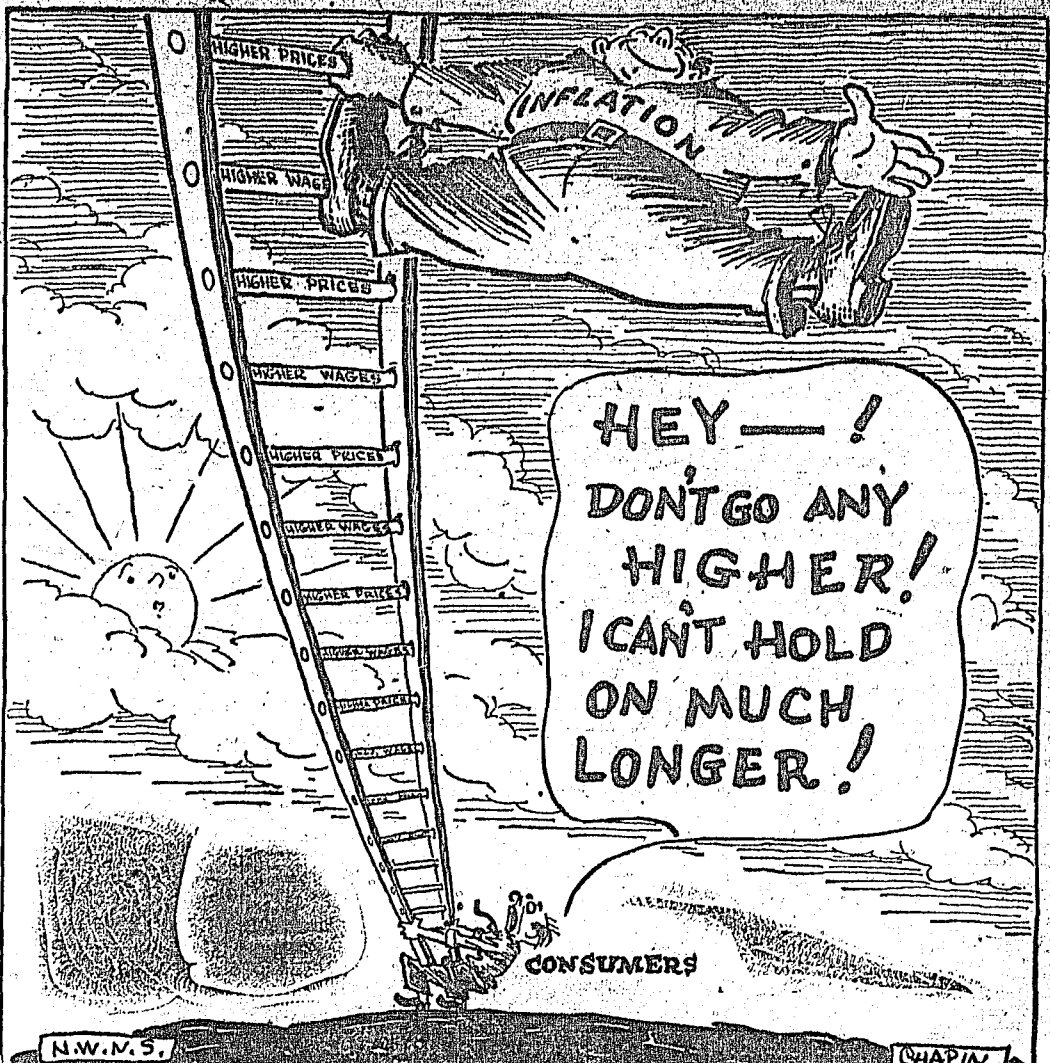
LITTLE THINGS
