Subcommittee recommends return of land to Hawes, Little

The Senate Subcommittee on Natural Resources, has reported that their first recommendation for the Matagorda Island land transfer is that the land in question should be returned to its natural owners, the Hawes and Little families.

The report was given in Houston on Thursday and was the result of a hearing held six weeks ago by the subcommittee. The subcommittee's second recommendation, if the first was not taken, was that the land be transferred to the state, as the federal government is now proposing.

A stipulation was made on both recommendations that the uplands, or wetlands portion, of the land be managed according to the same wildlife principals now being followed.

This information was learned shortly before the Pilot went to press on Thursday. A detailed article on the subcommittee report will follow in the Pilot Midweek.

Court opposes airport rent hike

"It's pretty evident that you don't have fuel. You're not in compliance with the airport and you're not in compliance with your contract...If you're going broke, I sympathize with you...but you knew what you were getting when you got an airport." — County Judge John D. Wendell.

"The real reason for the increase, we feel, is due to what's required of Rockport Aviation as far as abiding by the contract and lease agreement and

what's required of other operators at the airport. We feel that we're shouldering the whole brunt of the airport expense and no one else is doing anything, contrary to the rules and regulations set down by the country." — Clifford "Kip" Lowe, Rockport Aviation partner

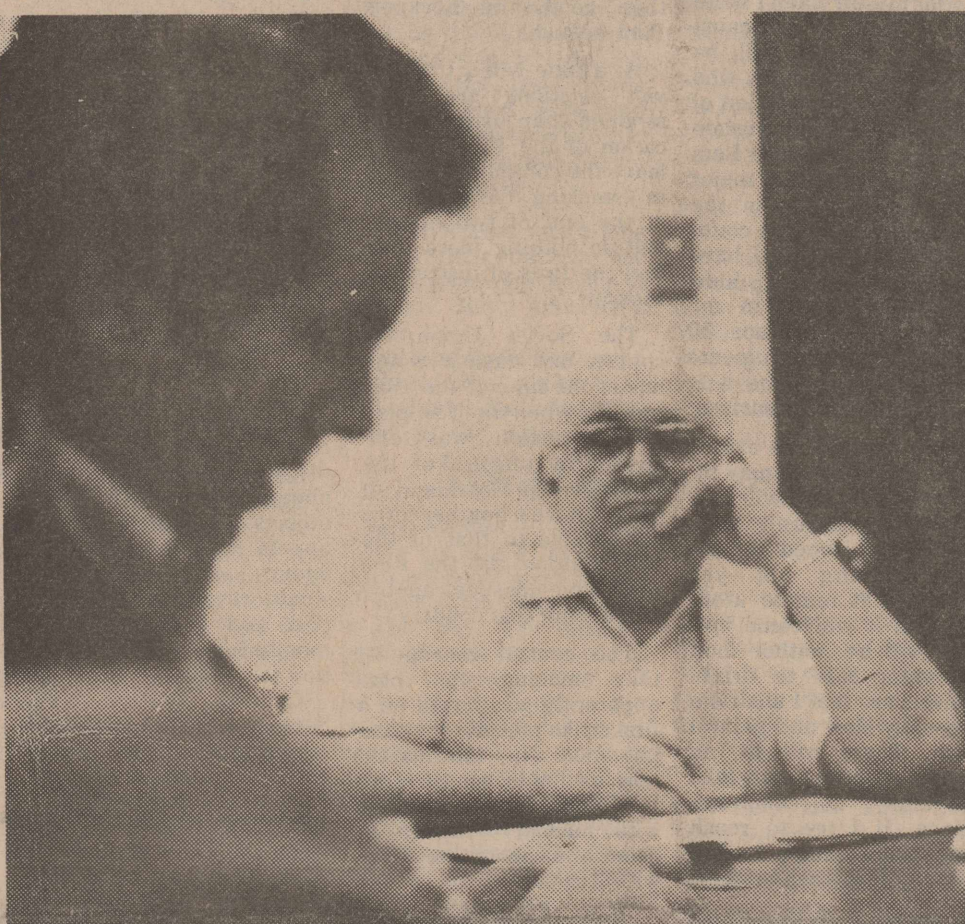
"I think what I'm saying is that these helicopter services have been allowed to go in there and not follow minimum requirements as set out by the airport and dispense their own fuel, where if they were buying fuel from my client, my

client could very well afford to do all these activities that are required." — McNeal Munn, attorney for Rockport Aviation

The fixed-wing base operator of Aransas County airport, Rockport Aviation, recently raised their hanger rent by some 70 percent and on Wednesday,

representatives of the company appeared in Aransas County Commissioner's Court, at the request of the commissioners, to justify the rent hike. They charged that the numerous helicopter operators at the airport, by dispensing their own fuel and not buying

Cities join fight against CPL rate request

Rockport and Fulton officials have announced plans to join a Texas Municipal fight against Central Power & Light Company's proposed rate increase.

CP&L is asking for a rate increase of about 18.68 percent, according to Joel Zapata, manager of the Rockport CP&L office. This percentage is based on pro-forma test year revenues, including fuel. The new rates will be about 48.5 percent higher than pro-forma base revenues excluding fuel.

The test year for CP&L was from Jan. 1 through Dec. 31, 1981. During that period, CP&L reports a deficiency of \$156 million in revenues.

Under the proposed rate hike, an Aransas County resident now paying \$34.86 for 500 kilowatt hours of electricity would pay \$43.88. A current \$65.01 bill would jump to \$80.69. The cost of 2000 kilowatt hours would increase from \$125.29 to \$154.30.

Current rates include a March fuel adjustment of slightly more than three and a half cents per kilowatt hours. The proposed rates include the same fuel adjustment plus a gross receipts surcharge.

In requesting the rate increase, CP&L officials say it has been 30 months since the company's last rate increase. During

the past three years, in addition to inflation, the company has spent more than \$660 million on its continuing construction program and anticipates spending another \$257 million during the next year, officials said. They added that most of the \$257 million will be spent at the South Texas Project nuclear plant.

CP&L officials said this is the fourth rate request in the company's history, with prior requests made in 1973, 1976 and 1979.

Bob Bernardy: Rockport area destined to be hub for retail outlets

"For the first time in history, Rockport is going to be a hub of retail outlets. This corner will be offering the greatest selection within a radius of 25 miles."

"This corner" refers to the one that will be occupied by Harbor Oaks Shopping Village on Hwy. 35 North and the statement is from Bob Bernardy at Live Oak Real Estate this past week in reaction to the inquiries he's had from businesses wanting to locate in the new center.

"Another grocery store has approached us to locate in the center," Bernardy said, "giving us three gro-

ceries to choose from now." He added a decision on a grocery store is expected within the next six weeks.

"We've had a remarkable response from local merchants wanting to locate in the center," Bernardy said, as well as a large number of inquiries from Corpus Christi businesses interested in opening a branch in Rockport. Inquiries from Corpus he added, include restaurants and a clothing store.

He declined to mention any names at this point since no leases have actually been signed. But, he added, "We have letters of intent for several thousand square feet of floor space and several

verbal inquiries."

Interest is also running strong in the mini-mall which will be patterned after the Galleria in Houston — although on a smaller scale, Bernardy said. The mini-mall will consist of two stories with a balcony arrangement with small retail businesses on the lower level and professional services on the upper. Bernardy has already received inquiries from business and professional people interested in leasing space.

Plans for the \$5 million shopping development, to be located between Traylor Avenue and Henderson on Hwy. 35 North, were officially unveiled March

17 by Roger Seaman Jr., president of the Candy Stick Corp. of Corpus Christi, project developers.

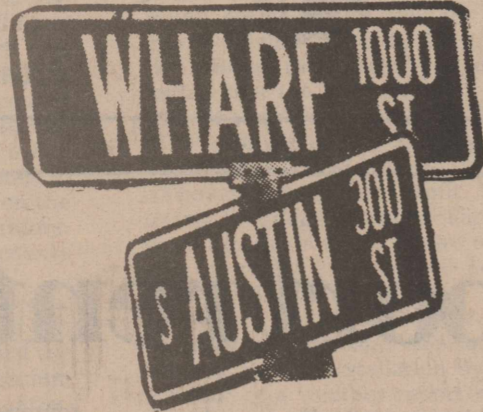
Although Seaman did not name any other stores to be located in the new center, he announced that an Eckerd Drug store would be constructed.

Construction of the center is scheduled to begin between June 1 and June 15 with projected completion date in early 1983. The strip center and mini-mall are expected to have more than 25 different types of stores in a 100,000 to 120,000 square foot area with 550 parking spaces.

Nuclear attack survival talk is sheer idiocy

"THE GREAT NOSTALGIA Kick," a piece in US&WR a few days ago was interesting, rather charming, but also a bit disturbing. Some might offer it as evidence of a nutty era of Americans prosperous enough to spend modest fortunes on trivia they really don't need, old dolls, toys, baseball cards and brittle wicker chairs. Never mind the 16 percent unemployed in Detroit. Some call this nostalgia a renewed interest in history. "Candy history," a sceptical, serious historian snorts. Yet there are nice aspects — the return of ballroom dancing, music with rhythm people can listen to, youngsters switching from t-shirts and jeans to "preppy" attire, revival of old movies with real plots. It's a sort of longing for the imagery of times past. There are reports from some university campuses of renewed interest in history, but a new course at George Washington University covering the period of 1880 to Pearl Harbor attracted only 14 students. However, the



class burgeoned in the second semester when the course covered the post war years. There's the rub, the disturbing part; unless I grossly misjudge, most people under 40 for the most part care very little for anything that hasn't happened almost within their lifetimes. Not just disturbing in my view, instead, tragic.

I'M ON A MODEST EGO trip, one readers of this column may share. Tuesday of last week Bill Moy-

ers on the CBS Evening News discussed the potential of nuclear war and cited the series of articles on the subject by Jonathan Schell in the New Yorker, soon to be published as a book. But you read all about that as much as a month ago in your hometown weekly newspaper.

ON MONDAY OF LAST week a Corpus Christi Call-er editorial chided civil defense people on their stance and attitude by intimating to the public that if proper

precautions are taken 80 percent of the people in this country can hope to survive — if proper precautions

and preparations are made for a nuclear attack. Nonsense, sheer idiocy! Many of you may remember the civil defense flap during the middle 1950's. Underground shelters were being urged, models wheeled about the country and demonstrated. Some people I am certain made a neat packet out of those sod covered pup tents. I suspect that many may still exist, forgotten in a corner of the backyard. I do recall one of gigantic proportions, built by a rancher near the Bluntzer Community in Nueces County. He used his own ideas and that place had everything. I often wonder what happened to it.

Seriously, and I speak only for myself when I write that if such a holocaust occurs I hope I will be among the lucky many who will be gone in a fraction of a second. Let me explain what I mean. Suppose I am far away from the major bomb targets, out in the wild and rocky Pecos country, if you like, and I have the (good?) fortune to hide deep in the earth in my shelter. Then perhaps 30 days later the instruments in my shelter tell me it is reasonable safe to surface. Depending upon the extent of the attack, there may be some chance that I will find some life around me, clouds of poisoned atmosphere having not yet reached that remote area. But soon it will come and there will be neither food nor water safe to drink. Chances are that I shall die a possibly slow and painful death. There will be no hospitals where I can take my family, no communications. If I try to reach some major center I shall probably turn back because

the closer I approach the more I will see of devastated fields, dead and rotting life — human, animal and vegetable... "And not all your piety, nor all your wit/shall change a single line of it."

FOR MORE YEARS than I can count I have enjoyed John Gould's pieces from his Down East Farm in Maine (Christian Science Monitor). Not long ago John made note of a TV review of the most important personalities of 1981. However, he had to miss the program since it came after 7:30 p.m. The idea bugged him for several days, until he made his own list. For reasons other than John's I too missed the review, but I'll back his list against the network's best. There's Everett Malm II who keeps a lobster boat by his telephone. He blows it vigorously into the mouth-piece whenever he is connected to a tape machine.

Reginald Ransome of RFD No. 3, Box 547, saves all his junk mail and then once a month carries it to the front steps of the postmaster's house. Chet Ringrose was a supporter of Weight Watchers Anonymous and sent a generous, but anonymous check.

Shorty Conover, baseball statistician, announced that Boomer Bagshot, left-fielder for the Tri-Town Tigers, batted .218 against left-handed pitchers and .218 against right-handed pitchers, for a combined season's average of .218. Yes, and Gunther Labouette of Meadow Road,

Smoking ruins plan

Although it has been nearly 30 years and new technology has replaced most military weapons systems since the 1950s, declassification of a U.S. plan to annihilate the Soviet Union may do more harm than good, the Rockport Pilot believes.

At a time when U.S.-Soviet relations are more strained than usual, publication of the U.S. plan to leave the communist nation in "smoking, radiating ruin at the end of two hours" will do nothing more than fuel the fires of distrust in Moscow.

The Soviet Union, of course, had nuclear weapons at the time of the 1954 briefing when the U.S. plan of destruction was discussed by officers of the Strategic Air Command. It did not have a bomber force comparable to that of the U.S. Neither did the Russians have missiles capable of reaching this country.

The central concept of the "smoking ruin" plan apparently was based on a first strike premise, but it is not clear in information now available whether the U.S. would have struck first with nuclear weapons in event of a conventional war with Russia.

The scope of the nuclear devastation plan is mind-boggling. A total of 735 B-47 bombers would have been used in the attack. The SAC target list included 1,700 "Designated Ground Zeros" including 409 Soviet airfields and petroleum installations.

In 1954, the man who would have executed this plan if it had been necessary to use it, Gen. Curtis LeMay, said he believed the war with Russia would have lasted 30 days. He estimated the single nuclear strike would have taken only two hours.

The "exact manner in which SAC will fight the war (with the Soviets) is known only to Gen LeMay as he will decide at the moment, depending on the existing conditions," said the document released for publication under the federal Freedom of Information Act.

Author David Alan Rosenberg reproduced the documents in International Security, a foreign affairs quarterly published by Harvard University.

The documents left no doubt the decision to mount the nuclear strike would be made by the president and that Gen LeMay would be in the commander's seat thereafter.

It is doubtful the release of this information, although long outdated and the intended weapons obsolete, will help the U.S. in its sensitive dealings with the Soviet Union.



Court won't release documents

The National Security Agency has further whetted the appetite of information seekers by admitting it has 135 "UFO-related" documents and at the same time declining to release them, citing its top-secret work.

The Supreme Court has refused to order the NSA to disclose whatever it knows about unidentified flying objects. In opposing an appeal for disclosure, the agency said such action would reveal some of its top-secret electronic monitoring and interception techniques.

Citizens Against UFO Secrecy, a New York-based organization, filed the disclosure appeal under the Freedom of Information Act. The case began in 1978 when the UFO group filed a formal request of 18 NSA documents under the information access law. NSA refused to release the papers, claiming they are exempt from disclosure.

The group then filed a lawsuit, seeking release of "papers in the possession or under the control of the National Security Agency relating to or pertaining to unidentified flying objects and the UFO phenomena."

NSA is a Defense Department agency headquartered at Fort Meade, Md. One of its main responsibilities is to gather foreign intelligence information by intercepting radio communications sent to or from foreign governments.

"It is protection of this critical information that is at the heart of the UFO case," the agency said.

Urging a federal district court to throw out the case, the NSA filed one public affidavit and one confidential affidavit that was reviewed in private by Judge Gerhard Gesell.

Gesell dismissed the case in 1980, declaring, "Release of this material could seriously jeopardize the

work of the agency and the security of the United States."

The UFO group then took the dispute to the U.S. Court of Appeals in Washington, but that panel affirmed Judge Gesell's ruling.

There you have it. People who would like to inspect official documents dealing with UFOs have lost their fight for the time being.

There have been many reports of UFO sightings over the years. It seems logical to The Rockport Pilot to assume some of the witnesses did have an extraordinary experience for which no proven explanation was ever given.

Wouldn't you like to see those UFO official documents?

Federal pension system should be examined

While our elected officials are searching for ways to reduce federal spending, including possible reductions in Social Security benefits, they should examine the federal pension system under which some retirees receive more than they were making while employed by the government.

Although the officials cannot arbitrarily change the pension system they can recommend changes to Congress.

Here is a prime example of the inequities of the pen-

sion system: He hasn't worked for the federal government for five years, but starting in April former House Speaker Carl Albert will be receiving a larger check than anyone currently on the federal payroll except the president.

An 8.7 percent cost-of-living adjustment will increase the pension checks of nearly two million federal retirees in April, pushing the Oklahoma Democrat's annuity beyond the \$100,000 level. At the same time, it will spotlight the troublesome problem of

reducing federal spending: the enormous impact of "entitlements" such as federal pension benefits, on uncontrolled budget growth.

Albert, like some other federal pensioners, is not only collecting more in pension benefits than he earned while on the job, he is getting more money than the salary currently paid to his successor, Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., who receives \$79,000.

Albert knows how O'Neill feels. When Albert was speaker, his predecessor, John McCormack, D-Mass., was getting more in pension benefits than Albert was earning at the same job. At the time of his death in 1980, McCormack was collecting about \$97,000 a year.

President Reagan is paid \$200,000 a year, but Albert will be getting more than Vice President George Bush's \$79,815, and more than Chief Justice Warren Burger, who is paid \$96,800 a year.

Former Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., D-N.J., a convicted bribe-taker who resigned just ahead of a vote by his colleagues to expel him, will get federal pension benefits ranging

from \$45,000 and \$50,000 a year. Unless the pension system is changed, it won't be long before Williams is receiving more in pension benefits than the \$60,662.50 he was paid as a sitting senator — and may be even more than incumbent senators will be getting then.

There is no question of the need for overhauling the federal pension system. The Rockport Pilot hopes Congress will act with dispatch to remedy the system's inequities. Unless he can do it on his own, no retired federal employee should be paid more, or even as much, as he was making while on the job. Such shenanigans make a mockery of every pension system, especially those that are tax-supported.

Federal privacy laws go to far

Attention should be given to correcting flaws in U.S. privacy laws that prevent detection of criminal records.

Before enactment of federal privacy laws in 1974, it was possible for a company to determine whether a job applicant had a criminal record.

Privacy law supporters argued that the practice of allowing checks for criminal activity was open to abuse. Congress was convinced and a law protecting an individual's privacy was put on the federal statute books.

Problems with privacy laws now being encountered should have been foreseen but weren't. Under the privacy law, it is illegal for anyone but a law enforcement agency to have access to criminal records. This system is also being abused.

The problem was underlined recently in Houston in the case of the Alley Theatre security guard questioned by police after the slaying of theatre director Iris Siff, who was found strangled in her office Jan. 13.

During the police investigation, it was learned the security guard was a convicted felon from Ohio who had served 40 months of a forgery and weapons charge sentence and who was on parole when he was hired by the Houston security service.

It is likely the security service had no alternative but to accept the guard applicant's word since it was forbidden by law from checking for criminal activity.

If a person applies for an armed security guard job, which requires he or she be commissioned by the state Private Investigators and Security Agencies Board, the board then becomes responsible for checking with the National Criminal Information Center (NCIC) to determine whether an applicant has a criminal record anywhere in the country.

In the Houston case, the guard was an unarmed or noncommissioned officer and as such was not subjected to an NCIC investigation. He has since resigned.

An employer cannot make a criminal activity check on a prospective employee because NCIC records are closed to all but official law enforcement agencies.

Houston investigators released the guard from custody after checking on his background. The next case could involve a convicted murderer who killed again.

The Rockport Pilot points out the obvious need to amend privacy laws. Employers should have access to pertinent information about a prospective employee. In its present form the privacy law protects a job applicant from an employer's right to know who he is hiring.

No one disagrees that the right of privacy should be protected from governmental prying, but not to the extent of allowing persons with criminal records to obtain a sensitive job by legally covering up that record.

Prior to WWI when things were going well for Germany, the Kaiser decided to remove the architect of Germany's peace, prosperity, and the planner of a seemingly bright future. The cartoon that ran that day was called, "Dropping the Pilot." The bright future that was almost theirs never came to be during the Kaiser's lifetime. It may be difficult at the moment to understand the analogy between Bismark's removal and the reelection of Mayor Falk, so hang in there a few moments.

There is more to the reelection of Mayor Falk than the influence he has on the city of Rockport. The Mayor has been recently selected by his peers on the Council of Governments to be the Chairman of the Council. Rockport, by having an elected official as Chairman of the Council, shall come into a period of having increased political influence on programs needed for the growth of the city and the county as a whole.

What does this mean? The chairman and the council of COG form an association of a 12 county region centered around the Corpus Christi metropolitan area. It will be noted that while Judge Barnes was Chairman Nueces County did not want for approved development projects.

The COG is responsible for the preparation of regional plans for water, sewer, transportation, recreation, economic development, human resources and the elderly. Funding for specific projects comes from local contributions and State and Federal grants or contracts. The position of Mayor Falk as chairman of COG will provide political clout for Rock-

port as well as the county in gaining recognition of vital problems in population density*, transportation, economic development

and services to the elderly.

The charter requires that two thirds of the members to the Council of Governments shall be elected officials. What clout can a chairman or council member have if he or she were to be voted out of elected office while serving an appointed term with the COG? Little, if any. It would be back to square one for Rockport and Aransas County.

Give Mayor Falk the support he needs by a strong showing of strength on election day and he will carry power from Rockport as he presides over the council. As a recently elected official and chairman of COG he can use his position to assure that sound and studied community action programs for transportation, economic development, sewer, health, services for the elderly, etc. needed for growth and an improved quality of life for the residents of Rockport and Aransas County will be on the docket and seriously considered.

Returning Walter Falk as Mayor will assure a continuity of purpose, maintaining experience and power among the members of the Council of Governments. Re-electing Walter Falk as Mayor would be a counter analogy to the Kaiser's action in that Rockport would be keeping its pilot.

Congressman has a way out of the dilemma

Editor's note: The Live Oak Peninsula Philosopher on his Grassburn farm thinks he has discovered a way to get more statesmanship in Congress.

Dear editor: As I understand it, Congress is supposed to set a budget, whatever purpose that serves, although I think it's sort of like the national debt ceiling which can be revised whenever it's handy, either up or down, the latter being something that's never been tried.

Anyway, Congress is having soul-searching trouble because this is an

election year. To set a budget that reduces the deficit requires a Congressman to vote for either a cut in his favorite spending program or a raise in taxes. And voting for a raise in taxes in an election year is considered as unwholesome for reelection purposes as eating a meal of turkey and dressing at half-time would be for a football team's chances of winning the game.

One Congressman, however, has discovered a way out of this dilemma.

He got up on his feet the other day and told his fellow Congressmen that he

had voted a few months ago in favor of cutting taxes despite the fact it meant a bigger deficit because "I considered it in my best political interest." In other words, he confessed he'd put staying in office ahead of what he thought was best for the nation. Out of habit, he was following the standard rule that says "the first duty of a Congressman is to get reelected."

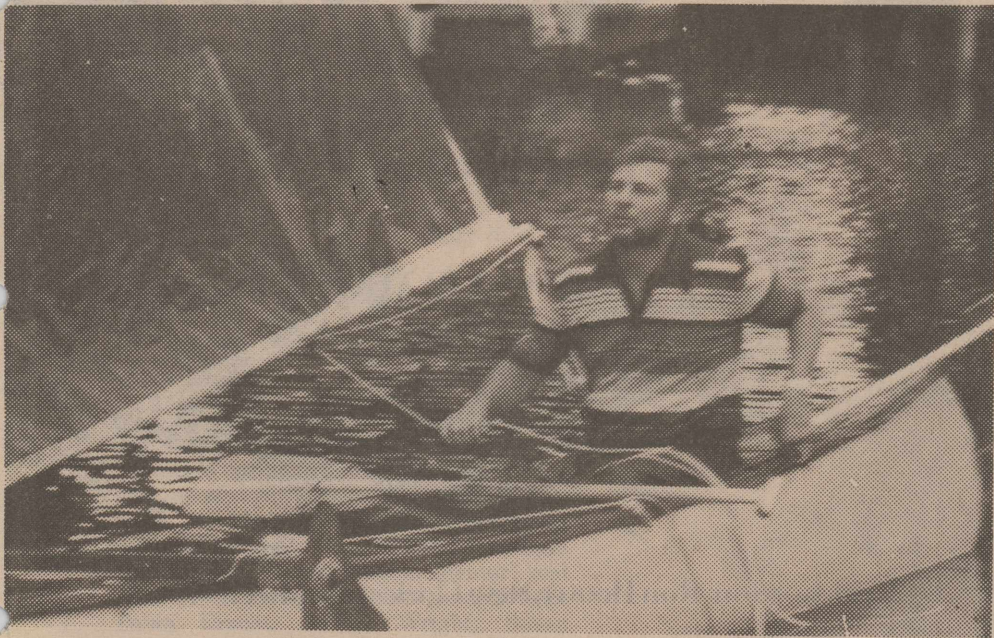
Now, he said, he regretted it and he doesn't care what his fellow party members think, he's going to speak his mind regardless and vote his convictions.



He added also that he won't seek reelection because he has developed a severe back problem that'd prevent him from serving. It's clear, the way to get more statesmanship in Washington is to get more Congressmen with back trouble. Yours faithfully, J.A.

Just waiting for the wind

"I just want to enjoy life as it comes." That's Henry Dodson's reason for selling his car in December, buying a 17 foot fiberglass canoe, equipping it with a sail, sailing and rowing to Fort Isabel, leaving there on March 15 and coming back up the Intracoastal Canal to Rockport, en route to Birmingham, Ala.

A native of Washington state, Dodson has served in the Coast Guard and has been a professional photographer. He says he doesn't call anyplace in particular home and repeats he "just wants to enjoy life" as much as he can and the best way for him to do that is on the water.

Asked if he was independently wealthy, Dodson laughs and says, "No, very independently poor. If I had a penny, I'd be on one of those big boats out there."

The canoe and outfitting it for the trip cost around \$500. The top of the craft is covered with a canvas tarp which fits snug around Dodson as he sails or rows in bad weather.

Bad weather has been his main nemesis recently. Prior to landing in Rockport on Monday, he spent three days in the rain and wind on an island north of Corpus Christi, waiting for the right wind to come this way. Spending his days on islands isn't

Dodson's idea of enjoying life. "I spend all the time pacing the beach like a caged animal, waiting to get out on the water."

Another problem encountered by the sailor recently was a broken rudder, forcing him to put up at a bait camp south of here. Trials and tribulations have brought him into contact with one good thing, however. "I really learned about real southern hospitality, having put up with people and having them help me out," says Dodson.

"One old guy was helping me with the rudder and I made a remark about southern hospitality and he said, "Southern hospitality is nothing compared to Texas hospitality. Have another bologna sandwich," recalls Dodson.

Staying at the Key Allegro marina as the guest of Russ Wilhour, Dodson is waiting for the wind to change. Having left on Wednesday around 3 p.m. in light of a weather forecast for southeast winds, he met with 15-20 mile northeast winds. "They weren't too far wrong - just 90 degrees," he quips. On his way back in, he ran into heavy fog.

So he's waiting. "If you see some guy walking around town, waiting for southeast winds, you know it's me," says the sailor.

Bon Appetit

Hi, everyone! This week the column is going to be devoted to my readers' recipes. After weeks of waiting and hoping, you ladies finally came through for me. For a while it looked as if Herb Gray would put you all to shame. Keep up the good work, ladies. You, too, Herb!



Pinto Beans Herb Gray
If you have ever acquired a taste for pinto beans then you can really appreciate this recipe, because the way most prepare them they invariably turn out rather tough and naturally the poor old beans get the blame. This recipe will not only give you a nice, tender, flavorful bean, but with a few fresh green onions and a little cornbread one could make it a meal. Personally I prefer mine with some type of BBQ. Here goes.
1 lb. pinto beans
Pinch oregano
Pinch sweet basil
1 tsp. Cumin
2 tsp. chili powder
Medium onion — diced
2 cloves garlic — diced
1 ham bone*
1 tsp. dry mustard*
1/2 tsp. red pepper (opt.)
2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. black pepper
So far it sounds like a lot of trouble but the rest is easy. Throw the rocks out and soak the beans for about 10 hours. Now this is the important part — much as it goes against the grain

of most old wives tales — heat up the beans to a simmer in the same water and DO NOT put anything in there with them! About every 30 minutes or so check to be sure the beans still have enough water — if not add some. After 2 1/2 hours the beans will have softened or even burst to the point where they can absorb the other flavorings so put in your ham bone and the rest of the ingredients and simmer one more hour. That's all there is to it.

*In case you do not have a ham bone use salt pork and eliminate the mustard but DO NOT change the cooking sequence.

Most think that adding the bone or salt pork at the start will add to the flavor — what actually happens if you do is that the beans become coated with fat and cannot absorb the cooking water as readily and remain tough.

Shrimp Creole Herb Gray
As mentioned in previous correspondence I am of the personal opinion that most, if not all of your recipes are designed for the party-wait crowd and are manufactured solely for weight watchers with the possible exception of all that gooey stuff. (Your St. Pat's did look rather good I will grudgingly admit). Anyway should you want to explore a culinary delight that will make your eyeballs tremble and your tummy say thank you just keep reading. The first thing you do is acquire a pound of fresh shrimp. The next thing you do is clean and devein them. Then you steam them for exactly six minutes, turn the heat off, let the steam out and cover for six more minutes, then put them in the refrigerator to cool — right quick. (Incidentally I would actually prefer to steam them in the shells but Elfriede always com-

- 1 medium onion — chopped
- 1 clove garlic — minced* (or 1/2 tsp. horseradish)
- 4 stalks celery — chopped
- 2 Tbs. olive oil (or corn oil if you do not have it)
- 20 oz. can peeled tomatoes
- 1 sprig thyme — crushed (or about 1/8 tsp. if pre-crushed)
- 2 bay leaves (throw away after cooking they taste horrible by themselves)
- 1 bell pepper — chopped
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 1/2 cups rice (cooked according to mfg. directions)

Should you and your husband still living together after completing the above then I suggest that you either go over to the neighbors and ask them if they have any dinner leftovers, or do the following: Simmer all ingredients except the shrimp and rice for about 30 minutes at extremely low heat. Stir every now and then and somewhere along the line add three drops of Tabasco — by the way simmer uncovered it lets all the cats around know if nothing else. At the end of 30 minutes, put in the chilled shrimp, stir and leave the heat on for two minutes. Turn off the heat and go over and argue with your neighbor or whatever for an hour or two — then come back and warm up the mixture. Then if you wish to make it pretty — shape the rice into doughnut-like shapes and fill 'er up.
*If you use garlic omit the horseradish.
Even with all the trouble it makes a delightful meal.
Party Pretzel Dessert
From Diane, receptionist at McMoran Oil Exploration, Corpus Christi.
1 bag of pretzels (10-12

oz.)
2 sticks of unsalted butter (oleo if you want, butter tastes much better)
1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
1 8 oz. pkg. cool whip
2-10 oz. pkgs. frozen strawberries
1-6 oz. pkg. strawberry or strawberry-banana Jello
In a 9x12 pan break up the pretzels into 1/4 inch pieces, covering the bottom. Too fine and it becomes mushy, too large and it is hard to serve. Melt the

butter and add 1 Table-spoon of sugar to it and make sure it is dissolved. Pour the butter over the pretzels in the pan. Stir it up good, so that all of the pretzel pieces have been covered in the mixture. Bake at 400 degrees for eight minutes. Do not over-bake. Set aside to cool completely.

Combine the cream cheese and the cool whip together with one cup of sugar and beat with a blender. Smooth this over the cooled pretzels.

Make your Jello and add the frozen strawberries. They do not have to be thawed. As a matter of fact, frozen they help cool the Jello. Let your Jello soft set and pour over the cream cheese mixture. If it is not soft set the Jello will make the pretzels mushy. Chill thoroughly, preferably overnight.

Memphis Salad
From Virginia Cauble (who just happens to be my Mom) of Albany, TX.
1 lg. can washed and drained sauerkraut
1 c. finely chopped onion

1 c. finely chopped celery
1 c. finely chopped green pepper
1 sm. can finely chopped pimento
1 c. sugar
1/3 c. white vinegar
Mix and marinate 24 hours in refrigerator before serving. Keeps well.
Heavenly Cheese Salad
From Gladys Tidmore, my Mom's oldest and dearest friend, from Albany, TX.
Prepare one large box of lemon Jello as directed on the box. Let cool and add a pinch of salt. Then add: 2 c.

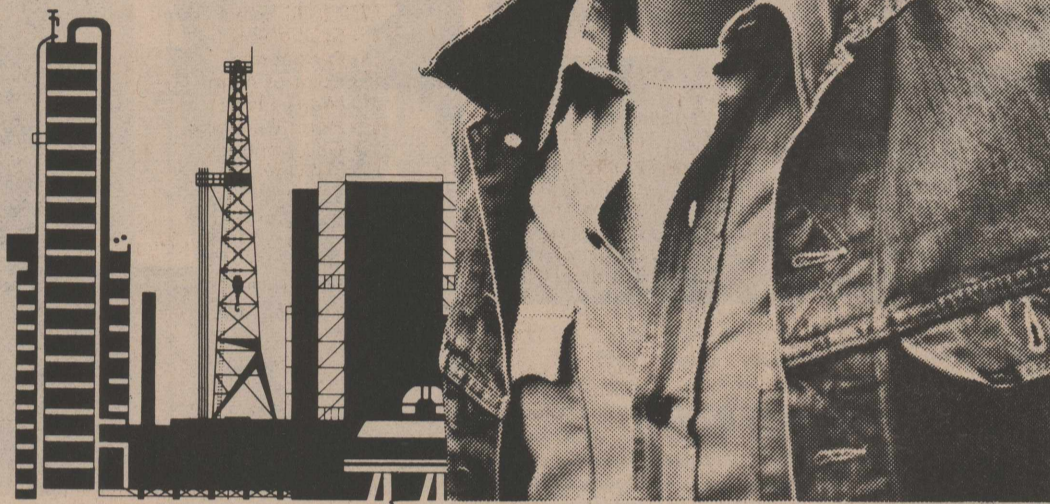

We entrust our lives to the man who drives the train or bus without question. We do not ask him to show us his license or tell us his history of accidents. "Why then do we always refuse to place our trust in our Father? Indeed, we positively mistrust him; it is as though when God is the driver, we want to snatch the wheel from him, or put

on the brakes. When he changes direction, so that our life seems to be altering course, we utter cries of distress. When he brakes or accelerates we shout in fear or anger. Imagine a family journey with all the children telling their father what to do, shouting at every crossroads: "Look out, there's a coach... See that cyclist... You're hogging the middle of the road..." It would be intolerable. Yet this is precisely what we do all the time with God."

Those of you on vacation traveling with your children will know what Fr. Evely is talking about. As for the rest of us who are on our journey through life, here is food for thought and digestion. What he is saying is that without trust we are nothing.

In other words, if you want to be somebody, then trust, not naively or without doubt, but realistically and with hope. Peace be with you.

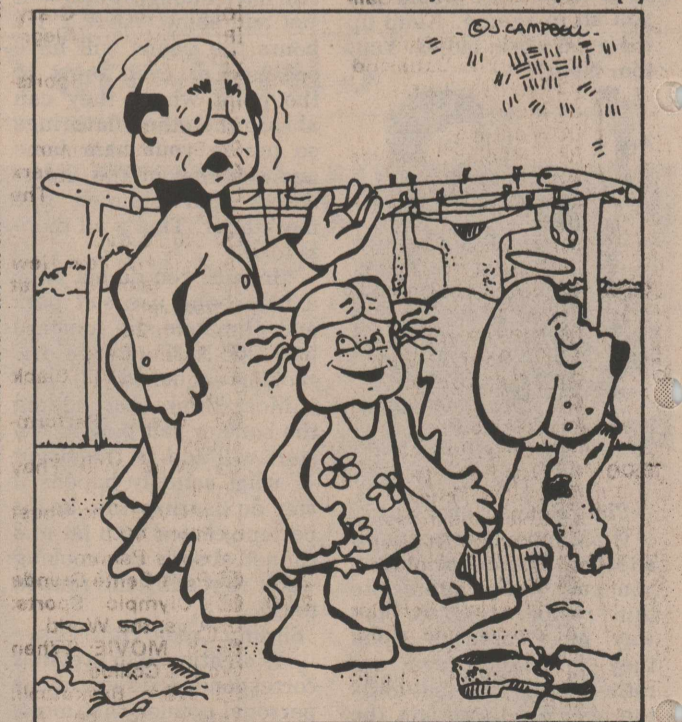
We would like to thank Ramon Garza for donating some nice books to our Home.

Peonies have rich history

Tree Peonies have been honored for centuries in China and Japan. In 400 years Japanese gardeners have developed more than 250 different varieties of this gorgeous shrub, making Japan the richest source of Tree Peonies in the world today.

One of the three most elegant and coveted varieties of the revered Tree Peony is Yachiyotsubaki (Eternal Camellian), a bright, double coral-pink. It's a Japanese favorite blooming on young plants with stems that are also vibrantly coral. Shimadaijin (Island Minister) is an enormous, fully double flower which glistens with a purple hue of great beauty. Taiyo (The Sun) is a bright, red double with petals that

gleam with a satiny sheen. Its gigantic blooms have distinguished it as one of the true greats in its homeland.

Tree Peonies are remarkably hard and long-lived. They tolerate shade and require only routine care and maintenance. Use them toward the front of shrub borders, include them in your garden as accents and use them for foundation plantings.

Ornamental all year, Tree Peonies have decorative foliage which is deeply cut and soft in texture. The woody stems are exquisite. The texture and sheen of their petals has been described as being "like Oriental silk, ruffled taffeta, or crimped and glistening satin." The blooms vary in size from six to ten inches across, and the plants aver-

age three to six feet in height with a spread that often equals the height. Well-established plants bear as many as 40 to 50 blooms.

The Tree Peony, which was first introduced in 1787 in Tibet, likes a sheltered spot away from strong spring winds which can snap the brittle slender stems. They like full sun or semi-shade in hot areas. The Tree Peony does best in a rich, deep moist soil. They like lime and should be mulched annually. Water them regularly in very dry situations. Tree Peonies can be added to the landscape in an area that needs color and is in the shade for part of the day.

Texas aquaculture plan released, reviews industry

COLLEGE STATION — The Texas Aquaculture Plan, a blueprint for the development of the state's aquaculture industry, is now available.

The plan provides a review of aquaculture — underwater agriculture — in Texas. Aquaculture ranges from catfish farming and growing shrimp and crayfish to raising baitfish.

The recently published document presents advantages as well as disadvantages for the aquaculture industry in Texas. It provides a logical basis from which the industry can be developed and provides a foundation from which future research and development can arise, points out Dr. James Davis, fisheries specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Primarily, the Texas Aquaculture Plan is designed to launch a unified effort to analyze past and current aquaculture practices in Texas and to develop more efficient technology," says Davis.

"Texas has a lot going as far as aquaculture is concerned," he points out. "It has one of the longest coastlines of any state, has regions with adequate supplies of both fresh and salt water, has a mild temperate to subtropical climate, and currently has a small but well-developed community of aquaculturists in both the private and public sectors."

The plan resulted after about two years of study and input from more than 150 individuals in Texas as well as surrounding states, notes Davis. Fish farmers, utility companies, various colleges

and universities, and a host of state and federal agencies were all involved in its development. The plan was launched at Texas A&M University during the 1980 meeting of the Fish Farmers of Texas.

"A key part of the plan deals with the resource potential for the aquaculture industry in Texas," says the fisheries specialist. "It provides an overview of freshwater resources as well as bay and estuarine water, ground and surface water resources, climate data and

soil resources.

Legal and environmental constraints are also reviewed along with a permitting system. The aquaculture industry impacts on water quality and quantity as well as land use, so this is a vital part of the overall plan, notes Davis.

Funding and financing assistance is also discussed in the document, including government and non-government funding sources.

Another section of the report deals with marketing of aquaculture products.

"The demand for aquaculture products is great not only in Texas but throughout the nation and has potential for expansion," says Davis.

"For fish farmers and others to take advantage of this opportunity, they must undertake better organized and more intensive market development programs."

Finally, the Texas Aquaculture Plan looks at various freshwater and marine species, including channel catfish, tilapia, largemouth bass, crayfish and shrimp, the potential for each of

these, and how they can be developed.

All in all, it's a document that provides a firsthand look at a growing industry that promises to get even larger in the years ahead, says

Davis. The Texas Aquaculture Plan lays the groundwork for what is to come.

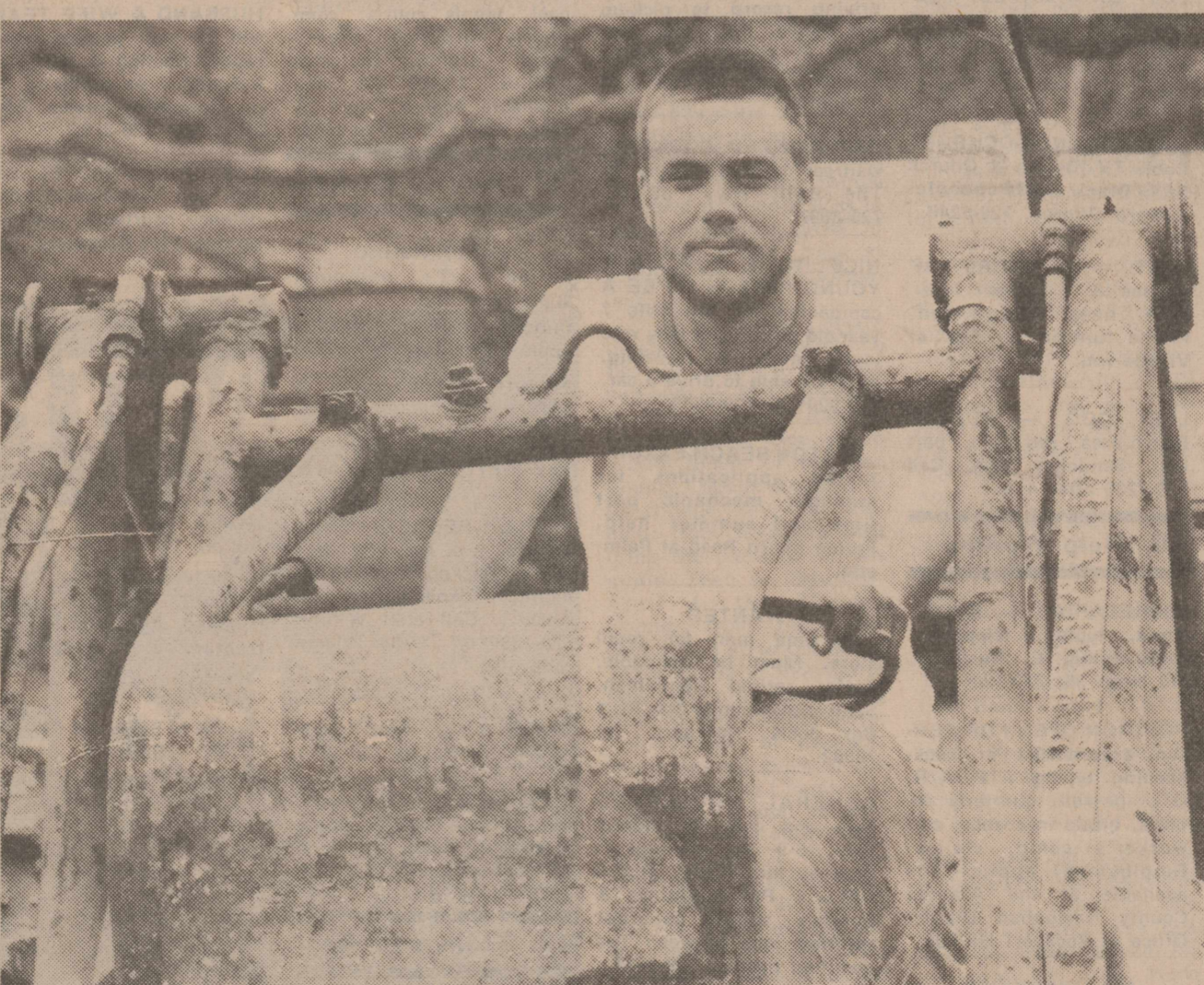

He's available for jobs in the area on weekdays, any time of day and he charges an hourly rate, which he says "is the only fair way for everybody." Septic tank jobs will be bidden on by Madill.

The "quality" part of the name is most important, he says. "Satisfied customers are the greatest asset I can have."

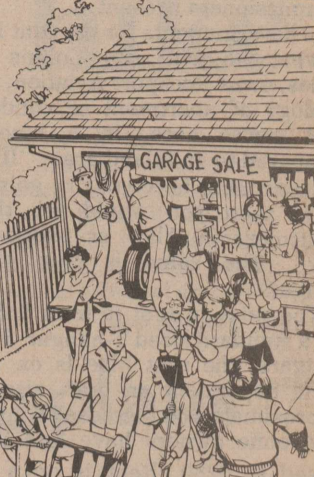

it from Rockport Aviation, were not carrying their part of the financial burden of airport upkeep.

Also appearing at the court session were several visitors, among them Harold Picton who charged that Rockport Aviation had, on numerous occasions, "run out" of aircraft fuel and had been unable to sell any to aircraft owners who needed it. Judge Wendell agreed with these charges, saying he had received many phone calls and complaints from airport users unable to buy fuel because of a shortage or unwilling to purchase fuel because of the high cost charged by Rockport Aviation.

Despite the fact that two county commissioners were absent, the discussion lasted for more than an hour and a half, resulting only in the agreement to conduct a later workshop session on the problem, with the helicopter operators, Rockport Aviation and all the county commissioners present.

In his arguments for the rent increase, Lowe, who with Rip Collins and K. Jones, owns Rockport Aviation, used the analogy of apartment or condominium rent prices here, in a resort area, compared to an inland area. "If you rent an apartment here you're going to pay more than you would for the same apartment in Alice or another inland town. The same is true of airport hangars."

The raise in rent is from \$85 to \$145 for a standard sized T-hangar. For larger hangars, the rent hike is on a sliding scale dependent on craft size with an approximate \$60 increase. King Air and Cheyenne owners have had their rent raised to \$280. Rent is on a monthly basis.

Of nearby airports, the only one with

higher rents than Aransas County is Corpus Christi, with a large hangar rent rate of \$330. Lowe told Wendell that he felt the Aransas County rent prices were still "lower than what they should be."

Attorney Munn reviewed the ownership record of Rockport Aviation in his presentation. The company purchased the airport lease over a year ago when former lessee Linwood Bland declared bankruptcy. (Bland was on hand Wednesday and voiced his support of the need for Rockport Aviation rent raise.) Munn spoke of the \$86,000 in capital improvements put in by Rockport Aviation during their lease period and admitted that the company had showed a loss for their first year.

"We're not talking about exclusivity. This is a public use airport," said Munn. "They need to make a profit. We're not trying to gouge anyone. The need of extra income is not to insure a profit — it's to avoid a loss. It's not greed-motivated."

Partners Collins and Jones were also on hand at the court session. Collins brought up the installation by Rockport Aviation of a weather report service for the transport helicopter operators and other aircraft owners, citing the fact that this one service alone had cost \$4,000 to set up, was being used by all operators at the airport and paid for only by Rockport Aviation.

Jones repeatedly told the court, "You can do something to make this easier for us. Why won't you?" Among his suggestions was the inclusion on the county lease agreements with airport lessees of an airport use tax, thus enabling Rockport Aviation to submit a bill to the county for reimbursement out of airport use tax funds.

The workshop session agreed on will

be held as soon as the judge receives an answer from the Federal Aviation Administration on his efforts to exempt the Aransas County Airport from Rule 139. Rule 139 states that as of the new year, transports carrying more than 30 persons can land and take off only at

Following approval of a seismographic company's proposal to cross a county road with a line, Wendell stressed to all present in the court that the commissioners and he did not give permission to seismographic companies to blast on county property.

After approving the Mineral Search Inc. request to cross a county road with a line, Wendell said, "They have to get permission to blast from property owners." Of blasting, he said, "It's a real pain in the side, but we know it's got to be done. We do not believe in blasting in the bays at all."

Wendell said he knew of many people with damaged windows or foundations due to their homes' proximity to seismographic blasts. "It's a real pain," he said, "We stay away from it."

Pet talks by Dr. Hap Lutz

Dr. Lutz is a former instructor of diseases of dogs and cats in the college of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

If a Pet Skips a Meal Dear Dr. Lutz,

I have a cat and a dog. They have been raised together and are great buddies. Sometimes my cat or dog won't eat for a day or two. Are they sick? Will they starve to death?

A Worried Pet Owner
Dear Worried,

A number of my clients feel that a cat or dog should eat regular meals and never miss a crumb. Animals will have occasional days when they do not feel like eating

without having an organic cause. Even tensions within a household are known to cause this.

By the third day, if the pet is not eating, measures should be taken to encourage eating; and if this is not successful, a veterinarian should be consulted. When the pet misses too many meals, it not only loses the energy normally supplied by the food, it also loses the energy used by the body to repair itself. This is why it is not advisable to wait beyond the third day to have a veterinarian examine your pet for illness if it is not eating.
